We have for acknowledgement your letter of September 4th, and note that you are continuing to receive appeals from Yeshivoth in Wilno. Naturally, the question you raise as to the continuance of these institutions in Lithuania, is difficult to answer. While we have thus far had no specific information of prohibitions placed upon them, the attitude of the Russian Government in the past toward replaced upon them, the attitude of the Russian Government in the past toward religious educational institutions, would make their future seem highly precarious. Orthodox leaders in this country are now endeavoring to assist a number of the Orthodox leaders in this country are now endeavoring to assist a number of the Institutions to find havens in other countries — the United States, Palestine and elsewhere, and a group of leading Jewish organizations here, including the Jeint Distribution Committee, are giving careful thought to the problem of all the Yeshivoth in Russian-occupied areas.

With respect to your inquiry in regard to the transfer of funds to Yeshivoth in Lithuania, as perhaps you know, since the absorption of the Baltic countries by Bussia, all transmissions of funds from America to Lithuania are now subject to control by our State Department. Special permission must be obtained from that countrol by our State Department. Special permission must be obtained from that Department for such transfers, and on the other side, too, the permission of the Lithuanian authorities must be obtained to release such funds as are received in that country. As you can understand, therefore, the transfer of money to designated institutions in Lithuania, in view of existing restrictions, is surrounded with many difficulties.

We might add, however, that within the last week, the Treasury Department announced a modification in these regulations, whereby individuals in the United States may send financial assistance to their relatives or dependents in the Baltic countries, provided that such remittances are made only by persons who have continuously provided in the United States for one year or more immediately preceding the date resided in the United States for one year or more immediately preceding the date thereof, and had been making similar remittances to the same payers for at least thereof, and had been making similar remittances are not to exceed \$50 per month six months prior to April 8, 1940; such remittances are not to exceed \$50 per month to any payer except that additional sums not exceeding \$10 per month may be paid for each additional member of the payer's family, but not in excess of \$100 per month to any one family; such remittances may be made only for the necessary living expenses of the payer and the payer's family.

We trust that the foregoing information will be helpful.

"Marseille, France (Special Dispatch) November 15th.

Entire Jewish population of Baden and Pfalz, 7,000 men, women and children, suddenly and ruthlessly expelled by Nazi Government and forcibly deported to concentration Camp, Camp De Gurz, Basses Fyrenees, in unoccupied part of France, facing death by starvation unless rescued through emigration to friendly havens overseas. In seven year persecution by Nazi regime, this is first case of total deportation of a large Jewish Community regardless of sex or age."

These people and thousands of others like them are faced with appalling tragedy but for the aid that you and we and all of American Jewry can yet give them.

The big problem is getting enough money to transport them out of Europe, and to help them establish themselves over again in the new lands where they are today dispersed.

Dear Mr. Berne:

I herewith submit to you the formal application of the 1941 United Palestine Appeal for inclusion in the fund-raising effort of the Cleveland Jewish Welfare Federation, Inc., of 1941.

To meet the requirements of Palestine involving the maintenance, security and extension of the present structure, and to stimulate the absorptive capacity of the country for additional immigration, the United Palestine Appeal asks that out of the funds raised for 1941 by the Cleveland Jewish Welfare Federation, Inc. a sum of not less than \$350,000 to be made available to the United Palestine Appeal.

In order that the facts to sustain this application may be presented directly to the officers entrusted with this responsibility, I request that the United Palestine Appeal be given the opportunity of meeting with the members of your Board of Directors at the earliest opportunity.

The Jewish Agency for Palestine and the Jewish National Fund, the two constituent organizations of the United Palestine Appeal, which also includes the Mizrachi Palestine Fund, have adopted a budget of \$13,640,000 for the period that coincides with our campaign effort. Because of the collapse of Jewish communities in Europe, which previously made substantial contributions to the Palestine upbuilding program, because of the effect of war on other countries, such as England, South Africa, Canada, etc., and because of the new emergency and war-time needs and opportunities that exist in Palestine, the leaders of the Jewish Agency and the Jewish National Fund believe that American Jewry will have to assume virtually the full responsibility for these programs.

This challenge to our statesmanship and our generosity the United Palestine Appeal is prepared to accept, with the understanding and sympathetic cooperation of your organization and its constituency.

Formal documents giving in detail the nature of these budgets will be submitted to you and to your fellow officers through the personal meeting which I trust can be arranged soon, and through the submission of statistical material.

In brief, however, these are the essential elements of the program which requires our energetic and effective collaboration:

In the field of immigration, Palestine continues to be an outstanding factor in the absorption of refugees. There are now available 8,100 immigration certificates which can be used before March 31, 1941 by immigrants in various parts of Europe, whose efforts to enter Palestine must be facilitated by funds for transportation.

The continued entry of non-certificated immigrants into Palestine today assumes wider proportions than ever before, as is attested by the entry in the month of November of over three thousand non-certificated refugees. The fact that Palestine absorbed over 24,000 refugees in the first year of the war also must be taken into consideration in determining the enlarged financial responsibility of the Jewish Agency.

The continued influx of a large immigration, combined with the impact of war upon the economy of Palestine, has brought new burdens to the Jewish Agency budget in the form of provision for relief. In the past several months the Jewish Agency has made available increased sums of money through the Vaad Leumi so that some 75,000 people a month could obtain relief assistance.

This is in addition to the obligation which the Jewish Agency assumes when non-certificated refugees are released into its custody by the Government. Thus, in the case of some 1700 hapless refugees, whose fate became known to the world through the explosion of the Patria, the Jewish Agency was given the responsibility to see to it that these men, women and children did not become public charges, and moreover that they were fed, sheltered, clothed and restored to the health which they had lost in the months of wandering on the seas.

The war has dislocated a great part of the economic and industrial life of the country. To prevent demoralization, to cut down on the relief load, the Jewish Agency as the representative of the Jewish people has undertaken to stimulate commerce and industry so that men could be employed in jobs and that the security of the country could simultaneously be strengthened through the continued functioning of the economic machinery and through the extension of various public works, particularly those to enlarge and to link the Jewish settlements.

The continuation of the colonization program is one of the most important duties facing the Jewish Agency and the Jewish National Fund in 1941.

The 257 Jewish settlements which dot Palestine must be protected and their areas and activity extended; equipment, livestock, agricultural instruction and assistance must be given, particularly to some hundred colonies established in the past decade, sixty of them in the last four years.

In the year 1940 the Jewish Agency and the Jewish National Fund were responsible for the establishment of eight new colonies. The program now under way provides for the erection of fifteen additional settlements in 1941. This colonization program is essential for these reasons, in brief:

To widen the frontiers of Jewish colonization in the Jewish Homeland, to provide the soil upon which the Yishuv's capacity for self-sufficiency in agricultural production may be enhanced, to erect settlements for the purpose of increasing the strategic security of colonies already established, and to give a foot-hold on the land to an increasing number of refugees who have come to Palestine to rebuild their economic life through integration on the soil of Palestine.

Grave new burdens have fallen upon the Jewish community of Palestine. It has met these burdens with patience, faith and self-sacrifice, providing increasing sums of money for emergency, security and war-time needs. However, certain programs which the Jewish community in Palestine was unable until the war to carry on by itself in whole or in part must, if this magnificent structure is to be preserved and widened, be assumed by American Jewry.

Thus, the Jewish Agency must enlarge its contribution for the maintenance of the educational system of Palestine, which embraces some sixty thousand children. This is but one illustration of the wide variety of cultural and economic, as well as agricultural activities which the United Palestine Appeal is sponsoring.

The facts of Palestine's development are in themselves a source of pride and encouragement to all Jewry. We must remember that because of the generosity and the vision of the Jewish people in previous years, there exists in Palestine the largest free Jewish community in the world, next to that of the United States. Preservation of the Jewish people and of Jewish values is bound up with the growth of the Jewish homeland in Palestine.

Today the Jews of Palestine are playing a significant role in the struggle whose outcome will determine the fate, not alone of one country, but of our present-day civilization. Over six thousand Palestine Jews are in the British Army. Palestine Jews are now serving in the battles in Egypt and Greece. In the coming months, additional thousands of Palestine Jews will be recruited in the regular forces and in the Volunteer Force, which has been initiated in the past week.

The Jews of America have the opportunity and the responsibility of making clear to this great Jewish community in Palestine that we share with them the spirit of faith in the ultimate triumph of the cause for which they are fighting, and that we shall do everything in our power to maintain their morale, not alone with moral, but with an increased material support.

For these reasons, I have every confidence that you and your associates will give the most sympathetic consideration to the request of the United Palestine Appeal for a minimum allotment requested for 1941, and that your Jewish community will respond to your 1941 welfare fund campaign with a generosity sufficient to meet this obligation which we have eagerly assumed.

My dear Mr. Halle:

I received your letter of January 13 which I assume was by way of a reply to my letter of January 11. I regret that it is not a reply. The Jewish Welfare Fund of Cleveland is entitled to have all the information that it can get concerning its beneficiaries, and as far as the report of the Allotment Committee is concerned, it will receive it when all other Welfare Funds in the country will receive it, at such time and in such form as the Allotment Committee will decide.

The point which I raised in my letter and which you seem to overlook is that you, as chairman of the Budget Committee, did not consult the chairman of the Welfare Fund before you made your direct request to the Allotment Committee. The members of the Allotment Committee know that I am chairman of the Jewish Welfare Fund of Cleveland, and when the chairman of the Budget Committee of the same Fund makes a request to the Allotment Committee for a copy of the report, they assume that it was done with my knowledge and approval. That, by implication commits me to a procedure which I together with the other members of the Allotment Committee rejected. We definitely voted not to make the report available to the country at large, but to send a copy of it after it is edited, to the three beneficiaries of the United Jewish Appeal and to the Council of Federations and Welfare Funds. The reasons for the action, I can not go into now, but they were sufficiently cogent to have been approved unanimously. You will readily see that your letter which asks for a reversal of the position taken, coming from the Cleveland Jewish Welfare Fund, whose chairman I am, is distinctly embarrassing to me, and the incident could have been avoided if you had taken the trouble to call me up.

I must again repeat the request which I made in my letter to you of January 11: that there be a little closer contact between the chairman of the Budget Committee and the chairman of the Welfare Fund. Dear Rabbi Silver:

Yours of January 11th. is before me and I want to assure you that there was no intent on my part to discredit you with the Allotment Committee.

