
Dear Rabbi Silver:

Institute of Jewish Studies,

which promotes research and publication.

Institute of Oriental Studies,

which consists thus far of an Arabic Department.

Institute of Chemistry,

which consists of

a. Department of Analytic and Synthetic Chemistry.

b. Department of Biochemistry.

Its main task is chemical research, with special emphasis on the economic and scientific problems of Palestine. (Fermentation of tobacco, formation of soils, etc., have been studied.)

Institute of Microbiology and Department of Hygiene,

which is at present concerned with problems of sand-fly fever, typhoid, dysentery and malaria, and with experimental work on cattle diseases.

Institute of Mathematics and Physics

which gives courses in higher mathematics.

Institute of Palestine Natural History,

which conducts research in plant physiology and flora of Palestine.


We have already organized Societies of Friends in about a dozen communities, and we hope to organize a similar Society in Cleveland.


Dear Rabbi Silver:

INSTITUTE OF CHEMISTRY

This Institute consists of a Department of Analytic and Synthetic Chemistry and a Department of Biochemistry. Though some courses are given, its main task is chemical research with especial emphasis on the economic problems of Palestine; e.g., the fermentation of tobacco and the character of soils.

Some of the investigations conducted by this Department, and published during the academic year 1926-27 are:

Investigations now under way, or in press, include studies on Mineral Salts in the Dead Sea; Physico-Chemical Studies of Soap Solutions, and Coagulation; the Technical Utilization of Certain Alcohols.

INSTITUTE OF MICROBIOLOGY

This Institute, including the Department of Hygiene, has among its major problems, sand-fly fever, typhoid, dysentery, and malaria, as well as cattle diseases. The American Jewish Physicians Committee appropriates approximately \$25,000 a year toward its support. The Joint Distribution Committee has been supporting the Department of Hygiene and the Nutrition Laboratory.

INSTITUTE OF NATURAL HISTORY

This Institute, comprising Departments of Botany, Zoology, and Geology, already has extensive collections of Palestinian flora and fauna, together with a geologic collection. Among its recent publications are the following:

INSTITUTE OF MATHEMATICS AND PHYSICS

The Wattenberg Hall of the Einstein Institute of Mathematics and Physics was completed and dedicated in October, 1928. The Physics Building is in the course of construction. In the meantime the Institutes of Mathematics and Physics will be located in the Wattenberg Hall. Professor L. Ornstein of the University of Utrecht will supervise the Department of Physics, and Professor A. Fraenkel of Kiel will head the Mathematics Institute.

The library of the late Prof. Felix Klein, of Goettingen, forms a part of the Mathematical Library now available to workers.

Funds for a Testing Materials Laboratory to be established in connection with the Institute of Physics, have been appropriated by the Palestine Economic Corporation.

LIBRARY

The David Wolffsohn Memorial Library will be dedicated on Mt. Scopus in June, 1929. The University has already over 200,000 volumes in this Library, including the only medical collection of note in the Near East. The library includes many rare books and manuscripts; among the latter is the original manuscript on theory of relativity, which has been donated to it by Professor Albert Einstein, Head of the Academic Council of the University.

INSTITUTES OF JEWISH STUDIES AND OF ORIENTAL RESEARCH

The Institutes of Jewish and Oriental Studies, together with the Administration offices, are to be housed in the Rosenbloom Memorial Building, for which the plans are now being drawn.

The Institute of Jewish Studies has initiated new critical studies of the Talmud, of Jewish History, and of the sociology of modern Jewry.

The Institute of Oriental Studies is devoting itself to a study of the history and literature of the Moslem civilization. The following works are now in preparation: "A Survey of Moslem Heraldry", by Prof. L. A. Mayer, and a Concordance of Classical Arabic Poetry.

Among the archaeological investigations now in progress are the excavation of ancient Synagogue sites in Palestine. A book on the important "Third Wall of Jerusalem", by Dr. L. Sukenik, field Archaeologist, is in press.

THE UNIVERSITY PRESS

The first enterprise of the newly established Press is to be a Quarterly Review of the Humanities, of which Professor J. N. Epstein will be the editor.

