ATTENDANCE Present were: Ezra Z Shapiro, chairman; Moses Benjamin, Mrs Jack Bloch, Martin Blum, Edward Braverman, Jerome Curtis, Saul Danaceau, Rabbi Louis Engelberg, S A Finesilver, Myron Guren, Mrs Moses Halperin, Mrs Louis Kaufman, Alvin Kendis, Rabbi I Krislov, Alexander Mintz, E Martin Paul, A E Persky, Aaron Resnick, Julius Schweid, Renee Shulman, Max Simon, Phillip Steinberg, Henry Toll and Gabriel Leeb.

MEMBERSHIP The Secretary reported that the Council had received applications for membership from the B'nai B'rith Interlodge Council and the B'nai B'rith Women of Euclid, Chapter No. 336. Some question was raised regarding the eligibility of the former group on the basis that B'nai B'rith membership was already represented in the Council through the individual lodges. It was pointed out, however, that similar coordinating groups such as the B'nai B'rith Women's Council, the Pioneer Women's Council and the Jewish National Fund council had been admitted to the Council. In the course of the discussion the whole question of the eligibility of such groups was raised. It was decided that the matter of duplication in membership be studied thoroughly by the Council staff and a report submitted at an early date. Upon motion made, seconded, and carried, it was decided to recommend the admission of the B'nai B'rith Interlodge Council. The application of the B'nai B'rith Women of Euclid was similarly approved for recommendation.

Mr Resnick suggested that the Executive Committee adopt a policy to encourage or invite Jewish organizations to affiliate with the Council. He pointed out that he knows of a number of Yiddish-speaking groups not at present affiliated with the Council who would benefit by such affiliation. He indicated that he would personally be happy to appear before these groups, if authorized by the Executive Committee to do so, to urge their applying for membership. In the ensuing discussion there was general agreement regarding the desirability of all eligible Jewish groups applying for membership in the Council. AMIt was felt, however, that it would be unwise for the Council itself to invite these groups to apply since in some instances it might be necessary to reject an application and an organization might feel that it was placed in an embarrassing position by the Council itself through such invitation. It was the consensus, however, that individual members of the Executive Committee, in a purely personal capacity, might very properly encourage unaffiliated groups to apply for membership in the Council. It was also agreed that the Council staff in the course of making the survey on membership duplication, also make an inventory of Jewish organizations in the community. This would provide more accurate information on these organizations which are still unaffiliated with the Council.

BLACK BOOK

Mr Barron reported that the council had received a request from the
Director of the Jewish Black Book Committee to sponsor a large public
meeting in Cleveland similar to the one held at Madison Square Garden in New York
on March 27th, to present the Jewish Black Book to the officials of the city. The
Black Book is a documented compilation of the facts concerning the Nazi atrocities
against the Jews of Europe. The sponsoring organizations of the Jewish Black Book
Committee include the World Jewish Congress; the Jewish Anti-Fascist Committee,
USSR; Vaad Leumi of Palestine; and the American Committee of Jewish Writers, Artists
and Scientists. It is the intention of the Black Book Committee to secure wide
distribution of the book among opinion-forming persons throughout the country and
to make it an instrument for combatting anti-Semitism. Mr S Almazov, Executive
Director of the Black Book Committee, requested the opportunity to appear personally
before the Executive Committee in order to present his group's message. This request had been granted a nd Mr Almazov was introduced to the Committee.

Mr Almazov spoke at some length regarding the careful and thorough documentary job done by the editors of the Black Book and described in considerable detail the recent Madison Square Garden meeting at which the Black Book was officially dedicated. He stressed the need for providing the widest possible distribution of the book among those who influenced public opinion so that they will be in possession of the facts and be fully aware of the injustice which were heaped upon the Jewish people of Europe. He pointed out that in a number of major Jewish communities in the country plans were proceeding for large public meetings to dramatize the book, and felt that Cleveland was especially fortunate in having a

Community Council which incorporates all major groups and could therefore most effectively sponsor such a meeting. This was not the case in some of the other communities where special committees had to be formed to launch this project. He urged the Executive Committee to give favorable consideration to his request.

