Dear Rabbi Silver:

May we call your attention to the enclosed proofs of a "Report on Germany", recently prepared by members of the Faculty-Graduate Committee. We should be pleased to have your comments on the Report.

We are proceeding to publish this material as a pamphlet which we plan to distribute, at cost, as widely as possible.

The Faculty-Graduate Committee for Peace is an organization of faculty members and graduate students at the University of Chicago. Its policies and activities are determined by its members. It is a voluntary organization, recognized under University regulations, but is in no way authorized to represent the University.

We propose that the cover of the Report bear a brief statement of endorsement, signed by a small selected group of individuals. The suggested statement follows:

"The prospect of German rearmament presents a most serious threat to world peace today. It calls for widespread discussions and thoughtful consideration by all Americans. We welcome this Report as a valuable contribution to such discussion."

If you deem the circulation of the Report a worthy project, would you agree to sign the endorsement? (Perhaps you would prefer to formulate a brief statement of your own.) Your support would be invaluable in advancing circulation of the pamphlet and thus, we believ, in promoting understanding of the crucial problem of Germany.
