Dear Rabbi Silver,

I had hoped to see you in
your own Kingdom, but nobody
seems to want me in Cleveland.
Are you coming to N.Y. any time
before Apr. 10th when I am to sail?

Kindly believe that I don't
intend to talk politics — we are
both fed up with em, I presume.
But I wanted to have a second
talk with you — for I remember
the pleasure of the first, 4 years
ago. And I want also your
advice as to the progress of my
favorite child, the Hebrew Atlas.
Mr Jacoby, director-manager of the
H. S. L. Co., has arrived here to
organize the sale. He himself is

a man worth knowing - one of the
unknown big men of Jewry, to whom
in the terrible years 1918-1920 the
safety of Odessa was due.

Please let me know whether
there is any chance of seeing you
here. In the meantime, kindest
regards and best wishes for Passover;
and if there is anybody in Cleveland
who yet remembers me without
being shocked, give them my
fatherly blessing.

My dear Rabbi Silver:


You have now been receiving "THE ZIONIST" for some time and have had an opportunity to acquaint yourself with our aims and purposes.
