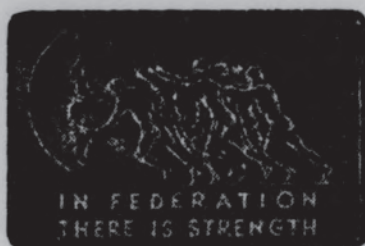

REPORT OF THE BUDGET COMMITTEE TO THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE
JEWISH WELFARE FEDERATION REGARDING ALLOCATIONS TO AGENCIES
SUPPORTED BY THE JEWISH WELFARE FUND

Agencies affiliated with the Jewish Welfare Fund requested subventions totalling \$7,731,701 for the fiscal year 1949. In considering those budget requests, the Budget Committee had to take into consideration the expressed desire of the campaign leadership that a goal in the neighborhood of \$6,000,000 would be an advisable one for this year's campaign. On the other hand, the Budget Committee was confronted with the fact that last year's goal of \$5,859,000 was not realized and that only about \$4,810,000 were raised. The Budget Committee had before it proposals to budget the local agencies in accordance with their needs, make a certain appropriation for the United Jewish Appeal and freeze all other national and overseas agencies at last year's level. The Budget Committee decided, however, not to follow this procedure. It decided, instead, to consider each request on its own merits, always conscious of last year's appropriation.

The total allocations as recommended by this Committee amount to \$6,223,797.

As far as the budget of the local agencies is concerned, the Budget Committee adopted the same principles which were applied by the Social Agency Committee Budget Sub-Committee when budgeting the Community Chest-supported agencies last December, namely:

1. The Committee based all 1949 recommended allocations on the approved 1948 budgets of the agencies, rather than on the actual 1948 experience.
2. All items of non-Federation income were budgeted for 1949 as high as they could be expected reasonably to go in the light of the rate of income in the first ten months of 1948. The Committee emphasized the necessity during this period of rising costs and full employment for agencies, to realize the maximum of income from sources other than the Federation. The Committee recognized and was sympathetic to the point of view expressed by all agencies, that it was difficult to increase income from recipients of the service.

However, it was the considered judgment of the Committee that continued concentrated efforts by the agency was indicated with regard to this problem.

3. The Committee based its salary recommendations on the 1948 budget plus a 6% increase. This increase is to cover cost of living adjustments, increments, and any other adjustments. Some new positions were recognized over and above the 6% increase.

4. Food costs were estimated on the 1948 budget except in instances where the actual experience in 1948 was less than the amount budgeted. It is the consensus of the Committee that food prices have reached their peak and may be lower in 1949 than in 1948.
5. Repair and Maintenance items are for the most part at the 1948 approved budget level. Special consideration was given to unusual repairs, repairs which were by direction of the city or state authorities, and for the replacement of essential equipment.
6. In determining 1948 budget for Power and Fuel, the 1948 budget or the 1948 experience, whichever was less, was used as the base in determining the 1949 grant.
7. The 1948 budget or the 1948 experience, whichever was less, was used as the base in computing the 1949 Clothing budget.

The 6% salary adjustment could not be adhered to when the salaries of teachers of some of the Hebrew schools were under consideration. As a matter of fact, these teachers who are only on a part-time basis - sometimes only a few hours a week - are covered in their salary claims by a city-wide agreement which establishes the salary scale for all Hebrew schools teachers. It should be noted that up to this year the Hebrew teachers were largely underpaid and that for the first time an attempt is made to bring their salaries up to a fair level.

After having reviewed the budgets of the various schools affiliated with the Bureau of Jewish Education, the Budget Committee was impressed by the fact that some of them are operating at a fairly high per capita cost and that a lack of coordination between some of the schools is evident. The Budget Committee therefore recommends that the Board of Trustees of the Jewish Welfare Federation appoint a committee to study and survey the entire situation of the institutions affiliated with the Bureau of Jewish Education with regard to their financial operations and the proper coordination of their work.

Such a study is especially urgent in the case of the Hebrew Academy where large operating deficits and unsatisfactory records have made an immediate audit of its records necessary.

In the following, the allocations to individual agencies are explained.

March 23, 1949

A. OVERSEAS RELIEF:

1. American Birobidjan Committee

The Committee recommended no allocation since sufficient funds are not available to grant a subvention to this organization.

2. American Friends of Hebrew University

The Committee recommends an allocation of \$14,000. This is the same amount which, before last year's campaign, was appropriated to this agency.

3. American Funds for Palestinian Institutions

The Committee recommends an allocation of \$12,000. This allocation is made in the belief of the Committee that the support of a central organization of this type, which did away with separate fund-raising on the part of their beneficiaries, was the only logical approach to the problem of appeals from Israel at this time.

4. American Red Mogen David

This organization came to the Jewish Welfare Fund for the first time, this year. The Committee felt that it is a worthwhile organization to be supported. However, due to the lack of funds, only a token allocation can be made. The Committee, therefore, recommends an allocation of \$1,000.

5. Committee for the Forgotten Million

The Committee passed the request of this organization. However, it was felt that the Joint Distribution Committee, which is working in the same area and intends to spend \$2,000,000, should be asked to give consideration to this organization's needs.

6. Contingent Fund

No appropriation is recommended to this committee as an allocation is recommended to the Federated Council of Palestine Institutions.

European Jewish Children's Aid

The Committee recommends an allocation of \$35,229 and a contingency reserve of \$5,000. This is in accordance with the request by the agency. Due to the fact that the operation of the European Children's program is based on facts beyond the control of the agency, the Committee felt that it had to accept the estimate of the agency. It is understood that the reserve of \$5,000 will be released by the Budget Committee only upon proof of need.

Ezras Torah Fund

This organization received \$350 each year from the Contingent Fund. As the Contingent Fund does not receive any allocation this year, the Committee felt it should make the same appropriation.

9. Federated Council of Palestine Institutions

This organization had applied in previous years but had not received an allocation, as it would not agree to the Budget Committee's request not to send any collectors into Cleveland who would try to raise funds for organizations affiliated with the Federated Council. This year, the representatives of the Federated Council explained that the affiliated organizations had agreed not to undertake any fund-raising by collectors. The Committee, therefore, felt that an allocation of \$12,000 should be made, especially in view of the fact that all the beneficiaries of the Contingent Fund Committee are part of the Federated Council. The Committee felt that a step forward in the direction of elimination of solicitors by a large number of organizations, is taken by making a grant to the Federated Council.

