Minutes of a Meeting of the Budget  
Committee of the Jewish Welfare  
Federation held at the Federation  
Office, Monday, July 30th, 1934.

1. The following were present: Mr S P Halle, Chairman and Messrs Jos M Berne, Maurice Bernon, Lester I Miller, Ezra Z Shapiro, Sidney N Weitz and Jacob Wolpaw.

2. The Chairman stated that a Meeting of the Officers of the Welfare Fund had been held on July 23rd and the probable necessity of re-allocating the moneys to be disbursed from the Welfare Fund on the basis of a present estimate of realization was discussed. The results of the 1934 Appeal to date, showed 3,079 pledges for a total of \$81,417; and while the canvass for increased subscriptions was not entirely completed and it was intended to continue the effort to rebuild the resources of the Fund throughout the present year, there was little indication that more than \$85,000 could be raised.

The analysis attached hereto showed that the Mail Solicitation which extended from March 1st to the middle of May had brought in 765 pledges for \$37,724 representing a net loss of \$3,678; the Campaign to enlarge the Membership, which extended from May 15th to the end of June, resulted in 2104 additional subscriptions for a total net of \$35,726; and the present re-solicitation of cards for increases and new pledges which began about July 1st, has brought in 210 additional new pledges, totalling \$7,967, with the increases secured.

On the total pledged to date, there has been collected, \$42,936; of this, \$7,172 was expended to date for Campaign and Collection expense; \$9,500 has been paid to the Bureau of Jewish Education; \$1,635.16 was paid to cover the cost of Passover supplies for indigent clients of the County Relief Administration; and \$1,000 was advanced to the League for Human Rights Against Naziism. The foregoing distributions were all made in accordance with tentative appropriations already passed upon. The cash balance as of July 23rd was \$23,629; and there was also cash in hand on account of previous years' collections amounting to \$1,618.

3. The Budget Committee was then asked to consider a re-alignment of the appropriations to National Agencies as well as to Local Agencies and Foreign Causes, and the following revisions were considered and approved for recommendation to the Board:

4. It was moved, seconded and carried that the Board be asked to approve an expenditure of \$1,000 out of the appropriation to the United Jewish Appeal for the transportation of German Jewish Children from abroad.

5. The Committee also voted to recommend to the Board that \$1,600 be transmitted to the United Jewish Appeal out of the delinquent Welfare Fund collections of previous years, since this money properly belonged to the Joint Distribution Committee and the Jewish Agency for Palestine.

6. No further business coming before the Meeting it was adjourned.

1. There were present: Judge Maurice Bernon, who acted as Chairman on account of the illness and absence of Mr Louis S Bing Jr.; Mesdames Rose Levin and Norman Wollinsky, and Messrs Harry Affelder, Joseph M Berne, E L Geismer, S P Halle, George Mayer, Lester I Miller, Sidney Moss, Ezra Z Shapiro, Sol Reinthal, William C Treuhart, Sidney N Weitz and Jacob Wolpaw.

2. The Minutes of the Meeting of the Budget Committee which just preceded that of the Board, were then submitted and the recommendations contained therein were duly approved.

3. The Secretary reported that because of the delay in distributing funds to the National Agencies occasioned by the protracted Campaign of this year, some of the Agencies had manifested impatience and had either projected appeals locally or had asked permission to do so.

The Hebrew University several months ago directed letters to former contributors asking for renewals of their individual subscriptions, but later apologized for their so doing when their violation of the principle of their affiliation with the Fund was brought to their attention; The National Home for Jewish Children at Denver had recently through its local Ladies' Auxiliary started a canvass for the sale of tickets to a benefit dance in the community; and here likewise, the Officers of the Institution acknowledged their error when the matter was brought to their attention. The Jewish Consumptives and Ex-Patients Relief Association of Los Angeles sent a Representative to Cleveland recently to ascertain if permission would be given that Agency to conduct a Special Appeal during the High-Holy Days. In a Conference with the Director of the Federation in which, he was advised that the affiliation of the Sanitarium with the Jewish Welfare Fund precluded the possibility of any such Appeal.

4. Because of the fact that the Cleveland Community's response to the Welfare Fund has been the source of considerable concern among the local leaders, the Secretary submitted recent statements and information which had come to hand from other cities indicating the existence of like problems elsewhere. In a letter to the President of the St Louis Federation, the Secretary of that Organization, Mr Bernard Greensfelder, pointed to the general decline in Jewish giving and growing lack of interest in communal affairs generally in St Louis during the past few years. Mr Greensfelder sent a copy of this letter to the Cleveland Federation for comment and suggestion.

In a letter which had evidently been sent broadcast throughout the Country by Mr Ira Yonkers, Chairman of the United Jewish Appeal of New York, under date of July 24th Mr Yonkers pointed to the serious effects of a multiplicity of Appeals for various Palestinian Causes which were carried on coincidentally with the United Jewish Appeal in New York, and which served to confuse the givers and to affect unfavorably their responses to the Central Appeal. Mr Yonkers was asking the Communities

elsewhere to cite any similar experiences to be used as a basis for consideration and action by the Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds when they meet in January.

The Detroit Appeal which brought in \$140,000 recently on a goal of \$175,000, was not, as had been represented heretofore, an Appeal for German Jewish Relief mainly. A Campaign booklet which has just been received from Detroit showed that 45% of the amount to be raised in the Campaign was intended for both the United Jewish Appeal and all other non-local Agencies, and 47% was being raised for local Jewish Institutions, some of them already partially supported by the Community Fund.

5. There was some discussion regarding the further outlook for the Fund for this year and attention was called to the plans for publishing again an annual booklet of givers. It was felt that the general distribution of such books would not only stimulate the giving of those who were disinclined to support communal activities, but that it would also help to bring up the level of giving of many who would otherwise attempt to meet their obligations by niggardly contributions. It was the feeling of some of the Members that a substantial increase in Membership could yet be developed by intensive solicitation.

6. The Secretary stated that the National Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds were preparing current up-to-date information on National and International Agencies, such as are being included in Welfare Funds here and elsewhere; and that this information would be boiled down into brief form for the Members of the Federation and the Auxiliary Boards.

7. No further business coming before the Meeting it was adjourned.

Dear Rabbi Silver;

The Budget Committee and the Board of Trustees of the Federation have found it necessary, because of the failure of the Welfare Fund Campaign to achieve its goal, to revise the allotments to the Beneficiary Agencies of the Fund. The Minutes of the Meetings wherein this action was taken several days ago are attached hereto and I sincerely hope that the Members of the Auxiliary Board and others who have been assisting us will take the opportunity to acquaint themselves with the present status of the Fund.

Publication of the book will be undertaken as soon as our Members have concluded their work of re-soliciting the cards which are now in their hands and I am hopeful that those who have not yet finished this work will do so at as early a time as possible.

Meetings of the Auxiliary Board will be resumed as soon as the vacation period is over, and well attended meetings can be assured.

1. There were present: Mesdames Jac L Einstein, Siegmund Herzog, Rose Levin and Norman Wollinsky and Messrs Maurice Bernon, B R Brickner, George Furth, Eugene L Geismer, Isador Grossman, Marc J Grossman, S P Halle, Sidney Moss, Max Myers, Abraham Nowak, Sol Reinthal, Sidney N Weitz and Jacob Wolpaw.

Judge Maurice Bernon acted as Chairman in the absence of President Bing who has been ill.

2. In a letter to the Board under date of October 6th, Mr Bing requested because of his ill health, that the Board extend him a temporary leave of absence from his duties and responsibilities as President. It was the sense of the Board Members however that, with other Officers available to assist in carrying on the Federation's business, there would be no occasion to take the action requested by Mr Bing and that the Secretary be instructed to assure him of this on behalf of the Board and to express for the Board their earnest wishes for his speedy recovery.

3. The reading of the Minutes of the Board and Budget Committee Meetings of August 23rd were dispensed with, mimeographed copies of the Minutes having already been mailed to the Members of the Board.

In the absence of Mr Affelder, Chairman of the Placement Committee the Secretary reported that the Case Working Services were now in operation in both Child Caring Institutions, Miss Moskowitz having begun her work at the Orthodox Jewish Orphan Home on September 22nd. The Placement Committee had not yet held any Meetings in order that the new Program might have an opportunity to get into operation properly.

4. The Chairman again called to the attention of the Members, the East-Central States Mobilization Conference at Columbus this week end. It was felt that the Program offered opportunity for an unusually interesting discussion by lay leadership of the present day trend in Jewish Life.



In connection with the preparation of the Program, Mr E M Baker was Chairman of the Regional Program Committee, and the work was carried on mainly out of the Cleveland Federation office during the past four weeks, entailing also a three day stay of the Secretary at the New York Headquarters of the National Council. The expense incurred for correspondence, amiling and the trip to New York would amount in total to about \$75 exclusive of the office's services. It was moved, seconded and carried that the amount be collected from the National Council; with the understanding however, that if funds were not so available fully, any balance would be made up out of the Jewish Welfare Fund.

5. Mr S P Halle, Chairman of the Budget Committee submitted a brief resume of the Community Fund's plans for the 1935 Goal and Campaign. The total requested by both Federations & for other purposes was \$4,022,000. There had been subscribed for 1934, \$2,950,000. It was the judgment of the Campaign Committee and the Council that an increase to \$3,500,000 represented as much as could be hoped for and the proportionate tentative distribution as between the two Federations was therefore reduced, the Jewish Welfare Federation being allotted \$343,000 against its request for \$386,000. These figures do not include an estimate of between \$700,000 and \$800,000 to be received from the County Welfare Levy. Final budgeting, Mr Halle said, would take place after the Community Fund's results were known.

The Jewish Welfare Federation has been requested to co-operate in organizing and supporting the work of a Citizens Committee which will urge upon the voters the necessity to approve the  $4\frac{1}{2}$  Mill County Welfare Levy. Mr Halle and the Executive Director represented the Jewish Federation in the Meetings.

Other innovations in the Community Fund Campaign this year included, first, the planning of a Community Chest Exposition to bring to the contributing public as effectively as possible an exhibit of the work of the Social Agencies. There was some natural objection to any suggested attempts at exploitation of the beneficiaries of the Institutions, and it was understood that the Institutions were free to use their own judgment as to the manner in which their respective services might be exhibited. Mr Bernstein was assigned by the Office of the Federation to work out with the Community Fund Committee, the cooperation of the Jewish Agencies.

