Dear Rabbi Silver:-

In the tragedy of European Jewry the condition of the children is particularly appalling. Herbert Hoover recently said:

"If civilization and humanity mean anything today, immediate help must be given those innocent little sufferers of the war who will otherwise be exterminated by disease and pestilence, as ruthlessly as if they were massacred."

The Joint Distribution Committee in the past has expended large sums in Europe towards maintaining war orphans. It is realized, however, that the growing urgency of this work demands that it be inaugurated on a larger scale than heretofore. For this purpose, a special Orphans Committee has been created of which Dr. Solomon Lowenstein, formerly superintendent of the Hebrew Orphan Asylum of New York is Chairman, and Mr. Charles Zunser, Executive Director. Mr. Zunser will have the assistance of Miss Jessie Bogen who has recently returned from Poland where she made a special study of the orphan situation.

It is the plan of the Orphans Committee to enlist the aid of the Jews of America in the financial adoption of the homeless and starving children abroad in a way similar to that used with notable success by the Fatherless Children of France Committee. In a short time Mr. Zunser will take the liberty of presenting the project to you in more detail.

The plan is to secure the financial adoption of particular children by benefactors for a certain designated sum. tentively fixed at \$100 per child. Lists of children will be submitted giving the name, date of birth, sex and address. Each donor will eventually receive a letter of gratitude from the adopted orphan, and thus may clearly see the result of his generosity. These financial adoptions will be supplemented by the bringing over of limited numbers of specially selected groups of orphans for adoption here and also wherever possible, by the reunion of orphans with relatives in this country.

I know that the Orphans Committee can rely on your vital aid in this sacred work.

My dear Dr. Silver:

The Joint Distribution Committee invites your interest and cooperation, and through you the active interest of the members of your congregation and of your community in the work of its newly inaugurated War Orphans Committee.

Broad plans by which, through American initiative the several hundred thousand Jewish war and pogrom orphans of Europe and Palestine are to be cared for, have been outlined by this Committee which is comprised of distinguished Jews, under the Chairmanship of Dr. Solomon Lowenstein, Executive Director of the Federation for the Support of Jewish Philanthropic Societies of New York City.

To in any way grapple successfully with this problem, the sympathy and interest of all the Jewish people must be secured, especially of the women, to whom the subject of the welfare of these hundreds of thousands of children should appeal with particular force, as was made evident during the War in the appeals in behalf of the children of France, Belgium and Serbia.

The main objectives to be sought by the Committee are to enlist the interest of a large number of American Jews, who shall agree to financially adopt a designated orphan in Europe; to bring about the reunion of a number of Jewish war orphans with their relatives in the United States; and lastly, to bring to this country limited numbers of specially selected, physically and mentally robust, war orphans for adoption in good homes here. Dr. Solomon Lowenstein, chairman of the Committee, made an exhaustive study during the war for the Red Cross, of conditions affecting the war orphans in the Near East and by training and experience is especially qualified for the great work entrusted to him.

The financial foster-parents will contribute to the support not of any child, but of a given child, whose identity shall be known and in whom they will be able to take a direct personal interest and to keep in touch with and follow the child's progress. A photograph and full record and history of each child and how it became orphaned is to be supplied to the American sponsors for the child's well-being and arrangements will be made for correspondence by letter between the foster parents and the adopted child.

As a first and vital step to the inauguration of the war orphans' program, the European Bureau, of which Dr. Simon Peiser is the head, is to at once begin the compilation of a complete census of war orphans in Poland, Czecho-Slovakia, Roumania, Austria and other countries of central and eastern Europe and Palestine.

It is estimated that there are not less than 300,000 orphans ranging in age from five years upwards. The number may be considerably in excess of this figure, but there are few orphans surviving under five years of age, both because of the low birth rate during the war and of the fact that in most instances infants have succumbed to the privations to which they have been exposed.

To accomplish this undertaking, the cooperation, not only of individuals but of all Jewish societies and organizations both in America and Canada is to be enlisted, including the synagogues, temples, fraternal organizations, Landsmanschaften, the trades unions and other agencies of Jewish life in America.

The J.D.C. intends that wherever possible, the war orphans shall be cared for in private homes and in their native countries abroad and the greatest care is to be exercised in the selection of these homes and of the families who will be entrusted with the up-bringing of these children.

Of equal interest with the plans for the care of the thousands of orphans abroad, is that for bringing to America those orphans who have relatives here who are willing to care for them.

