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



JUST A MOMENT



WITH THE JEWISH WELFARE FEDERATION

FUND SETS NEW MARK

The largest amount ever raised in a Jewish campaign in Cleveland, pledged by a record number of contributors, is the achievement of the 1938 Jewish Welfare Fund Campaign.

A total of \$343,908 was subscribed by 13,419 persons. This is almost \$15,000 more than the minimum campaign goal, and \$50,000 more than was raised last year. About 3,300 new contributors were enrolled.

Collections too are better than 1937. On August 11, the Fund had collected \$141,873, or 41.3% of the total pledged; last year at the same time receipts were \$112,596, or 38.6% of the total pledged.

That Cleveland's campaign experience was typical of Jewish communities throughout the country is revealed by the fact that 45 of 51 cities have surpassed their 1937 results, despite adverse economic conditions. The 51 Welfare Funds raised \$4,009,946, a gain of 11.8% over last year's total of \$3,586,393 for those communities.

Among the larger cities, Detroit raised \$390,869 from 13,053 contributors, and Los Angeles secured \$340,000 from 8,100 donors. The latter represented an increase of \$87,000 over last year's total. San Francisco, regularly a leader in fund-raising, reported \$345,000 with returns incomplete, and with a Jewish population half the size of Cleveland, Detroit, and Los Angeles.

\$500,000 IN TWO WEEKS

Extraordinary was the success of the two-week tour of Eddie Cantor in England in behalf of the Youth Aliyah. His goal was \$100,000. He raised more than \$500,000. Fourteen hundred children will be transported from Central Europe to Palestine, as a result of his efforts.

Announcement of this achievement was accompanied by the report that 2,300 children have gone to Palestine through the Youth Aliyah. There they have entered 35 agricultural cooperatives and 3 centers where they receive two and three year training courses in agricultural and academic work.

Hadassah is the American agency for the Youth Aliyah. The Cleveland quota is met through the Jewish Welfare Fund.

HOPE FOR REFUGEES

Pressure upon Germany to permit emigrants to take out some of their capital will be the first task of the international refugee organization created by 32 nations under the leadership of President Roosevelt and Myron C Taylor.

Such liberalization of policy is essential if other countries are to absorb large numbers of refugees, delegates agreed. To secure that change is the responsibility of George Rublee, American director of the joint body.

Hope for refugees was seen in the recognition that enforced emigration of persecuted peoples is an international problem, not the concern of a few. Scope of the problem was pointed to by Mr Taylor, when he told the delegates that more than 600,000 emigrants will have to leave Germany within the next five or six years. The United States will help by permitting entry of the full annual quota of 27,000.

Bearing a major responsibility in making possible the emigration and transportation of refugees will be such private organizations as the Joint Distribution Committee, to which a large portion of the Cleveland Jewish Welfare Fund is granted.

Meanwhile, as if in mockery, the Nazi regime struck a new blow with a decree taking licenses from all Jewish physicians. More than 6,000 saw their means of livelihood vanish.

JOBS FOR YOUTH

What occupation to prepare for is a question of deep concern to Jewish youth, perplexing to Jewish parents, troubling to Jewish communities. Caught in the welter of mass unemployment, they face the further difficulties of overcrowding of professions, discrimination against Jews.

A pamphlet recently published by the B'nai B'rith Hillel Foundations shows the lack of balance among Jewish college students, and reflects part of the problem. It reveals that 1 out of every 5 Jewish youth goes to college, compared with 1 of 12 in the general population. One of every 4 law students is Jewish; 1 of every 5 pharmacy students; 1 of 6 medical students; 1 of 6 commerce students. Yet only 1 of every 33 persons in the general population is Jewish.

Other pertinent facts: 1 of every 7 social service students is Jewish; 1 of 7 fine arts; 1 of 9 veterinary medicine; 1 of 10 journalism; 1 of 11 architecture; 1 of 16 engineering; 1 of 33 education; 1 of 40 agriculture.

To help direct Jewish youth to fields other than those already overcrowded, is the purpose of the B'nai B'rith Vocational Bureau. It receives support from the Cleveland Jewish Welfare Fund.

Locally this work is done by the Vocational Adjustment Department of the Jewish Social Service Bureau, and the Group Guidance program of the Council Educational Alliance. Both agencies are members of the Jewish Welfare Federation.



THE HUGE PHILLIPS RANCH OF MONTANA

a possible home for many of the unfortunate Jews
now forced to leave Germany and Austria

American history is replete with the movement of many persecuted or ambitious peoples who have migrated here from their home lands. Pennsylvania owes its existence to the Quakers and its early growth to the Huguenots, Mennonites, Dunkards, Amish and others. Maryland grew out of a Catholic movement and even today the Mormons are still supreme in Utah.

Therefore, there is ample precedent for considering Montana as a home for some of the persecuted Jews of Germany and Austria who must be moved quickly or starve.

Several very outstanding features make the Phillips Ranch well worthy of deep consideration. First of all it is no mere assemblage of waste land, but choice acreage capable of not only supporting enormous herds of cattle, but permitting of almost any diversified program of agriculture being practiced.

Secondly improvements scattered over its 64,000 acres, including reservoirs, ditches, fencing and ranch buildings have a replacement value of \$411,500.00.

Third, it is not some isolated tract far from civilization. Located in Phillips County, with headquarters not far from Malta, the County Seat on the Great Northern Railroad, there is available to newcomers just about any convenience that might be expected in rural America.

On the Phillips lands are 70 miles of creeks. As a vacation land it is without a peer. The nights are cool in summer, the scenery grand and excellent bathing is provided in naturally warm mineral spring water, at one point, which has a temperature of 75°. The old gold mining camp of Landusky lies picturesquely in the mouth of Rock Creek canyon. This town was made famous in the old days by Pike Landusky and the Curry outlaws. Zortman, another similar old gold camp, adjoins ranch holdings to the northeast.

The Phillips ranch lands have oil possibilities as they lie somewhat north of a line drawn between the Cat Creek and Kevin oil fields. The oil producing formations are persistent throughout eastern and north central Montana and underlie these lands. There are five known structures on the ranch lands. Two gas wells, said to produce over 2,000,000 cubic feet per day, at a depth of less than 600 feet, have already been struck close to ranch holdings.

All the units of Phillips Ranch provide sport for the hunter, as sage hens and pin-tail grouse are ordinarily plentiful, as well as many species of wild ducks, which raise their young in large numbers on these lands. The Missouri River brakes, along the southern bound-

ary of the county, are the natural habitat of the blacktail and white-tail deer which will be kept perpetually stocked from the Little Rocky Mountains, which are designated as a Federal Game Preserve.

In addition to game, there are many fur-bearing animals on the property such as beavers, muskrats, mink of especially fine quality, weasels, skunks, badgers, etc. which are of considerable value to the ranch.

The irrigated land of the Phillips Ranch, having been appropriated early in the agricultural development of Montana, is deep and of high quality. It is equal to the best irrigated land in eastern Montana. It has a high lime content which makes it especially valuable in the production of alfalfa. It also produces heavy crops of wheat, oats, barley, corn and other grains, as well as excellent root crops.

In the tabulation of values shown below, it is well to keep in mind that they are in line with what comparable lands elsewhere in the state command. However, in other places, there is a water charge of \$60 per acre to be paid to the Government over a 30-year period. In contrast, the Phillips Ranch is provided with ample water through its own privately owned, fully-paid, perpetual water rights which are supplemented by adequate storage facilities paid for.

Taxes, state and county, for the year 1936 were \$6400.00. This included taxes on personal property.

Before Congressional appropriations ran out, the Government had the lands under consideration for relocation of farmers from submarginal areas.

To settle the estate of Benjamin D. Phillips and distribute the proceeds among five heirs, this property is now for sale at a truly sacrifice price.

As a class the Jews of Germany and Austria are among the most highly educated peoples of the earth. Among them are to be found skilled scientists, professional people and artisans and business people of every description. To attempt to move them in small numbers and scatter them all over the world would be both costly and dissipate their influence for constructive good.

Picture the possibilities of several thousand of these people located here in Montana. In the beginning they would be self-supporting through cattle raising, farming and later dairying, poultry raising and other agricultural activities.

Just to care for their own cooperative needs would result in the building of big businesses. Later on such resourceful people would expand business. Very likely they would develop holdings for gold, oil, gas and fur-bearing animals.

Not only would they soon become self-supporting but do great things for Montana. Just as the Quaker influence remains in Pennsylvania and the Mormon influence in Utah it is reasonable to believe that they would become a great power for good.

At first glance, my interest might appear to be nothing but that of a real estate broker trying to sell lands for a client. However, I believe that here is the germ of an idea for some real humanists or group of such people. America would gain by the acquisition of such people and the people of this Nation, who are going to do something for the Jews regardless, might do their bit on a grand scale and one that would be economical for all concerned.

The Phillips Ranch can be purchased for well below its real value and there is nothing about the whole project that will not stand up under the most searching scrutiny of any body of experts.

If you believe that the idea has merit, please advise if it is of personal interest or whether you would be interested in lending your influence to the extent of bringing the matter before bodies of people who would act.

My dear Sam:

I received the formal invitation today of the conference of the Ohio Region of the JDC to be held in Columbus on October 16. I assume that there will be a good representation from Cleveland and I am eager that at this conference, some strong and effective word be spoken in behalf of larger allocations on the part of welfare funds for overseas needs. We have a good record in Cleveland but there are other communities where the reverse is true. The overseas appeal - JDC and UPA - is used to arouse the communities to give generously, but of the total finally raised, only a small percentage, sometimes less than twenty-five percent, is given to overseas agencies. This is true of many communities in Ohio and elsewhere. I had a long talk about this matter with Rabbi Jonah B. Wise yesterday in New York City, and with other leaders of the JDC. They are in full agreement with me that communities ought to be aroused to the emergency situation which confronts our overseas work and should therefore put their allocations for these purposes on an emergency basis. Some of the figures which I could put into your hands are truly startling. The JDC and the UPA have on more than one occasion during the year sent joint communications to certain communities refusing to accept their allocations to these agencies because of glaring inadequacy. It would be fine for some of our representatives at the conference in Columbus to present this matter for discussion. It seems to me that a fifty-sixty percent share of funds raised should be a minimum set aside for overseas relief.


I had already written Schanfarber in Columbus that I would not attend the J.D.C. Regional meeting on October 16th, since I had just returned from New York with others and had had all of the messages and information that are likely to be presented at Columbus by the J.D.C. I know that the Regional Conferences which the J.D.C. has been planning are intended for the smaller communities which have not been as responsive to either national or overseas obligations, as they should be.

It is my impression that time and the process of education are needed to change this situation and I think that the J.D.C. regional meetings may be a helpful means of directing their attention to the gravity of the European conditions and the responsibilities which they must assume proportionately with the whole country. Another difficulty with the very small community is that out of the limited amount of money which it raises, it finds itself embarrassed in offering the national agencies the pittance that would go to them on a general distribution.

These smaller communities have in many instances been largely guided by the average distribution for overseas work shown by the budgetary schedules of the country-at-large. However, they have likewise been unduly influenced by the weight of local interests. Thus, if the community in Canton and Youngstown are strongly B'nai Brith minded, one finds an unreasonable amount of money allocated to the national institutions and purposes of the B'nai Brith.

Minutes of a Meeting of the Board of Trustees and the Jewish Welfare Fund Committee of the Federation held at the Federation Office, Thursday, October 13th, 1938.

1. The following were present: Mr. Joseph M. Berne, Chairman; Mesdames Walter Goldsmith, Norbert Kruger, and Abraham A. Strauss and Messrs. Harry Affelder, Hyman J. Alperin, Milton P. Altschul, Judge Maurice Bernon, Louis S. Bing, Jr., E. L. Geismer, S. P. Halle, Adolph Keller, George B. Mayer, Aaron Permut, Louis H. Schwarzenberg, I. L. Kenen, Ezra Z. Shapiro, Philip Steinberg, Sidney N. Weitz, Alex Wintner, S. D. Wise, and Eugene E. Wolf.

2. The Chairman submitted the recommendation of the Budget Committee for an additional appropriation of \$850 from borrowed funds of the Federation to complete the current year's operation of Camp Wise.

On motion made, duly seconded, and carried, the Board approved this recommendation.

3. The Chairman then submitted also, the recommendations of the Budget Committee with reference to the requests of the German Jewish Children's Aid Committee, the local Coordinating Committee for German Refugees and the Contingent Fund Committee, all as contained in the minutes of the Budget Committee Meeting hereto attached.

On motion made, duly seconded, and carried, the Members representing jointly the Board and the Welfare Fund Committee voted approval of a further allotment of \$1,000 to the German Jewish Children's Aid Committee; \$800 to the local Coordinating Committee for Refugees and \$70 for the Contingent Fund Committee.