10. Graduate Faculty

The Committee recommends the same allocation as in 1948, namely, \$2,500.

11. Hebrew Institute of Technology in Haifa

The Committee, impressed by the work done by this institution in the reconstruction of Israel, feels that an appropriation of \$4,000 is a proper allocation.

12. Hebrew Sheltering and Immigrant Aid Society

An allocation of \$17,500 is recommended. This represents an increase over last year's allocation. The Committee took into consideration the fact that the work-load of this agency will be greatly increased due to the increasing number of displaced persons coming to this country thru the efforts of Hias.

13. Medical School Campaign

The Welfare Fund accepted as its share in this program an amount of \$80,000. \$44,000 have been paid and this year's request is for the balance in the amount of \$36,000. As the building program is actually just getting under way, the Committee felt that the balance should be spread over two years. It therefore recommends an allocation of \$18,000.

14. Jewish Family Service Association (Refugee Service)

The Budget Committee recommends an allocation in accordance with the request made by this agency, namely, \$103,989, and a contingency reserve in the amount of \$46,100. This allocation is recommended with the same reasoning on which the allocation to the Jewish Children's Bureau is based, namely, the uncertainty of the program.

15. United Jewish Appeal

The Committee recommends an allocation of \$4,500,000, which is the same amount that was allocated before last year's campaign.

16. Weizmann Institute of Science

The Committee recommends an allocation of \$20,000, which is an increase over last year's appropriation. The Committee feels that this institution plays a very important part in the reconstruction of Israel.

17. Youth Aliyah

The Committee recommends an allocation of \$33,575 in accordance with the request of this agency, which seems to be Cleveland's proper share in the important program of this organization.

B. CIVIC PROTECTIVE AGENCIES:

1. The Committee decided to appropriate the same amounts to the American Jewish Congress, the Jewish Labor Committee, Joint Defense Appeal and the War Veterans as in 1948, which means the following appropriations:

2. Jewish Community Council

The Committee recommends an allocation of \$60,807. The Committee arrived at this decision by making the following deductions:

C. HEALTH SERVICES:

1. Cleveland Jewish Convalescent Hospital

The Committee recommends an allocation of \$8,325. It should be noted that last year's allocation was for \$15,086. The considerable decrease in request is mainly based on larger income from the Cleveland Hospital Service Association and full occupancy of the hospital. The following deductions from the original request were made before arriving at the recommended allocation:

2. Jewish Consumptive Relief Association - Los Angeles

The Committee recommends an allocation of \$2,500. It recommends that this allocation be contingent upon their assurance that they would not undertake a fund drive for maintenance or capital needs in Cleveland.

3. Leo N. Levi Memorial Hospital

An allocation of \$2,000 to this organization is recommended by the Budget Committee. A letter shall be sent requesting that no mail solicitation shall be undertaken in Cleveland.

4. National Home for Jewish Children

This organization did not submit a request this year; therefore, no allocation is recommended.

5. Mount Sinai Hospital

At the special request of the Mt. Sinai Board of Trustees, the Budget Committee arranged a special hearing. Mt. Sinai presented a picture of their present financial condition and pointed out that they would require \$218,127 over and above the original allocation of \$151,737 in order to operate during the year 1949. After a full discussion, the Budget Committee voted to recommend that an amount of \$175,000 be appropriated to a Contingency Fund for Mt. Sinai Hospital to be released by the Budget Committee upon application by Mt. Sinai with the responsibility for demonstrating the need for the funds to rest with the officers of the Hospital.

D. EDUCATIONAL AND CULTURAL AGENCIES

1. American Academy for Jewish Research

This being a beneficiary of the Contingent Fund Committee in previous years, the same allocation as given by this Committee is recommended.

2. American Association for Jewish Education

The Committee recommends an allocation of \$2,500.

3. B'nai B'rith National Youth Services Appeal

The Committee recommends a total allocation of \$14,200, of which \$7,200 are earmarked for the local Hillel Foundation, and \$7,000 for the over-all services of this agency. This represents an increase over last year's pre-campaign allocation.

5. Bureau of Jewish Education

- a) Administration - The Committee recommends an allocation of \$23,351. The following adjustments were made by the Budget Committee:

- b) Cleveland Hebrew Schools

The Committee recommends an allocation of \$56,390. The following deductions were made from the submitted budget:

The Committee expressed itself that in view of the decline in enrollment at the school, the operating cost seemed to be high.

- c) Hebrew Academy

The Budget Committee recommends an allocation of \$10,000 to this organization. The Budget Committee does this in full knowledge of the fact that at this time no intelligent line by line budgeting is possible on account of the difficult financial situation of this agency. The Budget Committee therefore makes the recommendation that the payment of this allocation is dependent upon the following conditions:

- 1) That the Hebrew Academy, during the current year, cleans up all operating deficit accumulated thru 1948;
- 2) that the Hebrew Academy will submit a balanced budget for 1949 based on the \$10,000 allocation recommended by the Budget Committee together with such other income for operating purposes as the Hebrew Academy is reasonably certain to receive. The Budget Committee further recommends that the Board of Trustees of the Jewish Welfare Federation appoint a committee to study the financial condition of the Hebrew Academy.

- d) Institute of Jewish Studies

An allocation of \$5,000 is recommended.

e) United Jewish Religious Schools

An allocation of \$10,952 is recommended.

f) Workmen's Circle Schools

An allocation of \$2,000 is recommended, based on the following changes in line by line budget:

Fund-raising (deducted) 100

g) Yeshivah Schools

An allocation of \$14,557 is recommended. For a number of years, the Bureau of Jewish Education has tried to coordinate the activities of this organization with those of the Cleveland Hebrew Schools; in fact, the Board of the Bureau of Jewish Education has instructed the Yeshivah to merge with the Hebrew Schools, but no such step has been taken by the Yeshivah. On the other hand, Yeshivah has taken over the school activities of the Oheb Zedek Congregation without consultation with the Bureau of Jewish Education. At the time this merger was consummated, it was pointed out by the Yeshivah that the newly-created organization would be thoroughly self-supporting. The Oheb Zedek Congregation is contributing \$5,000, which does not cover the per capita cost. The budget request for 1949 shows that this is not the case and that the community is now asked to support about 80 pupils that came from the Oheb Zedek Congregation. In view of this fact, the Committee felt that the only adjustments over last year's should be as follows:

h) Histadruth Ivrit of America

No allocation to this organization is recommended by the Budget Committee.

