Dear Friend:

The Joint Distribution Committee will shortly be in a position to advise you of its opinion as to what can best be done from its standpoint for our fellow Jews in Germany. No official request has yet come from Germany for a large amount of money. The Joint Distribution Committee has, however, out of its current resources, been forced to send an emergency contribution. In view of the amount of subscriptions made to date, this is, for us, a comparatively large sum. Last year, for the first time, we were obliged to allot a substantial sum for credit aid in Germany.


It is our conviction that we shall be called upon for large sums, and unfortunately, our present resources are entirely inadequate. You are urged, therefore, to hold yourself in readiness for a prompt effort to meet such a request for aid to people for whom we have the very greatest feeling of obligation.

The Joint Distribution Committee has firmly resolved to do nothing except with the official cooperation of the German Jews. It has for many years maintained contact with and enjoyed the confidence of all the leaders of the German Jewish welfare organizations.

Our main office in Berlin is functioning adequately and is able to make any contacts necessary. It has not been molested and it is in a position to administer whatever aid is needed.

In time of distress, it is the duty of those who can, to help. We fear that distress will follow upon terror in Germany, and we believe that many individuals, groups and localities will be affected. If any organization is qualified to and has the duty to help in this situation, it is the Joint Distribution Committee. We therefore again urge you to be ready and assure you we will make only such demands upon you which we are convinced are our plain duty.

My dear Sam:

I have just had word from Baltimore that at the initial meeting of the campaign for the J. D. C. and the Jewish agency, a sum of \$55,000 was raised and that the prospects are that Baltimore will raise over \$100,000 at these trying times with two of its big banks closed. Baltimore, you will remember, also had a very successful drive for these two causes two years ago.

What is Cleveland going to do? Will we permit the aroused Jewish sentiment, the sense of wrong and indignation which is universal in our ranks against the unspeakable iniquities of Hitler to spend itself in protests and sounded fury and nothing else? Our refugees to foreign lands must be helped. Those who are compelled to stay on in Germany and who have been driven from their professions and occupations must be assisted to re-establish themselves in other positions where they can earn a living. Thousands of German Jews are flocking to Palestine fighting for the immigration certificates which alone permit them to enter the country. Most of them are untrained for the kind of work which they must do in Palestine. They must be re-trained. Many of them can be settled on the land, but land must be purchased and prepared for them.

The whole of American Israel is keenly alert to the situation. Community after community is organizing relief campaigns. Ought we not in Cleveland also to act

immediately before the interest wanes and the splendid Jewish sentiments aroused again become dormant? The summer is coming on. Next fall the story of German Jewish persecution will be a twice told tale. We have not had a creditable campaign for the J. D. C. or for Palestine to my knowledge in nearly five years. It is high time that we do our duty and redeem the fair name of our community.

My dear Sam, you are in a key position of leadership and I earnestly request you to proceed with this work at once. A meeting should be held at once of the members of the Federation and plans made for the campaign. I stand ready to help you in every way.



My dear Sam:

I have called up twenty-five people to serve on the campaign committee and have obtained twenty-five acceptances. Not one has refused. The sentiment is overwhelming for an immediate relief effort and truly remarkable. I have ten more names to call up and I shall present to you the full list on Friday.

The Friday meeting meeting should be handled very carefully. All non-essentials calculated to delay action should be carefully avoided. There should be no discussion of the American Jewish Committee or the Jewish Congress or efforts to achieve unity among those organizations who are acting in the "political sphere" of the German Jewish situation. We are concerned with the problem of the immediate material relief of the German Jews and the J. D. C. is the one universally recognized agency in the field which is authorized and competent to carry on this work. It has announced a national campaign to raise two million dollars. Some communities like Philadelphia and Baltimore have already launched their drives. Cleveland should also proceed at once with this campaign. Quick action is urgent and the remarkable sentiments which have been aroused among the Jewish people must be capitalized to the utmost for the benefit of German Jewry.

This, in my judgment, should be the keynote in our Friday meeting and you should sound the keynote. A strong and positive presentation of the matter on your part will go

a long way in creating the "stimmung" for this meeting. A resolution should be drafted beforehand and presented by a member of the Board summarizing what I have said above ordering the immediate launching of the campaign, fixing the date and calling upon the Jewish community of Cleveland to rally as one man round this great cause.

I believe that the question of our local needs could be disposed of by another resolution that a part of the funds raised in the forthcoming campaign shall be used to meet the commitments made by our community under the terms of the Jewish Welfare Fund and that the Board of the Federation shall be authorized at the conclusion of the campaign to decide what percentage of the funds raised shall be allocated to these needs. The Board of the Welfare Federation can be trusted to make just and satisfactory distributions of the funds raised, bearing in mind of course, that by far the major part must be devoted to German Jewish relief. It would be a mistake, however, to emphasize any other item in the campaign other than this relief.

Telephone conversation between Mr. Weinberger and Mr. Prigmore  
June 2, 1933

Mr. Prigmore - I have been figuring this thing every which way and presume you have been doing the same thing. I got back home and found the facts just as I presented them to you. We don't want to do anything to cause any embarrassment in any way to you. Foreign investment represents about 25%. We have German technicians in our plant and I wouldn't want to take any action for which you might be criticised or which would place either of us in an embarrassing position. Here's what I would like to do. Leave it all up to you. You do the thing you think will make you happiest and cause you the least embarrassment.

A.W. ---- Did you write to Dr. Silver as you promised?

Mr. Prigmore - No. I thought what was the use of writing. You write a letter of that kind and it might be exploited and enlarged, etc. and I had explained all this to Dr. Silver and you. What we want to do is protect you.

A.W. ---- I'm just going to be quiet until this thing blows over. I'm not going to buy Agfa and if I am overstocked on anything, cameras, and so on, I want to get the privilege of returning them to you if you will be kind enough to give me credit. I'll handle it the best way I know how.

Mr. Prigmore - The way we feel here about this delegation going over to Europe, we feel this is going to be rectified in a couple of weeks. Don't you think it would be advisable to wait a couple of weeks and see what developments are?

A.W. ---- The film packs are going/right away. I'll see if I am heavy on anything else and will keep in touch with you. As soon as I get some information I'll write to you or drop in to see you. If I'm in New York I'll write you and you can probably make arrangements to be there.

A.W. ---- I know just how you feel. It is a poor policy to send anything out in writing.

Mr. Prigmore ---- Remember what Dr. Silver said about ----- If there is anything we can do to help a situation of this kind, if Dr. Silver will send me that list I'll get busy and send him a contract -----.

A.W. ---- I'll be in to see him and talk to him.

Mr. Prigmore - Well, good luck, and watch your step.

My dear Mr. Goldhamer:

On reading through the minutes of the special meeting of the Board of Trustees held on May 26th, a copy of which you send me, I find that paragraph number three is not sufficiently clear and does not to my mind represent the real sense of the meeting. The impression given by the paragraph is that unless the amount to be designated for German Jewish relief is not over-subscribed that all other agencies will receive nothing. This was, I believe, in nobody's mind. Whatever sum will be raised in the campaign should be allocated proportionately to the various agencies giving the larger share, of course, to German Jewish relief as represented by the J. D. C. and The Jewish Agency.

A statement should also be included in the minutes recording the sense of the meeting that the final allocation of the funds is left in the hands of the Board of Trustees of the Jewish Welfare Federation.



In order to keep the records straight I am writing you this letter.

