In the belief that a congenial and memorable occasion would result, an informal committee secured the General's acceptance of an invitation to spend a day and evening with us in an advance celebration of his birthday. The day selected is October 12th and the place will be the Hershey Hotel at Hershey, Pennsylvania. The General will arrive in time for a round of golf in the morning, visit with us during the afternoon, and then we will all dine together convivially and most informally (business clothes) in the evening. Please let me know (by return mail, if possible) whether you can join us and, in the event that you can, enclose your check for \$25.00 drawn to the order of "Treasurer of Dinner Party". This will cover the cost of the dinner and a birth-day remembrance, the existence of which is to be confidential.

No doubt many will wish to stay overnight. The Hotel Hershey can accommodate 150 guests. There are two good hotels in Harrisburg, and convenient transportation to these will be available. If you so wish, a hotel reservation will be made for you -- in which case please indicate whether you prefer to stay at Hershey or Harrisburg.