4. In this connection, the Chairman advised Mr. Keller that he would arrange a meeting shortly of representatives of the Refugees Committee to discuss the functions and the relationship of the Committee's work to the Federation and the Jewish Social Service Bureau.

5. The Members of the Board and the Welfare Fund Committee were likewise provided with copies of the financial statements of the Federation and the Welfare Fund as hereto attached.

6. The Chairman advised that the reports which Mrs. Schulze had been requested to prepare resulting from her survey of the Vocational Adjustment Department of the Jewish Social Service Bureau, the Group Guidance Project of the Council Educational Alliance and the Superior Through Extension Project of the Council Educational Alliance also, had just been completed and were now available to the Committees which were to take them under advisement. The Chairman stated that the reports were too voluminous to warrant the preparation of additional copies beyond those now available but that anyone interested could make use of the copies in the Federation office.

7. The Members were advised that in accordance with action taken by the Board at a previous meeting, the Officers had paid out of the Capital Reserve Fund the sum of \$516.50 which represented one-half the amount required of the Federation towards the cost of extending a city water main to Camp Anisfield. The total cost, other than for labor which was provided by W.P.A., was \$1,783; Mr. and Mrs. Eugene E. Wolf contributed one-half the Federation's share as a gift and the balance of the cost was being met by contribution of various sums by owners of lake frontage adjacent to the Camp. The payment by the Federation is in the form of a loan to the Jewish Business Girls Vacation Club, evidenced by note, and to be repaid at the rate of not less than \$100 a year.

8. The Chairman advised that the necessary negotiations were being handled with the liquidators of the Union Trust Company whereby the Federation would take over the two mortgages on the property of the Orthodox Jewish Orphan Home in return for its loan of \$6,000 to aid in the settlement of the Home's indebtedness.

9. The members were advised that under date of July 25th, Mr. Fred Ramsey, Director of Public Health and Welfare had inquired as to the Federation's position with regard to the Tuberculosis Convalescent Home constructed recently by the Jewish Consumptive Relief Society of this city. Mr. Ramsey stated that the Women's Society had asked if he could provide patients for their institution; and also, medical service. With the reply to Mr. Ramsey's letter there was also sent, a copy of the statement issued by the Federation at the time its approval of the project was requested and denied. It was suggested that the Secretary read the statement to the Members to acquaint those who had not been on the Board at the time, with the Federation's action which was now justified in the light of subsequent events.
10. Mr. Berne stated to the Members that he had appointed Rabbi Silver and Mr. Sidney N. Weitz as the Federation's representatives with himself to serve on the Implementing Committee for Jewish Education and it was expected that the meetings of the Committee would be arranged soon.
11. The Board was informed that Mr. James R. Garfield had accepted appointment as the fifth member of the Charles Eisenman Award Committee to succeed the late Newton D. Baker. The appointment was concurred in by the other four members of the Committee who are the President of the Jewish Federation, the President of the Welfare Federation, the Chairman of the Community Fund and Mr. Edward M. Baker of the Federation Board.
12. Copies of the audited statements of both the Jewish Federation and the Welfare Fund, prepared by certified public accountants, have been mailed to the Officers of the Federation and the Welfare Fund; and the Chairman advised the Members that those interested might review these audits at the office since the number of copies prepared by the auditors was limited.
13. On behalf of the Federation Board, various letters requiring attention in the interim between Board Meetings, have been sent out. The good wishes of the Board were conveyed to Messrs. William Weisenberg and Philip Frankel in their illnesses; the congratulations of the Board were sent to Bellefaire on the occasion of the celebration of the 70th anniversary of the establishment of the Jewish Orphan Home; and within the past few days letters of condolence were sent to Mrs. Dudley S. Blossom and the Community Fund.
14. The Chairman advised that Messrs. S. P. Halle, Howard Wise, Samuel Goldhamer and himself had been in attendance at the recent national meetings held in New York by the Coordinating Committee for Refugees and the Joint Distribution Committee; representatives of the Federation are expected also to be in attendance at the meeting of the Board of Directors of the Council of Federations and Welfare Funds in Pittsburgh, October 15th and 16th; and at the meeting of the Joint Distribution Committee Regional Conference on October 16th in Columbus; and the annual meeting of the East Central States Regional Conference being held in Louisville on October 22nd and 23rd.
15. Mr. Louis Bing suggested that the Welfare Fund Committee should be more conversant with the policies and activities of the local Anti-Nazi League, it being his feeling that several matters which had had the attention of the League in recent months had evoked criticism of the League's policies.
16. No further business coming before the meeting it was adjourned.

Minutes of a Meeting of the Budget
Committee of the Federation and Wel-
fare Fund held on Thursday, October
13th, 1938, at the Federation Office

1. There were present Mr. S. P. Halle, Chairman; and Messrs. Harry Affelder, Milton Altschul, Joseph M. Berne, Maurice Bernon, Louis S. Bing, Jr., Eugene L. Geismer, Adolph Keller, George Mayer, Max Myers, L. H. Schwarzenberg, Ezra Shapiro, Philip Steinberg, Sidney N. Weitz, S. D. Wise, and Eugene H. Wolf.

2. The Secretary submitted a statement of the Appropriations Account of the Federation, copy of which is hereto attached and which indicated that against appropriations of \$380,385 already made for 1938, the Federation was receiving \$358,385 from the Community Fund; and that there was available in addition \$8,658.86 from Impounded Funds received by the Council Educational Alliance, Jewish Social Service Bureau and Mount Sinai Hospital from the Union Trust Company and applied against their appropriations; and that the borrowings still to be made from the Federation's Permanent Funds amounted to \$13,736.14.

3. Under date of September 7th, 1938, the Officers of Camp Wise Association had advised that approximately \$1,000 additional would be required because of the loss this year of support from the Cleveland Foundation and the Press Fund. Receipt of funds from both of these sources was contemplated when the Camp's budget was made up for 1938. On October 11th, Mr. Treuhart, Treasurer of Camp Wise, advised further that the Press Fund had now contributed \$150 for this season and that, therefore, only \$850 would be required additional from the Federation.

It was moved, seconded and carried that this amount be borrowed from the Federation's Permanent Funds and appropriated to Camp Wise.

4. The Committee was also advised that owing to the Community Funds action in setting the 1939 goal at the same figure as for 1938 and the probability that the Jewish Federation would receive no more than was allotted this year, viz. \$358,385; and possibly less if the Campaign should fail, the Budget Committee Members had been divided into groups to review the budgetary and financial statements of the respective agencies. This review was for the purpose of ascertaining where reductions might be made in the financial requirement for 1939, and if possible, what reallocations might be made in a general budgetary schedule of the Federation. Material was now being prepared for the Committees and they would be asked to meet with the representatives of the Agencies before December 1st.

5. A statement of the Jewish Welfare Fund Appropriations Account was also submitted to the Committee and copies are here attached. The total appropriations as scheduled amount to date to \$342,030 against pledges received from 13,413 subscribers amounting to \$343,932, an excess of about \$1,900 over the amount appropriated. The statement also shows that the total collected to date for 1938 is \$190,422, representing 55.4% of the amount pledged against a collection of 54.8% for the same period on 1937 pledges.

6. Under date of June 30th, the Welfare Association for Jewish Children had called the Federation's attention to its deficit situation resulting from the withdrawal of support of the County Child Welfare Board and the Cleveland Foundation. The current year's deficit was now estimated at \$6,200 of which \$3,000 had been borrowed from the Federation and \$2,000 from the Sinking Fund of the Welfare Federation itself. With reference to the balance of the deficit, viz. \$1,200, the German Jewish Children's Aid Committee through its Chairman, Mrs. Herzog, is now requesting the Welfare Fund to appropriate this amount representing compensation for the placement and supervision of German Jewish children. No such provision had heretofore been made in the Welfare Fund budgeting for this work.

7. The Secretary was asked to state what other requests were before the Welfare Fund for consideration and the Committee was advised that under date of September 22nd, the local Coordinating Committee for Refugees was requesting an increase in the monthly allowance for its work from the present budget of approximately \$700 per month to \$1,125 per month; this would represent an annual budget of \$13,500 against appropriations already made for this work amounting to \$8,600. The increase was for staff enlargement as indicated in a budgetary statement presented to the Refugees Committee and hereto attached. No increased estimate was included for relief expenditures which now had risen to a point above \$500 per month. The net amount required for the balance of the Welfare Fund fiscal year ending February 28th, 1939, was about \$1,900.

8. The Budget Committee was also asked to provide an additional amount of \$70 to the Contingent Fund Committee to cover its allocations of the current year which exceeded the total already allowed by this amount.

9. There were also before the Budget Committee the following appeals for additional funds:

- a) The American Committee for Jewish Palestine Participation in the New York World's Fair, requests an appropriation of \$5,000 from Cleveland towards the cost of building the Palestine Pavilion and Exhibit, which will be approximately \$250,000. The letter of request is signed by Messrs. George Backer as President and Harold Jacobi as Treasurer, with Meyer W. Weisgal as Director.
- b) The American Ort Federation continues its request for a reinstatement of last year's allotment of \$5,000 instead of the appropriation of \$3,500 granted this year.
- c) The HIAS, under date of August 23rd, appeals for a substantial additional appropriation towards an emergency transportation fund of \$250,000. Inquiry was made of the Council of Federations and Welfare Funds for some indication of the validity of this request in the light of the Joint Distribution Committee's expenditures for transportation of emigres. No satisfactory information has as yet been provided by the HIAS.
- d) Under date of October 3rd, the Jewish Telegraphic Agency through its President, Mr George Backer, requested an audience for Mr. Jacob Landau, the Director, who wishes to come to Cleveland to present a report of the European situation with plans for radically improving and extending the work of the Telegraphic Agency.
- e) Mr. Fred Butzel, Chairman of a Special Committee which has been considering the future status of the Graduate School for Jewish Social Work in New York, is calling a meeting of his Committee and the President and Directors of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds in Pittsburgh on Sunday, October 16th. The purpose of the meeting is to present to the Federations and Welfare Funds plans and recommendations for the continuance of the School, provided that adequate funds will be made available by the country-at-large. Tentatively the report indicates the need for Federations and Welfare Funds to double their present contributions.

10. It was apparent to the Members that allocations could not be made in excess of the amount still available and Judge Bernon moved that the sum of \$1,000 be appropriated to the German Jewish Children's Aid Committee of the Welfare Association for Jewish Children; \$800 to the

Coordinating Committee for Refugees and \$70 to the Contingent Fund Committee. The motion was seconded and some discussion ensued as to the advisability of reducing the amount asked by the Welfare Association or to lessen the amounts requested by all three Committees. It was generally recognized that the Refugees Committee's work would call for appropriations at a later date especially for relief and that in the meantime the Refugee Committee had available to it approximately \$3,000 remaining in its \$8,600 appropriation.

Judge Bernon's motion was finally put to vote and carried, with Mr. Bing dissenting.

In this connection, Mr. Keller as Chairman of the Coordinating Committee for Refugees, requested that the situation of his Committee be clarified as to its functions and its relationship to the Federation and to the Jewish Social Service Bureau.

11. With reference to the request of the American Committee for Jewish Palestine Participation in the New York World's Fair, it was suggested that further information be secured by the Secretary as to the project itself and the sources of support from various communities.

12. No further business coming before the meeting, it was adjourned.




Dear Friend:

At a meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Jewish Welfare Federation, held on Wednesday, November 30th, it was decided to communicate with the leading members of our community in further reference to the attempts of our Jewish people to escape from Nazi oppression and persecution.

Many thousands have been fortunate in having relatives or friends here, who have been able to provide for them affidavits and guarantees to enable them to emigrate, or at least to plan for such emigration.

On the other hand, there are many more thousands who are unfortunate, having no one to whom they can turn for such assistance. In the absence of necessary affidavits or other assurances of the possibility of their emigration, they have been and are being interned in concentration camps and otherwise subjected to suffering and degradation. Those who have had affidavits provided them are not, we are being informed, interned in the camps; and those who have been in the concentration camps are, upon receipt of affidavits, being released.

It is for the purpose of appealing to you directly to offer your personal assistance in this situation that we write this letter. A number of our Jewish citizens in Cleveland as in other cities, have volunteered themselves as signatories and guarantors on affidavits of non-dependence to aid in securing the entry of many individuals and families from Germany and Austria. And while the signatory is required, of course, to show satisfactory financial standing, the affidavits are filed directly with the Consuls and are thereby not exposed as public information. Furthermore, the obligation of financial aid or relief which may be incurred at some future time is one which

Will you therefore be willing to join with the others who have already given affidavits and are continuing to do so, in acting as a guarantor for some of those who are pleading so desperately with us for a chance to escape from their plight.

