DR. EMANUEL NEUMANN presented a suggestion of Mr. Philip Chasin, the Director of the New York Metropolitan area of the Israel Bond Organization, that the ZOA hold a dinner for Bonds with Dr. Abba Hillel Silver as the guest of honor, which may also celebrate fifty years of his Zionist activity and leadership. The dinner is to take place Sunday, December 16th, as a city-wide affair for all five boroughs.

Dr. Emanuel Neumann read his reply to Mr. Chasin in which he had expressed his agreement in principle but had also pointed out some of his misgivings with regard to this dinner. The main problem was the fact that at the end of the year most of the ZOA members would have purchased their Bonds for 1956, and that a great number of Bond functions would already have been held by ZOA Districts. Also, the Bronx and Long Island planned Regional Bond functions, to take place before that date. Dr. Neumann emphasized that such a city-wide Bond dinner as a tribute to Dr. Silver under ZOA auspices must be an impressive affair and a complete success with adequate financial results. He also pointed out that the annual Chanukah Festival takes place in Madison Square Garden on December 6th, and this too will be a factor in selling a large amount of Bonds to ZOA people before the proposed Silver dinner. He invited Mr. Chasin to comment on these matters.

MR. PHILIP CHASIN in response to Dr. Neumann's remarks said that he was not expecting the sales to be made mostly at the dinner but that the dinner would be in the nature of the culmination of all efforts made by the ZOA in 1956, and that all purchases made by ZOA members during the current year and sales effected by their efforts would be announced at the dinner and included in the total result.

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MR. ABRAHAM GOODMAN asked how Mr. Chasin proposed to determine the ZOA credits since the ZOA is not informed of credits by the Bond Organization.

The question of credits was raised by nearly all the Regional officers present. It was pointed out that ZOA leaders and members are active in trade functions, community functions, synagogues, etc., etc. The point was made that in such cases the ZOA should receive credit and at the same time credit could also be given to the respective trade, synagogue, etc.

MR. PHILIP CHASIN repeated that he would see to it that the ZOA receives full credit for all purchases made by ZOA members, as well as for sales made through the efforts of its members and workers. He proposed to put at our disposal the Transmittal sheets for the calendar year so that we would be able to check our membership against the purchases and sales made. Mr. Chasin said that he would meet with Miss Eisner upon his return from his vacation and work out details of a credit system.

DR. EMANUEL NEUMANN proposed that a small committee should meet with Mr. Chasin in due course to discuss ways and means to ensure ZOA credits.

The second part of the discussion dealt with the proposed function. All Regional officers present participated in the discussion. Mr. Joseph Alliger for Long Island, and Mr. Joseph Rolnick for the Bronx, stated that they had come to the meeting with misgivings about the proposed function but after having been assured that the Regional and District Bond affairs, which will take place before the Dinner, will be regarded as a build-up for the dinner, and that the December function will be a culmination of their Regional Bond efforts and a celebration, they felt that they could go along with the suggestion made by Mr. Chasin. There was general agreement in principle to undertake the proposed dinner.

MR. NATHAN SCHOOLER suggested that a free invitation to the dinner should be given to people who sell for instance \$2500 worth of Bonds.

MR. ABRAHAM GOODMAN proposed that a trip to Israel should be awarded to a District that excels in its efforts for Bonds, and that these trips should be booked through the Tourist Department of the ZOA.

MR. CHASIN said that these were details to be worked out at a later stage, that he will think about these suggestions. He proposed that those present at the meeting should constitute a Committee for the dinner, and that it should meet again sometime in August in order to discuss the function further.

The meeting was adjourned at 2:15 p.m.



A major and enlarged meeting of the Board of Governors of the Israel Bond Organization to plan our campaign program for 1956 will be held on Saturday night, January 7, and Sunday, January 8, at the Savoy Plaza Hotel, Fifth Avenue at 55th Street, New York City.



My dear friends:

I am happy to be here tonight and grateful for the many lovely things which you have said about me. I shall cherish them. I am
proud to have been associated with the Zionist Organization of America
for more than half a century. I recall that I attended my first
Zionist Convention as a lad of eleven, an accredited delegate from the
first Junior Society in the United States — the Dr. Herzl Zionic Club.