In my administration of the work as Chairman of the Budget Committee I have seldom brought to the Committee as a whole or the Chairman the problems arising, until enough information was at hand to place it before them, so that definite judgment could be given by the Committee. In this case there was no other motive and I regret that any action of mine should place you in a false position or possibly undermine your position.

I would like to present to you my interpretation. Firstly, if the Allotment Committee as constituted had come to a definite conclusion as to allocation, no question could have arisen. Their failure placed the local Budget Committee in a position of making the decisions by themselves and as Chairman of the Budget Committee I felt that all of the information that was placed before the Allotment Committee unedited was rightfully for our use. The funds which are expended to secure this are furnished by the Welfare Fund cities and there is no question in my mind but that we are entitled to the report exactly as made by Mr. Freedman, who was selected by the Committee. I can see no reason why we as a Budget Committee should not place our own interpretation on this report, instead of having it handed to us by possibly interested parties to the agreement, and in asking for this information and knowing of the decision made by the Committee I felt that it would be embarrassing to Rabbi Silver to be in a position where he would simply voice the Committee's action to us. I likewise felt that it was so important that we have this information at hand before any allocations were made that we be rightfully allowed to make our own interpretation thereof.

Mimites of a Meeting of the Jewish Welfare Fund Committee of the Federation held in the Campaign Headquarters, Statler Hotel, On Tuesday, January Elst, 1941.

- 1. There were present: Rabbi A. H. Silver, Chairman; Mesdames Siegmund Herseg, A. F. Hellman and Abraham Strauss and Messrs. E. M. Baker, Joseph M. Berne, Judge Meurice Bernon, Rabbi B. R. Brickner, Saul S. Danaceau, George Furth, Philmore Haber, S. P. Halle, Irving Hexter, Adolph Keller and Bugne E. Wolf.
- 2. There were submitted to the meeting the attached memoranda covering:
- a) The statement of receipts and disbursements of the 1940 Jewish Welfare Fund account from the beginning of the fiscal year, March 1, 1940 to January 17th, 1941.
 - b) A schedule of 1940 appropriations and payments as of January 17th.
- c) A statement of receipts and disbursements in the delinquent pledges account covering the same fiscal year period.
- d) An analysis in detail of the numbers of contributors and brackets of contributions in amount for the ten years of the Fund.
- 3. The Director reviewed preparations for the 1941 Campaign thus far undertaken as covered in the attached outline

per the street partition.

4. The Chairman stated that in order that plans might go forward at once for divisional organization, it was essential that the Campaign Officers be selected and on motion by Mrs. Herzog, duly seconded and carried, the Chairman was instructed to appoint a Meminating Committee of Seven to meet at once with power of selection of a slate of Officers which will be a proved at a later date by the Welfare Pund Committee and the Board of Trustees.

In this connection, Rabbi Brickner pointed out that both Rabbi Silver and he had, a year ago, indicated their desire to give up their Sampaign leadership in the feeling that it was time that lay persons undertook the responsibility; and that he himself was firm in his conviction that this should be done and he wanted it understood that he did not wish his name considered as one of the Campaign Chairmen for this year. Rabbi Brickner assured the group, however, that the Campaign would have his every cooperation, nevertheless. Rabbi Silver expressed himself as being in agreement with Rabbi Brickner's statement and thereupon appointed the following as a Nominating Committee: Philmore Haber, Chairman, Joseph M. Berne, Rabbi B. R. Brickner, Saul Danaceau, Mrs. Siegmund Herzog, Bugene E. Wolf and himself. It was understood that this Committee would meet promptly.

5. The Chairman suggested further, that inasmuch as no fixed procedure had been followed in the various years in the Welfare Fund operation in the manner of selection of Campaign personnel; and since there seemed to be some confusion in the minds of people as to the relationship of the Committee and the Welfare Fund to the Federation, the matter ought to be clarified by the restatement and adoption, if necessary, of proper regulations governing the Fund's administration.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the matter be referred to a small Committee and the Chairman appointed for this purpose, Judge Maurice Bernon as Chairman, Edward M. Baker, Hax Simon and Mrs. Abraham Strauss.

about two months ago for office accommodations and meeting space for the 1941 Campaign. It was found necessary because of several conventions which were already scheduled, to accept the dates of either April 27th or May 11th for the opening dinner meeting of the Welfare Fund Drive, if we were to have proper facilities for Campaign meetings. The earlier thate was accepted since the opening on May 11th would mean that the Campaign would not be concluded until May 22nd or 23rd, leaving entirely too short a time for the preparation of the June 1st bills. Rabbi Brickmer called attention to the fact that the Central Conference of American Rabbis was having its conference on April 27th and the Rabbi was of the opinion that the Federation date should be changed. The date was approved; Rabbi Brickmer voted in the negative.

7. The meeting discussed in a general way the situation relating to the failure of the large overseas agencies to come to an agreement on any joint budgeting and Rabbi Silver urged that this situation be not dramatized since there had been precedent in years past for both the independent budgeting and the united appeal. It was his feeling that neither situation had or would effect the status of Welfare Funds but that communities would find it possible to come to a satisfactory agreement on the amounts on which they wished to allocate to the Joint Distribution Committee, the United Palestine Appeal, the National Refugee Service and other Agencies.

8. No further business coming before the meeting, it was adjourned.

MEMORANDA FOR THE MEETING OF THE JEWISH WELFARE FUND COMMITTEE - JANUARY 21.1941

 Report of the 1940 financial operations covering receipts and disbursements on both 1940 and delinquent accounts; and comparison of collections, 1940 with 1939.

2. Preparations for 1941 Campaign thus far undertaken:

A. Business Men's Council composed very largely of the leadership of the Men's Divisions was organized in November; and in addition to assigning to the members the collection of substantial delinquencies of previous years, on which they have collected to date a total of approximately \$10,000, one meeting of an educational nature was arranged for them, at which Mr. James Rosenberg of New York was present to discuss the development of the San Domingo Resettlement Project.

A second meeting was planned for December 16th to which Judge Meurice Rothenberg of New York, one of the Vice-Chairman of the United Palestine Appeal, was invited; he had actually accepted the invitation but cancelled his date at the last moment owing to his inability to leave court and come to Cleveland.

Other similar educational meetings were planned for the Business Men's Council but deferred after the middle of December because of the holidays and the imminence of preparation for the 1941 Campaign itself.

- B. The entire record of four sets of 35,000 file cards for the Campaign has been completed; and these cards are now being used by the respective Divisions as the Chairmon and Vice-Chairmon are called into meetings to organize.
- C. Division meetings have been started and will continue as rapidly as possible after the selection of Campaign Officers.
- D. In the meantime material is being gethered for the Budget Committee for consideration at the usual time in the latter part of March.

3. Further plans to be undertaken now:

- A. Soloction of Campaign Officers.
- B. Communication with all of the members of the Compaign Organization apprising them at this time of the personnel of Compaign Officers and organization which is now going forward in the respective departments and divisions.
- C. Dates for the Campaign have been set in accordance with the availability of the Statler Hotel accommodations which required the opening of the Campaign on either April 27th or May 11th. The former date was chosen as being preferable in order to provide sufficient time for bookkeeping and billing before June 1st. The large number of accounts———nearly 25,000——has tended in the past two years to stagnate the work in the office seriously.

We have considered the request made by you for the sum of \$600 to defray the cost of leisure time and group program for refugee young adults for the remainder of the fiscal year of the Jewish Welfare Fund. We have also discussed the problem with Mr. Samuel Goldhamer of the Jewish Welfare Federation. It is the concurrence of our committee that neither the Refugee Service Division nor The Jewish Social Service Bureau itself is an agency authorized to make appropriations from funds received from the Jewish Welfare Fund to other organiza-tions which are beneficiaries of the Jewish Welfare Fund or Federation. We make this reservation because we think that the action requested and taken should not be regarded as a precedent for either organization. Mr. Goldhamer, however, has stated that the Jewish Welfare Fund is in favor of our transferring \$600 which you request, on the theory that we are acting as a conduit of title, the situation being simply that one of the beneficiaries of the funds, ourselves, temporarily and accidentally has a small available balance on hand while the other is temporarily in need of an additional appropriation. Hence, we regard the appropriation as one authorized and made by the Jewish Welfare Fund and within your budget, rather than made by our organization and within our budget. Under these circumstances, we naturally assume that if all the money is not necessary for the purpose for which you requested, any excess will be returned to us so that, in our trusteeship capacity, we may account for the same. I hope that the above somewhat formalistic explanation will not make any less welcome our check in the amount of \$600 which I am happy to enclose herewith. Gentlemen:

About a year ago we mailed two requests, one to Rabbi Abba Hillel Silver and one to Rabbi Barnett Brickner, in the form of an appeal for help for the Kinsman Jewish Center. Both Rabbis replied at that time that the Federation will take action as soon as possible.

We are aware that a committee was appointed to make a study of the Kinsman Jewish Center, in order to make a report to the Board of Trustees of the Jewish Welfare Federation. Dr. Azriel Eizenberg, executive director of the Cleveland Hebrew schools visited our Hebrew school a number of times. We also turned over to him all information of our Center. Up to this date we have no indication from the Jewish Welfare Federation that help will come forth.

We deeply regret that we must again write you concerning our Center, because we realize the hard times in which our people find themselves and we know that the Federation is so heavily burdened with raising money for overseas, for Palestine, for refugees and for National institutions, yet our Center today is in such dire need for immediate help that we have no place to turn but to the Federation.

For the last two years our Hebrew school and Junday school are kept up with a deficit accumulating year in and year out. If you will refer to our original application you will find all our figures pertaining to the upkeep of these schools. A great number of organizations, youth clubs, adult classes, citizenship classes which meet in our Center without any rental fees whatso-ever, because we realize the educational and cultural fields are so valuable to the youth, yet their financial status is so that we cannot ask for any compensation.

Gentlemen:

Under date of December 6th we addressed a letter to you embodying our request for immediate funds to augment our staff and operation so that adequate service and the necessary special attention could be given to the refugee young adults. At that time we submitted an estimated budget and the program for this activity as worked out by the organizations and agencies concerned with the refugees. We also submitted a copy of a letter from the Refugee Service Division approving and recommending that our bureau service refugee young adults in the manner projected in the report.

