My dear Judge Strasburger:

I have read with care your memorandum of September 5th, addressed to Mr. Jasper J. Mayer, in regard to the Givern-ment's recommanding the Independent Order of B'nai B'rith for social work among Jews who have volunteered and are in various branches of the United States Army.

It has been the policy of the Commission on Training Camp Activities to deal with one agency and one agency alone, in connection with specific lines of welfare work. Thus, we deal with the Young Men's Christian Association instead of with the social organizations of the various Protestant churches. In the same fashion we deal with the Enights of Columbus instead of with the various societies of the Catholic Church. Several months ago, after careful investigation, we made up our minds that the organization best fitted for social work among Jewish soldiers was the Jewish Welfare Board, and that Board was recognized to carry on this kind of activity.

In taking this ground I do not want to appear to east any reflection upon the organization with which you are affiliated, or upon the work your organization is in a position to undertake. I believe, however, that the Jewish Welfare Board represents the widest possible basis for this kind of work, and for that reason its selection was to my mind a wise one.

Regarding conference yesterday the Executive Committee of the Jewish Board for Welfare Work in the United States Army and Navy in the interest of co-ordinating and merging all activities looking to the welfare of the soldiers and sailors in the United States Army and Navy agree to your suggestion that the following posts namely, Rockford, Battle Creek, Des Moines, Tacoma, Baltimore, Alexandria, Fort Worth, Houston and Hattiesburg be under the supervision of the Bnai Birith, your representatives to carry into effect at these posts the policies now in force and those which may be adopted by the administrative committee of the Jewish Board for Welfare Work of which the Bnai Birith may name three members? It is agreed that there shall be one Treasurer and all funds collected by the Bnai Birith shall be sent to the National Treasurer. Mr. S. S. Rosenstamm, to be used in connection with the welfare work of the Jewish soldiers and sailors. I have been asked to express to you the satisfaction of our Board that this basis of co-operation has been established and we will send out our appeal with your signature attached, adding notation which you dictated. MY DEAR SIR: I am in receipt of your circular letter of October 1st, asking for a contribution to the "Jewish Welfare Work in the Army and Navy." I fully agree with the thought that you have so well expressed -- "That our boys who have responded to their country's call and are ready to make many sacrifices in token of their loyalty and devotion to America are deserving of all the inspiration, the cheer and the comfort which we can possibly give them." I am a member of the Executive Committee of the National Red Cross, Cleveland Chapter. I am convinced that the benefits accruing from the work being undertaken by the National Red Cross are enjoyed by all our soldiers, without distinction as to race or religion. I believe that through the efforts of the Red Cross, the material needs and physical comforts of ALL the boys at the front are being well taken care of. The War Department and Department of Justice, we are informed, have adopted drastic restrictive measures as to liquor and social vices. Last week, I met Mr. Harold Clark, in charge of the work of the Young Men's Christian Association at Camp Sherman, Chillicothe, who told me that that organization, the Young Men's Hebrew Association, and a Catholic organization, which I believe is the Knights of Columbus, were working together in a spirit of greatest harmony to take care of the moral and religious needs of the soldiers. I asked him if any distinction was being made as to race or religion, in the enjoyment of the library facilities or recreation facilities offered by any or all of the Associations, and he assured me that question did not in any way enter into the camp life. If it is true that the National Red Cross is taking care of the physical and material needs, without respect to race or religion, and if Y.M.H.A. is taking care of the religious and moral needs of the Jewish boys, then I am wondering why we need another organization.

The War Department and the National Red Cross are seeking simplicity rather than multiplicity of organizations.

My dear Colonel Cutler:

I am enclosing herewith a memorandum of the understanding between us, and which I believe contains all the points that we discussed, except the matter of expediency. If it differs in any way from your understanding of the matter, will you kindly wire me to Chicago, Monday morning. I am submitting a copy of this also to Messrs. Rosenzweig and Hartman, and taking a copy with me to Chicago to submit to Mr. Kraus and the Managing Board. I hope, as I told you before, that there will be thorough according this great work.

I have been struck with the enthusiasm of Mr. Rosenzweig. I feel that he could be of great use, and along the lines of our conversation regarding using as much of our machinery as possible, I would suggest that Mr. Rosenzweig, who, as you know, is President of District No.1, be made a member of the Executive Committee, and put in a place where his ability and enthusiasm may bring the greatest practical results in the work itself. Mr. Rosenzweig is greatly interested in the welfare of the boys and in the workers who are in the field. It seems to me that were he put where he could render the most efficient service on the practical side of the work itself, he would be a great seset to your organization.

You will be glad to hear that I saw Mr. Warburg this morning, and that he is in thorough agreement with what we have done, as is Mr. Charles Hartman. May I express to you the personal hope that our conference will not have been held in vain, and that you may soon hear from Mr. Kraus and myself that the I.O.B.B. will throw its strength, its organization and its enthusiasm into this great work.

At the conference held in Providence, with regard to the co-operation and merging of the work of the American Soldiers and Sailors Welfare League with that of the Jewish Welfare Board for the Army and Navy, the following points were mutually agreed to.

First: That all moneys collected through the I.O.B.B. agencies be transmitted to S. S. Rosenstam, National Treasurer, New York.

Second: That a balance of at least \$2,500 be maintained in Chicago for the present, but that the continuance of such balance be made contingent until a policy of National subventions is approved of by the Executive Committee of the Jewish Welfare Board for the Army and Navy.

Third: That requisitions properly approved by the Chicago office be forwarded to the New York office, and that these requisitions be honored by New York for the payment of such expenditures as are approved of by the Chicago office.

Fourth: That a letter be written by Mr. Adolph Kraus, president, and Colonel Harry Cutler, chairman, jointly, to the lodges, setting forth the facts of the merger and the reasons therefor.

Fifth: That after the present supply of American Soldiers and Sailors Welfare League stationery for the camps is exhausted, that the stationery at all camps be uniform and bear the imprint of the Jewish Board for Welfare Work in the United States Army and Navy.

Sixth: That simultaneous reports of the workers be sent to the Chicago office and the New York office, and that all policies adopted by the administrative council be put in force in all cantonments.

Seventh: That Colonel Cutler issue credentials for the workers in the cantonments supervised by the I. O. B. B. through the New York office. Such credentials, however, to go only to those who are designated by and satisfactory to the I. O. B. B.

Eighth: That Colonel Cutler use the present organization of the I. O. B. B. as agencies for the collecting of funds and such other activities as may properly be used in furthering the work, and that as far as possible the general plans of work of the I. O.B. B. organization be utilized.

Ninth: That the New York office furnish the Chicago office with stationery after the present supply is exhausted.

In the above conference, it was understood that the Chicago office of the American Soldiers and Sailors Welfare League be retained as a clearing house for the work prosecuted heretofore by the I. O. B. B., as per prior agreement with Colonel Cutler, but that the national headquarters of the entire organization be in the City of New York.

It is understood that in view of the merger of all the activities in the central organization as per agreement, with the particular exceptions whereby we are given special control in certain reserved camps, that we become a constituent organization of the central body as reorganized, in the same sense as those other organizations who have joined therein.

# INDEPENDENT ORDER OF B'NAI B'RITH

### CHICAGO

October 25-1917.

Colonel Harry Gutler, 7 Eddy Street, Providence, R.I.

My deer Brother Cutler:-

I wired you as follows: "Memorandum prepared by Rabbi Fox follows in the main our agreement excepting a matter touching form and not substance. Will explain in letter which follows:"

I thought that any further negotiations were unnecessary and that a full agreement had been reached between us. I cannot, for reasons stated in my letter of October 1st, agree to paragraph four in the memorandum submitted to me by Rabbi Fox, namely that a letter should be written by you and me to the lodges explaining the "merger". I shall be pleased to fully explain the agreement made with you for co-operation, and we can agree if necessary on the form of the letter. I am also willing to join you in a public letter to be published in the Jewish newspapers. Whether my view as why not to send a joint letter to the lodges, as explained in letter of October 1st, is correct or not I hope you will understand that I am not prompted by any motive to which you can take exceptions, but solely by what I deem the proper mode of procedure. To adopt any other course would be an innovation. It has never been done before and there is no reason why it should be done now.

Paragraphs one-two, three, six and seven of the memorandum do not differ from the understanding you and I had. In paragraph eight strike out the first two lines and substitute for it the following:- "The I.O.B.B. shall aid in collections." If the Executive Committee of the Order is to surrender its duty to any one there will be no objection on my part to surrender it to you, but so far I am not ready to abdicate. The last paragraph commencing with the words " It is understood" I do not understand and therefore cannot agree to without some satisfactory explanation, nor does it seem to me of any great importance.

We have organized every state, even where there are no camps, for the collection of funds. Some of our representatives have shown considerable activity. Those men ought to remain in charge of the collection of funds, or at least jointly with others so as not to dampen their enthusiasm.

Rabbi Fox told me of the hot time you had at the meeting in New York and that you saved the situation. That did not surprise me neither as to yourself nor as to the distinguished assembly, for there is always a hot time at any meeting held in New York.

I am sorry that you seem to think that you will not be able to meet me in New York for I am sure that you and I would agree on every point in a few minutes, whereas trying to come to an understanding by letters is not as satisfactory.

is to once and for all do away with the present misunderstanding intentionally or otherwise, on the part of a great many members of the Order, whose zeal and loyalty prompts them to withhold their fullest measure of co-operation. In this letter we should clearly define the fact that we are merged, and that the B'nai Bfrith is ready to put all its machinery and strength of its organization behind this work. This, as you know, will be of inestimable value.

I would thereupon proceed to make the appointments, which I am anxious to do, of I.O.B.B. men in the furthering and perfecting of this organization.

I agree that to adopt this suggestion would be an innovation, but an innovation, in my judgment, well worth while in the interest of the cause we are serving. However, if you insist that this should not be done, but will join me in a public letter to the press, I shall reluctantly waive my wishes in the premises.