Secondly, the Community Fund, for the first time this year, organized a Special Committee to canvass Corporations for pre-Campaign increases, and it was reported that the work was progressing satisfactorily. Messrs E M Baker, I F Freiburger, Nathan Loeser and S P Halle of the Federation Board had been asked to assist on this Committee.

6. No assistance had been received for the Welfare Association for Jewish Children from the Coulby Fund of the Cleveland Foundation during the past two years, and inasmuch as allotments were being made by the Trustees for the work of the Children's Bureau, it was suggested that an application be directed again asking that consideration be given to the needs of the Jewish Agencies in the appropriations for 1935. There was also some possibility that an allotment might again be made by the County Child Welfare Board for Child Placoment Agencies out of the proceeds of the Welfare Levy.

7. The Federation received a letter under date of October 9th from the Liquidator of the Union Trust Company asking about the financial condition of the Orthodox Jewish Orphans Home because of its failure to maintain its interest payments on Mortgages amounting to about \$25,000. The Liquidator was advised of the critical situation of the Home due to a 50 percent reduction in its Community Fund Allotment.

8. Copies of a mimeographed financial statement of the various Funds of the Federation for eight months ending August 31st were handed to the Members present; special attention was directed by the Secretary to the substantial amounts received from Public sources for both 1933 deficits and 1934 needs. The statement also contained a record of Jewish Welfare Fund subscriptions as of present date showing a total of 3115 pledges amounting to \$83,893.



9. In connection with the Jewish Welfare Fund, the Chairman advised the Board that there had been considerable correspondence with the Denver Children's Home regarding its several solicitations locally despite its affiliation with the Fund. As a result of an Appeal which was apparently sent out in the local Community quite generally before the recent Holidays, the Institution's attention was again directed to the fact that it was violating the principle of its affiliation; and the Officers of the Home were also requested to provide the Federation with a full list of all contributions received in response to this Appeal locally with the understanding that the Welfare Fund expected to reimburse its Members for amounts which they may have contributed.

The reply from the President of the Children's Home expressed great regret over the inadvertent violations and promised that these would not occur again; also a request that no money be returned to those who contributed since "the entire amount did not exceed \$150, and no one had been brow-beaten into giving." After a discussion of the matter it was decided that the Secretary should communicate with those contributors who were also Members of the Jewish Welfare Fund offering to return to them the amounts which they had contributed if they so desired; and such refunds would be deducted from the appropriation to the Home.

10. The Secretary submitted the Minutes of a Meeting of the Capital Account Committee of August 29th authorizing the sale or exchange of certain Securities held in the Memorial Fund and the S D Wise Fund, the latter on recommendation of Mr Wise.

11. The Board was also advised that at a Joint Conference of Educational Fund Loans held on August 29th approximately \$600 of funds available from the Educational League were recommended for loans to three of the seven students, whose applications were investigated. Neither the Federation nor the Council of Jewish Women Scholarship Funds had any money available to loan at this time. The Minutes of this Meeting are also on file.

12. The Secretary read the Minutes of the Committee Meeting on Policy and Re-Organization held on Thursday, September 20th proposing the set-up of a Plan for a Jewish Community Council largely as a discussion forum until its purposes and aims can be more clearly defined. The plan will of course be submitted to the Federation Board for approval, before being projected.

13. Mrs Herzog as Chairman of the German Jewish Children's Aid Committee reported that Mrs Oberbrunner had been authorized to go to New York to select if possible the five children who were to come to Cleveland out of a first group of 25 now en route to this Country. It was felt that inasmuch as Mrs Oberbrunner had interested certain Cleveland homes in accepting these Children, it would be advisable for her to make a selection if possible of the children that would fit best into these homes.

14. The Board was advised that expressions of regret had been sent in its behalf to both the Cuyahoga County Relief Administration and to the family of the late A V Cannon.

A letter of congratulation was also sent on behalf of the Board to Mr Marc J Grossman on his appointment to succeed Mr Cannon as Chairman.

15. Under date of September 7th Mr S D Wise instructed the Board to make the following distribution from the Wise Foundation Fund for 1935:

At Mr Wise's request also, the President appointed a Committee composed of Nathan Loeser, S F Halle, Max Myers and the Executive Director to confer with Mr Wise regarding possible revisions of the Wise Charitable Trust to more definitely clarify its intent and purposes.

16. On August 31st a group of Members of the Federation Board were invited to the home of Paul Feiss to meet Dr Ernest Kahn of Frankfort, Germany and one of the foreign delegation on Housing, who were in Cleveland advising with the local Housing Authorities. Mr Reinthal reported that Dr Kahn was able to give some interesting sidelights on the German Jewish situation particularly with reference to the friendly concern of most Germans for their Jewish friends and the deep regret which they felt over the attitude of the Hitler regime. Dr Kahn also pointed out that the Hitler Government seemed to interest itself in directing the flow of Jewish migration to Palestine by permitting those Jews who wished to go there to take with them a larger share of their property than if they migrated to other Countries. On question directed to Dr Kahn regarding the probability of the development of a Ghetto life for the Jews remaining in Germany, Dr Kahn replied that Ghetto life in Germany was already a fact, since Jews were already denied free association with non-Jews in public places and at public functions.

17. No further business coming before the Meeting it was adjourned.





Report of the Committee on Policy and Reorganization proposing the  
Establishment of a Jewish Community Council -- December 3, 1934.

The Problem

The Problem, essentially, is the lack of unity and coordination in Jewish life.

This is apparent locally, nationally, and internationally. The tragic results are being unfolded every day in Poland, Austria, and Germany.

In our own Jewish community of Cleveland, we have likewise been guilty of a lack of integration and coordination. Instead of being one community, in reality we are a number of different separate communities. Each group sees its own interests and its own problems, with little or no perspective of how these affect the total community.

At no time has there been a broad consideration of community problems by all the elements concerned, nor an adequate understanding or interpretation of the various movements and efforts within our Jewish life.

Neither has there been any organization or body qualified to speak for the entire Jewish community. This has resulted in confusion, disorganization, and has laid the way open to misrepresentation. It has also meant the lack of any central instrument equipped to control subversive acts and movements seriously affecting all Jewry.

On the other side of the picture, is the fact that there is much capable leadership in the community that has never been fully utilized. Were this given opportunity for expression and service, the entire community would benefit.

It is imperative that all Cleveland Jewry be educated to understand its problems, needs and responsibilities. The failure of the Welfare Fund is but one example of this.

The Place of the Federation

It is clear that this is a problem requiring attention and action by the entire Jewish community. The Committee recognizes from the start that while the Federation happens to be the organization to study and propose a broad united development, its task would be to enlist the participation of the whole community, as far as possible, in considering and formulating definite measures to meet these needs.



### Purposes and Functions of a Jewish Community Council

The Council would be a body of representatives of the major Jewish organizations in the city. It would include:

1. Temples and Synagogues
2. Educational and Cultural Organizations
3. Philanthropic and Benefit Societies
4. Lodges and Social Clubs
5. Local Chapters of National and International Societies

The Federation would be one of the organizations included.

The Council would be primarily a discussion forum and an educational instrument.

It would bring together for the first time all elements of the Jewish community, which today are a number of separate communities.

It would discuss matters of concern to the entire community, from the standpoint of information and analysis.

It would give expression to all points of view within a single body and before an audience representing the entire Jewish community. Never before has this been possible in Cleveland, and never was it more necessary.

The Council would in no way affect the autonomy of any existing organization.

The form and functions of the Council would evolve according to situations and needs as these develop. It is intended at the start that there be a minimum of rules and that the structure be as flexible as possible.



Minutes of a Meeting of the Budget  
Committee of the Jewish Welfare Fed-

3 - Budgeting of Federation's Constituent  
Agencies, and income of the S D  
Wise Fund for 1935.

1. The following were present: Mr S P Halle, Chairman, and Messrs Harry Affelder, Isador Grossman, Lester I Miller, Max Myers, Sol Reinthal, Ezra Z Shapiro, S D Wise and Jacob Wolpaw.

2. The Chairman stated that action was needed on a number of items of appropriation and borrowing and that for some of these, it had been necessary for the Chairman to give his approval in advance of this meeting:

- (a) It was found necessary to improve the physical conditions at the Shelter Home by installing a new furnace and making other repairs in order that the Transient and Homeless Bureau of the County Relief Administration might be persuaded to again enter into an arrangement to subsidize the care of Jewish transients in the Home. The Chairman had agreed with Mr Meyer Wolpaw, of the Hebrew Shelter Home Committee, to make a further loan of \$300 to the Institution towards this expense, and the work has already been completed. It was moved, seconded and carried that the Committee's approval be given to this action.
- (b) The Committee likewise approved an increase from \$250 to \$300 in the Jewish Federation's Share of the expense of the 4.5 Mill Levy Committee; payment of the initial \$250 had already been approved by the Board at the last meeting.
- (c) The Board had approved an appropriation of \$24,000 for the Bureau of Jewish Education for the fiscal year ending February 28th, 1935, but since only \$20,000 was available in the Jewish Welfare Fund budget itself, it was necessary for the Budget Committee to instruct the Officers in reference to the borrowing of the additional \$4,000. It was moved, seconded, and carried that the money be borrowed from the Memorial Fund as needed.
- (d) It was moved, seconded and carried also that a Loan be made from the Capital Reserve Fund to the Jewish Welfare Fund, on its 1935 Campaign account, for the cost of printing, addressing and mailing of 3800 Jewish Welfare Fund Annual Reports. It was estimated that the cost would amount to about \$750 and loan up to this amount was approved in the motion.
- (e) The original allotment out of the Jewish Welfare Fund for the League for the Defense of Human Rights against Naziism, was in the amount of \$5,000; when the Campaign failed of its Goal, this allotment was reduced to \$3,000; but with the understanding that the Director would discuss with the proper Officers of the League, the question of a minimum amount on which the League could operate until February 28th, 1935. Such figures were now in hand, and it was estimated that \$600 more would take care of the League's needs to that date. It was moved, seconded and carried that the Board borrow this additional amount from the Memorial Fund for the needs of the League.



- (f) Within the past few days, the Joint Distribution Committee of New York sent a very urgent letter over the signature of its Chairman, Rabbi Jonah Wise, calling attention to the fact that Cleveland failed to complete its 1933 allotment of \$31,850 for that Agency; \$28,908.75 have been paid to date including the two additional remittances paid out of delinquent collections during 1934. The unpaid amount, \$2,941.25, represents 65% of a total due jointly to this Committee and to the Jewish Agency for Palestine.