After your office called me on Monday asking me to see Mr. Sam Gross to persuade him to take the chairmanship of the Downtown Division, I called up Mr. Eugene Geismer and asked him to see Mr. Gross, being of the opinion that Mr. Geismer could influence Mr. Gross more than I could. On Wednesday morning, Mr. Geismer informed me that Mr. Sam Gross could not accept. Inasmuch as The Temple Board was to have a meeting that night, Mr. Geismer and I decided to see Mr. Gross at the meeting, expecting that he would attend. Mr. Gross, however, did not come to the meeting.

You called me the following morning all excited and almost inarticulate. I was compelled to ask you to postpone your conversation, cool off and call me back. You did not call me back. That same afternoon I went down to see Mr. Gross. I spent an hour with him and finally persuaded him to take the co-chairmanship together with Mr. Geismer. I called up Mr. Geismer that evening and he accepted gladly to serve with Mr. Gross. Thereupon I called Mr. Iglauer, chairman of your Organization Committee, and notified him that the two men had accepted. This morning I had my secretary convey the same information to your office.

You, however, went to see Mr. Dauby this morning. I do not know what transpired at this meeting, but Mr. Gross' name evidently came up in the course of your conversation. I have just been called up by Mr. Gross and informed that he must withdraw his acceptance of yesterday and that he will not serve.

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

Dear Dr. Silver:

I have your letter of June 24th, which is in answer to my letter of June 22nd, inviting you to speak at the opening dinner of the campaign to be conducted here under the auspices of the Joint Distribution Committee for funds for the relief of the Jews in Germany.

In answer to your question as to why we need three Rabbis, I beg to say that when I extended you this invitation by telephone on June 22nd, and confirmed it by letter that day, we did not know here that a Western Pennsylvania Conference was contemplated, or that Dr. Wise would be with us for such an occasion. We later learned from the New York office of the Joint Distribution Committee that it was considered advisable to hold a Western Pennsylvania Conference on Sunday, July 9th, at which Dr. Wise would be present. We immediately suggested to New York that the conference and the dinner both be held on the same day, namely, July 16th, and that we would be very happy to have both yourself and Dr. Wise with us on that day. We had in mind that Dr. Wise would be the guest speaker during the afternoon conference and that you would be the guest speaker in the evening, with Dr. Goldenson taking part in both events.


However, as your letter indicates that you think it unnecessary for all three of you to participate in the day's exercises, and that the situation can be handled adequately by Dr. Wise and Dr. Goldenson, we shall, of course, submit to your decision, although we all hope that we may have the privilege of hearing you upon some other occasion in the near future in Pittsburgh.

As to your comments with reference to the fact that we are not conducting a joint drive with the Jewish Agency, I might say that, before any announcement of the campaign here was made, a tentative arrangement was entered into among Pittsburgh Jews interested in German

I really hate to impose upon your good nature and to bother you again in the matter of the campaign. But I regard it as both a civic and a Jewish obligation to do all that can be done to save this campaign from collapse thereby hurting the great causes which it planned to serve.

We set out to raise \$150,000. The campaign was to have closed yesterday. But only \$82,000 was raised and the workers resolved to continue the campaign for another week in the hope of raising additional funds. The amount raised is pitifully inadequate. After deducting campaign expenses and those sums which were pledged to local and national causes, there will be very little left as the contribution of the Cleveland Jewish community of one hundred thousand Jewish souls for the relief of our unhappy brothers and sisters in Germany. The morale of our community will suffer both in our own eyes and in the eyes of the non-Jewish community. Minutes of a Special Meeting of the Board  
of Trustees of the Jewish Welfare Federa-  
tion held at the Federation Office, Friday,  
May 26th, 1933.

1. There were present the following: Mr Sol Reinthal, Chairman, Mesdames Siegmund Herzog and Bernard Krangel and Messrs Maurice Bernon, B R Brickner, Harry S Davidowitz, Albert E Einstein, Isador Grossman, Jay M Halle, S P Halle, George J Klein, Abraham Lewenthal, Nathan Loeser, A H Silver, Wm C Treuhaft and Jacob Wolpaw.

2. Communications were read to the Board from Mr Louis Lipsky, Chairman of the Board of Directors of the American Palestine Campaign and from Mr Jonah B Wise, Chairman for the National Campaign of the Joint Distribution Committee and both of these communications set forth the serious condition of the Jews of Germany, both those who had found it possible to cross the borders into other Countries and those who were practically interned without opportunity to leave or to continue their normal pursuits and livelihood. A very urgent plea was made for immediate action throughout all Jewish Communities in this Country to join with the Jews of England in raising funds needed to provide relief. Arrangements had already been effected with representative Jews of Germany for the transmission and administration of Relief Funds through them.

In England a Committee, headed by members of the Rothschild Family, had taken up the immediate responsibility of raising funds and in this Country the Joint Distribution Committee under the leadership of Mr Warburg, Rabbi Wise and others, was making plans for a National Campaign.

Some Cities such as Baltimore, Philadelphia, Chicago, Pittsburgh and Columbus were already through conducting Campaigns or organizing for the purpose.

The political and economic situation of the Jews in Germany as indicated by the actions of the Hitler regime, pointed very strongly to the fact that there would be a re-organization of Jewish life of those remaining in Germany and that efforts would have to be made to aid those who had left Germany in establishing themselves in other Countries where they might be admitted and to plan for those who have already made application in large numbers for permission to go to Palestine.

After discussing the matter briefly, it was moved, seconded and carried that Cleveland organize at once under the auspices of the Federation to share in the National Appeal for both the Joint Distribution Committee and the Jewish Agency for Palestine, with direct reference to the needs of German Jewry.

3. It was also moved, seconded and carried that the primary purpose of the Campaign should be for German Jewish Relief, but that to the extent to which the Community was willing to oversubscribe this primary goal, the additional funds would be used in meeting Cleveland's obligations to the Agencies included in the Welfare Fund for 1933 and for which it was estimated \$50,000 would be adequate.

4. The Chairman was instructed to confer with other Members of the Board in the selection of a Campaign Executive Committee, and that efforts should be made to have a group representing Cleveland attend the National Conference of the Joint Distribution Committee in Chicago on June 4th.

5. It was moved, seconded and carried that the Campaign objective be left to such an Executive Committee together with plans for the Campaign itself; and in this connection it was recommended that the National Headquarters of the Joint Distribution Committee be requested to send one of its Field Representatives to Cleveland to aid in the organization and prosecution of the Campaign.

II

6. It was moved, seconded and carried that plans be made to open the Campaign on Sunday, June 25th.

7. It was moved seconded and carried that a sum up to \$7,500 be made available by borrowing from one of the Capital Funds of the Federation for necessary publicity and organization expense in connection with the Campaign.

8. No further business coming before the Meeting it was adjourned.

Dear Mr Goldhamer:

You have inquired about the different kinds of activity which our people in Germany are organizing for relief and reconstruction, with our help. Our European Director, Dr. Bernhard Kahn, came here for a brief stay, at our request, to acquaint us with the more intimate details of the situation, of the plans of the Jewish leaders in Germany and of discussion with the Central Relief organizations being built up in England, in France as well as in the countries to which refugees have fled.

The Central Committee of Relief and Reconstruction in Germany is faced with five major problems. First, actual palliative aid, - food clothing, maintenance of the charitable and welfare institutions. The situation is becoming increasingly urgent. By October, when the resources of many people who still have some remnant of savings left will have been exhausted, and when the welfare institutions themselves can no longer rely on large contributions, the condition of thousands of Jews in Germany will become desperate and as the winter approaches the need will become more and more terrible. At present, the German Jewish organizations are trying their best, locality by locality, to meet such types of aid.

Second, for thousands of Jewish children in Germany, even in the elementary schools to which they are not denied admission, life has become a martyrdom. It is necessary to take certain Jewish elementary schools already in existence, enlarge their capacities for enrolling more children and, if possible, to set up new schools.

