# ANNOUNCEMENT

OBERT MARION LA FOLLETTE has a hold upon the interest and confidence of the American people enjoyed by few men in public life. It is not due to chance or favor. It is personal to the man. It is an expression of trust which comes from the ordeal of service. It followed his long fight of fifteen years in Wisconsin. In all America there is no stronger man upon the platform than Mr. La Follette. He has spoken upon Representative Government hundreds of times. Again and again he has addressed the same audiences upon the same subject. The principles are as old as the struggle for liberty. The reasoning is the same. But the address is always fresh with the vital facts of the present hour and full of human interest, which centers about the men who are in the thick of the great fight for government by the people

Eloquence has for its highest object the trimph of principle, of justice, of right. Earnestness born of a deep conviction in the everlasting rightenishess of the cause presented is the basis of Mr. La Follette's command-

### LA FOLLETTE OF WISCONSIN

Extracts from Character Sketch by Emerson Hough

MERICA needs a man. Never in all her history so much as now has she needed a man. Within twenty-five years this need will be more imperative. This sounds like sensationalism. It will sound less so twenty-five years from now. Assuredly the people of America will demand Magna Charta back again. Assuredly there will arise for them the man they need, whether he be governor, senator, president, is of no consequence. He may be greater than either or all.

What about La Follette of Wisconsin, a fighter with the soldier left out, a man who knows American life from the bottom round of the ladder up. He is a man without a party behind him. He has a state behind him instead of a party. He has more than a state behind him, and more than a place on the sidetrack of the United States Senate.

A marvel of concentration and continuity of purpose, he has never been driven away from his idea.

"This is a republic. The people are the masters, not the slaves."

That is the La Follette idea. That is the Wisconsin idea—that the voter is the actual boss.

The Wisconsin idea is that of the truthful printed page and the logical public speech. Its purpose is an educated voter; its intent is to put the power in the hands of the intelligent and educated voter. That is American-There is much hope in that idea. Perhaps that idea may preserve Magna Charta for the American people. Under this idea Theodore Roosevelt and Robert M. La Follette are brothers, twin brothers. Roosevelt, let

us hope, is not a Republican but a democrat in the true sense, as he personally insists he is.

La Follette is not a Republican, but a democrat. Moreover, he has been building an intelligent democracy. He has been making public the truth regarding government and misgovernment. For him, or for some one else, if he shall prove indifferent or faithless, there is growing a party of actual democracy, a party of popular intelligence and resolution. At present Robert M. La Follette is the leader of that party.

The La Follette idea and La Follette himself are before the public. The question is simply, who is the man and what is he? He is not a socialist, not an anarchist, simply an American, simply a man, who remembers that under our pledge to ourselves and to the world we are a Republic, and must always remain so

\* \* \* \*

Is La Follette a politician? Yes, a good one. Is he honest? Ask those who have fought with him. Is he in earnest? Ask his friends. Is he a game fighter? Ask his enemies. La Follette has never quit a fight. He has never taken the weaker part. He has never been bought.

\* \* \* \*

Understanding and sympathy, an actual knowledge of his people, a sincere conviction, a tremendous concentration of purpose, a clean personal life, these things are so much greater than the common arrogant power that goes with money in politics, that the progress of La Follette has been a thing foregone and assured. The man is sincere. He is real. His ambition is not a personal ambition, but a great purpose. It is something bigger and better. It is manhood. It is bigness.

His eyes are blue or blue-gray—the best fighting eye in the world. The La Follette jaw fits the rest of his face. His chin and mouth are those of the speaker. As to the expression of this face, worn by twenty-five years of uphill fighting, what shall I call it? They say he has the face of a Jesuit. Yes, it is the face of Lellemand, Jesuit burned at the stake for his convictions and smiling in the flames.

\* \* \* \*

Physically, he is as hard as nails, his eye bright and keen, his nervous vigor so tremendous that he will wear out man after man in a long session of work. He is the most Japanese-like, the most scientific fighter in politics today, and the one with the least of the grandstand about him. He looks upon himself simply as a machine for the accomplishment of ideas, of ideas which we will not call ambitions, but purposes.