Through these many years, which witnessed such revolutionary upheavals in Jewish life the world every so much tragic destruction and desolation in two World Wars, and so much of heroic and rewarding struggle for the establishment, recognition, upbuilding and defense of the State of Israel, the Zionist Organization of America has stood always in the vanguard of leadership and service. It pioneered in political action; it mobilized world opinion; it took on the brunt of every attack. Tonight I am heartened the thought that in the uncertain years which lie ahead when so much work will yet have to be done to make the State of Israel strong and secure, the Zionist Organization of America will stand in the forefront, alerted, devoted and unswerving as ever. Your present distinguished leadership under Dr. Emanuel Neumann and his associates is a welcome assurance, both of competence and courage.

To you and to our fellow Jews all over the world, and to our brave brothers in Israel, I could at this time give no more appropriate and profound slogan and rallying word.

The State of Israel was not founded by men who easily gave up. This requires no elaboration before an audience such as yours, which knows the history of the tense battle-days of our Movement. The State of Israel was not defended in the war of liberation eight years ago, and again in the war for survival a short time ago by men who easily gave up. Every new industry established in Israel, every new mine, or mill or factory, every new ship or harbor, or road or railway track, every new settlement or completed irrigation project, is so much red blood poured into the life stream of the nation.

who believe that this world organization has been affair. Everyone wishes the United Nations is yet to come. It will soon come in the Near East, and on its outcome will depend the very survival of that inter-

national organization which was called into existence to preserve the peace of the world.

The cease-fire which was achieved there is entire occasion -- not necessarily the prelude to permanent peace. The United Nation's force, now gathering in the Middle East, if intelligently employed, may prove to be an important step towards a final solution of those issues which have kept that part of the world in needless tension and turmoil for year, or it may lead only to a restoration of the status quo ante from which all the evils flowed, and for a carte blanche to the dictator Nasser to resume all his former dangerous plottings and adventures.

Nothing has so far happened to discourage Nasser from believing that the United Nations force will restore him to his former position and prestige; his commandos free to range again across the borders of Israel; his blockade against Israeli shipping in the Suez Canal and in the Gulf of Aquaba to remain in force; and he himself free to acquire again vast stores of weapons and munitions for an attack upon Israel, since which the Israeli forces forestalled and frustrated his contemplated attack so calamitously a few weeks ago.

New that Our government has concluded that the best hope for peace in the Middle East lies in the United Nations and has resolved to channel through it the consideration of its problems a procedure which it has not followed heretofore, chosing rather to find them outside the framework of the United Nations. Seconds increasingly urgent for our government, whose authority and prestige in that part of the world have been augmented by recent events, and prestige forthright leadership in the United Nations in order to achieve solutions, in keeping with its expressed desire to demonstrate impartial friendship to all

Without such leadership nothing constructive will situation will rapidly deteriorate. Unless the United States and the other free nations of the world take strong initiative for a just settlement, it is quite possible that the Asian-African bloc in the nations which has been uniformally hostile to Israel, coupled with the support of the Soviet bloc, which as part of its strategy to penetrate more and more in the Middle East can be counted upon to vote consistently against Israel, will succeed in imposing the kind of a settlement which Israel as a matter of survival would be forced to reject. Our government should not wait until there is armed agression or

procrastination and a new formula for inaction are beginning to emerge. by Arab States and their abettere elsewhere. The Arab States want time to grow stronger militarily, to regroup and to reorganize, so that at the proper time they will be able to confront Israel with ultimatums and dictate a peace settlement on their own terms. This is the explanation of the inspired talk one hears today among sain the Arab delegations, as well as elsewhere in the corridors of the United Nations and in certain quarters in Washington. This is not the time comments for direct negotiations between Israel and its Arab neighbors. Tempers are too hot. Perhaps in two years this step might be undertaken. Dr. Fawzi, Egyptian Foreign Minister, speaking last Thursday before the National Press Club in Washington was asked to answer the statement which was made to the Press Club by Israel's Foreign Minister two days before -"that Israel was willing to negotiate peace with Egypt directly, immediately and without any pre-conditions." He replied, "These things have their time in history." Dr. Fawzi further said that Egypt was not willing to discuss the passage of Israel's ships as part of a Suez Canal settlement. "This is part and parcel of the Israeli question which we are willing to discuss at the proper time" It is not a proper part of the Suez question."