Following Mr Almazov's presentation, Mr Resnick remarked that there are probably many important items which were excluded from the Black Book, due in part, he said, to the ideology which motivated the dominant group; The Jewish Anti-Fascist Committee of USSR, and the American Committee of Jewish Writers, Artists and Scientists. He felt, however, that in future editions some of this would be corrected and that in any event the Black Book represents the one available document telling the story of the destruction of European Jewry. As such, he asserted, it must be considered the foundation on which to build additional evidence, and it was important to distribute the story as widely as possible. He contended that if the Council does not carry out this project the Communists will, and he expressed the opinion that this was a task which must be the responsibility of the organized Jewish community. Mr Simon pointed out that the important thing was to circulate the facts rather than to hold a mass meeting. Mr Mintz expressed the opinion that the project might be tied up with the Jewish Welfare Fund drive. Following further discussion the motion was made and duly passed that the President appoint a committee of five to study the proposal and its various ramifications and to submit a report to the Executive Committee.

Mr Leeb, Chairman of the Kashruth Board, reported that following the KASHRUTH decision of the Jewish Welfare Fund to allocate \$7,000 to the Council for its Kashruth program, the Kashruth Board met to consider some of the details for actually implementing the program. Considerable question had arisen with regard to the interpretation of the agreement that the Rabbis should handle all religious aspects of the work. There was evident disagreement among the members of the Mashruth Board as to the areas which were exclusively religious and those which had broader implications. Some of these differences were resolved and others were left to be worked out by a sub-committee which was also given the assignment of drawing up a code of procedure for the inspectors, methods of reporting, the possibility of reducing the number of inspectors, and the desirability of establishing an office which would be convenient to all the Jewish districts. Another committee was named to consider methods for certifying the existing Kosher meat markets. In commenting on Mr Leeb's report, Mr Simon pointed out that it would be imperative to secure complete and unequivocal agreement on the part of all the elements represented on the Kashruth Board with respect to the major issues before any funds are expended on the program. It was generally felt that the Council in accepting responsibility for the "ashruth program could not permit any half-way measures or basic compromises on vital aspects of the program.

CULTURAL COMMITTEE In reporting on the work of the Cultural Committee, Mrs Moses

Halperin, acting chairman, announced that the Music Week Committee had been formed into a permanent Jewish Music Committee with Dr Jerome
Gross as chairman. This Committee was considering a broad program of activity for the coming year and was immediately concerned with the task of setting up a plan for a national competition to stimulate composition of particular types of Jewish music as part of the fund created by Mr Morgenstern. Mrs Halperin also reported that recently a meeting was held of representatives from twelve of the Yiddish-speaking organizations affiliated with the Council to explore some of the ways in which the Council could be helpful to them in the field of Yiddish program planning. A number of specific suggestions emerged from that meeting and a sub-committee was appointed to consider specific suggestions for the coming year. There has been general agreement that the Council should assume responsibility for planning a series of specifically Yiddish cultural events.

It was also reported that the National Folk Festival in cooperation with Western Reserve University and the Sesquicentennial Commission would be held in Cleveland during the latter part of May. It is the purpose of the Festival to present authentic programs representing the various cultural and ethnic groups which compose America, through the medium of music and dance. The Council has been invited to plan for a Jewish presentation and for some time was in contact with the Hebrew Arts Committee in New York with a view toward bringing one of its dance groups to Cleveland for this occasion. More latterly, a local group of young people has been assembled, with the assistance of the Jewish Youth Council,

which had formulated a program and was rehearsing in preparation for the Festival. The Council staff has worked closely with the group and has maintained contact with the officials of the National Folk Festival.

REORGANIZATION OF CENTRAL JEWISH COMMUNAL STRUCTURE

a result of his address at
the Tenth Anniversary Celebration of the Council in which he projected the idea
of a single central agency for the Jewish community along the lines of Newark and
Kansas City, there has been set in motion a considerable amount of discussion
within the community. It was his feeling that the realization of the objective
which he set forth was not a short-range matter, but on the other hand it should
not be put off to the indefinite future. He stated that it had been his intention
to stimulate thinking along these lines and he would like to see during the coming
year a series of discussions of the idea as such. He expressed the opinion that
it might be desirable to devote a meeting of the Council to a discussion of the
subject by means of a panel which would include various points of view which would
stimulate additional discussion among the membership-at-large and create a plat-

Mr Curtis stated that in his opinion it would be better first to have the matter studied carefully by the Executive Committee of the Council with the view toward examining the wisdom and feasibility of attempting to inaugurate such a plan at this time. There would be many problems of interpreting such a project to the community. Mr Resnick also felt that the whole matter should first be discussed by the Executive Committee which might wish to invite others to sit in on the discussion. He agreed that the matter should be undertaken without delay and as much time as possible should be devoted to it during the coming year.

form for discussion throughout the community during the coming year. He asked the members of the Executive Committee for their reaction to this suggestion.

