
Dear Friend:

Dear Rabbi Silver:

I know you will be surprised to hear from me after these many long years.

It is a far call from that Sunday evening when I spoke at a meeting for you in Wheeling, and it is also many years since our frequent contacts in Pittsburgh during the lifetime of my sainted brother, J. Leonard Levy.

We have watched your splendid record of service down through the times, and have often wished that there was an opportunity for us to meet again. I believe that time has come, and this is to invite you to pay a visit to Texas in the interests of the United Jewish Appeal.

For several years I have been volunteering the service of raising funds for the Combined Jewish Campaign and for the United Jewish Appeal, and this year again I have accepted the responsibility for putting Texas in the forefront of the States in America in its contribution to the European and Palestinian situations.

A great number of your admirers have evidenced a deep interest in wanting you to come to Dallas, Houston, and San Antonio and give them a picture of the situation as you know it and as only you can impress them.

Your acceptance of this invitation means much for the cause, and perhaps between Seventy to Eighty Thousand Dollars is involved, based upon last year's contributions from the three key cities mentioned above. If you will consent to come to Texas, I will arrange to have three mass meetings on three consecutive nights in one week, such as Tuesday night in Dallas, Wednesday night in Houston, Thursday night in San Antonio, or vice-versa, and will arrange for your reception and comfort in each city.

Would it be possible for you to come to Texas the first week of April, which would be April 2nd, 3rd, and 4th, or the following week April 9th, 10th, and 11th? If you cannot arrange to be here on either of the above mid-weeks of April, would it be possible for you to arrange any other dates that would be acceptable to yourself and to the United Jewish Appeal offices in New York?

I am very anxious, my dear Rabbi Silver, to have you come to Texas at this time, and would appreciate your accepting my invitation for the sake of the old days, irrespective of the great service you will render to the cause of



Dear Rabbi Silver:

It is a source of gratification to my associates and to me, to learn that you have accepted the chairmanship of the 1935 campaign of the Jewish Welfare Fund, of which, as I understand it, the United Jewish Appeal is the largest beneficiary. Not only do I know of your position of leadership, both locally and throughout the country, but also, having had the pleasure of meeting you in Philadelphia a few years ago, I know how effective it will be to have you head the Cleveland campaign this year.

We are particularly anxious to see your good city go over the top, and to have a generous amount allocated to the United Jewish Appeal this year. Cleveland did, until a few years ago, set an example among the Jewish communities of this country for our campaigns, as I have noted in reviewing the records. While I can realize that local conditions have mitigated against the success of our appeals in your city during the past few years, it is a source of great concern to all of us that Cleveland's contributions should have been so completely out of line with other comparable communities when one considers the Jewish population and the splendid leadership which Cleveland enjoys. I take it that it is no secret that Cleveland has been practically at the bottom of the list among the major cities during the past two or three years.

On March 29th, I wrote to Mr. Louis S. Bing, Jr., in reply to his kind invitation, indicating that I would probably be able to attend a luncheon meeting of the young people on May 5th. In this connection, I mentioned to Mr. Bing that there was a possibility of my meeting with this group Saturday evening, May 4th, if he wished it. However, inasmuch as your letter speaks of an opening dinner to be held on Sunday, May 5th, I should greatly appreciate it if you would inform Mr. Bing that this arrangement is preferable to a Saturday night meeting.

Memoranda for Meeting of the General Welfare Fund Committee for the 1935 Appeal

April 4th, Statler Hotel Lattice Room.

1. Brief resume of the four years history of the Fund in Cleveland:

Established to consolidate mainly the appeals for funds locally for national and international Organizations. Developments since 1931, in Germany and elsewhere, have made necessary a large increase in the number of Jewish Purposes for which money had to be raised, tho the amount actually secured in 1934 was less than that raised in 1931:

1931: Fourteen Jewish Organizations were allotted	\$ 128,464;
1932: Fifteen " " " "	56,090;
1933: Nineteen " " " "	93,048;
1934: Twenty-three " " " "	88,018.

Previous Campaigns conducted earlier in the year; this year the Federation decided to delay the opening of the Campaign until May in order to be assured the full strength of the community's man-power for the Drive.

The large General Welfare Fund Committee which has been invited to the Meeting today, not only is representative of the Federation and the Constituent Organizations of the Welfare Fund, but is representative also of every substantial Jewish interest in the Community.

This Committee is called together to discuss the general Plan, Program and Personnel for the Campaign. Specific tasks will of course need to be assigned to the various important Committees.

Rabbi Silver and Rabbi Brickner have very generously accepted the General Chairmanship and the Associate Chairmanship respectively; and they have been assured the co-operation of the leadership of the Community.


Cleveland Jewry will stage its 1935 Welfare Fund Drive during the month of May. A group of persons representative of the various interests in Jewish life has already begun to plan the campaign, and the first meeting was held yesterday noon at the Statler Hotel.

Rabbi A H Silver has accepted the position of General Chairman of the campaign, and Rabbi B R Brickner will be Associate Chairman. Other officers are being drawn from the leadership of the Federation and the general community, and those who have been invited to serve have expressed their readiness to do so.

William Rosenwald, son of the late Julius Rosenwald, will make his first visit to Cleveland to address the opening dinner meeting of the campaign. In accepting the invitation, Mr Rosenwald expressed the hope that "Cleveland Jewry would as in days of old take its place in the van of the Jewish communities of America, and once more be one of the most generous in the discharge of its communal responsibilities, at home and for overseas purposes.

"In a sense, I have a traditional interest in Cleveland," Mr Rosenwald explained, "because of my father's friendship for the late Charles Eisenman and others of your communal leaders. I am happy to avail myself of this opportunity to visit here, and to be of what help I can in your enterprise."

Mr Rosenwald recently joined with Paul Baerwald, Felix Warburg,



and others as co-chairmen of the United Jewish Appeal, which this year will seek to raise \$3,250,000 in this country for the assistance of Jews in Germany, Poland, and other lands where mass distress continues, and to aid in the development of Palestine.

Rabbi Silver, in commenting upon Mr Rosenwald's appeal to Cleveland Jews, said "Mr Rosenwald is referring to those fine examples of generosity which our people were wont to exhibit in the campaigns during and following the period of the World War, when goals were subscribed and oversubscribed.

"We have not had any such campaign for several years, but it is our hope that with industry and commerce emerging from the depths of the depression, we shall at least be able to improve our response over those of the past two or three years. Other communities have shown better results, and I am sure that we shall not be found doing less than our share.

