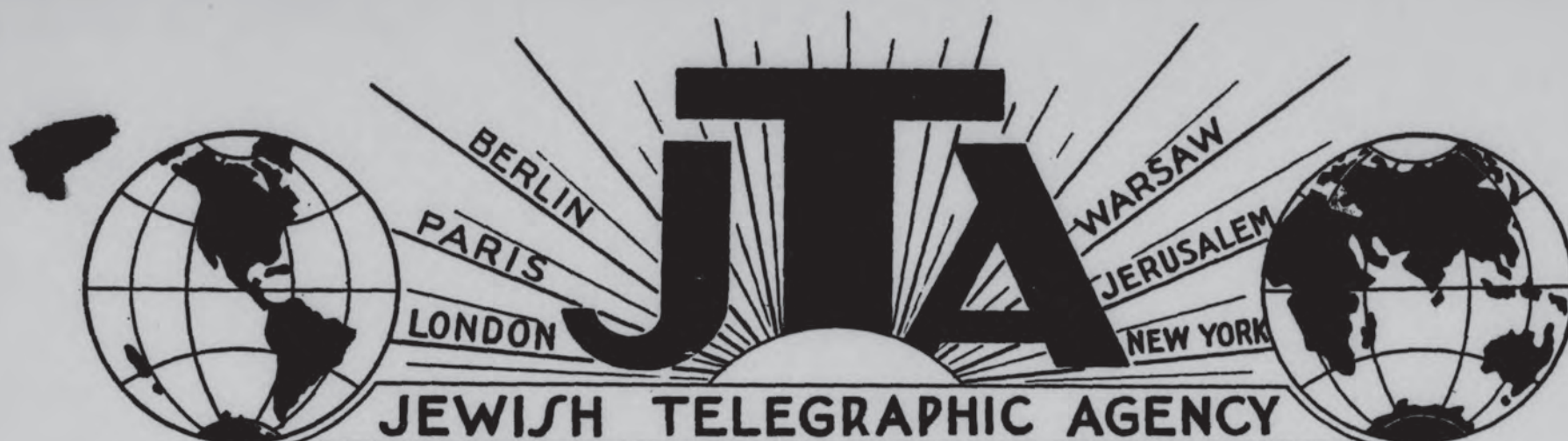

Dear Dr. Silver:

I wish to submit to you a Memorandum based on observations which I made during my trip to Europe, which included a visit to Germany and talks with many Jewish leaders.

I have noted with interest the very active part you are taking in the Boycott Movement. It seems to me that the success of the Boycott Movement depends entirely on who would be entrusted with executing a world-wide plan.

If I may make a suggestion, nobody seems to me more fit for this task than Dr. George Bernhardt, who for many years was editor-in-chief of the "Vossische Zeitung" in Germany, a member of the German Parliament and what is of particular importance, an economist of note. I don't know whether he would be prepared to assume this task, but as you have seen from what he has written in our paper, he is heartily in favor of the Boycott. He knows better than anybody else, the entire field of German commerce and economy. He was a member of the Economic Council of Germany (Reichswirtschaftsrat) for a number of years, also managing Director of the Federation of the German Department stores.

I would also like to take this opportunity to make the following suggestion.

We are carrying, as you know, a weekly column, written by R. D. Blumenfeld, who was for thirty years editor-in-chief of "The Daily Express" and is England's most celebrated journalist, and a weekly column by Professor Bernhardt, who also enjoys a world-wide reputation.

We would like to have a column written by an outstanding American and we would appreciate it very much if you were to consent to contribute weekly a column of five or six hundred words for our paper. Our Sunday paper has made a hit and its circulation is steadily increasing.