Paragraph 8, which you criticize is the phrascology and language of Dr. Fox and I did not see same until he sent me a copy from New York where he wrote it. This paragraph emanated entirely from Dr. Fox. It was his suggestion, which I readily and cheerfully concurred, namely, to utilize the general machinery of the I.O.B.B., hence, you will see that I am not looking to have you surrender to me or to this Board any functions of the Executive Committee of the Board, or for you to abdicate. I rather think you made these references in a spirit of good natured facetiousness, for I am sure you give me credit for better motives than harboring any such thoughts as your statement would imply.

The last paragraph is also the phraseology of Dr. Fox. I am sure he can give you the explanation you request.

None of the money collected by the T.O.B.B. has thus far been sent to the National Treasurer. Will you be good enough to suggest that this be done without delay, retaining in your possession \$2500.00 of the amount now collected, which I understand to be about \$12,000.00.

### MEMORAN DUM.

With reference to the conference between Mr. Adolph Kraus of Chicago and Mr. Felix M. Warburg of 52 William Street, held on October 27th at 11 o'clock A.M.

Mr. Kraus, upon his arrival from Chicago, came in to discuss the matter of the Jewish Welfare Board, and stated that he was sorry to hear from Dr. Fox that the matter of joining the Welfare Board and the B'nai B'rith had caused quite a discussion during the meeting, and that he wanted to assure me that he wished to live up to the agreement that he had made, and that all he was interested in was not to get credit for the 'B'nai B'rith, but, having gone as far as they have, he did not feel that they should give up their identity in this work; and that he also understood that this Joint-Welfare Board was between the Welfare Board as such -party of the first part- and the B'nai B'rith - party of the second part.

I told him that he had received much more consideration than any other party which had gone into the Welfare Board for the sake of unity. I told him that the Y. M. H. A. started this work long before the War, looking after the soldiers in the different posts in this neighborhood; and while I personally paid the expenses of the Y. M. & Kindred Associations for a number of years, and while I thought that the Y. M. H. A's name was the proper one which expressed the work that they have done for the soldiers, and should, therefore, have been adopted; and

and had merged in the name which was satisfactory all around, and the new Board had taken over the responsibility for the work to be done in the camps and cantonments. That no other organizations had asked for any privileges in supervising special posts, and that for the sake or co-operation, we had conceded to him the supervision of the 8 posts stated before, and that I hope he will appreciate this attitude and ask for nothing further.

He mentioned our request at the last meeting that no special stationery should be used by the B' B'. after the present supply was exhausted. as there should be uniformity all over, but their name appearing on stationery wherever used would give the B' B'. credit and standing for all work done by the joint-organizations. He appreciated that, and stated that he would want to raise no point that would create any difficulties. We then discussed the personality of Dr. Fox, and I stated that I thought he would be very useful and I hoped he would be kept on this work. Mr. Kraus then volunteered the statements that there were a good many organizations which were not quite satisfied with the ruling, that only three Societies, viz., the Y. M. C. A., the Knights of Columbus and the Welfare Board, could be permitted to the camps. and stated that the meeting had been called upon the suggestion of the Secretary of War of Masons and Organizations which wished to be heard. That in courtesy to the Secretary of War, he would attend such a meeting, and he gave me the assurance that whatever action other Societies would take, he would promise me that relationship between the B.B. and the Welfare Board would not be changed. and that he would live up to his agreement.

I thank you for sending me copy of your letter of November third to dolonel dutler and am frank to say that I am amazed at its contents. At the conference at our office you stated that you were going to a conference that had been called by the disgruntled societies which you were attending as a matter of courtesy, but you volunteered the assurance that regardless of what other organizations might do, you felt yourself bound to the agreement which you made and would stick to it. I cannot understand, therefore, the evident change of attitude, and as I have made a memorandum of our conversation and handed it over to the committee with the assurance that, as far as you were concerned, the agreement would be carried out, it puts me in a position which is new and embarrassing one for me, of having made a statement which is not borne out by the facts. gram. I appreciate the information therein contained. I feel however, the necessity of again requesting some information from you on the same subject.

The campaign which the Y. M. C. A. is about to begin, will assume large proportions. It is their object to raise \$900,000 in Cleveland, which means that close on to \$75,000 or perhaps \$100,000 would come from our people. Many of our people would like to know how far our Jewish boys are availing themselves of Y.M.C.A. facilities in the Camps, whether any attempts in influencing or proselytizing are being made at these places, whether Jewish Religious Services are held in the Y.M.C.A. shacks, — in general — we would like to know definitely what understanding, if any, exists between our own Welfare Board and the Y. M. C. A. Do you contemplate a duplication of the social service work which the Y. M. C. A. is carrying on, or erection of separate shacks for our boys.

Mayer, in regard to the Government's recommending the Independent Order of B'nai B'rith for social work among Jews who have volunteered and are in various branches of the United States. Army. It has been the policy of the Commission on Training Camp Activities to deal with one agency alone, in connection with specific lines of welfare work. Thus, we deal with the Young Men's Christian Association instead of with the social organizations of the various Protestant Churches. In the same fashion we deal with the Knights of Columbus instead of with the various societies of the Catholic Church. Several months ago after careful in-



My dear Mr. Cutler:

I am in receipt of yours of the 31st. alt. In raply therato would say that in what I said to Dr. Goldrich I do not wish to be misunderstood. I visited Camp Dix for the purpose of establishing our recreation work inside and outside of the camp for District No. 3, as is being done by other Districts of our Order. When I found that you had a worker at that camp, who at the time I met him, was in company with Dr. Goldrich, I immediately stated that we would do no work at Camp Dix on account of duplication. As to my expression to Dr. Goldrich that something should be done to bring about more cordial relations between the L. O. B. B. and the J. B. W. W. I simply meant that I am an ardent B'nai B'rith, have worked and watched for twenty-five years, and stand ready to be elected President of District No. 3, on January 27th. Besides the Order's work, I have for many years endeavored to do communal work, for there is absolutely no question that much can be done for our Jewish Faith and people; therefore being inspired with the work for the cause in question-that of our Jewish boys who are and will be in war for our Country. I felt that two organizations of forces working for the one cause should not be.

I am sorry to state that many non-Jews are making bold statements that there is no harmony in the Welfare Work of the Jews. I am informed of all agreements and abrogations of the two organizations and reasons for working independently, and I say to you, friend Cutler, as I said to Dr. Goldrich, the cause is greater than any body or bodies, and no matter how good the work is that either body is doing, the dissention which exists hurts the cause and Judiem. Why should big, broad-minded philanthropists and men of Jewist affairs, squabble and quibble over who should or should not be recognized, organization or individual alike.

You are without question acquainted with the work our Order has undertaken and accomplished in the past, never for a selfish purpose. Why now, after we have lone the pioneering in this line of work, look down upon the Order.

I am writing this to you, friend Cutler, without any motive only as my heart dictates for the good of all Jews and the cause. Try and get together to show to the world that the Jew is ONE in this particula duty for our boys and the love we have for our glorious U.S.A.

I fully appreciate the spirit in which youhave written to me, and also wish to thank you for the kind works expressed.

My feeling has always been likewise for you, and for this reason only have I spoken so plainly to you on this very important matter. Can't you arrange to work with Brother Kraus. Forget the past and work as ONE.

Ladies:

In a talk with Mr. Herbert J. Rosenbaum, who represents the Jewish Board for Welfare Work at Camp . Sherman, I learned last evening that very few of the soldiers are provided with helmets. Mr. Rosenbaum informed me that there was greater need of helmets than of any other kind of knitted garment and that he would like to have as many as 600 for immédiate distribution among our Jewish boys.

Would it be possible to furnish these helmets as an enterprise of the Sisterhoods of Ohio?

I am writing to every Sisterhood in the State asking that each society furnish a number of helmets, the number to be based on the membership of the society. The quota for your Sisterhood is 175 helmets. If you are willing to furnish this number please have the helmets made at once and sent directly to Mr. Rosenbaum, c/o Y. M. C. A., Camp Sherman, Chillicothe.

Dear Mr. Cutler:

D. Bellin of your city also copy of correspondence between him and Mr. Rosenzweig and copy of a resolution adopted by your lodge.

Mr. Bellin inquires whether the B'nai B'rith News will publish a statement prepared by you hearing upon "the controversy" which according to your lodge I "have seen fit to inaugurate".

Before answering that question I deem it proper to call your attention to the following: I became acquainted with you about fifteen years ago. At that time you were not quite as well known as you are to-day. My friendly interest in your welfare during those years has not been an obstacle to you in climbing the guilded heights of fame. I had confidence in you and therefore did not hesitate to come to an agreement concerning joint work for soldiers and sailors without reducing the full agreement to writing.

When Rebbi Fox delivered to me the memorandum which you wanted me to sign and which contained provisions contrary to our agreement, I declined to sign it.

On October 23rd last I wired you that I would be in New York on the 28th; that I wished to discuss with you the provisions in the memo., which differed from our original agreement; that I would be at Hotel Astor and if you could not meet me there to wire me time and place of meeting. On the same day Dr. Fox wrote you that I would not agree to the memo, that I would be in New York on the 28th and that he hoped everything would be arranged. I confirmed my telegram by letter and fully stated my objections to the memo. I then had not the slightest doubt that if I had an opportunity to refresh your recollection that our Chicago agreement would stand.

I arrived in New York on the 27th of October. I there met Brothers Hartman and Rosenzweig. I was told by Brother Rosenzweig that you telephoned him on the 26th that on account of your wife's illness you was loth to leave Providence, but that if after his talk with me he should be of opinion that it would serve any useful purpose for you to come to New York, to wire or telephone to you and you would come. I promptly requested that he should neither wire or telephone. My reason for so requesting was that you knew that I came to New York expecting to see you; that you knew what I wanted to see you about; that I deemed tt important to see you - yet knowing all that, you did not wish to come unless Brother Rosenzweig would certify that it would serve a useful purpose for you to meet me, it was best that you should not come.

I would not have expected you to come, but if she was well enough so that you could come if Mr. Rosenzweig would wire you, you could have come without being wired for. And as a matter of fact I thought you would come but you failed to do so. You did not even send me a message by phone, wire or letter.