The Welfare Fund has on hand now \$862 of delinquent collections, and has also coming to it from the Memorial Fund the sum of \$2808.73 which was borrowed at the time of the Banking crisis to enable the Memorial Fund to redeem its \$25,000 Participation Certificate from the Guardian Bank. It was moved, seconded and carried that the amount of \$2808.73 be restored to the Welfare Fund from the Memorial Fund, and that the Officers send to the Joint Distribution Committee and the Jewish Agency for Palestine, their proper shares of the total thus made available.

- (g) The Committee was advised that owing to the unusual prolongation of the Welfare Fund Campaign this year, the Campaign and collection expense would exceed the original allotment of \$10,000. For further collection expense up to February 28th, 1935, \$1200 would be needed, and it was moved, seconded and carried that the Officers be permitted to borrow up to this amount if necessary, from the Capital Reserve Fund, to be repaid out of 1934 collections as they become available.

- (h) With reference to the receipt of the accrued dividends on the shares of the Richman Bros Co Stock bequeathed to the Federation by the late Henry Richman, it was moved, seconded and carried that the total amount of the first year's dividend, viz., \$1800, be credited to the Jewish Welfare Fund as a Gift in Memory of the Donor. Mr Richman passed away just prior to the beginning of the 1934 fiscal year and it was felt that if he had lived, he would undoubtedly have duplicated the pledges of \$2,500 made by each of his Brothers; and that it would be fitting therefore, to allocate the income for this year to the Welfare Fund, in his memory.

3. The Committee then took up for consideration the budgeting of the Federation's Constituent Agencies, out of present Community Fund resources for 1935.

The total of the budgets submitted to the Community Fund prior to the Campaign for both Federations for the National Agencies and for all other purposes, represented an aggregate of over \$4,000,000. In this request was included the budget for Jewish Welfare Federation's Agencies amounting to \$386,900, and which did not include an amount of approximately \$73,000 to be secured for Mount Sinai Hospital from the anticipated County Welfare Levy.

In adjusting its Campaign Goal to \$3,500,000, the Community Fund reduced proportionately the shares of the two Federations and the Jewish Federation's portion of the Goal, if achieved, would have been \$343,000. The Community Fund secured only \$3,026,000 of which \$30,000 represented a designated pledge by the Cleveland Foundation; deducting this latter item, the amount secured in pledges was \$2,996,000 or 85% of the Campaign Goal.

On the basis of an 85% realization, the Jewish Federation will be entitled to receive for its Agencies \$293,049, as against \$295,993 in 1934, and which at this moment represents all of the Funds which can be allocated from Community Fund sources. Furthermore, until some necessary Legislation is enacted by the State to either re-submit the Welfare Levy which failed of the necessary 65% vote, or to provide income from other Tax



sources, both the Hospitals and certain of the Child Caring Agencies including the Welfare Association for Jewish Children, will be inadequately provided for.

The Community Fund has a reserve of approximately \$197,000 out of this year's delinquent collections, improved collections in 1934 pledges, and release of impounded bank balances. The use of these funds is subject to consideration and decision by the Community Fund Council, and Representatives of the two Federations will be asked to meet with Fund Officials next week to discuss the question.

The Welfare Federation in its Meetings held during the past week adopted the following Resolutions on recommendation of its Budget Executive Committee:

- "1. That the Community Fund be asked to hold any balances it may carry over from 1934 as a reserve to meet future contingencies and,
- "2. That Allocation to the several groups be based on the original allocation included in the \$3,500,000 goal, adjusted on a percentage basis to the Fund realization; with the understanding that agency budgets approved within these adjusted group allocations be on a tentative basis, subject to review and revision if necessary at the end of February, 1935."

On Motion made, duly seconded and carried, the Budget Committee of the Federation recommends to the Federation Board that resolutions similarly phrased to meet the Jewish Federation's budgetary situation, be adopted and forwarded to the Community Fund Council.

The Committee then proceeded to consider allocations to be made to the respective Agencies as the tentative basis of their support for the first two months of 1935, and the following allotments were recommended out of present Community Fund resources:

1. The Members of the Auxiliary Board were also invited to participate in the Meeting and there were present: Judge Maurice Bernon, acting as Chairman in Mr Bing's place, Mesdames Siegmund Herzog, Rose Levin and Norman Wollinsky, and Messrs Milton Altschul, Nathan Cornsweet, Bernard B Eisenberg, Eugene Freedheim, A S Forsch, S P Halle, Nathan Loeser, George Mayer, Lester I Miller, I R Morris, Sidney Moss, Max Myers, Sol Reinthal, W J Schoenberger, Max Simon, Wm C Treuhaft, Sidney N Weitz, Jacob Wolpaw and Meyer Wolpaw.

2. The Reading of the Minutes of the Board Meeting of October 11th, was dispensed with, copies having already been mailed to the Members.

3. Mrs Herzog gave a brief report of the Proceedings of the East Central States Regional Conference, held in Columbus, Ohio as a part of the Mobilization Program of the National Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds. Mrs Herzog pointed out that whereas the interest of the Jewish lay Leadership had up to this time been concentrated on philanthropic problems as their central concern, there was evidence now that American Jewry was awakening to its responsibilities for a coordinated thinking and planning on questions of more immediate significance to present day Jewish life. A detailed report of the Conference is contained in the statement attached hereto as Exhibit "A".

In furtherance of its Program of Mobilization, the National Council was planning a 1935 General Assembly of Delegates from the various Regions for Saturday, January 12th and Sunday January 13th in Baltimore, and both the Federation and the Welfare Fund were being requested through their respective Officers to select additional representation to the Assembly.

4. Under date of October 18th a letter was directed to the Cleveland Foundation requesting aid from the Coulby or other Funds of the Foundation, for the Jewish Child Caring Agencies; under date of November 15th, Mr Carter, Director of the Foundation, advised that decision was being reserved until after the Community Fund Campaign; however, during the Campaign a substantial part of the Foundation's income for Child Care purposes was allocated to the Children's Bureau and to the Vocational Guidance Agency, leaving only a small sum for possible further allocation.

5. The Members present were provided with mimeographed copies of a ten Months financial statement of the various Funds of the Federation; in connection with this statement, the Secretary called attention to a further payment of \$1,000 into the Memorial Fund, by the Hebrew Free Loan Association, leaving an unpaid balance of \$1,500 on its Loan.

The Members were also advised with regard to the Jewish Welfare Fund, that while the October 31st statement showed only \$58,000 collected on the 1934 pledges, there was collected to date upwards of \$65,000, last quarterly installments being due December 1st.



## II

6. The Members present were given copies of the 1934 Annual Report Booklet of the Welfare Fund, which was just out of Printing. The Booklets will be subject to general Distribution by the Auxiliary Board and Welfare Fund Committee, in connection with their plans for the 1935 Welfare Fund.

7. The Minutes of the Meeting of the Budget Committee held at the Mid-Day Club on December 6th were then submitted as here attached. Motion was made, duly seconded and carried, that the actions and the recommendations of the Committee as contained therein, be approved.

8. The Members were informed that in the absence of Mr Bing, Mr Max Myers, as one of the Vice Presidents, had appointed representatives of the Jewish Federation to meet with like representatives of the Welfare Federation, the Hospital Council and other interested Bodies, in considering a proposal of the Academy of Medicine for the Study of the Dispensary Services of all Community Hospitals. Mr Myers appointed Messrs Harry Affelder, Judge Bernon, E S Halle, S P Halle, Sol Reinthal and Max Simon.

9. Under date of October 29th, the Cleveland Trust Company reported the exchange of \$5,000 p.v. Mortgage Participation Certificates in the S D Wise Trust, for Home Owners Loan Corporation 4% Bonds.

10. On suggestion of the Chairman, it was moved, seconded and carried that the Bequest of the late Henry C Richman be set up as the "Henry C Richman Fund" of the Federation and that disposition of the Stock representing the Bequest, and future direction of the Income of the Fund, be referred to the Capital Account Committee and the Budget Committee respectively, for recommendation back to the Board. The Board also voted to send to the Executors of the Richman Estate in accordance with their request, a suitable Resolution acknowledging its receipt.

11. In a letter to the Board under date of November 13th, Rabbi Brickner, as President of the Bureau of Jewish Education, asked permission for that Organization to encourage endowment gifts for its purposes in the Community. The Secretary had written for the Board to Rabbi Brickner, that no special permission of the Board, was needed.

12. A request was received from the Citizens' Welfare Sightless Committee asking the Federation's endorsement of a Congressional Act known as the Dunn Bill, which would assign to blind persons the work of attending news, cigar and Confectionery stands in all Government Buildings. The Secretary had conferred with Mrs Palmer, Director for the Association for the Blind here, and was awaiting her advice.

13. The National Conference for Palestine asked for appointment of local representation at its Assembly in Washington on January 20th. The matter was referred to the Chairman for attention.

14. The Board was informed that letters had been sent in its behalf: to the Jewish Social Service Association at New York, congratulating that Agency on the Occasion of the Celebration of its 60th Anniversary; to Mr Lester I Miller on his appointment as President of the Jewish Social Service Bureau; and to Mr Isador Grossman on the passing away of his mother.

15. The Chairman was instructed to appoint a Special Committee on Plans and Program for the next Annual Meeting; and in accordance with the Regulations to appoint a Special Committee for the selection of Candidates for Trustees at Large.



### III

16. Mr Max Simon, the Chairman of the Committee on Policy and Re-organization of the Federation, appointed December 6th, 1933, then presented a report for his Committee, setting forth the proposal for the creation of a Jewish Community Council, representative of all interests and elements in the Cleveland Jewish Community. "The purpose, as set forth more fully in the attached memoranda," Mr Simon said, "would be to create a Community Voice and Authority in matters outside the philanthropic area administered by the Federation itself, but which were of vital interest and importance not only to the local Jewish Community, but to Jewry generally. In its inception, the Council would undoubtedly represent nothing more than a Forum for general discussion of such matters bringing to the various groups an understanding of the problems and points of view of others; and out of which ultimately there might be crystalized a basis for unified thinking and action." After a general discussion of the proposal in which it was pointed out that the Federation would after its sponsorship of the Council, be represented merely as a single Community Agency; and with the understanding further that the effort for organization of the Council would have to be put forth gradually as to permit an appreciation of its purposes to permeate through the community, it was moved, seconded and carried that the Committee be authorized to pursue its activities to the point where the Community Council was brought into being.

17. No further business coming before the Meeting it was adjourned.


At this Meeting the Board approved a program looking to the creation of a Jewish Community Council in Cleveland.



