

Dear Rabbi Silver:

When the Dormitory Campaign was first mentioned at Buffalo someone suggested that, if each Sisterhood would raise an amount equivalent to \$7 per member, this would yield \$250,000, the sum required to build and equip the Dormitory. This \$7 quota was accepted without further examination.

We have since then been urged by the authorities of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations to change this quota to \$10. We have refused to do this because a great many Sisterhoods are now in the process of collecting the funds, and have advertised the fact that they are working on a \$7 quota. To make any change now, would necessitate that they make many explanations to their campaign workers and to their membership.

My advice is that although we cannot change the quota, still we can do this--Every Sisterhood can go over the top and raise more than its quota of \$7 per member.

I am happy to inform you that I have heard from a number of Sisterhoods that have already adopted this plan and who have raised far more than the quota assigned to them. I feel assured that we shall be able to count your Sisterhood among those.



## The Four Steps in the Dormitory Campaign

## The First Step is ORGANIZATION-

- a. Select a proper chairman, one who will work and who can get the assistance of your community.
- b. If in a city where there are several Sisterhoods, arrange a meeting of all the Sisterhood Presidents and Chairmen and elect a chairman for the city, either from those present or some one else. Let this group be the Campaign Executive Committee. This is to insure running the campaign at one and the same time and getting the benefit of the momentum and publicity.
- c. Select for your Sisterhood a Campaign Committee having the following characteristics:
- (1) Not afraid to work; (2) Large enough so that no one member will have to visit more than 10 persons; (3) Large enough to visit every family (man or woman) on your Sisterhood or Congregation list.
- d. Make it easy for your committee by providing your workers with cards containing the names of the persons they are to see. Don't be afraid to spend the money that it takes to do this. It will be well spent.

## The Second Step is PUBLICITY ---

- a. Get your city talking about the Dormitory Campaign from the very beginning.
- b. Ask your rabbi to deliver an address on Dormitory Campaign at a special meeting of your Sisterhood.
- c. Ask the rabbi to speak of it in the pulpit.
- d. Take your whole Campaign Committee, or as many as you can, to a photographer and get a picture taken of the group. Take this to the local paper. Tell the Editor of the campaign you propose to start.
- e. The same in your weekly Jewish paper.
- f. When you get some large subscriptions, publish them.

## The Third Step is GETTING THE MONEY---

- a. Send the right person to the right party.
- b. If you fix your quota at \$7.00 or \$10.00, don't ask every lady or gentleman for that amount. Ask every person for the amount he or she ought to give. Make up your mind on this subject before you call.
- c. Treat your contributors right. Let each worker give a receipt for every donation received—before leaving. Send us every name, with full address and amount. Upon receipt of the money we will acknowledge the same to the contributors.

## The Fourth Step is WHEN TO START-

- a. Only one answer—NOW! It makes no difference what other campaign is going on. There is always something going on. START TODAY—and keep it up. Don't stop until you are finished.
- b. When you begin collecting money have a place of meeting, where all the workers can come every afternoon at 4 P. M. to report what they did.
- c. Chalk up the returns of each committee on a blackboard and induce a generous rivalry.
- d. Serve tea every day.
- e. The parlors of the hotel are a good place to meet, or in the temple.
- f. It need not take more than seven days of solicitation for the biggest campaign, if you have enough workers and if you have done the preliminary work for them.



Dear Rabbi Silver:

I don't think I have to tell you that we are running a Campaign to raise \$250,000 for a Dormitory for the students of the Hebrew Union College. You have undoubtedly heard from Dr. Englander, and have received the able report of Dr. Morgenstern on Housing Conditions for the Hebrew Union College Students.

We have no hope of making a success of this Campaign unless we are assured of your personal advice and co-operation. I am writing to elicit this both for myself and the benefit of your Sisterhood. May I be so bold (in a letter asking for advice) as to make a suggestion? In order that each city may raise its quota a great deal of information has to be given and considerable enthusiasm has to be created. There are two places and two occasions where this may be done.

Some of the money will have to be raised from Sisterhood members. Some of it will have to be raised from the men in your congregation. May I ask you to speak on the subject, both from your pulpit and also at a meeting of the Sisterhood. Possibly a combination of the two would be the best solution, if you will have the kindness to bring this about. I mean a special Sisterhood Day or Sisterhood Service to be held in the temple. On this occasion the College and the Dormitory, and the new position of women in the religious world of today might be made the subject of the address.

If this could be arranged in the near future it would make the assistance doubly effective.

Thanking you in advance for your hearty co-operation which I anticipate, and trusting to hear from you, I beg to remain, with cordial greetings.