It should also be recalled that American military aid was denied the State of Israel on the convenient but not consistently applied formula that our country does not wish to become in an arms race. The State of Israel was also excluded from the regional security arrangements of the Baghdad Pact, and was denied also any other security such as our country has with many other nations.

exploit to the fullest its dramatic and energetic ingress into the long-disturbed area of the Middle East, and should not stay on until the area is fully pacified, but that it should quickly withdraw and leave the fate of that part of the world to the will and whim of governments who have consistently proclaimed their unwillingness to make peace.

In our judgment the United States should press most energetically in the councils of the United Nations for immediate action which will bring the representatives of the governments of the Near East together around a conference table for the urgent settlement of all their outstanding issues. Nothing has so far happened to discourage Nasser from believing that the United Nations force will restore him to his former position and prestige in the Near East; his commandos free to range again across the borders of Israel; his blockade against Israeli shipping in the Suez and in the Gulf of Aqaba to remain in force; and he himself free to acquire again vast stores of weapons and munitions for an attack upon Israel which the Israeli forces frustrated so calamitously a few weeks ago.

Now that our government has concluded that the best hope for peace in the Middle East lies in the United Nations and has resolved to channel through it the consideration of its problems — a procedure which it had not followed in the past, chosing rather to find them outside the framework of the United Nations — it becomes increasingly urgent for our government, whose authority and prestige in the Middle East have been augmented by recent events, to take forthright leadership in the United Nations to achieve solutions which will be in keeping with its expressed desire for impartial friendship to all concerned. 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ADDRESS BY DR. ABBA HILLEL SILVER Delivered at the Israel Bond Dinner of the Zionist Organization of America New York City Waldorf-Astoria Hotel Broadcast over the ABC Network Monday evening, December 17, 10:05-10:35 P.M. (E.S.T.) My dear Friends: I am happy to be here tonight and grateful for the many lovely things which you have said about me. I shall cherish them. I am proud to have been associated with the Zionist Organization of America for more than half a century. I recall that I attended my first Zionist Convention as a lad of eleven, an accredited delegate from the first Junior Society in the United States -the Dr. Herzl Zion Club. Through these many years, which witnessed such revolutionary upheavals. in Jewish life, so much tragic destruction and desolation in two World Wars, and so much of heroic and rewarding struggle for the establishment, recognition, upbuilding and defense of the State of Israel, the Zionist Organization of America has stood always in the vanguard of leadership and service. It pioneered in political action; it mobilized world opinion; it took on the brunt of every attack. Tonight I am heartened by the thought that in the uncertain years which lie ahead, when so much work will yet have to be done to make the State of Israel strong and secure, the Zionist Organization of America will still stand in the forefront, alerted, devoted and unswerving as ever. Your present distinguished leadership under my dear friend, Dr. Emanuel Neumann, who has given a lifetime of outstanding service to our Movement, and his associates, is a welcome assurance, both of competence and courage. I referred a moment ago to the Junior Zionist Club which I joined more than fifty years ago, and which was named after the immortal leader of our Movement, Dr. Theodor Herzl. Dr. Herzl grew old and tired and died spent and exhausted at the age of 44 in the service of his people. He was fond of quoting to his friends a remark which he heard from an old fisherman: "The most remarkable of all things is when a man never gives up." May one ask when will be the proper time when Egypt will be pleased to discuss the passage of Israel's ships through the Canal, and when will be the proper time for peace negotiations? The eight years which have elapsed since the armistice was fixed have not been sufficient to cool off the hot tempers in the Near East. predatory eyes of politically immature demagogues see it. The severe social and economic problems of the exploited, impoverished and illiterate
Arab masses cannot be solved either by the obliteration of the State of
Israel or by the expropriation of all or part of its small territory.
There is land enough in the Middle East for many times its present population, given planning, irrigation and industrialization. It is not an act
of political sagacity to keep the Arab world stirred up over issues which
really do not affect the ultimate well-being of its peoples and to mortgage
their present limited resources to build up costly military establishments
where no one threatens, instead of trying to raise their low standard of
living.

Israel is eager to cooperate with the Arab peoples; to bring new life, progress and prosperity to the entire vast region which will be for the benefit of all. Some day Israel's outstretched hand of friendship will be taken. Until that time of reconciliation, Israel must be helped to remain strong in its economy and secure in its sovereignty and freedom.