Some Needs of the Hebrew University in Palestine

1. *Maintenance of Present Scientific Staffs.*
2. *Equipment for the Physics Laboratory now being built.*
3. *Equipment for the Departments of Geology, Botany and Zoology.*
4. *A Meteorological Station attached to the Department of Mathematics to coordinate meteorologic data.*
5. *Cooperation of the Agricultural Experiment Station with the University, and the expansion of Agricultural Research.*
6. *Further research on scientific projects having an immediate bearing on the economic development of Palestine; and coordination of the research activities of the Government and other organizations.*
7. *Additions to its scientific library.*
8. *A building for the Institute of Natural History and its Museum.*

ON July 24th, 1918, with the Turkish battle line only ten miles away, guns resounding and war planes in the distance, Lord Allenby, the British Commander-in-Chief in Palestine, and Dr. Weizmann, President of the Zionist Organization of the World, laid the cornerstone of the Hebrew University in Jerusalem. It is significant that the first act of the British soldier, and of the Jew, returning to his recovered homeland, should be the dedication of this site to the ideal of scholarship and learning.

The place where they chose to set the cornerstone was on the summit of Mount Scopus, a shoulder of the Mount of Olives. From there one can see to the south the white vaulted roofs and walls of the old City of Jerusalem, the gleaming temple place with the blue Dome of the Rock and Mosque of Akbar, and, in the distance beyond the City, the wilderness of Benjamin. Westerly and Northward are the Mountains of Judea, rugged, white and beautiful; and on the Eastern side the land slopes steeply, creased by the beds of many dry streams, to the Jordan Valley and the deep blue waters of the Dead Sea 3000 feet below. As far as the eye can reach beyond the Jordan are the Mountains of Moab.

After the League of Nations had given to Great Britain the mandate for Palestine and the Jewish Homeland was assured, the University remodeled or constructed its first buildings, and it was officially opened by Lord Balfour in April, 1925. Dr. Judah L. Magnes was chosen as the first Chancellor of the University; Dr. Weizmann is the President.

WHY A HEBREW UNIVERSITY?

IN the pages that follow a number of scholars and educators have set forth their reasons why this institution should be welcomed, why the ideal of a Hebrew University in Jerusalem appeals to them.

1. The local demand for such a University is insistent. Thousands of children are growing up in the land with Hebrew as their native tongue. It is one of the official languages of the country: ordinances, notices and the names of streets are written in Hebrew. Most of these young people will go into farming and trade, but many of them will want and deserve higher education, for the Jews have always been a people of the Book. The influence of the land itself will lead many of them into historic research and the study of religion, for the country-side is documented with historic references to Bible days, the Greek and Roman occupations, the Crusaders and the Saracens, and all that long succession of peoples to whom Palestine has been an inn or a home, whose voices still echo in its Mountains and the signs of whose civilization can still be traced in the earth.

2. The introduction of modern agriculture and proper breeds of fowl and cattle into a new region creates new problems of soil and climate, water supply, chemistry and physics which can best be solved on the spot in the scholarly atmosphere of a University which is in contact with cognate learning in other parts of the world. So, too, the sudden contact by a people who for generations have dwelt in the West with diseases of the East has inevitably stimulated the study of medicine and especially such ailments as are peculiarly Oriental and which have rarely received the attention of modern science.

3. The Jews who have benefited for centuries from the Universities of the Western world—not merely from the opportunity to go there as students but from the results of their scientific discoveries and scholarship—owe to the world in return the tribute of a place of higher learning.

4. We must provide a place of study for the hounded and disappointed youth of lands which limit the number of Jews who may enter their Universities as students and give them no opportunity for independent scholarly research.

5. Palestine is the logical place for theological students to do post-graduate work. This has long been recognized by Christian sects hundreds of whose priests and ministers visit the land every year.