\* \* \* \*

In or out of office, in the Senate or afterwards, in yet higher office or otherwise, La Follette of Wisconsin is too great and game and good a man not to hold a place of leadership in this struggle for fundamental democracy. His idea of teaching the people the truth, and then of leaving the issue with the people is too sane and too sound and revolutionary an idea not to attain ultimate triumph.

## COMMENT

In his political addresses Mr. La Follette quotes no poetry, uses no figures of speech, labors for no climaxes tells no stories, indulges in no humor. Familiar with all the masterpieces of literature, and a lecturer on Shakespeare, he never refers to them in his political addresses. He takes the dryest subjects-transportation, taxation, and legislative records, and holds the rapt attention of farmers, laborers, merchants, and professional men. If there is any climax in his impassioned addresses, it is when he mentions the public official who neglects or refuses to do his duty. He has no carefully wrought out exordium or peroration. His opening is rather in the nature of a courteous greeting, merging quickly into the dignified earnestness of his argument. After the first half dozen sentences his voice, rich and varied in quality, becomes clarion, resonant, yet musical and far-reaching. In grace of manner and action, and in dignity and ease on the platform, he satisfies the most critical, yet all in his audience are intent rather on the ability and earnestness of the orator.-William Kittle, in The Arena.

Mr. La Follette's speech in the United States Senate on the Railroad Rate Law was by far the ablest, most comprehensive, and most authoritative discussion of that subject that has ever been made in either house of Congress.—The Philadelphia North American.

La Follette has builded his genius and his personality into every "beam and pillar" of our government in Wisconsin. These reforms are the labor of his hands. We point to the most perfect system of constructive legislation written on the books of any state in the Union. The Wisconsin idea—the restoration of government to the people—is today an uplifting force under every commonwealth in this Republic.

No propaganda was ever announced in his career which has

not been justified by the course of events, and today in Wisconsin no man asks the repeal of a letter of the laws written upon the books through his labor and genius. We have never marched to Moscow, have never struck our colors, and we have never sounded a retreat. \* \*

I have seen him in the fray, with jaw set, his eyes blazing, his whole figure instinct with indomitable energy for the justice of his cause. Man of battle, unparalleled in the history of American politics, fighting the cause of the common people, his sword ringing upon the armor of his enemies, neither asking nor giving quarter. He will live in memory as the most splendid type of fighting citizen which this generation has given to the Republic.—Extract from the speech of H. F. Cochems, presenting La Follette as Wisconsin's candidate for the Presidential nomination, National Convention, Chicago, June, 1908.

In the battle of popular rights against reaction, class rule and the dominance of privilege, through the money-controlled machine, Senator La Follette stands squarely with the people and against the self-seeking enemies of popular government. 

### DENOUNCED AS FOES OF THEIR COUNTRY.

Wheeling, W. Va., March 6.—Denouncing the senators who filibustered the armed neutrality bill to its death as "enemies of their country," and calling Senator Robert M. LaFollette a leader of "traitors," citizens of Wheeling, assembled in mass meeting last night, took steps to prevent LaFollette coming here to deliver a lecture next Thursday evening. The lecture, the subject of which was "Undermining Democracy," was to have been delivered in the Koff Street temple. Rabbi A. H. Silver, pastor of the temple, declared:

"I pray to God that man cannot come here."

A resolution bitterly scoring LaFollette and his followers for opposing the bill, and demanding that the lecture engagement be immediately canceled, was passed unanimously. One copy was forwarded to Senator LaFollette and another copy, with telegrams of praise, was sent to President Wilson.

We would also like to get from you the names of eight or ten leading citizens of Wheeling who participated in the mass meeting at which those resolutions purport to have been adopted and who assented to them and who would be willing to give deposition, if necessary, with reference to the facts of the resolutions having been adopted and sent to both the President and Senator LaFollette.

We would also thank you to advise us how many people, approximately, were present at that mass meeting.

We would also thank you to let us know the name of a court commissioner or judge before whom depositions could be taken if it becomes necessary to do so.

We trust that you will co-operate with us in getting to us this information, which is to become important in this suit which we believe is of nation-wide significance.

Will you please tell us whether or not Senator LaFollette had a speaking engagement there March 8th or at any other date and whether the same was cancelled?