Silver Calls for U.S. Action to Attain Middle East Peace in Nationwide Radio Address Broadcast from ZOA Dinner in his Honor

NEW YORK (ZINS) - Dr. Abba Hillel Silver called upon the government of the United States to take forthright leadership in the United Nations to achieve a permanent peace settlement in the Middle East, in an address delivered at a dinner tendered in his honor by the ZOA New York metropolitan regions and the Israel Bond Organization in tribute to his 50 years of Zionist leadership. Dr. Silver's address was broadcast from the Waldorf Astoria Hotel over the national ABC network.

Dr. Silver, who is honorary president of the Zionist Organization of America, declared: "Our government should not wait until there is armed aggression or until that 'innocent' victim of aggression, Nasser, has had time to rebuild his badly shattered military establishment, or until Syria has had time to build up a vast arsenal of tanks, planes and guns provided by the Soviet Union. It should press most energetically in the United Nations for action which will bring the representatives of the governments of the Near East together around a conference table for the settlement of all the outstanding issues."

ZOA Sold \$1,250,000 in Israel Bonds in Honor of Dr. Silver in New York

Rabbi Irving Miller, chairman of the American Zionist Council, who presided at the dinner, announced that \$1,250,000 in Israel Bonds were sold by the 5 metropolitan regions of the ZOA in New York in a special campaign in honor of Dr. Silver.

Rabbi Miller and Dr. Neumann, president of the ZOA, joined in presenting Dr. Silver with a plaque, on which was mounted a silver map of Israel.

In presenting the plaque to Dr. Silver, Dr. Neumann declared: "Dr. Silver now stands upon an eminence that is beyond the praise of his admirers or the criticism of his detractors. He looms before us as a towering historical figure, one of the greatest statesmen in Zionist history. Two names will be inscribed imperishably on the pages of our history, those of the two men who on two different fronts were jointly responsible for the establishment of the State of Israel and who are its principal architects: the one is the present Prime Minister of Israel, David Ben-Gurion; the other is our guest of honor, Dr. Abba Hillel Silver.

"Israel and Zionism have need of Dr. Silver today more than ever -- have need of his wisdom, his sagacity, his brilliant leadership, his force and strength of character and above all, his indomitable courage. For Israel is facing its gravest crisis since its inception."

The dinner was also addressed by Col. Chaim Herzog, military governor of Jerusalem, and by Dr. Joseph Schwartz, executive vice-chairman of the Israel Bond Organization. A letter from the White House, which was read at the dinner, expressed cordial and best wishes of President Eisenhower to Dr. Silver.

LAUNCH DRIVE FOR \$75,000,000 IN '57

Golda Meir Stresses Key Role Of Bonds in Present Crisis

EMERGENCY CAMPAIGN SET FOR SALE OF FIRST \$20,000,000 BY END OF FEBRUARY

1956 Total of \$54,088,850 Established Record as Biggest Year in Bond History

Eddie Cantor's 65th Birthday and Conference in Miami Feb. 15-17 Will Climax Peak Effort

"CASH NOW" IS KEYNOTE OF COMING WEEKS

1956 BOND SALE SETS RECORD

An extraordinary campaign to sell a minimum of \$75,000,000 in State of Israel Bonds during 1957, in order to provide the economic strength which Israel must have to meet the critical problems confronting it, was launched this week at the meeting of the National Board of Governors.

Responding to a statement of Israel's need by Foreign Minister Golda Meir, who spoke at the meeting, and to a cabled message from Finance Minister Levi Eshkol, the Board members also announced plans for an intensified 60-day drive to sell the first \$20,000,000 in Bonds by the end

of February.

The chief highlight of this intensified effort will be a nation-wide mobilization in honor of Eddie Cantor's sixty-fifth birthday, culminating in a National Birthday Celebration on Saturday evening, February 16 at the Fontainebleau Hotel in Miami Beach. The celebration will be held in conjunction with the 1957 Inaugural Conference for Israel Bonds, meeting at the Fontainebleau from Friday, February 15 through Sunday, February 17.

Mrs. Meir, who, in addition to her vital duties at the United Nations, visited more than twenty major cities for Israel Bonds in a trip which represented a key factor in bringing about the outstanding success of the final phase of the 1956 drive, stressed the dangers facing Israel and the decisive character of Israel Bonds in safeguarding the State of Israel. She urged American Jews to buy Bonds as "keepers of Israel's future."

Urges Peace Settlement

Israel's Foreign Minister warned that, if Israel is forced to return to the position prior to October 29, the people of Israel will again be exposed to boycott, blockade and fedayeen attacks. Mrs. Meir urged a peace settlement to avoid the risk of a new outbreak of hostilities in the Middle East.