Did you ignore my request because you intended thereby to have me understand that you was in command of the situation, that you were conferring favors and that we were expected to obey your orders and that your message sent by Rabbi Fox that you would grant no further concessions was the last work? I asked for no concessions.

On that particular and very enjoyable Sunday I learned among other things that you said to our leaders in your District that in the interview you had with me in Chicago, I referred to District No. 1 in a contemptuous manner and that you gave out the impression that I said (or acted) as if I did not care what District Mo. 1 desired. What could have been your object in making such a statement? Was it perhaps to make friends for ma? I am sure that what took place between us did not justify you in making such a statement. I proposed to you that the B'nai B'rith would take care of the posts in which we had commenced work and that your organization should take care of the rest - to which you agreed. You then, as I thought, in kindness to me, called my attention to the fact that that arrangement might displease our brethren in District No. 1 as my selection aid not include any camp to that district. I thought you was right and so promptly offered to exchange one of the camps we had reserved for one in district No.1. You answered that could not be done because the camp which would probably be selected by our members would be Camp Upton, that that was the largest camp and that your organization could not possibly think of giving it up, that in fact you could not give up any, and that was substantially all that was said concerning District No. 1, except that I said our members in that District would probably help you in your work.

On the evening of that day the Treasurer of your organization filled my oup of happiness to overflowing by informing me that we would have to take orders from your organization. We were not then quite ready to kowtow to any one man or combination of men and will not do so during this administration.

When I left New York for Washington I left with the conviction that it was impossible under such circumstances that there should be any sound cooperation between your organization and the Order in soldiers welfare work and that it would be best for the service that each organization should go its way unhampered and that each render the best service possible. Therefore upon my return to Chicago, I did not hesitate to act promptly. Each district was informed that the Executive Committee would not co-operate with any other organization but that each District was at liberty to take such position concerning such work within its District as it might deem proper.

The day after that communication was sent out, I was very much surprised to receive your letter in which you stated that the

Harry Outler- P 3. delivery of my letter to you was delayed so that you did not receive it until the 29th of October, the very day on which the Secretary of War announced that fraternal organizations would be recognized by the War Department. In that letter you stated that you were willing to waive the conditions which were not included in our original agreement. Had you wired me that message it would have arrived in time and I am of opinion that I would not have permitted anything personal to influence my action- but your message came too late. Perhaps it was for the best. I have refrained from making the above facts public because it contains considerable personal matter and to engage in a personal controversy can do the persons engaged in it no good but is liable to cause harm to the cause for which they stand. Even the charge which some one has been kind enough to make more or less public, that I broke my word, has not tempted me to follow snother course. And now as the responsible editor for the B'nai B'rith News, I will answer Mr. Bellin's inquiry.

desire to do you justice. But I am not feeling unfriendly I simply feel hurt. If you can show where I made a misstatement concerning yourself. I will promptly correct it. If you differ with me as to any facts concerning you published in the B'nai B'rith News, you will have no trouble to convince me if you are right. If I find that you are right, I will admit it. If I find that you are wrong, I will so inform you and then you may write a more lengthy article and furnish such evidence as you may delare.

If you require more space we will have to wait for the February issue. In such case your communication must reach this office not later than January E5th as I intend to go to California the early part of February and none of the co-editors of the paper will be authorized to publish it during my absence.

My Dear Rabbi Silver:-

I acknowledge with thanks your valued favor of the 15th, and amsorry that you cannot see your way clear to cooperate with us in this campaign. I believe that the 1.0.B.B. can cooperate with the Welfare Board in this work, and as far as we of District No. 2 are concerned, we expect to do this, but we do want to expend our own funds, and know that it goes for the boys in our District.

Neither you nor I of course, have anything to do with the negotiations between the two Boards which were previously carried on and subsequently broken off, and it is not my purpose to see a soldier boy of our faith jammed in between two fighting organizations.

District No. 2 will work in each camp with the Welfare Board, and will supply such work as they have not supplied. For instance; at Camp Sherman there will be an I.O.B.B. Building outside the camp which the Welfare Board has not established. The same is true in other camps. So far the Welfare Board has not arranged for any recreational activities that we know of. For instance; I have just had Rabbi Martin Zielonka of El Paso, Tex. go down to Camp Cody for us and make a survey, and all that the Welfare Board did there, was to send Rabbi Landau there to find out the names of the Jewish Soldiers so they could send them Matzos. In my estimation, and no doubt you can insur concur with me in Martin and religion can be forwarded Outawed by simply sending matzos.

We are arranging for weekly services in Deming, N. M. and the boys will be sent delicacies, such as cigars, cigarettes, etc. You can therefore see that there is a vast deal of work to be done. and that our District in confining itself to four or five cantonments and doing the work there in splendid shape can not supplement and not conflict with the work of the Welfare Board.

I am in receipt of a letter from the (National) Jewish Board for Welfare Work in the United States Army and Navy, asking me to send out a call for the purpose of forming an Ohio State Association, in order to take charge of the Jewish welfare work that is to be conducted at Camp Sherman, Chillicothe, Ohio. Mr. Chester Teller, Executive Secretary of the National Jewish Board for Welfare Work in the U.S. Army and Navy, proposes to come to this meeting, in order to acquaint us with the duties that will devolve upon this organization. Cincinnati has been chosen as the meeting place, I presume, for the obvious reason that we have already organized locally and because ours is the largest city in the neighborhood of Chillicothe.

The absence of concerted action in the last few months has produced at times a great deal of duplication in the supplies sent to Chillicothe and in the assistance rendered. At other times, the absence of cooperation has resulted to the disadvantage of the work. The object of the State Association is to coordinate the assistance to be rendered by the various cities, and to produce a certain measure of cooperation without which our efforts are apt to be well intentioned but futile.

At this preliminary meeting, which we expect to call within a couple of weeks, we can discuss all these matters fully, and also determine in what manner to organize in each city so as to produce the best results. We are writing to the rabbis in the State of Ohio asking each one to appoint or select two representatives for this meeting. If you can come yourself, by all means do so. If this is impossible, please see to it that the two men who will give us the most assistance in this undertaking come to the meeting in Cincinnati, If it is necessary to have these men officially appointed by your congregation, please take the matter up with the proper authorities so that this can be accomplished.

We must hear from you giving us the names of the representatives from your city and congregation within the next week, in order that

I have refrained from answering any of the printed allegations, although none of them are founded on fact, for the reason that I hesitate to expose the wounds from which our disunited people are suffering.

I am heartened, however, with the thought that men holding the sentiments that you do, and coming into the leadership of your district, as you are, will do all in your power to present duplication overlapping with all the svils attending thereto, particularly in a patriotic work, where as an auxiliary to the Government, we should be as one unit.

In order that you may understand the attitude of the War Department and its injunction to our National Board, I take the liberty to enclose copies of correspondence, which is self-explanatory.

Be assured that all my efforts have been to carry out both in spirit and in letter, the instructions of the War Department, and nothing would make me happier than to see the mobilization of all the hearts and all the minds of our Jewish citizenry working harmoniously to accomplish our mission in this crises which confronts the welfare of our country, in particular, and the world in general.

Your suggestion of the 17th addressed to Mr. J. Teller was submitted and reached me in this city today. I deeply appreciate the interest which you are manifesting and am sending you herewith copies of correspondence which, if you have the time and patience to peruse, will give you a very fair conception of the situation. Of course, I have not all of the data with me, as most of it is in my office in the east.

I am submitting these instruments to you without comment except to say that the record of the conference with Doctor Fox was dictated by him after he returned to New York and is entirely his own phraseology, but follows in the main, the original articles of agreement as indicated in my telegram to Mr. Kraus of September 25th.

In this connection I desire to say that after going into the merits and necessity in this patriotic work of a complete merger, Doctor Fox volunteered this statement, which I herewith quote as nearly verbatim as I can recollect. He said, in the presence of our field secretary:— "Colonel Cutker, I can see the magnitude of this work and agree with you fully that there ought to be but one agency and clearing house and I would strongly urge the president of the Order, if I could have my way, to entirely eliminate the American Soldiers and Sailors Welfare League and put the complete machinery of the Order behind the National Welfare Board". Of course, it is needless to tell you that notwithstanding the agreement of September 13th, that not one penny was turned over by the I.O.B.B. to the National Treasurer of the J.B.W.W. although many contributions in different parts of the country were made to the I.O.B.B. when it was announced that the Order had emalgemented its work with the National body.

You will observe from my communications that I have thus far refrained from giving publicity to the real facts of this controversy and have paid no attention to the distortions of the truth or the allegations not founded on fact in the B.B. News and in private correspondence, for the reason that I hesitate to expose the wounds from which we, as a people, are suffering, especially in a crucial time such as this. Acting upon the suggestion of the national Board for Welfare Work in the U.S.Army and Navy, Mr.Julius W.Freiberg, President of the Cincinnati Federation of Jewish Organizations for Welfare Work in the U.S.Army and Navy, issued a call addressed to a number of Jewish leaders in various cities in the State of Ohio asking them to assemble in the City of Cincinnati on February 4th, at 10:00 A.M., to consider the advisability of organizing an Ohio State Branch of the J.B.W.W.

Col. Harry Cutler, President of the (national) Jewish Board for Welfare Work in the U.S. Army and Navy, was present at the meeting, also Mr. Chester W. Teller, Executive Secretary of the (national) J.B.W.W.

Mr.Julius W.Freiberg called the meeting to order and stated the purpose of the same, outlining the nature of the Federation of Jewish Societies effected in Cincinnati. He then called upon Mr. Chester W.Teller to address the meeting. Mr.Teller outlined the method of organization contemplated by the national Board, and invited an expression of opinion from those assembled with reference to the nature of the organization to be called into existence in the State of Ohio.

Mr. Freiberg then called upon Col. Harry Cutler, President of the national organization, who addressed the meeting at length outlining

the history, purposes and present plans of the J.B.W.W.