If you are so inclined, please communicate with Mr. Adolph Keller, Chairman of the Cleveland Coordinating Committee for Refugees, at his address, 2230 Superior Avenue. Your assistance is most urgently solicited.




Dear Rabbi:



This will be a Dinner Meeting for which invitations will be extended shortly to the Members of the Jewish Welfare Federation; and the Meeting itself will be open to the general public.



TO ALL THE CHAIRMEN OF THE RESPECTIVE DIVISIONS

Those of us who attended the mid-year Meeting of the Welfare Fund Campaign Officers and Chairmen at the Oakwood Club, Tuesday evening, came away I am sure, firmly convinced of the greater task which confronts us as a result of both the more critical European situation as well as its impact on our American Jewish life. As Dr. Goldmann pointed out, the year 1939 seems destined to bring even more persecutions and a wider spread of anti-Semitism; and some intimation of the very much larger need for the Relief and Refugee work both here and Overseas, was given by Rabbi Silver.

It is well that our minds have become adjusted to this greater responsibility even in advance of Rabbi Silver's advice, and it is quite evident that we must plan now to enlarge and improve greatly our whole Campaign Organization for the Drive next May.

I am, therefore, communicating with you and the other Chairmen of the respective Divisions to ask if you do not think that it might be a very good idea to arrange individual meetings of the Chairmen NOW, to discuss the personnel of your Teams.

If you feel that this suggestion should be followed out, will you please arrange with Mr. Goldhamer for a luncheon or other meeting with your Co-Chairmen for this purpose. An hour spent in preliminary planning now, will I am sure, make our efforts more effective next May.



1913-1919 Federation reorganized. Federation affiliates itself with the Community Fund.



SPOTLIGHT

LOCAL

The Cleveland Community Chest in its 19th annual campaign raised \$4,125,000 against a goal of \$4,450,000; and the Jewish Welfare Federation will receive only \$336,000. To meet the reduced appropriation the Jewish Welfare Federation Board has requested its beneficiary agencies to accept a 7½% reduction from their 1938 appropriations, to apply to the first two months of 1939 until further adjustments can be made.

The Jewish Welfare Fund officers and leaders met on December 13th, 1938 to hear Dr Nahum Goldmann, administrative representative of the World Jewish Congress, and to discuss plans for the 1939 Jewish Welfare Fund campaign. Dr Goldmann elaborated on the theme that anti-Semitism has become an instrument of political action and that Jews must resort to political action to be able to combat the spread of anti-Semitism.

Rabbi Silver, as general chairman of the Jewish Welfare Fund, stated that the 1939 goal of the J.D.C. and U.P.A. will be \$20,000,000, indicating that Cleveland would need to raise upwards of \$600,000 to provide its share.

Max Freedman and Alex Wintner have been added as vice-chairmen of the Campaign Committee.

NATIONAL

At the annual meeting of the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee held in New York on Wednesday, December 21st, Joseph M. Berne, president of the Jewish Welfare Federation and S. P. Halle, chairman of the Budget Committee of the Federation were elected to the Board of Directors.

After a series of meetings held recently in New York City between the representatives of the United Palestine Appeal, the Joint Distribution Committee and the Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds, it was announced that for the year 1939 the appeals of the U.P.A., J.D.C. and the National Coordinating Committee for German Refugees will be joined together in a nation-wide goal of \$20,000,000.

Leaders in Jewish communal activities in the United States and Canada will meet to discuss current problems at the General Assembly of the Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds in Baltimore, Maryland on January 21, 22 and 23. The Council comprises 147 Federations and Welfare Funds in 119 cities. Mrs. Siegmund Herzog in Cleveland is chairman of the Committee on Regional Activity. Other members of the Board from Cleveland are Edward M. Baker, Rabbi Abba Hillel Silver, and Samuel Goldhamer.

Dear Rabbi:

While, from the minutes of a meeting of the Elman Concert Group which was held on January 3rd, it appears that I was a member of the Sub-Committee appointed to make plans for the concert, I was not invited to the subsequent meeting and knew nothing of it until advised by Mrs. Herzog that she had been asked to come to such a meeting; and was then further requested by Mr. Goldman to provide the list of fifty Jewish sponsors for the large Committee.

I requested Mr. Goldman to send me a memoranda of the plans for the meeting, finally, before suggesting any names to him and I received from him today the draft of the minutes here enclosed.

The plans are not along the lines suggested by yourself but rather in keeping with Mr. Ryan's original thought of a large meeting with tickets to be sold as low as twenty-five and fifty cents.

If it is your feeling that we must, nevertheless, go along with the plans as a matter of good-will between ourselves and the non-Jewish groups, I shall try to prepare a list for Mr. Goldman before I leave the city next week. Please give me your reaction and advice and also, please return the minutes.

MEETING OF THE ELMAN REFUGEE CONCERT COMMITTEE

Held Tuesday noon, January 3, 1939, at the Midday Club.

NOMINATION AND ELECTION OF OFFICERS: On nomination of Mr. Walton, the following were unanimously elected: Dr. Culler as Chairman, Mr. Goldman as Secretary.

Dr. Culler announced that Mayor Burton had agreed to act as Honorary Chairman for the Elman Refugee Concert.

DATE OF CONCERT: Dr. Culler announced that the New York office had suggested that Cleveland hold its Elman concert on January 25, 1939, and suggested that this being too short a notice, that the date ought to be advanced to a later date.

Mrs. Carlin also suggested a later date because January 25 would conflict with a large Catholic function which was already scheduled.

Rabbi Silver suggested that in order for this concert to best cooperate with the efforts of the Jewish Welfare Fund Drive in May, that the Elman Concert be held, if possible, toward the middle of April.

Mr. Wiener said that the only possible date at or about that time would be April 11 if it was still available.

Mr. Baker moved that the concert be held, if possible, during the week or two following Easter, thus including the April 11th date. Mr. Ryan seconded. Carried.

Mrs. Carlin, speaking for the Catholic women, expressed appreciation for the postponement and pledged the strong aid of the Catholic women for the concert at the later date.

PLACE AND TYPE OF CONCERT: Mr. Ryan suggested that the concert be held at Public Hall, open to as many people as possible at a price within reach of all in order to (1) raise money and (2) to crystallize as much of the public mind of "the man in the street" as possible.

Rabbi Silver suggested that the concert be held at Severance Hall at higher prices to (1) raise more money and (2) crystallize public opinion by attracting all of Cleveland's most prominent leaders.

Mr. Stashower, Dr. Warren, Mr. Wiener and Mrs. Carlin suggested a combination of both ideas by using Public Hall with a reserved section downstairs at seat prices of \$5.00 or \$10.00 for patrons, the balance at \$1.50 to \$1.00, and the balcony (either reserved or unreserved) at 50¢ to 25¢. This, said Mr. Stashower, should be easier to organize and put over.

CONTENT OF CONCERT: Msgr. Begin (representing Bishop Schrembs and Archbishop Funnels of New Orleans, the National Catholic Head of the Elman Refugee Concert Committee) pledged the cooperation of Cleveland Catholics. He inquired whether Elman would carry the concert alone or whether speakers and other entertainment should be added to the program.

Mr. Stashower suggested the addition of some Cleveland German Singing Organization.

Mr. Eppley moved that the concert be supervised by an executive committee to be appointed by Dr. Culler and that such executive committee be entrusted with arbitrary powers concerning the management, date, place and content of the concert and with all matters incident thereto. Seconded by Judge Petrash. Carried.

Dr. Culler appointed the following committee: Mr. Walton, Mrs. Mussum, Mr. Ryan, Mrs. Wulff, Mrs. Carlin, Mr. Richard Maher, Mr. Wiener, Mr. Stashower, Mr. Bing, Mr. Sam Goldhamer, Mrs. Siegmund Herzog, Mr. Keogh.

The executive committee was instructed to meet as soon as Mr. Wiener received confirmation from New York as to the date for the Cleveland concert.

The meeting adjourned at 2:00 P.M.

MEETING OF THE ELMAN REFUGEE CONCERT COMMITTEE

Held by the members of the Executive Committee, Monday noon, January 16, 1939, at the Midday Club. Dr. Culler presided.

DATE OF CONCERT: On Mr. Wiener's advice that April 11 was available, Mr. Ryan moved that the concert be held on that date. Seconded by Mr. Stashower. Carried.

MANAGEMENT: Mrs. Herzog moved that Mr. Wiener be employed as concert manager. Mrs. Carlin seconded. Carried.

PLACE OF CONCERT AND PRICE RANGE: Mr. Stashower moved that the concert be held in Public Auditorium (at a rental of \$375.00 including all services), that sponsor seats be sold at two for \$5.00, that the balance of reserved seats be sold at \$1.50 and \$1.00 each, and that unreserved seats be sold at 50¢ each, with a number set aside for students at 25¢ each. Seconded by Mr. Keogh. Carried.

Mr. Maher moved that no advertising be solicited for the program. Seconded by Mrs. Mussum. Carried.

TYPE OF CONCERT: It was the sense of the committee that Elman appear alone with no assisting artists or speakers; that the printed program carry the names of sponsors, a citizens committee of 50 from each of the 3 groups, and editorial matter concerning the purpose of the concert; that Mr. Baker, Mr. Ryan and Mr. Mather be invited to act as co-chairman under the honorary chairmanship of Mayor Burton.

The meeting adjourned at 1:45 P.M.

Dear Rabbi:

I am leaving the city this evening for my usual vacation at this time of the year and want to keep you informed on the developments in our plans for the Campaign Organization to date.

Mrs. Herzog has, of course, had her women together and is proceeding with organization plans; and will want to discuss with you the very important question of the participation of women of means in the support of the Campaign. This was particularly discussed at the Baltimore Conference because of the success which was achieved in Philadelphia and in New York where special efforts have been made in this direction. Kurt Peiser was especially enthusiastic over the results of the effort which they made this year with such women and the results which were achieved, he says, without affecting in any slight degree the gifts of their husbands.

During the past two weeks I have had about eighteen meetings with Chairmen of the various Divisions, selecting personnel for their Teams and revamping this personnel where men needed to be dropped and new ones added. Every Team will be enlarged this year both in its leadership and in workers. This is being done not only because there are more cards in the prospect list than every before, but also for the psychological value of enrolling large numbers as a means of committing them more directly and effectively to the Campaign.

Letters will be going out about the end of February when I expect to be back in the city to all of those who are being invited to serve in the respective Divisions and most of these

letters will be on the business stationery of the respective Chairmen, and signed by them personally. In doing this piece of work earlier than heretofore, we should be in better position to develop our Campaign organization to a higher degree of perfection than ever before. The Chairmen are planning preliminary meetings with their Vice-Chairmen for the purpose of assigning workers in groups to each of those who head the Divisions, all for a better followup system during the Campaign.

In addition, I am sending special letters where requested, on the Temple stationery and over your signature. We will be sending you copies of these special letters so that you will not be taken unawares by any personal responses which you may be receiving in acknowledgment of the invitations which you are extending. I trust that Miss Kline will promptly forward such responses to me so that our records will be complete and up-to-date at all times.

I have already discussed with Isidor Coons and with Montor plans for Speakers for our Campaign Meetings; I have asked George Backer, especially since he made such a fine impression at the Baltimore Meeting again; and Mr. Montor is trying to schedule the visit of the Marchioness of Reading for February 23rd which will be approximately the date of her return to New York from Chicago and after she has spoken in New York and Washington. It was my feeling that any successful results of her work in those cities would give impetus to any plans here with the women. Mrs. Herzog will arrange with Mr. Bernstein for a gathering of the women, perhaps at Mrs. Jessie Hays's home or at Mr. S. P. Halle's home, whichever may be found available.


It will interest you to know that Mr. C. K. Sunshine reacted very generously to our letter to him and we are to have quarters in the Ninth-Chester Building at no cost except for light and cleaning service. I am to see the manager of the building today for arrangements and expect to put our force of girls into the quarters about the first of March.

I hope that you will have in mind yourself some persons whom we might ask as Speakers for our Campaign and for preliminary meetings; also, if the opportunity offers while Mr. Dauby is still at home, will you get his assurance of heading up the Pre-Campaign Gifts Committee again. We shall probably need to divide this work and I may have separate meetings for the lower groups of givers with Sam Wise and Phil Frankel acting as Chairmen.

Have you heard that there are two initial gifts already offered for the New York Campaign of \$250,000 each? Mr. Willen intimated something of this kind in his talk at Baltimore.

The Executive Committee of the World Jewish Congress takes the liberty of asking you to grant \$5000 toward the work of the Congress.