Reports presented to the Board by Abraham Feinberg, Israel Bond President, and Dr. Joseph J. Schwartz, Vice President, indicated that 1956 has been the best year in the history of the Bond drive. A record total of \$54,088,850 in Bonds was sold during 1956 representing a 28 percent increase over 1955, and bringing the total sold since the Bond drive began to \$270,667,200.

Mr. Feinberg stressed the fact that the achievements of 1956 augur well for the capacity of American Jewry to meet the even greater needs of 1957. He noted that Israel can not at present count on economic aid from sources other than Israel Bonds, which therefore represent the foremost element in sustaining Israel's economy.

Dr. Schwartz drew attention to the unprecedented pressures placed on Is-

rael's economy by her security problems, and by the increased flow of refugees, many of them from Egypt, Hungary and other parts of Europe, which may reach a peak figure of 100,-000 for the year.



He called on all Trustees, Guardians of Israel and National Sponsors to double their Bond purchases for 1957. "These double Trustees, Guardians and Sponsors," he said, "will play a key role in the strengthening of Israel. Israel counts on all of us for this type of decisive participation in the building of her future."

Can Produce Increased Sales

"Even in a year when we broke all records," Dr. Schwartz pointed out, "we enrolled only a limited number of Trustees, Guardians and Sponsors. This dramatizes the fact that greater coverage in these categories can serve to produce greatly increased Israel Bond sales."

Lawrence G. Laskey, New England Regional Bond Chairman, was named Chairman of the Inaugural Conference in Miami and of the National Committee for the Cantor Birthday Celebration. Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt was named Honorary Chairman of the Women's Committee for the celebration. At the same time, Jack Benny undertook to serve as Chairman of the National Entertainment Committee.

"There can be no better way of honoring Eddie Cantor than by Israel Bond purchases at the highest possible level," Mr. Laskey said.

Cantor's Outstanding Service

"For the past quarter of a century," Mr. Laskey added, "Eddie Cantor's love for Israel and his devotion to the Jewish people have been reflected in extraordinary service and self-sacrifice. Through his unceasing effort and leadership, he helped arouse American Jewry to the dangers of Hitlerism and stirred Jewish communities throughout the country to raise many millions of dollars prior to and after the establishment of the State of Israel.

"It is characteristic of Mr. Cantor that he agreed to the birthday tribute on condition that it would be utilized for the maximum sale of Israel Bonds."

Meir Sherman, Israel's Minister for Economic Affairs, outlined the vital

purposes for which Israel Bond funds are needed. He drew attention to these major aspects of the situation which make Israel Bonds more vital.

1. U. S. economic aid, which normally amounts

to about \$40,000,000 per year, has been suspended since the Sinai operation.

- Because of advance payments already received from German reparations, the amount Israel can look forward to in 1957 will be considerably reduced.
- 3. Larger Israel Bond funds are urgently needed, because the immigration pressures have been greatly increased. If no Bond funds are available for housing new immigrants from Egypt, Hungary and other parts of Eastern Europe, Israel may be forced to go back to tent cities and camps for the new arrivals.

4. If Israel Bond funds are not available in sufficient volume, there will be no jobs for newcomers.

5. If the Bond drive does not provide much larger funds, Israel will not be able to solve the problem of her oil shortage and the shortage of elec-

tric power. This is a very serious situation because the wheels of industry have begun to slow down, and as a result unemployment is increasing. The unemployment figure is already 30,000.

Outstanding community leaders announced plans for highly intensified Israel Bond efforts during the coming months, in response to Israel's pressing needs. Representatives from Canada reported that their 1956 sales exceeded 1955 by 40 percent, and promised an accelerated rate of increase for 1957. Leaders of the Jewish communities of Latin America advised the Board of Governors that they would double their 1956 results during the coming year.

From address by MRS. GOLDA MEIR, Foreign Minister, State of Israel

Throughout the years, during which we have been harassed by this extremely serious security situation, we have never overlooked the major importance of economic strength as an indispensable foundation for the economic independence of Israel and as one of the principal mainstays of our country's defense. The central role in building our economic strength has been played by Israel Bonds.