"All we ask is that everyone lend his utmost support to the campaign; we shall need man-power as well as money-power."

The Federation this week is issuing its annual Welfare Fund Year Book, listing the contributions of Cleveland Jewry during 1934, and describing the agencies and causes for which the funds are used. Subscribers are asked to consult the subscription lists and to advise Rabbi Silver of the names of persons who were overlooked in the appeal last year.

Headquarters for the drive will be at the Statler Hotel, and the campaign meetings will be held there.

My dear Mrs. Herzog:

Following up our conversation of yesterday -- I am more convinced than ever that this year an independent women's campaign organization should be established under your leadership which should consist of about fifteen teams of ten members each, to which organization a definite block of about one thousand cards should be turned over. The cards assigned to the women's group should follow the plan of the Community Chest Campaign, namely, that they be those of smaller donors, say from one to fifteen dollars. These cards should be zoned so that a woman can complete her full assignment in a few hours.

Thus we shall have two correlated campaign groups, each capable of intensive cultivation of its field. I would suggest that some of the meetings of the women's organization during the campaign be held independently of the men's campaign meetings, say on alternate days, and some of them jointly.

I believe that the Jewish womanhood of our city will rally in a splendid way to a definite job assigned to them and for which they will feel themselves entirely responsible.



Minutes of a Meeting of the Budget Committee of The Jewish Welfare Fund with reference to allocation and goal for The Jewish Welfare Fund campaign for 1935 needs.

The following were present: S P Halle, Chairman, Messrs Edward M Baker, Joseph M Berne, Rabbi B R Brickner, Max Myers, Sol Reinthal, Ezra Z Shapiro, Sidney N Weitz and Jacob Wolpaw.

The Committee was provided with memoranda showing (a) a record of allotments to the various agencies of The Welfare Fund for 1934, with note of special requests by the agency for 1935 requests; (b) a list of other agencies requesting inclusion in the Welfare Fund for 1935 with letters and information supporting such requests; (c) a record of allotments made to agencies for 1934 by the Welfare Funds in Cincinnati, Detroit, St Louis and San Francisco; (d) general information regarding the experiences of Welfare Funds in the above cities as provided by the National Council of Federations and Welfare Funds, all of the foregoing as contained in the memoranda hereto attached.

The Committee after reviewing this general information, proceeded to consider the individual items of allocation for agencies already in the Fund, and the following allotments were agreed upon:

The question of allocation to new agencies asking inclusion in the Fund, was then taken up after consideration of the action of the Chairman in agreeing to a tentative allocation of \$2,500 as the Cleveland Jewish Physician's Committee share of the National Budget for the building of the Rothschild Hadassah Hospital Unit in Palestine, and the amount of \$ 2,500 was approved; it was also agreed to allocate 500

to the German Jewish Children's Aid Incorporated, as part of the expense which the National Committee would have in its care of German Refugee Children; an allotment of \$300 for the Jewish Statistical Bureau was approved; and to consider for later allocation from a contingent fund, the requests ^{of} the Hebrew Teachers College in Jerusalem, the Yiddish Scientific Institute of Wilna and the Avukah; and such other causes as may make application to the Fund.

With regard to the Jewish National Fund it was the opinion of the Budget Committee that much of the activity in Zionist circles locally would be lost, if the raising of funds for land purchase as represented by the National Fund should be discontinued, and, therefore, the National Fund should not be included in the Jewish Welfare Fund for an allotment. With regard to the European institutions requesting inclusion in the Fund, it was suggested that inquiry be made to ascertain if such institutions were not already receiving aid through the budget of the Joint Distribution Committee.

Considerable discussion ensued with regard to a guarantee of the Bureau of Jewish Educational allotment, which Rabbi Brickner was requesting. It was the sense of most of the members present that no promises of guarantees could be made in advance of a knowledge of the campaign results.

There was also general agreement on the suggestion that the Campaign Goal of \$130,000 should be announced in all of the publicity and that the list of all of the agencies included should be made known; but that the tentative allocations as agreed upon by the Budget Committee at this time, should not be published.

No further business coming before the meeting, it was adjourned.

Memoranda for Meeting of the Men's Organization Committee April 9, 1935

Lattice Room, Statler Hotel.

1. Purpose of the Meeting:

So many of those present have been participants in previous Campaigns of the Welfare Fund and the Federation, that there is little need to review the procedure to be followed in organizing the Soliciting Groups for the Campaign.

Return to former Plan of Organization Due to the difficulties which appeared to hamper our solicitors in going to men in their own lines of business and profession, for pledges during the past few years, we had given up the plan in the Campaigns of the last three years. However, the improvement of conditions generally, warrants us in returning to this well-tried and logical procedure in organizing.

Most of those who are here today, have served faithfully and energetically as Chairmen and Vice Chairmen, and we shall look to them for the same leadership in organizing their Divisions.

New Prospect List Our Prospect list will of course include all of the subscribers of last year and the year before; and the list has also been augmented by a careful Directory search for new names. The total number of Cards for assignment will run to about ,000. The number of subscribers of last year, was 3,000.

These Cards have been broken down into 32 Trade and Professional Divisions; and the approximate number of Cards for each Division, is noted on the Lists which you have before you. The amount of organization for each Division, will depend therefor on the number of Cards to be assigned.

In addition to the Chairman, or Co-Chairmen, in each Division, there should be enough Vice Chairmen chosen, to cover fairly well, the different Classifications within each Division. For example, in the Furniture Division, there are such special lines as Radios, Rugs, Carpets and Floor coverings, ~~stony~~ Beds and Bedding manufacturers and Dealers, etc; these separate Classifications may justify a special Vice Chairman to have a few workers selected by himself. The aggregate of all of these Chairmen and Workers, will constitute the entire Division, working under the Furniture Division Chairman.

We have never covered the Cleveland Jewish Community as thoroly in recent years, as we did for example in 1926 when we had more than twice the number of subscribers we now have. We want to do the job as completely this year as possible, and it will take man-power to do it.

Complete

Coverage Women's The Women are organizing this year more effectively and more enthusiastically than in past years. Under the leadership of Mrs Herzog and Mrs Levine, a Women's Executive Committee has been organized; and they in turn have chosen Mrs L J Kane, to lead the organization of the women workers.