The Chairman of our Administrative Committee, Dr. Nahum Goldmann has had the privilege, in December 1938, to address a meeting of your officers and co-workers convened by the Federation in Cleveland and presided by Rabbi Dr. Abba Hillel Silver. In his address, Dr. Goldmann outlined the kind of work which the World Jewish Congress is doing and its achievements during the last years, as well as the urgent necessity for organising the defence of Jewish rights in central and eastern European countries where they are menaced more than ever.

A fortnight ago, a session of the Administrative Committee of the World Jewish Congress was held in Paris, attended by representatives of Jewries in central and eastern European countries - Roumania, Poland, Hungary, Czechoslovakia, Yugoslavia, Lithuania. Their reports indicated the menace of terrible catastrophes which threaten the existence of millions of Jews in Roumania and Poland, catastrophes of the kind of those which struck German Jewry, if appropriate measures are not rapidly taken to avert the danger.

The situation is serious but not hopeless and a well organised action may save these Jewries as we succeeded in saving Roumanian Jewry during the Goga regime. But such action requires considerable funds while we are badly hampered by an acute lack of money. We need a defence fund of at least \$150,000 to \$200,000, and in several countries special actions are under way to collect such a fund. In view of your warm reaction to Dr. Goldmann's address, we are confident that your Board will recognize the purposefulness of the work we

are doing and the justification of our application. We are certain that in granting this contribution your Federation will set an example to many other Welfare Federations in the United States to support the defence work carried on by the World Jewish Congress.

We should be grateful if our application could be considered as soon as possible and your decision communicated to us.

Dear Doctor Silver,

I venture to send you enclosed copy of the application which our Executive sent today to the Jewish Welfare Federation, care of its President, Mr. Berne.

I hope sincerely that you will back our application in your Board, and am certain that with your support the amount which we have asked for will be granted. I cannot tell you how badly we need new resources. We are engaged in many activities designed to prevent catastrophies in Roumania and Poland where intervention on a large scale is extremely urgent; if such action is not taken promptly and vigorously, we may have to face in these countries situations worse than in Germany.

Another important item of our work just now is one I did not want to mention in our official application but which you may impart to your Board if you wish to do so. It is the share which we are taking in preparing the defence of young Grynszpan. The World Jewish Congress is getting together an important documentation for the trial, which will subsequently be published as a Black Book on the situation of the Jews in Germany. The funds which Mrs. Dorothy Thompson has collected will be used exclusively to pay the attorneys. We need additional funds for collecting documentation, since it is our intention to make this trial one of the greatest political trials of the decade. We cannot, you will well understand, make a public appeal for funds for this purpose, but you should know of this our work and bring it to the attention of your Board.

I am sure you will agree with me that \$5000 is not too much for all the work we are doing, and I trust earnestly that you will put it through with your Board.

I was really deeply impressed by the warm response to my address at the dinner you have presided and which was so perfectly arranged. I do hope that the understanding which I found with your group will materialize in an appropriate cheque.

I hope too that next summer, when you will certainly be in Europe to attend the Zionist Congress we will find a way of connecting you more closely with the World Jewish Congress by working out a scheme for the representation of the WJC in America not limited exclusively to the American Jewish Congress. We cannot afford to have men like you outside our work, especially as our views on Jewish policy are identical.

For the time being, I ask you earnestly to help us by taking care of our application.

Dear Mrs. Herzog:

It was kind of Rabbi Silver to mention to you the Women's Division of the Jewish Welfare Fund here in Chicago as we occupy a very small financial place in our general campaign. I am happy, however, to tell you of our procedure, in case I can be of any help to you.

We organized the Women's Division through Jewish women's clubs and organizations by calling a large meeting of all presidents and by asking them to appoint a chairman in their organizations in charge of raising funds for refugees. The chairman was then asked to appoint a committee commensurate with the size of her organization, so that each member might be contacted personally and no worker be given too many names to solicit. We have tried to stress the importance of each organization continuing the work for which it was founded, as we felt that even in this emergency we did not want to impair or curtail current activities.

We asked that each woman give a personal contribution out of either her household budget or her clothes allowance or out of some fund which she could call her own. We also tried to stress that men were being solicited through the Men's Division and that a husband's giving in no way precluded the possibility of an extra subscription from the wife. In this connection, there is a matter of timing, as it would be likely that this might tend to curtail the contribution of the husband if a wife was solicited before he was. On the other hand, we have had numerous notifications from women that their husbands had not been approached and requests that we allow them to solicit contributions from them. Until the present time, we have asked them to refrain from doing so, in order that the Men's Division would be unencumbered by our activities.

In regard to meetings, we have had large rallies for all workers where reports have been given and totals announced. We have made it a point not to have luncheon meetings inasmuch as we feel that women could give the time during the morning or afternoon hours and thus save the expense of luncheons.

It is rather difficult to give you examples of comparative figures between gifts of men and their wives. There are cases where men have given between two and ten thousand dollars and where their wives have given an additional five hundred. These, however, are very few and I should say that the general range of our contributions from women to be between one dollar and fifty dollars. Our greatest response has come from women who are able to give the smallest sums, inasmuch as the richer women feel that they have given in conjunction with their husbands and are, therefore, not to be solicited again.

The goal of the Women's Division was set quite arbitrarily at \$250,000. We have to date, \$258,000, having increased our quota by a vote of the organizations interested to \$275,000. This will not give you an entirely accurate picture as \$112,000 of this amount represents contributions from very wealthy widows which was already on hand when we started our campaign.

In organizing our campaign through women's groups and auxiliaries of various kinds, we have met with a situation which I think should be explained to you. There are, naturally, many women who belong to two or more organizations, and in such cases, they have been approached two or more times. The problem of this duplication concerned us at first, but we have since found that it was beneficial rather than detrimental inasmuch as it created an added stimulus.

I am enclosing two mimeographed sheets which we distributed to our workers and which I think are a necessary part of her equipment.

If there is anything further that you may wish to know, you may be sure that I will be glad to assist you by answering any questions.

The Jewish Welfare Fund of Chicago is engaged in raising \$2,000,000. These funds are to be allocated under an agreement reached primarily between three organizations, The American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee, the United Palestine Appeal, and the National Coordinating Committee. Under this agreement an Allocations Committee is being established in New York to which our funds will be forwarded.

The work of the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee includes relief to our suffering brethren overseas, and the settlement and rehabilitation of Jews in various countries where they may be permitted to enter. The United Palestine Appeal settles Jews in Palestine. The National Coordinating Committee has the task of resettling the refugees in this country.

The Jews of the United States are to raise \$20,000,000 for this purpose during 1939. At present the understanding is that the first \$10,000,000 raised will be distributed as follows:

\$5,000,000 to the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee
\$2,500,000 to the United Palestine Appeal
\$2,500,000 to the National Coordinating Committee.

Because the picture changes almost daily, the understanding is that the second \$10,000,000 will be allocated in accordance with the need. If the doors of Palestine open wider, more funds will go to the United Palestine Appeal. Should other countries permit a larger immigration, more funds will go to the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee; if the United States finds room for more refugees, the National Coordinating Committee may receive greater funds.

We are anxious that you appeal to your women for their personal contributions. We are trying to reach every woman in Chicago. It is the urgent desire of those in charge of this campaign that all monies subscribed are in addition to the funds required for maintaining your present activities. In no way do we want to impair or curtail the projects of the organizations in our community. We want, rather, to insist that these be maintained throughout the year on the level established in the past. Funds for this emergency drive should come as additional individual contributions for an emergency.

Our plans for organizing this campaign are that each one of you, as president or representative of your organization, shall immediately appoint a chairman in charge of raising money for the Jewish Welfare Fund; that the chairman appoint a committee whose function it will be to solicit your membership directly. The size of the committee will depend upon the size of your membership and its operation will be supervised by you.

We shall expect a report from each one of you each week at the office of the Women's Division of the Welfare Fund, telephone Central 7012. More specifically, we are asking that you notify us immediately as to the name of each chairman and the number of workers on her committee.

INSTRUCTIONS TO THE WORKERS

WHAT MUST I KNOW AS A WORKER FOR THE WOMEN'S DIVISION OF THE JEWISH WELFARE FUND?

1. What is the goal of the Jewish Welfare Fund Drive in Chicago for 1939?

\$2,000,000.00

2. How will these funds be allocated?

The American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee (which includes relief to our suffering brethren overseas and the settlement and rehabilitation of Jews in various countries where they may be permitted to enter); the United Palestine Appeal (which settles Jews in Palestine) and the National Coordinating Committee (which has the task of resettling the refugees in this country). No money will be sent into Germany.

HOW CAN I SOLICIT MY PROSPECTS WITH THE GREATEST EFFICIENCY AND DISPATCH?

1. What is the best approach?

Personal contact is best. Telephone to make appointment.

2. Who fills out the pledge card?

The prospect must sign the card herself. She must also fill in the amount of her pledge personally, indicating her own first name as well as her husband's.

3. When do I collect the money?

Collect the money when the pledge is given, if possible. If pledge is given via telephone, send pledge card and self-addressed envelope. Ask for a prompt return. All checks are to be made payable to the Jewish Welfare Fund.

4. Can the prospect pay by installment?

If her contribution is over \$10, the prospect may pay in quarterly installments, the last installment to be paid by October 1, 1939.

5. What about currency?

Give a receipt to donor, using the back of a pledge card.

6. How is money acknowledged?

The office of the Jewish Welfare Fund sends a formal receipt to every contributor for all monies subscribed.

7. What is to be done with the pledge cards?

As quickly as the money comes in, attach it to the pledge card and forward it to the chairman of the Welfare Fund Drive in your organization. She will have the responsibility of forwarding all money to the office of the Jewish Welfare Fund at least once each week.

8. What if prospect replies, upon solicitation, that she has given together with her husband?

Ask for a contribution out of her own allowance. Any amount is acceptable. Stress the emergency of this drive.

9. What if prospect replies that she has already been approached?

Express your regret, explain duplication is sometimes unavoidable; ask what worker or organization has obtained her pledge. Make this report to the office of the Women's Division of the Jewish Welfare Fund.

10. How can I get answers to further questions?

By telephoning the Jewish Welfare Fund office at Central 7012.

Dear Mr. Bernstein:

Mrs. Richard Percy Limburg, the Chariman of our 1937-1938 Drive, is away at present and your letter has been referred to me. I take pleasure in sending you such information as I have available.

Our experience would indicate that working and giving on the part of women did not effect adversely the giving of the men; on the contrary, we have found that in many cases it had a salutary effect, - enthusiastic women have a tendency to increase the interest of husbands and fathers and act favorably upon the gifts of the men. In addition, some years ago an informal study was made of the effect of women's giving upon men, and while unfortunately I cannot send you a copy of this report, it was clearly indicated that, with very few exceptions, women's giving did not result in split giving, and as the years have past and women have become more and more interested in Federation, this has become even less evident.

Attached is a statement of comparative giving of men and women, selected entirely at random from the larger givers; it does not even include the largest givers since their cases are different. It should be born in mind that in one or two of the cases the woman is the wealthier member of the family.

I should like to point out that without the understanding and encouragement of the men it would have been quite impossible for the women to have followed through a program of this kind.

If there is any further information that you may desire, I should be very glad to send it to you.

Received yours of February 8th, reminding me of my promise to give you certain information.

To start with, we are all very happy over the unusual success of our Campaign which is just coming to a close. As you know, we started with a quota of \$70,000, which did not actually take care of all our budget. This figure was increased to \$80,000 before the drive started, and we have now raised almost exactly \$102,000.

Last year we secured 1,827 pledges of which 265 were women, and approximately 200 juniors. To date, we have received this year 3,370 subscriptions, consisting of 1,630 men, 1,275 women, and 465 juniors.

Our women's contribution division originally had a quota of \$13,000 based on \$3,6000 of last year's pledges, and they raised approximately \$22,000. A good deal of this was high-pressure work, and as a result we are anticipating more shrinkage than usual in this group. However, they fooled us in the drive, and they might do likewise on collections.

There are very few things to which I can contribute our success other than, the extreme hard work and self-sacrificing effort put forth by everyone connected with this year's Campaign. Nevertheless, I feel that in good part, our success was due to the fact that our Chairman, at all times kept his finger on every detail, took personal charge of each step in the work, and never asked anyone to do anything which he himself not only was willing to do, but did do.

One innovation which worked out remarkably well was a series of seven or eight small dinner parties, at private homes, to which were invited the large givers. They set an example through their gifts, and the inspiration which they got at these meetings, carried through the entire list.

Dear Mr. Rosichan:

I have your letter requesting some information about our Women's Division, and will try to give you some information about our methods, though I can't give you all the definite figures you ask for.

Our Women's Division went considerably over \$21,000. I believe our quota was \$13,000 and we went over that in special gifts. We worked it in this way.