The building of Israel is a constructive and dynamic effort. We are not merely concerned with consolidating our economy. While solving the normal economic problems of a young and growing nation, we must be prepared to meet emergency situations in Jewish life in other parts of the world as exemplified today by the Hungarian refugee problem and the problem of Jews expelled by Egypt.

Perhaps the most important element responsible for the establishment of the State of Israel is the fact that we have always realized the necessity of looking ahead and creating the machinery to cope with the problems of the future. The inauguration of Israel Bonds in 1951 to provide the financial resources for economic growth is an outstanding example of planning ahead. I do not know how we could have had the rate of economic development so necessary to our survival and progress during the past six years without Israel Bonds. Nor can I see any possibility, even more today than ever before, of meeting the pressing economic problems arising from the present situation and our extraordinary immigation needs without a far more intensive campaign for Israel Bonds this year.

To preserve our achievements to date, and to be worthy of the sacrifices in Sinai and elsewhere for Jewish existence, the coming year must witness even greater efforts to sell more and more Israel Bonds. Our forefathers said: "The day is short but work is great." We hope you will act speedily and with utmost devotion. Israel's destiny lies in your hands, no less than ours. May your efforts be blessed with success.

Baltimore's tribute to Mrs. Meir re-

sulted in the sale of \$285,000 worth

Inspired by the example of Los Angeles General Chairman and Dinner Chairman Louis H. Boyar, over 1,100 guests paid tribute to Mrs. Meir with Bond purchases of more than \$250,000 in her honor on December 13.

A total of \$232,100 was achieved at a breakfast attended by 600 people in Lynn, Mass. in honor of Mrs. Meir. The event was held under the leadership of Co-Chairmen William Abramowitz and Arthur R. Schwartz and Greater Lynn Women's Division Chairman Mrs. Arthur R. Schwartz.

Jersey City bought \$202,600 to honor Mrs. Meir on December 9. Louis Ross is General Chairman of the Jersey City campaign and A. D. Hirsch is Honorary Chairman.

Crowds Hear Mrs. Meir

St. Louis responded with a sale of \$200,000 in Mrs. Meir's honor at a dinner on December 17 attended by more than 900 friends of Israel. Melvin Dubinsky was Dinner Chairman.

In Cincinnati, over \$176,000 worth of Israel Bonds were purchased in tribute to Mrs. Meir on December 18. Dinner Co-Chairmen were Joseph H. Hoodin and Charles M. Messer.

Under the vigorous leadership of Israel Grody, General Chairman, and Louis K. Roth, Associate Chairman, Hartford's Golda Meir Dinner saw \$158,000 in Bonds sold.



WOMEN INTENSIFY EFFORTS, SET PLANS FOR 1957 DRIVE

In the closing weeks of 1956, thousands of American women took part in heightened campaign activity for Israel Bonds, and set about formulating-their plans for the 1957 drive.

Los Angeles has emerged again as one of the most productive communities in the nation, with 16 women Trustees and 313 Sponsors. \$666,000 in cash was realized at the Women's Division's two major sales events of 1956, the Israel Fashion Show and the Bond-Between-Us Luncheon.

In Greater New York, announces the Women's Division Chairman, Mrs. Jan Peerce, women's sales for 1956 reached a high of \$1,835,250.

In Boston, where thousands of women took part in the Israel Day sale of Bonds, 1956 saw the enrollment of more than 300 Trustees and Sponsors.

CHICAGO LABOR DINNER FOR DAVID McDONALD PRODUCES OUTSTANDING ISRAEL BOND RESULTS

In an outstanding display of trade union participation in the Israel Bond drive, more than 2,000 American labor leaders and representatives from all over the country attended an Israel Bond dinner held in the Grand Ballroom of the Conrad Hilton Hotel in Chicago on December 4 in honor of David J. McDonald, President of the United Steelworkers of America. Their desire to pay tribute to Mr. McDonald and to support Israel's economic development resulted in the sale of about \$2,000,000 in State of Israel Development Bonds.

In addition to the keynote speech of Mrs. Golda Meir, Israel's Minister for Foreign Affairs, the dinner featured major addresses by George Meany, President of the AFL-ClO; General Lucius Clay, and Mr. McDonald. William L. McFetridge, Vice President of the AFL-CIO, served as Dinner Chairman.

OVER 125,000 ATTENDED CHANUKAH FESTIVALS


More than 125,000 persons attended Israel Bond Chanukah Festivals in December in major cities. Admission to the Festivals was by purchase of Israel Bonds.