It is in the field of secondary education, however, that the need is the greatest because this is where the  $1\frac{1}{2}\%$  quota legally applies under the new regulations. There are a few Jewish secondary schools which will have to be enlarged and extended, but the chief job of education of the boys and girls now excluded from the secondary schools, the colleges and universities will be in training for productive work in handicrafts, agriculture and manual occupations. Whether they leave Germany or not, these youths will have to be trained so that on a reduced and lowered scale of living, they can at least earn their bread.

July 17th, 1933

Mr. Samuel Goldhamer:

Third, for the Jews within Germany there is the tremendous problem of preparing and making possible for as large a number of the younger, vigorous people to leave Germany to settle in such lands as may accept them and in which they may be adapted. Every avenue of refuge is being sought. Through the Colonization Association and the Hicem, possibilities in South America, in the French colonies, in other lands are being considered. In the British colonial empire, wherever there is a chance to absorb immigrants, the committees are feverishly studying these openings. In this program, the Central Relief and Reconstruction Committee of Germany will undoubtedly eagerly avail itself of every opportunity to send as many Jews from Germany as possible to Palestine - as many as permits can be secured for and as the means of all the committees engaged in this work will allow.

Fourth, thousands of refugees without funds have in the meantime fled to France, Holland, Switzerland and other lands and have become a problem in those countries to the Jewish communities there. It is hoped that the local committees in these lands will be able to provide some of the essential relief requirements of food, shelter, etc. Already the Joint Distribution Committee has had to make contributions to committees in France, Belgium, Holland and other countries, and it is quite clear that the funds of the Joint Distribution Committee will have to be devoted in a substantial measure for constructive aid to these refugees to enable them to be absorbed in the lives of these lands. Undoubtedly, we shall have to open free loan societies in the refugee centers, provide for vocational training and otherwise help to adjust these people.

Fifth, by and large, despite whatever one may wish to the contrary, the bulk of the Jews in Germany will have to stay there, will suffer there, will have to end their days there. To the extent that it is possible for many of the men and women to readjust their lives to new occupations, to different work, to maintain whatever business and trade opportunities still remain for the small merchant, the shopkeeper, the workingman, - in all these respects the Central Relief and Reconstruction Committee of Germany, with our aid, is making a valiant fight to hold every possible point of vantage.

We are cooperating with the French committee which, however, finds it a great burden to meet the refugee problem in France. We are cooperating with the British committee. We cannot neglect the demands of relief. We are doing our best to work along broad constructive lines of re-education and re-training and of emigration. Ours, therefore, is perhaps the largest responsibility and burden in connection with the tragedy that has befallen our people in Germany

Sterling Products (Inc.) Group—Net profits of \$9,348,314, equivalent to \$5.34 per share on 1,750,700 shares which will be outstanding upon consummation of the plan.

Bristol-Myers Company and Mum Manufacturing Co., Inc.—Net profit of \$2,447,130, equivalent to \$3.49 per share on 700,280 shares to be outstanding.

Vick Chemical Co.—Net profit of \$2,625,761, equivalent to \$3.75 per share on 700,280 shares to be outstanding.

Life Savers, Inc. and Pine Brothers, Inc.—Net profit of \$885,257, equivalent to \$2.53 per share on 350,140 shares to be outstanding.

United Drug Company (including Liggett)—Net loss of \$2,451,437. This company will have 1,400,560 shares outstanding upon consummation of the plan.

The principal items of the separate balance sheets of the subsidiary companies as of December 31, 1932, adjusted to give the effect of the proposed allocation of assets are as follows:



Firstly, let me thank you for the quick and efficient dispatch with which you have handled the Cleveland matter up to date. Especially effective was the letter which you obtained from the Honorable Nathan Strauss, Jr., which was mailed to Isaac Carmel. It is being used in good stead.

I enclose herewith a copy of resolution which after careful reading will explain the whole situation to you. I might tell you that Rabbi Silver is wholeheartedly cooperating with us in this matter.

Up to now we have represented that the Cleveland Zionist District and the Ohio Zionist Region in the absence of any other agencies were the duly constituted authorities to negotiate for and on behalf of the American Palestine Campaign in Cleveland. The committee appointed at the meeting to which reference is made in the resolution consists of the following: Ezra Z. Shapiro, Chairman; Max I. Kohrman, Dr. Moses Garber, Samuel Miller and Rabbi Davidovitz.

It is extremely important that you get a letter at once addressed to me from the Honorable Nathan Strauss, Jr., as National Chairman of the American Palestine Campaign, authorizing this committee to negotiate for and on behalf of the American Palestine Campaign.

I might say to you, however, that even though such authority will be granted to us in such letter, that before we accede to any definite allocation, we will notify and consult with you to seek your final approval unless by separate letter you secure authority from the Honorable Nathan Strauss, Jr. to the committee to make final decision in the matter.

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, in the Jewish Welfare Fund Campaign just completed in the City of Cleveland, the Jewish Agency for Palestine Fund was included along with the more recently established fund for German Jewish Relief, and

WHEREAS, at no time during said campaign was the actual and specific apportionment of funds between these two agencies determined and announced, and

WHEREAS, despite the fact that emphasis during the campaign was laid upon German Jewish Relief, it was never understood that in the division of funds the specific German Jewish Relief Fund would be preferred over the Jewish Agency for Palestine Fund other than in some slight degree, if at all, and

WHEREAS, in the words of the Honorable Nathan Strauss, Jr., National Chairman of the American Palestine Campaign, "the daily dispatches from Germany and from Palestine continually stress the fact that Palestine, of all countries, is the land which is most suitable for the absorption of a substantial number of Jews from Germany; that the extent to which the Jewish Agency, the only body able to act in this matter, can be of service is dependent upon the funds placed at its disposal by the Jewish communities.....that the decision to be made with regard to the distribution of funds should be determined by the use to which the money can be placed; that Jewish leaders in America are constantly talking of the efforts that must be made to expedite the settlement in Palestine of German Jews, and that unless this talk is supported with financial means it becomes idle gesture", and

WHEREAS, the greatest part of the funds of the Jewish Agency for Palestine are now employed in aiding German Jewish refugees in Palestine, and

WHEREAS, prior to the meeting of the board of trustees of the Jewish Welfare Federation at which allocation of the funds of the Jewish Welfare Fund committee was considered, a duly authorized committee representing the local agency of the American Palestine Campaign notified the executive director of the Jewish Welfare Fund that it desired to be heard upon the matter of allocation of funds before final decision was to be made thereon, and

WHEREAS, the board of trustees of the Jewish Welfare Federation have without consulting or giving a hearing to said committee, determined the allocation of funds between the two agencies hereinbefore named, granting the sum of \$12,000.00 to the American Palestine Campaign, and \$37,000.00 to the fund for German Jewish Relief, and

WHEREAS, the said allocation is grossly unfair, wholly inadequate, entirely without regard to the relative tasks of both agencies, and in utter disregard of the existing and ever growing importance of the position of Palestine as it relates both generally to the whole of world Jewry and specifically to the plight of German Jewry,

NOW THEREFORE, the executive committees of the Cleveland Zionist District and the Ohio Zionist Region, in joint meeting held on August 23, 1933 Resolve to and do hereby request and urge upon the board of trustees of the Jewish Welfare Fund that the matter of allocation of funds of the last Jewish Welfare Fund Campaign insofar as it relates to the Jewish Agency for Palestine and the fund for German Jewish Relief, be reopened for further consideration, and that in such reconsideration a hearing be given to the duly accredited representatives of the American Palestine Campaign in this district to the end that a fair, just and adequate allocation between these two agencies be arrived at.