First, I got myself a very efficient vice-chairman (Lil Frehling) and then proceeded to get an equally capable chairman of special gifts. Then we contacted the president of the Sisterhood of every Temple in the city, reform, conservative and orthodox, and asked them to give us the names of five or six of their best workers. Then we got their lists of members. We would then ask that a committee of five or six people come to lunch at either Mrs. Frehling's home or mine, and we would explain the project and sell them on the idea that women should give. Some of them were very lukewarm at first, but before we got through with them, they were extremely enthusiastic. We spent an entire day with each group and at that time we went through every name on the Sisterhood list and rated each woman according to what the members of her own Sisterhood thought she could give. We rated them on the basis of 25 cents a week up. Before we got through with each group, every woman there accepted our request that she become a member of the special gift committee.

We then appointed two or three captains for each congregation, and asked them to get a committee of ten women. There were 12 teams, and many of the special gift workers, after their work was done, served as captains and members of individual subscribers division teams. Altogether, we had about 120 women in our division. We worked under great difficulties in getting women experienced in the work of the drive on our division, as the campaign already had a division of over 100 women who had been working for several years, and we were not permitted to interfere with them, consequently we had to use for the most part women who had never done drives work before.

On Wednesday, January 18th, we had a luncheon for all women workers, at which Miss Tony Sender and Miss Warburg spoke, and of course we had some large subscriptions planted and we started out with several subscriptions of \$200 and they came in very fast. When we finally got the bulk of the large ones in, we asked every table (each team had its own table) to have each member rise and announce her subscription. There were 169 women at that meeting and we got 169 subscriptions, the smallest amount being \$12.50, and everyone there, with the exception of ten or fifteen, giving \$25 or more. We got over \$7,000 at that meeting. We followed that luncheon meeting with a 2:30 meeting at which we had a pretty good audience, and got about \$2,000 more that afternoon. Our special gift workers then worked the rest of the week, and when our individual subscribers' division started their work on January 23rd, we already had our quota of \$15,000 or were pretty close to it. The subscriptions from women last year were \$3,700.

Our selling point, of course, was the banks. We distributed about 1,000 banks and we sold women on the idea of putting 25 cents, fifty cents, or a dollar a week away. We are now working on a plan for collection. We are going to collect the first quarter on April 1st, and the collection is to be made by the workers. Of course, some of this money is coming in already by check, so that we expect to have about 700 or 800 to collect, and with our organization of 120 women, you can see that this

will not be too difficult. Every woman who worked on this division understands that this is a permanent organization, and that part of her job is the collection four times a year of a certain number of banks. I am taking the responsibility of this collection, with the help of the campaign bookkeeper, and we intend to account for every bank out and we hope to get every subscription in.

As to literature, we were not permitted to do any advance advertising of any sort for fear that it might hurt the men's contributions, so the first letter sent out was the one to the workers inviting them to the luncheon to hear Sender and Warburg, and no mention was made of the purpose of that meeting. Invitations were sent to the entire list of women we had got together for the mass meeting in the afternoon to hear these speakers, and we followed that up by using the Sisterhood telephone committees.

I think that the success of this Women's Division was largely due to the fact that we surrounded ourselves with influential and capable women from every type of congregation, and I think the women of each congregation felt that they must make the right showing. The cards given out to the individual teams were all cards right in their own Sisterhoods. By the way, we also checked these lists with congregation lists, so as to be sure to get all women who were not affiliated with Sisterhoods. In one or two instances we were accused of high pressuring, but there were few complaints, and the entire thing went over on a wave of terrific enthusiasm.

I am writing you in detail because I feel that this method could be worked successfully in every city and because I hope it will be. If there is anything else I can tell you, please let me know.

You undoubtedly know that Louisville increased from \$48,000 to over \$100,000 so I don't have to say that we did not hurt the men's contributions.

Hope you can get something out of this long and badly typed letter.

As you will recall, the adjourned Board meeting at the Baltimore Assembly decided to constitute the entire Board a finance committee for the Council. Each member accepted responsibility for assisting in obtaining substantially larger allocations from our member agencies. In that connection, I am enclosing a memorandum on financing the Council program for 1939.

The memorandum points to the decrease in foundation support and the resulting urgency for greater membership grants, with reasons in support for such action. Let me emphasize a few of the points which strike me with particular force.

1. Few of our member agencies, I believe, realize to what extent the growth of the welfare fund movement has reduced fund raising costs for the national and overseas agencies and what further substantial economies are possible in this direction. That means, of course, that a greater proportion of every dollar contributed by communities goes to the service provided and less to overhead. The Council's work in developing welfare funds contributed greatly to this achievement.
2. The refugee program which today is of primary importance would be virtually an impossibility without local Jewish organization throughout the country. If Senator Wagner's bill, calling for the admission of 20,000 refugee children is passed as all of us fervently hope, there will be a greater responsibility than ever, on the organized localities to prevent concentration in New York City and other ports of entry. Only well organized communities with properly developed federations and welfare funds can effectively deal with the refugee problem. Obviously the same applies to the \$20,000,000 Emergency Campaign.
3. For the most part, allocations to the Council have been made on the basis of - just another national service agency. Its program and service, I think warrant a different approach and special consideration. As the national association of the federations and welfare funds throughout the country, it expresses their

collective interest in national and overseas problems and serves the member agencies in connection with these problems. All of these activities, in addition to the field service and fund raising and budgeting assistance, seem to me to take it out of the class of other national service agencies and justify an allocation based on the total funds raised by the member agency, the degree of organization achieved in that particular community and its Jewish population.

I am certain that if those and the other services performed by the Council for the federations and welfare funds are brought to the attention of budget committees, substantial increases will be granted. Mail appeals are not adequate for this purpose and therefore it has been suggested that a Regional Finance Committee be set up in each region consisting of members of the Council Board and of the regional organization. Such a committee, through one or more of its members, would undertake to appear before the budget committee of each member agency within the region and present the Council's application. The field representative of the Council in the region will work very closely with the committee and assist in every possible way.

Busy as I know you to be, I would like very much to have you accept the chairmanship of such a committee for your region. It is the most important job we have before us. Your knowledge of the welfare fund development puts you in a peculiarly favorable position to understand and interpret the importance of its financing effectively. In addition to you the following members of our Board live in the East Central Region: Edward M. Baker, Cleveland; Samuel Goldhamer, Cleveland; Mrs. Sieg. Herzog, Cleveland; Charles J. Rosenbloom, Pittsburgh; Edwin J. Schanfarber, Columbus; William J. Shroder, Cincinnati and Henry Wineman, Detroit. I have written each of them asking that they hold themselves in readiness for a call from the Regional Finance Chairman. I know that they will all be ready to help.

We have a part-time field representative in the region, Arthur Rosichan, who spends the rest of his time with the Cleveland Jewish Federation. Mr. Rosichan will be available to work with you in developing plans for covering the territory, assigning responsibility to the committee members and such.

In order to reach the total Council budget the East Central Region will have to increase its quota for this year from \$8,660 pledged for 1938 to \$18,500. This is not an insurmountable goal, when we realize that this region is the heart of the middle west and includes all the territory from Pittsburgh west through Indiana and from Kentucky north through Michigan. One of the big items in our field program for 1939



is the making available of a full time field representative to assure more adequate service to this most important of our regions.

Suggested allocations have been worked out for the regions and the list of regional allocations is enclosed. It occurs to me that the next step would be to get in touch with each of the member agencies in the region, so that a personal appearance before their budget committees of one of our friends in the region may be assured. The time element is extremely important for two reasons: 1) Many budget committees are now meeting and determining allocations and 2) That until the increased sums requested are made available we will be unable to complete our field and information service, both of which are vitally necessary.

I am due to talk to the 25th annual meeting of the Jewish Federation in Akron next Wednesday, March 1st, and I should like very much to have the opportunity of stopping in Cleveland earlier that day to discuss this whole situation with you. Will you write or wire me upon receipt of this letter as to the convenience of the afternoon of March 1st or possibly the next morning. Akron is so close to Cleveland that it would be comparatively simple for me to come over.

Dear Mr. Bernstein:

We read with interest your letter of February 22nd with reference to the reported wealth in the hands of German Jewry. Within recent months, the question has been raised by a number of the contributors to the Joint Distribution Committee as to whether it is necessary for major Jewish organizations, such as the Joint Distribution Committee, to engage in activities within Germany. The point has been made that there would seem to be sufficient wealth, at least among a small number of Jews of Germany, to meet the requirements for emigration, training, etc. Since the wealth of the Jews of Germany cannot be transferred out of the country in any event, why should it not be used for this necessary internal work? Unfortunately this is not possible for the simple reason that the wealth of Germany, whether it belongs to Jews or non-Jews, is subject to stringent control on the part of the Nazi government.

As to the wealth possessed by Jews, you will recall that possibly a year ago or longer each Jewish person residing in Germany, having possessions aggregating 5,000 Reich Marks or over, was required to file an exact itemization of all his possessions, - real property, personal property, household effects, everything - with the German financial authorities. It is now impossible to dispose of any of these assets without express permission of the German financial office having jurisdiction. These assets are held subject to call by the German government at any time. You may have noticed in the newspapers that in the past day or two, decrees were published requiring every German Jew or stateless Jew in Germany to turn over to designated offices all their jewelry, precious stones, gold, silver and platinum, and other possessions. Thus you will see that although it might have been reported that the Jews in Germany possessed a certain aggregate wealth, they have no control over this property; they cannot dispose of it without official permission; they may not even make a contribution to the Jewish charitable organizations in Germany without permission. Where cash was held in banks, these funds have been blocked and it is necessary to secure permission to withdraw minimum amounts based upon calculations made of requirements for the coming week or two weeks, or whatever the period is.

Naturally, under such strict government regulations, the Jews of Germany cannot dispose of their means which become subject, not only to the normal income tax and other government taxes of the country, but in the case of the Jews to fines such as the 20% impost made after the November excesses, the Reichsfluchtsteuer (flight tax) imposed on

prospective emigrants, etc.

We have no firsthand information as to whether the instalments of the fine levied by the German government have been met in full. Our offhand impression is that if they have not been met entirely, there certainly was not a great deal lacking. Under the regulations, it was necessary for the people paying the fine to liquidate their obligations to the largest possible extent out of cash which they possessed, before disposing of any of their property. Thereafter, because of the pressure to liquidate securities, real estate and other assets in order to meet instalments payable by individuals, the threat of disorganization of the respective markets in Germany became so great that the actual assets were taken over at a stated value to meet the instalments. Under such circumstances it does not appear likely that the instalments were not met, but it must be recalled that use of these means was permitted only as a last resort after the individuals had exhausted their own cash resources.- Our information is that conditions for the Jews in Germany have definitely taken a turn for the worse during the past several weeks.

We hope that the foregoing information will be adequate for your purposes. Should you require anything further, please let us know.

On my return home from Mexico several days ago, I found your letter of February 22nd awaiting me. Seemingly, the responsibilities of national leadership are endless and growing; but it is fortunate that we find it possible to select the kind of leadership that is prepared to assume these obligations.

With regard to the financial situation of the Council, your letter will be submitted to our Budget Committee in due course; but I have a feeling that the Budget Committee will react to the suggestion for further increased allocations to the Council from Cleveland, in much the same manner that some of our Council Board Members from Cleveland and I myself have reacted when we have had opportunity to review the schedule of contributions from other communities as compared with that from Cleveland. I know that we object when an individual contributor in our own community makes similar comparison of his own giving with that of others who under-
subscribe; nevertheless, the progress and development of the National Council and the benefits which accrue from its development to every Jewish community in the country not only warrant but really demand that communities respond adequately and in proportion to their resources and population.

This has not been the case and I personally have tried to take a position in the Council Board meetings bringing this inequality of support to the attention of the representatives of other communities whose contributions have not measured

I have just returned to the city after an absence of a month and find your letter of February 20th inquiring about our deduction of \$300 from the Coordinating Committee allotment from Cleveland for 1938.

It so happened that when we were called upon to aid in the development of the resettlement work in the towns surrounding Cleveland; and there was involved some expense for travel to Columbus on the part of some of our professional workers on the Refugee Committee; as well as expense for postage, printing, telephones, telegraph, etc., in connection with the arrangement of meetings in the various communities and here in Cleveland; and for the transfer of one or two Refugees who were sent out of Cleveland into nearby communities in the interim until New York could begin its transfer, we were without any money for further appropriation in our Welfare Fund and felt that we were entirely justified in utilizing some small part of the appropriation to the National Refugee Committee for this work which was not really local but national in character and of direct benefit to New York and the National Committee.

Undoubtedly for the new year, if further such funds are required, appropriation can be made if necessary independently of our allotment to your New York Committee. We expect furthermore to send you an itemized statement of the expenditures which came out of this \$300 deduction.

