WORLD OF SLAVES

Darre

A new aristocracy of German masters (Herrenvolk) will be created. This aristocracy will have slaves.

A NAZI PEACE ...

Darre

Our future generations must even in peace time be educated in such a manner that in case of necessity they may be fit to defend strongly and energetically what we acquired. Here, too, the form of slavery mentioned above will prove its worth. German masters will be fine pillars to uphold Germany's rule of the world.

Hitler

Without power over Europe, we must perish. Germany is Europe. We must have Europe and its colonies. Europe is for us. Whoever conquers it will press his seal on the coming age. We are the chosen. . . .

If ever there is a place where democracy is senseless and suicidal, it is in South America. We must strengthen these people's clear conscience. They are actually ashamed of their good instincts! We must send our people out to them. For this we have no need of formal officials and governors. Audacious youth is what we want. Our youth must learn to colonize. . . .

The American people is not yet a nation in the ethnographical sense. It is a conglomerate of disparate elements. But it is the raw material of a nation. The German component of the American people will be the source of its political and mental resurrection.

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NO PEACE AT ALL...

Wendell L. Willkie

"It makes a vital difference to the United States which side prevails in the present conflict. I refute the statement that our national security is not involved in a British defeat. . . .

The hope for democracy is the victory of those powers which believe in our way of life... and the rebirth of the confidence of men in one another.

(Jan. 13, 1941)

A prospect of a future surrounded by Totalitarian powers; threatened by dictators whose real desire is for conquest; loaded with armaments and debts and fixed with a declining standard of life—such a future is not a future for Americans as we have known them.

We must lay the moral, intellectual and spiritual foundations for the kind of world we want our children to inherit. It must be an open world. It must be a world in which Americans will share with other nations the responsibilities—and the great prospect—of peace.

(Statement to Senate Foreign Relations Committee on Lease-Lend Bill)

We know now that a nation can have peace with the Nazis only at the price of total surrender.

Such a dictated peace would be no peace at all. It would be another armistice leading to the most gigantic armament race and the most devastating trade wars in all history.

The third is freedom from want, which transplanted into world terms means economic understandings which will secure to every nation a healthy peace time life for its inhabitants—everywhere in the world. (77th Congress)

EMPLOYERS' "GREATEST GIFT"

Robert Ley, Labor Front Fuehrer

The National Socialist government has given the workers back to the employers—the greatest gift the employers can receive.

(speaking at Kiel, July 14, 1937.)

OFFICIAL DECREES

- 1. Sec. 2 (1) The trustees of labor are to regulate the conditions for the conclusion of legally binding labor contracts, instead of labor unions, individual employers or associations of employers.

 (May 19, 1933)
- 2. Sec. 18 (1) For large economic districts, whose limits are defined by the Reich Minister of Labor in cooperation with the Reich Minister of Economics and the Reich Minister of Interior, trustees of labor are to be appointed. They are Reich officials (Civil Servants) and subject to the supervision of the Reich Minister of Labor.

(January 20, 1934)

- 3. Sec. 36 (1) Violation of social duties . . . is to be punished as an offense against social honor. An offense of this sort exists if . . .
 - (2) Workers imperil labor peace in the enterprise through malicious agitation . . .

(January 20, 1934)

4. Sec. 2 (2) Workers and clerks, following the date fixed by the Reich Minister of Labor, may not be employed unless they possess a work book . . . to be made out by the Labor Offices.

(Februray 26, 1934)

5. Sec. 1 The President of the Employment Board alone has the right to regulate the distribution and particularly the exchange of workers.

(August 10, 1934)

6. Sec. 1 (2) All young Germans of both sexes are obligated to serve their people in the Reich Labor Service.

Sec. 3 (2) The Labor Service affects persons between 18 and 25 years of age.

(June 26, 1936)

7. Sec. 1 (1) Works managers, workers, clerks, apprentices, volunteers and assistants may not give notice of termination of employment, unless the Labor Office has consented to the dissolution of the work contract.

(September 1, 1939)

"WE MAKE OUR CHOICE"

William Green, President of the American Federation of Labor

Highlights From Wagner Act

It is hereby declared to be the policy of the United States to eliminate the causes of certain substantial obstructions when they have occurred by encouraging the practice and procedure of collective bargaining and by protecting the exercise by workers of full freedom of association, self-organization, and designation of representatives of their own choosing, for the purpose of negotiating the terms and conditions of their employment or other mutual aid or protection.

(Sec. 7)

Employees shall have the right to self-organization, to form, join, or assist labor organizations, to bargain collectively through representatives of their own choosing, and to engage in concerted activities, for the purpose of collective bargaining or other mutual aid or protection.

(Sec. 8)

It shall be an unfair labor practice for an employer—

- 1. To interfere with, restrain, or coerce employees in the exercise of the rights guaranteed in section 7.
- 2. To dominate or interfere with the formation or administration of any labor organization or contribute financial or other support to it;
- 3. To discharge or otherwise discriminate against an employee

because he has filed charges or given testimony under this Act.

4. To refuse to bargain collectively with the representatives of his employees.

In any investigation, the Board shall provide for an appropriate hearing upon due notice, either in conjunction with a proceeding under section 10 or otherwise, and may take a secret ballot of employees, or utilize any other suitable method to ascertain such representatives.

Prevention Of Unfair Practices Limitations

(Sec. 10) (a) The Board is empowered, as hereinafter provided, to prevent any person from engaging in any unfair labor practice (listed in sections 8) affecting commerce.

Sec. 13 Nothing in this Act shall be construed so as to interfere with or impede or diminish in any way the right to strike.