Minutes of a Meeting of the  
COMMITTEE ON POLICY AND REORGANIZATION  
Sunday, January 13, 1935, 10:30 A.M.  
At Mount Sinai Hospital

1. There were present: Max Simon, Chairman; Mrs Rose Levin, Messrs E M Baker, George Mayer, Sidney N Weitz, Meyer Wolpaw, S Goldhamer, and Philip Bernstein, of the Federation.

Leon Wiesenfeld, of the Jewish Daily World;  
Meyer Weintraub, of the Jewish Daily Forward;  
Ralph Wertheimer, of the Jewish Review and Observer.

Mr Leo Weidenthal, of the Jewish Independent, was unable to attend because of illness.

2. Mr Simon reviewed the history of the Committee and explained the problem with which it has been concerned, namely the effort to achieve greater unity and coordination among the various elements that comprise Cleveland Jewry. He sketched the outline of the Community Council proposal, and asked the opinions of the Editors regarding it.

3. Mr Wiesenfeld stated that personally he was strongly in favor of the plan, that it incorporated much that had been advocated by the "Jewish World", and that he would do all he could through the medium of his newspaper and his personal contacts to bring about the creation of such a Council. It was his opinion that while a large portion of the Jewish population was not prepared to submit to the regulation of an organization resembling a Kehillah in power, there could be little objection to a Council such as was being proposed. He did not believe, however, that the Orthodox element would give the Reformed group its support.

Mr Baker explained that the first objective of the Council would be to bring together the various elements in a discussion of problems of common concern. This friendly and respectful exchange of opinion would in itself be an educational and cohesive force, and would serve a very worthy purpose. The problem of support was secondary at this time to that of mutual understanding and respect. Mr Wiesenfeld was in agreement with this.

4. The Committee was congratulated by Mr Weintraub for the effort it was making to bring greater unity into the Jewish community. While he had no authority to speak for the "Jewish Daily Forward", whose editorial policies were determined by the national board of editors, or for the Workmen's Circle, of which he is District Secretary, it was his personal opinion that both organizations would endorse the Council. He pointed out that the Workmen's Circle, which has six local branches with a total of 1200 members, felt that it had not received sufficient consideration from the entire Community in regard to the support of its Yiddish Schools, and would welcome the opportunity for a rational discussion of this problem.

Mr Weintraub cautioned the Committee to give the Community the maximum opportunity to share in working out the plan, and real responsibility in carrying it forward. People are not receptive to a program which is set up and placed in their hands without giving them a share in creating that plan, he explained, and their interest and participation would be enlisted only if they took an active part throughout.

Mr Wiesenfeld agreed that the ground would have to be carefully prepared. He called attention also to the need for real leadership, recalling that the lack of such leadership had been the reason for the disbanding of the Federation of Jewish Organizations, which had been in existence a few years ago.



5. Hearty agreement with the objectives of the Committee and Community Council was expressed by Mr Wertheimer. It was his opinion that one of the present deficiencies was the lack of support accorded the Jewish newspapers by the various organizations, and he raised the question as to whether the Council could play any part in making clear the importance of such newspapers to the Jewish Community.

Mr Simon replied, and others agreed, that the Council was intended to stimulate a greater and wider interest among the organizations in Jewish problems and activities, and a greater appreciation of the value of Jewish newspapers would naturally follow.

6. It was pointed out further that the desire for unity did not mean uniformity. Differences of opinion would still exist. The aim was to create an attitude of tolerance among Jews for the views of other Jews, to "break down the series of Ghettos which Jews have created among themselves."

The Council would thus aim to include every point of view, and representatives of every element in the community. With this basic principle in mind, details of representation would be worked out later.

7. In order to avoid possible misinterpretation, the newspapers were requested to use the Committee as the single news source regarding the Council organization progress. The Editors were invited to attend the future group meetings to be called by the Committee.

8. No further business coming before the meeting, it was adjourned.


Dear Rabbi Silver:



Thursday, January 24, 1935, 8:15 P M, at the Heights Temple

1. There were present:

2. The Chairman opened the meeting by briefly outlining the problem which the Committee had been studying, and the Community Council which it was suggesting as a possible constructive solution. Questions and frank comment were invited from those present.

Rabbi Porath strongly endorsed the proposal that a Community Council be created, stating that two years ago he had made a similar suggestion to the B'nai B'rith, with the hope that this Organization would inaugurate a movement to create a body similar to the British Board of Jewish Deputies, or the New York Court of Jewish Arbitration. While he thoroughly agreed that a Council was needed, he did not believe, however, that it would be wise to include Rabbis at the beginning. It was his opinion that their participation would be a hinderance, rather than a help, because of personal rivalry. He suggested that it be built around secular organizations among which there was no competition, and that the Temples and Synagogues be brought in gradually, inviting the Reformed, Conservative, and Orthodox groups in that order. He referred to the absence of Reformed representation at this meeting as illustrative of his view. Mr Goldman agreed that the Orthodox Rabbis should not be brought in at first, in order to avoid the many conflicts in which they are continually involved.

In reply, Mr Simon pointed out that to follow such a course would be to admit that either the Temples and Synagogues were not important, or that their cooperation could not be attained -- an admission which the Committee was unwilling to concede. On the contrary, he asked, if the Rabbis are not interested in the problem of Jewish unity and coordination, who should be? The suggestion that the Temples and Synagogues be brought in gradually classified according to differences in ritual, he also deemed unwise. Rather than accentuate differences, the Committee desired to erase them in this constructive undertaking which was the mutual concern of every Jew.

Mr Goldhamer supplemented Mr Simon's remarks by pointing out that this was a problem of the entire Community, and that the Federation merely happened to be the organization which was bringing it to the attention of Community. While this was a logical responsibility of the Federation, since it deals with the universal problem of human welfare and represents the entire Community, it had drawn its original inspiration and impetus from the Synagogue, which should remain the central and binding force in Jewish life.

It was also pointed out that the absence of Rabbi Silver and Rabbi Brickner did not mean that they lacked interest or were in disagreement with the suggestion that a Community Council be created. The project had been discussed with them individually, and both had expressed their hearty endorsement of the plan.

3. Rabbi Rosenthal thought the plan of the Committee a "splendid one", stating that the need for it had been long felt. Mr Rocker expressed full agreement, assuring the Committee there would be a unanimously favorable response from the Community. He stated further that it was "one of the



long before. Mr Wiesenfeld supported these opinions, reporting that he had printed the Committee's outline of the Council in "The Jewish Daily World" Friday, January 18, and that it had received a more enthusiastic response than anything that had been published in the past few years. There could be no doubt, he believed, but that the Community strongly desired such a Council. Several others present expressed similar opinions.

4. The question was raised as to what powers the Council would have. Mr Simon explained that the Committee had not attempted to define these, in the belief that at the beginning the Council should be as flexible as possible, having a minimum of rules and evolving gradually according to needs and concrete situations as these developed.

Rabbi Cohen, Mr Rocker, and Rabbi Rosenthal were of the opinion that the powers of the Council should be more sharply defined. Rabbi Rosenthal believed that unity as an abstract ideal would not be a sufficiently strong appeal, and that from the beginning the Council would have to be built around some concrete program. The drive against obscenity in moving pictures was cited as such a possibility. Rabbi Cohen felt that when organizations signified their affiliation with the Council, they should do it with the clear understanding that they would abide by its decisions. Mr Rocker did not think that a Council which confined itself to mere discussion of Community problems would meet the present need. What was required was a Jewish Community voice, which would clearly define the position of Cleveland Jewry in regard to concrete issues. He pointed to the local Kashruth situation as a "scandal" which sorely illustrated the need for such a voice.

The Chairman and other members of the Committee pointed out that these questions had been given thorough consideration in the sessions held prior to this one. It was their conviction that the beginning would have to be made where the Community as a whole would be willing to participate. Any threat to the autonomy of the organizations would undoubtedly keep many from entering the Council, thus defeating the purpose of making it Community-wide even before it had come into existence.

The first objective would have to be a rational discussion of mutual problems, with a representation of all points of view. This in itself would be a constructive achievement, and would have to precede further development. The Cincinnati Council was cited as an example, the organizations there not having entered until they were assured that they would not be bound by the acts of their representatives.

Rabbi Porath was in full agreement with the Committee. Controversial issues, such as the problem of Kashruth supervision, should be avoided at the beginning, he said, and the Council should content itself with discussion of matters not likely to cause serious divisions. Development would have to be gradual, and the primary aim must be to achieve mutual good will. No reason should be given any Organization to refuse participation in the Council. Once they were members, and the Council had established itself in the Community, it would be difficult for an Organization to justify its withdrawal because of disagreement with any decision of the delegates.

A lengthy discussion of this problem concerning the Council's initial powers followed. In the course of these remarks, it was made clear that while a Kehillah might represent the ultimate development of the Council, such a body could not be set up at the beginning. Even the historical Kehillah, however, had not had police power. The only compulsion such a body could exercise would be the weight of public opinion, which the Council would naturally have if it were truly representative of the Community and had established itself. Therefore, a pledge by an Organization to abide by the decision of the Council would be merely placing a needless obstacle in the path of the Council, since the pledge could not be enforced and would not be necessary.

It was finally agreed that the gradual approach outlined by the Committee would be the wisest course of action to follow. The business of the Council would naturally revolve around concrete issues of immediate concern to the entire Community, and it was expected that there would be definite expression by the Council of its position in regard to these matters.



5. There was some question as whether the series of discussions planned by the Committee prior to the organization of a Council were necessary, and whether it wouldn't be more advisable to call one large meeting, since the Community already seemed strongly in favor of the Council. Mr Wiesenfeld stated that the small meetings might distort the picture of what the Council was intended to be. Rabbi Gemuth believed that an authoritative body was urgently needed, and its formation should not be delayed until the entire Community's support had been obtained.

Mr Simon pointed out that one of the very purposes of these meetings was to bring these distortions to the surface and correct them. In a large meeting this would hardly be possible. It was also intended that there be a maximum opportunity for discussion, since it was desired that the Council be created by the Community rather than the Committee, and this too could not be achieved through a large meeting. Such a session was planned after these small meetings had been concluded.

Mr Wiesenfeld suggested that instead of building the Council on the basis of representation of the larger Organizations, the latter should be disregarded and democratic elections should be held instead. None of the others expressed agreement with this point of view.

It was also suggested that letters be sent to all the Organizations, to be read to their memberships, outlining the Committee's plan for the creation of the Council. This found general support.