Co-operation

Their plan is to provide not only the usual quota of Auditors and Office Assistants, but also a substantial group of women who will enlist in the Men's Divisions to take such Cards as can be assigned to them with best results.

It was nice to have had the chat with you last Sunday afternoon.

I am taking the liberty of enclosing herewith a letter which I received a few days ago from Dr. Jonah B. Wise who recently returned from Germany. The letter speaks for itself and for the urgency of the campaign of the Jewish Welfare Fund upon which we are now launched in Cleveland. German relief is but one of twenty-three national and international causes which will be served by our Welfare Fund. Our basic quota this year is \$130,000. Last year we raised only \$86,000 which was far below that of any community anywhere near the size of ours. The prestige of our community has suffered seriously in the last few years through the recurrent failures of our Welfare Fund campaigns. We are making an effort this year to re-establish the Cleveland Jewish community as a leader in American Jewry --- a position of honor which we occupied for many years. Whatever addition you can make to your last year's contribution will be profoundly appreciated by me and by all the officers of the campaign.

My dear Mr. Weisenfeld:

Following up the conversation which we had in your home on the occasion of the delightful party which we had -- I think that one or two editorials within the next two weeks on the subject of "Giving" or "Lack of Giving" on the part of many Jews of Cleveland to the Jewish Welfare Fund would be very timely and helpful.

I believe that a special appeal ought to be made to the orthodox Jews, the rank and file Jews and the "stam" Jews to do much better by this Fund than they have in previous years. It should be pointed out that many hundreds of them who should have given, haven't given a penny in the last few years to the German-Jewish relief, to the Talmud Torah and to the twenty other agencies included in the Fund. Many of those who gave, gave pitifully inadequate sums. I believe that a frank discussion of the subject in your own vigorous style would be tremendously helpful. These Jews should be appealed to on the basis of their Jewish responsibilities as well as the prestige of our community which has suffered so greatly because of the successive failures of our campaigns.

Mr. Bentwich is a noted Author and one of the outstanding legal minds of England, and has been in the public eye frequently in international relations.



Led by Rabbi A H Silver and Rabbi B R Brickner, and with the temples and synagogues playing a very prominent part, the Jewish Welfare Fund Campaign will get under way Sunday evening, May 5, with the "Rosenwald Dinner and Rally". William Rosenwald, co-chairman of the United Jewish Appeal, and son of the late Julius Rosenwald, will address several hundred workers and explain the conditions which make the \$130,000 goal the very minimum which must be obtained.

Twenty-five different national and international welfare causes will receive support from the seven-day campaign. Chief among these is the relief and reconstruction of German, Polish, and other European Jews, whose condition has become increasingly desperate in the past year.

The drive will also be marked by the element of Cleveland Jewry's own prestige as a Jewish community in bearing its share of the national philanthropic responsibilities. Fund leaders have issued comparative figures which show Cleveland far below other cities with smaller Jewish populations.

Cincinnati, with one-fourth Cleveland's Jewish population, raised 40% more; Detroit, also with a smaller Jewish population, contributed 50% more; and San Francisco, with half as many Jews, raised more than twice as much as Cleveland. The campaign has therefore adopted as its slogan, "For the Prestige of Cleveland Jewry," and is emphasizing the need to restore to Cleveland the reputation it once enjoyed as a national leader in philanthropy.

Another element being stressed is the effect which a victory for the anti-Semitic forces in Europe would have upon Jews throughout the world. The degradation of the Jews to the place of a second-rate and inferior people in Germany and other countries would undoubtedly have its effect in England and the United States, and the Jews of these two countries are being urged to lead the battle against these subversive forces.



FOREWORD

In many lands of Europe the Jews now experience insecurity and suffering to an extent which they have never known in modern times. Economic conditions in certain lands have borne with special heaviness on the Jewish population during the past decade. In more recent months the restrictions and the discriminations practised against Jews have assumed new forms of hardship and cruelty. The campaign against Jews in Germany is continuing and even being intensified. Many of the Jews of Germany, seeking escape from the mental torture and physical doom which surrounds them, look eagerly for ports of refuge. But barriers surround them everywhere. Neighboring lands which are generous enough to accept them give them only temporary shelter, forcing them to evacuate after comparatively brief periods. Even those limited few who find permanent domicile cannot obtain work, because of legislative restrictions. The conditions barring new adjustment in other European lands are as oppressive for Jews of Poland as for Jews of Germany.

Great masses of Jews trapped! What shall they do to live? Where shall they go to carve out a new future, which will give them ease of mind and assure for their children a happiness and freedom impossible where they now live?

The answer is one which the Jews of many European lands have already supplied. They plead: Send us to Palestine, where we shall be not refugees but settlers, not wanderers but homemakers for life!

JEWISH IMMIGRATION INTO PALESTINE

The paramount place that Palestine occupies in the organized effort of Jews to save themselves from disaster in lands in which they now live is reflected in the immigration figures of the past two years. Jewish migration to all other countries amounted to a total of less than 30,000 for 1933 and 1934. But Palestine alone, about which there used to be so much doubt as to its resources and size, received and made permanent homes for about 90,000 Jews.

SETTLEMENT OF GERMAN JEWS

During 1933 and 1934 the attention of the Jewish world was focused on the events in Germany. It was natural that great emphasis should be placed, in all lands, and particularly in the United States, on the necessity of aiding German Jews to enter Palestine. It has been universally recognized that Palestine alone, of all countries, is willing and able to accept a large number of those who must flee from Germany.

In the last two years Palestine was able to absorb and provide for the German Jewish refugees a permanent, politically and economically, assured existence. The further influx of German Jews into such countries as France, which at first offered them a haven of refuge in open-hearted generosity, is hedged about with great difficulties. Even many of those who entered are being forced to leave because of the inability to obtain work-permits. Palestine is prepared to receive additional German Jews not merely in the same proportion as before but to absorb them, as well as Jews from all over the world, on a much larger scale -- if the means are made available.

From the spring of 1933 to the first of April 1935, there entered into Palestine 23,000 refugees from Germany, about one-half of them without means. It is expected that during 1935 there will be a further immigration from Germany to Palestine of 15,000 people.

GERMAN CHILDREN

One of the most important tasks of the Central Bureau is supervision of the emigration to Palestine of young German Jews under the age of eighteen. These youths receive their education in various youth institutions and agricultural settlements. The Jewish Agency guarantees to the Palestine Government, on the basis

of funds provided by the Central Bureau, the maintenance of these youths until their eighteenth year. A special commission determines the types of homes in which these youthful immigrants shall be placed. Special buildings have been erected and continue to be built for the housing of these youths.