6. Henry Adams and André Siegfried have pointed out the different streams of civilization flowing in the East and in the West, the one illustrated by American standardized super-production and the other by the East Indian saint earning by self-abnegation the rewards of future worlds. In Palestine where the Jews, the British Government and traders of all nations have brought from the Western world scientific method and industrial organization these two streams come in contact with each other. With their eastern background and their western outlook the Jewish people have a rare opportunity of learning to understand the essence of each civilization, of interpreting one to the other and reconciling these different philosophies.

It has been the function of the Jew throughout his history to be interpreter and mediator among groups and peoples, philosophies and ideals. There is now a great opportunity in Palestine to translate

East to West and West to East and the University on Mount Scopus is the key to the translation; for like the Rosetta Stone it has on one side the Hebraic tradition reaching back to the days of Abraham, the nomad, and on the other the scientific tradition of Spinoza and Einstein and Freud.

STANDARD OF SCHOLARSHIP

THERE is no institution in the Near East maintaining such high scholastic standards as the Hebrew University in Jerusalem.

Following the example of institutions such as Johns Hopkins, it was determined, in order to assure a scholarly basis for the work of the University, that it would at first be restricted to research and the instruction of graduate students who held University degrees. Now, however, undergraduate courses are being introduced to meet the demands of Palestinian students and of Jewish youths coming from those European countries where the *numerus clausus* is applied.

Although the University is open to men and women of all races and creeds, the language of instruction is in Hebrew, as it is in all Jewish schools in Palestine.

THE WORK OF THE UNIVERSITY

THE largest department of the University is at present the Institute of Jewish Studies, which is not a theological school, but approaches Jewish problems from the point of view of a western university. It is engaged in historical and archaeological research and in restoring old Hebrew texts.

There is also an institute of Oriental studies which is at present engaged in preparing a concordance of Islamic poetry, which has never before been done. The Institute of Chemistry is engaged in special Palestinian problems. The Department of Hygiene is investigating local diseases and the effect of climate and nutrition on the prevalence of disease. There are also Institutes of Palestine Natural History, and of Mathematics, and a Library which now includes about 200,000 volumes.

A large number of scholars visiting Palestine, and others especially invited for that purpose from Europe and America, lecture at the University each year, thereby enabling it to keep in contact with the scholarly thought of the western world and to avoid the evil of inbred thought.

The Board of Governors of the University is unique in having among its membership men of such rare attainment, science and scholarship as Professor L. S. Ornstein of Utrecht, Professor E. Landau of Goettingen, Judge Benjamin N. Cardozo and Dr. Chaim Weizmann. The Academic Council is headed by Professor Albert Einstein, and Professor Sigmund Freud is also a member.

The University is fortunate to have many enthusiastic friends. The following statements by a few of them, Jews and Gentiles, indicate some of the purposes which the University may serve and the ideals which it may forward.

BENJAMIN N. CARDOZO

*Chief Judge of the New York Court of Appeals and
Trustee of Columbia University.*

I do not know whether the plan of a Jewish homeland in Palestine is destined to succeed or fail. It has its sponsors and its critics. The fate that awaits it may be more than they expect or less. Whatever the fate shall be, the University will be lifted above those temporal mutations. If the home is maintained, an institute of learning will be more than useful; it will then be indispensable. If the home is dissolved, the institute will not be wasted; it will be, like institutes of learning anywhere, a boon to all mankind.

What a mockery of the Jewish past it would be to found a dwelling place for Jewish life without providing at the same time a dwelling place for the spirit which has identified that life and made it luminous and significant for all these centuries of time!



DR. CYRUS ADLER

*President of Dropsie College, and President of The Jewish
Theological Seminary of America.*

There are many arguments which have been used in support of the University. Palestine and the Near East generally need a great institution of learning. The Jewish students of Eastern Europe, who are actually or virtually debarred from many seats of learning, need it.

To me, however, there is another aspect of the matter: Ever since the eleventh century, when Bologna inaugurated the university movement, whatever secular or professional learning Jews acquired was gotten in these foundations—Paris, Oxford, Cambridge and their successors. As you know, most of these early foundations came out of the church. For nearly a century and a half, hundreds of thousands of Jews have profited by the universities of the world. In what way can this debt be more fittingly repaid than by the Jews giving one University back to the world and where could this University more appropriately be located than at Jerusalem?

