Owing to the unavoidable absence of Dr. Rosenbach, Dr. Lowenstein presided.

Dr. Lowenstein explained that the purpose of this meeting was to pass on the recommendation in the motion made by Mr. Warburg at a meeting of the sub-committee of the American Friends and the American Jewish Physicians' Committee held Thursday, November 17, 1938, as per copy of the minutes attached hereto.

Mr. Warburg's motion was:

"That this joint committee recommend to the Executive Committee of the American Friends that the American Friends incorporate into its group the American Jewish Physicians' Committee, and that there be worked out the details of this incomporation through a Joint Committee to be appointed by the American Friends and the American Jewish Physicians' Committee"

Upon motion made by Mr. Untermyer and seconded by Miss Emanuel, it was voted:

"That the recommendation contained in the motion made by by Mr. Warburg, as quoted above, be accepted"

Dr. Lowenstein announced that Dr. Rosenbach would appoint the joint Committee referred to in Mr. Warburg's motion. (Since this meeting, Dr. Rosenbach appointed Dr. Ratnoff, Mr. Warburg and Mr. Finkel).

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The next matter presented for discussion was the following letter from Mr. Lurie of the Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds.

"We are making plans for our General Assembly which is being held in Baltimore on January 21-23, 1939. The subject for our opening session on Saturday evening will be the crisis in Europe and the reorganization and readjustment of Jewish life which has been forced by Europe's political changes. With the new developments in relation to British action in Palestine, we would very much like to have a presentation of the Jewish problems in Palestine by an outstanding leader. As before, we are turning to Dr. Judah Magnes as the most desirable choice. Is there any possibility that Dr. Magnes can be in the United States around the time of our conference?

"I will appreciate your communicating with him and letting us know as soon as possible whether there is any chance that we could have him on our program.

Mr. Finkel was instructed to telephone Mr. Lurie and advise him that the American //Friends has no information regarding the possibility of Dr. Magnes coming to this country around the time of the conference of the Council of Jewish Federations and that we did not deem it expedient at this time to suggest to Dr. Magnes that he come to America.

MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE SUB-COMMITTEES OF THE AMERICAN FRIENDS AND THE AMERICAN JEWISH PHYSICIANS COMMITTEE HELD THURSDAY NOVEMBER 17, 1938 at DR ROSENBACH'S HOME

Br. Rosenbach called the meeting to order at 5:10 p.m.

He said that this meeting was being held in accordance with the following vote passed at the meeting of the Executive Committee of the American Friends on November 9.1938: WRHS ARCHIVES

"Dr. Ratnoff appoint a committee of six representatives of the American Jewish Physicians' Committee and Dr. Rosenbach appoint a Committee of six representatives of the American Friends, and that this joint Committee meet as soon as possible to discuss the question of a new relationship between the American Jewish Physicians' Committee and the American Friends".

Dr. Rosenbach called on Dr. Ratnoff to present the matter.

Dr. Ratnoff pointed out:

That under the new arrangement there would be eliminated the confusion which has resulted from the American Friends and Physicians' Committee each soliciting funds separately and holding separate functions;

That the Medical Department of the University has a very strong emotional appeal which under the new arrangement could be capitalized by the American Friends to the advantage of the entire University instead of, as heretofore, by the Physicians Committee alone;

That the Medical Department is now a part of the University and, therefore, there should be no separate drives for funds;

That the Physicians' Committee owes \$55,000. to Hadassah and approximately \$16,000. for equipment for the Hospital Bldg;

That, in London, he told the administration that he would have to conduct immediately an aggressive campaign to raise these amounts;

That the administration of the University and Mr. Finkel felt that en

independent, aggressive campaign by the Physicians Committee to raise (in addition to its annual budgetary commitment) the indebtedness to the Hadassah and the amount necessary for the equipment would be detrimental to the best interests of the University;

That Mr. Finkel and he suggested to the administration that if they could arrange the advance of \$25,000. to the Physicians' Committee to be used by them toward the repayment of its debt to Madassah, it would be possible, under these circumstances, for the Physicians' Committee and the American Friends to combine its activities and that such a combination would be highly desirable;

That under this proposed arrangement, the American Friends would assume the responsibility for the annual budget of the Physicians Committee, namely, \$22,000., and the obligation to pay to the University out of its excess funds the \$25,000. advanced by the University and the \$30,000. balance remaining still due to the Hadassah, and that the payment of this \$55,000. would, of course, be spread out over a period of years;