This task of soliciting funds to which you are so generously devoting your time, may be only a job to you, but it's life to those who will benefit from your efforts.

Jews are actually dying in Poland because they have nothing to eat -- 600,000 lives are being shattered in Germany -- 300,000 are striving for new life in Palestine -- the institutions which are developing the constructive forces in Jewish life, never more important than today, depend upon the contributions you obtain for their very existence.

This is a campaign in which every dollar you get is necessary -- vitally necessary.

The goal that has been set is a minimum - a minimum below which we cannot and must not fall. It does not begin to measure the needs. It is not as much as cities with fewer Jews have given. It is the least that we can give and still maintain our self-respect as a Jewish Community.

If we do not raise the \$130,000 we are seeking, we must truly hang our heads in shame for our failure to carry our share of the burden.

The people whom you are asked to solicit have money -- not as much, perhaps, as they had in 1929, but enough in many instances to give far more than they donated

last year. And they will give far more if they understand how truly desperate the needs are, and how much more fortunate they are, whatever their experiences have been than the Jews of Europe and the destitute sick in this country.

They will give more, too, if they realize fully that they are giving to 25 different agencies, instead of making one donation -- that if the Jewish Welfare Fund didn't exist they would be solicited 25 times each year, by 25 different people, for 25 different purposes -- and that the one contribution they are giving should be enough for all.

On page 11 you will find a copy of the chart with which you will be provided, listing the various agencies in the Fund. In your talk to the prospective donor, after you have made clear the worthiness of our cause and the necessity of his contribution, place this chart in front of him and ask him how much he would give to each institution listed, starting with the first and going down the entire list. Then add up these sums, and attempt to secure his pledge for an amount at least equal to the total.

On each pledge card you will find a figure which is the quota for the prospective donor. When you approach the donor do not inform him that his quota is so much and he is expected to give that much. This figure is only given to you as a guide and we suggest that you do not bring it up until after the prospective donor has stated to you what he is willing to give, and then only if it is under the quota figure.

Many of your prospective donors will, of course, raise several questions in the course of your conversations. The following are a few of the most typical ones, and the answers to them:

Question: What is the Jewish Welfare Fund?

Answer: The Jewish Welfare Fund supports practically all recognized worthy Jewish institutions and causes that are national or international in scope and also certain local Jewish institutions of an educational character. These are listed on pages 5 to 8 inclusive.

Question: In what proportion will the money raised by this year's campaign be distributed among the agencies depending upon the Welfare Fund for Support?

Answer: See page 10.

Question: If I contribute to the Community Fund why should I contribute to the Jewish Welfare Fund?

Answer: The Jewish Welfare Fund does not conflict with the Community Fund. All worthy local Jewish charitable organizations such as orphan homes, fresh air camps, institutions for the aged, etc., are supported by the Community Fund. The Jewish Welfare Fund supports organizations for Jewish relief in foreign lands such as Germany, Poland and other countries where our fellow Jews are downtrodden and persecuted. It supports Jewish tubercular hospitals and other institutions for the relief of the Jewish sick in this country who cannot be cared for in local hospitals, and it supports other organizations which perpetuate the education of our race both in this country and in Palestine. Last but not least, it supports certain agencies which are combating the vicious anti-Semitic propaganda which is being spread in this country and abroad, thus insuring the social and economic freedom of our people in our own native land and elsewhere.

Question: I am pestered by solicitors for other charitable organizations; why should I give so much to the Jewish Welfare Fund?

Answer: The recognized worthy causes are included in the Jewish Welfare Fund. You have discharged your obligation to the community if you give your rightful share to the Community Fund and to the Jewish Welfare Fund.

Question: Why don't the individual institutions solicit their own funds instead of thru the Jewish Welfare Fund? Wouldn't it be better if each of the institutions supported by the Welfare Fund put on its own campaign?

Answer: No. In the first place you would be pestered by 25 different solicitations while now you are approached only once. The cost of putting on this one campaign is less than one-third of the amount expended when the institutions which the Welfare Fund supports promoted their individual campaigns. A much greater amount of your money therefore goes directly to the purpose for which you have given it, and only a minimum amount of the total funds raised is spent in putting on the campaign.

Question: I have heard that the Jewish Welfare Fund has expended large amounts of money in publicity and incurred other considerable expense in conducting the campaign. Is this true?

Answer: No. Thru the generosity of the four local radio stations, the radio has not cost us a penny. The workers and solicitors have all donated their time and paid their own expenses, including lunches at the daily meetings. The only expenditures made are the actual cost of printed matter and the salaries of the necessary clerical help.

Question: There are some organizations in the Fund with which I am not in sympathy. Why should I give as long as they are included?

Answer: In the first place, every one of the agencies in the Fund has been investigated and found worthy of your support.

Secondly, in every campaign of this type, people can be found who differ on the merits of each individual cause. Those which you deem most worthy, other people may dislike. And those which you criticize have supporters who would make great sacrifices to maintain them.

If we are to have a united campaign and unified social effort, we must accept and respect each other's philanthropic preferences.

Even if you can't see the value of some of the agencies, there are enough others which you do approve, and which require all the support which you can possibly give.

Question: Why should I give when I am already supporting my family and relatives?

Answer: A great many of us are doing the same thing, and we ought to be thankful that we can. But how about those who do not have any relatives or friends to provide for them? How are they going to live?

Question: Can't you wait until I think it over?

Answer: We're making a real effort to complete this campaign in a week. I have pledged to devote the entire week to the work and have many other prospects assigned to me. If you give me your subscription now, my report at tomorrow's luncheon will greatly encourage all the other workers.

## WHAT DO THESE AGENCIES DO?

### RELIEF AND RECONSTRUCTION

#### **GERMAN JEWISH CHILDREN'S AID, INC.**

is making possible the education and maintenance of 250 German Jewish children who have come to this country because life holds nothing for them in Germany. The children are being placed in private homes which will provide for their entire support.

---

#### **HEBREW IMMIGRANT AID SOCIETY**

is assisting as many Jews as possible to leave Germany, and to establish themselves in other countries; helps European Jews who have come to the United States to locate their relatives, adjust themselves, learn the language, find work so that they do not become public charges.