We raised \$343,000 last year on our goal of \$328,000 for 1939 and because of the emergency conditions existing with all of Jewry in Europe and Palestine, we shall be called upon to raise approximately \$750,000 in Cleveland. And as in the past several years, the major part of it will go for the aid of our dispossessed Jews of central Europe and those who are having to remain there to suffer the oppressions and persecutions which are being visited upon them.

If you should decide that you wish to make your contribution to Cleveland again this year, and desire to make an increase in the amount, as we hope you can do, we shall be very grateful to you and while we have not yet had printed our pledge cards for the new Campaign, I am taking the liberty of enclosing one of last year's cards which will suffice for the purpose.

(N.B.) The balance for the year shows a loss or deficit of \$ 735.91. Therefore, the result of this will be that, instead of paying our teachers the amount of \$ 1,162.50, within the next six weeks, before the end of our fiscal year, we will pay them only \$ 426.59 (\$ 1,162.50 less 735.91) and in this way our income and expenses will balance in actual cash but our loss for the year is \$ 735.91.

The following is a brief report on the liabilities of the YESHIVATH ADATH BNAI ISRAEL:

April 15th, 1938 the Yeshiva owed its teachers staff a total of \$ 7,620.97. In the Income and Expense statement dated April 15th, 1938 to April 15th, 1939, the figure of teachers' staff salaries (\$ 6,747.70) include the amount of \$ 217.70, which was paid on account of the back salaries due to our teachers' staff. Today, March 1, 1939, the balance in back salaries due is \$ 7,403.27. *

Also, we have miscellaneous debts amounting to approximately \$ 200.00, including \$ 50.00 balance on the roof repair, advertising expenses, and other items.

Dear Rabbi Silver:

I finally got a cab. I'm
telling you this so you wont stay awake nights worrying.

It was good of you to give me
some of your time as I know how busy you are. After-
wards I met Goldhammer and lunched with him, Baker and
Halle. That gave us a chance to discuss the services
the COUNCIL is rendering national and overseas agencies.
I think they're all convinced.

Goldhammer assures me, as you
did, that Cleveland wants to do its share in no niggard-
ly fashion, but what sticks in his craw, as it does in
mine, is that certain other communities are not holding
up their end. It's true, and it's a nut we'll have
to crack in the next year or two.

It wasn't such a critical
situation while the Foundations were standing behind us,
but now that they're easing out, as they're right in do-
ing, we'll be sunk unless we can make up the amounts
they're withdrawing, with a bit over to enable us to
continue expanding our field-services.

The more I study the situa-
tion, the more convinced I am that this work of organi-
zing Welfare Funds and Federation services must con-
tinue so that there may be proper machinery for raising
the larger amounts of money that will be regularly re-
quired from now on, and also for the establishment of
services essential to the refugees now coming in.
Otherwise it wont be possible to get them away from the
Eastern cities and scattered around the country.

I'll do my darndest to shame,
cajole or club the backward cities into line, but it's

going to take time. Some of them wont have Budget hearings until the Fall; others take a narrow view of their responsibilities and are interested only in knowing to the last decimal point what the COUNCIL is doing for them. So we have to have a few cities that will do more than their share, just as we have to have individuals who give more than their share to set a pace.

I'm writing at such length because I know that you're the key person in Cleveland, and whatever you recommend will be done. Please stand by me!

We are very pleased to confirm your appointment as a Vice-Chairman of the Women's Gifts Division of the 1939 Jewish Welfare Fund campaign. We know that you can be very helpful in this great humanitarian effort and we are counting upon you for very valuable assistance.

The events of the past few days have amply illustrated that never have we faced a greater emergency in Jewish life. Three hundred thousand more victims have been added to the Nazi terror to join with those who are being crushed in the German Reich and the former Austria. Beaten in concentration camps, stripped of their positions, separated from their families, left penniless to starve, and despised and ridiculed, they need our help desperately and tragically.

Dear Rabbi Silver:-

I am very sorry that you were unable to attend the meeting of the Budget Committee, March 23rd, at the Oakwood Club, so therefore, I would like to give you a brief resume, giving you "my side" of the picture.

When I presented the case for the Yeshiva, I realized that all the representatives quoted the amount that it was necessary with which to operate their institution with for the coming year. But realizing circumstances, they cut their requirements very drastically. Therefore, I did the same, ie., saying that our accounts payable to April 15th, 1939 are \$ 8,300.00, including a deficit for the year of 1938-9 in the amount of \$ 735.91. But realizing the drain on the Federation's Funds due to the European situation, I therefore asked for only an additional \$ 3,495.00, to the \$ 3,000.00 that we have been getting in the past two years, making a total of \$ 6,495.00 for next year as our requirement, including our new Lakeview branch.

Rabbi Brickner then questioned the right of the Yeshiva to open a new branch without first consulting the Bureau of Jewish Education. I replied that as long as the Bureau does not recognize our Yeshiva as an educational institution, it is, therefore, not necessary for us to consult the Bureau. Also, I explained that there is a demand for an orthodox Yeshiva in the Lakeview section by parents who wish to have their children attend an orthodox school, and as our Yeshiva is the only orthodox educational institution in the city, we felt justified in opening a branch. Rabbi Brickner replied that the Talmud Torah schools are also orthodox, and I insisted and said that I could prove that the Yeshiva is the only school in the city where a child receives a true, traditional, orthodox Jewish education.


Dear Reverend Silver:



Dear Mr. :

I am very anxious to have you join me on Monday evening, April 10 at 7:45 P.M. at a meeting at the Oakwood Club. Mr. Henry Ittelson, one of the leading Jews of America, will be in Cleveland on that day to take counsel with us on matters of great importance which confront us. I should like you to have the opportunity of discussing with him and with a few other leaders of our own community who will be in attendance, some matters of great moment in Jewish life today.

Among the purposes of the meeting are: first, to receive a first-hand and clear picture of developments in Europe; second, to survey the consequences of refugee immigration into the United States; and third, to consider the nature of the responsibility that falls upon individual communities as well as the extent to which individual leaders are prepared to share this responsibility with us.

I believe that the problem is of such gravity as to warrant the utmost effort on your part to be present and to give those who will attend the benefit of your presence and counsel. Unless I hear from you to the contrary, I shall look forward to your coming to the meeting.

Before I Die

A German refugee called at my office the day before yesterday, and she left with me an English translation of a letter written by Dr. Jacob Schultz of Vienna before he killed his wife, his child and himself. The original letter was confiscated as she attempted to carry it across the border. However, she had memorized it and had had it translated into English. The woman appeared to be intelligent and well educated. Inasmuch as she left the copy with me to use at my discretion, I am forwarding it to you for publication, if you so desire.

BEN ARONIN

IT IS 10:00 o'clock.

At 5:00 o'clock in the morning I shall kill my wife and child and then myself.

Hilda is asleep in the next room. My wife is reading *Cyrano de Bergerac*. I left her lying in the bed, with the shaded light of the lamp falling about her, leaving the rest of the room in darkness. She seemed so at rest, her dark hair framing her calm white face. She likes to read in bed. I kissed her on the forehead, gently — then I left her. I went to my baby's room. She is five, and she has golden curls. I used to have golden hair when I was her age. I am afraid of disturbing her, and I do not want her to wake. I want her to sleep on forever. My friends tell me she "doesn't look Jewish," as though that were a compliment. They mean that her light little face, with its upturned little nose, does not yet carry lines of sadness and suffering.

It seems so strange that I can sit here so calmly, when just a moment ago all of Hell was burning in my heart and mind, and I wanted to run out of the house screaming:

"Murderers! Beasts! May God destroy you all — may the streets run red with your blood! May your arrogant sneers and your cruel mockery turn to sniveling yelps for mercy. May your whole accursed generation be ground into the dust, even though all of humanity perish with you!"

I envisioned the earth, washed clean of all life, sweeping, untrammelled by the hates of mankind, through the heavens — part of the harmony of the cosmos.

But I am calm now — for I am a Jew — the older brother of humanity, who fell in love with a dream four thousand years ago — a dream that the world could be ruled by love and not by hate; by mercy and not by war; by truth and not by lies.

And to wish all humanity destroyed before it attains that dream is to deny faith in God — in Pattern — in

Purpose. It is such denial that leads to the hysterical paganism which now overwhelms us.

Before I die I affirm my faith in an Eternal God of Love, who created heaven and earth. I believe with perfect faith that all mankind, regardless of race, color or creed, are brothers. I believe with perfect faith in the God of the Old Testament — the God of the widow, of the orphan, of the poor — of the stranger within the gate. I believe with perfect faith that all men are the Sons of God, and that there never was, is not and never will be one creature of flesh and blood of greater divinity than a noble human being.

I am not Dr. Jacob Schultz. I am The Christ!

The crucified Christ — the man who died on a Roman cross — existed, and he exists today. He was crucified, and he is crucified today. The "Wandering Jew" of your malicious legend is that Christ! I am that Christ! Every man of my people is The Christ! And at the foot of the cross, whereon we are impaled, the legionnaires of hate cast dice for our garments, confiscate our possessions and leer upon us, as they crown us with thorns, and hoot at us: "You are the chosen people!"

But long ago one of our great sages said: "Be among the persecuted — not among the persecutors."

LAST night thousands of Polish Jews crouched in the ditches and the mire of the German-Polish border as you jeered them on their march to Calvary. You spat at them and cried: "Go on! Go on!" Three went insane. A woman lying in a muddy ditch bore a child. That Jewish woman was the Mary of the Manger, and her child was a Jew, and therefore The Christ! So in every age have Jewish mothers borne their babes — in graveyards — at roadsides — fleeing from their persecutors.

Jesus on the Cross — the Jew!

Mary in the Manger — the Jewess!

Tomorrow morning you will find me dead. Perhaps you will term my act an act of cowardice — of escape. Yes, escape from the alternative of being taken to a concentration camp — from which my wife would shortly thereafter receive a neat box of ashes — sent collect — a tribute to Nazi efficiency. And her fate? And that of my child? What would they be?

Saul fought upon the mountain of Gilboa until he could fight no longer — and then fell upon his sword. That was courage and pride — not cowardice.

Yet the battle is hopeless only for me — not for Israel. My cry will be heard by generations yet unborn, as was the cry of Akiba when in his agony he called: "Hear, O Israel! The Eternal is our God, the Eternal is One!"

The Jew will not die. Israel will survive even this calamity.

As for me — I do not kill myself. I die upon the Cross.

Liberation

Will it take civil war to end Jew control?

"Liberation," organ of William Dudley Pelley's Silver Shirts, is published in Asheville, N.C. In this issue Pelley denounces his followers for preparing for the civil war for which Gentile Americans will sacrifice the Jewish minority which he says has seized control of the Government.

Christian Free Press

JEWRY DECLARES WAR, CHRISTIAN PATRIOTS ARE READY

"Christian Free Press," published in Glendale, Calif., is the organ of the Christian Christian Patriots. Current anti-Semitism is fed by charges that American Jews are pushing behind of Hitler, are trying to push America into war with Germany in order to save their persecuted fellow.

NATIONAL AMERICAN BULLETIN

"National American Bulletin," published by the American Nationalist Party, with headquarters in New York City, issues a Newsmagazine. It is like this item feature sensationalized reports of Jewish refugees awaiting for America and taking away Americans' jobs.

THE AMERICAN NATIONALIST CONFEDERATION THE NEWS BULLETIN

The American Nationalist Confederation is an attempt to unite scattered Fascist groups into a national organization. Its News Bulletin is printed in St. Albans, W. Va., by a house painter named George Deathridge, head of the Knights of the White Camellia. (see the opposite page).

My dear Dick:

Let me thank you for your kind letter of April 8th. I appreciate your contribution of \$5,000 to the Jewish Welfare Fund. I will inform headquarters to credit Mr. Carl Felder with your contribution.

I am sorry that I did not get a chance to see you when I called upon Mr. Richman, and also that you did not have an opportunity to attend the meeting at which Mr. Henry Ittelson presented the desperate needs of the refugees whose numbers are increasing by the thousands daily and for whom we are trying to raise, in this country, \$20,000,000. Our Cleveland share is \$800,000, \$466,000 more than we raised last year. Frankly, I do not know how this amount is to be raised in this community unless the men of greater means will give, this year, on an emergency basis sums far in excess of what they gave in any previous year.

I am wondering, my dear Dick, whether it would not be possible to obtain an additional contribution from the Richman Foundation to supplement your and Mr. Richman's gifts, or a memorial gift in memory of Henry and Charles. Frankly, we were thinking in terms of a \$25,000 contribution from you and your uncle, similar to the contribution which was made by Mr. N. L. Dauby, and to the contribution which we hope to receive in a few days from the Beaumont Foundation. Only if we can get a few contributions in those high ranges is there any hope of even approximating the very large sum which we have been asked to raise.