Minutes of a Meeting of the Budget Committee of the Federation, held on Thursday, August 24, 1933 at the Federation Office.

1. There were present: Mr S P Halle, Chairman; E M Baker, Maurice Bernon, Louis S Bing, Jr., Mrs Siegmund Herzog, Max Myers, Sol Reinthal, and S D Wise.
2. In reference to the instructions of the Board ~~that~~ the question of payment of the claims of the Jewish Relief Society and its representatives for unpaid bills incurred in providing the Passover needs of the indigent families of the Jewish Social Service Bureau, it was moved, seconded and carried after a brief discussion of the matter that the Federation recognize and pay these claims as representing legitimate obligations of the Bureau in its ministration to the needs of its families, but without any commitment on the part of the Federation for such expenditures in the future except to the extent that they may be duly provided for by budget. It was further moved, seconded and carried that the Chairman appoint a sub-committee to meet with representatives of the Bureau and the Jewish Relief Society to ascertain the amount which the Federation is to pay, following which the Officers of the Federation are to arrange for necessary borrowing from capital funds for the purpose. The Chairman appointed Mrs Siegmund Herzog, Louis S Bing, Jr., and the Executive Director to represent the Budget Committee.
3. There was submitted to the Budget Committee a communication from the President of the Local Board of the Jewish Orphan Home, under date of August 10th again setting forth the critical financial situation in which the Jewish Orphan Home now finds itself and with particular reference to the decrease in the original allotment from the Cleveland Community Fund from \$22,000 to \$12,000. The Chairman of the Budget Committee replied to the letter on behalf of the Federation stating that efforts were being continued to secure supplementary aid from Public Sources, and that there was hope that such aid might come from the One-Mill Levy Committee or from other State or County Funds now made available by the new tax legislation.
4. The Director advised that failure thus far to secure a supplementary contribution from tax sources to balance the budget of the Jewish Day Nursery, had now left that Organization with inadequate funds for operation, and with the result that the officers were compelled within the past two months to cut in half the already reduced salaries and wages of the Nursery employees. The officers reported further that some of the employees were planning to leave, and asked assistance from the Federation in the situation. The total budget of the Day Nursery for the year amounted to approximately \$4,800, of which \$2,300 was available from Community Fund sources, and approximately \$1,100 from the Ladies Society of the Day Nursery. It was estimated that an amount between \$1,000 and \$1,400 might be required to complete the budget, depending upon the further resources of the Ladies' Auxiliary. It was moved, seconded and carried that pending the availability of funds for the Nursery from public or other sources, an amount up to \$250 per month be borrowed by the Officers of the Federation from capital funds to balance the deficits as they may appear from month to month.
5. The Budget Committee then took up for consideration the distribution of further moneys out of the recent Campaign, for member agencies of the Welfare Fund. The following allocations had already been decided upon by the Board of Trustees at its meeting on August 18th:

The total of all of these allocations exceeded by \$1,850 the net amount heretofore estimated as available, but the allocations were made with the hope and expectation that the collection experience together with some new pledges that might be secured during the year would result in a larger net realization than estimated.

It was understood also that all of the Agencies would be advised that the allotments were granted on condition that no further solicitations would be undertaken by them in Cleveland during the current year of the Welfare Fund.

6. The Committee was advised that a communication had come from Mr Nathan Straus, Jr., to Mr S D Wise under date of August 21st, questioning the allocation made by the Board on August 18th to the Jewish Agency for Palestine. Copy of this letter and reply thereto were submitted to the Members and are hereto attached.

7. No further business coming before the meeting, it was adjourned.

Dear Mr Wise:

It has come to my attention that an effort is being made to divide the funds raised recently through the Welfare Fund in the following proportion: \$36,000 to the Joint Distribution Committee and \$12,000 to the American Palestine Campaign of the Jewish Agency.

Trusting that this report is inaccurate, I hasten to write to you to emphasize the injustice that would be done if such a decision were actually arrived at.

The daily dispatches from Germany and from Palestine continually stress the fact that Palestine, of all countries, is the land which is most suitable for the absorption of a substantial number of Jews from Germany. The extent to which the Jewish Agency, the only body able to act in this matter, can be of service is dependent upon the funds placed at its disposal by the Jewish communities.

May I point out that where similar joint campaign efforts have been held in other cities, the division has been virtually on a fifty-fifty basis. This was true in Philadelphia, Baltimore, Washington and other communities. The decision to be made with regard to the distribution of funds should be determined by the use to which the money can be placed. Jewish leaders in America are constantly talking of the efforts that must be made to expedite the settlement in Palestine of German Jews. Unless this talk is supported with financial means, it becomes idle gesture.

I earnestly hope that you and your associates will consider this matter from the long range point of view and act accordingly.

Dear Sir:

I have your letter of August 21st, and while I was not present at the meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Jewish Welfare Federation when the action was taken allocating a portion of the amount realized in the recent German Jewish Relief Campaign to the purposes of the Joint Distribution Committee and the Jewish Agency, I have advice in the form of minutes of the meeting and am thereby acquainted with the basis of the procedure.

I do not believe that the members of the Federation Board have disregarded the role of Palestine in a program of assistance for German Jewry such as may need to be worked out for the future. I believe that it is generally recognized that the opportunities for migration of at least a small portion of German Jewry into Palestine are certainly more immediate and available than those into other parts of the world, and that effort will need to be made to raise adequate funds to serve this specific purpose.

I find that in making up the budget for the Jewish Welfare Fund here in Cleveland for 1933, and this was done in February prior to the development of the German Jewish situation, there was an agreed division of \$10,000 each for the Joint Distribution Committee and the Jewish Agency. However, we were unable because of the general banking situation and the even greater debacle in the closing locally of two of the three largest banks of this City, to proceed with our Campaign. It is furthermore doubtful in my mind if we could even at this date have proceeded with any Campaign locally for the general purposes of the Welfare Fund had not the emergency of the German Jewish relief situation made necessary an immediate appeal and given the opportunity to carry along the Welfare Fund with it.

I do not know if you have been made acquainted with the basis upon which the local appeal was projected, but in order to arouse an adequate interest and response it was necessary to bear down strongly with the appeal for German Jewish relief. The larger subscribers constituted a group having a peculiar interest in the plight of German Jewry and their contributions to the extent that they were generous under present conditions, came primarily in response to the appeal for aid in Germany, as set forth by the Joint Distribution Committee for administration under its auspices.

With this background and understanding it would have been most unfortunate for the Board of Trustees of the Federation, and in our judgment for any future appeals which the Federation might sponsor in this community, if they had decided after the Campaign upon any other action than that of giving as large a part of the Campaign realization as possible to the Joint Distribution Committee for the use of the relief of the Jews in Germany; and it is my understanding further that a part of the money that may be placed in the hands of the German Jewish committees themselves may very likely be used in aiding families who desire to leave Germany and some of whom will find their way to Palestine. It is not inconceivable that both of these funds may be at work serving purposes in the same direction.

At any rate, we should like to make it clear that upon the basis of our appeal the Federation could not in the present situation do otherwise than keep faith with the Community in allotting the larger sum to the Joint Distribution Committee.

My dear Mr. Goldhamer:

I received in this morning's mail, copies of the correspondence which passed between Mr. Nathan Straus, of the American Palestine Campaign and the office of the Jewish Welfare Federation. I believe that Mr. Straus' position is well taken. I do not believe that there is merit to the statement in your reply that "upon the basis of our appeal, the Federation could not, in the present situation, do otherwise than keep faith with the community in allotting the larger sum to the Joint Distribution Committee." Nobody questioned the justice of allotting a larger sum to the J. D. C. But I know of very few communities in the country where such a miserably small percentage of the funds was allotted to the Jewish Agency for Palestine. And please remember that in every community, not only in Cleveland, the emphasis was naturally placed on the German Jewish situation.