We expected that the Budget Committee might consider our request for interim budget for the balance of the fiscal year 1940, and also our estimated budget for 1941, but soon found out that this plan was not feasible by reason of the fact that the Budget Committee was not scheduled to meet until it was time to consider budgets for the year 1941, and also the fact that the Welfare Fund had already made appropriations in excess of its available funds. Having the conviction that the need for this specialized activity of our bureau was urgent, and that we could not reasonably await the meeting of the Budget Committee and the commancement of the fiscal year 1941, we discussed the matter with Rabbi Silver and Mr. Goldhamer. Upon their suggestion, we made a request directly to the Refugee Service Division for a transfer of enough money out of their anticipated surplus funds to cover our interim budget.

The Refugee Service Division, recognizing the urgency and the value of the work, appropriated the sum of \$600.00 and forwarded the same to us on January 23rd, 1941, this sum to cover our expenditures in this work for the balance of the fiscal year of the Welfare Fund. A copy of the letter of the chairman of the Refugee Service Division setting forth their understanding of the basis upon which the transfer was made is enclosed.

It is apparent that we could not employ someone to take the responsibility for leasure time work with the refugee newcomers as assistant to our director.

Mr. Rosen, on a temporary two months basis. We are proceeding to set up the

program and employ a worker on an annual basis as our only alternative. Although the procedure may be a bit unusual, we feel we are reasonably justified in so doing because of the necessities of the situation as we have observed them, the recognition and approval of this refugee leisure time project by the interested agencies, to-wit: Refugee Service Division, Council of Jewish Women, Council Educational Alliance, as set forth in the report heretofore sent to you, and the further fact that the demand for our service by the refugees has grown so fast that it has impaired our service to the native groups for whose benefit our agency was originally established.

We trust that you will find our action reasonable, and that we will have your cooperation in seeing that we receive appropriation for the year 1941 to continue this work. The cost of carrying on the refugee leisure time program will be included as part of the Young Adult Bureau Budget for 1941, and will be submitted to you in due time.

Dear Friend:

May I respectfully submit to you and ask that you present to the Jewish Welfare Federation of Cleveland the urgent request of the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee for the allocation of at least \$275,000 from the proceeds of your campaign for the current hiscal year.

That you and your associates may properly appraise this request, we submit the following digest of the program of J.D.C. for the immediate future, based on the needs of sorely afflicted Jewish populations in nearly every European country, of refugees who have temporary and highly precarious asylum or are in interpment or concentration camps, of additional thousands who await emigration facilities and transportation to lands of refuge, and finally of those Jewish immigrants who are attempting to take root in Central and South America, the Philippines and other parts of the world.

OVERSEAS NEEDS AS SUBMITTED TO J.D.C.

For the first six months of 1941, the J.D.C. has received budgetary applications from committees and organizations throughout the world totalling over \$12,600,000. Details are set forth in schedules attached. This sum can be spent without in any way aiding the economy of the aggressor nations. It is composed of minimal estimates by competent organizations who are on the spot to appraise the actual need. It is substantially below the amounts which indeed could be used constructively and to great advantage to meet the pressing needs for emigration, to furnish food for large masses of the Jewish people throughout Europe, and for other essential activities. It makes no provision for long-range programs, capital investments or even normal phases of reconstruction work, which, when conditions permitted in the past, have been the concern of the J.D.C. It restricts itself to pure life-saving through emergency relief measures and through emigrating as many as possible of the Jewish people who are in jeopardy. In sum, it covers only those indispensable functions which we are sure our contributors feel must be undertaken at this time of world crisis.

This year, instead of presenting the customary type of annual budget, the J.D.C. wishes to bring to your attention those actual minimal applications for only six months. The ever-changing conditions abroad necessitate frequent rearrangements of the plans of all organizations. No one can forecast what the precise conditions and problems may be for a year. The J.D.C. has been obliged to make commitments on a month-to-month basis, having in mind the most pressing situations and taking into account in a realistic way what is likely to be our income from all sources.

INCREASED RESPONSIBILITIES OF J.D.C.

In pleading for the largest possible support from your community to enable the J.D.C. to meet as great a portion as possible of the applications before it, we draw your attention to several major factors:

The Jews of this country, and they alone, carry the life-and-death responsibility for deciding whether or not, and to what extent, the J.D.C. programs of emergency aid, emigration, relief and service throughout Europe, Latin America and the Far East shall be maintained. The J.D.C. derives no funds from affiliated organizations, parallel drives or auxiliary campaigns. There are no loan funds, no women's organizations. J.D.C.'s only resources are the proceeds of its 1941 campaign through direct application to American Jewish communities.

A much larger burden rests today on the J.D.C. than ever before. Formerly substantial supplementary funds could be counted upon from the Jewish communities in the countries in which J.D.C. operated. Today, the very givers of a year ago are the recipients of aid. Moreover, such European organizations as the Central Council for Jewish Refugees in England and the Jewish Colonization Association, which formerly could be relied upon for substantial amounts, are no longer able to contribute. The extent of this loss is evidenced by the fact that in 1939 these two organizations alone assigned \$1,200,000 for activities in cooperation with J.D.C. During the same year an additional \$1,700,000 was raised locally by committees for assistance to refugees in France, Holland, Belgium and other countries. Obviously, this cannot be duplicated in 1941, when the committees' leaders are themselves refugees. Many, many additional millions were raised and spent by mass Jewish populations such as the Polish, who formerly met all but a fraction of the costs of their social, child care, economic and welfare programs, the J.D.C.'s grants being largely supplementary. Today, the Jews in German-occupied Poland, where J.D.C. operates, are almost entirely dependent upon outside aid simply in order to live. It is hardly necessary to go through the grim list. Hungary, Roumania, other countries in Eastern and Central Europe present screly aggravated situations.

Above all, the tragic plight of millions of European Jews is today so critical as virtually to be a question of "now or never". If J.D.C. is given the necessary funds, hundreds of thousands can be fed and kept alive; thousands more can be emigrated to the Americas and to Palestine; relief and hope can be brought to those in concentration camps and internment centers; the newly arrived, unadjusted and unabsorbed refugees in Central and South America can be more adequately dealt with in terms of redistribution, resettlement, retraining, and orientation to their new surroundings. In the western hemisphere, the last-named problem must be looked at from the American as well as the Jewish viewpoint. Quite apart

from the vital job of saving lives, it must not be overlooked that a breakdown in morale, if J.D.C. should be unable to sustain its service, could never be compensated in future years. It is next to impossible to rebuild tomorrow after irreparable damage has been done today. The time to help is now.

In the light of today's situation, it seems clear that the time has come to stop thinking in terms of mere philanthropy or voluntary taxation. The problem is now one of all-out defense for people who literally stand on the brink of disaster. Governments at war, or on the verge of war, have no time for normal welfare services when their very existences are at stake. Private philanthropy must continue to save people while democratic governments battle to save civilization. That is why J.D.C. represents the last and only ray of hope for millions of our fellow Jews. At the same time, because of the standing and reputation of the J.D.C. abroad, governmental agencies in France, in Switzerland, in Portugal, in Shanghai and elsewhere look to J.D.C. for relief work and some orderly approach to the refugee problem. Were J.D.C. to fail to meet such requirements, the effect on the cooperation needed and secured from governments would be immediate and disastrous.

THE REALISTIC NATIONAL QUOTA OF J.D.C. AND YOUR LOCAL SHARE

The attached list of budgetary requests which we have received for the first six months of 1941 have been carefully scanned, evaluated and pruned to their smallest proportions. No one, viewing the alarming arrivity of the Jewish world crisis, can doubt that the J.D.C. could expend \$12.600,000, and much more, to good advantage during the first six months of 1941. Unless conditions change radically, it may well be anticipated that at least a similar sum vill be required for the last six months, or over \$85,000,000 for the year. On the other hand, the J.D.C. is fully cognizant of the many legitimate demands made on American Jewish communities by other agencies, overseas and demestic. We assume that your community will provide first for the problems right at your own doorstep; that you will make allotments to agencies such as the National Refugee Service to permit them to carry on effectively. But beyond the domestic and American refugee scene, we must place emphatically before you the total J.D.C. responsibilities for overseas aid, the crucial nature of the present emergency, and the vast number of human beings abroad affected.

We submit for your appraisal the following tables showing the amounts respectively allotted to the Joint Distribution Committee, the National Refugee Service, and the United Palestine Appeal from the receipts of the United Jewish Appeal in 1939 and in 1940:

*Plus an additional \$1,000,000 for local refugee needs from the Greater New York Campaign of the United Jewish Appeal. Based on the attached budgetary requests presented to the J.D.C., we could, as we have stated, ask the Jews of America for \$12,600,000 for the first six months of 1941. In the light of the vast numbers of Jews who require life-giving help, this amount is not large. We realize, however, that the Jewish communities of this country have many responsibilities. As an American organization, we are ready realistically to take these into account in making our appeal to your community and to others, on a level which we deem possible of fulfillment and yet generous. We have therefore reviewed the giving record of your community and others, and have suggested quotas for each community which, when totalled, amount to a nation-wide goal of \$11,250,000 for the year.

It is important to stress that this campaign goal will provide for a budget cut to the bone and indispensable to be met if the J.D.C. is to continue even its minimal present standard services. The 1941 goal is not in any way inflated. It is based on no higher a rate than that at which the J.D.C. actually expended funds during the latter part of 1939 and the early part of 1940, after the war had begun. Then we were disbursing \$1,000,000 a month. Naturally, as our income was reduced we were obliged to curtail our appropriations. In doing so, we were compelled to reduce the volume of our help, to cut down essential activities, and to permit an aggravation of Jewish needs the world over. In asking American communities for \$11,250,000, the J.D.C. is applying for even less than a total based on a \$1,000,000 monthly rate of expenditure. We include in this the necessary costs of the national campaign and of possible shrinkage in collections. Our appeal to the country represents, not a sudden substantial increase over and above the record of what we have been doing, but rather a request consistent with actual past expenditures in the period of the last few years.

Your community's share in the total of \$11,250,000 has been set at a minimum of \$275,000. With an awareness of the urgency of the needs, we ask you to help us realize this amount requested for 1941 and as much more as possible.