6. As a result of the above discussion, Mr Rucker moved, and others seconded, that those present definitely go on record as endorsing the Committee's proposal that a Jewish Community Council be created in Cleveland. The motion was unanimously approved.

7. No further business coming before the meeting, it was adjourned.

1. There were present: Mr Louis S Bing, Jr., Chairman, Mesdames Jac L Einstein, Siegmund Herzog and Rose Levin and Messrs Judge Maurice Bernon, Nathan Cornsweet, Jerome Curtis, George Furth, Marc J Grossman, S P Halle, Sam Herwitz, Irwin Loeser, Maurice Maschke, I R Morris, Sol Reinthal, Ezra Shapiro, Max Simon, Ben Sinks, J Soglovitz, Wm C Treuhafft and Meyer Wolpaw.

2. Copies of the Minutes of the Board of December 7th having been mailed to the Members, further reading was by mutual consent, dispensed with.

- (a) The Secretary reported for Mr Harry Affelder, Chairman of the Placement Committee, that the first Meeting of the Committee for the consideration of reports on admissions, discharges and rejections of children, had been held on December 16th. It was evident from the manner in which the Program of Case-working Service is working out with the Institutions, that proper and adequate relations have been established with the other Agencies in the Community having to do with Jewish Child Care Problems, and that the Placement Committee is having no occasion therefore, to adjudicate any of the problems. It was also reported that Miss Joanne Ortelle, of the Child Welfare Department of the State Board of Charities had visited the two Child Caring Institutions recently, for the first time in 20 months; she reported to the Federation office her very favorable impression of the improvement of conditions resulting directly from the new Case-working arrangement.
- (b) Isador Grossman had been acting as Chairman of a Committee including Mrs Jac L Einstein, and Messrs George Furth, Jerome Curtis, and Monroe Loeser, to consider the possibilities of organizing a Junior Federation, or some other type of Jewish Youth Organization which would stimulate the interest of the younger groups in problems of Jewish Community life. In the absence of Mr Grossman from the Meeting Mr Jerome Curtis reported that several Meetings of the Committee had been held; that it was concluded that a Junior Auxiliary of the Federation, if patterned after similar Organizations in Brooklyn and New York City, would lack the necessary interest to sustain activity for purposes other than money raising; and that in the endeavor to bring the Youth Groups of the City together for discussion of the same problems that concerned the adult Jewry of the City, it seemed advisable to tie such Organizations in with the newly proposed Jewish Community Council. Contact was therefore being main-



tained by Mr Bernstein representing the Committee, with the Jewish Youth League now under the guidance of Mr Friedland, and it was planned that when the Jewish Community Council was organized, both the League and the Constituent Bodies comprising it would be accorded representation.

- (c) Mr Max Simon, the Chairman of the Committee which is promoting the Jewish Community Council, stated that the Committee had held a Meeting on Sunday, January 13th with representatives of the Anglo-Jewish and Yiddish Newspapers for the purpose of enlisting their interest, suggestions and support for the Program of the Council. The Committee had the assurance of the newspapers, <sup>of</sup> their wholehearted support of the project; and it was agreed that space would be devoted editorially and otherwise by the papers while Mr Simon's Committee was meeting with representative groups and elements in the City. The next Meeting, Mr Simon reported, was to be with representatives of the Synagogues and Temples.

3. Mr S P Halle, the Chairman of the Budget Committee reported on the results of a Joint Meeting of the Budget and Investment Committees, held on January 17th and which are covered in detail in the Minutes of this Meeting, copy of which is here attached.

The Board was advised that letters had been received from the Camp Wise Association, The Educational Alliance, the Jewish Social Service Bureau and the Welfare Association for Jewish Children, relative to their inability to function properly during the current year with the funds tentatively made available to them; it was decided to defer action until after the Welfare Levy had been voted upon.

The Budget Committee had received an application from the National Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds for increased Community support for the work of the Council for 1935. The major part of the budget of \$25,000 is now being provided by the New York Foundation with a Gift of \$10,000 and it was felt that the support of Federations and Welfare Funds should be increased substantially over the amount of \$6,500 which was received in 1934. Cleveland had been asked to increase its allotment from \$415 to \$750 for 1935 and the Committee recommended an appropriation of \$750 to be met largely out of the Welfare Fund; this recommendation was duly approved by the Board.

The Cuyahoga County Relief Administration has again this year contacted the Federation of Jewish Women's Organizations with request that they undertake the distribution of Passover needs for Jewish Clients. The Chairman of the Women's Group asked the Federation if it would renew its supplementary financial assistance, which last year amounted to \$1,443 out of a total of \$3,156 expended for the purpose. The Committee recommended that the Board plan to provide the necessary supplementary aid out of the 1935 Welfare Fund, and with borrowings in advance of the Campaign if necessary; the recommendation was duly approved.

4. Mr Halle reported for the Capital Account Committee also, that the Federation's Loan of \$5,000 to the Hebrew Free Loan Association had been paid in full.

The Capital Account Committee also received from Nathan Loeser and S D Wise recommendations for amendment of the Trust Agreement of the S D Wise Charitable Fund, the intent of which is to assure the receipt by the Federation annually, of all income of the Trust, in the event that those eligible by the Agreement to designate the use of the Income, should fail to do so. Copy of the proposed amendments are attached to the Minutes of the Capital Account Committee Meeting.

Mr Halle reported also that the Committee had requested the Cleveland Trust Company to submit to it as soon as possible recommendations for the reinvestment of Principal cash in the Wise and Memorial Funds.



5. The Chairman advised of the re-appointment of Messrs Max Myers and S D Wise as representatives of the Federation on the Community Fund Council for the ensuing two year period; and the re-appointment of Isador Grossman and S Goldhamer as representatives of the Federation on the General Board of the Welfare Federation.

6. The Board was also advised that in the interim of a Meeting, a letter had been sent in behalf of the Members to Judge Bernon expressing their regrets in the death of his father recently.

7. The Annual Report of the Financial Operations of the Federation for the fiscal period ending December 31st, 1934, copy of which is here attached, was reviewed briefly by the Secretary and copies provided to the Members for their reference. There was also attached a memorandum of the Formal Meetings held during the last year in which the Officers, Committee Members and Executive Director participated.

In connection with the Eisenman Award, on which no action had been taken during 1934, the Chairman asked the Members of the Board to submit to him at the earliest opportunity suggestions for consideration by the Award Committee.

8. The Chairman called attention to the fact that Members of the Executive Committee of the Ohio Regional Conference were being called upon to assist Communities in the adjacent area in the plans for the establishment of Jewish Welfare Funds; Mr Goldhamer had been asked to meetings twice within the past several weeks at Canton, Ohio, and Judge Maurice Bernon was to speak at the Annual Meeting of the Akron Federation on January 30th.

9. The Secretary submitted a communication from the Cleveland Branch of the American League Against War and Fascism, calling attention to the importance of the activities of this Organization. It was moved, seconded and carried that the letter be received and placed on file.

10. The Chairman called attention to the fact that Dr Paul Hutchinson, Chairman of the Chicago League for the Defense of Human Rights against Naziism, would be the Guest Speaker at the Friday noon Luncheon of the Local League at the Chamber of Commerce; the Members were invited to attend.

11. Mrs Herzog and Mr Goldhamer made reports on the four day Jewish Welfare Conference which was held in New York City early in January and their Summary is carried in the memoranda hereto attached.

12. Mr Ezra Shapiro reported on the Palestine Day Conference at Washington emphasizing particularly the unity which is being brought about among the various forces of American Jewry behind the Palestine Movement.

13. No further business coming before the Meeting it was adjourned.







## THE JEWISH WELFARE FUND of CLEVELAND

The establishment of the Jewish Welfare Fund in Cleveland and elsewhere followed many years of planning by organized as well as unorganized Jewish Communities throughout the Country, looking to more efficient and economical methods of raising funds for National Agencies and International Causes.

The primary purposes were (1) to relieve Communities from the annoyance and excessive cost of individual appeals; (2) to aid in an intelligent understanding of the Causes which Contributors were asked to support; and (3) to achieve ultimately a reasonable control of the budgeting of such Agencies and Causes.

But an even more important purpose, it was felt, would be accomplished when the various elements of our Jewish population came to join their interests for more effective thinking and planning on Jewish problems.

Welfare Funds in San Francisco, Detroit, Cincinnati, and Indianapolis preceded the one in Cleveland; and similar Funds are being established rapidly in other Cities.

### Plan of the Fund in Cleveland

The Cleveland Welfare Fund was created in 1931, and was sponsored and is administered under the auspices of the Jewish Welfare Federation.

It aims to serve those needs and purposes of the Jewish Community, which cannot be met from Community Fund resources.

It aims in its Budget of Appropriations, to serve the interests of all Groups and Elements of Jewry.

With reference first, to the Plan of the Fund, it has been suggested that certain questions be considered by the Trustees and Members of the Auxiliary Board:

### QUESTIONS

1. Is the Welfare Fund as conceived here in Cleveland, as inclusive as it should be? In other words are there Organizations and types of Jewish services other than those listed here, which should be included for support? What are they?

### CAMPAIGNS

The depression years do not of course afford any fair estimate of the effectiveness of Campaigns whether they be for Jewish Welfare Federations, Welfare Funds or general Community Chests. The Cleveland Community Chest is fifteen years old and up to 1931 succeeded in increasing Cleveland's contributions from about \$3,500,000 to \$5,650,000; during the past four years and despite the tremendously increasing requirements for all types of Welfare service, pledges fell to \$2,950,000 in 1934.

Nevertheless in the light of our obligation to project the Jewish Welfare Fund Appeal for 1935 it is not too soon to consider every possible suggestion and plan to increase the effectiveness and the results for the ensuing year. In doing this it will be helpful to review the experiences of the past several years since the Fund was established in 1931.

1931 - The first Campaign held in 1931 was planned on the pattern of previous Jewish Community Campaigns here and elsewhere; the soliciting Organization was developed by Business and Professional Groups. The Campaign Goal was \$250,000 and \$130,000 was subscribed by 3500 contributors.

1932 - In 1932 this plan was abandoned because of the reactions of the Chairmen of a number of Business and Professional Divisions, who expressed the feeling that their too intimate knowledge of the devastating effects of the depression within their own lines of business and industry mitigated against really successful solicitation in their own ranks.

A new Plan of Organization was tried and the Temples, the B'nai B'rith Lodges, the two Country Clubs and the larger Women's Organizations were asked to develop soliciting Divisions from among their own memberships.