William Green

We believe in America, we believe in the freedom we enjoy here, freedom of speech, freedom of press, the right to worship in accordance with the dictates of conscience, and free assemblage. These are our cardinal principles of freedom that belong only to a democracy. We will guard them with our organization and will guard with our lives if necessary.

We stand with the Congress of the United States, we stand with those who are administering the affairs of the nation in the extension of all material and moral aid to Great Britain, and we pray that Great Britain will win this

conflict with Totalitarian countries.

OUR FRIENDS...

Hitler

When I wage war, I shall long have had relations with the men who will form a new government (in the enemy country), a government to suit me. We shall find such men, we shall find them in every country. We shall not need to bribe them. They will come of their own accord. Ambition and delusion, party squabbles and self-seeking arrogance will drive them. Peace will be negotiated.

Our strategy is to destroy the enemy from within. I shall never start a war without the certainty that a demoralized enemy will succumb to the first struggle of a single, gigantic attack.

As in France and other countries, also in the U.S., we have many of our compatriots and even more friends among the citizens of the U.S. who are favorably disposed toward us and will not permit public opinion to allow something as senseless and insane as war against Germany — Germany which in a few months gained possession of two continents . . .

We have in the U. S. a political organization with the same exactitude as Berlin or Prague and we have no fear of any activities on the part of the U. S.

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PROMOTE INTOLERANCE...

Dies Committee

The Bund is an "absolutely militarized organization patterned after the ruthlessly efficient, military setup which characterized Hitler's machine in Germany." This was revealed by the official confidential manual of the German-American Bund, made public recently by the Dies Committee. The Manual states that the Bund demands of its Storm Troop members absolute "loyalty which comes before everything else and extends to the minutest details of the Storm Troopers' lives."

Roosevelt

Let us no longer blind ourselves to the undeniable fact that forces which have crushed and undermined and corrupted so many others are already within our own gates.

Their secret emissaries are active in our own and neighboring countries. They seek to stir up suspicion and dissension, to cause internal strife. They are active in every group that promotes intolerance.

These trouble-breeders have but one purpose. It is to divide our people, to divide them into hostile groups and to destroy our unity and shatter our will to defend ourselves.

There are also American citizens, many of them in high places, who are aiding and abetting the work of these agents.

Your government knows much about them and every day is ferreting them out.

AMERICA

"Demoralized . . Corrupted"

Darre

You have been asking about my opinion of America, especially the U. S., and the danger of this pseudo-democratic republic's possible attempts to hinder us in our historic development. There is no fear that this demoralized country will mix in this German war. . . .

The U. S. also will be forced by Germany to complete and final capitulation. Our superior industrial production will be sold at very low prices to the whole world and will cause the United States to have not 7,000,000 but 30,000,000 unemployed.

Mr. Rosefeld (referring to President Roosevelt) will then beg the Fuehrer on his kness to purchase from the U.S. not manufactured products but raw materials at prices which we will dictate.

The United States is at present so demoralized and so corrupted that, like France and England, it need not be taken into consideration as a military adversary.

The only purpose of our offensive against the United States is to forever get rid of another bulwark of plutocracy, to regain what belongs to us, to establish order, to proportionately distribute property and to teach America to respect Germany.

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"Great Arsenal of Democracy"

Roosevelt

There are those who say that the Axis Powers would never have any desire to attack the Western Hemisphere. That is the same dangerous form of wishful thinking which has destroyed the powers of resistance of so many conquered peoples.

The vast resources and wealth of this American Hemisphere constitute the most tempting loot in all of the round world. No nation can appease the Nazis. No man can tame a tiger into a kitten by stroking it. . . .

I have the profound conviction that the American people are now determined to put forth a mightier effort than they have ever yet made. As President of the United States, I call for that national effort. We must be the great arsenal of democracy.

(Fireside Chat)

The time is near when they, "The British and their allies," will not be able to pay in ready cash. We cannot and we will not tell them that they must surrender merely because of present inability to pay for the weapons which we know they must have. The world order which we seek is the cooperation of free countries, working together in a free, civilized society....

The fourth is freedom from fear, which translated into world terms means a world-wide reduction of armament to such a point and in such a thorough fashion that no nation will be in a position to commit an act of physical aggression against any neighbor—anywhere in the world.

FREEDOM SHALL PREVAIL

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The League for Human Rights, Freedom and Democracy, as part of the labor movement, has been engaged in an uncompromising struggle against the dictator states and their agents abroad for years before the outbreak of the war.

Organized Labor realized from the very beginning, long before the conflict reached its present climactic intensity, the terrible implications of the dictator states for the welfare of

humanity.

Their suppression of civil liberties, priceless heritage of centuries of struggle against earlier tyrannies; their destruction of democratic processes of government; their liquidation of all voluntary associations, from trade unions through church organizations and cultural and social groupings; their ruthless suppression of minorities of faith, race and opinion—these inhumanities have spread a chill of horror among the civilized peoples of the world.

Their major instrument has been anti-semitism, anti-catholicism and a general offensive against the existence of all established faiths; their major goal, slavery for the toiling

masses.

Through denunciation, demonstration, boycott, through every means at our disposal, labor has called upon the free peoples of the world to unite for effective action while time and the relative weakness of the dictators permitted.

Today, the League, together with the rest of the labor movement, gives its full support to our own democratic institutions, and to the remaining free peoples of the world in the profound

conviction that freedom shall prevail upon the earth.

We fight for: Freedom of Expression and Association; Freedom of Faith; Freedom from Fear and Freedom from Want—for all peoples everywhere in the world.