The J.D.C. has consistently urged that, in view of the uncertainties of this year, a substantial part of the funds collected for all purposes of overseas aid by all the organizations applying to the communities, shall be subject to review by an impartial and objective allotment committee. Should such a procedure be established this year, we are ready to place our budgetary request before such a commission. We do not know whether such a plan will actually be carried out in time for the communities to plan their budgets this year. In the meantime, therefore, bearing in mind that Welfare Funds and other communities conduct only a single campaign for the entire year's needs, and request a budget covering estimated requirements for the year, we are in duty bound to set before you a quota for the entire year 1941. The J.D.C. campaign will be conducted on a dignified plane. We plan no independent local J.D.C. drives, nor will we ask Welfare Funds to conduct any. We ask only that J.D.C. be awarded the largest possible amount that can be raised by your community for overseas needs, and that a representative of the J.D.C. be permitted to appear before your Budget Committee to explain, in greater detail than is possible within the compass of this letter, the requirements and programs of our organization.

Be assured that we recognize our obligations and yours as American citizens, as Jews and as human beings. The leadership of the J.D.C. pledges that not one cent

of your money will benefit the economy of aggressor nations, weaken the British blockade, or be used in any way inconsistent with the opinion, policy and desires of the entire American community and government.

If the great masses of the Jewish people are to be saved from hopelessness and sheer extinction, new sacrifices will have to be made by all who are able to contribute in this country. The J.D.C. can and must carry on despite all of the difficulties that beset its path. We earnestly ask your continuing and augmented support to cope with a continuing and augmented problem, affecting the lives, the security, the decencies of existence of millions of our fellow Jews.

The Jewish Welfare Fund Committee with the approval of the Board of Trustees of the Jewish Welfare Federation has just selected the personnel of Campaign Officers for the 1941 Welfare Fund Appeal.

I have also received referendum material addressed to me as "Chairman of the Jewish Welfare Federation". My understanding is that the Federation is a member of the Council and that the Jewish Welfare Fund is not a member of the Council. However, I am not certain about this. I am forwarding your letter and my reply to Mr. Goldhamer and I will ask him to clear the matter by checking our records and by getting in touch with the Council, if necessary. If there is any question about it, we will have both groups vote as we certainly do not wish to deprive either group of its rights. Since I expect to be out of the city the week of the 17th of March, I have suggested to Mr. Goldhamer that he call a meeting of the Federation Board for March 13th to consider this matter and to take care of other Federation matters if time permits. 

Gentlemen:

Enclosed is our financial statement covering the period from March 1, 1940, to February 28, 1941.

We wish to call your attention to the reasons of the decline on our statement of the amount of income as well as the disbursements. The reason is that most of the incomes from our affairs are shown as net profigs after our affair committee had deducted the expenses. Our experiment, beginning last year, to embrace our entire cultural activities, the school as well as our theatrical studio and our other various activities, has proved to be a success.

We point proudly to the further development of all the affairs that we have undertaken this year. In view of the fact that the census taken by the Jewish Community Council regarding the drastic geographical changes of the Jewish population in this city, the Yiddish Culture Society at the last general meeting held Monday, February 24th, at the Council Educational Alliance, unanimously adopted a resolution that we should expand our school activities by opening another school branch in Cleveland Heights. Of course, we realize the hard responsibility that we are taking upon ourselves in view of the deficit that we are confronted with. Nevertheless, we feel that the conditions of Jewish education in this city are very much backward in comparison with other communities in cities of similar size.

We feel confident that the Jewish Welfare Fund will give us encouragement in their decision of our allocation for this coming year, so that we may further the cause of a finer, more spiritual Jewish community.

Cur Yiddish Theatrical Studio has been active more this year than in any other year in our history. There is practically no Jewish organization in the city where we have not been represented with the finest talented men and women, bringing to them the finest of Yiddish literature, poetry, and drama.

We will as always appreciate if you will give us the opportunity at the hearing of the budget committee, the chance to be present and plead our cause.

At your request, I am sending you some material pertinent to the request we made of the Budget Committee of the Jewish Welfare Federation for an allocation of \$2000.00. You have probably received by this time, a Preliminary Memorandum issued by the United Service Organizations for National Defense, together with a letter from Mr. Frank L. Weil, the President of the Jewish Welfare Board, dated March 27th. I shall merely supplement it by a brief statement which I included in the hearing at the Eudget Committee.

I am sorry you were unable to attend this meeting as I had looked forward with anticipation to meeting you. We have met on previous occasions in the past when you spoke at meetings that marked the launching of YMHA and Jewish Center Building fund campaigns, of which I was in charge.

Since you are familiar with the YMHA and Jewish Center movement, it is not necessary for me to dwell on it. I merely wish to point out that the Jewish Welfare Board, which is the parent body of all these institutions, serves them regularly through a variety of activities. The Council Educational Alliance of Cleveland is one of our constituent organizations, and Mr. Sam Levine avails himself of our services. The Jewish Young Adult Bureau also benefits from the services we render. We have a full-time field secretary in your area who visits Cleveland regularly. Mr. George B. Mayer can tell you about his work. All of these services are given freely without cost.

We feel that the "Y's" and Centers constitute a potent force in the fight for civilized values and democratic ideas. It exemplifies domocracy at work.

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We take care of the morale of the men in service also. We serve them in army posts, navel stations, veterans hospitals, and soldiers' homes. Last year, we handled about 10,000 personal welfare cases for disabled veterans and their dependents. These activities are carried on in all sections of the United States, in the Philippines, Hawaii, and the Canal Zone. We have enlarged our Army and Navy Committee, of which Mr. John M. Schiff is Chairman, to meet the new call upon its services. We have added to our field staff and have provided facilities and activities for the men in uniform. The funds that the United Service Organization will raise, will include only the additional emergency expenditures and not the normal army and navy work.

The Jewish Welfare Board, as you know, is the agency authorized by the United States Government that ministers to the religious, social, and welfare needs of the Jewish men in the army and nawy. There are specific Jewish activities of great importance which we will have to carry on irrespective of the United Service Organizations. In the first place, we are planning to collect statistics regarding the participation of Jews in the national defense program. It will be costly, but I am sure you will agree that it should be done. Secondly, there is a very vital public relations angle to our work which is distinctively Jewish in value. We have an unusual opportunity to bring about better understanding and good will among the different faiths represented in the Army and Navy. Furthermore, there are aspects of the religious program which go beyond usual army and navy welfare work and they are definitely Jewish in purpose.

In the light of these greater needs, we feel justified in asking for an allocation of \$2000.00. Last year, we spent \$172,414.00 and because of inadequate support, we incurred a deficit of over \$52,000.00. The expenditures for 1941 will naturally be greater, to meet the additional needs. I am sure you will agree that our request is reasonable. We hope that you will use your great influence at the Eudget Committee meeting to help us secure this grant.

Dear Merry:

I had an opportunity to review with Rabbi Silver this afternoon the budgetary setup as presented by the statements received from the various agencies, and with consideration for the possibilities of a goal that can be achieved in the light of present conditions and the exceedingly successful results here in Cleveland in money-reising for the Welfare Fund in the past two years.

Were we to be guided by the requests as submitted by the agencies who submitted increased budgets, we would be asking for \$356,000 more than was alloted to them in 1940. This does not take into account the agencies who indicated a greater need without giving specific figures of expectancy from Cleveland. The total would undoubtedly carry us over a million and a quarter dollars as a Campaign Goal.

with reference to the special situation in Oleveland, it is generally recognized now that in the past two years, the Cleveland Jewish community has been influenced to give much more generously than has been the case in other large communities comparable with Cleveland. For example, Philadelphia while having no complete Welfare Fund, but having a population about two and one-half times the size of Cleveland, succeeded in raising in 1940, for the major overseas work, only about \$750,000 as compared with Cleveland's contribution of about one-half a million dollars. Chicago likewise, with a population three times that of Cleveland's, produced only \$1,400,000 or about \$400,000 less than had been raised in 1939. Los Angeles, with a Jewish population fully half again as large as Cleveland's, fell short about \$200,000 of its goal and raised only something over \$600,000 in 1940. Detroit with at least as large or a larger Jewish population, raised less than Cleveland's \$750,000.

Mr. Harry F. Affelder Cleveland,

It is my impression that since this word has gone around, there has been something of a let-down on the part of Cleveland Jewry in its enthusiasm about larger money-raising and in its pride of achievement.

Under the circumstances, it does not seem likely to me and I believe that Rabbi Silver joins me in this feeling, that we shall be able to reproduce in 1941 the results of the last two years. Mevertheless, it would be a mistake, of course, to set a goal that was equal to the amount raised last year \$736,000, or even less than the amount of our goal last year which was \$360,000. In either case, there would be a tendency on the part of many contributors to take advantage of the situation in the feeling that somehow the goal would be achieved even though they themselves did not maintain their previous rate of giving. This tendency will be accentuated in the higher brackets of course by the effects of increased taxation and by the prospects of even greater public burdens.

- In reviewing the individual items of the budget, therefore, it is suggested that no increases be granted except in unusual local situations and then only very modest additions and on this basis we have set up tentative figures as indicated in the attached memoranda.
- With reference to certain specific cases, I have been asked to secure further information on the financial setup as indicated in the Hadassah audit figures provided by the Council of Federations and Welfare Funds. For two years we have noted substantial reserves ranging from \$300,000 up to \$500,000; while some of this appears to be reserved for commitments, much of it is not explained on any such basis and in particular reference to the Youth Aliyah project, it would seem that there are reserves at present considerably in excess of any funds that might be used in the light of present immigration possibilities for children into Palestine.
- In 1938, when the first figures for Hadassah were received from the Council of Federations and Welfare Funds, inquiry was instituted with the Hadassah directly at the instance of Mr. Halle. Chairman of the Budget Committee, to ascertain for what purposes such large reserves were being held and why further large sums were requested from the country in the light of such reserves. The replies we received are contained in the attached memoranda which I am sending to you and I am also apending hereto a copy of the most recent statement of "Assets and Reserves of September 30th, 1940" provided by the Council of Federations and Welfare Funds. Here again, it will be noted that there are substantial reserve funds and balances being carried over into the 1940-41 fiscal year. All of the foregoing is cited because question has been raised by members of the Budget Committee as to the nature of Hadassah's current request.

In reference to the defense agencies, it would appear desirable that some lump sum should be allocated in the budget pending a more careful study and review of the services currently being rendered by defense agencies of which many new ones have arisen and all of which appear to have the self-same purpose of combatting anti-Semitism but without any clear indication that there may not be overlapping and possibly waste. This feeling regarding the defense agencies is not of recent origin but accounted for by the demandof two years age of the establishment of a General Jewish Council to coordinate and evaluate the functions and services of the several national protective bodies.