For this Campaign the Goal was \$150,000 and \$58,000 was raised from 1500 subscribers.

1933 - With the serious setback experienced in 1932 the Plan of Organization by Businesses and Professions, was again tried.

The Goal was again \$150,000 and \$91,000 was secured in pledges from 3100 subscribers. The Campaign followed the Bank Closing, but produced the foregoing results undoubtedly because of the strong appeal of the German Jewish Tragedy.

1934 - After three years of operation of the Fund the Federation Board attempted a Plan of mail solicitation to test out the Community's interest in the support of the Fund. This Mail Appeal brought approximately \$38,000 from 750 contributors who had pledged about \$41,500 in 1933.

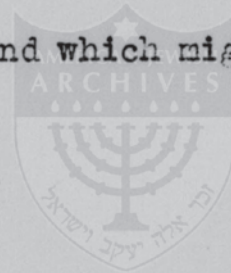
The Mail Appeal was followed by a personal solicitation to reach the mass of contributors who had failed to respond in the Mail Campaign; this brought in, in renewals and new subscriptions, 2300, for a total of \$35,000.



A third effort was then necessary to build up the quality of the pledges and a Federation Auxiliary Board was reorganized with picked representative Business and Professional men to assist the Trustees in re-soliciting the pledges already secured. This Program brought in an addition of about \$9,000 made up almost entirely of increases subscriptions.

  - (b) Soliciting Groups from Temples and other Organizations?
  - (c) The Business and Professional solicitation under Auxiliary Board leadership?
2. What other suggestions have you in mind which might make more effective any of these Plans?





### PUBLICITY

When the Welfare Fund idea was first projected in 1931, a very intensive Direct Mail and Newspaper Publicity Campaign was undertaken, particular attention being directed towards (1) selling the soundness of idea behind a unified program of solicitation and collection; and (2) the worthiness and usefulness of the Agencies comprising the Welfare Fund.

There was some criticism of this initial publicity as having been too costly and intensive, notwithstanding the fact that the total spent was less than 25% of the expense incurred for the individual campaigns of the same Agencies and Institutions.

In 1932, the general newspapers were used to a much lesser extent, and the direct mail publicity was likewise curtailed. There is some question if this limitation on publicity did not have a direct bearing on the serious failure of the 1932 Campaign.

In February, 1933, the use of the general newspapers was discontinued almost entirely, and a limited publicity by direct mail was prepared but given up entirely when the banks closed just at the time that the campaign was to be undertaken. The Campaign then did not take place until the Appeal for the relief of German Jewry was projected in June and when a considerable amount of money was expended on direct mail to bolster up the personal campaign. There was no need to utilize the general newspapers beyond the publicity which they themselves were already carrying with regard to Hitler and his Nazi activities against the Jews.

In 1934, the general newspapers were again not used; beginning in December, 1933 a series of articles were carried in the weekly Jewish papers to develop a cumulative interest in the Welfare Fund and its program. The direct mail Campaign was also not costly being limited to a series of sales letters through the period of a week preceding the final appeal for subscriptions.

Likewise no great amount of direct mail publicity was used preceding either the personal campaign for mass membership or the more intensive personal solicitation for increases, which followed.

An Annual Report booklet, containing the names of the Givers and their pledges, was published after the 1931 Campaign and then discontinued with the failure of the 1932 Drive and the general depressed conditions prevailing. The Booklet is to be published again and distributed to all contributors. It is deemed an effective instrument to build up interest and support.

### QUESTIONS

1. Is it your opinion that the Welfare Fund idea has been sufficiently sold to the Community, to make unnecessary any substantial expenditures next year for direct mail?



2. Do you on the other hand, feel that any or all of the Causes represented in the Welfare Fund are not yet sufficiently familiar to the prospective contributors and the Community, to warrant a discontinuance of this type of publicity?
3. Would brief descriptions of the Agencies and Reports of their work in the Annual Welfare Fund Booklet, serve the purpose?
4. Do you think it wise for the Jewish Community to utilize the general press in its appeal for specifically Jewish Causes?
5. Do you think that the radio would be of avail and that the Federation would be justified in having recourse to its use?
6. Do you think that the development of a Speakers' Committee of men and women closely identified with the Federation and the Welfare Fund, would constitute a helpful sales force in bringing success to the Welfare Fund Appeal?
7. Do you have in mind any other suggestions for publicity which would help assure the success of the Fund?

Minutes of a Meeting of the  
COMMITTEE ON POLICY AND REORGANIZATION  
Monday, March 4, 1935, 3:30 P.M. at the Federation

1. There were present: Max Simon, Chairman; Mesdames Siegmund Herzog and Rose Levin; Messrs E M Baker, Maurice Bernon, George Mayer, Sidney Weitz, William C Treuhart, and Rabbi A H Silver.

2. The Chairman reviewed briefly the six conferences that had been held with the representatives of the larger Jewish organizations of the city, including the Rabbis and Presidents of the Temple and Synagogue Congregations and Activity Groups, Lodges and Social Clubs, Philanthropic and Benefic Societies, local chapters of National and International Organizations, and the Editors of the Jewish Newspapers. In all, a total of 130 persons had been contacted in this way, representing 67 Organizations, or 86 if Auxiliaries and Temple Activity Groups were counted independently.

Every conference had gone on record, without a dissenting vote, in favor of the formation of a Jewish Community Council. In fact, he stated, there was prevalent an eagerness that such a body be created, to bring about joint thought and action on matters of concern to the entire Jewish Community, to develop a broad leadership, and to act as a Community Voice for Cleveland Jewry. Some skepticism had been expressed as to whether a Council could really accomplish these things, but there was a unanimity of opinion concerning the need for them. The Committee had a clear mandate from the Community to proceed with the organization of a Jewish Community Council.

3. Mr Baker asked if it were possible to determine the number of persons reached through representation in these conferences. No accurate information was available, since this could be learned only by checking the membership of these organizations, and noting the duplications which undoubtedly existed. Since the Temples and Synagogues represented a cross-section of the Community, and 19 of these Institutions in every part of the city had been represented in addition to the 48 other organizations, it was believed that the total number was perhaps about 10,000, though this was only a guess.

4. There was some discussion concerning the basis of representation in the Council. Rabbi Silver asked whether a Council based upon individual membership obtained through contributions to the Jewish Welfare Fund might not be more advisable than one consisting of delegates from the various Jewish organizations, such as the Committee had in mind. He suggested that in this way the Council might avoid the intense partisanship that the delegates from organizations would carry to the meetings, and a deliberative body chosen by the membership would be qualified to speak for the entire Jewish Community on the broad basis of Community interest, rather than in terms of the members' respective groups. This type of organization would thus parallel the Jewish Communities of Europe. Since the Committee had already proceeded on the other basis, however, he questioned whether it would be wise to change even if it should be decided that individual membership would be preferable.

In the consideration of the two alternative plans, it was stated that one of the objectives of the Council would be to broaden the interests and points of view of the various groups, and this was one of the major reasons for bringing them into the Council. It was recognized that intense group loyalties existed, and it was hoped that these could be "harnessed" and utilized in a constructive way and to the advantage of the entire Community. Once delegates were selected to the Council, they became representatives of the Community rather than their organizations, and spoke in their individual capacities, without binding their groups by their actions.



It was recognized that the two plans had the same objectives, and differed only in approach. In view of the above considerations, the prevailing circumstances in American Jewish life, and the Committee's procedure to date, it was agreed that the Council should be set up on the basis of delegates selected by organized groups.

5. Plans for the large meeting to take definite steps in creating a Council were then discussed. Mr Mayer asked if it would not be wise at this point to ask the organizations to select their delegates for this meeting, so that there might be no charge that the Federation was "hand-picking" them. While it was agreed that such a feeling should be avoided, it was felt that those who had attended the small conferences should be invited, since they already understood the purpose of the movement and had voiced their approval of it. If they were not present, the Committee would almost have to begin its interpretation again. In order to meet all the needs, the Committee therefore approved Judge Bernon's motion that an invitation be extended to all persons who had attended the preliminary conferences, those who had been invited but had not been able to be present, and organizations which might have been overlooked; also, each group should be given the privilege of selecting an additional delegate should it so desire.

At that meeting, it was agreed, there should be a review of the sentiment expressed in the conferences, and a definite vote directing that a Jewish Community Council be created. A temporary chairman would then be chosen, and an Organization Committee would be selected to draw up a Constitution, to be approved later by these delegates. Organizations would then be invited to select delegates in accordance with the provisions of the Constitution. The Organization Committee, it was believed, should be small enough to function effectively, but must be representative of all elements. It was suggested, too, that the Secretary have definite plans for its consideration.

6. As for the basis of representation, the Cincinnati Council might be used as a model, adapted to fit local needs. The number of delegates there are proportionate to the size of the dues-paying membership of the organizations, with special provision being made for those which do not have such memberships, such as philanthropic agencies supported by the Community Chest. The underlying principle of the Council is that every point of view should be represented, and groups which do not meet some of the specifications are judged accordingly.

7. The structure of the Council should be developed in accordance with expanding functions, it was agreed, so that each Committee would be created only in response to definite needs. In this way, a massive super-structure without a functional basis would be avoided. The Council would concern itself with situations which it could adequately handle, progressing to the more difficult ones as its strength and prestige increased.

8. The question was raised concerning the financial support of the Council. While it was expected that this would not be a large sum, it was recognized as being a most important item. Rabbi Silver suggested that assessments might be made on the basis of the size of the constituent organizations; for example, five or ten dollars might be paid annually for each delegate, if the number of representatives was in proportion to the total membership of each group. Should this amount prove insufficient, the balance might come from the Jewish Welfare Fund. This proposal found general agreement.

9. The Secretary was then directed to arrange the meeting to launch the organization of the Jewish Community Council. No further business coming before the meeting, it was adjourned.



As you are no doubt aware, the March appeal for the renewal of the 1935 support of the Jewish Welfare Fund in Cleveland, was deferred this year to a later date.





Minutes of a Meeting of the  
BUDGET & FINANCE COMMITTEE  
Thursday, May 23, 1935, 3:30  
p.m. at the Federation Office

1. There were present S.P. Halle, Chairman; Louis S. Bing, Jr., Lester I. Miller, Sol Reinthal, Ezra Shapiro, Sidney Weitz, S.D. Wise, and Jacob Wolpaw.