---

#### **JOINT DISTRIBUTION COMMITTEE**

provides food, clothing and shelter for hundreds of thousands of poverty-stricken Jews in Germany, Poland, and other European countries; cares for German refugees; assists many of them to become self-supporting once more through small loans; cooperates in their vocational retraining; establishes many on farms; carries on a health and child care program; promotes the economic development of Palestine.

---

#### **JEWISH AGENCY FOR PALESTINE**

provides a haven for thousands of persons in Palestine; purchases land, arranges agricultural settlement, makes available business credit, trains immigrants for various occupations, maintains schools and health centers, develops the natural and mineral resources of the country.

---

#### **PEOPLES ORT FEDERATION**

Trains unskilled persons, and doctors, lawyers, and former government officials who have been thrown out of employment and forbidden the opportunity to earn a livelihood in their professions by the German government, for skilled work as artisans and technicians, so that they might support themselves and their families; provides artisans and farmers with tools, raw materials, and other supplies on credit; builds cooperative factories, artels, colonies.

---

#### **ROTHSCHILD-HADASSAH HOSPITAL**

will be built in connection with the Hebrew University, to relieve the badly over-crowded and inadequate facilities that exist at present; it will contain 300 beds, and will provide medical care and research. The fund is being raised in the United States through the joint efforts of the American Jewish Physicians Committee and Hadassah.

## PROTECTION OF THE SOCIAL, POLITICAL, AND ECONOMIC RIGHTS OF JEWS

---

### AMERICAN JEWISH COMMITTEE

combats discrimination, and aids the victims of persecution in all countries where anti-Semitism is manifested; exposes anti-Semitic movements in the United States; contacts government officials, organizations, religious bodies both here and abroad in carrying out these purposes and in promoting a program of enlightenment and tolerance; carries on its purposes in a quiet manner.

---

### AMERICAN JEWISH CONGRESS

through committees on economic problems, legislation, universities, and on the economic status of Jews, attempts to prevent and break down anti-Jewish discrimination in these fields; stimulates the anti-German boycott; sponsors American and international rehabilitation. It uses more direct methods than the American Jewish Committee, such as public protest meetings.

---

### B'NAI B'RITH ANTI-DEFAMATION LEAGUE

through its national organization and local vigilance committees throughout the country, covers the press, stage and screen, schools, business, and other walks of life in discovering and combatting anti-Semitic propaganda and activities.

---

### JEWISH TELEGRAPHIC AGENCY

gathers and disseminates news of Jewish life, conditions, and activities in all parts of the world. Its reports reach practically the entire Jewish and general press of the United States and other countries, and act as a tempering and protective influence on behalf of the rights of Jews wherever they may be infringed.

---

### LEAGUE FOR HUMAN RIGHTS AGAINST NAZI-ISM

stimulates the boycott of German goods in Cleveland, promotes harmonious relations among the various groups in the community, and acts as a clearing house for local organizations in spreading information and in investigating complaints regarding anti-Semitic propaganda.

---

### CARE OF THE AFFLICTED

#### JEWISH CONSUMPTIVES RELIEF ASSOCIATION (LOS ANGELES)

cares for indigent tubercular patients who have come from all parts of the country to Los Angeles, seeking cure; in addition to medical treatment it provides religious, social, and recreational programs for the patients.

## JEWISH CONSUMPTIVES RELIEF SOCIETY (DENVER)

provides similar care for tubercular persons who have come to Denver for treatment and are without funds; it carries on a research program for the prevention and early detection of the disease, and trains patients for occupations suited to their physical condition.

## LEO N LEVI MEMORIAL HOSPITAL

treats persons who have come to Hot Springs to take advantage of the medicinal value of the mineral waters, and who become penniless there; it gives clinic and general hospital service.

## NATIONAL HOME FOR JEWISH CHILDREN (DENVER)

gives shelter, education, and training to destitute children whose tubercular parents had come to Denver in the hope of treatment and cure.

## CULTURAL AND EDUCATIONAL

### BUREAU OF JEWISH EDUCATION (CLEVELAND)

was organized in 1924 to establish and promote Jewish religious and educational schools for those children whose parents could not afford to affiliate themselves with Temples or Synagogues, for the study of Jewish religion, history, and culture in the light of American ideals and citizenship. It maintains two affiliated school systems: the Council of Jewish Women, the Hebrew School and Institute. Its extension program includes the adult Institute of Jewish Studies, League of Jewish Youth, and the Young Judea organizations.

## GRADUATE SCHOOL FOR JEWISH SOCIAL WORK

trains persons for skilled professional service in Jewish social work, equipping them with a knowledge of Jewish life as well as a thorough grounding in a social service technique. Its graduates are placed in all parts of the country.

## HEBREW UNIVERSITY OF PALESTINE

brings higher education in medicine, the sciences, and humanities to the people of the Near East, both Jew and non-Jew. Extension work is given in the villages and colonies, and scientific research is applied practically to stamp out malaria, check cattle and poultry diseases, and aid agriculture and industry. Its medical library, the only one of note in the entire Near East, is used extensively by physicians throughout Palestine. It has added 15 German refugee professors.

## HILLEL FOUNDATIONS OF B'NAI B'RITH

provide students at nine American universities with religious services -- Reformed, Orthodox, and Conservative -- instruction in Jewish history, literature and culture, sponsors debates, forums, lectures, carry on dramatic activities, promote interdenominational understanding and gives financial assistance to those in need. They seek to prepare these students for future leadership in their own communities.

## JEWISH WELFARE BOARD

is a coordinating center for the development of Jewish Centers throughout the country. It also provides welfare and religious service for Jewish men in the United States army, navy, marines and government hospitals.

## MENORAH ASSOCIATION

aims to study and advance Jewish culture and ideals among Jewish college students and the Jewish community at large. It has 36 member societies in American colleges publishes the "Menorah Journal", conducts the School for Adult Jewish Education in New York, sponsors the Menorah Educational Conference, composed of faculty members. and the Menorah Summer School.

## NATIONAL FARM SCHOOL

AMERICAN JEWISH  
ARCHIVES

prepares and places city-bred young men in scientific agriculture. The only school of its kind in the country, it draws students from many states, provides both theoretical and practical training on its excellently equipped farm, and finds employment for them in widely dispersed areas.

## GENERAL SERVICES

### PASSOVER FUND

provides for the special Passover needs of Jewish families on relief in this country; the Welfare Fund supplements the amount raised by the Federation of Jewish Women's Organizations.