The necessity for organizing in Ohio was the theme of the general discussion that followed. This discussion crystallized in a motion to appoint a committee of ten to consider the nature of such a State organization, and to report back to the meeting at 3:00 o'clock.

The following Committee was appointed by Mr. Freiberg with Mr. Chester W. Teller, serving as Chairman: Mr. C.W. Teller, New York City; Mr. Harry Cutler, Providence, R. I.; Mr. Fred Lazarus, Jr., Columbus, O.; Rabbi David Lefkowitz, Dayton, O.; Mr. B. T. Lampert, Toledo, O.; Mr. Adolph J. Newman, Cleveland, O.; Dr. David Philipson, Cincinnati, O.; Rabbi A. H. Silver, Cleveland, O.; Mrs. Harry Sternberger, Cincinnati, O.; Rabbi George Zepin, Cincinnati, O. A racess was then declared.

When the meeting reassembled at 3:00 o'clock, the Committee on Organization reported as follows:

### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON ORGANIZATION

Your Committee begs to submit the following five resolutions for your consideration:

1- RESOLVED: That it is the sense of this meeting that we can best endorse the purposes of the J.B.W.W. and best further its aims by the creation of an Ohio Branch of the J.B.W.W.

2- RESOLVED: That the Chio Branch of the J.B.W.W. be composed of local city federations of Jewish organizations interested in army and navy welfare work.

Resolved: That the Executive Board of the Ohio Branch consist of representatives elected by the various communities, in the following ratio: Cities of 100,000 and over- 3 representatives; cities of 10,000 up to 100,000- 2 representatives; cities of less than 10,000 where there are federations of Jewish organizations for Army and Mavy Welfare Work- one representative for each city.

4- RESOLVED: That this Executive Committee appoint a committee of 5 to be known as the Committee on Camp Activities:

That the membership of this Committee be not necessarily

That this Committee represent both the National Board and the Ohio State Branch, acting in an advisory and cooperative capacity with the camp workers.

5- RESOLVED: That this body elect a temporary Chairman and temporary Secretary, who are to be instructed to correspond with the Jewish communities in Ohio, and to request them to organize locally and to elect their representatives to the Executive Board of the Ohio State Branch of the J.B.W.W.

The above resolutions were considered seriatim and adopted

as a whole.

Mr, Julius W. Freiberg was elected temporary Chairman and Rabbi George Zepin was elected temporary Secretary.

The meeting then adjourned.

A case has come to my notice, here at camp Greene that I desire to tell you about, as the party in question may appeal to you.

Mrs. Morris Weisgerg and baby of three years of age, was deserted by her husband some two months ago. She went to work and managed to eke out some kind of a living. The husband had enlisted, while drunk and signed up as a single man. He preceeded to get into trouble down here and is now in the guard house on six charges ranging from taking french leave to forgery. He wroteto his wife, asking her to come. She borrowed money to get here and arrived here Jan. 1" penniless. She has been taken care of by the Jewish community (which is small and only in moderate circumstances) and the Red Cross. They have both decided to send her back to Cleveland where she has a few friends and in a larger city she may be able to take care of herself. Her fare back will be paid and she will have a little money, but it may be a hard struggle until she gets started working again. I have taken quite an interest in this case and am going to ask you to help her with advice in case she should appeal to you.

Enclosed please find the minutes of the meeting held in Cincinnati to form an Ohio Branch of the Jewish Board for Welfare Work in the United States Army and Navy. As the Ohio Branch is to be a federation of "City Branches", it is very important to proceed immediately to call such city branches into existence.

It is our impression that the following details of organization will be acceptable to the National Jewish Board for Welfare Work.

- 1. That each city federation call itself "The (name of city) Branch" of the Jewish Board for Welfare Work.
- 2. That each City Branch consist of a federation of all Jewish organizations of the city that can immediately or remotely serve in Soldiers or Sailors Welfare Work. This would include Synagogues, Charity Organizations, Ladies' Societies & Jewish Clubs, in fact any Jewish organization with the willingness to serve or to hold itself in readiness to be called upon to serve.
- 3. That such City Branches be called into existence and elect representatives on the Executive Board of the Ohio Branch J.B.W.W. before April 1,1918 when it is proposed to call a meeting of this Executive Board.

Will you therefore get into touch with the other members from your city who attended the meeting and with all others whose aid and assistance you will require in order to carry out the above plans to the end that an organization may be effected without loss of time?

If the temporary officers can be of any assistance by their advice or presence, they will be glad to respond to any call.

### NEW BUILDINGS AUTHORIZED

The Executive Committee of the Board at its last meeting voted to refer the subject of Camp and Cantonment Buildings to the Chairman of the Finance Committee, Chairman of the Building Committee, and the Executive Director with power. In pursuance of the resolution, Mr. Israel Unterberg, Mr. Mortimer Schiff and Mr. Chester J. Teller conferred on March 12th, at which the following rection was talked. which the following action was taken:
It was reported by Mr. Unterberg that
the building at Camp Upton, Yaphank,
L. L. was completed, and that plans for
buildings at Camp Devens, Ayer, Mass.,
and Camp Meade, Admiral, Md., have
been approved. At Camp Cody, Deming,
N. M. the Board is using the military N. M., the Board is using the military building. Two types of building, one to be known as type B, and to cost \$7,500, and one to be known as type C, to cost \$5,000, have been approved as standard. Buildings of type B were authorized at Camp Sherman, Chillicothe, Ohio; Kelly Field, San Antonio, Texas, and at Camp Greene, Charlotte, N. C., and at Camp Gordon, Atlanta, Ga. Buildings of type C were authorized at Camps Hancock, Wheeler, Ga.; Dix, Wrightstown, N. J.; Funston, Fort Riley, Kans.; McClellan, Anniston, Ala.; Lewis, American Lake, Wash.; Jackson, Columbia, S. C.; Lee, Petersburg, Va., and Wadsworth, Spar-tanburg, S. C. A building of type C was approved subject to further investigation by the Executive Director at Camp Kearney, San Diego, Cal., and buildings at Camps Johnston, Jacksonville, Fla., and Sheridan, at Fort Sheridan, Ill., were made subject to further investigation. It is planned eventually to erect buildings at each of the National Guard Camps and National Army Cantonments, as the necessity arises.

### PLANS FOR PASSOVER

Soldiers of the Jewish faith, both here and abroad, will be given a 42-hour leave, beginning on the afternoon of March 27th, under an order issued by the Adjutant General, through the efforts of Congressman Isaac Siegel, in behalf of the Jewish Welfare Board. This makes it possible for the men in the camps to either go to their homes, or to attend Seders in the nearby towns, on the first two days, and Passover Service on March 28th and 29th. The Board is making efforts to obtain

invitations to the homes of Jewish families for as many men as possible who are not within short traveling distance of their own homes. Where necessary, Community Seders will be arranged for those not pro-

vided for at private homes.

Commanding Officers of the various camps have granted permission to Field Representatives of the J. W. B. whereby the use of mess halls, after the regular mess, may be used for Seder services for both evenings. In some instances halls of the K. of C. and Y. M. C. A. will be used for the Seders.

This, however, will only be necessary in a few camps, where the men are unable to get leave, through quarantine or other rea-

The soldiers attending Seders at private homes may be served with wine, but where a Community Seder is held in town the men must be served with grape juice.

### NAVY FURLOUGH

Secretary Daniels has instructed all naval commanders, in their discretion, to give forty-two hours' leave beginning with the evening of March 27 to men of Jewish faith in the navy, that they may observe the feast of the Passover.

### ARRANGEMENTS TO MEET CAMP LIBRARY NEEDS

The Jewish Welfare Board has completed plans for supplying to Jews in the Army and Navy reading matter which will meet the needs of the men and which will form a valuable addition to the library facilities already provided through the American Library Association.

The Board is actively co-operating with the American Library Association and makes an appeal to both the Jewish and non-Jewish public to contribute books in liberal quantity, both new books and those which can be spared from private libraries

and from institutions.

A special appeal is being made for copies of the Jewish Encyclopedia, Graetz's History of the Jews together with essays and addresses on Jewish subjects, particularly those dealing with religion, Bible history, economics and nationalism. Only complete individual volumes and sets in good condition can be used.

The Jewish Publication Society of America has placed sets of its publications at the disposal of the Board and similar generosity has been shown by both Jewish and

non-Jewish publishers.

The Library Committee of the Board has addressed an appeal to all the religious, educational, and communal organizations throughout the country, requesting their co-operation and asking that they, in turn, make an appeal to their members for donations of books in both Yiddish and English on Jewish subjects.

Through the local representatives in the field, the Board will seek to learn the specific needs of individual readers and lists of various books and periodicals in English and Yiddish will be submitted, from which, it is hoped, that eventually a standard Jew-

ish library will be selected.

A questionnaire, for this purpose, is being distributed among the Jewish men in the service, with the request that each soldier check any of the subjects listed on the sheet, in which he is especially interested. He is also asked to specify any particular books, papers, and magazines which he desires to read. Thus, the Board will be in a position to supply not only books which it considers appropriate, but the books which the men at the camp actually want.

A model collection of volumes is now being gotten together and is to be exhibited at the National Executive Offices of the Board, 19 West 44th Street, New York City.

### RELIGIOUS SERVICES

The Executive Committee, at its last meeting, voted in favor of Sabbath services at the Camps. Sunday services were also approved, but only when supplementary to and not in substitution for Sabbath services.

### BOARD'S NAME IS CHANGED

The Jewish Board for Welfare Work will in the future be known as the Jewish Welfare Board—U. S. Army and Navy. The change in name was decided upon because of its simplicity and brevity.

### BOARD'S OFFICIAL EMBLEM

Representatives of the Jewish Welfare Board with the Army may easily be recognized by the official insignia—the shield of David (Mogen David). This is a sixpointed triangle within a circle, the circle touching the points. The design is embroidered in pale blue and is worn on the cuff of the left sleeve of the coat.

The initials of the Board in cut metal letters, are affixed to each lapel of the coat. The official uniform is of the regulation O. D. Forest Green cloth, similar to that worn by Y. M. C. A. workers.