Please disregard me in this matter. I am only a mouthpiece in this great and tragic cause. Disaster has overwhelmed our people. Dangers are threatening us from all sides, including our own country. Maximum sacrifices are demanded of all of us to care for the hundreds of thousands



A STATEMENT OF A GRAVE EMERGENCY

Dear Friend:

We address this communication to you in order to apprise you of the approaching Jewish Welfare Fund Campaign of Cleveland, to acquaint you with its needs and to solicit your most earnest and utmost cooperation.

Our community has been called upon to raise an unprecedented sum of money this year—Eight Hundred Thousand Dollars—to relieve the tragic plight of our suffering brothers abroad, to care for the refugees who are coming to our shores and to defend the position of the Jew in our own beloved country against increasing malicious and dangerous propaganda.

Your chosen representatives have carefully studied the budgets of the three major Agencies which are engaged in these services, as well as the forty others which are to be the beneficiaries of the 1939 Jewish Welfare Fund, and they have recommended only the irreducible minimum required for their effective functioning.

More than two thirds of the total goal has been definitely ear-marked for overseas relief and refugee needs:—for the manifold activities of the Joint Distribution Committee which cover the face of Europe, reaching into every danger zone where Jews have felt the blows of intolerance; for the United Palestine Appeal which is helping in the rebuilding of Palestine where in the past five years alone over two hundred thousand Jews from Germany and other parts of Europe have found a

new home and a new life; and for the work of the National Co-Ordinating Committee whose program comprises vital services to the refugees who are coming to the United States, their resettlement and transportation, and their integration into the economic life of our country. These three agencies are raising this year the sum of Twenty Million Dollars.

The remaining thirty-five percent will be allocated among those agencies which are engaged in the protection of Jewish rights in the United States, in counter-acting Nazi-inspired propaganda, in important local and national educational activities and in the support of some philanthropic and service agencies, not otherwise subsidized by our Community Chest.

We are fully conscious of the solemn responsibility which we have assumed in setting so large a quota for our community—a sum nearly one-half million dollars more than was raised last year. Yet we could not act otherwise. Ours is one of the gravest and most distressing periods in Jewish history. Seldom has tragedy piled upon tragedy in such rapid and appalling succession. Never has our people been forced to fight on so many fronts at the same time. The highways of the world are choked with Jewish refugees fleeing from terror and hatred, seeking new homes. Most of them are utterly impoverished, having been plundered and despoiled before they were driven out. Few doors are open to receive them. These helpless and innocent victims of the world's madness today are our brothers and therefore our wards. To assist them in every way possible is a sacred obligation which no Jew, living in this free and blessed land, either can or would wish to shirk.

We appeal to all our fellow Jews to rise to the challenge and the pathos of this desperate hour and to give as they have never given before. We appeal to each and every Jew to give according to the full measure of his ability, in relation to his income, his capital and his mode of living.

Cleveland has always been in the vanguard of communal leadership in the

United States. All other communities are responding most generously to this appeal. We can do no less.

This is an emergency appeal addressed to you in a time of grave emergency. We trust that it will be answered by you, when solicited by a representative of the Welfare Fund Campaign, most generously and sacrificially.



In the Battle to Save 5,000,000 Persecuted Jews

1,000,000 JEWS IN POLAND

are starving—slowly wasting away unto death. They are padlocked from life. They are without food and the means of getting it. Their stores are boycotted. They are barred from industries. Their shops and homes are destroyed by fire and bombs. Thousands need medical care. A



survey in one school district shows two-thirds of the Jewish children plagued with tuberculosis. Jews are beaten on the streets, left to die in the gutters.

200,000 JEWS IN AUSTRIA

are being shattered by the Nazi dictatorship. They are being ousted from the professions. Their property is being confiscated. Their department stores and corner shops are closed. Their leaders are being thrown into concentration camps. Trapped, they cannot live in the country and many cannot get out. Hundreds have committed suicide.

victims of a pogrom more subtle but more diabolical than any conceived by the Czars. They are political and social outcasts. They are not permitted to earn a livelihood. They lose their property if they manage to escape. They are denied public relief if they remain. The public schools are closed to their children. Almost one-half of the Jewish population has applied for relief from Jewish agencies.

900,000 JEWS FACE PERSECUTION IN ROUMANIA.

The anti-Semitism promoted by the Goga regime still flourishes. Thousands are victims of the direst poverty. They need food, clothing, shelter, medical care, education.

IN HUNGARY, LATVIA, LITHUANIA,

and other European countries, thousands of Jews are in desperate need.

"Israel Must Weather this Storm too"

THE REMEDY: THE JEWISH WELFARE FUND

Black though the picture may be for the Jews of Central Europe, ringed with the bars of Nazi hate, there is hope for them.

A plan for the mass emigration of Jews from the fascist countries has been announced during the last few weeks by Secretary of State Cordell Hull.

Its execution depends on the Jewish agencies which receive their support from the Jewish Welfare Fund and which must raise the money to finance these sad exiles of the 20th century.

During the last few years these agencies have helped victims of persecution to emigrate to other lands, notably Palestine. More than 100,000 have left Germany since Hitler came into power. Many more have left Poland, Austria, and other lands.

For those who must remain, these agencies have brought renewed hope of life.



Food is provided for those who are utterly destitute and would starve without this help. More than 100,000 children get their only real meal in this way.

Thousands who are in rags are clothed. Shelter is given to the homeless, victims of persecution.

More than 200,000 free loans are granted each year, involving millions of dollars. One-fifth of the Jewish population of Poland and Roumania are kept self-supporting in this way.

More than 100 Jewish communities have been helped to withstand and recover from pogroms.

400 farm and trade schools and factories are maintained, to teach Jews technical skills and give them employment. Self-support, not charity, is the goal.

Hospitals, clinics, and sanatoria are supported for the destitute sick. 100,000 children are sent to summer health colonies each year.

* * *

This work is done by agencies which receive their support from the Jewish Welfare Fund. It is made possible by the money you will raise. The agencies are: the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee; American Ort Federation; German Jewish Children's Aid; National Coordinating Committee to Aid German Refugees; German Jewish Refugee Local Committee; University in Exile (New School for Social Research); Hebrew Sheltering and Immigrant Aid Society.

You may recall that I had a fleeting moment of conversation with you at the Oakwood Club relative to your contribution to the United Jewish Appeal. Dear Sir:

We understand that the league for Human Rights has blacklisted our company for purportedly failing to support the boycott of German goods. Permit us to state the following facts:

1. Our company voluntarily sacrificed several years ago over 50% of its new equipment business because it was German manufactured. This involved serious financial losses which have continued because we have been unable to replace them with American substitutes. We propose to continue to endorse the boycott regardless of the financial sacrifices involved.

2. We state without qualification that we are conscientiously and effectively boycotting every item in our field of business, in the most effective manner known to us

3. We have voluntarily contacted the League in this matter and have requested the appointment of a small committee of business men to study our problem and advise with us as to the most practical procedure. We have pledged our willingness to comply in full with the decision of such a committee.

4. This request has been ignored completely, and we protest against the incompetent and arbitrary methods used in reaching their decision.

5. It is our considered opinion that a so called League for Human Rights has the elemental responsibility of protecting those human rights. We state that boycotting our firm in the face of its record represents an arbitrary action and does violence to the rights of our company by unjustly injuring its reputation and that of its officers.

Since we share with you the desire to protect the reputation and usefulness of all institutions associated with the Jewish Welfare Federation we urge such investigation as is necessary at this time.

Reference is here made to our telephone conversation on the matter of the League for Human Rights and the Turner Type Founders Co.

You stated that you had a long meeting with the Chairman and reviewed with him facts and statements that I had given you. It was reassuring to know that despite the strain to which we are being subjected, the Chairman conceded that I had presented these facts to you essentially as he knew them.

When you telephoned me Tuesday evening, April 20, it was to reassure me that the League proposed to discuss this matter further. It appears that you satisfied their Chairman that the League neither was in possession of the facts nor had taken advantage of our urgent request that they acquaint themselves with them through a committee of competent business men.

I called your attention to numerous telephone calls I had received stating that the League had already placed our name on a blacklist released by the Women's Auxiliary of the B. B. This actually was done without warning or advice as to why.

May I further state that our brief is not against any decision honestly and competently arrived at.

We state the following to be true:

1. The League is not in possession of all the facts nor has it availed itself of the opportunity to get them.
2. They have ignored our request to appoint a committee of competent business men to consult with us.
3. They have admittedly permitted emotional prejudices in their deliberation after these were called to their attention.
4. The methods employed for seeking truth and justice have been that of a secret tribunal and are a travesty on the name of a so called League for Human Rights.
5. We propose to continue to boycott German merchandise to the best of our ability and regardless of the financial sacrifice involved or the impugning our reputation.
6. We are happy to submit our case to any group of competent business men that might be suggested by an impartial and responsible source.

May I again thank you for volunteering your services in the interests of simple justice.



My dear Hillel:-

I have your letter of the 2nd inst before me, and you are quite correct in assuming that I had already made up my mind regarding my contribution to the Jewish Welfare Fund for 1939 when you spoke to me. A visit from you, however, is always worth while and appreciated.

It is not a question of what I wish to give to the cause, but rather one of ability to pay and what is fair under the circumstances. I have seen some of the contributions made by others where they have doubled and tripled their former subscriptions. More power to them!

I think it is important that I continue to contribute to non-Jewish causes on a fair and equitable basis, since I expect to continue to live in the community and in the United States; unfortunately I cannot increase my subscription to the Jewish cause without at the same time cutting down my contributions in other directions, for the very good reason that I haven't enough to go round. My income has been reduced by a substantial amount since 1937, 1938, and now again in 1939 (no dividends, and for other reasons).

Looking at the matter in retrospect, I think my mistake has been in allowing myself to be persuaded to increase my contributions in the past at a rate faster than my income, without realizing that these drives for increased contributions from year to year must in the end bring about an impasse, and a situation that would demand a reversal in form,- especially when one's income is substantially reduced at a time when the drives become more intensified for double and triple contributions.

I presume I will be criticized by many for failing to increase my contribution at this critical time. I know that many people in Cleveland believe that I own a substantial part of Industrial Rayon Corporation and that my means are large; nothing could be further from the truth in both instances. I have been liberal when I was able. I have had to retrench in my contributions

when my income began to shrink. I have heard it said by some well-meaning people (who are of course misinformed) that I could have given two or three times what I contributed during any year without the slightest inconvenience to myself.

I am a little bit sensitive and take these criticisms perhaps a little bit too seriously, and I think it is probably more for this reason than for any other that I have shunned the meetings and have been reluctant to take an active part in the drives. To be quite frank about the matter, I don't like to sit in meetings with men who are critical of my seeming failure to come up to their expectations. In other words, I don't like to be put on the spot, so to speak, when I feel I am doing my part.

My connection with Industrial Rayon has placed me in a very embarrassing position from the standpoint of contributions. I am asked to give not on the basis of my personal means and income but on the basis of the financial standing of the company which I happen to head. This of course is unfortunate, but there seems to be no remedy for this type of build-up. So here you have the story.

The campaign opened auspiciously last evening with a great dinner meeting at the Statler Hotel which was addressed by Edward M. Warburg. You have probably received some of our campaign literature. My dear Sam:

I have been so busy that I have not had a chance to acknowledge your kind letter of May 2nd. I thank you for the contribution of yourself and your family to the Jewish Welfare Fund. Were these normal times, and were our community reaching out for a normal campaign goal, I would be delighted with your subscription. I know how generously you gave in the past, and how whole-heartily you have been supporting every worthwhile institution in our community. I know, furthermore, that business conditions have not been all that one would wish for. Taking all these factors into consideration, I would have hailed your contribution.

But these are not normal times, and we are not conducting a normal campaign, but an emergency campaign. We have been asked to raise a half million dollars more than last year, that is to say, nearly two and a half times what our community raised in the very successful campaign of 1938. Such an extraordinarily large sum of money can be raised only if all our contributors give a minimum of two and a half times what they gave last year. You readily see, therefore, my dear Sam, that while your contribution is generous, it is not quite adequate.

Of course we shall fail if we do not obtain contributions this year on an emergency basis. The more the pity! Never was money more needed. And never was there a graver crisis in Jewish life. You listened, this noon, to Dr. Marvin Lowenthal. He told the story quite dispassionately and without adornment, and I am sure that you were stirred to your depths as everybody was at the meeting. I can add nothing to it.