GEORGE FOOT MOORE

Professor of History of Religion, Harvard University.

Allow me through you to extend to the Hebrew University of Jerusalem my felicitations on its auspicious beginnings and my best wishes for a future of large and long service to learning and science.

M. J. ROSENAU

Professor of Preventive Medicine and Hygiene, Medical School, Harvard University.

The Hebrew University made a deep impression on me, which grows with time and distance. It offers a hopeful prospect for advancing Jewish happiness and security the world over. You are the chief priest of a temple for scholarship with opportunity for scientific revelations. On account of its location and spirit, it offers asylum and encouragement for the expression of Jewish Genius.

R. BUTIN, S.M.

Curator of the Museum of the Catholic University of America.

I am glad to have this opportunity to say that to my mind, it, The Hebrew University on Mount Scopus, is called upon to render great service and to contribute very efficaciously to the progress of Palestine. Its very location in Jerusalem, where so much of the Jewish history has been made, will surely attract many and will create interest everywhere. It will be the means of introducing modern methods and ideals to the Arabic World and the Arabs to the West. By the practical results of its investigations, the University will in time gain the confidence of the Palestinians who will reap numerous benefits from its presence among them. I remember with pleasure the tests made at the University on the various diseases and plagues of the East and on the ways to combat them. Surely this cannot but win the approval of everybody. It will be so in every line of Research. It will also create a desire for learning, and will play a leading role in the development of the educational system of the land.

STEPHEN S. WISE

Rabbi, Free Synagogue of New York.

The Hebrew University combines the love of the Jew for learning and his capacity highly to use the educational instrumentalities of the Western world.

* * *

It opens its doors to the people of Palestine irrespective of faith and race. It stands as a refuge for those European Jews denied access to the Universities in their own countries. Whatever American Jews may think with respect to the validity of the Zionist position, I feel that every American Jew ought to give his support to the building up of the Hebrew University in Jerusalem, which already gives promise of becoming a noble and enduring contribution of the Jew in the realm of learning.

HARRY EMERSON FOSDICK

Minister of the Park Avenue Baptist Church, New York.

That Jerusalem should be made the cultural headquarters of Judaism seems to me an entirely natural and worthy enterprise and I should think that it would capture the imagination of Jewish leaders. A great service can be done to all religions by the right kind of university centre in Jerusalem and I should be very happy to see the project under Dr. Magnes carried to a fruitful success.

KIRSOPP LAKE

Professor of Ecclesiastical History, Harvard University.

Of all my recollections of my visit to Jerusalem last year none, I think, is so vivid as that of lecturing to your university. The combination of place, people, and subject rendered it an unforgettable incident. I was convinced then, and subsequent thought has confirmed the conviction, that you possess in Jerusalem the one essential for a great university—the presence of a group of men who add a passionate desire for knowledge to a large ability for learning. Almost anyone can teach but comparatively few can learn, and a university is essentially a place of learning. Since the days of the first rabbis that, if I read history right, has been the tradition of Judaism and yours is

one of the few races which has ever made learning the basis of its aristocracy. It was a real pleasure in Jerusalem to find a society which, though divided by race, language, and politics, was so conscious of that international brotherhood to which scholarship provides admission.

How far you will be able to follow up this success naturally depends on the generosity of others and as to that I can only express hope. But for you and your immediate colleagues it is true, as Luther said of the German Protestants in the sixteenth century, "the Spirit and the gifts are yours."

Dear Rabbi Silver:

Although there were sporadic attacks in the immediate vicinity, I know you will be glad to learn that the University was not injured during the recent tragic events in Palestine. Indeed, it was able to perform a unique function as a place of refuge for valuable books and manuscripts which were brought to the vaults of the Library for safety.

November 18th marked the opening session for the academic year 1929-30. On account of the difficulty Jewish students are experiencing in Eastern and Central European universities, it is expected that enrollment will be increased at the Hebrew University.

