
Dear Mr. Secretary:

I have your telegram and letter of October 3. I have had Bedell Smith's name in the back of my mind for some time in connection with the type of mission you suggest. However, the way things are at the moment, I feel that the time is not right to start any active negotiations. I think we must wait until both sides show a disposition to negotiate and seek our help. When that time comes, I shall certainly consider very carefully the possibility of asking General Smith to put his great talents to the task.

Dear Bedell:


The attached confidential note from Secretary