Mr Simon agreed that the achievement of the objectives included in Mr Shapiro's address - the development of an integrated community structure would be desirable ultimately. He pointed out, however, that it is possible to have unity without oneness and that oneness of itself does not assure unity. The climate was not right for such discussion at this time although he agreed that it would be desirable for the idea to germinate and take root. It was pointed out by Mrs Halperin that it is not too early to begin to discuss the principles involved and that it would be a mistake to put off such discussion. Mr Mintz suggested that the Council assemble a body of data to demonstrate the advantages of such a single central community organization structure. In reply to these comments Mr Shapiro stated that progress does not take place unless there is a desire to have things happen which is implemented with action. He stated that when he projected his idea at the Tenth Annual Meeting it was his hope that it might lead to study and action. He reminded the Committee that in his address he stated specifically that he did not have in mind that the central community organization should be either the Council or the Federation; that it might be an entirely new body. He could not subscribe to the counsel of inaction on the basis that the present time was not propitious. For some the time is never propitious. He pointed out that almost two years ago the Federation suggested a joint committee of the Jewish Welfare Federation and the Jewish Community Council should be set up to consider areas of interest and activity but despite the appointment of such a committee by the Council the composition of the Federation's committee was never clarified and no meetings were ever held. He saw no reason for waiting and felt that there was everything to be gained by beginning to study the question now.

A motion was carried to appoint a committee to formulate a plan for studying the whole subject and to report back to the Executive Committee at an early date.

COMMUNITY RELATIONS

Mr Barron reported briefly on several recent developments in this field. The two recent meetings addressed by Gerald L K Smith and Father Termeniello were very poorly attended and it was known that those sponsoring the meeting were keenly disappointed at the poor response. As a result it seems possible that Smith and Termeniello would not return to Cleveland very soon. Virtually no publicity was given the meetings in the local press and there were no pickets. Both Smith and Termeniello emphasized their martyrdom growing out of their court conviction in Chicago. It was apparent that they were much less guarded in their anti-Semitic remarks at these most

recent meetings in Cleveland. Mr Barron also reported that the Council presented a memorandum at a recent meeting of the NCRAC's Committee on Community Consultation outlining the Council's reasons for opposing the establishment of a joint ADL-American Jewish Committee regional office in Cleveland. The decision of the Committee was to arrange for the executive heads of the two national agencies, together with two members of the NCRAC Committee to come to Cleveland to discuss the entire situation with the Council's Community Relations Committee. It was planned that the next meeting of the Community Relations Committee would deal with the whole matter of intercultural education, a very important aspect of the Council's program in the field of community relations.

Mr Shapiro submitted the following names for the approval of the Executive Committee as members of the Community Relations Committee for the coming year. As representatives of the Community at Large - Maurice Bernon, Rabbi B R Brickner, Jerome Curtis, Philmore Haber, Irving Kane, Mrs S S Kates, Max Kohrman, Aaron Resnick, Morris Morgenstern, Max Simon, Fred Stashower, Phillip Steinberg and Abraham Rubin; Jewish Welfare Federation - Louis Bing Jr, George Mayer, Leo W Neumark and James Miller; League for Human Rights - M E Glass, Emery Klineman and Daniel Sherby; American Jewish Committee - Ralph A Colbert and Herbert A Rosenthal; American Jewish Congress - Mrs Ben B Goldman and Rabbi Rudolph M Rosenthal; Anti-Defamation League - Oscar Brown and Philip Frankel; Jewish Labor Committee - Julius Weisberg and I Axelrod.

OPA LEGISLATION The staff of the Council requested guidance in regard to inguiries received from member organizations wishing to know what stand, if any, they should take on OPA legislation. The whole question of the role that organizations like the Council should play in the field of social legislation has been discussed over a long period by Jewish public relations agencies. While it is generally conceded that few of these legislative issues have direct Jewish relationship, it is felt by many that any deterioration in the economic fabric of the country would provide fertile ground for anti-Semitism. It was also pointed out that many city-wide groups like the Church Federation and the Federation of Jewish Women's Organizations, had taken a positive stand in support of OPA.

It was the consensus of those present that this should be given much more intensive study and thought than was possible at this meeting and should be referred to the Community Relations Committee.

The meeting was adjourned at 10:55 p.m.

Dear Rabbi Silver:

You are no doubt aware that the forthcoming Fourth Session of the American Jewish Conference, to be held at the end of November, will have as its major task the consideration of the proposed plan for the creation of a permanent representative body to succeed the Conference.