### CONFER ON TRAINING CAMP ACTIVITIES

The Jewish Welfare Board will be represented at the meetings of the Committee on Training Camp Activities to be held Monday, March 25. Morris Cahan will attend the conference for the Central District at Des Moines, Iowa, while Adolph Shirpser will be present at the Pacific Coast Conference to be held in San Francisco.

There also will be present at the conferences, representatives of the Y. M. C. A., Y. W. C. A., K. of C., American Library Association, Playground Recreation Association, Divisions of Athletics, Camp Music, Military Entertainment, Law Enforcement, Protective, Work for Girls and Social Hygiene Instruction.

The Central District includes the following camps, cantonments, naval and other stations: Funston, Dodge, Grant, Custer, Taylor, Sherman, Great Lakes and Selfridge Field.

Rabbi Warsaw was present at the conference of the camp representatives of the Southwestern District of the several departments on Training Camp Activities, which was held March 5 at Fort Worth, Texas. Rabbi Warsaw made an interesting report to the Board on the proceedings of the Conference.

Philip Russ, Field Representative at Camp Gordon, represented the Board at the conference of the Southern District held at Atlanta on March 1st. The Southern District includes the following camps and cantonments: Greene, Sevier, Hancock, Wheeler, Sheridan, Johnston, Wadsworth, Gordon, Jackson, McClellan and Shelby.

These men will send reports to National Headquarters on the proceedings of the several conferences. These reports will be distributed to all the representatives of the Welfare Board, so that each may have the benefit of the action of the conferences.

### CONFERENCES OF FIELD SECRE-TARIES.

The Field Secretaries, Leon W. Goldrich. Dr. L. B. Bernstein, Rabbi D. De Sola Pool and Rabbi Horace J. Wolf, held a series of conferences with the Executive Director from Sunday, February 24, to Thursday, February 28, at which were taken up the following subjects: "Theory of Branch Organization Fiscal Relationships," "Camp Work," "Reporting Technique."

The Field Secretaries also held a number of special conferences between themselves, at which various matters of interest were considered, and made a number of important recommendations, of which mention will be made in the next issue of the Sentinel.

### FREE TRIPS TO CAMP

Free transportation by motor car from New York City to Camp Upton is soon to be provided for the immediate families of the men serving under the colors at the Long Island cantonment, and whose purses cannot stand the strain of the required railroad fare.

James A. Hemstreet of the American Automobile Association has developed a plan by which free transportation to the camp will be provided on Sundays. One hundred cars will make the first trip on March 31, and it will be possible to accommodate about four hundred persons.

Members of the Association will be asked to loan their cars for this purpose whenever possible. Those who wish to make the trip will be required to write Mr. Hemstreet's office in advance, and a list will be made showing available cars.

It is hoped the idea will be followed by other communities throughout the country.

MINUTES of MEETING of representatives of various local Jewish Organizations, held at the Excelsior Club on Monday, March 18, 1918. Rabbi Wolsey in explaining the call for the meeting, stated that he, with Rabbi Silver and Mr. Benj. Lowenstein, had been called to a conference in Cincinnati some weeks ago, where the following plans of the National Board for Jewish Welfare Work among Soldiers and Sailors were outlined: 1. It was desired to organize the Jews of the country for the purposes of the work, into geographical units; each State to be represented by a State Branch or Committee composed in turn of representatives duly elected by representative local Committees. 2. These Committees both State and local, to concern themselves not alone with the task of ministering to the spiritual and physical needs of the Jewish Soldiers in the various Camps, but also with the raising of the necessary funds for such purposes; the distribution of the funds, however, to remain in the hands of the National Committee. A roll call showed the following local Organizations represented at the meeting: The Cleveland Council of Jewish Women, by Mrs Julius Fryer and Mrs J Janowitz; The Euclid Avenue Temple Sisterhood, by Mrs Sol Moses and Miss Clara Manche; The Temple Women's Association, by Miss Edna Goldsmith; The Bene Jeschurun Sisterhood, by Mrs E E Rickman and Mrs H J Goodman; The Beth Tephilo Sisterhood, by Miss Fryer; The Sisters of Zion, by Mrs A Krohn and Mrs L Wolk; The Excelsior Club, by Messrs Jac Einstein and Emile L Strauss; The Temple, by Rabbi Silver and Mr Benj Lowenstein; The Euclid Avenue Temple, by Rabbi Wolsey and Mr Ad I Newmant The Bene Jeschurun Congregation, by Rabbi Jacob Klein and Mr B Freedman; The Oheb Zedek Congregation, by Rabbi H A Liebowitz; The Temple Israel, by Rabbi Ad Steiner; The Cleveland Lodge, I.O.B.B., by Messrs M E Meisel and B B Given; The Federation of Jewish Charities, by Mr S Goldhamer.

Rabbi Wolsey, acting as temporary Chairman, asked those present to indicate their pleasure with regard to the matter submitted; from the expressions of opinion which followed, it was clearly the sense of the meeting that an organization be effected to co-operate in the national movement, and it was moved, duly seconded and carried that a permanent local Committee be formed, to be composed of the representatives present and such other representatives as might be added by the Organizations invited to participate.

It was further moved, seconded and carried that the Committee elect permanent Officers, and the names of Rabbi Wolsey for Chairman, Mr. Given for Treasurer, and Mr. Goldhamer for Secretary, being submitted without competition, these nominees were upon motion made, duly seconded and carried, declared unanimously elected. Messrs. Wolsey, Silver, and Liebovitz were likewise unanimously elected as representatives to the State branch of the Jewish Board for Welfare Work.

The question of the character and manner of appointment of an Executive Committee, elicited much discussion which was finally brought to a close with a favorable vote on the motion of Rabbi Silver, "that the Chairman be instructed to communicate with all Jewish Organizations in the City, asking each of them to appoint two representatives to serve on an Executive Committee working jointly with the permanent Committee already organized."

Was adjourned subject to further call by the Chairman.

My dear RabbiSilver:

It is estimated that there are at the present time 60,000 Jewish young men in the military service of our country. They encounter not only the risks of actual warfare, but are under a constant strain mentally and spiritually because of the sudden transition from peaceful life to that of the soldier.

The Jews of America have accepted the responsibility of helping these Jewish men in every way possible. We must meet their religious, social and personal needs. For this purpose the Jewish Welfare Board was organized, and it is now conducting welfare activities in practically every camp and cantonment in the country. In order, however, to extend our program, it is necessary that we secure the services of an additional number of idealistic and capable men who can represent the American Jewish community in this work. It is estimated that an additional 200 men will be needed for this service in the next six months. Naturally, we prefer men who are over the draft age. While men of experience in social or religious work are preferred, such experience is not absolutely necessary, as we have prepared a brief but intensive course of training for applicants in preparation for active service.

The Board is prepared to pay well for such sorvices and if you know of any men whom you consider capable of joining our organization as field representatives, will you be kind enough to ask them to fill out the enclosed application blanks, and forward them to this office with as little delay as possible.

Our greatest need at the present time is for capable workers, and we appeal to you to use every effort to secure for us at least one first class man in your community.

My dear Colonel Cutler,

Before I left, you requested me to study conditions in France with reference to our Welfare Work. I had ample opportunity to do so, inasmuch as I was privileged to travel through the larger part of France and to visit the entire American front.

Of course, you know as well as I do, that we have done absolutely no work there as yet. You have no doubt heard by this time from your Commission members, whom I was privileged to neet more than once in Parks:

There is a crying need in France for Rathie and for Welfare Workers. Hen in all parts of France are asking very insistently for the manifestation of some interest in them and in their welfare on the part of the Jews if America. I have been embarrassed more than once by questions put to me by our Jewish men, with reference to the small consern shown by American Jews in the religious wellbeing of Jewish Soldiers in France.

This spate of affairs has also been commerted upon by quite a few Christian ministars whom I met, who asked why there were no Jowish Rabbis to visit the Jowish wounded and to officiate at the burial of Jewish boys.

I do not know what to advise you in the matter, my dear Colonel Cutler. There is only one thing

that we can do, and that is to exert every possible means to get men, especially ministers, and to send them ever immediately to France. It is needless to say, that great care and judgment should be used in the selection of these men. It is not desirable, to my mind, that very young men be sent. The Boys seem to prefer men of middle age, who can bring to them fatherly counsel and advice.

Your Commission in Paris is doing excellent although working unior great handicap.

If I can be of any service to you in the matter, I hope that you will call upon me.

To the President and Trustees of Jewish Congregations in the United States

Dear Friends and Fellow Jews:

There are now in the Army and Navy of the United States approximately 100,000 Jewish young men. A conservative estimate shows that by the summer of 1919 there will be 100,000 more. It is essential that these, our sons and brothers, shall be aided in their difficulties and watched over in this critical period of their lives by the household of Isreal, so that they may receive solace, comfort, advice, and instruction in their trials and tribula-To that end the Jewish Welfare Board was ortions. ganized.

To aid in the accomplishment of that result the Government of the United States has provided for the appointment of Jewish Chaplains' who shall attend to the religious needs of those of the Jewish faith who are fighting the battles of the Republic. Nothing can be more important than that those who are charged with the performance of this sacred duty shall be men of character, tactfulness and intelligence, men who understand the soul of the Jewish boy and who can keep alive in the hearts of our youth the divine spark of our ancient faith. Those of other creeds are looking after their own sons who are in the service. We cannot, we must not, lag behind in meeting this tremendous responsibility.

The services of Rabbis are imperatively de-With commendable devotion to the country and There are, however, family ties which impose upon them grave responsibilities. They must provide for those who depend upon them for support. Out of their salaries as Chaplains it will be necessary for them to make substantial expenditures for uniform and equipment. The difference to them and to their families between their present salaries and those fixed by the Government represents a vital need. Without it there would be hardship and suffering for their dear ones.