That the Physicians Committee would, out of its own funds and prior to January 1, 1939, take care of its obligation for the equipment of the hospital building and that this money would be raised without any public drive;

That the proposed arrangement would start January 1, 1939 which is the beginning of the fiscal year of the Physicians Committee;

That he was confident that the joint receipts as a result of the merger would be in excess of the amounts raised separately;

That the American Friends in its propagands and publicity as well as the Physicians Committee as an auxiliary group would stress the medical departments;

That it was his hope that the proposed arrangement between the Physicians Committee and the American Friends would serve as a precedent and as an impetus for the organization of similar professional groups;

That the Physicians Committee in the course of the last four years raised \$160,000. and that in the 172 years of its existence raised \$625,663.;

That the Physicians Committee was always handicapped in its fund-raising by reason of the fact that it has always remitted all of its money to Jerusalem as fast as collected and therefore never had enough funds in its Treasury with which to conduct a money-raising campaign and that he felt confident that an aggressive campaign for members as a result of the merger would result in 2500 additional members;

That Mr. Finkel and he would map out a membership campaign immediately upon completion of the arrangement;

That any delay in this arrangement would be undesirable because ultimately the combination would have to take place anyway, and it would be best to have the combination take place at a time when the Physicians Committee is at its fullest strength;

That as a result of the arrangement, the budget of the American Friends and the Physicians Committee and the income of both would become one, even although the Physicians Committee would retain its identity as an auxilliary group;

Mr. Warburg spoke in hearty approval of the arrangement and said that it was a "magnificent step". He paid a glowing tribute to the accomplishments of the Physicians Committee and to Dr. Ratnoff, and expressed the hope that other groups would organize in a similar Eashion and that Dr. Ratnoff would help in this direction.

Upon motion made by Mr. Warburg, it was voted:

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"That this joint committee recommend to the Executive Committee of the American Friends that the American Friends incorporate into its group the American Jewish Physicians' Committee, and that there be worked out the details of this incorporation through a Joint Committee to be appointed by the American Friends and the American Jewish Physicians' Committee"

Mr. Norman approved all that Mr. Warburg said in support of the proposed arrangement and expressed confidence that the repayment of the \$55,000. by the American Friends would impose no great burden because the repayment was to be amortized and was to be paid out of surplus receipts. He felt that there would be sufficient receipts each year to make an annual repayment.

Dr. Libman said that he felt that we shouldn't have two separate organizations - that he felt this arrangement would serve as an example to other groups - professional and non-professional and that we ought to endeavor to repay the \$55,000. as soon as possible and not spread it over too long a period.

Miss Emanuel expressed approval in principle of the proposed arrangement. There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 5:50 p.m.

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MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE ASSOCIATION OF THE AMERICAN FRIENDS OF THE HEBREW UNIVERSITY, HELD AT THE HARMONIE CLUB, WEDNESDAY, NOVEMBER 50, 1938, at 5 p.m.

The meeting was called to order by Dr. Lowenstein, who presided in the absence of Dr. Rosenbach.

The first order of business was the ratification of the revised By-laws adopted by the original subscribers to the Certificate of Incorporation (Miss Emanuel, Mr. Bressler, Mr. Friedman, Mr. Lamport, and Dr. Ratnoff), and adopted by the Executive Committee at its meeting of November 9th. (Copy of the By-laws is attached hereto).

Upon motion made by Mr. Norman, it was voted:

"That the revised By-laws adopted as above be ratified"

The next order of business was the election of 41 members to the Board of Directors.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 5:20 p.m.

BY-LAWS

OF

AMERICAN FRIENDS OF THE HEBREW UNIVERSITY, INC.

(hereinafter called "Association")

ARTICLE I.

Name

The name of the Association is: American Friends of the Hebrew University, Inc.

ARTICLE II.

Objects

ARCHIVE

The objects of the Association are:

- 1. To aid in the maintenance and development of the Hebrew University Association of Jerusalem, Palestine, (hereinafter called "University")
- 2. To disseminate information concerning the University and its activities but no part of its activities shall ever consist of carrying on propaganda or attempting to influence legislation.
- 3. To facilitate the making of contacts between the University and institutions of learning in the United States and Canada.
- 4. To stimulate the interest of students, research workers and members of the teaching and learned professions in the University.
- 5. To have representation on the Board of Governors of the University and to make nominations thereto, subject to the Constitution and By-Laws of the University.