Cleveland The total set up in the tentative figures here listed is approximately the same as the goal for 1940 and it will need to be emphasized that out of a feeling that more cannot be raised than was raised last year, no agencies are granted increases over the amounts sat up for them heretefore. And in this connection, it may seem advisable for the Budget Committee to recommend that priority be given local and national budgets in order to safeguard the maintenance of those facilities which have, many of them, been held in check in their budgeting, while large overseas demands have had to be met. This might furthermore represent a safeguarding of the basic interest and purpose in the establishment of our Jewish Welfare Fund. If I have not been clear in some of the statements here set forth, I shall be glad to discuss any of the matters with you further, before the meeting tomorrow afternoon. Sincerely yours,



\$875,000 is to be raised this year for the Welfare Fund - - in other words, a hundred agencies need \$90,000 more from Cleveland.

This represents a minimum recommendation of the Welfare Fund Budget Committee after careful study of the information before them, and after two extended meetings in which the Agencies' requests were thoroughly reviewed.

We must now determine what efforts we are to put forth this year to achieve our Goal. It can be done in part by some broadening of the base of support in numbers though much further progress in this direction is not possible - - we have already nearly 25,000 adult contributors out of a population of about 86,000. The more likely plan will be to explore those areas of giving where more generous contributions can be expected.

In this plan, we shall, as in other years, need the advice and the aid of yourself and the two hundred other Chairmen and Vice-Chairmen who comprise the Campaign Advisory Committee. Two meetings of the Committee are therefore being arranged, and it will be highly important that every member attend both so that the work may be fully covered.

We shall meet on Monday evening, April 7th, and on Tuesday evening, April 8th, at the Oakwood Club, and in order that we may make good progress with the work of reviewing the prospect lists, the meetings will be called promptly at 7:30 o'clock, and the time will be devoted to the business in hand. Refreshments will be served during the evening.

Dr. Manfred Arie, formerly a Supreme Court Justice in Vienna, will be a guest and bring a brief message.

Gentlemen:

your statement as of March 31, 1941, which sets forth the distribution of the Jewish Welfare Fund allocations for the various agencies included as beneficiaries in your Welfare Fund for 1941. You have designated in the full D. under "Educational and Cultural," that our youth activities have requested an allocation of \$3,00.00 for 1941 and that this is an increase over 1940 of \$1,000.00. Please note that we have not submitted our request for an allocation until today, as evidenced by this very letter of application for a substantial allocation. We feel confident you will be helped in determining upon a larger allocation for our emarged program of service for the Millel, the Aleph Todik Aleph, and the Vocational Service Bureau, as embraced by the Mider Scape appeal.

This is an assurance from the B'nai Frith National Wider Scope Nouth Service Fund to your local devoted organization and to American Jory at large that our amounding program will be pushed forward vigorously this year to the end that the positive values of Americanism and Jowish life may be preserved. American Jeway is aware that the tide of materialism is rising day by day. Throughout the world there is much dissatisfaction with the political, economic, and social life of the people. Restlessness is evident over where. Youth finds itself in present day life, confused, and therefore in a "tough spot." They must not be permitted to lose faith in their fellow men. They must not be permitted to give up hopes for a better and greater tomorrow. They must be given every chance to ascend to the higher levels of life. Surely they have he natural desire to become bigger and better men and women.

The B'nai B'rith National Youth Service Program is sware of all of these problems; and, fortunately for American Jeery, this youth program, as represented by the Hillel Foundations, the A. A.A., and the Vocational Service Bureau, is geared in every respect to give Jewish youth constructive guidance, in order that they may contribute something towards the making of a better world in the future.

The Hillel Foundations and the A.Z.A. truly represent American Jewry's national dynamic youth instruments, functioning as training grounds for Jewish leadership; and, through their cultural, religious, social, and inter-faith programs, our youth are learning to understand and appreciate their institutions, their religion, their holidays, their home life, their history, their statistics, their literature, and their problems. This is positive work which strengthens Jewish life internally.

We submit hopefully herewith this request for an allocation of \$7,500.00. Please note that this suggested allotment is based on the character, volume, and scope of the vital work which we are doing in these critical times for the welfare of America and the well-being of the Jewish people.

A further word about the activities of these programs. Dr. A. L. Sachar, distinguished National Director of Hillel, gives emphasis to the fact that Hillel units today on 55 college campuses serve as symbols of the dignified values of Jewish life. In 1938 there were less than 20 units in the country. With pride we all join Dr. Sachar in hailing the superb comments on Hillel's work by 55 college presidents and their staff as tangible evidence of Hillel's effectiveness in this field. Approximately 30,000 Jewish students and a good representation of the Christian student body on these campuses are served by Hillel. It is estimated that over 105,000 Jewish students attend American Universities today. As indicated, we are serving approximately 30,000 of them. A large portion of the remaining 75,000 or more can and will be served just as soon as American Jewry provides more adequate financial support.

In the field of public relations the Hillel units on every necessary occasion make replies to subversive propagandists. Hillel discredits their lies. Hillel is on guard all the time, protecting the integrity of democracy and the good name of the Jew. Hillel is building the forces of good-will between Jews and Christians. This is only one of their many services to humanity. Only recently, in a large state, the legislative assembly voted additional funds to an investigating committee on subversive activities in a number of universities. Here again we can join with Dr. Sachar in expressing our gratitude for having established already a Hillel unit in one of these iniversities, where it is watching carefully over the interests of Jewry through an effective public relations program.

Regarding the value of the Hillel cultural and religious programs. Students are introduced, under trained and sympathetic auspices, to the fundamental values of their people; and when they go back to their communities, they do so as enlightened and interested Jewish laymen. Many federations, temples, sister-hoods and other communal institutions are grateful to Hillel, which has served these youths as a training ground for this service. All Hillel units are manned by directors (Rabbis) who are most highly and specially qualified to guide and influence the lives of our youth.

As for the army of 12,000 A.Z.A. boys between the ages of 15 and 21 organized into 450 chapters throughout the country - they are being prepared, through serious and systematic study by means of a religious, cultural, social, and patriotic program, to become interested and active members in American Jewish life. The A.Z.A. means to these young Jews what the Hillel Foundations mean to the Jewish college students. They are enthusiastically active in Boy Scout work; regional, district, and national oratory and debate on general world and Jewish affairs; they sponsor an annual youth Sabbath, also scholarship loan funds for the needy and deserving students at college; they sponsor an annual summer camp for over 500 boys and participate there in cultural, religious, and recreational activities. In these turbulent times A. Z. A. chapters throughout the country cooperate with Christian youth groups in promoting joint patriotic celebrations. Their numerical strength jumped in 1938 from 245 chapters with a membership of 6,600 to 450 chapters with a membership of 12,000 at the end of 1940. These young A.Z.A. boys properly say to us that if we are to build a stronger, greater, and better America and Jewry, we must build them in the hearts of youth, who sconer or later will assume manifold duties and responsibilities of the state and of the Jewish community.

The Vocational Service Bureau, a most vital part of the Wider Scope Youth Service Program, is dedicated to the task of vocational guidance for our youth. It engages in the publication and distribution of pamphlets and leaflets; in the publication of articles in the Anglo and Jewish press; in talks; and in national, regional, and in local conferences. Through this educational and guidance service it aims to broaden the vocational horizons of our youth, so that they may be distributed as widely as possible in occupational fields and also make them more vocationally alert, so that they shall have some compensation for the handi-cap of discrimination. The Eureau was established several years ago; and, though young, it has already earned the admiration and gratitude of parents who are vitally interested in the vocational problems of their children. It has, likewise, gained recognition and appreciation from others that have taken notice and advantage of its research facilities, namely, Vocational Service Bureau publications, Jewish community centers, settlement houses, synagogue and temple organizations, Jewish college fraternities and sororities, orphan homes, child and welfare agencies, Jewish vocational service agencies, and miscellaneous youth and parental groups.

The estimated and over-all national financial requirements for the B'nai B'rith National Youth Service Program for 1941 approaches a quarter of a million dollars. We sincerely trust that we may anticipate a grant in line with the amount we are suggesting. We plead for this measure of support, because it will help us to meet our needs - and let us remember that there is no better way of training our youth than to emphasize in their minds through the B'nai B'rith Youth Program the need of developing a greater spiritual consciousness and unselfish service in their lives. Your devoted Jewish Community Fund is supporting this noble and essential program.

The B'nai B'rith Anti-Defamation League is not included as a beneficiary in the B'nai B'rith National Youth Service Fund, as the Anti-Defamation League and the

American Jewish Committee have made arrangements to conduct a national joint campaign for funds for the American Defense Activities of the American Jewish Committee and the Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith. This plan in no way affects the administration of either the B'nai B'rith Anti-Defamation League or the American Jewish Committee, nor does it affect the integrity of their respective defense programs.

Tell How

We asked some of the Welfare Fund's ace solicitors to tell how they get the substantial increases year after year. We thought you would want to know their methods. This is what they told us:

We see every prospect personally. We never solicit by telephone or mail. We have found that the only way we can really explain the needs and services of the Fund, properly answer the questions that are raised, and remove the doubts that our prospects may have, is through a personal conversation.

We try to get the "odd gift." From people who can and should give much more than they have given, we try to get double and triple the previous gifts. But even from those who are giving generously, we try to get the "odd gift." Most people who give \$25 can give \$30 just as easily; those who give \$50 can give \$60; those who give \$100 can give \$110 or \$115; those who give \$250 can just as easily give \$275; those who give \$500 can give \$525 or \$550. We try to get that additional five or ten or twenty-five or fifty dollars. They're very important. And we find we can get them in most cases.

We take plenty of time. We feel that the Fund is important enough to ask our prospect to spend whatever time may be necessary to discuss it. If one visit isn't enough and the prospect wants to think it over, we come back a few days later to discuss it again.

We are not apologetic. We don't think we are imposing upon the prospect. We are not seeking anything for ourselves. A great deal depends upon what we secure. We know that we are asking every prospect to do more than make a charitable gift—we are asking him to invest in the future of democracy and freedom, in the security of his own family. He has just as much at stake as we have.

We emphasize that 100 agencies depend upon the Fund. We remind every prospect that his gift to the Jewish Welfare Fund must be divided among 100 agencies. It is not one gift but the total of 100 gifts. We ask him to figure out what he would contribute if each of the 100 agencies had a separate campaign in Cleveland, and we ask him to give to the Jewish Welfare Fund at least the total of what he would contribute under those circumstances. We try to know our facts, thoroughly. Every prospect has some question. Some want to know about the British blockade and how aid can reach European Jewry without helping Nazi Germany. Others want to know how refugees can get out of Europe. There are always some who want the full facts on what is actually being done in Europe and Palestine. Some want to know about the Cleveland agencies in the Fund and their relationship to the Community Fund. They aren't satisfied with vague answers. They want the facts, and we try to be prepared for their questions before we see them—with this year's facts, not last year's.