2. Summer Play School. Miss Frances Wise described the work of the Summer Play School operated by the Council of Jewish Women, and asked the Committee for a grant of \$ 700 to make possible its continued existence this year. It was pointed out that the Play School served children in the area of greatest need, at East 55th Street near Quincy and Scovill, and that many Jewish families were forced to move back into this neighborhood because they owned homes there and could not afford to live elsewhere.

The Committee voted to grant the Play School \$ 700 from the General Fund.

3. Council Educational Alliance. The request of the Council Educational Alliance for additional funds for operation was then considered. The request had been made in January for \$ 6,000, for the following purposes:

To continue activity without further curtailment.....	\$ 2,500
For 5% salary restoration.....	\$ 1,500
For additional staff to meet greater needs.....	\$ 2,000

At the last meeting of the Board of Trustees in April, the Alliance had been granted \$ 1,250. After considerable discussion, the Committee voted to grant an additional \$ 2,750, covering the first two of the above items. Of this sum, \$ 1,000 is to come from the General Fund and \$ 1,750 from the Memorial Fund. It was agreed that action on the third should be deferred until a future date.

4. Camp Anisfield. Miss Selma Strauss explained the work of Camp Anisfield, and described its financial needs. She pointed out that while the camp was self-supporting, there was needed a loan of \$ 250 for insurance, and an additional \$ 250 for repairs, replacement, and for the necessary publicity to obtain enrollment. She also asked for permission to operate the camp on a co-educational basis, but it was explained that this decision must be made by a committee of three, consisting of Mr. Eugene Wolf, Mr. Louis S. Bing, Jr., president of the Federation, and the president of the Jewish Business Girls Vacation Club.

The Committee voted to loan Camp Anisfield \$ 500 from the Capital Reserve Fund.

5. Deportation Situation. Mr. Shapiro presented the application of the Labor Zionist Council for a loan to make possible the emigration of a man who had entered the United States on a defective German passport. An arrangement had been effected with the immigration officials to permit his entry to Palestine, rather than deportation to Germany.

The Committee agreed that ordinarily this type of situation would not come within its scope, but due to the emergency nature of the case, with the man forced to leave within two days, it was voted to loan him an amount up to \$ 250, from the Memorial Fund, the note to be signed by him, Dr. I. Milcoff, chairman of the Labor Zionist Council, and another member of this group. It is to be repaid within six months.



6. Jewish Social Service Bureau. Due to a clerical error, the Jewish Social Service Bureau had been granted \$ 2,772 instead of \$ 2,872 to cover its 1934 deficit. The Committee voted to grant it an additional \$ 100 from the General Fund.

Mr. Miller stated that the Bureau had been forced to limit its service very seriously and to maintain a salary scale below comparable agencies, because of the lack of funds, and urgently required additional support. The matter was discussed at some length, and it was agreed that before any action could be taken, a detailed study would have to be made. It was decided that this should be done.

7. Camp Wise and Camp Henry Baker. It had been expected that Camp Wise and Camp Henry Baker would receive a grant of \$ 1000 from the Cleveland Foundation and the Press Fund. The recent action of the Community Fund, and a statement of the Press, appeared to make it very uncertain as to whether there would be any funds allotted to Community Fund camps by the Press, and it was agreed that the situation would require careful study.

8. Conference Expense. The Committee voted to allot \$ 175 for the expenses of Mr. Goldhamer and Mr. Bernstein in attending the National Conference of Social Work, and the National Conference of Jewish Social Service.

9. Bequest and Gift. The Committee was apprised of the bequest of \$ 100 to the Memorial Fund from the estate of the late Mrs. Rose W. Krause, and of a gift of \$ 15 from Mrs. Theresa Bing for the fostering of youth activity. The latter had been used to help develop the Young Adult Division of the Welfare Fund campaign.

10. Wise Trust. It was reported that the execution of the supplementary agreement to the S. D. and May Wise Charitable Trust had been completed.

11. Jewish Telegraphic Agency. The Committee voted to re-imburse Mr. Eugene Wolf to the extent of \$ 250, the amount loaned by him to the Jewish Telegraphic Agency against its allotment from the Jewish Welfare Fund. This sum is to be deducted from the Agency's allocation, but the Committee agreed that the Agency should be notified of its disapproval of this practice.

12. League for Human Rights against Nazi-ism. A communication was received from the League for Human Rights Against Nazi-ism, calling attention to the desperate financial condition, and appealing for aid. The committee voted to grant the League its full quarterly allotment before June 1, deducting the sum that had already advanced to it.

13. Yeshiva Adath B'nai Israel. A communication was received from the Yeshiva Adath B'nai Israel, requesting inclusion in the Jewish Welfare Fund. No action was taken, pending the receipt of service and financial data.

14. Passover Fund. A communication was received from the Federation of Jewish Women's Organizations, requesting that the full support of the Passover Fund be assumed by the Welfare Fund in 1936. Action on this was deferred to a future date.

Minutes of a Meeting of the Board  
of Trustees of the Jewish Welfare  
Federation held at the Federation  
Office, Tuesday, May 28th, 1935.

1. There were present: Mr Louis S Bing, Jr., Chairman, Mrs Myron Rice and Messrs Harry Affelder, Alexander Buchman, Isador Grossman, Richard H Kohn, Jack Lampl, Irwin Loeser, George Mayer, Lester I Miller, Sidney Moss, Abraham Nowak, Aaron Permut, Wm C Treuhart, Sidney N Weitz, S D Wise, Jacob Wolpaw and Meyer Wolpaw.

2. The Minutes of the Board Meeting of February 19th having been mimeographed and mailed to all the Members, it was moved, seconded and carried that further reading be dispensed with and the Minutes were approved as submitted to the Members.

3. Mr Sidney Weitz, a Member of the Jewish Community Council Committee, and also the sub-Committee to draft regulations for the Council, reported that this Committee had had several Meetings and was planning shortly to conclude its task and to submit the tentative draft of a Constitution for approval to the main Body of the Council.

4. Mr S D Wise reported on the action of the Budget Committee at its Meeting held on May 23rd and reviewed in brief the following items for loan and appropriation which were incorporated in Minutes, copies of which had already been sent to all Members of the Board. After a brief discussion of some of the items, it was moved, seconded and carried that they be approved. The items are as follows:

For the Council of Jewish Women, for Play School,  
an additional allotment of \$ 700

For the Council Educational Alliance's present  
activities and 5% salary restoration, an additional allotment of \$2,750

of which \$1,000 is to be taken from the General Fund Balance and \$1,750 from the Memorial Fund;

For the Jewish Girls' Vacation Club in its use and occupancy of Camp Anisfield, an additional loan of \$500 to cover the cost of insurance and needed repairs and replacements; this Loan was to be made from the Capital Reserve Fund.

For emergency expense incident to the emigration of a deportee who had entered the United States on a defective German passport, and in whom the local Labor Zionist Council was interested, a contingent Loan up to \$250 from the Memorial Fund; this loan to be secured by a Note signed by Mr Julius Hirschfield, the beneficiary, / Dr I Milcoff, Chairman of the Labor Zionist Council and another Member, and to be repaid within six months.

For The Jewish Social Service Bureau, an additional allotment of \$100 from the General Fund to correct a previous oversight in meeting the full actual deficit for 1934.

For the Conference Expenses of Messrs Goldhamer and Bernstein, \$175 to be taken from the General Fund's Balance.

Minutes of the Budget Committee Meeting having reference also to other matters requiring further attention of the Committee, are here attached.



5. With regard to the status of the Jewish Welfare Fund, the Executive Director reported that the entire indebtedness of the Fund to the Jewish Agency for Palestine and the Joint Distribution Committee on 1933 allotments totalling \$49,000, had been discharged during the past week by the payment from 1933 Collections of the balances still due, namely \$836; also that an additional amount of \$2,500 was remitted during the past week for the United Jewish Appeal on Cleveland's allotment of \$30,000 for 1934, leaving still unpaid the sum of \$4,785.

6. With reference to the 1935 Campaign, the Director reported that the final results have not yet been tabulated, but that it appeared that there would be some 6700 pledges for a total of about \$138,000, or \$8,000 over the goal which had been tentatively fixed by the Budget Committee.

In this connection the Chairman stated that he had within the past few days discussed with Mr S P Halle, Chairman of the Budget Committee the need to make provision for the continuance of Mr Bernstein's services in connection with the development of the Community Council as well as other activities within the Federation for which Mr Bernstein's services were utilized. Both Mr Bing and Mr Goldhamer spoke highly of Mr Bernstein's work.

It was planned with the approval of the Board to grant Mr Bernstein an increase in salary for the first six months of the ensuing year beginning June 1st, from \$1800 to \$2,400; and for the final six months a further increase to \$3000. This would require a total of \$2700; and \$300 additional was asked for further expense incident to the development of the Jewish Community Council.

On motion duly made, seconded and carried the Board approved the allocation of \$3,000 from the Welfare Fund for this purpose.

It was also pointed out to the Board that the Campaign Expenses would exceed the original estimate of \$8,000, by approximately \$3,000, due to the fact that the prospect list of 12,000 names was more than double the number which was handled in the Campaigns of the past several years; and also that the short ~~Campaign~~ time allotted for the Campaign made a much more intensive publicity and organization program necessary. It was also explained to the Board that the shrinkage in collections would probably be greater than was originally estimated, due to the fact that there were included in the 6700 pledges more than 2300 of \$5 and less.

On the suggestion of the Chairman, it was moved, seconded and carried that there be allocated out of the Welfare Fund an amount up to \$11,000 for the Campaign Expenses and that the Budget be adjusted to take account also of shrinkage in collections, up to \$8000.

The Board was then asked to give its final approval also to the allocations which had been tentatively set up for the Welfare Fund by the Budget Committee on April 8th and of which notice had been sent to all of the Board Members for their approval on April 12th. It was understood that further consideration would be given by the Budget Committee, to any requests for re-adjustment of these allocations, as well as to new applications for funds which were in hand, all within the limits of the Contingent Fund which had been set up in the original Budget.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the appropriations as hereto attached in the Minutes of April 8th be approved.

7. Mr Richard H Kohn, who with Messrs George Mayer and Jacob Wolpaw had been appointed by the Chairman to serve as a Special Nominating Committee to nominate Officers of the Board for 1935, submitted the following report on behalf of his Nominating Committee:

"The Committee met on Friday, May 24th, and after due consideration of the Board's requirements in the selection particularly of Vice Presidents who are to be the Chairmen and Vice Chairmen of the important Committees, decided to recommend for election for 1935, the following Officers:

Mr Sidney Weitz was requested to take the chair in submitting these Nominations and, with no other nominations offered, motion was made, duly seconded and carried that the Secretary cast the vote of the Meeting for the candidates named. The vote was cast and the nominees declared duly elected.