Elaborate safe-guards are to be thrown about the bringing to America of the Jewish war orphans whether for adoption
by persons here or where their relatives here are known and
apply to the Committee for the children. Not only will each
child have to undergo the most rigid medical and physical
examinations abroad before the effort is made to bring them
here, but they will also be subjected to mental, moral and
physical tests; to insure that they will develope into healthy,
normal and useful adults.

The Committee will also make the closest investigation of the history and environment of the families in the United States who claim relationship to the orphans, or who may apply for the adoption of an orphan. A register is to be kept of the names of all persons in the United States and Canada, who can be reached, who are related to children orphaned by the war and are prepared to receive them into their own homes.

Some idea of the work already accomplished by the Joint Distribution Committee in relation to the Care of War Orphans is given by Miss Alice Seligsberg, who went to Palestine in the Committee's behalf. She found there upon her arrival some forty-six hundred orphans. Most of these children had no homes and absolutely no one to care for them and no food to eat. They wandered about the streets by day and by night, their cries and wails filling the air and making sleep well nigh impossible. Each morning the bodies of numbers of the children who had succumbed during the night were carried away. The Committee, by finding individual homes mainly in the colonies and by subventions to deserving local institutions had succeeded in caring for most of those children who survived.

What has been done in Palestine it is hoped to do gradually in Europe, by the working out of the plans as formulated. It is believed that in addition to thousands of individuals who will give from their plenty, the \$100. annually which has been fixed as the amount needed for the feeding, clothing, education and supervision of a child, many fraternal, religious and other organizations will appropriate from their treasury a sum sufficient to care for a large number of children.

We have taken the liberty of writing to you at length, so that you may acquaint yourself with the details of this plan, so that you may discuss it both publicly, in your pulpit, and among the members of your community, to the end that persons may be found in your community who may be desirous of becoming the financial foster parent of a given child in Europe or who may wish to legally adopt an orphan into their own homes and to register and forward to us a list of persons who have orphaned relatives abroad whom they wish to bring here.

The program is ambitious. If we succeed we shall have saved the coming generation of Jews from the utter destruction that seems to await them. We can succeed only through the efforts of a united Jewry.

We beg to request that you make a statement, to be published through the newspapers endorsing the joint campaign of the organizations in the European Relief Council for funds to provide food for starving children in Europe.

Church leaders of various faiths are being asked to make such endorsements. We are seeking by the aid of these statements to present the project as one which should be supported by all citizens, irrespective of race or creed.

The enclosed circular gives authoritative information regarding the situation and the plans for meeting it. In addition, let me say that the Ohio state committee has voted to assume responsibility for 200,000 children, feeling this to be the state's just share of the 3,500,000 to be fed. We are emphasizing the number of children to be fed, rather than the number of dollars to be raised. "Ten dollars saves a child" is the slogan of the campaign.

We trust that we may receive your endorsement within the next few days. Any additional information you may desire will be furnished cheerfully.

THE EMERGENCY

A TREMENDOUS emergency exists in Eastern and Central Europe.

It is due to no new or sudden causes, but is the persistent result of the chaos consequent upon the War.

The expectancy on the part of American Relief Organizations that the present autumn would end the demand for their aid has been disappointed.

The hope that widely planted crops would yield a bountiful and adequate harvest has not been realized.

Poverty, privation, suffering and death still march unchallenged and unchecked.

Economically and politically the ruined world must wait. There is not dynamic energy left in the world to face the task of speedy reconstruction.

But there is one cry that cannot be hushed and there is one challenge that cannot be disregarded.

It is the cry of hungry children; the challenge of Life or Death.

There are millions of children overseas who have never learned to smile. There are millions to whom Christmas means only another day of hunger.

At least three and a half million children in Central and Eastern Europe are face to face with disaster and death. Already they are in the grip of winter, half-clothed and unsheltered. Famine and pestilence have added their menace to already existing horror.

Unless aid is rendered at once, there will follow a tragedy so vast as to be unspeakable.

THE EUROPEAN RELIEF COUNCIL

REALIZING the emergency, eight Relief Organizations, all of whom had considered that their work carried on during the War was reaching a close, have agreed that never in all their experience has a call come so irresistible in its appeal; so far reaching in its meaning.

Representing each a different phase, both in work and method, they have found a common cause in answering the cry of these perishing children. They are:

- 1. THE AMERICAN RELIEF ADMINISTRATION, which since the Armistice has under the direction of Herbert Hoover carried the burden of daily food supplies to the undernourished children of Central and Eastern Europe. It fed six million children during the winter of 1918 in Central and Eastern Europe, and, during 1919, three and half millions were cared for, those who by medical test were determined to be the most seriously undernourished.
- 2. THE AMERICAN RED CROSS, which through its War Organization extended its relief work through Central and Eastern Europe, reached hundreds of thousands of children in the War-torn areas with medical help; rendered aid to mothers and new-born babies in make-shift maternity hospitals, and fought typhus, tuberculosis, rickets and kindred diseases over thousands of square miles of disaster and desolation.