- 2 -6. To collect funds in the United States and the Dominion of Canada and to expend, invest and reinvest the same for the purposes aforesaid. No part of the net earnings or income of the Association shall at any time inure to the benefit of any person, firm or corporation other than the University. ARTICLE III. Office The office of the Association shall be in the City of New York, with branches or local chapters in other cities of the United States and Canada. ARTICLE IV. Board of Directors 1. The Board of Directors shall consist of 41 members to be elected at the annual meeting of the Association. 2. Meetings of the Board of Directors shall be held at such place as the Executive Committee shall determine. 3. Meetings of the Board of Directors shall be held on not less than five days notice by mail or forty-eight hours notice by telegraph but such notice may be waived by any Director. 4. Each member of the Board of Directors shall hold office until his resignation or the election of his successor. 5. Any vacancy on the Board of Directors may be filled by the remaining members, and the person so appointed shall hold office until the next annual meeting or the election of his successor. 6. The Board of Directors shall meet at least once annually immediately after its election, and special meetings shall be held upon call

- 3 of the President, or upon petition of five of its members filed with the Secretary. 7. A quorum of the Board of Directors shall consist of seven persons. ARTICLE V. Powers of the Board of Directors 1. Except as limited by the provisions of this Article V., the management, control and administration of the Association shall be vested in the Board of Directors which shall exercise authority over the general affairs of the Association and carry out the purposes of the Association in accordance with its Certificate of Incorporation and the provisions of these By-Laws. 2. Without in any way restricting the general powers herein granted to the Board of Directors, said Board of Directors shall have the following additional specific powers. (a) To elect an Executive Committee from among its membership to consist of eleven or more persons as the Board of Directors may determine, said Committee to include the President, who shall preside, the Secretary and Treasurer of the Association. (b) At its first meeting in each year, to elect a nominating committee from among its number, of not less than three and not more than seven, who shall have power to nominate candidates to the Board of Directors for the succeeding year. The names of the candidates so nominated shall be submitted at the annual meeting. Nothing herein contained shall prevent the members from nominating other or additional candidates to the Board of Directors.

(c) To make its own rules.

(d) To nominate members to the Board of Governors of the University and to such other boards, councils and organizations as may from time to time be appropriate.

(e) Subject to the provisions of Article XI. hereof, to alter, or amend, these By-Laws in any manner consistent with law.

(f) To adopt a seal of the Association.

(g) To grant, revise or recall charters to local chapters.

(h) To exercise all powers and duties granted by law to directors

ARTICLE VI.

Executive Committee

- 1. The Executive Committee is hereby vested with all the powers of the Board of Directors between the meetings of the Board of Directors, and may appoint or authorize the President to appoint committees with such powers as the Executive Committee may designate.
 - 2. Five mombers of the Executive Committee shall constitute a quorum.
- 3. No act or omission of the Executive Committee shall at any time be called into question unless modified, amulled, or otherwise affected by a specific resolution of the Board of Directors at its first meeting held immediately succeeding such act or omission.

ARTICLE VII.

Officers

1. The Officers of the Association shall be elected by the Board of Directors at its annual meeting from among their own number, for a term of

- 5 one year or until the election of their successors. 2. Such officers shall be: (a) A President, who shall preside at meetings of the Board of Directors, of the Association, and of the Executive Committee, and shall perform such other duties as may be conferred upon him by the Board of Directors. (b) Not to exceed three Vice-Presidents who in the absence of the President shall act in his place in the order named. (c) A Treasurer, who shall receive, invest and disburse all funds as the Board of Directors may authorize. Investments shall not bo limited to investments legal for trust funds. (d) A Secretary, who shall have all the duties customarily exercised by such an officer, and shall perform such other duties as he may be instructed to perform from time to time by the Board of Directors. 3. No Officer shall receive compensation for his services. ARTICLE VIII. Membership 1. Membership in the Association shall consist of: (a) Any individual who has contributed not less than \$10.00 during the preceding fiscal year, whether contributing direct to the Association or through a Chapter. (b) One or more delegates from Welfare or Local Funds which shall have made a grant of not less than \$100.00 during the preceding fiscal year. The number and qualifications of delegates from each Fund shall be determined by the Board of Directors.