In this emergency we deem it our duty to the great causes which we are serving, to ask of you to add another sacrifice to whose which in common with all our fellow-citizens you have thus far been called upon to make. It is, that you not only extend to your Rabbi, should he request it, leave of absence for the duration of his service as Chaplain, but also that you pay to his family during that time the difference between the salary which you have heretofore stipulated to pay him and the amount allotted to him by the Government as a Chaplain.

We are making like requests of all Congregations similarly situated. We are encouraged in the belief that there will be a generous response by them to this appeal to their patriotism, their loyalty, and the love that they bear for their faith. This is but another way of serving the country in its hour of need, by aiding it in the maintenance of the morale of our soldiers and sailors, by making our sons worthy of America and of their forefathers, by providing them with that spiritual sustenance by which they will be enabled so to conduct themselves as to reflect honor and glory on their country and their religion, and perpetuate the virtues of their Maccabaean ancestry.

We look forward to an estimate and favorable response from you to this our earnest appeal.

NEW YORK Dear Mr. Billikopf: Replying to your letter of October 18th permit me to give you a short description of what our children have done with reference to the Fourth Liberty Loan and what they will do for the coming Drive. Realizing that there would be a Drive for the Jewish Welfare Board and for the Fourth Liberty Loan, early in July we instituted a war chest and cards as enclosed were distributed among the youngsters. During the summer, they redeemed their pledges in payments ranging from one to ten cents. At the beginning of the Fourth Liberty Loan, there was in the war chest some \$103.00 of \$168.00 pledged. When there was a possibility of the failure of the loan, the children took another fifty dollar bond even though they did not have the money to pay for it at the time. Some of the children, possessing the business instinct, so characteristic of our race, donated ties, books, games, etc., to be auctioned. These auctions gave much delight to the children and was the occasion of a great deal of innocent merriment, the articles auctioned being wrapped up, contents unknown. In this way, sufficient money was collected to pay for the last bond. War Work Drive these bonds to the amount of \$200. plus whatever other amount is left in the war chest, at the beginning of your Drive. The children fall feel that, being brought up in an institution such as ours where they have every available opportunity, they want to do their share in this work. It may be of interest to you, to know that there are over 200 of our boys and girls now in Service, quite a large number of whom are non-commissioned officers and we have a number of boys who have won their commissions. One of the boys has been returned from France leaving the battle line at Chateau Thierry. He is now an instructor at one of the camps. # A PROCLAMATION

By the President of the United States of America.

It has long been our custom to turn in the Autumn of the year in praise and thanksgiving to Almighty God for His many blessings and mercies to us as a Nation. This year we have special and moving cause to be grateful and to rejoice. AGod has in his good pleasure given us peace. It has not come as a merc cessation of arms, a relief from the strain and tragedy of war. It has come as a great triumph of Right. Complete victory has brought us, not peace alone, but the confident promise of a new day as well, in which justice shall replace force and jealous intrigue among the nations. Cur gallant armies have participated in a triumph which is not marred or strained by any purpose of selfish aggression. In a righteous cause they have won immortal glory and have nobly served their Nation in serving Mankind. God has indeed been gracious. We have cause for such rejoicing as revives and strengthens in us all the best traditions of our national history. A new day shines about us, in which our hearts take new courage and look forward with new hope to new and greater duties.

While we render thanks for these things, let us not forget to seek the Divine guidance in the performance of those duties, and Divine mercy and forgiveness for all errors of act or purpose, and pray that in all that we do we shall strengthen the ties of friendship and mutual respect upon which we must assist to build the new structure of peace and good-will among the nations.

Wherefore, I, Woodrow Wilson, President of the United States of America, do hereby designate Thursday, the twenty-eighth day of November next, as a day of thanksgiving and prayer, and invite the people throughout the land to cease upon that day from their ordinary occupations and in their several homes and places of worship to render thanks to God, the Ruler of nations.

In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the United States to be affixed.

Done in the District of Columbia this sixteenth day of November, in the year of our Lord, one thousand nine hundred and eighteen and the independence of the United States of America the one hundred and forty-third.

Thou hast borne aloft those who flew on wings of the wind and Thou hast stood beside all who have fought the fight of heroes. Thou hast been with them in danger, strengthening them and rescuing them. We thank Thee that Thou hast delivered them from death on every side, that Thou hast saved them from sickness and injury, and kept them alive at this day.

Merciful Father, Thou who art good and who doeth good, send Thy healing to those who are ill and heal their wounds. May Thy consolations soothe the soul of those weeping for their loved ones who have been smitten. Thou hast decreed that the sword shall not consume forever. May it be Thy will that Thou wilt scatter the peoples who glorify militarism. Mayest Thou hasten the day when there shall be heard tidings of peace for all mankind, peace to those that are far off and peace to those that are near.

May it be Thy will to bring back our sons speedily to their homes, crowned with the victory of honor and right. Mayest Thou cause Israel to dwell in peace and safety. Draw near the day on which the nations shall form one league through which nations shall not lift up sword against nation, neither shall they learn war any more. May that day soon dawn when love and truth shall meet together, righteousness and peace shall kiss, and there shall be the peace of righteouness and justice, security and safety, love and brotherhood, freedom and liberty for us and for all the peoples of the world, Amen.

Get his subscription for every dollar he can give - collect fifty percent of his subscription when he signs and the balance within three months thereafter. If he wants to pay all at once take it. Send all money to Brother Sol Kiser, c/o The Meyer-Kiser Bank, Indianapolis, Ind.

Tell every Jew in your section that every penny of this money goes for the Jewish Warriors in District No. 2. Tell them that we are employing men of the highest type and calibre to successfully prosecute this work.

Tell them that every boy will receive all of the attention that possibly can be given by our trained representatives. Tell them that this collosal work can only be made possible by generous giving. If you think it necessary call a Mass Meeting and have prominent local speakers urge the people to give. If you want other than

My dear Rabbi Silver:-

The package of knotted goods, sweaters and 25 pairs of socks, came this morning, followed by your letter. Will you kindly thank the donars for the sweaters and socks and assure them that they will reachour own boys who are so greatly in need of them.

In answer to your letter want to say that I often urged Mr Skirball to write to Cleveland for things that were needed, because I felt we were calling too often on smaller communities. Mr Skirball always bragged and prob-Harry L. Glucksman, Asst. Executive Direably with cause on what Cleveland would do at his request. But the fact remains that with the one exception he eveidently did not make any request. In the matter of knitted goods of which you wrote he did not care to take the responsibilites and always sent our boys to the Red Cross, for he did not care to bother with such matters himself. Some times the Red Cross answered the request of a soldier, sometimes not. Personally, I have always felt that we could with greater dignity take care of our own except under unusual circumstances. Fortinately such circumstances have never floored me and I always managed somehow to meet a situation, thru the kindness of friends over the state. I do not want you to misunderstand me in having pointed out that Cleveland has done so little and am glad of your assurance that she will come to the rescue now. If you do not mind I should prefer these matters to be arranged thru you. I do not know Rabbi Woolsey and he may have some feelings of resentment over the transfer of Mr Skirball.

My dear Rabbi Silver:-

Your telegram in regard to sweaters and socks came to hand and I wired an immediate answer in ' order that the things might be sent without delay. At present the overseas boys are returning in thousands and after passing thru the "delousing process" in the debarkation camp are usually minus underwear and socks. Why the Red Cross does not immediately take a hand at this point, I can not under-But the boys arrive, minus underwear and often without stand. Their clothing torn and looking as tho it had overcoats. gone thru a crushing mill. Of course, they expect immediate discharge but they are often here for weeks. It has been our custom to send them to the Red Cross in camp here but the headquarters is in one end of camp and the ware-house in another. It means a walk of about three miles. Only at times to find one or the other place closed. Fortunately I have been able thru good friends to keep 12 or 15 sweaters constantly on hand, so that we can always meet the situation so far as our Jewish boys are concerned.

Your telegram came last night as one of the most welcome messages we have had in many a day and coming from Cleveland seemed to be a voice from the dead. During all of these months we have had supplies sent us from almost every city in Ohio except CLEVELAND. As a matter of fact since I came to Camp Sherman last April, Cleveland with a representation of over 50% of our Jewish boys of Ohio, has done nothing for us here except to send cigarettes and cigared during the recent epidemic upon telegraphic request from Mr. Skirball at that time. I wonder if you could take this matter in hand and see if the good people in your city could manage to send us at regular intervals, cigarettes and tobacco.

We get regular supplies of cakes, candies and fruits from Cincinnati, Youngstown, Columbus and the other J.W.B. Branches of this state. After the armistice was signed people seemed to think that now that things are over there is nothing more to be done. You must surely realize that now more than ever do we need to cater to the soldier who is sent to this camp for demobilization. There is none of the former excitement and camp life, but only the daily and hourly unrest in awaiting discharge, postponed from day to day by the slow process now in force. To be able to give our boys a Jewish welcome a bit of home food or a smoke ow whatever sort he likes--- this is, I believe, part of the welfare work of the moment. To see that they are properly clothed and to help them out of their troubles, real or fancied, these things are all a part of what confronts the welfare worker at present.

You can readily see now how important it is that we should have the strongest cooperation from our branches and as I told you before, Cleveland having its 50% representation has been weefully in the rear. I can not understand the reasons for this and I hope you will not take offense in my telling you the facts as they stand.

My dear Mr. Teller:

I herewith enclose you a letter of Mr. Jordan's to Rabbi Silver under date of January 3rd. Rabbi Silver has forwarded this letter to me, together with a copy of his letter to Mr. Jordan. I wish to confirm what Rabbi Silver says in his reply that Cleveland has "never received requests from a Welfare worker that was not promptly complied with". Mr. Jordan's complaint is as unjust as it is unnecessary and ungracious.

I am wondering just how far camp workers may go in their requests for articles from communities and I am also wondering what the Rea Cross obligation is in the matter of knitted articles and just what appropriation the Jewish Welfare Board makes for requests of that sort. In addition to the very heavy subscriptions that have fallen upon the pocket-books of our people. Do the Red Cross and Jewish Welfare Board expect us also to supply the things that we presumed we were paying for when we made our subscriptions? Furthermore, I want to know whether Headquarters will confirm the position taken in the letter of Mr. Jordan or whether he was exceeding his authority. Do the camp workers have a directory of the community branches ? Mr. Jordan seems to betray a complete ignorance as to any organization obtaining in Cleveland.