i) Historia Judaica and Jewish Quarterly Review

Although these two organizations received support from the Contingent Fund Committee last year, the Budget Committee felt that no allocation should be made this year.

j) Jewish Occupational Council

The Budget Committee recommends an allocation of \$650.

k) Jewish Vocational Service

An allocation of \$69,947 is recommended. The Budget Committee arrived at this figure by reducing the budget requests in the following items:

l) Joint Educational Loan Committee

The Budget Committee recommends an allocation of \$1,968. This allocation was necessary because the available funds of the Federation's own Educational Loan Fund are not sufficient to take care of the contractual obligation under which Federation has to pay its share into the Joint Educational Loan Fund each year.

m) National Conference of Christians and Jews

An allocation of \$2,500 is recommended.

n) National Council of Both Jacob Schools

The Committee does not recommend that an allocation be made to this organization. From the presentation of the agency's program, it results that most of its pupils are living in New York City. It therefore seems to be a purely local institution.

o) National Farm School

Allocation of \$2,500 is recommended.

p) National Jewish Welfare Board

The Budget Committee recommends an allocation of \$30,000.

q) Rabbi Jacob Joseph School, Torah Umesorah, Union of Orthodox Jewish Congregations, Yavne Jewish Theological Seminary

No allocations are recommended to these organizations because their fields of activities should not be supported by the Welfare Fund.

r) Training Bureau for Jewish Communal Service

An allocation of \$1,500 is recommended.

s) Yeshivah University

Although the Budget Committee recognizes that certain activities of this organization are worthy of support, no allocation is recommended in view of insufficient funds available.

t) Yiddish Scientific Institute

This organization received \$2,000 in 1948. The Budget Committee recommends that no allocation be made this year as it feels that the more urgent and important needs have to be supported at this time.

E. GENERAL SERVICES:

1. East Central States Region - Council of Jewish Federations & Welfare Funds
The Committee recommends an allocation of \$200.
2. Federation of Jewish Women's Organizations
The Committee recommends an allocation of \$6,970.
3. Jewish Telegraphic Agency
The Committee recommends an allocation of \$5,000.

F. COMMUNITY FUND SUPPLEMENTATION, EXPENSES, RESERVE, ETC.

1. Campaign and Collection Expenses are set at \$225,000.
2. Local Agencies of the Jewish Welfare Federation
This item in the amount of \$268,978 was already approved by the Board of Trustees at its December meeting.
3. Lake County Jewish Federation
The amount of \$6,000 budgeted for this organization represents 40% of all pledges collected by the Painesville group.
4. Shrinkage
The Committee recommends an allocation of \$288,153.
5. Reserve Contingencies
An amount of \$1,131 was voted to be kept in reserve for and when the Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds requests this amount to continue its overseas studies.

RECORD RESPONSE GREET'S STIRRING TALK BY ISRAEL'S FOREIGN MINISTER

A precedent-shattering meeting last night (Tuesday) at the Oakwood Club marked the pre-Campaign opening of Cleveland's 1949 Jewish Welfare Fund Appeal. An inspiring, masterful address by the Hon. Moshe Sharett, Israel's Foreign Minister, lifted the audience to a spirit of high enthusiasm and truly generous giving. Max Freedman, General Chairman, presided at the meeting which also heard stirring talks by Rabbi Abba Hillel Silver and Rabbi Barnett R. Brickner.

The audience responded with a spontaneous announcement of pledges for the 1949 Campaign. An initial spark by Ben Klausner was fanned to a bright flame as more and more persons arose to express their deep feelings, backed up by pledges. Only the lateness of the hour -- it was already 11:20 p.m. -- compelled the Chairman to bring the meeting to a close. Forty givers contributed in excess of \$574,000, representing an increase of about 30% over the same group's contribution of \$446,000 last year. Of the 40 gifts, 37 represented increases over last year's gifts. None of the remaining three pledges showed any decrease.

SPECIAL GIFTS MEETING BOOSTS CAMPAIGN TOTAL TO ABOUT \$1,000,000.00

The enthusiasm that marked the Sharett meeting of a few weeks ago was again in evidence last night at the Special Gifts meeting at the Oakwood Club. Pledges announced last night raised the total in the 1949 Campaign to date to \$928,530.00. A preliminary analysis of the returns indicates that an increase of 26.2% has been registered over the same pledges for 1948, which amounted to \$735,815.00. Pledges promised but not actually received at last night's meeting and not included in this total will most likely be in by the time this Bulletin reaches you, and will give us our first \$1,000,000.00.

S. M. Friedman, Special Gifts Committee Chairman, and the indomitable Leonard Ratner, both of whom defied doctors'

orders to attend the meeting, worked hard in planning the gathering and lining up prospects. A spirited, informative message was delivered by Dr. William Haber, University of Michigan professor, who recently returned following 14 months overseas as Advisor on Jewish Affairs to General Lucius D. Clay, in charge of U. S. Forces in Europe. Dr. Haber described the resiliency and courage of the Jewish DP's who are leaving those ghastly camps forever. With proper help, he declared, all Jews in the DP camps wishing to go to Israel will emigrate there by October of this year. Describing the miracles wrought by the bravery and determination of the people of Israel, Dr. Haber also warned of the serious problem being created by the influx monthly of 25,000 to 30,000 Jewish refugees into the new State. He stressed the urgency of funds to the UJA to solve the problem of receiving these newcomers and speeding them to a productive role in the economic life of Israel.

Three young Israeli war heroes -- a young infantryman, a flight lieutenant, and a lieutenant of the Women's Corps (the Chen) -- greeted the gathering in simple, brief words. A punchy talk was made by Morris W. Berinstein, prominent merchant and communal leader of Syracuse, who described the great potentialities in a united effort by American Jewry and the opportunity to solve definitely the overseas Jewish problem this year.

Max Freedman, General Chairman, received the volunteer pledges announced from the floor. Increases were made in all ranges.