We start to solicit early. We start out the day we get our cards. We know that in several cases we will have to make more than one call, and we allow ourselves time for it. We have found from experience that it never pays to put it off.

Every prospect is different. We try to know something about our prospect before we see him, and to work out the most effective approach to him. This differs in many cases. Each person has his own interests, his own likes and dislikes. In some cases we have found it helpful to go with another solicitor.

We ask him to do the fair thing. Most people are fundamentally decent and want to do the right thing. They may not always understand the need or have the facts. We consider it our job to supply that to them.

The man who says he can't afford to give more. For many people, business conditions have improved since last year. Their incomes are greater. And the needs are greater. We try to reason it out, and have the man ask himself whether he really has sacrificed anything by his giving—whether he has lowered his standard of living because of his contribution—whether he has even given up any luxuries or comforts. And we find that very, very few people have. We try to point out the seriousness of this situation—and how great is the threat to everything he holds dear. And we ask him whether he can really afford not to increase.

The man who complains about taxes. We know that taxes are higher and will be still higher. We face it frankly. But we also know that net incomes are higher, after deducting taxes. We have found it very helpful to remind some persons that in England people are paying 50 percent of their incomes in taxes to fight the menace

that has already made slaves of the Jews of Europe—and we have found it very helpful also, to point out that despite these taxes the Jews of England are giving five times as much, proportionately, as American Jews for refugees and for Palestine.

We also have tried to point out that the Federal government permits deductions up to fifteen percent of incomes for charitable gifts, and that the net cost of the donor as a result is actually less than the gift made. We have found that many people don't use this opportunity fully.

The man who doesn't believe in some agency. We tell such a person that every agency in the fund has been carefully studied by the Budget Committee and is rendering a necessary service. We tell him that those agencies he may like particularly, others may not like. These balance off, and every agency is getting its fair share in proportion to its needs and service.

The man who doesn't believe the money can be used. We give him specific information on what actually is being done in Poland, in Germany, in Austria, in France, in Palestine, in Central and South America, in the United States.

We have found that there is no honest answer to these facts.

The man who wants to use the gifts of others as an excuse. We try to convince him that because one person may not give enough is no excuse for another to do the same. In our daily lives we don't pattern our actions after the worst citizens. There is no reason why we should use the worst giver as our example. We ought to do what is right, regardless of what others do. But if people look for examples—for every case of poor giving, we can point out several examples of very liberal giving.

There is no short cut. Successful solicitation requires careful, thorough work. As salesmen, we have found that we have to know our product, and take the time to sell it properly. But it is the greatest product in the world—the saving of innocent lives, and the preservation of our own democracy and right to live as decent, self-respecting citizens.

My dear Rabbi:

In further reference to my telephone conversation and according to the enclosed schedule of proposed taxes that I clipped from the New York Times it is my analysis that

- (a) An individual who has an income of \$10,000 will now pay taxes of \$1628
- (b) and an individual who has an income of \$15,000 will now pay taxes of

 Difference---\$1445

That means that on the additional \$5000 income the taxes will amount to \$1445 or about 30%. If a pledge is made of \$500 then the government is paying 30% and the tax payer is really only pledging \$350.

- (c) Now take the person who has an income of \$20,000. Under the new set-up the taxes will be \$4800
- (d) and an individual whose income is \$25,000 under the new set up his taxes will be

 \$6824

 Difference---\$2024

And since \$2024 is 40% of his \$5000 income the same token of reasoning the individual who pledges \$750 is really only paying 60% into the fund or \$450 and the government is paying the other 40%.

Or if an individual pledges \$1000 he really only pays \$600 and the government pays the other \$400.

Therefore Rabbi, the fact is that in most cases where individual's incomes are in excess of \$15000--and there are plenty of them among our people--whatever amount they pledge, they are really only paying from 35% to 60% of the amount--the government pays the difference of their pledge.







Dear Rabbi Silver:

In accordance with your suggestion to Mr. L. W. Neumark, we hereby submit our request for an allocation from the Jewish Welfare Fund of Cleveland. The money will be used solely for the purpose of self-defense in Palestine.

Our organization has recently received very urgent demands from the Irgun (National Military Organization of Palestine) stating that the reverses suffered by the British forces on the Near Eastern front are forcing them to withdraw most of their forces from Palestine to the Egyptian battle front. Palestine is thus dependent on its internal security only on the men and arms of the Jewish community.

The reports stated that following the Iraq example, Palestine Arabs might renew attacks on the Jews, only on a much larger scale than during the pre-war period of 1936-39.

The Irgum is the only force in Palestine that has demonstrated its ability to counteract Arab terrorism, and has in the past inflicted on them neavy losses. To a great extent, it is due to these acts that the Arabs in Palestine still hesitate and have not answered Iraq's call to join them in the revolt against Great Britain, and to start attacking the Jews.

The question of protecting Palestine against the nearing Axis forces may be solved only through the formation of a Jewish Army, and we have urged that ever since the outbreak of the war.

However, the internal security of the Jews is a totally different problem. Whether or not Palestine will be overrun by the Axis, there will be a transition period in which there will be little the British can do to prevent internal riots. We must even admit that from a British military point of view it is unimportant whether or not twenty or thirty thousands Jews will be killed through Arab attacks. At any rate, it has always been our opinion that self-defense is not only our right but our duty.

It may be worthwhile to recall here that in 1929 the Arab mayor of Jerusalem, one of the moderate Arab leaders, told Pierre Von Passon in an interview, that the Jewish problem in Palestine can be solved in two days - simply by massacring 75,000 Jews a day. The tens of thousands of Assyrians slaughtered by the Iraqis immediately after World War I is another example of what could be the fate of Palestine Jewry.

Fortunately, we are happy to state that ten years of very intensive work by the Irgun in Palestine has produced not only scores of trained men, but has also brought to Palestine considerable quantities of arms and ammunition of all sorts. There will, therefore, be a fight in Palestine if the Arabs start it. The results will depend on the amount of equipment the Irgun will be able to supply its soldiers.

To save Jewish lives in Palestine is, of course, a sacred duty. It will be a stain on the Jewish people the world over if our inability to equip Palestine Jewry for self-defense will be tragically demonstrated. For eleven years now, we have been stressing the primary importance of the military side of the Palestine scene. We succeeded to a certain extent, but failed to convince those in whose power it was to solve that problem.

This, Dr. Silver, is therefore a critical request at a very critical moment. We are now attempting to collect a large sum of money to be cabled immediately to Palestine for the purpose of acquiring more arms and ammunition. There is ample opportunity to acquire them from individual arabs in Palestine (who do it for good profit), and especially in Syria where the large French army has been demobilized and is in a chaotic condition.

With all due respect and appreciation for the purposes of the welfare fund of Cleveland, we feel justified in requesting most urgently an allocation of ten thousand dollars as an emergency measure, to be cabled directly to the Irgun, or, if you wish, to one of the well-known personalities in Palestine who is supporting it.

Your letter of May 2nd was submitted to the members of the Campaign Executive Committee for consideration, and they desire to point out to you that the Campaign organization has this year, as in other years, been interested in the suggestion to provide facilities for kosher service for the Campaign; this has however proved impractical, since the type of facilities required for the many meetings which we hold are nowhere available, and particularly not in the downtown area in which approximately 95% of our Campaign workers have their businesses and offices.

As you undoubtedly know, those who desire fish or vegetable plates instead of meat service at our luncheons and dinners, have at all times had such dishes served them; on the other hand, we have noted that there are not many who care for a fish diet and we are sure that you would not hold that such persons must eat fish against their will.

It has never been compulsory for anyone, not desiring to do so, to eat at the luncheons or dinners; in fact, realising that the service is, under no conditions kosher, such persons have eaten before the meal.

If at some future time, facilities of the proper kind should be made available in a downtown area, you may be assured that the Welfare Fund will give the matter serious consideration.

The Jewish Welfare Funds throughout the country have, from time to time, expressed their interest in seeing a coordination of activities in the field of defense, including the coordination of fund raising. For almost three years the Welfare Funds, as Jewish communities at large, have looked to the General Jewish Council of the American Jewish Committee, the American Jewish Congress, the Binai Birith and the Jewish Labor Committee to become the instrument of coordination.

The American Jewish Congress has been from the first, and remains one of the strongest proponents of the need for a coordinated policy in the field of activities for defense of the rights of Jews and in the field of securing the funds with which to carry out these activities. It has come to the regrettable conclusion, however, that the General Jewish Council has not been and cannot be the agency of coordination and that, in fact, by its inactivity the General Jewish Council has liquidated itself.

In accordance with that view the American Jewish Congress presented an extended memorandum, a copy of which is herewith enclosed, to a Plenary Session of the General Jewish Council held last Sunday. When, despite the agreement on the part of all the agencies involved, the General Jewish Council has been inactive, it refused to recognize this inactivity by formally dissolving itself, the American Jewish Congress withdrew its delegation.

The culminating act, in our judgment, in a long series of events expressive of the self-nullification of the General Jewish Council is the agreement between the American Jewish Committee and the B'nai B'rith for joint fund raising and coordination of activities. This is formal notice that this agreement supersedes the purposes of the General Jewish Council and it is formal notice of the acquiescence by the B'nai B'rith to the premises of the American Jewish Committee that its first allegiance is to its large contributors, some five hundred and fifty in all, whose prejudices against joint fund raising are responsible for the failure to reach any agreement for joint fund raising in which the American Jewish Committee, B'nai B'rith, American Jewish Congress and Jewish Labor Committee would be partners.

Dear Rabbi Silver:

Acknowledging your favor of April 15th, we want to say that we are grateful to you and the other members of your Committee for your readiness to include HIAS in your 1941 campaign. We also appreciate the fact that you have made an effort to give us an increase of \$500.00. Last year we were promised a similar increase but we received the same allocation as the previous year due to the fact that you did not raise your quota.