Because this matter is of such vital important to American Jewry, the Cleveland Jewish Community Council is arranging a one-day Regional Conference on October 19th for leaders of Ohio and Western Pennsylvania communities to consider the proposal, exchange views, and make suggestions about it. The American Jewish Conference is cooperating by sending Mr Louis Lipsky, Chairman of the Executive Committee, and Dr Maurice N Eisendrath, Chairman of the Committee on Future Organization which formulated the plan.

The Conference will be held at the Hotel Allerton and will consist of two sessions: The morning session, opening at 10:30 will be limited to American Jewish Conference delegates from the region, a special Council Study Committee, and out-of-town representatives. The afternoon session, beginning at 2:30, will be open to Jewish Community Council representatives, presidents of organizations, and to the public and press. The conference will not take any position on the proposed plan, it being set up primarily to provide a vehicle for clarification and exchange of viewpoints and as a means for developing an informed public opinion on the subject.

I hope you will plan to attend this conference on October 19th and to participate fully in the discussions.

On June 30th the following item appeared in the Cleveland News:

"AFFELDER DENIES ZIONIST CLAIM OF 'VOTE BLOC'

A public statement disputing Zionist claims of a so-called "Jewish bloc vote" was issued today by Lewis J Affelder chairman of the Cleveland chapter of the American Council for Judaism.

Affelder said he was concerned about a Taft-for-President pamphlet in which political support was sought "on the special basis of (Taft's) appeal to Jews as a bloc." He mentioned the name of Rabbi Abba Hillel Silver, Clevelander who is a world leader in Zionism, and said:

'We think it of primary importance that claims of the existence of a 'Jewish bloc vote' be exposed as untrue.

'We think this is of particular importance in the city of Cleveland, where political Zionists, under the leadership of Rabbi Silver, are so prone to play politics by helping to advance this claim of a Jewish vote.

National president of the American Council for Judaism is Lessing J Rosenwald."

Since I didn't want to call a special meeting of the Committee during this hot spell, I discussed the matter with our Vice-Chairmen, Paul Eden and Arnold Edelman, and then sent a letter (copy of which is attached) to Mr Affelder expressing our views on the matter. I hope this meets with your approval. It is our understanding that our action is in conformity with the established policy of our Committee.

Dear Mr Affelder:

Your recent public statement regarding a so-called "Jewish bloc vote" has come to the attention of the Community Relations Department of the Jewish Community Council. Apparently, you were unaware of the fact that over three years ago, by common agreement among the national and local Jewish organizations, all matters with regard to the defense of Jewish rights, anti-defamation activities and all phases of Jewish community relations in Cleveland, are referred to and cleared through the Community Relations Committee of the Council. The particular matter in question is precisely the kind of issue on which all Jewish organizations and individuals are expected to take no public action without prior consultation with the Community Relations Committee.

As a matter of fact the Committee had already considered this matter within several days after the event and this, together with related issues, received what we considered to be appropriate action on our part.

Under the circumstances, you have not only violated community discipline, though unwittingly no doubt, but have also engaged in what we consider to be the poorest kind of public relations. Whereas before, the material (which we also condemned and took steps to prevent its repetition) was directed only to Jews, it has now been brought to public attention and to those among whom it will obviously do the most harm.

We shall be happy to discuss any phases of the matter with you, at your convenience.







THE Jewish Community Council is the central representative body which speaks for and acts in the name of the entire Jewish community of Cleveland, and which concerns itself with the problems affecting the Jewish community as a whole.



The Council is the Voice of Cleveland's Jewry

It is a democratic forum for the exchange of ideas and opinions among Jews holding differing viewpoints on Jewish and community problems, and it serves as the instrument for carrying out the decisions of the majority.

One hundred and sixty organizations—religious, secular, political, cultural, fraternal, social, professional and social service—elect delegates each year who constitute the assembly and committees of the Jewish Community Council.

As a Dynamic Structure the Council Has Come to Serve Many Purposes

It functions principally in two large areas:

- ONE: It seeks to promote the high traditional standards of ethics, culture and cooperation so that the Jewish community can function creatively, responsibly, and with dignity. It strives to eliminate from Jewish group life elements and practices which are at variance with the ethical traditions of the Jewish group, and which may be harmful to the good name of the Jewish people.
- TWO: It endeavors to improve and strengthen the relationships between the Jewish and the general community. It strives to promote better understanding, and to promote intergroup and civic cooperation which strengthen American life. It safeguards the civic, political, religious and economic rights of the Jewish people and it endeavors to eliminate negative aspects destructive to Jewish life.