You will recall that on the day before the Federation meeting, I suggested to you an allocation on the basis of thirty thousand and twenty thousand. You regarded it then as a fair distribution. I am convinced that a very serious mistake has been made by Jewish Welfare Board in the allocation of its funds and that the subject should be reconsidered at the earliest opportunity.



We are deeply concerned with the division of funds that is proposed by the officers of the Cleveland Welfare Fund. It had been the understanding of the officers of the American Palestine Campaign that the Jewish Agency and the Joint Distribution Committee would share equally in the proceeds of the fund-raising effort. It was on that basis that the campaign was launched. It was with that understanding that Mr. Morris Rothenberg, one of the national chairman of the American Palestine Campaign, went to Cleveland to address a meeting on July 5th as a substitute for Dr. Chaim Weizmann who was unable to come because of illness.

I have been informed that it is proposed to allot to the American Palestine Campaign \$12,000. and to the Joint Distribution Committee \$38,000. Without in any way deprecating the splendid work that the Joint Distribution Committee is doing, I must emphasize, however, that the Jewish Agency for Palestine is entitled to equal consideration, not only because the community was appealed to on that basis, but even more because of the increasing importance of the place of Palestine in meeting the problem of German Jewry.

I know that there is in Cleveland a sufficient interest in Palestine and sufficient knowledge of the obligations of the Jewish Agency for Palestine to assure an equitable decision in respect to the division of funds.

This letter is to authorize you to act on behalf of the national administration of the American Palestine Campaign in securing an adjustment with the officers of the Cleveland Welfare Fund so that a just settlement may be made in recognition of the part that the Jewish Agency for Palestine is playing in the present situation of Jewish life.

My dear Mr. Wise:

I am sorry that I did not attend the meeting of the Joint Committee yesterday as I hoped to. I was delayed in Chicago a day longer than I expected. I understand that Mr. Goldhamer read at the meeting, a letter addressed to him by me, dated May 24, 1933, which was interpreted by the committee representing the Federation to mean that I favored allocating, by far, the major part of the funds to be raised in the campaign for German-Jewish relief as over ~~and~~ against the Jewish Agency for Palestine. It was further suggested that my criticism of the allocation which ~~was~~ actually made by the Federation constituted a reversal of my former attitude. Mr. Goldhamer could have cleared up that impression if he had also read to you the letter which I wrote to him on May 19, 1933, five days before my letter of May 24, a copy of which I am enclosing herewith. From my letter of May 19, you will readily see that when I spoke of German Jewish relief, I definitely included Palestine. For it appears to me clear and also others who had studied the situation as far back as May, that one of the most constructive and important part of German-Jewish relief work -- if not the most important, would have to do with the care and settlement of German emigres in Palestine.

I do not understand by what stretch of the imagination, the phrase "local needs," mentioned in the last paragraph of my letter of May 24 could be made to refer to the Jewish Agency for Palestine. I regard it as a gross over-sight on the part of Mr. Goldhamer not to have brought my letter of May 19 to the attention of the committee.



My dear Mr. Goldhamer:

Confirming our telephone conversation as of yesterday, may I advise you that the committee representing the American Palestine Campaign, of which I am chairman, which met with the committee representing the Federation on Tuesday last, awaits a reply from the Federation to the request made by it for a reconsideration of the allocation of funds in the direction of a more equitable division thereof as between the J.D.C. and the Jewish Agency for Palestine.

May I point out to you that I have, since our last meeting, seen copies of correspondence from Rabbi Silver to you dated as of May 19th and June 2nd. The letter of May 24th, which you used in argument as indicating that it was Rabbi Silver's suggestion to the Federation that by far the greater sum of money should be allotted to the J.D.C. fund, when interpreted or read in connection with these letters which preceded and succeeded it, clearly conveys an impression directly contrary to the one which you implied at our meeting. I point, for instance, to the sentence covering the point in Rabbi Silver's letter as of June 2nd, in which he says, "Whatever sum will be raised in the campaign should be allocated proportionately to the various agencies, giving the largest share, of course, to the German Jewish Relief, as represented by the J.D.C. and the Jewish Agency." I am sorry that the members of the committee did not get the correct impression from all of the correspondence of Rabbi Silver with you, because they too shared the impression expressed by you at the meeting that Rabbi Silver had indicated the need for a disproportionate preference in favor of the J.D.C. in the allocation of funds.

Of course you understand that we do not predicate our claim upon that which transpired between Rabbi Silver and the Federation. Our claim is based upon all of the considerations in the matter which were so amply discussed at the meeting.

I must reiterate to you that the Zionist element in this community definitely and earnestly feels that a revision in this allocation of funds must in all justice and fairness be had. We shall await the answer of the Federation at the very earliest opportunity.

I deeply regret that there should have developed such a wide difference of opinion as to the fairness of the Federations attitude in its allocation of funds as between the J. D. C. and Jewish Agency for Palestine.

I have carefully read copies of letters which you were good enough to forward to me but I am still compelled to believe that the Federation Committee did no injustice in its interpretation of your communication of the 24th. This interpretation was I think shared by the representatives of the Zionist group. In the event, however, if an injustice has been done you in this interpretation, this fact I think would not alter my judgment that in view of all of the encompassing circumstances the Federation's allotments were fair. It is not a matter in which I or anybody else should take an arbitrary point of view and when I present to the Federation Board a summary of the conference between the Federation Committee and the Committee from the Zionist organization, I shall present the latter's point of view with complete fairness.

May I not take this occasion to thank you and to congratulate you upon your altogether nobler and stirring address which I heard over the radio last night. It was I thought, the high point of the program.

I regret not being able to have a chat with you in Washington but it seemed some how or other that I couldn't quite catch up with you.

My dear Ed:-

This is very funny! After trying so hard to persuade you and the members of the Federation Committee that when I wrote of German Jewish Relief in my letters to Mr. Goldhamer I included Palestine, a fact that was clearly stated in my letter of June 2nd, I find that the Federation itself adopted the same position. In its official publicity released this week in the Jewish Review and Observer and in the Jewish Independent under the heading of "Federation Apportions Relief Campaign Funds", I find the statement - "The Campaign Goal of \$150,000 included an estimate of \$100,000 for the relief of German Jews, mainly through the agency of the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee and the Jewish Agency for Palestine; the balance of \$50,000 was budgeted for the other Organizations"...

While the goal was not achieved in the campaign it was understood that whatever the results, the division of the funds would be upon the same basis viz: "two-thirds for the German Jewish Relief and one-third for the other organizations".

It seems then that Mr. Goldhamer was not mislead by my letter of May 24th. He knew exactly what I meant for we both meant the same thing. Why he should attempt to befuddle the committee is beyond me. The plea for Palestine was "rightly sold" to the Jewish Community this year on the basis of what it is doing and will be called upon to do for the Jewish refugees from Germany. That Palestine is today performing this relief work is common knowledge. I cannot therefore see any warrant for the fear which has been expressed by some members of the Federation Board that if the allocation of funds between the J.D.C. and the Jewish Agency be put on the basis of 30,000 and 20,000 that there would be terrific resentment in the community. I am confident that under your leadership the whole subject will receive a friendly and dispassionate reconsideration and final settlement at the next Board meeting.

I am sorry that I did not see you in Washington. I heard

that you were there and I tried to locate you both in the afternoon and in the evening but without success.

I am sorry that you did not attend the New York meeting. It was a truly remarkable gathering and I believe that a great deal of good was done in the dissemination of Anti Hitler and Pro Jewish sentiment through the country.

