My dear Wohl: In reply to your letter of April 18th, I do not know of any community in the vicinity that is at present in need of a rabbi. The suggestion of an Alumni Emergency Fund to assist communities financially so as to enable them to engage rabbis is an interesting but a very expensive one. I do not see how our alumni can raise enough money to subsidize more than two or three such communities. I believe that the matter should be discussed at the annual meeting of the Alumni Association in June. We have just circularized the membership of our congregation for Union dues. Dear Dr. Silver,

With the approval of President Morgenstern, I am trying to raise the sum of \$370.00 to finance the participation of two Hebrew Union College students in the Peace Caravan to be conducted by the American Friends Service Committee in the Summer of 1936. Hebrew Union College students, acquitting themselves most creditably, participated in this venture during the Summers of 1932 and 1934, funds being supplied by the National Federation of Temple Sisterhoods and by the National Council of Jewish Juniors. Certain fiscal changes in one of these organizations preclude a repetition of this support for the immediate present. Hence my attempt to obtain the sum from other sources.

The Peace Caravan consists of a group of thirty young men and women who, after an intensive course of instruction in international problems at one of the universities, travel in pairs throughout the rural districts where they arrange and address all types of meetings in the interests of world peace. Supervision is exercised by the American Friends Service Committee but financing proceeds from separate sponsors.

The four Hebrew Union College students who have served in the past have been the only Jewish participants. As matters shaped themselves, these students turned out to be emissaries for Judaism as well as for world peace. They have combatted, among the rural folk, not only erroneous ideas about international affairs but even more absurdly erroneous ideas about Judaism and the Jews. We as Jews have our own additional interests at stake even though the interests of world peace are primary in this endeavor.

Can you possibly get some well-to-do person to make a substantial contribution to this fund of \$370.00? Will you thus help us out?

I hope you will not consider me presumptuous for addressing you with a request. In our Social Studies Department under Dr. Abraham Cronbach we are now engaged in research on the problem entitled "Sectarian Factors in Contentions over Communism, Pacifism and Similar Controversial Issues." This study is to figure as one of a series proposed by the National Conference of Jews and Christians.

We want to determine how the participation of Jews in radical and other movements creates anti-semitic feeling. Besides Communism and Pacifism the other controversial issues are: birth-control, the Negro problem, the New Deal, etc.

Dr. I. M. Rubinow and others have been most helpful with material from their personal files. We have in mind to include in our study the attack of J. F. Lincoln in connection with the Ohio Unemployment Insurance Legislation of 1933. We understand that you answered Mr. Lincoln. Would you choose to send us your clippings, your lecture, or any other material that you have on this and similar incidents.

In the sphere of our study there also enter the problems you discussed in an article "Pogroms Are Not Such Srimple Matters" published in The Jewish Daily Bulletin, October 21, 1934 in connection with James W. Gerard's speech on the Jews and Communism in America. You must have written and lectured on this problem. Will you be good enough to lend us the material. I shall be personally responsible for the items you send us, and of course, I shall not fail to acknowledge my indebtedness to you in the study.

Perhaps you can recall any other cases in which some Rabbis or Jewish laymen were attacked in the press as radicals, pacifists, etc. Perhaps it has been your good fortune to be accused of that in print. If so we are ready to use you as one of our "cases."

We are rather eager to have the information at the earliest possible date. Please help us.