Dear Friend:

'We Do Not Need Your Political Aid' – Sharett

(Excerpt of address delivered recently in Philadelphia by Foreign Minister Moshe Sharett of Israel)

There were times when we from Palestine and we representatives of the Zionist movement here, applied to Jews throughout the United States to throw in their lot with our cause and help us politically, use their voting strength in this country, use their influence on the government, in the press, with their fellow Americans — Gentiles — in order to help us. That is over. We no longer appeal to your political help. We do not need it.

This may be a very bold statement, but that is the position. Just because there is a State of Israel there must be a certain amount of separation. We cannot claim your allegiance in any formal sense to the State of Israel. You owe your allegiance, as citizens, to your own country and to your own government.

We hope very much — in fact we feel confident — that the bond of friendship between us as the State of Israel and your government will go from strength to strength, and that there will never be any serious misunderstanding between us. But that is our relationship as a state to state.

When we go to Washington and talk to your Secretary of State we do not talk on your behalf; we talk on behalf of the State of Israel. We do not expect you to accept any political responsibility for our status in the international world. That responsibility is ours alone.



1. Sell yourself first and early. An early, generous gift sets an example for others to follow and helps you do a more effective selling job.
2. Cover every one of your cards. Remember, each card represents a source of help to our fellow Jews overseas.
3. Know your Fund facts. This booklet will give you information about the 1949 Campaign. Have it with you at all times.
4. Make an early start. This will give you more time in which to complete your solicitations.
5. See your prospects -- in person. Do not solicit pledges on the phone.
6. See your "tough" prospects now. They may require return visits.
7. If in doubt about accepting a pledge, consult your Division Chairman. When you have accepted a pledge, thank the contributor on behalf of the Jewish Welfare Fund. Turn in pledges immediately rather than hold them until you've finished with all your cards.
8. On the dotted line, please. Have each pledge card signed by the contributor.
9. Fill out pledge cards properly and completely. This will help the office staff in recording and listing pledges.
10. Attend Campaign Dinner and Report Luncheon meetings.

1. KEYNOTE OF 1949 CAMPAIGN

The dominant note of this year's Campaign is the reconstructive stage of the work of the United Jewish Appeal (UJA) agencies. The UJA seeks to raise \$250,000,000 nationally this year on behalf of its three constituent agencies -- Joint Distribution Committee (JDC), United Palestine Appeal (UPA), United Service for New Americans (USNA). Our fellow Jews overseas have progressed from survival to reconstruction, from wandering to settlement, from homelessness to homecoming. The Jewish DP camps can be cleared out this year and about 250,000 Jews brought into Israel, and some 25,000 to America. (At the beginning of 1948, there were approximately 200,000 in the DP Camps of Europe and Cyprus. Their number has decreased to about 85,000 this year.) If we utilize to the maximum the opportunities of providing real help to our fellow Jews overseas, the bulk of them will not have to depend in the future on the philanthropy of the American Jewish community.

2. NEEDS OF UPA

The UPA agencies -- Jewish Agency for Palestine, Palestine Foundation Fund, and Jewish National Fund -- will spend half of their budget to meet the requirements of newcomers entering Israel. The funds received from the United Jewish Appeal are not used for the people of Israel, who risked their lives in attaining and protecting Jewish statehood, and are being heavily taxed, and living on an austerity basis. UPA

funds provide services for the newcomers in Israel so as to enable them to become part of the country's productive life as speedily as possible. These services fill the gap between the time of the refugees' arrival and their absorption into the economic life of the country.

3. IMMIGRATION AND HOMECOMING

Based on figures covering immigration into Israel for the first few months of this year, a record number of 250,000 homeless Jews will enter the new State. This figure exceeds the total number of Jewish refugees admitted to Palestine in the 1938-1948 decade. In terms of this country's population, it would equal an immigration into the United States in 1949 of about 46,000,000. According to Eliezer Kaplan, Israeli Finance Minister, it costs at least \$1,000 to meet the needs of an immigrant into Israel from the time of his entry until he is absorbed into the country's economy. Funds must be available for relief, health needs, housing, training to prepare him for use in the country's agricultural and industrial life. Multiply this per capita cost by the number of immigrants and you have an idea of the size of the funds needed. This is the arithmetical aspect of this great project in human engineering.

The time factor is all-important in moving these Jews clamoring to leave Europe. This is particularly true in the Eastern European countries where changing conditions make it uncertain just how long the emigration of Jews will be permitted.

4. HOUSING IN ISRAEL

About 35,000 Jewish immigrants in Israel live in temporary shelters or reception camps. For the mental and physical rehabilitation of these people, and for the great number of other Jewish refugees entering, it is essential that housing be provided in agricultural or urban communities. They have had too much of living in Europe's camps, both during and after the war, to continue existing in camps, even in Israel. Farm settlements must be expanded and factories must be further developed to provide housing and opportunities for productive work. Especially important are the 150 settlements that must be put up in the Negev (south) and in other frontier areas of the country.