Our representatives at the camps have lists of our local Branches, and we are certain that Mr. Jordan knew that there was a Branch of this Board in Gleveland. We are advising Mr. Jordan that his action in this instance has been improper and displeasing.

cooperation of your community for the denation of comfort articles and delicacies, he was not violating the policy of this Board in reference to this matter. Wearing articles, knitted goods and similar supplies, are furnished by the Red Cross and all soldiers are entitled to receive such articles from the local Branch of the Red Cross in the Camp.

It is true, as you say, that the public has contributed funds for this purpose. We feel certain that such contributions, however, did not terminate the interest of your people in the welfare of the men. Our communities throughout the country have been so eager to show their good-will and concern for the soldiers, that they have not hesitated to supplement their financial offerings with knitted goods, delicacies, reading matter, and all other supplies which would contirbute to the comfort and happiness of the men. Such gifts express the interest of the donors in a more personal and direct manner, than do the subscriptions to the big mational funds which are administered by National Bodies.

While we do not favor a practice on the part of our Field Representatives which would savor of mendicancy, we do not object to having them call the attention of our Branches from time to time, to the current needs of the men, inviting at the same time the cooperation of the Organization in meeting these needs.

My new position keeps me on the radd, but I like it for it is full of rich experiences, which I am sure will be valuable to me in the days to come. Horvitz came back from Cleveland and told me of a misunderstanding that he seemedto have had with you. I am not trying to defend him merely because he is a relative, for that does not make any difference to me, but I am sure that if you really understood the circumstances in the case you would not have judged the way you did. I hope that you will some time have the opportunity of getting together with Horvitz for I would like to see the whole matter straightened out. I really know so little about the Cleveland conditions that I cannot judge even in my own mind whether you were wight or wrong in retiring from the board. All that I can say is that I am sorry that the incident occurred.

My dear Rabbi:

This is to notify you that in accordance with the last meeting of the Cleveland branch of the Jewish Welfare Board a downtown office has been established at 416 Lennox Building with Field Representative, Jacob Wattenmaker, in charge.

It was decided that we ought to have a downtown office so as to be more accessible to soldiers and sailors who are passing thru town, or are in the employment district, or coming up from the Union Station. I trust you will make it possible at your leisure to stop in and introduce yourself to Mr. Wattenmaker and help him to get in touch with the Cleveland situation. He stands ready to serve the soldier and sailor in every possible way.

This is also to inform you that this Branch has effected a relationship with the Red Cross, Y. M. C. A., and Knights of Columbus. The workers in charge meet at lunch every Tuesday for the purpose of mapping out the work for the week and avoiding duplication.

The Welfare Board proposes to advertise the location of its office and its willingness to serve in every possible way, and place cards and advertisements at promiment public places. This is also to confirm the relationship entered into between the Jewish Welfare Board and the Independent Order of B'nai Brith whereby we are to use the latter's building at a monthly rental of \$250 for dormitory and club purposes. This lease is for six months and subject to termination at the end of that time with a thirty-day notice. I should say in this connection that the boys from the Great Lakes Naval Training Station who are Clevelanders have already formed a Great Lakes Club and they intend to use the B'nai Brith Building for the purpose of maintaining their organization as well as the spirit of the station from which they come.

I trust you will do all you can to make the work of the Branch effective. Please feel free to make any suggestions that occur to you.

My dear Rabbi Silver:

I have wanted to see you for some time with reference to the resignation which you sent me under date of February 5th, but, somehow or other, I have been so busy that it has been impossible for me to make an appointment with you.

I want to persuade you to withdraw the resignation if you will for it seems to have been sent to me under a misapprehension. It is true that you were not personally consulted with reference to the use of Jewish Welfare Board quarters at the B'nai Brith building but, of course, that criticism, if it is a criticism, might be made by every member of the Executive Board. No one whatsoever was consulted personally with reference to any action that the local Board has taken. In each and every case matters of moment were always referred to meetings of the Executive Board and no action whatsoever was taken except after a full discussion by all the members of the Board who were present at the meetings. There has been no secret attempt made by me or by anyone to take either the action to which you refer or any other action. The matter has all been done in the open and I trust you will feel that you know me well enough to understand that I could not and would not be guilty of any such action.

You know, of course, you have been notified of every meeting that has taken place but that, unfortunately, you have not been present at any one of the meetings except the one called to organize the local Branch. You have even been notified by telephone of meetings in addition to the regular letter sent to all the members of the Board but you were prevented from attending.

I trust you will understand that your counsel in all matters of the Jewish Welfare Board is wanted and we have never so interfered with the democratic character of the organization as to take any action which was not agreed upon at open meeting. As far as I am personally concerned, I have at no time been wedded to the proposition of the B'nai Brith building. fact, at the last meeting it was proposed that we do not rent the building at all but the B'nai Brith officers took the position that in as much we had gone into some negotiations with them at a previous meeting they would be seriously handicapped in their activities because they had already foregone some dates which they had presumed the Jewish Welfare Board would take over. At any rate, the lease which has been entered into is terminable in six months. It was felt that we could serve the soldiers very much more conveniently and effectively if we had a downtown office as is the case with the Knights of Columbus, the Y. M. C. A., and the Red Cross; and, it is the thought of the Executive Board that we maintain this office only so long as there is necessity for it. If there is no demand for Jewish Welfare Board service I may assure you it is the desire of our Executive Board that we disband altogether. So far the office in its one week of service has had a great many applications from soldiers and sailors for help and information. Therefore, I am hoping that you will join with us upon a purely democratic basis and come to our meetings and give us the benefit of your counsel and cooperation.

There is no disposition upon the part of any one of us to utilize the Jewish Welfare Board for any other purpose except that of

unselfish service for the soldier and sailor, and I trust that you will meet with us in that spirit. I trust that you will feel that no injustice has been intended nor any done to you. Please let me hear from you as soon as possible with the good news that you will allow me to withdraw your resignation. With very cordial greetings, I am

March 14th, 1919 Rabbi Louis Wolsey, Cleveland Jewish Welfare Board, City. My dear Rabbi Wolsey, Of course, if you believe that the interests of the Jewish Welfare Board will best be served by the withdrawal of my resignation, I shall be pleased to withdraw it. Permit me to say, however, that the resignation was not sent in under any misapprehension. The criticism which I made in my letter is perfectly valid. You say that it could be made with equal justice by all the members of the Executive Board. Perhaps: but you forget that I was Vice President of the Organization. Furthermore, if the office did not justify pergonal consultation, simple courtesy might have prompted it. You will recall how frequently we consulted when the organization of the Welfare Board was under consideration, even to the point of fixing the hours for meetings to our mutual convenience. These consultations suddenly ceased upon your election to the Presidency. Soon after the Organization was perfected, I said to you that I could not be counted I added, however, that I upon to attend meetings. should be pleased to co-operate with you and to assist you in every way possible. As far as I recall, you never solicited this co-operation and assistance.

I still feel that it was a decided oversight on your part that I was never informed,
either orally or in writing, as to the progress
of the Welfare work, especially in the last matter
of Welfare Board headquarters. It seems that
Mr. Hurovitz, Representative of the Welfare Board,
also did not find it advisable to comercin to see
me during his frequent visits to the city. It was
only after the entire matter of Welfare Board headquarters in Cleveland had been definitely settled,
that he requested an interview with me "to discuss
Welfare work", which preposterous request could
not, of course, be granted.

I cannot at all understand what you mean by requesting me to join you mean a purely democratic basis. What other basis for co-operation have I asked for?

If you and your Board still feel that only by attending meetings can I be of service to the Organization, and that only in such a manner can I ever hope to keep in touch with this work, or to be consulted about its policies, then my resignation, I am afraid, must stand. If not, I shall be pleased to retain my office and assist you as far as possible.

I have spoken frankly. I trust that you will find in my words no unfriendly note.

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

My dear Rabbi Silver:

I have been so excessively busy that I have been unable to answer your letter which deserved a reply before this. I want, however, to say to you how pleased I was to have your very frank statement of your position and that I think I understand it. You feel that a discourtesy has been shown you. I wish to assure you that none was intended and that I trust you will believe me when I say that I regret very much that you misinterpret me into an attitude which is farthest from my thoughts and intentions. further to say that your letter was interpreted in no unfriendly spirit at all. Its frankness appeals to me and I know my own will be also interpreted in the same spirit.

When I referred to the Welfare Board being organized upon a "democratic basis", I simply meant this: that all of us who are serving the sailors and soldiers under such auspices, ought to do it upon terms of complete equality and that no one of us should feel entitled to exemptions that all the rest should have a right to claim. The only way in which our organization can do work effectively is through consultation in meetings. I realize full well that you are not always able to attend meetings. I am not, either. We are both But I must ask you how is it possible to further the work except through meetings ? You must remember that you have not been able to attend a single meeting of the Welfare Board since its organization. Of course, I can understand that some ma tter of urgency and importance has prevented your coming.

That you were not informed as to the proceedings of the last meeting was hardly my fault. I begged and implored Mr. Steuer to send a copy of the minutes of that meeting to every member of the Board and he has not done so yet. course, that is an inefficiency with which we have to struggle, but it indicates to you that there is no intention of taking a snap judgment or an advantage over those who were not present at the meeting.

At a meeting of the Committee on Chaplains of the Jewish Welfare Board held in New York City on April 7th, 1921, it was decided to bring the following information to the attention of the Rabbinate of the country:

The Jewish Welfare Board is continuing as a permanent organization to minister to the religious needs of the men of Jewish faith in the U. S. Army and Navy. The Committee on Chaplains will accordingly remain a standing Committee to advise in all matters relating to the religious activities of the Board.

Responsibility for welfare work as such in the Army and Navy has passed directly to the Education and Recreation Branch and to the office of the Chief of Chaplains of the Army, and to similar branches in the Navy. The welfare organizations are no longer allowed to have their own workers within the camps.