During the past four years, Arab students have worked side by side with Jewish students in its laboratories, and the School of Oriental Studies has carried on important researches in Moslem history and culture. To further its work, the Board of Governors at its recent meeting in Zurich authorized the establishment of a Chair in Assyriology, and funds are already in hand for a Chair in International Peace. Through these means, and through the practical researches in its Departments of Chemistry, Hygiene, and other scientific departments, the University can do much to increase and develop good understanding in the country.

I know that we may count on your support during the coming year for these projects. We are enclosing a pamphlet descriptive of the work done during the last four years.


I have the honor to enclose an invitation to the dedication of the Wolffsohn Memorial Library of the Hebrew University, to be held in the Untermeyer Open-Air Theatre on Mt. Scopus. Sir John Robert Chancellor, High Commissioner for Palestine, will make the chief address. The University Choral Society in cooperation with the Jerusalem Musical Society will take part in the ceremonies. Special exhibits of the rare manuscripts in the University collections will be shown during April.

A Music Festival in which massed choirs from Tel Aviv, Petach Tikvah, Rehovoth, Nes-Ziona and the University Choral Society will participate, will be given in the Open-Air Theatre as part of the celebration. It is hoped that this Music Festival will inaugurate similar annual events which may form part of a "Passover Pilgrimage" to Palestine.

It is fitting that the fifth anniversary of the University, formally opened by the late Earl of Balfour on April 1, 1925, should be marked by the dedication of the Library, the finest structure of its kind in the Near East. Its collections already number over a quarter of a million volumes, and Moslem, Christian and Jew mingle in its reading rooms. It possesses the only medical library of note in the Near East. The value of this collection may be measured by the fact that two branch libraries for the use of physicians have been established, one in Jerusalem, and one in Tel-Aviv.

Since its opening, five years ago today, the University has made continuous progress in practical research which has benefitted the entire country. It has established a high standard of culture which has already made its influence felt, not only in Palestine, but by Jews everywhere. As a friend of the University, I feel sure you will want to join with us in congratulating it on this latest phase of its development.

Dear Rabbi Silver:

This year several dozen students are registered at the Hebrew University from institutions in Eastern Europe, where, as you know, there is a particularly virulent form of Anti-Semitism.

The situation of the student-body at the Hebrew University is considerably different from that at our own colleges. Practically every student there must earn his entire expenses. They are willing to work at anything; the difficulty is there is not enough work to go around. Scrub-women, tile-layers, stenographers, day-laborers--both men and young women fill these jobs and are glad to get them. A favored few do tutoring. The University employs as many as possible in construction work, but this too is so scarce that jobs have to be divided between students so that each may have one or two days' work a week.

The minimum monthly expenditure for a student is about \$25. This low sum is made possible by the help offered through the cafeteria, maintained in part by the University and partly by the students. There is also a "Loan Bank" which grants sums from \$10 to \$15 for a period of several months, without interest.

It would indeed be heartening to these young men and women if your Sunday School or junior organization were to join with other groups to make up a scholarship of \$300, the amount necessary to cover a student's minimum living expenses for a year. They might contribute \$25 to cover a month's board and lodging, or if they prefer, they could contribute a special prize of \$25 for a needy student, which would be awarded in your School's name at the end of the year.

I hope you will urge your young people to respond favorably in this extraordinarily difficult year. I know you will agree that lending aid to their fellow-students in Palestine will enable your boys and girls to carry on in a concrete way the Jewish tradition of learning. I earnestly hope we shall hear favorably from you soon.

EXCERPT FROM A LETTER REGARDING STUDENT SCHOLARSHIPS NEEDED
AT THE HEBREW UNIVERSITY - By Dr. Judah L. Magnes

"Prizes and scholarships are, indeed, one of the greatest needs of the University since so many Jewish students of considerably ability lack even the minimum means for existence, and suffer serious hardship in order to go through their course of study.

"To enable a student to live, however modestly, a scholarship should not amount to less than £4 - £5 a month/(\$20 to \$25) or about £50 - £60 (\$250 - \$300) yearly. Smaller scholarships can be used for shorter periods, that is, for one semester.

"Scholarships can be either earmarked for a certain subject or -- which is much better - granted at the discretion of the University Council, which can then take into consideration the relative merits and needs of the students in the various institutes.