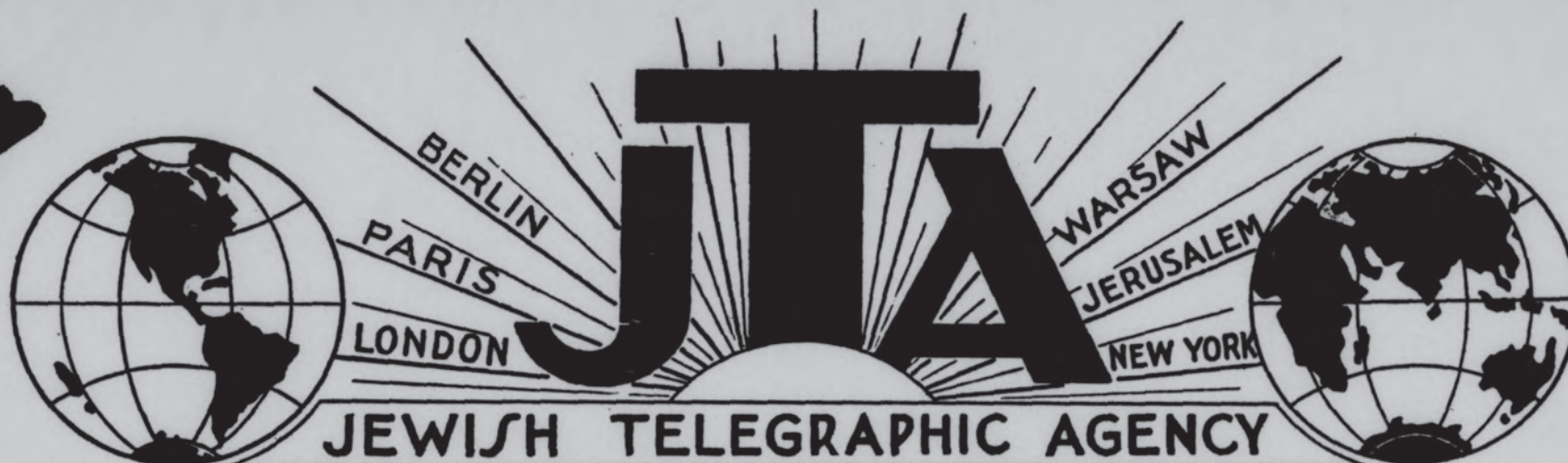

In reply to a telegram addressed to him on September 30 requesting a statement from him on reports from Geneva that his name was being mentioned as League of Nations High Commissioner to direct activities in behalf of the refugees from Germany, Mr. Herbert C. Hoover addressed the following reply to the Jewish Telegraphic Agency, under the notation, "confidential":

October 6, 1933.

Your telegram reached me enroute West. It would be improper for me to make any statement in regard to a matter where I have not received the offer. I am deeply sympathetic with the possibilities of this League of Nations project for the amelioration of persecution and suffering.

If some American is to be chosen it must be one who would have the loyal backing and support of the present Administration at Washington. Consequently he must be of that political faith, otherwise he would have but little influence and might be a liability instead of an asset to these suffering people.

It is also worth considering as to whether, in view of the very large unpopularity of the United States in European countries at the present time, it is not desirable that this task should be undertaken by some European statesman who could at least command the ministerial support in different countries in Europe.

Dear Rabbi Silver:

We have your letter of recent date. You are certainly right in suggesting that it would be useful to send this week's issue around to leading clergymen and we are doing so.

When are you going to be in New York? I wonder whether you might be here on January 15 at which time we intend publishing the first issue of our enlarged daily. It will be the same size as our Sunday paper and we intend to arrange a luncheon which we hope will be attended by prominent members of our community. I also would like to have a talk with you about the boycott. It seems to me that the boycott might be much more effective if we could convince Washington and the American industrialists that many of the industries which the Jews used to run in Germany, could be established by them in the United States and that many markets today served by Germany, could be captured by the United States. I believe that in this way only would we get whole-hearted cooperation in the boycott.

A man like Bernhard would have been uniquely fit for establishing a machinery of this type. Unfortunately he is no longer available as he has acquired a German daily newspaper in Paris.