We, of course appreciate the local situation. However, we are at a disadvantage due to the fact that you base your support to HIAS on an unfavorable record established in 1932. You will find that for the year 1931 we received an allocation of \$6000.00, from your Welfare Fund. Surely you will agree with us that the activities of HIAS at present require a considerably greater budget than the one of 1931. For some reason you made a drastic decrease in 1932, from \$6000.00 to \$2,500.00. It might have been due to the deplorable economic condition of your community at the time. Ever since we have been receiving the same decreased allocation in spite of our continued efforts to make your Committee understand that we deserve considerably greater support because of our increased obligations. The worst thing in this case is not only the immediate loss but the repercussions your allocation to our cause has on other communities. Time and again we are told that if we are satisfied with an allocation of \$2500 from Cleveland we ought to be satisfied with whatever support certain other communities give us.

We respectfully appeal to you and your Committee to take into consideration the hardship thus created to our cause. HIAS cannot be satisfied with an allocation of \$3000 at this time from Cleveland, particularly in view of the ever-growing, desperate demands for our life-saving activities both here and in thirty countries throughout the world. It is our sincere hope that you will find it possible to give us a considerably increased allocation for this year. We should like to avoid launching an independent HIAS campaign in your city. But should we be forced to relieve your Welfare Fund of further responsibility in financing us, we would nevertheless wish to remain on the friendliest terms with it. We shall under all circumstances avoid any interference with your campaign efforts, except if necessary, to advise your community in general that HIAS will not participate in your Fund this year. We still hope for the best.

It was certainly good to hear from our Regional Director, Mr. H. M. Kaufman, that you have a fine conception of HIAS needs. We feel confident that you will present our recent communications in the proper light at your Budget Committee meeting. We look forward to hearing your final decision.

May we suggest that you and your Committee take into consideration the fact that our budgetary item for overseas needs for 1941 is considerably larger than the one for 1940. This item in itself commands better consideration from your Federation. I am inclined to believe that you will agree with us that not having given us even the compromise request of \$5000, your Committee should not have included the name of HIAS as one of its beneficiaries without our consent.

I want to add that since our recent correspondence with your Federation we were compelled to open a new branch in Kobe, Japan in order to establish a new avenue of escape for those of our helpless wanderers who can best make their way through Japan. This is our second branch in the Far East. We have maintained a branch in Shanghai, China for many years. Our branch in Lisbon, Portugal which has been instrumental in saving the lives of thousands, found it impossible to cope with the demands for its services and on May 2nd wired us for a special sum of \$30,000 for transportation of people who would lose their permits if they did not leave Portugal immediately. This request has of course been complied with, in spite of the fact that we are hard pressed for funds.

You can readily understand that the above two instances do not exhaust the continued demands for increased appropriations which we receive from our overseas branches.

As stated in previous correspondence we want to keep our friendly relations with your Federation. We hope that you will make it possible for us to do so.

We received your communication of April 14th, notifying us that our agency was grented an allotment of \$2000 for 1941. We had hoped that our friend, Mr. Weisberg, would be given an opportunity to bring before your Budget Committee our present budgetary requirements so that consideration would be given to our request for an increased amount of support from Cleveland. We are fully aware of the fact that the demands for foreign aid must be met, but we feel that this should not be done at the expense of our own institutions. We are engaged in a great life-saving effort and are dependent upon your assistance to make our service possible -- even as thousands of unfortunate men and women, afflicted with tuberculosis, are dependent upon us for assistance. For many years, those of us who are responsible for the care of the tuberculous have been concerned with the large number of persons entering our sanatoria who have received sanatorium care previously, and even several times. Economic conditions being what they are these days, many of these patients are forced to take employment which is too hard for them, with the result that they soon break down. For that reason we are now concentrating on a program which has for its objective the economic and secial rehabilitation of these sufferers. According to our records, your campaign takes place during this month and we should like to know whether it has already been held. We sincerely hope it has been a successful drive. We should appreciate receiving any literature published in connection with this campaign and also a list of the names and addresses of your Board and Budget Committee. Many thanks. Dear Doctor Silver:

Mr. Morris Waldman has forwarded to me your letter of April 16th. I really do not know how to answer it, for as you know I am also Treasurer of the United Jewish Appeal effort in New York, and you know how much of my time and services I give to it.

I realize full well that with inadequate sums of money, the only way you can give larger sums to the Joint Defense Appeal of the American Jewish Committee and Anti-Defamation League, would be to take it away from someone else, and I think that is unjust and unnecessary. I realize the dilemma you are in. It does occur to me, however, that defense work is a particularly different type of activity than any philanthropy we are engaged in. After all, it is really not a philanthropy at all.

Perhaps it would be best to omit the Joint Defense drive from your appeal altogether. It is obvious that we need \$2,000,000. It is equally obvious that we cannot get it from Welfere Funds, for understandable reasons. Furthermore, the needs of this Joint Appeal are temporary - it is \$2,000,000 this year - it may be \$200,000 next year, and it may be \$10,000,000 the next year. Of course, like you, I hope to God that we will need nothing, and you will agree with me that we cannot budget our needs with any accuracy or detail.

I have a feeling that probably the best thing to do would be for several leaders of this Joint Appeal to come to Cleveland and sit down with ten or twelve of your basic leadership to discuss this problem in toto. I know that men and women who have given generously (sometimes I feel that I don't know such a person) can be induced to give substantial sums to this type of effort without affecting in the slightest their giving to other causes.

I doubt whether any of us can discuss this with any real measure of satisfaction through the mail. If it meets with your approval and the approval of your colleagues, I should very much appreciate it if you would permit me to be part of a group of three or four men to come to Cleveland for a day's session, if need be, where we might not only discuss this problem, but place be-

My dear Mr. Goldhamer:

It was good to see you, if for only a moment, while I was in Cleveland the other day. As soon as I noticed how busy you were, I knew it was no time to go into detail regarding our program. Since your organization was so good as to contribute \$1,000.00 last fall and to include in your spring drive \$2,000.00 for the coming year, I wanted to keep you advised from time to time as to what is being done. I shall make it a point to call on you again the first time I am in Cleveland and have opportunity.

I am sure you will be glad to know that our program is developing satisfactorily to carry the spirit of goodwill between Jews and Christians into the educational program with children and young people where it will be most effective. I have always been of the opinion that the place to create goodwill is among the younger folks so they will grow up without religious prejudices. It is far easier to develop people without prejudices than it is to cure the prejudices after they have developed.

This summer we bring together at Camp Indianola the leaders of Youth activities of the churches from all over Ohio for a training conference for 16 days. We have engaged a Jewish rabbi to spend the entire 16 days with these Youth leaders to not only help create goodwill in their own minds and hearts but to coach them on going back to their respective counties to create goodwill among Youth there.

Similarly we had quite recently a meeting of the teachers of Weekday Schools of Religion throughout Ohio. The purpose was not only to train them in doing better teaching of Religion but to carry into their schools the spirit of goodwill between Jews and Christians and to train the children in their classes in that spirit.

We sincerely believe that as this program develops, and it should develop very significantly in the next few years, that it should be shot through and through with the spirit of Inter-religious goodwill and should be very definitely designed to cultivate that spirit in children and youth on a state-wide basis.

Dear Sir:

The Yiddish Culture Gezelshaft, (The Jewish Cultural Society) in which I am profoundly interested, was founded in 1929 by a group of Jews who appraised the great value of cultural life among those people who couldn't reach the vast treasuries of literature, art and song in any other language than the one they spoke, Yiddish.

When organized, they have enshrined the high principles of Jewish creativeness on state and literature, the fine traits which inspired us, Jews, in all lands and through all centuries of a living a life of "nomads", with no home where we could build our homes, our temples, and thus make our indispensable contribution to the peoples of all countries.

With this in view, we established the two institutions which merit recognition and support of the Jewish Welfare Board, the only agency in Cleveland which subsidizes accredited institutions such as ours.

Dramatic Studios which serve as a school for developing Jewish talents is only one part of our activities. But the Shelem Alaichim School brings our children into the orbit of our Jewish national life. Our curriculum embraces the subjects of Jewish language, Yiddish, Jewish history, the Bible, folk legends and every subject pertinent to the development of self respecting Jews to face life as free citizens.

Basing my appeal in behalf of the Yiddish Culture Gezelshaft on the above stated facts, I sincerely hope you will reason with me and decide to make an allocation which will help this institution to continue its service which I consider as indispensable to the life of tens of thousands of Jews in Cleveland. An allocation for one thousand dellars (\$1,000) is the amount needed without forcing the institution to cut down the necessary services in line with its program.

Let me hope that this request will be granted.

Silver The Temple Ansel & E. 105th Street Cleveland, Ohio Dear Rabbi Silver: In accordance with your suggestion to Mr. L. W. Neumark, we hereby submit our request for an allocation from the Jewish Welfare Fund of Cleveland. The money will be used solely for the pupose of self-defense in Palestine. Our organization has recently received very urgent demands from the Irgun (National Military Organization of Palestine) stating that the reverses suffered by the British forces on the Near Eastern front are forcing them to withdraw most of their forces from Palestine to the Egyptian battle front. Palestine is thus dependent on its internal security only on the men and arms of the Jewish community. The reports stated that following the Iraq example, Palestine Arabs might renew attacks on the Jews, only on a much larger scale than during the pro-war period of 1936-39. The Irgun is the only force in Palestine that has demonstrated its ability to counteract Arab terrorism, and has in the past inflicted on them heavy losses. To a great extent, it is due to these acts that the Arabs in Palestine still hesitate and have not answered Iraq's call to join them in the revolt against Great Britain, and to start attacking the Jows. The question of protecting Palestine against the nearing Axis forces may be solved only through the formation of a Jewish Army, and we have urged that ever since the outbreak of the war. However, the internal security of the Jews is a totally different problem. Whether or not Palestine will be overrun by the Axis, there will be a transition period in which there will be little the British can do to prevent internal riots. We must even admit that from a British military point of view it is unimportant whether or not twenty or thirty thousand Jews will be killed through Arab attacks. At any rate, it has always been our opinion that selfdefense is not only our right but our duty.

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It may be worthwhile to recall here that in 1929 the Arab mayor of Jerusalem, one of the moderate Arab leaders, told Pierre Von Passen in an interview, that the Jewish problem in Palestine can be solved in two days - simply by massacring 75,000 Jews a day. The tens of thousands of Assyrians slaughtered by the Iraqis immediately after World War I is another example of what could be the fate of Palestine Jewry.

Fortunately, we are happy to state that ten years of very intensive work by the Irgun in Palestine has produced not only scores of trained men, but has also brought to Palestine considerable quantities of arms and ammunition of all sorts. There will, therefore, be a fight in Palestine if the Arabs start it. The results will depend on the amount of equipment the Irgun will be able to supply its soldiers.