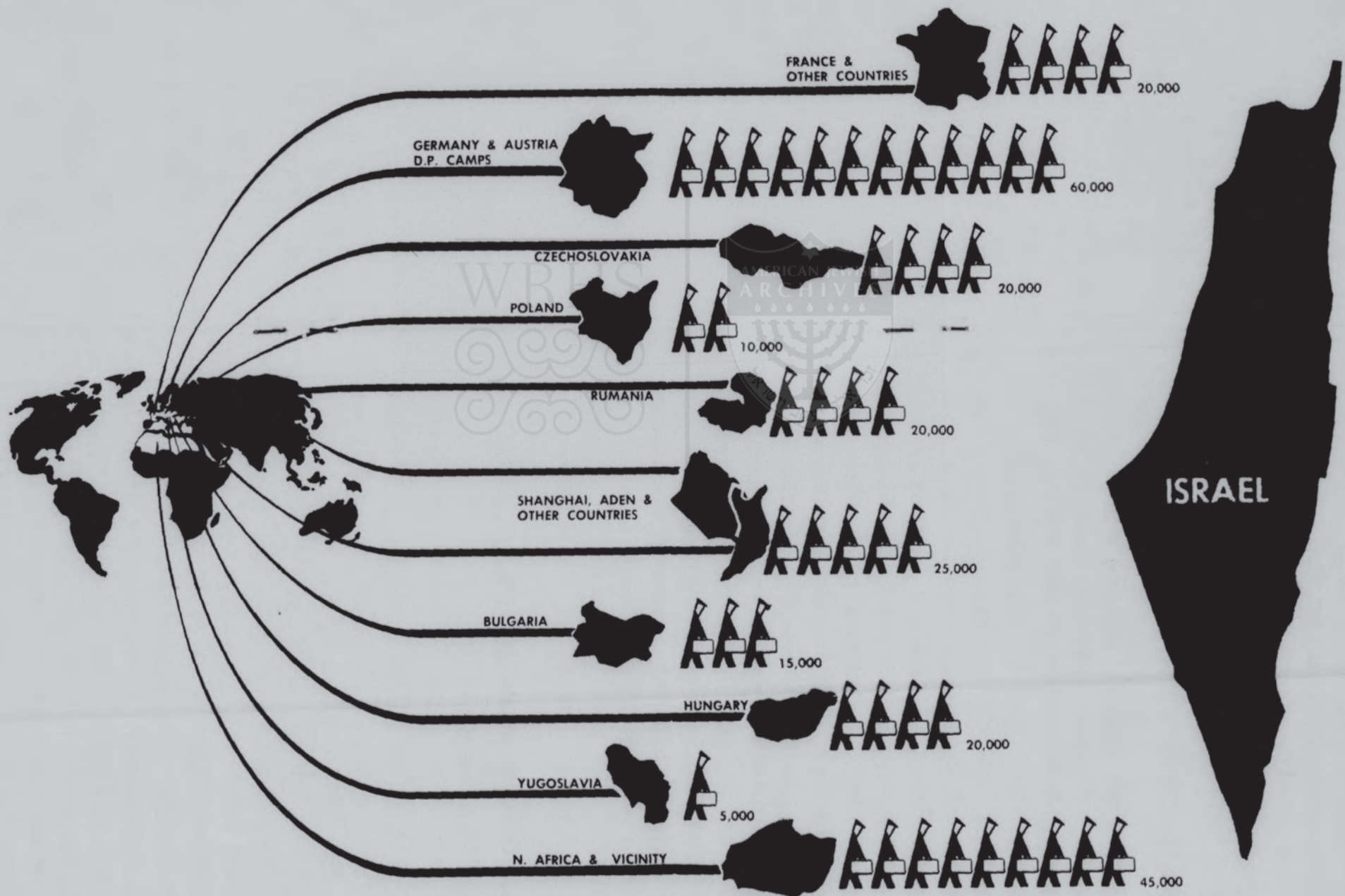


5. TASKS OF THE JDC

Major effort of the JDC is to keep the transportation lines open for Jews eager to leave Europe and North Africa, and to solve the problem of the Jewish DP's. The JDC pays the transportation costs of almost all of these emigrants. Of the 1,400,000 Jews remaining in Europe, JDC must feed, clothe, and provide other services for at least 600,000. In Western Europe, JDC must be enabled to continue the further reconstruction of Jewish communal life; in Eastern Europe, an extensive network of cooperatives, health and welfare agencies and institutions must be supported to help Jewish inhabitants of these lands on the path of recovery. Relief needs are smaller than in pre-

vious years, but, very often, JDC food packages still represent the difference between semi-starvation and a barely adequate diet.

6. UNITED SERVICE FOR NEW AMERICANS

The 1949 needs of the USNA have been placed at \$11,645,000, on the basis of an expected entry of 24,500 Jews into the United States. Liberalized immigration legislation by Congress will result in a substantial increase in this number. Most of USNA's budget is devoted to meeting the food, clothing and shelter needs of these arrivals. The agency moves these newcomers away from the ports of entry to settle them in communities throughout the country. They must be given vocational training, taught English and new skills and trades, and helped to become useful members of the American community.

7. U. S. GOVERNMENT LOANS TO ISRAEL AND UJA NEEDS

The United States Export - Import Bank has authorized a credit of \$100,000,000 to Israel. All of this loan must be spent in the U.S.; no part provides for funds to pay immigration costs of Jews into Israel, nor for initial reception or care, nor for other services until these newcomers become productive members of Israel's economy. These most pressing needs must be met out of contributions by Jews outside of Israel, mainly through the United Jewish Appeal. Government

loans are, of course, of vital importance in developing the country's economy and helping place it on a self-supporting basis. But they still leave the immediate needs of Jewish immigrants to be met by contributions through the UJA.

8. HELP TO CLEVELAND'S JEWISH AGENCIES

Our Campaign reflects the major importance of help to our fellow Jews overseas. However, it does not overlook adequate support to maintain the many services of the Federation's local agencies. This year's goal includes allocations to all local agencies of the Federation to enable them to maintain good standards of service and undertake essential expansion of services. The Welfare Fund thus reflects the policy of keeping our own communal institutions in sound condition, to enable them to give effective service to the Jewish community of Greater Cleveland, and thus be in position to be of more effective aid to our fellow Jews wherever and whenever help is needed.

9. MANY AGENCIES BENEFIT FROM ONE GIFT TO THE JEWISH WELFARE FUND APPEAL

The 1949 Jewish Welfare Fund budget calls for direct allocations to 45 agencies. However, a number of these agencies have already coordinated fund raising activities of constituent agencies. For example, the United Jewish Appeal raises funds for 3 agencies, the

American Fund for Palestinian Institutions for more than 90. Accordingly, a contribution to the Jewish Welfare Fund Appeal is shared by a total of 230 agencies in Cleveland, throughout the United States, Israel, Europe, and other parts of the globe. These beneficiary agencies agree not to conduct independent fund-raising campaigns in our community. Jewish health, education, cultural and community relations agencies are also among the Fund's beneficiaries. One gift to the Jewish Welfare Fund Appeal goes a long way and many ways.