"As you are aware, the need for scholarships is very acute in Palestine; probably more so than anywhere else. Cost of living is fairly expensive, the currency high, and many students simply cannot subsist on the pittance that their parents can afford to give them. The University endeavors to employ students wherever possible, even as unskilled laborers on our buildings now in the course of erection. But such work interferes with their studies and moreover, is scarce. This summer, for example, there are twelve vacancies for unskilled laborers available for the students, and the Student Committee divided them among thirty-six students, giving each two days' work a week only. On the other hand, the Jews never admitted that education is for the well-to-do only. As other nations pride themselves on winning because they refuse to know when they are beaten, so we study because we refuse to know that "we cannot afford it."

"Under such circumstances the University authorities were compelled to provide for scholarships temporarily from the regular budget of the Institutes. This practice, however, could not be kept up very long. There are already several regular scholarships provided by special contributions. Among them are the Canada B'nai B'rith Organization Scholarship of £50 per annum; a Boston Palestine Scholarship amounting to £41, the Hebrew Graduates and Undergraduates Association of Australia, etc., etc.

"We are likely to introduce tuition fees which, though a normal and healthy feature of a University's life, will make the position of poor but gifted students even more difficult. There will be many deserving applicants for scholarships, and there should be twenty or thirty scholarships instead of the three or four we now have."....





You have been suggested as one of a small group in Cleveland who will be interested to constitute a Charter Membership of a Society of Friends of the Hebrew University. We are therefore writing to you to invite you to join us.

The primary purpose of the Society will be to foster an interest in this unique enterprise which may well prove to be the real contribution of American Jewry to modern educational and scientific advancement.

The Hebrew University was established in 1918 and was dedicated in 1925. Its present buildings and equipment are the contribution largely of leaders among American Jewry. Its faculty includes Scholars and Scientists of note in their respective fields. 


I want to thank you for your willingness to devote some time to the discussion of Hebrew University problems in Cleveland after the busy day that you had and having just returned from out of town.

Last year at about this time you were good enough to award a scholarship in the amount of \$500 to the Hebrew University in honor of Rabbi Hillel Silver. I am not at liberty to make the letters from Jerusalem public but this one sentence quoted from them will convey to you the tenor of the whole material:


"The Hebrew University will go down
unless something is done to save it."

We all realize that this is no time to try to enlist new supporters. Nevertheless, I feel that you and all of us who have contributed towards the auspicious beginnings of this University will be willing to do something to save it from the collapse which will inevitably come if we cannot support it through the next months. (Unfortunately the gravity of the financial situation of the Hebrew University is not in any measure realized by either the general or the Jewish public).

I am attaching a memorandum of your former contribution, in the hope that you will feel that those who helped to establish the University should help now when there is grave danger of our work being wholly lost.

Dear Rabbi Silver,

It was a great shock to hear that you had left Jerusalem so suddenly and on so sad a mission. Will you please convey our sympathy to your wife? We had been looking forward to seeing you and her at the little house at Nathania which is just about getting into shape. At that time I had expected to take you on a long walk along the beach up to Wadi El Huwarith to talk over with you the problem of the University and your own relationship to it.

You have gotten a bird's-eye view of the University and I know that you must be pleased with some of it. At any rate, you - with your keen insight - realise undoubtedly some of its great possibilities. These days, when the Hitler reaction is directed primarily against the Jewish mind and spirit, it is an increased duty to strengthen the University in order that it may become genuinely the creative centre for the Jewish mind and spirit.

You are eminently fitted to take the lead in America in lifting your voice on behalf of the University. You are a Hebrew and an American, and you are concerned with intellectual and spiritual values. It seems to me that nothing could fit in with your own make-up and sphere of activity better than devotion to the University and intensive work on its behalf.

I know that the Committee in New York would welcome your cooperation and would want to do everything possible to make your task as important and as pleasant as possible. There are doubtless many others who can work on behalf of economic enterprises in Palestine; there are not many so well equipped as you are to engage upon this important work for the University.