Thank you very much for your letter of September 11. I am sorry that we did not get to meet in Washington. Some mutual friends told me that you were in the hotel and I tried both during the day and during the evening to locate you, but without success.

The meeting in New York was really very fine. The gathering was of representative men of importance and influence in the life of the city and the nation. I was very happy that we were able to bring our message to them. Particularly helpful were the addresses of the non-Jews like Alfred E. Smith, former Ambassador Gerard and Colby. In this particular situation, what the non-Jew says is, of course, much more important than what we say.

With reference to the allocation of the campaign funds by the Federation, I regret that a personal issue has been injected into the question which should be decided on its own merits. It is clear that what I wrote or did not write to Mr. Goldhamer did not in any way determine the opinion of the Board in voting the campaign or in allocating the funds after the campaign, for clearly the letter was never read at any meeting of the Board. I am not particularly worried about the injustice which was done to me at your committee meeting when Mr. Goldhamer deliberately created an altogether false impression about my attitude by reading the letter of May 24, without at the same time reading the letters of May 19 and June 2. You write that Mr. Goldhamer's interpretation was shared by the representatives of the Zionist group. Of course it was. But after reading my letters of May 19 and June 2, they wrote to Mr. Goldhamer, the following:

"May I point out to you that I have, since our last meeting, seen copies of correspondence from Rabbi Silver to you dated as of May 19th and June 2nd. The letter of May 24th, which you used in argument as indicating that it was Rabbi

Silver's suggestion to the Federation that by far the greater sum of money should be allotted to the J.D.C. fund, when interpreted or read in connection with these letters which preceded and succeeded it, clearly conveys an impression directly contrary to the one which you implied at our meeting. I point, for instance, to the sentence covering the point in Rabbi Silver's letter as of June 2nd, in which he says, "Whatever sum will be raised in the campaign should be allocated proportionately to the various agencies, giving the largest share, of course, to the German Jewish Relief, as represented by the J.D.C. and the Jewish Agency." I am sorry that the members of the committee did not get the correct impression from all the correspondence of Rabbi Silver with you, because they too shared the impression expressed by you at the meeting that Rabbi Silver had indicated the need for a disproportionate preference in favor of the J.D.C. in the allocation of funds."

I am quite hardened by this time to these slight attempts at character assassination which is sometimes resorted to in order to gain a point. I recall my experience with the Federation during the orphanage controversy. I am, however, anxious that justice be done to the cause and I feel that a grave injustice has been done by allocating such a miserably small amount to the Jewish Agency for Palestine, which is this year charged with caring for so many thousands of refugees from Germany. In normal times, with Palestine carrying on its customary activities, such an appropriation might, perhaps, have been justified. But this year with an altogether new and heavy burden which has been placed upon the institutions in Palestine in being called upon to care for the hordes of German emigres and their children who are pouring into the country, this pitifully inadequate sum which has been allocated to Palestine portrays a strong lack of understanding of the situation. I do not believe that we would be breaking our word with the community if we attempted the allocation which I suggested. I am sure that the community would heartily approve of it. By the community, I mean, of course, everybody except the few die-hards, who, in the last two decades have, like the Bourbons, of old, neither learned anything nor forgotten anything. For them, Palestine is still something exotic, Eastern European, un-American, etc. etc.

I am convinced that neither you nor I wish to be arbitrary or dogmatic in the matter. I certainly did not wish the personal element to enter into the situation and muddy the waters. You and I carried the brunt of the last campaign. We shall probably have to assume the burden of responsibility in future campaigns. We do not wish to do anything that will create strife or disrupt the Jewish Welfare Fund which is still a very feeble institution.

I believe that the matter ought to be reconsidered in a friendly and dispassionate way at the next meeting of the Federation Board. I believe, furthermore, that the committee representing the Zionists of the city should be heard at this meeting.

My dear Rabbi:

You are undoubtedly aware of the fact that the German-Jewish Children's Aid, Inc., has been organized to arrange for the transportation to the United States from Germany of 250 German-Jewish children. The parents and natural guardians of these children are sending them to the United States for education and training, because they have no other outlook for the children in preparation of their future.

The children who have been selected by the German-Jewish organizations that are cooperating with us in this plan range in age from six to fifteen, the majority of them falling into the 11 to 14 age group. Most of the children have both parents and as these parents look forward to reunion with them at some happy later date, we have promised not to place the children for legal adoption in this country.

We are asking the Jewish communities throughout the United States to help us in this project in two respects. First, we are asking for subscriptions from individuals in the Jewish communities, in any sum of money, to cover the transportation expenses for the children. The amounts may be small or large. We estimate the cost of transportation per child to amount to \$100.00. However, individuals may give lesser amounts provided they contribute individually and send their checks to Paul Felix Warburg, who, for the present, is the disbursing agent. It is necessary for us to make a separate request from individuals for the transportation expenses of the children because under the immigration laws, no committee or corporation is permitted to solicit funds for this purpose. That is why the appeal is made separately from that of the United Jewish Appeal Campaign which you have had in your community or which you are planning to have in the future.

Secondly, we are asking social service organizations in communities east of the Mississippi (including, however, Missouri and Minnesota) to secure free homes in private families where the children will be maintained and educated.


The first group of children is expected by October 1st, and units of ten or twelve will follow at weekly intervals. It is necessary, therefore, to find homes for these children almost immediately.

You can give us your cooperation by announcing from your pulpit during the High Holy Days the need for homes for these German-Jewish children. It should be understood that each home which is offered will be investigated by a professional social worker and that where a child is placed in an accepted home, the social worker will continue her interest in the child. This is necessary because of our pledge to the United States Government that the children will attend school regularly until they are at least sixteen years of age, that they will be properly educated and not exploited in any way. We are also guaranteeing to the Government that the children will not become public charges.

Please bear in mind that we have pledged the Government officials that THERE WILL BE NO PUBLICITY IN THE PRESS ON THIS SUBJECT. We prefer to have direct appeals made to the Jewish people and we count on your cooperation in keeping this out of your local press.

We shall appreciate your active cooperation in this matter.



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THE JEWISH SITUATION IN GERMANY

AS SEEN BY JEWISH LEADERS IN GERMANY

- by our Special Representative in Berlin -

A prominent German-Jewish leader gave me the Hitler More following description of the situation: Moderate than "The Jews in Germany have no hope for the better. On the contrary, the worst is yet to come. All depends upon the outcome of the fight in the Nazi ranks which is now going on, - a fight in which Hitler represents one side, and Goering and Goebbels the other.

"Hitler is rather inclined to consider public opinion abroad. Such is however not the case with Goering and Goebbels. Both of them do not care in the slightest what the press abroad will write about Germany, or what Parliaments and Governments will say. Their chief interest is - internal. Like the Bolsheviks in Russia, they disregard everything that is said or threatened abroad. They would regard it only in one case; if Germany were to face war. But since no nation wishes to be engaged in a war at present, they feel that all the protests and parliamentary discussions abroad are only talk, involving nothing serious for the present regime in Germany.

"It sounds like a paradox, but the only hope for the Jews is if Hitler wins the fight with Goering.

"As the present situation indicates", (my informant looked around twice to make sure that no one was listening to what he was going to say), "Goering and Goebbels would feel quite happy to have Hitler disappear. They would build a mausoleum for him, would proclaim him a national martyr, but would inwardly feel relieved. Hugenberg and the others don't mean anything in the present government, and have no influence whatsoever.

"The shadow which is hanging like a heavy cloud over German Jewry at the present moment is the law that is being contemplated with regard to the restriction of the employment of Jews. The intention seems to be to restrict the employment of Jews to three percent of the entire staff in every German enterprise.