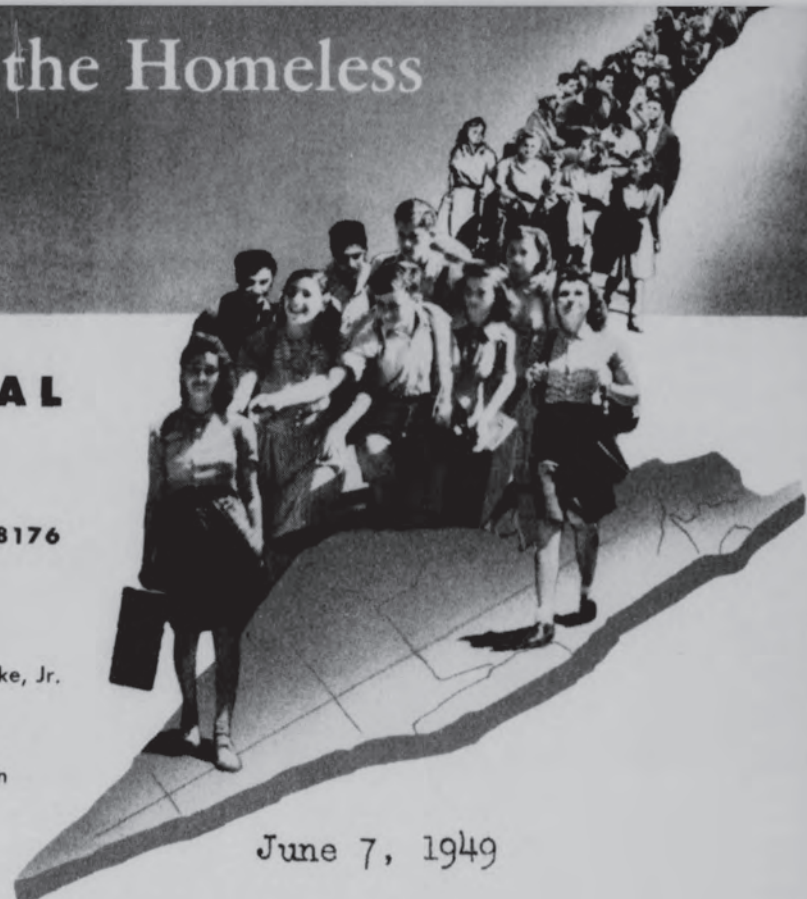

ACTION ON MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF APRIL 27TH.

The minutes of the Board meeting of April 27th were approved with an amendment to show that Messrs. Affelder and Weitz were present.

ANNOUNCEMENTS.

- a) A letter of congratulations has been sent to Irving Kane upon his recent election as Chairman of the National Community Relations Advisory Council.
- b) A letter of condolence has been sent to Mrs. Daniel E. Morgan upon the death of her late husband.
- c) The Federation has been informed by the Council of Jewish Federations & Welfare Funds that the following persons were elected as large-city community representatives on the National Campaign-Executive Committee of the U.J.A. for 1949: Herbert Abeles of Newark, N.J., James H. Becker of Chicago, Louis S. Myers of Kansas City, Mo., and Abraham Srere of Detroit.
- d) The Council of Jewish Federations & Welfare Funds has established a new Committee on Unified National Fund Raising to seek methods of assuring greater stability and unification of appeals for non-local causes. Julian Freeman of Indianapolis is chairman of this committee. Cleveland is represented on the committee by Jerome N. Curtis and Henry L. Zucker.
- e) The Council of Jewish Federations & Welfare Funds and the Jewish Agency have announced the appointment of a new Jewish Agency Committee on Multiple Campaigns to eliminate "unauthorized and illegitimate" fund-raising campaigns and to establish U.J.A. priority in behalf of Israel.
- f) Joseph Kapell announced the highlights of the program of the National Conference of Jewish Social Welfare, which is being held currently in Cleveland.

FINANCIAL REPORT.

The Financial Report of the Federation for May 1949 was distributed (filed as Exhibit A).

June 8, 1949

JOINT EDUCATIONAL LOAN COMMITTEE.

The Chairman announced that a letter has been received from Dr. S.F.M. Hirsch, Chairman of the Joint Educational Loan Committee, asking the Federation to designate a representative to succeed George J. Klein, whose term expires July 1, 1949 (Exhibit B). The Federation has three representatives on this committee who serve for three-year terms; namely, Maurice Bernon, George B. Mayer and George J. Klein.

Upon motion by Mr. Benesch, seconded by Mr. Hays, it was voted to designate Mr. Klein to succeed himself as representative on the Joint Educational Loan Committee.

APPOINTMENT TO GOVERNING BODIES, UNITED PALESTINE APPEAL.

The Secretary read a communication from Judge Morris Rothenberg, Acting National Chairman of the United Palestine Appeal, requesting that the Federation appoint a representative to serve on the Governing Bodies of the United Palestine Appeal (Exhibit C).

After a brief discussion, during which the names of Max Freedman and Leonard Ratner were placed in nomination and in which they declined the nomination, it was voted upon motion by Jack Lampl to authorize the President to make the appointment with the advice and consent of the officers.

REPORT OF THE 1949 JEWISH WELFARE FUND CAMPAIGN.

Mr. Freedman reported on the successful conclusion of the 1949 Welfare Fund Campaign (report filed as Exhibit D). He paid tribute to the fine spirit of the workers and to the generous response of the community. He indicated that Cleveland will probably be the only major city in the country to raise as much money in 1949 as it raised in 1948. He called special attention to the participation of local agencies in the distribution of Welfare Fund monies and of the need for widespread participation by local agency board members in the raising of funds.

ELECTION OF EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR (dictated by Samuel Goldhamer).

In concluding his report, Mr. Freedman said it was his pleasure to pay tribute to the splendid manner in which Mr. Zucker had taken hold of the Welfare Fund Campaign, and the thoroughness with which he carried the direction of the tasks imposed upon him. He stated further that since the trial period for his assumption of the Acting Directorship of the Federation would expire on July 1st, he believed that the Federation Board would at this time wish to take the necessary action leading to his appointment as the Executive Director, succeeding Mr. Goldhamer, as of October 1st next, the date of Mr. Goldhamer's retirement. Mr. Freedman desired therefore to offer a motion, if it was in order, that the Board of Trustees take this action at this time, leaving to the Executive Officers the question of any salary adjustment that might be called for.

The motion was promptly seconded, and unanimously carried, and Mr. Zucker, who had asked to retire from the meeting during this presentation, was invited to return; and on being informed by the Chairman of the action, thanked the Board and assured them of his intention to continue to discharge the duties of his position to the fullest of his abilities.

June 8, 1949

The foregoing action by the Board disposed of the decision taken a year ago to appoint a committee to consider Mr. Zucker's qualifications to assume the position of Executive Director.

BUDGET COMMITTEE.

Mr. Weitz, Chairman, reported for the Budget Committee regarding the estimate of 1950 needs to be presented to the Community Fund. The report was distributed and is on file (Exhibit E).