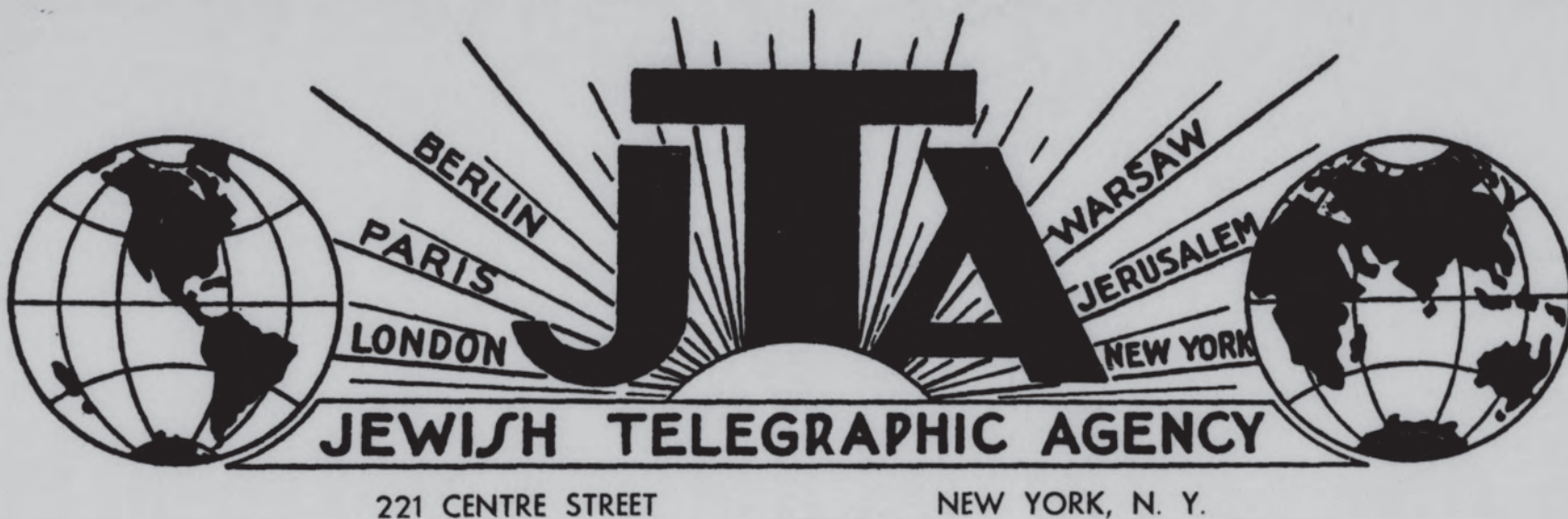

In the last line of the fourth paragraph before the last: "becoming with us an impeding virtue..." My text read "an impedimental virtue..."

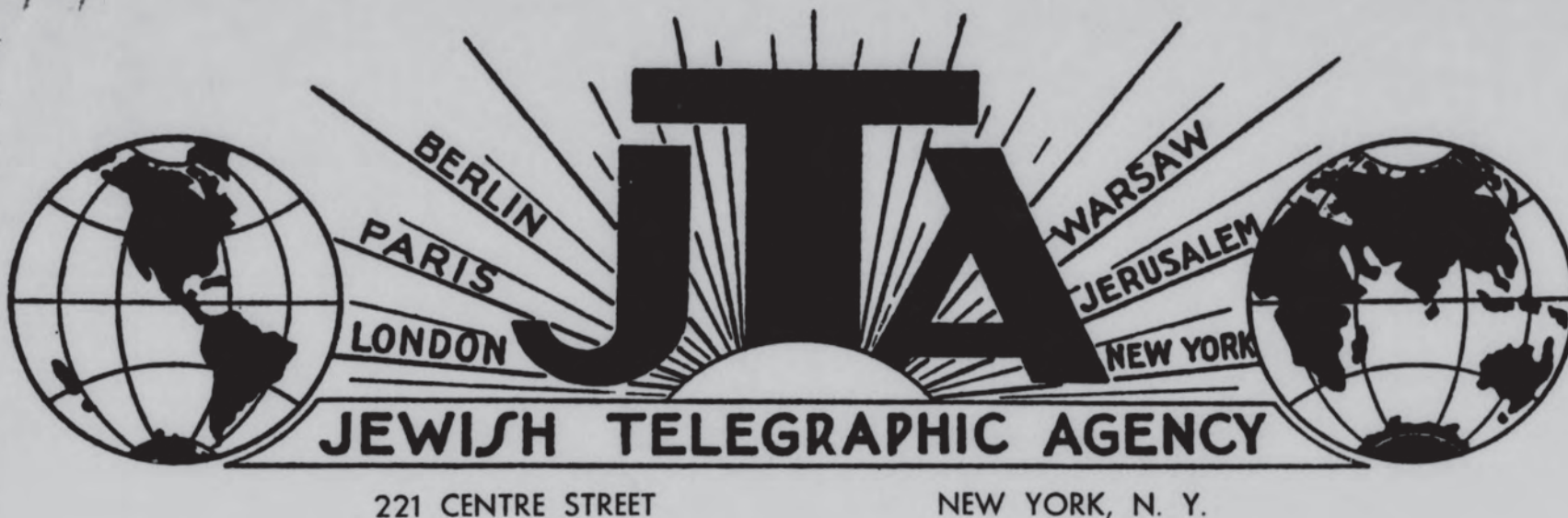

My dear Mr. Halle

I was glad to receive a letter from Mr. Goldhammer in which he informed me of your desire to assure me that every possible consideration will be given to the needs of the JTA in the allocations to be made, and that it is therefore not necessary for me to appear before your Committee. May I, however, mention in this letter a few of the things I would have orally stated, had I attended your meeting.

The allocation to our agency will probably be made on the basis of what we received in previous years. May I point out that the tremendous changes in the Jewish situation merits the consideration of our needs in proportion to these changes. Frankly, I believe that what I am saying is not only because of my identification with the J.T.A., but also in full appreciation of the various elements involved, and because I believe that nothing is as important today as counteracting Nazi propaganda. In this direction, our agency could do much more useful work if we had adequate means at our disposal.