## JEWISH STATISTICAL BUREAU

collects and distributes information on various phases of Jewish life today, such as immigration, vocational followings, etc. It publishes bibliographies and factual studies, serving directly a large number of libraries, public bodies and individuals.

## NATIONAL COUNCIL OF JEWISH FEDERATIONS AND WELFARE FUNDS

stimulates and coordinates the activities of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds throughout the country, and supplies them with factual information concerning the budgets and services of the various national agencies which they support.


CHART SHOWING ALLOCATION OF FUNDS

Touching the question of your letter, I am not at all clear in my own mind as to what the correct procedure should be. My first reaction is that no attempt at a formal statement of the religious position of Liberal Judaism today should be attempted at this time. Any attempt to formulate religious creeds at this time will prove, I am afraid, an unprofitable labor. It is likely to lead to a tremendous amount of theologic controversy which, particularly at this moment in Jewish history, would not be helpful. The old Pittsburgh Platform is binding upon no member of the Conference. It has not been in the way of any progressive measures which the Conference has in recent years wished to adopt and it has certainly not interfered with the theologic independence of any one in the Reform Jewish Ministry. The Pittsburgh Platform has been generally ignored.

I am certain that no general agreement on any important item in a new platform can be had.

A periodic discussion at our Conferences on the part of individual members of the Conference of important Jewish concepts and religious values is desirable. That such discussions should lead to the formulation of a creed or a platform is quite another matter.

I should like to discuss this subject with you further when we shall have occasion to meet. Letters are altogether unsatisfactory. With all good wishes, I remain



# *In the Scales of History*

## A Brief Account of the REBUILDING OF THE JEWISH HOMELAND IN PALESTINE

### FOREWORD

**I**N many lands of Europe the Jews now experience insecurity and suffering to an extent which they have never known in modern times. Economic conditions in certain lands have borne with special heaviness on the Jewish population during the past decade. In more recent months the restrictions and the discriminations practised against Jews have assumed new forms of hardship and cruelty. The campaign against Jews in Germany is continuing and even being intensified. Many of the Jews of Germany, seeking escape from the mental torture and physical doom which surrounds them, look eagerly for ports of refuge. But barriers surround them everywhere. Neighboring lands which are generous enough to accept them give them only temporary shelter, forcing them to evacuate after comparatively brief periods. Even those limited few who find permanent domicile cannot obtain work, because of legislative restrictions. The conditions barring new adjustment in other European lands are as oppressive for Jews of Poland as for Jews of Germany.

Great masses of Jews trapped! What shall they do to live? Where shall they go to carve out a new future, which will give them ease of mind and assure for their children a happiness and freedom impossible where they now live?

The answer is one which the Jews of many European lands have already supplied. They plead: Send us to Palestine, where

*we shall be not refugees but settlers, not wanderers but home-makers for life!*

More than 120,000 men and women have made application with the Jewish Agency for Palestine, supreme Jewish authority in the rebuilding of that country, for immigration permits to enter Eretz Israel. Heads of families, individuals; middle class and poor; adults and children—all of them ask that the Land of Promise which beckons in the Near East shall be a land of fulfillment for them too.

The extent to which their requests may be met is dependent on the tempo of development in Palestine and upon the help which can be given by the Jews of America and other lands in creating economic opportunities for self-help.

The American Palestine Campaign is the instrumentality through which the Jews of America give their aid to the Jewish Agency for Palestine in its program of reconstruction.

### *The Keren Hayesod Shows The Way*

THE early beginnings of the rebuilding of the Jewish National Home in Palestine, though having a history of less than two decades of large practical activity, seem very remote today—in the light of the enormous progress that has been made in recent years. Only a few years ago there was great satisfaction when some 3,000 Jews a year were able to enter Palestine. In 1934 some 60,000 Jews were absorbed by Palestine—and yet there is need and room for an even greater annual immigration.

A principal factor in laying the foundations for Palestine's present capacity for the absorption of Jewish immigrants is the Keren Hayesod, the Palestine Foundation Fund. Established in 1920 for the purpose of organizing Jewish support for the colonization of Palestine, the Keren Hayesod during fourteen years of continuous activity has been responsible not only for the progress in colonization, immigration and education, but laid the bases upon which private initiative is today building.

Through the channel of the Keren Hayesod, which is the financial instrument of the Extended Jewish Agency for Palestine, Jews in America as in other lands have contributed substantial sums so that immigrants could be placed on the land,

given new occupations and new perspectives, surrounded with the elements essential for the restoration of a normal, healthy, creative Jewish life.

The Keren Hayesod is today engaged in the same tasks which have occupied it since 1920. Except that its responsibilities have grown greater, its opportunities for service to the Jewish people are larger, and its need of the support of American Jews even more pressing. Through the American Palestine Campaign, which is a constituent member of the United Jewish Appeal, the Jews of America may give to the rebuilding of Palestine: that want and despair may be replaced by contentment and hope.

### Colonization: Yesterday and Today

**I**N the two years 1933 and 1934, approximately 90,000 Jews entered Palestine, including more than 20,000 Jews from Germany. No country in the world equalled or came anywhere near that record. It is, in fact, a record not greatly exceeded by the rate of Jewish immigration to any country at any period in the history of post-war Jewish migration.

The Jewish population of Palestine is today estimated at 325,000\*, compared with 55,000 in 1919. The intervening years constitute an epic in pioneering colonization. Indescribable difficulties were overcome; great sacrifices were made; extraordinary work was done. The vanguard of a people assuring its future worked with energy and devotion in the national interest. Guidance, support, maintenance for this national reconstruction were provided by the Keren Hayesod, as representative of the Jewish people.

Since its establishment, the Keren Hayesod obtained in voluntary gifts from Jews throughout the world a sum of about \$26,000,000. To that amount American Jews contributed some \$13,000,000. The fundamental character of the work done by the Keren Hayesod and the permanent future of its accomplishments is indicated by a recent survey.

A report on January, 1935 on the financial status of the settlements established by the Keren Hayesod showed that some fifty colonies had reached the point where it was no longer necessary for them to obtain financial assistance. Moreover, a number of the colonies had begun to repay the loans extended to them by the Keren Hayesod.

## *Expenditures of the Keren Hayesod*

**I**N Judea, in the Sharon Valley, in the Valley of Jezreel, in the Jordan Valley, in Galilee, the colonies and training farms of the Keren Hayesod form a network of Jewish communities that are not only the pride of the Jewish world but the hope of tens of thousands of additional Jews who can be absorbed in these colonies, if they are enlarged, and in new colonies now to be started.