After brief discussion, it was voted upon motion by Mr. Weitz, seconded by Mr. Sherby, to approve the report of the Budget Committee and to authorize the presentation to the Community Fund of the estimate of needs of \$1,085,914 as outlined in the report.

EUCLID JEWISH COMMUNITY.

The Chairman recalled that at the April 27th meeting of the Board it was voted "that the Jewish Community Centers be requested to prepare a report regarding the needs of the Euclid Jewish community for the consideration of the Social Agency Committee; and that the Social Agency Committee be instructed to report to the Board of Trustees of the Federation. It was understood that the Jewish Community Centers and the S.A.C. are to be asked to take into consideration the report of the informal committee which has met with representatives of the Euclid group and to report their findings at an early date."

Mr. Neumark reported for the Social Agency Committee that after considerable discussion and with a report in hand from the Jewish Community Centers, the Social Agency Committee voted to make the following recommendations:

"The needs of the Euclid community are recognized and appreciated. Further, the facts indicate that there is no existing facility which can be utilized for communal purposes, and short of purchasing such a facility there does not appear to be any solution in the foreseeable future. The prospect of an integrated facility (as described in the JCC report) is in keeping with a sound principle of broad community planning. However, the needs of the greater Cleveland community in other areas of service are so much greater that the Committee is compelled to weigh its decision with these facts in mind. It is therefore recommended that the SAC report to the Board of Trustees that this project should not receive the capital fund assistance it requires. It is suggested that the neighborhood might be helped to mobilize itself to develop a facility on its own initiative, assuming full financial responsibility, and that the general community through the Federation and its agencies might provide the professional leadership and guidance to assist in the development of required services."

(Complete reports of the Social Agency Committee and the Jewish Community Centers were distributed and are on file as Exhibits F and G).

There was considerable discussion of the reports, including a statement from Mr. Guren with respect to the attitude of the Jewish Community Centers. The point was made that it is not clear whether it is intended that the Center in Euclid should be a community center operated by the Jewish community of Euclid or by the Jewish Community Centers, which would rent space to a synagogue; or a congregation-owned building which would make its facilities available for recreational, educational and cultural purposes.

June 8, 1949

It was voted upon motion by Mr. Neumark, seconded by Mr. Brown, to approve the recommendation of the S.A.C. Twenty-three persons voted in favor of the motion and seven against.

BOARD MEETINGS.

The Chairman announced that the next regular meeting of the Board will be held on June 29th and would be devoted exclusively to discussion and action upon the report of the Executive Committee calling for the reorganization of the Jewish Welfare Fund Committee. The last summer meeting will be held in July, at which time final action will be taken on the distribution of funds for the 1949 Jewish Welfare Fund Appeal, and upon such other matters as will require the Board's attention before adjournment for the summer.

MEMORANDUM

Subject: REORGANIZATION OF THE WELFARE FUND COMMITTEE

The Executive Committee recommends to the Board of Trustees that the Welfare Fund Committee be reorganized immediately following the 1949 Welfare Fund Campaign. The purpose of this proposal and the proposal itself is outlined in the following report:

I. WHAT IS THE WELFARE FUND COMMITTEE?

The Welfare Fund Committee was established by the Federation in 1931. The following is quoted from the By-Laws of the Federation under the title Standing Committees: "...welfare Fund Committee which shall be composed of one representative member selected by each of the beneficiary agencies of the Welfare Fund which has received \$1,000 or more in appropriations from the Fund during the preceding fiscal year and five representative members selected by the Jewish Community Council, provided the Council desires such representation, and appointed by the President of the Federation; also five members from the Board of Trustees of the Federation selected and appointed by the President. The Committee shall select its own officers. It shall concern itself with Program, Policy, and Campaign objectives of the Welfare Fund and may adopt its own Code of Regulations and Procedure, all subject to the approval of the Board of the Federation."

II. WHY REORGANIZATION?

The Welfare Fund Committee has been an active committee only in a very limited sense. It has never adopted a Code of Regulations & Procedure; it has not met regularly; it has not held regular elections. It has participated only superficially in the organization of the Welfare Fund Campaign and in budgeting Welfare Fund monies. The Executive Committee believes that the Welfare Fund Committee should be reorganized now and made an active committee.

III. PROPOSED PLAN FOR REORGANIZATION OF THE WELFARE FUND COMMITTEE.

It is proposed that a new Welfare Fund Committee be organized by the Federation with the following specific provisions:

1. The Committee is to be composed of one person to be designated by each of the 24 men's divisions and the Employees' Division; two by the Young Adult Division; and four by the Women's Division; plus the Chairman or Co-Chairmen of the Campaign and the Associate Campaign Chairmen and the Chairman of the Special Gifts Committee; plus the officers of the Federation; and ten members-at-large to be designated by the Board of the Federation but not be necessarily members of the Board. The Committee is to be constituted annually about July 1st.

2. The Committee is to discharge the following functions subject to the approval of the Board of Trustees:
 - a) Organize and operate the Jewish Welfare Fund Campaign; organize and operate such other money-raising campaigns as the Federation sponsors directly; represent the Federation in other money-raising bodies if and when the Federation agrees to co-sponsor or assist other campaigns; and arrange for an orderly approach to the Jewish community of Federation and non-Federation appeals.
 - b) Act as the social planning arm of the Federation in the national agency field: by studying alone or jointly with other communities the needs of the national agencies with a view toward greater coordination and unification of effort, improvement in quality of work, and initiation of new services; by designating four representatives on the Federation's Budget Committee; by making basic studies in regard to specific national agency programs and the Federation's financial responsibility toward support of these programs; and by cooperating with other cities in such joint efforts as the Large-City Budgeting Conference, the Large-City Planning Conference and other meetings related to fund-raising, budgeting and planning regarding national agency programs.
 - c) Conduct other year-round local activities such as assisting in the collection of Welfare Fund pledges; developing prospect lists for the Welfare Fund and distributing prospect cards; conducting year-round educational and good-fellowship meetings directed toward Welfare Fund workers and contributors; recruiting welfare Fund workers; directing educational campaigns through personal contacts with serious under-givers; and helping to tap public opinion as to the size of the annual welfare fund goal, support of certain agencies or activities, and other matters.
3. The Committee is to select its own officers, and adopt its own Code of Regulations & Procedure, subject to the approval of the Board of Trustees.