We have, for the past few weeks, been negotiating with the British Government for a daily wireless dispatch to be sent out from the powerful Rugby station, to be received by newspapers and news agencies around the world. They have made a very considerable concession with regard to the price involved, and we would broadcast a daily wireless report about the developments in Germany. We would be permitted to determine the contents of this report, and for the purpose of counteracting Nazi propaganda these arrangements would be very desirable. The German wireless broadcast from the Nauen station a very considerable amount of propaganda to many newspapers in various parts of the world. In many countries, such as South America, the Jewish community is not in a position to receive material to counteract this propaganda, and our daily report would therefore be most effective in neutralizing the Nazi propaganda and helping to fully bring out the real situation in Germany.

This is only one of the various activities we should be in a position to carry out at this time.

It would also be desirable to institute here, as we have in England, a mat service to be sent to the smaller English newspapers.

Mr. Halle:-
Page 2-

Already, a few hours out of New York, newspapers contain practically nothing about Germany. It would also be desirable to make such a mat service available for the German newspapers throughout the country, in the German language. The cost of this service would depend on the type of contributors, the amount of photographic illustrations, the number of newspapers supplied. I believe it would also be desirable to include cartoons. A similar service which we have started in England has proven most effective.

The unfortunate truth is, however, that we are at this time really crippled in our work, and starved for lack of sufficient funds. It has not always been easy to raise funds to cover the various aspects of our work, but it seems to me that today wisdom and statesmanship require a persistent and intelligent effort to counteract the poison which the Nazis are spreading.

Two years ago, I was sitting in Berlin opposite one of the Ullstein brothers, in his office, trying to interest him in the work of the J.T.A. I pointed out that the Jew has no army or navy to protect his rights, and depended on public opinion. Mr. Ullstein "poo-hooed", and ridiculed my remarks, saying that the Jews were running the biggest newspapers, banks, and other large enterprises in Germany. He did not believe that Hitler would ever come into power, and, even if he did, could never carry out his "crazy" projects. A few months ago, as you know, the Ullstein concern was coordinated, and, with the exception of one, all the brothers were removed from the Board. One of the greatest enterprises in the world is, in all likelihood, doomed.

I was assured by one of the leaders of German Jewry only recently, that if, in 1928, \$150,000.00 had been placed at their disposal, it would undoubtedly have prevented the rise of Hitler.

The average rich Jew in Germany felt that if his wealth were protected, he was satisfied in attending to his business and leaving Jewish political efforts to a small number of well-meaning but not sufficiently powerful people.

Even in ordinary times it was extremely difficult for us to cover our normal deficit. The German situation has imposed new and terrific burdens on us, and it is absolutely impossible for us to continue our work effectively if we should receive only the same support we received heretofore.

Mr. S. P. Halle:-

Page 3-

The German situation has arisen after years of depression, and at a time when the dollar has depreciated. We are not permitted to receive cables collect but are forced to pay for them on the other side, and our cable bills keep mounting. We are heavily indebted to the cable companies, and are working under terrific financial strain.

I therefore most earnestly appeal to you to increase, substantially, your grant to our agency, and sincerely hope that you will give my request your consideration.

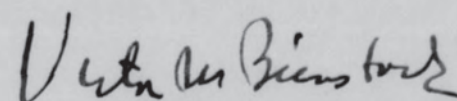

But I wonder whether you know about High Commissioner McDonald's meeting held last night, at which very impressive pleas for unity in relief work were made by McDonald, Warburg, d'Avigdor Goldsmid, Albert Lasker, Senator Cohen, Morris Rothenberg, Louis Lipsky and others. 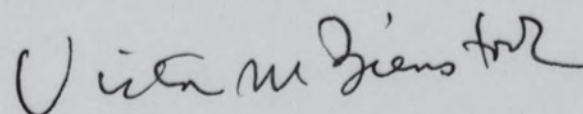

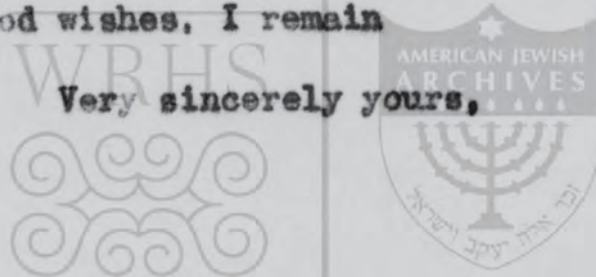

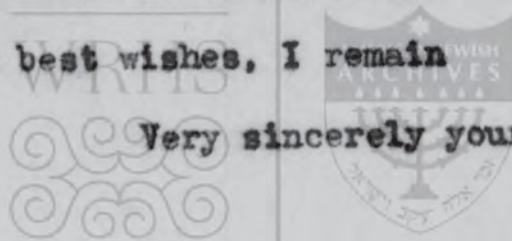