A review of the manner in which Keren Hayesod funds have been distributed indicates its many-sided activities. About \$8,500,000 or one-third was expended on agricultural settlement, including agricultural experiments. Disbursements for education, including the Hebrew University, the National Library and the Haifa Technicum, amounted to 20 per cent. of the total. Public works consume 10 per cent. Half of a total expenditure of \$2,500,000 on public works was spent on road making, improvement of land and water supply. Almost \$1,000,000 went towards the creation of employment and the provision of training various trades and crafts. The immigration program accounted for approximately \$2,500,000. Public Health measures and preventive medicine utilized 6 per cent. Investments in town and country projects, in national and communal institutions consumed more than 4 per cent. and urban colonization about 4 per cent. Religious purposes required about 2 per cent. In order to estimate correctly the considerable sum expended by the Keren Hayesod for religious institutions and interests, it must be kept in mind that the Mizrachi (orthodox) schools contain a third of the pupils of the Jewish educational system, and hence receive a third of the educational budget. The remaining 7 per cent. is distributed over various other fields and includes a fair sum spent on the acquisition of land for the Jewish people.

## *Jewish Immigration Into Palestine*

**T**HE paramount place that Palestine occupies in the organized effort of Jews to save themselves from disaster in lands in which they now live is reflected in the immigration figures of the past two years. Jewish migration to all other countries amounted to a total of less than 30,000 for 1933 and 1934. But Palestine alone, about which

there used to be so much doubt as to its resources and size, received and made permanent homes for about 90,000 Jews.

Once a negligible center of Jewish life, Palestine is today the eighth country in the world having a large Jewish population, being above even Great Britain and Austria. But Palestine occupies the first place in the world in its ratio of Jewish population. Jewry in Eretz Israel represents 25 per cent. of the settled population of the country, as compared with 3½ per cent. in the United States, 10½ per cent. in Poland, 2 per cent. in Russia and 5½ per cent. in Roumania.

The part played by the Keren Hayesod in developing Palestine's absorptive capacity cannot be overestimated. Today Palestine is a country in growth, whose economic and industrial activities assume ever new and larger forms. The land is in great need of labor, both in agriculture and industry. The possibilities for Jewish immigration increase in proportion to the development of the country. Thousands of people come into Palestine who have means of their own and whose projects in urban and rural centers create room for additional people. It is the task of the Keren Hayesod to provide for those who are without means, to direct their immigration to Palestine, to give them a place in the agricultural life of the country, and to equip them with the necessary elements for a satisfactory adjustment.

### Maintenance of Education

PALESTINE Jewry has one of the most progressive school systems in the world. Some 30,000 children attend the kindergartens, elementary schools, secondary schools, technical and manual schools and teachers' seminaries which comprise the system. The establishment of Hebrew as the dominant language of instruction is as great an achievement in the social and cultural sphere as the integration of Jewish labor on the land.

The Keren Hayesod during its period of activity spent nearly \$5,000,000 on education. The expenditure on this item has been reduced from year to year because the Jewish population of Palestine has grown stronger and stronger year after year, and has become able now to maintain its educational service with the help of a small ratio of the contribution which

had been made previously by the Keren Hayesod for this purpose. The continuance of the contribution is justified from every point of view as there are in Palestine communities, especially Oriental communities, and strata of new immigrants—who cannot give their children the education they should have, because their economic position is not yet stabilized. As for the new generation, all of Jewry must feel responsible.

### *Contribution To Urban Development*

THE Keren Hayesod has done much for urban development. Few people know that the Jewish city of Tel Aviv, humming with life, also was not built without aid from the national "treasury". It was impossible to begin building Tel Aviv itself without the 300,000 gold francs which were loaned in 1909 by the Keren Kayemeth to the home-building group which laid the foundations of Tel Aviv. On Keren Kayemeth land stands the "Gymnasium", which was an important factor in the town's development during its early days. The Great Synagogue of Tel Aviv, also was erected on a Keren Kayemeth plot. The Nordia and Haza-fon quarters of Tel Aviv, which have considerably enlarged their area, are built on Keren Kayemeth tracts. As for the share of the Keren Hayesod in Tel Aviv, the average citizen of that city probably does not know that without the £103,000 which the Keren Hayesod invested in the electrification project, there might today have been no cheap power for his factory, or electric lighting for his home. If Hebrew accents are heard on the lips of the children in the streets of Tel Aviv, the Keren Hayesod is entitled to the credit of having fostered Hebrew schools and Hebrew education in Palestine during all these years. Few people know how many homes were built in Tel Aviv with the help of the Keren Hayesod, how many roads were laid with its assistance, how many immigrants were enabled by it to establish themselves there.

For labor and public works in the towns and on the land, the Keren Hayesod has expended \$520,000 to date; of this amount \$135,726 in Tel Aviv and Jaffa; \$59,026 in Jerusalem and its suburbs; \$41,016 in Haifa; \$7,259 in Afule; \$23,350 in Petach Tikvah and \$17,441 in Ness Ziona.

The Keren Hayesod has helped Jewish workers to make their way into all occupations existing in Palestine, and to introduce new pursuits previously unknown. Though certain institutions were unable to hold their own when the crisis came, their value as a training ground for workers can hardly be over-estimated.

For commerce and industry, the Keren Hayesod has paid out £46,587 in the form of loans to various industries, such as textiles, leather, stone-cutting, fisheries, etc. In addition, it invested £103,183 in the Palestine Electric Corporation, £13,288 in the Palestine Potash Corporation (Dead Sea Concession) and £22,871 in various credit institutions. The Keren Hayesod also invested £56,408 in the General Mortgage Bank at Tel Aviv.

The Keren Hayesod erected and acquired buildings for schools and public institutions in the cities, as for example, the Jewish Technical Institute and the Hebrew Secondary School at Haifa, the immigrant shelters at Tel Aviv and Haifa, the Hebrew Gymnasia, the Laemel School, Boys School A, and the Tachkemoni School in Jerusalem, the Mothercraft Training Centre in Tel Aviv and others.

### General Growth of Palestine

**T**HREE was a time—not so long ago—when discussion of Palestine had to include proof that it was capable of supporting the Jews who entered the country. But Eretz Israel has passed that stage. Its rapid development is such that the Jewish imagination can hardly keep abreast of the progress being made. On all sides there is overwhelming evidence that in Palestine Jews are finding and will continue to find in ever larger numbers—not merely the peace and freedom of the Jewish National Home, but a new economic opportunity which assures them of a comfortable livelihood.