I sincerely hope that your all-too-brief visits to the University will have given you a picture of its activities that will urge you on to fall in with this suggestion, and I hope that we may meet soon in common labours in this cause.

My dear Dr. Magnes:

Permit me to thank you for your kind letter of May 1st. I am sorry that due to the sad loss which we sustained, Mrs. Silver and I were compelled to leave Palestine so hurriedly. I look forward with pleasure to our seeing each other again and discussing a little more The Hebrew University.

I am very grateful to you for the warm welcome which you extended to me, to the University and for the tour of inspection and acquaintances on which you conducted me. I learned much more about the University than I knew before.

Of course I am ready to help the cause of the University in America. I cannot, however, accept a position of leadership in the work. Not only because I am burdened with many other responsibilities, but because I have made it a practise never to assume the responsibility of leadership for a cause or an institution with which I am not officially connected and over whose larger policies I can have no say whatever. You will, I am sure, understand the reasons for it. The Hebrew University has quite a number of American Jews on its Board of Governors and from among that group should logically come the man or men to lead in the work in this country. Whatever time and energy I can spare from my numerous other duties I shall be happy to devote to this cause.

You will recall that last year at this time, you made a contribution to the Hebrew University, and they are wondering if you would care to renew it in this or a larger figure at this time. "In these grim and terrible days that confront Jewry—and not merely Jewry but the most precious conquests of the human spirit—the claims of the Hebrew University are inescapable. I speak not of compassion for the fate of the German Jewish professors. The Jewish men of learning in Germany, whose light is being extinguished, must be saved, not primarily for their sake but for the sake of all mankind. . . . The tragic development in Germany thus furnishes an opportunity, as well as a duty, to win for the Hebrew University in Palestine, men of world-wide distinction."

FELIX FRANKFURTER

TO THE JEWISH PEOPLE

IN Germany today, it is not so much 600,000 Jews who are being attacked as it is Judaism. It is not the Jew as an individual human being who is being ground down, but the Jew as the bearer of Judaism.

It is the Jewish mind, the Jewish spirit, the Jewish tradition, the thousand ways in which Judaism has expressed itself in the Western world, that is dreaded by the pagan nationalism of present-day Germany. A drop of Jewish blood is sufficient to create the fear that the Jewish mind will overcome the German mind.

The Jewish book is publicly burned. This is not the first time in Jewish history that the books of the People of the Book have been burned.

An Assault on Israel's Spirit

Freedom of thought and of the mind, the liberty of the individual conscience, judging men by ethical standards and not by race or color, the right of minorities to their own lives and ideals, the passion for social righteousness, indignation at oppression, protection of the orphan and the widow and the stranger within the gates, detestation of war and of brute force, the glorification of life and of the spirit, the unity of Mankind in the Supreme Unity of God—it is against these Jewish ideals and values that the onslaught is made. Let men of good will make no mistake. The attack upon the Jew is but the forerunner and the symbol of the will to rule the world through force and war in the name of pagan idols. At Sinai, Israel was commanded not to bow down to these images or to serve them, and throughout Israel's history—even

through its back-slidings and aberrations—it has been the idea of the supremacy of mind, of spirit, of the unity of Mankind, that has dominated his thought. This idea has found expression also in Christianity and Islam insofar as they are derived from Judaism. This idea has found tongue through Jewish personalities of the most varied types and through all ages. It is to this that the continued existence of the Jewish community now and everywhere bears witness; and it is against this that the barbarian and the heathen are raging. It is a sure instinct that leads them to pounce upon Israel and Israel's spirit and ideas as their chief prey. Woe unto mankind if Israel is vanquished! It is the age-long struggle between Esau and Jacob, between Edom and Judea. At this great crisis of the world's history, it is the warfare of Gog and Magog.

This challenge to the sacred ideals of Israel which have become the ideals also of large parts of Mankind, must be met by Jew and non-Jew all along the line. But it is primarily the Jew who must meet it. This is his historic mission, his destiny.