MINUTES.

The minutes of the Board meeting of June 8th were approved.

CAPITAL LOAN -- MT. SINAI HOSPITAL.

The Chairman reported that the officers of the Federation and the Budget Committee have considered a request from Mt. Sinai Hospital for an emergency loan of \$75,000 from the Federation (letter filed as Exhibit A). Mr. Weitz reported that the Budget Committee has considered this matter and recommends "that a loan of \$50,000 be given to Mt. Sinai Hospital to enable the Hospital to come to a current basis in the payment of its bills; it being understood that the Hospital will set up this item on its books as a capital loan, and that the Hospital will repay this loan from capital funds not later than July 1, 1950."

Mr. Weitz's presentation and the discussion which followed centered about the urgent cash situation facing the Hospital, and the efforts of the Federation's Committee on Mt. Sinai Hospital Finances to evaluate the financial needs of the Hospital and the Federation's responsibility toward meeting these needs (Mr. Weitz's report filed as Exhibit B).

It was voted upon motion by Mr. Weitz to approve the recommendation of the Budget Committee and to authorize the sale of such Federation securities as necessary to make available \$50,000 in cash to the Hospital.

AUTHORIZATION FOR SAFETY DEPOSIT BOX.

The Chairman announced that upon recommendation of the Executive Committee the Federation has recently undertaken to microfilm all financial records. These records should be kept in a safety deposit vault at the bank. This requires the adoption by the Federation of a resolution authorizing the rental of a vault and designating the names of persons who shall have access to the vault.

After a brief discussion it was voted to approve the resolution, suggested by the Cleveland Trust Company, with the provision that the President, the Treasurer, the Executive Director and the Comptroller may have access individually to the vault; and with the provision that the vault is to be used only for the purpose of storing the microfilm records (copy of resolution filed as Exhibit C).

June 29, 1949

The Executive Director was authorized to select the bank in which the vault is to be rented.

REORGANIZATION OF THE JEWISH WELFARE FUND COMMITTEE.

The Chairman stated that there had been mailed to all members of the Board an Executive Committee proposal for the reorganization of the Jewish Welfare Fund Committee (Exhibit D). This proposal represents careful study by the Executive Committee and by a Sub-Committee on Reorganization of the Welfare Fund Committee, of which Mr. Weitz is Chairman.

The proposal has been cleared with a number of community leaders, with the present Jewish Welfare Fund Committee, and with Philip Bernstein of the Council of Jewish Federations & Welfare Funds. In general there is agreement on the need to reorganize the present Jewish Welfare Fund Committee; on the desirability of year-round campaign emphasis; on the importance of reflecting the views of contributors and campaign workers in the policy-making bodies of the Federation; and on giving greater emphasis to social planning on the national agency level. The following reservations have been expressed regarding the proposal:

- 1) Some of the matters outlined for the Jewish Welfare Fund Committee's consideration are so important and "so fundamentally the direct concern the Board that the Jewish Welfare Fund Committee may find itself generally meeting concurrently with the Board in order to avoid an extra step. This would be especially true of problems of national coordination and national-local relationships", and problems involving fundamental financial policies.
- 2) The Jewish Welfare Fund Committee would need to operate through sub-committees, such as one on collections, one on independent campaigns, etc. "Is it necessary to filter their recommendations through the Jewish Welfare Fund Committee before they go to the Board, or should they go to the Board directly?"
- 3) Some of the work of the Jewish Welfare Fund Committee could properly come within the direct scope of the Budget Committee.
- 4) The Jewish Welfare Fund Committee should limit its activities to year-round fund-raising activities, and problems directly related to fund-raising such as collections, building up prospect lists, good fellowship and education meetings, and miscellaneous appeals. It is not feasible to mix in with these activities the complicated social planning problems in the national agency field.
- 5) There should be a more definitive charge to the Jewish Welfare Fund Committee to keep informed and keep the Board informed regarding national agencies in order to permit intelligent action when questions arise about these agencies.
- 6) The Jewish Welfare Fund Committee should not be charged with policing miscellaneous appeals. A separate standing committee responsible to the Board should be established.

7) The Committee should be appointed by the President of the Federation, with approval by the Board. The Jewish Welfare Fund Committee cannot be organized "from the bottom up"; the Committee should appoint the Divisions, not be appointed by the Divisions.

8) The Jewish Welfare Fund Committee should be represented on the Board of Trustees by its Chairman and its two Co-Chairmen, not by ten persons as proposed.

In the ensuing discussion the following points of view were expressed:

The work of the Committee should be restricted to the raising of funds. No other function should be added, at least at the beginning. The miscellaneous appeals function is a highly controversial one and should be retained by the present Miscellaneous Appeals Committee. The assumption of this responsibility at this time by the Jewish Welfare Fund Committee would be an unnecessary burden.

The functions are very similar to those outlined for the present Welfare Fund Committee in the reorganization plan of 1931. These functions have never really been undertaken by the Welfare Fund Committee.

All new agencies applying for Welfare Fund support should have the stamp of approval of the reorganized Welfare Fund Committee before the Budget Committee considers making an appropriation to the organization.

The discussion with respect to the structure of the proposed Committee centered about the method of selecting the representatives from the Divisions. Several proposals were made.

It was moved by Rabbi Brickner, seconded by Mr. Weitz, to approve as submitted the report of the Executive Committee, recommending the reorganization of the Welfare Fund Committee. It was voted upon motion of Mr. Freedheim to amend the report by rewording Section III-1, to provide that the Board of Trustees elect Division representatives to the Welfare Fund Committee upon nomination of a Federation Nominating Committee. This Nominating Committee would be expected to consult with leaders of the Divisions to secure suggestions regarding representation. There were 3 "nay" votes on this amendment.

It was then voted to approve the report as amended and to authorize the President to appoint a Nominating Committee to nominate the members who are to be elected by the Board of Trustees. There were 3 "nay" votes on this motion.

MRS. JANET MANBURG.

The Chairman announced the resignation from the staff of Mrs. Janet Manburg, effective August 31st. He recalled to the Board that Mrs. Manburg has given to the Federation fifteen years of devoted service, and expressed to Mrs. Manburg the appreciation of the Board for her service to the community.

The Chairman expressed the best wishes of the Board to Mrs. Manburg for her health and happiness.