- 6 -(c) Representatives of such other groups, and also such other individuals, as the Board of Directors may from time to time designate. 2. (a) The annual meeting of the Association shall be held in the month of November at a place and date to be fixed by the Board of Directors. (b) Notice of such meeting shall be given at least 15 days prior thereto. At such meeting, the Annual Report of the Association shall be submitted, the election of Directors shall be held, and all the powers of the Association may be exercised. The Board of Directors may from time to time make rules or regulations for voting in person, by mail or by proxy. (c) At any meeting of members 25 shall be a quorum, in person or by proxy, but a lesser number may adjourn the meeting. (d) All questions shall be decided by a majority vote of the members present except that directors shall be elected by a plurality of the votes cast at the election. 3. Special meetings of the mombers of the Association shall be called by the Secretary upon the request of the President or any two officers, or upon the written request of at least five members of the Board of Directors. 4. Notice of any meeting may be waived by any member. ARTICLE IX. Chapters 1. Branch or subsidiary societies of the Association to be known as chapters, may be organized throughout the United States of America and the Dominion of Canada. 2. Fifteen or more persons desiring to become Friends of the Hebrew University may form a local chapter and apply for a local charter as follows:

Such persons shall adopt by-laws in harmony with the Certificate of Incorporation and the By-Laws of the Association, and shall file same with the Secretary of the Association in the City of New York, together with the address of the headquarters of the organization, a list of all officers, the names and addresses of its members, and a certificate signed by one or more of its officers showing that at least fifteen of the members have become members and have paid their first annual dues. The application shall further be accompanied by payment of not less than 75% of all dues collected by the proposed chapter. Upon the approval of the Board of Directors, a charter will be issued to such group, and it shall thereupon be duly constituted as an official chapter of the Association. All charters so granted shall be subject to revision or recall by the Board of Directors. 3. All collections by local chapters shall be remitted to the Association subject to the deduction of the actual cost of effecting such collections, such cost not to exceed 25% thereof. 4. It shall be the duty of each chapter to advise the Secretary of the Association of the names and addresses of members and contributors and of any change in its membership. It shall keep accurate records of all moneys collected and forward same to the Treasurer of the Association, and shall make an annual report to the Board of Directors at the times and in the form prescribed by the Board of Directors. 5. The books and records of each local chapter shall be subject to visitation and inspection by the Board of Directors of the Association.

- 8 -ARTICLE X. Financial Statements The Board of Directors shall submit at each annual meeting a financial statement of the Association for the preceding fiscal year. The fiscal

year of the Association shall be determined by the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE XI.

Amendments

- 1. These By-Laws may be amended by the Association at an annual meeting or any special meeting called for this purpose by the vote of twothirds of the members present. These By-Laws may also be amended by the Board of Directors at any of its meetings by two-thirds vote of tho members present, provided notice of the proposed amendment has been given fifteen (15) days in advance. A quorum of the Board of Directors for the purpose of amending the By-Laws shall be fifteen.
- 2. The Certificate of Incorporation of the Association may be amended in such manner as may from time to time be prescribed by the provisions of the Membership Corporation Law of the State of New York.

I am attaching hereto for your information copy of letter which I sent to Mr. S. P. Halle under date of February 7th. I call your special attention to the next to the last paragraph in which I say that I would be glad to go to Cleveland to appear before the Budget Committee "if you and Rabbi Silver feel it would be advisable".

I have been trying desperately hard to get increased grants from as many of our Welfare and United Funds as possible, and have just completed a two weeks! tour through the South for this purpose. Cleveland has been one of our most generous sources of support and I am anxious to be able to continue to point to it as sort of pace-setter for the other communities.

Owing to the great pressure which has been brought to bear on Welfare Funds for increased allocations by the JDC, UPA and the National Coordinating Committee, the American Friends finds itself especially hard-put this year to meet the increased needs of the University. These increased demands have been made necessary firstly, by reason of the fact that the University's income from Europe will be lost to it this year and secondly, because of the increased demands made of the University to take on additional refugee scholars and students.

The University has now on its regular Academic and Research staff thirty-five scholars and scientists from Germany and Austria. Hebrew University is greatly in need of the services of these men and it is hoped that funds will be placed at the disposal of the University to enable it to admit as many as possible of these scholars and scientists. This will have the twofold purpose of strengthening the University academically as well as enabling these scholars to escape the terrible fate forced upon them in their own countries.

Do you feel that it would be helpful if I would appear