We must of course, above all, meet the needs of those whose bread is being taken from their mouths, whose children are being persecuted in the schools—the refugees and those who remain behind. But it will be a fatal misreading of the gravity of the crisis if we do not exert our full powers to save, to strengthen, deepen and spread abroad the things of the Jewish mind and spirit.

The Great Act of Requit

The attack is directed in the first instance at the Jewish University man—the teacher, the research-worker, the man of the liberal professions and the arts, the scientist, and the scholar. The attack must be met on our

part by a great symbolic act—making the Hebrew University in Jerusalem the chief repository of the Jewish mind and spirit. This is the great act of requital worthy of the long Jewish tradition.

The Hebrew University must be enabled to bring to Jerusalem some of the distinguished scholars and scientists who are ready to come here, and to bring here also some of the younger men who show promise of great things. Unfortunately the Hebrew University cannot be made large enough to invite all of those who ought and would like to come here. But if the University is enabled to announce its ability to receive only a limited number, this will in itself have moral value for German Judaism and for the rest of the world. It will indicate that Judaism is alive to the grave dangers threatening it and to the boundless opportunities before it. Let the Hebrew University become the creative centre of this spurned Jewish mind, the centre of inspiration for the Jewish spirit.

A Power-House of the Jewish Intellect

With the University as the active centre, the laboratory and the power-house of the Jewish intellect, let then a Jewish Academy be formed, embracing every distinguished Jewish scholar and scientist and artist throughout the Jewish world. German science rejects with disdain the contributions of Jewish scholars, scientists and artists. Let Judaism welcome them back to the ancient fold—"Rachel weepeth for her children. But refrain thy voice from weeping for they shall return from the land of the enemy." The very existence of a universal Jewish Academy, with the Hebrew University as its centre, will bring radiance into Judaism and will aid in the spread of wisdom. But there are many tasks of scholarship and science

for such an academy—tasks which only a concentration of Jewish intellectual and spiritual forces can achieve. Among other things, the systematic poisoning of the world's youth through the systematic spread of a philosophy, a religion, based upon the vagaries and dangers of anti-Semitism must be counteracted systematically, scientifically. In order that this may be done, the traditional values of Judaism must be worked up and studied much more extensively, systematically, thoroughly, than at present. Upon the basis of the old traditions, new human values must be created, that we may help save all Mankind from the catastrophe that threatens.

The Time for Great Deeds

These are days when money is hard to get. Some may question the suitability of giving expression to large aspirations at a time when it is all too difficult to pay the salaries of those who are already at the Hebrew University. But if the Jewish people is to be stirred to a revival of its mind and spirit, if the inner significance of the tragedy in Germany and far beyond Germany is to be understood, whose voice is to be lifted if not that of the Hebrew University? If ever it was necessary to give voice to large thoughts and to bold plans of action, it is today, at this turning-point in Jewish history. Is it too much to ask a people of over 15,000,000 souls to do great things at such a time? A gift of a million dollars to the Hebrew University at this moment would be an unforgettable and historic act resounding throughout the world. It would be an indication that Israel is not orphaned at this juncture of our fate.


All that I need do, obviously, at this moment is to second the motion and urge you with all the power at my command to help us. You know best in what way you can do so. Is there any likelihood of your being in New

With the thought in mind that it is your desire to keep posted on the activities of the various committees, permit me to submit to you the following:

The committee met in your office and decided with your advice and approval, to have an Advisory Committee consisting of prominent citizens of Cleveland and also increase the Active Committee.

Subsequently at your request I had a conference with you at your office and at the conclusion of same, you asked me to request of the American Friends of the Hebrew University a supply of pamphlets, etc. In response to our urgent call of February 14th, the necessary literature was forwarded.

About March 3rd I received a letter from you requesting me to send out a number of letters to members who might be interested to serve on the Active Committee. This I forthwith complied with. At the same time, you suggested we hold the matter of the Advisory Committee in abeyance until I hear from you further.

It is not my purpose to hurry you into taking action which you feel should not be done at this time. I am prompted to write this note solely because I have in mind the obligation which we assumed, namely, the scholarship fund of \$500 and also the keen interest of some members of the committee in this work which I fear will be diminished if the committee remain dormant.
