MAY I THANK YOU FOR THE SPLENDID STATEMENT ON ISRAEL WHICH YOU ISSUED ON FRIDAY. YOUR REAFFIRMATION OF ~~Y~~ WHOLE-HEARTED SUPPORT TO THE PALESTINE PLANK IN THE REPUBLICAN PLATFORM WHICH PLEDGED TO ISRAEL FULL RECOGNITION WITH ITS BOUNDARIES AS SANCTIONED BY THE UNITED NATIONS AND AID IN DEVELOPING ITS ECONOMY IS MOST HEARTENING AND IS COMPLETELY IN ACCORD WITH THE SYMPATHETIC AND COOPERATIVE ATTITUDE WHICH I KNOW YOU HAVE ALWAYS EVIDENCED TO THE CAUSE OF THE REESTABLISHMENT OF THE JEWISH STATE. ANY SUGGESTION THAT YOUR MOST RECENT DECLARATION ON ISRAEL IS A PARTISAN POLITICAL MANEUVER INJECTED AT THE LAST MOMENT IN THE CAMPAIGN HAS NO BASIS WHATSOEVER IN FACT STOP THE PALESTINE ISSUE IS NOT AND CANNOT BE A PARTISAN ONE IN THIS CAMPAIGN INASMUCH AS BOTH POLITICAL PARTIES ENDORSE THE STATE OF ISRAEL, URGE THE GRANTING OF ECONOMIC SUPPORT AND MAINTAIN THAT ITS BOUNDARIES ~~AS DEFINED BY THE UNITED NATIONS RESOLUTION~~ ~~OF NOVEMBER THIRTY-NINTH~~ SHOULD NOT BE MODIFIED WITHOUT THE CONSENT OF THE STATE OF ISRAEL. THAT YOU SPOKE UP AT A TIME WHEN OTHERS WERE SILENT IS A TRIBUTE TO YOUR SINCERITY AND FORTHRIGHTNESS.


As it happens, the pressure of my private practice is such that I have found it necessary to undertake any no engagements away from home.

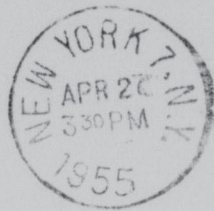
Meanwhile, why don't you have lunch with me when you are going to be in New York. I should like to keep up to date with your labors.