"The Jews outside Germany have no idea of how Suicides on great the number of suicides is now growing the increase amongst the Jews in Germany. Depressed and without means, many take their lives. The press is not reporting this new "feature". The new decree will no doubt result in an epidemic of suicides among the Jews, since it will affect the poorest element among them.

"Emigration would be a salvation, but where to? And where will the means come from?

ports a man with an American or English passport
abroad in order to keep the world informed about the actual
state of affairs in Germany.

"Great care should be taken not to exaggerate in reporting the news (as was the case about the Jewish bodies fished out from the Spree, or about Jewish girls being violated by Nazis), because then the Jews are forced by the government to deny these reports, and the government has good grounds to compel them to make such denials.

"It is sufficient to report the actual facts, which in themselves are strong enough. Even in Berlin, where everything looks quiet on the surface, the Jewish streets in the Eastern part of the city have plenty of tragic facts to relate every day.

"In the provinces it is still worse. In Chemnitz the latest act is to forbid Jews to leave the city."

You no doubt know already the details of the meeting Intimidation of Jewish Leaders with Goering at which Goering knocked on the table furiously when he called Hollaender, Blumenfeld, Naumann and the representative of the Jewish War Veterans to demand that they deny the existence of "Greuel" for the outside world. It was the nastiest scene which Jewish leaders have ever gone through even in Czarist times.

The Board of Jewish Deputies in London failed in Mansion House Meeting in London Called Off its effort to arrange a meeting of protest at the Mansion House with the participation of the Lord Mayor. The reason, it is learned, is that The Bank of England advised the Mansion House against the holding of such a meeting.

The authorities referred to reports which had been published by the J.T.A. in the United States which had been recabled by the "Luegenabwehrcentral" (Central Office for the Prevention of Lies) in Washington and Berlin.

Growing Intensity
of German Anti-Semitism

Reports continue to come from Germany indicating that there are serious apprehensions of a Jewish massacre. These reports emanate from very responsible sources. Anti-Semitic agitation in Germany is rapidly increasing, and is about to reach a new pitch of intensity. The Nazi press and Nazi leaders, in their public utterances are going to every extreme in inciting the populace against the Jews. As a result, public feeling against the Jews is steadily increasing and the wild unscrupulous agitations of the Nazi leaders in the provinces, has made the situation exceptionally critical there.

Mr. H. G. Wells Advises
Unison of Action With
Other Groups

Mr. H. G. Wells, in a private conversation, expresses the view that it would be a mistake on the part of the Jews abroad to turn the developments in Germany into a strictly Jewish issue. What the Nazis are doing in Germany is a crime against civilization, and it is in this general light that the German problem should be dealt with, he advises. The fight should be conducted in unison with Catholics, Liberals and Socialists, who are also oppressed and persecuted in Germany, Mr. Wells believes.


The Anglo-Jewish
View

On the other hand, in British-Jewish circles, the view-point is widely held that it would be a mistake for Jews to combine in this fight with any other groups. The position of the Jews is different from that of any other body in Germany, it is held. Others are persecuted because they belong to parties which are persecuted merely because they belong to the Jewish race. Many British Jewish leaders also feel that if the Jews were to combine with the Liberals or Socialists it would lend strength to the Nazi argument that the Jews are linked up with socialist and pacifist movements, and are inclined to an international view-point. The Anglo-Jewish opinion is that it is preferable for every group to conduct its fight alone. Even the fact that the Socialist press is using the persecutions of the Jews in Germany for their own propaganda purposes is regretted.

The Economic
Boycott

A controversy similar to the one in the United States is raging in Anglo-Jewish circles on the subject of the boycott. While Lord Melchett is at the head of a movement actively and publicly advocating the boycott, other Jewish leaders are of the opinion that it should be conducted silently, and should not receive the official approval of the community. Supporters of the boycott movement, however, point out that, without public propaganda, the boycott cannot reach that degree of effectiveness which is necessary to make it a powerful weapon. Others reply to this argument, however, that if the Jews were to tie themselves up officially with the boycott, and the boycott were to fail, it would irreparably harm the German position in Germany.

A strong argument advanced against the boycott is that the Germans will blame the Jews if they cannot continue payment of their debts to foreign creditors, and that the Jewish boycott will therefore raise resentment in many circles which are now friendly towards the Jews and opposed to the anti-Jewish program in Germany.

Dr. Schacht, in his announcement in connection with the transfer moratorium, published on July 1st, stated that if German trade is interfered with even the limited payments which are provided for may not be made. In some circles the view is freely expressed that Germany is obviously reluctant to make a maximum effort to discharge its obligations, and that the transfer moratorium is going further than is really necessary, from a purely financial point of view. The London Times significantly points out that if Germany finds it difficult to comply with its international financial obligations, it should not continue to pursue an economic policy which would further hamper its economic capacity.

The Refugee
Problem Grows

The refugee problem is causing increasing difficulties. While a number of refugees have been permitted to enter England, they are not permitted to accept work. English physicians have even indicated that they would not really see German Jewish physicians admitted in view of the economic difficulties which prevail in England for British physicians. A resolution recently introduced at a conference of University teachers of England and Wales that an effort should be made to provide work for Jewish scholars who had been forced to flee from Germany met with definite resistance, particularly from the younger lecturers, and the resolution was tabled.

The Jewish Question
Must be Solved in
Germany

The opinion must not be ignored that the Jewish question must be dealt with in Germany since the entire German-Jewish population cannot be expatriated from the Reich. This is a view-point held very strongly by a considerable number of Jewish leaders. They also feel that only a very limited number of refugees should remain abroad, so as not to lead to the spread of anti-Semitism, as a result of the economic problem raised by their presence.

Propaganda

It seems that strong efforts are being made by the German government to cause feeling for Germany in Italy to revert to a more sympathetic plane. Two articles which appeared in the REGIMA FASCISTA and other articles in other Italian papers defend Hitler's persecutions of the Jews. Similar propaganda on a larger scale is also being conducted by the German government in Spain, Switzerland and the Scandinavian countries as well as in the United States.

FOR THE VINDICATION OF TRUTH, FREEDOM AND RIGHT!

Similar to what was done at the time of the World War, a number of newspapers in several countries abroad have again embarked upon a campaign of malicious propaganda directed against the Government elected by the majority of the German people.

There can be no doubt that the authors of these falsehoods are those who, in consequence of the political changes in Germany, have had to forego---or are likely to forego---certain personal advantages.

IT IS NOT TRUE

that the national Government has established a regime of terror in Germany.

IT IS NOT TRUE

that foreigners or German Jews are molested or even ill-treated.

IT IS NOT TRUE

that German citizens or their property are endangered merely because they belong to parties hostile to the existing Government.

IT IS A MEAN LIE TO SAY

that such persons are murdered daily or hourly.

IT IS NOT TRUE

that business firms or shops are looted by order of the Government or by persons acting on its behalf.

THE TRUTH IS

that, prior to March 5, 1933, such looting---carried out by Communist criminals---did frequently happen in Germany's large towns, and that---thanks to the vigorous and disciplined action of the national Government and its supporters---it has now completely ceased to exist; that since then everyone enjoys absolute personal safety once more and that peace and order has been restored; that now at last energetic steps are taken to combat the professional criminals and that the lax methods formerly resorted to by weak State governments have ceased to be applied. The new Government, in its war upon crime, sees to it that adequate means are employed with the result that public safety has been restored everywhere.

