Ileveland Statue Lincoln Status We are assembled today to dedicate a monument With the passing of the years the name of Lincoln has waxed in splendor. Legends have clustered around him - and legends are a people's sincerest tributes of love.

Lincoln has always made a particular appeal to the children of our nation. His life, his struggles, his honesty, his whimsical humor, his great loving heart have stirred the imagination of American boys and girls and have inspired among them deep reverence and the greatest affection.

It is therefore as beautiful as it is appropriate that this memorial statue of Abraham Lincoln which we are unveiling today and which is to adorn our city, is the gift of our school children.

No American is so well known the world over as Abraham Lincoln. His name is sweet upon the lips of the lowliest and the most distant people of the earth. They love to hear his story and to repeat it to their children.

For Lincoln is the epic of the common man. He shared to our weaknesses and our failures. His personality evolved through many inner and outer impediments. He carved his way through a channel of poverty, ignorance and back-woodsmen's superstitions to the open spaces of a magnificently rich and effective manhood. He suffered much. He knew the pain of love and loss. He was slandered and denounced in the dark days of war and defeat. He was martyred in the day of his triumph.

The prophet dies but his vision lives on and today a grateful people blesses his memory. Today also, we of the City of Cleveland are dedicating a monument to him as a symbol of our love and of our faith in his faith.

It is appropriate that this statue of Abraham Lincoln should stand in front of the Administrative Building of the Board of Education.

No one struggled so valiantly for education as Abraham Lincoln. No one reached out so eagerly in that primitive and lonely world of the pioneer as he did, and no one knew how to blend knowledge with wisdom and intellect with compassion as completely as he.

Here let his monument stand, stemming the tide of years.

The streams of life will sweep around its base. Generations will come and go. But here Lincoln will stand among his people, a wise kinsman and friend, and his lips will proclaim to each generation the faith which never grows old.