- 3. THE JEWISH JOINT DISTRIBUTION COMMITTEE, which while organized for the relief of Jews in the stricken parts of Europe and Palestine, has put its work on a non-sectarian basis wherever the condition of the whole population could best be helped. It is feeding daily 300,000 children; giving medical attention to 50,000 people in Poland; is distributing milk to underfed and tubercular children without regard to race or creed.
- 4. THE AMERICAN FRIENDS' SERVICE COMMITTEE (American Quakers) who entered Germany immediately after the armistice in November, 1918, took charge of the child-feeding work in Germany, and works on the basic theory that no helpless, hungry child can be an enemy of the United States when America can save that child from death.
- 5. THE KNIGHTS OF COLUMBUS, who despite the fact that their War Activities had been finally closed, reversed their avowed determination to take no part in "drives," and have thrown their organization behind the European Relief Council in its effort to meet the winter's desperate situation.
- 6. THE FEDERAL COUNCIL OF THE CHURCHES OF CHRIST IN AMERICA, which having sent its own trained observers to Europe to investigate conditions there, has put the united aid in its organization and its membership at the service of the European Relief Council in preaching the Children's Crusade.
 - 7. THE YOUNG MEN'S CHRISTIAN ASSOCIATION and
- 8. THE YOUNG WOMEN'S CHRISTIAN ASSOCIATION, whose work was of such an inestimable value during the War, and, who knowing so intimately conditions Overseas, have volunteered their aid in carrying this Appeal throughout the land.

These are the organizations that have banded themselves together in an attempt to save the child life of Central and Eastern Europe.

That they should be joined together is an event of tremendous significance.

That they should be joined in a single purpose gives unchallenged authority to the cause they are undertaking.

THINGS THAT MUST BE DONE

S PLENDID as it would be if it could be accomplished, there is no suggestion that these children be made comfortable. That is a physical and a financial impossibility.

It is merely proposed that as many of them as possible be saved from starvation by receiving one meal a day, and that that shall be given only to the neediest.

One meal a day isn't much, but in many parts of this desolated world of misery it is all that stands between these children and death.

These children's lives by the divine righ of having saved them, belong to America. They are the residue of 12,000,000 children whom America has saved since war clutched the innocent and the helpless. They are living children today because we have fed them. If we abandon them now—what then?

It is not hunger alone that threatens.

Pestilence and famine have always stalked side by side. Undernourishment produces diseases particularly its own. Starved and puny bodies make quick fuel for disease. Tuberculosis and typhus merely touch them and they are gone.

From maternity hospitals, over-crowded and ill-supplied, newly-born babies are sent away wrapped in old newspapers because there is nothing with which to clothe them.

Hundreds of thousands of children in Europe have never tasted milk, either animal or human, in their lives.

Medical aid must be furnished, together with clothing and at least some kind of care, if there is to be a tomorrow to follow the desolation of today.

I will take \$33,000,000 to carry this project of child-saving through until the next European harvest. Of this, \$23,000,000 must be provided for feeding children, and \$10,000,000 for medical service and aid.

The distribution of these funds will be under the direction of the European Relief Council,—made up of a representative from each of the co-operating organizations.

HOW YOUR MONEY WILL BE SPENT

HE European Relief Council pledges itself that not one penny of contributed money will be used for child-feeding overhead. Expenses of the program that are incurred in America, including the cost of collection of the fund and home office up-keep, will be met from the proceeds of the American Relief Administration's Food Draft sales.

Every dollar that you contribute for child-feeding will buy one hundred cents' worth of life-sustaining food for a child.

It should be remembered that the mass child feeding work will be carried on in the future as in the past, largely through the agency of the people of the country where aid is rendered.

The American personnel of the A. R. A. in Eastern and Central Europe consists of not more than 50 representatives, but associated with them are more than 100,000 field workers, about half volunteers and the rest paid in local currency by their own Governments or charities, who do the work, gather the children, establish the feeding-stations and who, through their own efforts and organization, furnish two units of help to every one provided by American aid.

For every dollar contributed from these funds that are being raised, two dollars will be furnished in transportation, local food supplies and labor by the Government of the country aided, and by local communities throughout that country.

The American dollar, plus the native two dollars, will give a child one balanced meal a day for a month.

Medical aid, medical supplies and material must, of course, be an unqualified gift, for these are the things above all others, absolutely lacking.