The Board, nevertheless, has found opportunity to provide for the religious welfare of the Jewish men. At the instance of this organization, Col. John T. Axton, Chief of Chaplains of the Army has issued a letter to the chaplains in the field advising them to avail themselves of the co-operation of the Jewish Welfare Board. Chief Chaplain John B. Frazier of the Navy has issued a similar letter to Navy chaplains.

Plans are now under way to have a Jewish section included in the Army and Navy Hymnal and a Committee of Three of the Committee on Chaplains has been appointed to select the hymns.

Furloughs were secured for the Jewish men for Rosh Hashonah, Yom Kippur and Passover and arrangements were made for services on these holidays. Chanukah and Purim celebrations have been held in this country and in the outlying possessions. Satisfactory arrangements were completed for the observance of Passover for this year. Matzoth and Haggadahs were distributed to Army and Navy posts and to the ships. Seder was conducted for the men in this country, in the Philippines, Hawaiian Islands, Haiti, Panama Canal Zone and for the men in the American Forces in Germany.

Religious services are held regularly under the auspices of the Board at many camps. These services are conducted by representatives of the Board, by visiting Rabbis or by soldiers. Additional full time and part time workers are being appointed.

Rabbis who reside in communities adjacent to military or naval posts have opportunities for assistance in the conduct of these services.

It is the desire of the Jewish Welfare Board and the Committee on Chaplains to have the full co-operation of the Rabbis of the country in this direction and in other ways that will arise from time to time. With the support and co-operation of the entire Rabbinate of America, the efforts of the Board to preserve the religious life of the Jewish men in the service will be greatly advanced.

## WAR DEPARTMENT Office of the Chief of Chaplains Washington

Dear Dr. Adler:

Recent action of the War Department has opened the way for many rabbis in the United States to receive commissions as chaplains in the Officers' Reserve Corps of the United States Army.

The Army of the United States consists of the Regular Army, the National Guard, while in the service of the United States, and the Organized Reserves including the Officers' Reserve Corps. The purpose of the Officers' Reserve Corps is to provide a reserve of officers in all branches and departments of the military service who will be available and trained for their respective duties and so organized that in the event of a national emergency there may be a complete and immediate mobilization.

The requirements for appointments as chaplains are simple. The general conditions are, citizenship in the United States or the Philippine Islands, applicant to be between twenty one and sixty years of age, and duly accredited by and of good standing in some recognized religious denomination or organization, with two years of practical experience in ministerial work. Those without prior military service must undergo an examination which embraces a general knowledge of the principles of education, economics, sociology, and the writing of a brief thesis dealing with some phase of psychology relating to the work of the ministry.

chaplains of the Officers' Reserve Corps shall be appointed and commissioned by the President of the United States. Each appointment shall be for a period of five years, but a commission in force at the outbreak of war, or made in time of war, shall continue in force until six months after its termination; but any Reserve

Chaplain may be discharged at any time in the discretion of the President, if he makes application therefor. The authorized grades in which appointments may be made in the Chaplains' Section of the Officers' Reserve Corps are, first lieutenant to lieutenant colonel, and promotions to the next higher grades, within the limits or rank stated, will be considered, in time of peace, upon application through military channels, after a commission has been held for at least one year in the lower grade.

So far as is practicable, chaplains will be assigned to units of the Reserve Corps in the locality of their places of residence. It is important to note also, that a chaplain in the Reserve Corps may hold a commission in the National Guard without vacating his Reserve Corps commission. The President, to the extent provided by the law, may from time to time, order Reserve Officers to active duty and for any period, but, except in time of National emergency expressly declared by Congress, no Reserve Chaplain shall be employed on active duty for more than fifteen days in any calendar year without his consent.

A chaplain, as is the case with all officers in the Reserve Corps, shall not be entitled to pay and allowances except when on active duty, but when on such active duty status he shall receive the same pay and allowances as an officer of the Regular Army of the same grade and length of service, and will also receive mileage from his home to his first station and from his last station to his home; but shall not be entitled to retirement or retired pay.

The prescribed duties of chaplains are closely analogous to those performed by rabbis in civil communities, modified only by the peculiar conditions attaching to military life, and especially the necessity that each chaplain shall, so far as practicable, serve the moral and religious needs of the entire command to which he is assigned, either through his own personal services or through the co-operative effort of others.

There are vacancies at this time for chaplains in the Officers' Reserve Corps in many sections of the United States, and rabbis who may be interested should apply to the Adjutant General of the Army or to the Chief of Chaplains for blank forms of application and such further information as they may desire.

### TO THE RABBINATE:

I beg to call your attention to the enclosed copy of a letter from Colonel John T. Axton, Chief of Chaplains, U.S. Army. You will note that under the new regulations of the War Department, members of the Rabbinate who did not serve as Chaplains during the emergency period, are also eligible for commissions as Chaplains in the Officers Reserve Corps. This suggests a method by which you can lend your aid to the development of religious activities among the Jewish men in the Army.

At the request of the Chief of Chaplains, the Jewish Welfare Beard, through its Committee on Religious Activities, which, is composed of representatives of all national rabbinic and synagogue organizations, will review applications made by members of the Rabbinate for admission to the Reserve, the endorsement by the Board of each application being required by the War Department.

If you can see your way clear to give the necessary time to this service, would you kindly apply to the Adjutant General of the Army or to the office of the Chief of Chaplains for blank forms of application and for such other information as you may desire? The application may then be forwarded for the review of the Committee on Religious Activities, or direct to the Chief of Chaplains who will send it to this Committee.

# JEWISH WELFARE BOARD UNITED STATES ARMY AND NAVY 149 Fifth Avenue New York City

Memorandum with Regard to appointment of Chaplains in the United States Army.

In view of the recent Act of Congress providing for the appointment of additional Chaplains in the Army, one for each 1200 men, there is a strong hope on the part of the Jewish Welfare Board that an increasing number of Rabbis will be appointed Chaplains.

The Committee on Chaplains of the Jewish Welfare Board has therefore drafted the following statement indicating the requirements as set forth by the Adjutant General's Office and such as the experience of this Committee has found necessary.

Chaplains in the United States Army are appointed with the rank, pay and allowance of a first lieutenant mounted.

The pay is \$2,000. per annum, and \$150. is allowed for the maintenance of one horse.

Allowances include quarters, light and heat, and mileage when traveling under orders.

All officers must purchase their uniforms, food and horses.

When appointed, chaplains are assigned and must go wherever ordered.

Quarters are furnished at military posts for the use of officers and their families, but in the field there is no provision for the accommodation of their families.

Candidates for appointment as chaplains must pay their own traveling expenses to and from the place of examination.

Chaplains must be duly accredited by some religious denomination or organization as may be prescribed by the Secretary of War.

The age of chaplains which was formerly between 21 and 41 is now between 21 and 45. It ought to be said, however, with regard to the minimum age that the following recommendation of General Pershing should be kept in mind, that the Chaplains "selected should be of the highest character, with reputations well established as sensible, practical, active ministers or workers" which would indicate that men of some experience in the ministry are preferred. General Pershing further suggested that the men "should be in vigorous health, as their services will be needed under most trying circumstances."

The Candidate for a Chaplaincy is obliged to furnish proof that he is a regularly ordained minister of some religious denomination, in good standing at the time of his appointment, together with a recommendation for such appointment from some authorized ecclesiastical body,

which is in the case of Rabbis the Committee on Chaplains of the Jewish Welfare Board.

The New regulations referred to in the Bill just passed have not yet been issued. It is assumed, however, that they do not differ greatly from those entitled "Special Regulations No. 3" issued in 1917. From these regulations it appears that in addition to the physical examination there is prescribed an examination into the extent of school, academic or collegiate, and theological education; pastoral work as Clergyman, experience in teaching, writing and spelling, elementary arithmetic including addition, subtraction, multiplication, and fractions, with general statement of the candidate as to what knowledge he may possess, if any, of other mathematics, English grammar and composition, geography particularly in reference to the United States, history, particularly of the United States and outlines of general history.

All but the physical examination is waived in the case of persons who are graduates of recognized Colleges or Universities. In practice, the Committee on Chaplains of the Jewish Welfare Board has recommended men who are graduates of a recognized Rabbinical College as well as of a secular College so that the examination required is merely a physical one.

The Committee point out to Rabbis who intend to be candidates that they would be expected to show a broad sympathy for all aspects of Jewish belief and practice and a proper regard for the susceptibilities of every element of Jewish men in the army and navy and that this ought to be extended also to men of non-Jewish faith when such men would require the services of a Chaplain and one of their own faith was not available.

Men who fulfill the above requirements and who are willing to accept Chaplaincies in the National Army are requested to fill in the accompanying blank and return it to the Committee on Chaplains, Jewish Welfare Board, 149 Fifth Avenue, New York City.

### Program of Committee on Drafted Men.

It is suggested that this Committee organize a band of volunteer workers in such a way that contact will be established with all local Draft Boards, with a view of ascertaining the names of all Jewish drafted men (in the second and succeeding drafts.) It will be found that arrangements can readily be made for scanning the lists of new conscripts and for transcribing from such lists the names of all men who are likely to be Jewish, judging from their names and the neighborhoods in which they live. It is suggested that when such lists are completed, arrangements be made for a meeting or meetings of drafted men to be held some time before mobilization. Such meetings should be addressed by Jewish leaders, and should be in the nature of a community send off to its sons and brothers.

### The following program is suggested:

- a. Introductory address and greeting.
- b. Information as to the aims and purposes of the J.W.B. the National Organization and its branches, or list of representatives at encampments (such lists will be furnished by the Home Office). etc. etc.
- c. Fatrictic address on the causes of the war; the aims and ideals of America; high privileges of those
- d. Address on military matters, etc., preparing the men for their transition from civil to military life.
- e. Short talk on the importance of registration of all American soldiers of Jewish blood, with distribution
- f. Gifts of Bibles and Prayer Books, and mementos from the Community.
- g. Rabbinical Benediction.