THE TRUTH IS

that a number of Socialist and Communist leaders have been arrested, partly for the reason that they have been found guilty of high treason and partly for the purpose of protecting them from the excessive attention of excited youths who hate them for having abused their former power; but not one of them has suffered the slightest personal injury and all will have an opportunity of defending themselves before an ordinary court of law.

THE TRUTH IS

that all foreigners and all German citizens irrespective of their religious beliefs or their race enjoy the full protection of the German



Government, that they follow their usual occupations in the same way as always and that they, too, acknowledge the admirable discipline of the National Socialist associations,

THE TRUTH IS

that, since the victory of the national revolution, the number of deaths due to political causes immediately went down to a minimum and that these few cases concern, without exception, the victims of Communist crimes or Communists who had to be shot down in justified self-defence.

No other revolution has been as bloodless as the national revolution of the German people on March 5, 1933; and practically all the victims up to that date belong to those parties who now make up the Government. It is, more especially, a mean lie to say that Jews are persecuted or that their personal safety is in any way threatened.

80% of the German people expressed their complete faith in the present Government on March 23, 1933, which proves that this Government enjoys a support exceeding anything enjoyed by any previous German Government.

We should be greatly obliged if you, too, would kindly contribute to the dissemination of truth in your country and its press, thus showing up---in the interest of the pacification of the world---the baselessness of the calumnies directed against the German people and its Government.

Der gefährte Jude

Wenn man offenen Auges durch die Straßen Berlins geht und sich die einzelnen Geschäfte betrachtet, so kann man manch Interessantes beobachten.

Da gibt es Tempo-Läden aller Art, Tempo-Wälder, Tempo-Schuster, Tempo-Schneider, Tempo-Kleiderei usw. Tempo, Tempo, der Jude will das Geld des Christen haben, es kostet ihm alles so lange, der Golem verzerrt zu langsam. Wo sind da die Innungen, die für die Geschäfte einspringen, die sich Zwangszinnsungen nennen, um dem Geschäftsmann das Beitragsgeld abzuwerben, die aber so hämmerlich versagen, wenn es heißt, etwas für die Kollegen zu tun. Geschlossen haben sie und sie schlafen noch.

Etwas Neues kann man jetzt beobachten. Der Jude wagt sich an Branchen heran, die ihm bisher gar nicht lagen. Er verschmäht es sogar nicht, ein gewöhnlicher Bubiker zu werden. Im Südosten der Stadt, in der Gegend der Neander- und Auguststraße, kann man es beobachten, daß Juden am Bierkahn stehen. Für sie scheint das die leise Retina zu sein. Wer weiß, auf welch schmuckiger Weise sie sich in den Beistand des Volks gesetzt haben. Aber eins haben sie verlassen und das ist ... den Namen des alten Wirtes abzumachen, und das mit Absicht. Haben sie doch den Willen, das Volk so lange wie irgend möglich zu betrügen. Darum tanzen sich die Juden.

Auch schlimmsten ist es in dieser Beziehung in der Lebensmittelbranche und da speziell bei den Fleischwaren.

Ob man seine Butter bei Reichelt oder Thürmann, oder Ackermann, oder Nordstern, oder Coona (Ed. Goldacker Pltz.) oder in sonst einem Großfamiliengeschäft kauft, es ist alles eins. Der Verdienst geht in jedem Falle immer an holländische Juden. Der holländische Jude ist der Inhaber fast der gesamten Fleischindustrie Deutschlands. Ihm haben wir unter Jahr überdientes Geld in den Rachen zu werfen. Und laufen wir nicht in den großen Geschäften, sondern unterstehen den kleinen Geschäftsmännern, so ist auch dafür gesorgt, daß der Jude auf seine Rechnung kommt.

Da ist nämlich der Jude Weinberger, der die kleinen Geschäftsläden mit Butter usw. versorgt, der aber nur noch dem Namen nach existiert, denn in Wirklichkeit gehört die Firma auch dem holländischen Konzern. Hier ist alles verschachtelt und verknüpft wie bei einem Rattenkönig.

Den höchsten Grab von Näßlinesse hat der Jude Weinberger ausgelügelt.

Im Jahre 1921 verkaufte der Schmalzleder Edmund Haase seine Firma an vier jüdische Kunden gekommene Juden. Es waren zwei Brüder Rosenblatt und zwei Brüder Adler. Diese vier falschen Brüder schöpften nur während der Inflationszeit die Sahne ab und verlaufen das Geschäft im Jahre 1925 weiter an Hermann Weinberger. Im Jahre 1928 starb ein anderer Schmalzleder Emil Kübler in Weihenstephan, auch diese Firma wurde von Hermann Weinberger geschluckt. Und wozu? Nur um mit dem Namen dieser beiden christlichen Geschäftsläden, die seit einer Generation als tüchtige Fachleute bekannt waren, Nebbach zu machen.

Und noch heute nach 12 Jahren, 5 Jahren fahren die Wagen dieser alten Schmalzfirmen unter dem gleichen Namen wie unter ihrem alten Chef und die Verkaufsstützen schreiben noch heute die mit der alten Firma versehenen Rechnungen aus. Alles nur, um die Geschäftsläden, um die Christen zu betrügen und zu begauern.

Ähnlich machen es auch die „Gescha“-Fleischwaren. Nachdem sie nun fast jeden Lebensmittelhändler mit Fleisch- und Wurstwaren bestreift haben, laufen sie sich die alte angesehene Fleischfirma Hesler und machen nun in allen Stadtteilen Läden auf, um noch einmal ihren Kunden Konkurrenz zu machen und ja den ganzen Handel an sich zu reißen.

Auch Warenhäuser, die angeblich für Beamte Vertragshändler sind und dementsprechend Namen führen, sind von Juden finanziert.

Was ist dagegen zu tun?

Wir wollen uns nicht länger von diesen Juden begauern und betrügen lassen. Sie haben uns durch ihre Hehereien genauso ruiniert und den Mittelstand an den Bettelstab gebracht. Jetzt Schluss damit.

Wir bitten die Regierung, daß eine Verfügung herausgebracht wird, die vorschreibt:

1. daß jeder Betriebshaber seinen Namen in großer Schrift am Schaufenster anbringen

wie der Ausländer behandelt werden muß. Auch hierfür liege sich ein Modus finden.

Parteigenossen! Ehe ihr einen Laden betreibt, den ihr noch nicht kennt, besucht ihn euch von allen Seiten, sucht den Namen und versucht herauszufinden, ob es ein Deutscher oder ein Ausländer ist, lauft nicht bei Juden, nicht in den Warenhäusern, unterstellt den Mittelstand. Jetzt haben wir die Regierung, die wir schon lange wünschten und die auch für uns sorgen wird; aber was nutzen die Verfügungen, wenn das Volk sich nicht daran richtet, wenn es doch zum Judentum rennt? Hier heißt es: Selbstbewußtsein. Der Jude muß gemieden werden, bis er vor die Hunde geht, bis er merkt, daß in Deutschland kein Nebbach mehr zu machen ist, bis er uns den Rücken lebt zum Wohl seines Volkes und unseres Vaterlandes.

Schuhjuden

Bei den Stellen, welche sich mit dem Ausschluß der Juden von öffentlichen Berufen zu befassen haben, laufen große Mengen von Gesuchten ein, in denen sich Mittelkreise der früher herrschenden Kreise für die Zulassung dieses oder jenes „anständigen Juden“ einsetzen. Ganz abgesehen davon daß solche Empfehlungen und „Besitzungen“ völlig zwecklos sind, sollen sich die Einsender solcher Schreiben gefangen lassen, daß jeder, der einen Juden befürworten will, von Rechts wegen verurteilt werden müßte, 2 oder 5 Jahre lang einen erwerbslosen Deutschen zu ernähren.