My dear Sam:

In going over the contributions to the Jewish Welfare Fund, as chairman, I came upon yours and I wish to thank you for your generous gift. In normal times your contribution would be more than adequate. But as you undoubtedly know, we have been asked this year to add a half million dollars to our goal of last year in order to meet Cleveland's share of the Twenty Million Dollar Campaign for refugees and overseas needs. My dear Hiram:

Thank you so much for your kind letter of May 8th and for the contribution which you made to the Jewish Welfare Fund. In normal times this would be an adequate contribution. But, unfortunately, these are not normal times.

I agree with everything you say in your letter but with its conclusion. Of course you must give to non-Jewish agencies. I am also sure that your wealth is being over-estimated in the community and that your position as head of Industrial Rayon has given you the glamor of mystical wealth. Undoubtedly, too, your income has been substantially reduced in the last few years. These are all valid reasons for not making any larger contribution than you have made -- in normal times. But in a year of unprecedented catastrophe, of menace and terror for millions of Jews, the like of which our history has not experienced in a thousand years, all normal considerations and calculations must be brushed aside, and men aware of their basic human, not to speak Jewish responsibilities, must do the extraordinary and the sacrificial thing.

American Jews have never been asked to raise Twenty Million Dollars before in a single year. The last time we were asked to raise any extraordinary sum of money was some twenty years ago when Mr. Julius Rosenwald undertook to raise Ten Million Dollars in the United States to which he, himself, contributed One Million Dollars. That was for the victims of the Russian pogroms. Since that time there has been no emergency appeal until this year for the victims of the "cold pogrom" of Jews which is now in full swing today in Nazi Germany and Fascist Italy, and which is also devastating Jewries in Hungary, Poland, Lithuania and Roumania.

To whom should we turn in such a crisis if not to Jewish men of means who, after all, do occupy important positions in this country? My dear Hiram, I found many just and true things in your letter to me, but I missed one word which must be the key in the





Dear Dr. Silver:

May I tell you how deeply I appreciate your kindness in helping to place our University in Exile on the Jewish Welfare Fund.

I wish very much that you could visit us some time and perhaps speak before our Faculty and graduate students. It would be a privilege to them to meet you and I think that you would find it extremely interesting to observe the Faculty, composed of exiles now numbering sixteen Germans, three Austrians, three Italians and one Spaniard, who are working gallantly and competently to establish a solid place in America. We have just finished our sixth year, and I may say, after having considerable experience with American university faculties, that I know of no faculty fundamentally so harmonious, so cooperative and so creative as these exiles. I am almost insufferably proud of them. When the Faculty was launched everybody regarded it as a bold experiment, and I received warnings enough of pitfalls to have deterred even the Pilgrim of Pilgrim's Progress. None of the difficulties materialized. Our Faculty have assimilated to the country even more rapidly than they would have assimilated if widely scattered. What I consider most important, they are assimilating themselves to the American education system, and assimilating their culture, too. I may add that among the prognostications of woe was the suggestion that our Faculty would be regarded with hostility by other faculties. This has proved to be absolutely not the case. They have been received with a degree of cordiality that not even I could have hoped for, and they have been treated with increasing respect with the passing years.

It will interest you to know that Cleveland is reported to have achieved one of the best if not the best, results of any of the Cities, in its Welfare Fund Campaign.

We all of us know that it was due not only to the deep consciousness of our people of the conditions and the needs, but also to the splendid spirit and enthusiasm with which everyone engaged in the Campaign, undertook his task.

As a result of this enthusiasm, many of the Chairmen and workers are continuing their efforts to fulfill their Division quotas looking to a closer approximation of the Campaign Goal of \$800,000. To date we have about \$768,000 reported, though the final audit and tabulations cannot as yet be made.

In the meantime, however, I thought you would be interested to know how the Men's Divisions respectively have reported, both at the close of the Campaign and since. A record of these results is here attached. Final results will be available later.

Dear Mr. Halle:

Thank you very much for replying so promptly to my letter of June 16th and for the explanation you were thoughtful enough to include. You were very kind to let me know that your committee was influenced by the fact that the Joint Distribution Committee has also budgeted substantial amounts for training and rehabilitation of the refugees and others in Europe.

I am glad you mentioned this because I know you are aware that regardless of such subvention and despite the fact that ORT, as the major European agency engaged in this specialized work, has vastly expanded its facilities, only a fraction of the present vital needs for occupational retraining in Europe is being met.

I believe the latest report issued by the Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds gives emphasis to the fact that ORT is the dominant agency engaged in this type of work and I have also found that the attitude of every European government, including England, confirms this conclusion.

I may be wrong, but it seems to me, under these circumstances, that if one agency finds it necessary to budget large sums for retraining work it merely stresses the vital importance of occupational retraining. Granting that, is it unreasonable for ORT, which concerns itself exclusively with this phase of the problem, to expect to receive the minimum needs with which to do the job demanded of it by its supporters in America and Jewish leaders throughout Europe.

I was encouraged to note that the one reason for the present allocation to ORT was that you could not arrive at any fair estimate of a definite division of the funds until there could be some better clarification of the respective fields of work for which both ORT and the J.D.C. seek funds. This question can be clarified and I am eager to cooperate to this end. Parenthetically, only a minimum of duplication or overlapping is possible in the retraining field. As in Cleveland and New York, the same students do not attend more than one institutions and a farm family does not settle in more than one colony.

I am attaching an allocation sheet covering a few cities which have already made allotments to ORT for 1939. Chicago, raising a little more than twice the amount secured in Cleveland, will contribute in excess of \$60,000 to ORT. The Los Angeles allocation is \$25,000. Boston, Mass., which has not yet published its allocation, will, I am told, allot between \$15,000 and \$20,000 out of a gross collection of approximately \$600,000. In Montreal, ORT participated with the Joint Distribution Committee on the basis of eighty percent for the J.D.C. and twenty percent for ORT. The campaign was launched and directed by the J.D.C.

If I have gone into this question at some length, it is only because I have no other choice having accepted the responsibility as the head of the ORT in America. Without reasonably adequate financial support, I cannot measure up to the obligation imposed upon me and I do not speak in a personal sense. I know that you and all of your colleagues in Cleveland are just as anxious as I am to arrive at a determination that will reflect our mutual interests in the problem and our desire to distribute our funds as effectively as possible. I am equally sure that I do not have to urge you to hold ORT's allocation for 1939 in abeyance, until we have had an opportunity to clarify the question that is puzzling you.

Of course, Mr. Altschul reported fully on the information conveyed to him in Cleveland and made reference at the same time to Mr. Goldhamer's reputation for possessing complete objectiveness in evaluating program and preparing budgetary information and guidance for his committee, but this makes it even more difficult to understand the situation.

Although the figures on the attached allocation sheet are quite modest, they explain better than any words of mine, the danger ORT would face through an allocation amounting to but little more than one-half of ~~the~~ one percent of your campaign objective in Cleveland.

Dear Mr. Goldhamer:--

Mr. Backer has asked me to acknowledge your very encouraging letter of June 29th and I am very happy to have the opportunity. Mr. Backer appreciated the thoughtful tone of your letter and felt considerably encouraged that his message would be considered by your budget committee before final allocations are fixed.

I hope that in attempting to interpret ORT's legitimate needs that we have not appeared controversial. At the same time I know you will be interested in the following extracts on the question previously raised by Mr. Halle in his letter to Mr. Backer. In a recent letter to Mr. Max Hershfeld of Brooklyn, a co-chairman of the Lawyer's Division for the United Jewish Appeal, who has since become a national co-chairman of ORT, the Joint Distribution Committee in a very lengthy communication stated that the J. D. C. had granted funds directly to the ORT in France for retraining work among the refugees. Mr. Hershfeld replied asking for specific information as to dates, amounts and the circumstances involved. He received a reply dated June 15th, 1939 from which I quote: "We have not yet received the detailed final accounting from abroad of all the committees and institutions to which grants were made during 1938 and we have as yet no detailed information from abroad for 1939. We can indicate only the general activities in the various countries for which allotments were planned, as this statement of budgetary requirements issued earlier this year points out. However, one preliminary report indicated that in October, 1938 an allotment of 10,000 francs was made to the ORT school in France. We have also authorized the Committee for Assistance to Refugees in Paris to avail itself of the ORT schools for training and retraining purposes, and to pay for this training."

The ORT Central Board in Paris has no record of this allotment and assuming it was made without their knowledge the sum total involved would amount to approximately \$280.00. I am quite sure that the Joint Distribution Committee would not knowingly make capital, in America, out of so nominal a transaction. In referring to the previously issued statement of budgetary requirements the letter continues: "You understand, of course, that this statement reflects the recommendations made the first of the year. We need hardly add that since the preparation of the statement, many emergencies have arisen with which you are undoubtedly familiar, necessitating revisions in the budgetary recommendations." I know I need not point out

the deep significance of that final sentence. The correspondence is in no sense confidential and if you feel that it would help clarify matters I will be very glad to let you have complete copies.

Believe it or not the hour is now two A. M. but if a little extra midnight oil can in any assist in bringing about a happy ending, and one completely satisfactory to you, if not for us, I shall feel eternally thankful.



The Budget Committee of the Jewish Welfare Federation has the responsibility for advising how the money of the Welfare Fund shall be distributed.

The Committee has reviewed very thoroughly the records of the financial operations and services of the Agencies considered for inclusion in the Fund.

In formulating its recommendations to the Federation Board, the Committee has furthermore given careful attention to such factors as the extent of the Agencies' direct services to this Community; the importance of each one in the general field of Jewish Welfare enterprise; and the amounts which they may legitimately ask of the local Community towards their support.

Decreases have been recommended in a number of the appropriations to conform with the current downward trend of commodity prices; several increases were granted as compensation for expanded services; and two additional Agencies were approved for support from the Fund.

The Budget Committee which is composed of Mr. S. P. Halle, Chairman, Mrs. Siegmund Herzog, and Messrs. Edward M. Baker, Maurice Bernon, Louis S. Bing, Jr., Sylvester W. Flesheim, Isador Grossman, Eugene S. Halle, S. H. Kleinman, Irwin N. Loeser, Max Myers, Sol Reinthal, S. D. Wise and Jacob Wolpaw, has submitted the following as the commitments of the Fund for the current year:

Thirty-three hundred of us subscribed one hundred and fifty thousand dollars to its purposes this past year.

Ten National Institutions and Hospitals received their share of Cleveland's support without sending solicitors or collectors into the City;

The Hebrew University in Palestine and the local Bureau of Jewish Education received allotments for their maintenance without Campaigns;

The Foreign Relief and Reconstruction Causes in Eastern Europe and Palestine, have been supported to the extent that the collections to date have made the transmission of funds possible.

And all of this has been achieved without the constant irritation of campaigns, drives and collections;

Without the excessive cost of such efforts (at least \$30,000 was saved the Community in 1931).

And without the uncertainty under which worthy Philanthropic enterprises labor, when they must beg for their own money year by year.

We believe that the advantages of such intelligent community action, warrant your appreciative response and your continued support of the Fund.



Germany Loses Trade

Berlin — May 17.—Dr. Hjalmar Schacht, president of the Reichsbank, presented to the transfer conference today, two sets of official statistics that may be regarded as his final argument for German's present inability to continue paying her debts.

The first was the rather catastrophic foreign trade balance for April. According to it, German exports during last month slumped to the unprecedented level of 315,800,000 marks, a drop of 21 per cent from the preceding month.

The second set of statistics was the Reichsbank statement of last week. According to it, Germany lost 25,000,000 marks more in gold and foreign exchange, or 15 per cent of her total holdings, reducing her note coverage to the equally unprecedented low level of 4.8 per cent.





A total of more than 60,000 had left Germany.



other European countries. All need food, shelter, retraining. Gravest danger, High Commissioner McDonald points out, lurks in possibility of large numbers becoming public charges, causing irritation, new anti-Semitic grumblings.





Dear Mr. Sunshine:

We are rather reluctant to bother you with the matter referred to in this letter knowing that you have been ill recently; but feel that you can best aid us in this situation.

The Jewish Welfare Fund Campaign is carried on as you know, in the spring each year. The Statler Hotel provides us during the months of March, April and May with Campaign Headquarters at the Hotel and without any charge. We also have our regular office headquarters in the old Smythe Building on Huron Road where our working force takes care of the detail of the Campaign. The quarters on Huron Road are very cramped and do not provide enough space for a force of thirty or forty girls to work efficiently; nor do we feel that it would be at all feasible or proper to even ask the Hotel to give us more space than the three or four rooms which they now assign for our meeting purposes.

We note that there is some vacant space in the Ninth-Chester Building, a portion of which would serve our purpose fully and which would need very little in the way of partitioning or alteration and for which latter we would gladly pay.

If this space is not in prospect for immediate rental or lease, would you and Mr. Spanye permit us the use of it as is? We would have no permanent installations, simply such office furniture and typewriters as we install for the Campaign and a telephone connection which the telephone company provides from our switchboard at the main office in the Smythe Building.