In the agricultural settlements, the Jewish population increased from 14,990 in 1922 to 70,000 in 1935.

In the season 1934-35, Palestine will produce an orange crop of 7,000,000 cases, as compared with 1,000,000 in 1922. Experts prophesy that the crop will reach 20,000,000 cases in the very near future.

In 1928 there were 3,505 Jewish and non-Jewish industrial and textile undertakings in Palestine. At the beginning of 1935 the Jewish industrial establishments alone reached the figure of 3,600, employing about 24,000 workers, with an investment of \$30,000,000 and an annual production of more than \$30,000,000.

So rapid is the influx of Jewish immigration in Palestine that the building construction industry cannot keep pace with it. In August, 1933, there were 6,788 workers in the building trade, and in August, 1934 the number had increased to 11,194.

An interesting reflection of the many-sided growth of the country is the fact that Palestine Electric Corporation sold for power and lighting during 1933 a total of 7,551,000 kilowatt hours of electricity, and during 1934 a total of more than 13,000,000 hours, with consumers increasing from 18,000 to almost 29,000. One of the most important founders of the Palestine Electric Corporation, which is headed by Pincus Rutenberg, was the Keren Hayesod which invested \$500,000 in this most important Jewish enterprise.

### Settlement of German Jews

DURING 1933 and 1934 the attention of the Jewish world was focused on the events in Germany. It was natural that great emphasis should be placed, in all lands, and particularly in the United States, on the necessity of aiding German Jews to enter Palestine. It has been universally recognized that Palestine alone, of all countries, is willing and able to accept a large number of those who must flee from Germany.

In the last two years Palestine was able to absorb and provide for the German Jewish refugees a permanent, politically and economically, assured existence. The further influx of German Jews into such countries as France, which at first offered them a haven of refuge in open-hearted generosity, is hedged about with great difficulties. Even many of those who entered are being forced to leave because of the inability to obtain work-permits. Palestine is prepared to receive additional German Jews not merely in the same proportion as before but to absorb them, as well as Jews from all over the world, on a much larger scale—if the means are made available.

In recognition of the special situation in Germany, the Jewish Agency for Palestine has been making available to German Jews a third of all the immigration certificates allotted to it by the Palestine Government. A part of this quota is also being distributed to refugees in various countries.

### Palestine, Keystone of the Jewish Future

THE tasks of the Central Bureau include the acceptance and training of agricultural urban workers, settlement of agricultural laborers' groups, colonization of middle class settlers, granting of loans to manufacturers, artisans and small trades people, giving information and advice in all branches of economic adjustment, transportation of children from Germany



and their settlement in Palestine, support of economic institutions in Palestine for the appointment of Jewish scientists from Germany, first aid and social care for the immigrants, obtaining and distributing Palestine immigration certificates for refugees from Germany, provision of funds for loans for irrigation work and for the enlargement of areas suitable for intensive cultivation in existing settlements.

From the spring of 1933 to the first of April 1935, there entered into Palestine 23,000 refugees from Germany, about one-half of them without means. It is expected that during 1935 there will be a further immigration from Germany to Palestine of 15,000 people.

Of the 23,000 German Jews who settled in Palestine, 9,000 went on the land and about 14,000 into the towns. About 60 per cent. of the immigrants are under thirty years of age, and therefore, represent a source of energy for Palestine. This figure also indicates that German Jews will be able to adjust themselves to living conditions in Palestine. The German Jews who have settled in the cities have established new industries and have introduced new projects. This work was furthered by grants of Jewish National Fund land and by extension of credits through the Central Bureau. Even more important has been the assistance given to the small traders interested in handwork and small merchandising.



ONE of the most important tasks of the Central Bureau is supervision of the emigration to Palestine of young German Jews under the age of eighteen. These youths receive their education in various youth institutions and agricultural settlements. The Jewish Agency guarantees to the Palestine Government, on the basis of funds provided by the Central Bureau, the maintenance of these youths until their eighteenth year. A special commission determines the types of homes in which these youthful immigrants shall be placed. Special buildings have been erected and continue to be built for the housing of these youths. This department is under the direction of Miss Henrietta Szold. The general director in Palestine is Dr. Arthur Ruppin, Chairman of the Executive of the Jewish Agency for Palestine.



Juvenile groups have been distributed in such Palestinian settlements and farms as Ben Shemen, Ain Charod, Tel Joseph, Children's Home Ahawah in Haifa, Girls Training Farm in Talpioth, Kibbuz Rodges, Domestic Training School in Jerusalem, Mishmar Haemek, Dagania, and Givath Brenner. By the spring of 1935 a minimum of 1,000 children had found homes in Palestine through the efforts of the Central Bureau.

The plight of the young Jews in Germany and their eagerness to go to Palestine is described in this manner by a German Jew:

"One can well understand the yearning of these young people to leave for Palestine as quickly as possible, when one considers their position in relation to the Christian population of Germany with whom they are obliged to spend most of their time. The enormous extension of the National Socialist movement which, among others, now comprises all the juvenile associations, and the political influence the State exercises over the schools and educational establishments of every description, have broken every link that ever existed between the Jewish and non-Jewish sections of the population. Therefore the young Jew of this generation depends solely upon himself and his kith and kin, and though the Jewish community may have gained new strength from this fact, the young acutely feel being shut off from the active life of the country. Jewish youth in Germany, during the last few years, have experienced the fate of Galuth in a manner touching them so deeply that we must do our utmost to help them to turn this experience into fruitful channels. We must not allow these young people to be crushed under the weight they have to bear."

Dr. Leo Baeck, Chief Rabbi of Germany and President of the Reichsvertretung of the German Jews, in a preface to a booklet issued for German Jewish youth settlement in Palestine, writes:

"To us German Jews it has become a life-task to see to it that our youth may not grow up without the blessings of childhood. To us has been entrusted the sacred task of protecting a growing generation from mental pain and affliction and, whenever necessary, to seek out and prepare for our young people an abode where soul and body which require light and pure air for healthy development, may, protected from all evil, grow up in perfect security. To create valuable men and women by safeguarding their childhood, that is the sacred duty that lies before us.

"Whoever is doing his share to further and support this great cause, in whatever way he may choose, is helping and preparing our future."


### For Whom Is The Appeal?