8. Following the election of the Officers, the Chairman announced that he would at once make his appointment of Standing Committees for 1935.

9. It was announced also that the new Budget Committee would meet shortly to consider the request of the Jewish Social Service Bureau and other Federation Agencies for their additional needs for 1935.

10. Mr S D Wise, Chairman of the Educational Fund Committee stated that a Meeting of his Committee had been held on Tuesday, May 21st; that two applications for Student Loans had been considered by the Committee; and that they desired to recommend a loan of \$450 to Mr Isador Cramer, a Senior in medicine at Western Reserve University; this loan was to apply against an indebtedness of \$750 which Mr Cramer owed the School with the understanding that payment of the amount would be acceptable to the School, enabling Mr Cramer to secure his Degree. Mr Cramer's scholastic record had been outstanding and he was highly recommended by the faculty and others who knew him. The Loan was duly approved by the Board.

11. The Board was also advised that a hurriedly called Meeting of the Capital Account & Investment Committee had been held on this day to consider the reinvestment of a substantial amount of cash which had come into the Memorial and the Wise Funds as the result of a decision of the Ohio State Supreme Court to the effect that Banks and Trust Companies could not issue Participation Certificates against Mortgages which they owned. The Cleveland Trust Company had therefore liquidated \$25,000 of such Certificates held in the Wise Fund; \$35,000 in the Memorial Fund; and \$500 in the Educational Endowment Fund.

There was other cash in the Wise Fund and the Educational Fund, and the following recommendations for investment of these moneys, were made by the Capital Account Committee, subject to approval by the Board:

Purchase for the S D Wise Fund of

\$5,000 p.v. of the National Steel Company's new issue  
of 4% Bonds, 1965 maturity; and \$30,000 p.v. of  
2 7/8's% U.S. Treasury Bonds of 1955/60 maturity;



For the Memorial Fund:

\$35,000 of p.v. of 2 7/8's U S Treasury Bonds of 1955/60  
maturity; and

For the Educational Endowment Fund:

\$ 2,500 of p.v. of the same.

12. No further business coming before the Meeting it was adjourned.







CONSTITUTION OF THE JEWISH COMMUNITY COUNCIL OF CLEVELAND

NAME:

ARTICLE I

Section 1.

The name of this Organization shall be The Jewish Community Council of Cleveland.

PURPOSE:

ARTICLE II

Section 1.

It shall be the purpose of this Organization to deal with matters of general concern to the Jewish Community of Cleveland.

DEFINITION  
OF TERMS:

ARTICLE III

Section 1.

Member shall mean an organization which has accepted and continues its membership in The Jewish Community Council.

Council means The Jewish Community Council of Cleveland, which shall consist of the representatives of members.

Representative means a person selected by a member to sit in the Council.

MEMBERSHIP AND  
REPRESENTATION:

ARTICLE IV

Section 1.

Any Jewish organization of Metropolitan Cleveland which is concerned with some aspect of Jewish communal, cultural, civic, fraternal, social, economic, or religious life, shall be eligible for membership in the Council.

Section 2.

The organizations whose names are listed in Schedule A appended hereto shall be members of the Council upon their respective acceptance of this Constitution.

Section 3.

All other organizations which desire to become members shall make application therefor on forms and in the manner to be prescribed by the Executive Committee. Such applications shall be transmitted to the Secretary of the Council and shall be submitted to the Council together with the recommendation of the Executive Committee thereon, for approval or rejection by the Council.

Section 4.

The basis for determining the number of representatives to be selected by each member shall be the dues-paying and/or voting individual membership of such member on the 1st day of May preceding the call for election of such representatives.

Section 5.

The representatives shall be apportioned among the members, subject to the provisions contained in Section 7 of this Article, as follows: each member having seventy-five to two hundred and fifty dues-paying and/or voting individual members, shall be entitled to select one representative; each member having a dues-paying and/or voting individual membership in excess of two hundred and fifty in number shall be entitled to select one representative for every two hundred fifty of such individual members or a major fraction thereof. No member, irrespective of the size of its individual membership, shall select more than four representatives.



#### Section 6.

A member which has no dues-paying and/or voting individual membership, or has fewer than seventy-five dues-paying and/or voting individual members may be permitted to select one representative with the consent of the Council and upon such plan as it may require.

#### Section 7.

Any member which has a dues-paying and/or voting individual membership of not less than seventy-five individual members, and which is a branch auxiliary or affiliate, but not an integral part, of another member which has a dues-paying and/or voting individual membership and which selects representatives to the Council, or which is an organization within a congregation, shall be entitled to select one representative.

#### Section 8.

The American Jewish Congress, The Anti-Defamation Committee and The American Jewish Committee, because of their purpose, position and activity in Jewish life, shall each be entitled, upon application to the Council, to four representatives in the Council.

### FUNCTION OF COUNCIL:

### ARTICLE V

#### Section 1.

The Council shall consist of the representatives selected by the members for terms of one year and until their respective successors are elected and qualified.

#### Section 2.

The Council shall have power to deal with all matters of general concern to the Jewish Community. It shall have power to adopt such rules and regulations for its conduct and for the carrying out of the purposes of this Constitution as shall not be inconsistent with the provisions of this Constitution. It shall elect the officers of the Council and the members of the Executive Committee for terms of one year and until their respective successors are elected and qualified.

#### Section 3.

Each representative in the Council shall have one vote. His action shall be construed as reflecting his personal opinion as a representative of the community, as well as the belief of the member which he represents, but shall not necessarily be binding upon this member.

#### Section 4.

Upon the affirmative vote of not less than one-third of the representatives present, the voting on any matter not listed in the call for the meeting, shall be postponed until the next succeeding meeting of the Council.

#### Section 5.

Meetings of the Council shall be held quarterly and the first quarterly meeting shall be in February of each year. Other meetings shall be held at the call of the President or of the Executive Committee, or upon written request signed by twenty or more representatives, stating in such request the reason therefor and the matters to be considered at such requested meeting.



Section 6.

If any representative shall die, resign, or otherwise be unable to continue in his duties his place shall be filled for the unexpired term by the member which selected him.

Section 7.

A quorum of the Council shall consist of forty representatives.

EXECUTIVE  
COMMITTEE:

ARTICLE VI

Section 1.

The Executive Committee shall consist of the officers of the Council and thirty members to be elected by the Council. The officers of the Council shall serve as the officers of the Executive Committee.

Section 2.

The Executive Committee shall prepare the agenda for each meeting of the Council and shall cause reasonable notice of such agenda to be mailed to each representative in advance of each such meeting. The Council may consider matters not on the agenda prepared by the Executive Committee, except as limited by Article V, Section 4.

Section 3.

The Executive Committee in addition to the powers and duties given it by this Constitution shall have such other powers and duties as may from time to time be delegated to it by the Council.

Section 4.

The Executive Committee shall have power to adopt such rules and regulations for the conduct of its business and for carrying out its powers and duties as shall not be inconsistent with this Constitution or with the decisions of the Council.

Section 5.

The Executive Committee shall fill any vacancies which may occur in any office, in the Executive Committee or in the Nominating Committee for the unexpired term.

Section 6.

Fifteen members of the Executive Committee shall constitute a quorum.

Section 7.

The Executive Committee shall meet at least once before each of the quarterly meetings of the Council. It shall have such other meetings as it may prescribe and it shall meet on the call of the President or at the request in writing of seven members of the Executive Committee.

Section 8.

The Executive Committee shall determine the number of representatives each member is entitled to select under the provisions of this Constitution before the time for the call provided for in Article VIII, Section 2 hereof.



OFFICERS:

ARTICLE VII

Section 1.

The officers of the Council shall be a President, a First Vice-President, a Second Vice-President and a Third Vice-President, a Secretary and a Treasurer. The officers shall have such powers and duties as generally appertain to their respective offices and such other powers and duties as may be assigned them by the Council or the Executive Committee.

ELECTIONS:

ARTICLE VIII

Section 1.

The quarterly meeting in February of each year shall be the annual meeting. At this meeting the officers of the Council and the members of the Executive Committee shall be elected.

Section 2.

Within ten days after October 1st of each year the Secretary shall issue a call to the members to select representatives to the Council. The call shall state the number of representatives the member is entitled to select as determined by the Executive Committee under the provisions of Article VI, Section 8 hereof. No person shall be selected as a representative by more than one member. The Executive Committee shall adopt rules for the certification of the selection of representatives by the members.

Section 3.

At the last quarterly meeting in every year, the Executive Committee shall submit a list of seven suggested names for a Nominating Committee. At this meeting the Council shall elect a Nominating Committee of seven representatives.

Section 4.

At least fifteen days before each annual meeting the list of nominations for officers and members of the Executive Committee made by the Nominating Committee shall be mailed to each representative. Such nominations together with any additional written nominations, signed by fifteen representatives and submitted to the chairman of the Nominating Committee or to the Secretary of the Council not later than three days before the annual meeting, shall be presented to the annual meeting. Only from the names so nominated shall be elected the officers and members of the Executive Committee.

Section 5.

The provisions of this Constitution as to time elements in the election of representatives, officers and members of the Executive Committee shall apply only so far as is reasonably convenient and possible to the first such elections to be held hereunder. The representatives, officers, and members of the Executive Committee first elected under this Constitution shall serve until the annual meeting in February of 1937 and until their respective successors are elected and qualified.

FINANCE;  
DECISIONS:

ARTICLE IX

Section 1.

The expenses of the Council shall be borne in such manner as may be determined by the Council.

Section 2.

A member may choose not to be bound by any particular decision of the Council. It shall, however, give notice of its decision not to be so bound.



AMENDMENT:

ARTICLE X

Section 1.

Amendments to this Constitution may be made by a two-thirds vote at any meeting, provided written notice of said proposed amendment is sent to the representatives at least ten days before the meeting at which it is to be acted on. Amendments may be initiated by the Executive Committee or by fifteen members of the Council who shall present the proposed amendment in writing to the Secretary for notification.

RATIFICATION:

ARTICLE XI

Section 1.

This Constitution shall become effective from the time that at least one-third of the organizations listed in Schedule A have signified in writing to the Temporary Organization Committee which has presented this Constitution that they have accepted this Constitution and have thereby become members. Thereupon the Temporary Organization Committee shall provide for the selection of representatives by the members and for the holding of the first meeting of the Council.