To save Jewish lives in Palestine is, of course, a sacred duty. It will be a stain on the Jewish people the world over if our inability to equip Palestine Jewry for self-defense will be tragically demonstrated. For eleven years now, we have been stressing the primary importance of the military side of the Palestine scene. We succeeded to a certain extent, but failed to convince those in whose power it was to solve that problem.

This, Dr. Silver, is therefore a critical request at a very critical moment. We are now attempting to collect a large sum of money to be cabled immediately to Palestine for the purpose of acquiring more arms and ammunition. There is ample opportunity to acquire them from individual Arabs in Palestine (who do it for good profit), and especially in Syria where the large French army has been demobilized and is in a chaotic condition.

With all due respect and appreciation for the purposes of the welfare fund of Cleveland, we feel justified in requesting most urgently an allocation of ten thousand dollars as an emergency measure, to be cabled directly to the Irgun, or, if you wish, to one of the well-known personalities in Palestine who is supporting it.

"Give us the tools, and we will do the job."

On behalf of the Jewish Occupational Council, we wish to apply to the Jewish Welfare Federation, Inc., of Cleveland, Ohio, for a \$300 allocation to support our work in 1941. The enclosed statement, together with this letter, form the basis for our application.

The Jewish Occupational Council is organized to assist all local communities and national organizations who are working to improve the economic adjustment of Jewish youth and adults. Without duplicating the activities of any other agency, the Council aims, through advisory, coordinative, clearance and research services, to strengthen the effectiveness of all organized efforts in the field of vocational guidance, job placement, training and occupational research.

The rapid expansion of vocational agencies for Jewish communities during the past ten years has been the direct result of widespread unemployment and the imposition of discriminatory barriers against the entry of Jews into certain occupations. Because public and non-sectarin private agencies were not equipped to deal with these problems, extra efforts were necessary in order to enable Jews to compete equally in thelabor market. A dozen national agencies offer speakers, pamphlets, vocational clinics, conferences and advice to local groups and individuals. As a partial result of national agency programs, local offices for placement and vocational guidance have been set up in approximately twenty Jewish communities throughout the United States and Canada.

In recent months, the current employment expansion resulting from the defense program has given rise to new problems. It is essential that groups and communities engaged in Jewish economic adjustment services be kept thoroughly informed of rapidly moving developments and that they be assisted in organizing programs to meet the new emergencies. In addition to immediate considerations, there is also a need for long-range planning to meet the problems arising for minorities as an aftermath to the defense program.

The Jewish Occupational Council was organized in March, 1939, to serve these functions. The independent and sometimes conflicting activities of these many groups required a central agency to coordinate their work, to eliminate duplication, and to conduct the necessary research to insure the soundness of all efforts. The new challenges to vocational adjustment arising out of the defense program need theleadership of an agency like the Jewish Occupational Council.

The attached statement contains specific reference to the organization, objectives, membership, activities, and finances of the Council.

For the past two years, the Council has been financed primarily by a grant from the New York Foundation. This foundation support was intended only to launch the organization and is being reduced in accordance with the terms of the original grant. The Jewish Occupational Council is now seeking financial support directly from Jewish communities and from national organizations throughout the country. The problems of Jewish occupational adjustment affect the entire community and the activities of the Council in this field necessarily have a positive effect upon all who are working to better the economic position of Jews.

It is therefore our conviction that organized Jewish communities should individually be able to allocate sums that would not be burdensome to them and that you would, in the aggregate, defray a portion of the Council's expenses. As you will observe, the budgetary requirements of the Council are quite modest and, rather than undertake a costly, independent fund-raising campaign, it has seemed to us reasonable and wise to turn to established wolfare funds for further assistance.

. We would be most appreciative if you would advise us at your carliest convenience of the action of your Board of Directors with respect to this application.

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Organization Responding to the long felt need for the coordination and strengthening of Jewish vocational activities, the Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds and the Conference on Jewish Relations called a Conference on Vocational Adjustment Policies and Problems in May, 1938. It was agreed at this conference, in which various interested national organizations and a number of well known economists participated, that coordination was an immediate necessity. Practical form was given to the findings of the conference by the organization of the Jewish Occupational Council in March, 1939. In June, 1939, Professor Albert Abrahamson of Bowdoin College was appointed Executive Director. Early in June, 1940, Professor Abrahamson returned to his college position and Eli E. Cohen was appointed Executive Director late in September, 1940.

Objectives According to its by-laws, the objectives of the JOC are three fold:

- To act as a clearing house for all national and local Jewish organizations engaged in occupational research, vocational guidance, placement and training.
- 2. To provide these agencies with occupational information and to cooperate with them in research and publication projects.
- To guide Jewish communities or organizations that may request assistance in establishing or improving occupational services.

We write to acknowledge your communication informing us that the tentative allocation to the American Jewish Congress is the same as for the year 1940 and will, in all probability, be in the amount of \$4,000. It is a source of regret to know that it has not been possible for you to make larger allocations owing to the failure to secure the larger funds required from your community.

May we call your attention to the fact that since our formal application was submitted, an additional request was sent to the Jewish WelfareFund for an appropriation in the amount of \$2,500 to finance the work of the Institute for Jewish Contemporary and Post-War Affairs. I am taking the liberty of sending you a copy of the blueprint covering this important work and to express the hope that despite local conditions, it may be possible for you to make a special appropriation to the Institute in view of the vital importance of its work.

In your postscript you mention your hope that the General Jewish Council may this year provide some type of information that will enable the local committee to deal more intelligently with allocations. As you know, the General Jewish Council has liquidated itself by its inaction, and the American Jewish Congress has withdrawn in recognition of that self-liquidation. One of the factors leading to the self-liquidation of the General Jewish Council was its failure to arrive at an agreement whereby there might be coordination in the matter of fund raising.

I have just concluded a series of meetings with Mrs. Charles Auerbach. In behalf of the Zionist Council for Youth, Mrs. Auerbach has asked me what assistance, financial and otherwise, she might expect from the Jewish Young Adult Bureau for Zionist youth work. She told me of her conversation with you and of your feeling that this work was a proper function of the Jewish Young Adult Bureau. I need not tell you how highly gratified I am for your support of this work.

One of the very first activities that the Jewish Young Adult Bureau sponsored when it was established in the fall of 1939, was the Zionist Study Group which brought together members of various Zionist youth organizations not only for the purpose of adding to their knowledge of Zionism but to help in the process of developing an informed leadership within these groups. Since that time I have worked as closely as time would permit with the Zionist youth organizations helping them with their various problems and seeking to spread their influence in the youth community. However, with our present resources, it will be impossible for us to continue this work, let alone expand it in the areas contemplated by the Zionist Council for Youth.

There seems to be an impression that the Jewish Young Adult Bureau budget submitted to the Welfare Fund last February was entirely for work with refugees. This is a misunderstanding undoubtedly resulting from the special, separate request we made in December, 1940 for refugee work. Our present budgetary request contemplates increasing our staff by one professional worker who would devote much of his time to carrying on the work of adjustment of newcomers, but whose major responsibility would be to work with the young adult organizations and youth in the community towards the end that the positive aspects of their Jewish consciousness might be advanced. In this connection I have been meeting with Dr. Eisenberg, of the Bureau of Jewish Education,

To the Jewish Community of Cleveland:

The Jewish Welfare Fund Committee with the approval of the Board of Trustees of the Jewish Welfare Federation has just selected the personnel of Campaign Officers for the 1941 Welfare Fund Appeal.

The Cleveland Jewish Welfare Fund desires to clarify the situation which has resulted from the decision of the Agencies heretofore participating in the United Jewish Appeal not to conduct a unified national campaign during 1941. The Agencies affected by this decision are the Joint Distribution Committee, conducting relief and transportation service for dispossessed Jews leaving the occupied and other areas of the conflict in Europe; the United Palestine Appeal, carrying on the resettlement of refugees in Palestine and the program for the upbuilding of the Jewish National Homeland; and the National Refugee Service, maintaining a general advisory service and assistance to persons in this country planning to bring relatives from Europe as well as relief and counsel to refugees already here who are in need.

In Cleveland, the Jewish Welfare Fund has in the past included these Agencies among the many which now participate in the Fund. Through the Welfare Fund Appeal it has been possible not alone to meet in a generous manner Cleveland's share and obligation in the support of all of these Causes, but to represent for the local community of givers the fine benefits of a single contribution for nearly one hundred Jewish Agencies and Causes which do not come within the scope of the Community Fund for support.

The dissolution of the United Jewish Appeal will in no wise affect the operation and administration of the Welfare Fund in Cleveland or elsewhere. There will still be only one Fund and we shall still have only one campaign.

The individual applications of The Joint Distribution Committee, the United Palestine Appeal and the National Refugee Service will in due course be considered by the Budget Committee of your Fund, along with all other applications. They will be carefully analyzed, and allocations will then be made to each on the basis of justice and fairness, which, we believe, will be approved by the thousands who contribute to the Fund.

There need, therefore, be no concern in our community about the future of our Welfare Fund, or about continued unity and harmony among us in our efforts to provide for the manifold pressing needs of our people, locally, nationally, and internationally, in which service Cleveland has achieved such commendable distinction.

We are happy to inform you that the United Jewish Appeal, which functioned as the common fund-raising instrument for the Joint Distribution Committee, the United Palestine Appeal and the National Refugee Service, has been re-established for 1941.

In coming to this decision, despite several months of independent campaign activities, these agencies were moved by the overwhelming desire of American Jewry to retain a union of forces in this critical period and in order to provide more effectively for the needs of our suffering people in Europe, the upbuilding of the Jewish homeland in Palestine, and the refugees in the United States. Recognizing that the support which they receive is dependent entirely on the good will and sympathy of the Jewish communities of America, the Joint Distribution Committee and the United Palestine Appeal, after reviewing the various factors which constituted their original differences, have come to a satisfactory agreement which will permit the continuation of the United Jewish Appeal for 1941.

We know that this news will be heartily welcomed by you as it has been by Jews throughout the country. The harmony which has been re-established will contribute, we are confident, to the success of our coming Jewish Welfare Fund campaign in Cleveland and of campaigns throughout the United States. We call upon the thousands of friends of our Jewish Welfare Fund to rally enthusiastically to the 1941 campaign, intensive preparations for which are now going on.
