My dear Rabbi Silver:

The enclosed letter from President Roosevelt to Mr. Newton D. Baker recognizes the essential place of voluntary welfare services in the national program for recovery. Mr. Baker's acceptance of the chairmanship of the 1934 Mobilization for Human Needs and Mrs. Roosevelt's acceptance of the chairmanship of the National Women's Committee are additional proof that the private welfare organizations are indispensable for national welfare. Thirty-four leading national organizations are cooperating with Community Chests and Councils, Inc., which directs and administers the Mobilization. As President of this association may I ask you to serve as a member of the National Citizens Committee of the Mobilization under Mr. Baker as chairman, and thereby strengthen and encourage the preeminent leadership that has already volunteered?

The President's, Mrs. Roosevelt's and Mr. Baker's participation indicates that social welfare services require this year the strongest possible influences and support in order to maintain their essential contributions to our American civilization. The provisions of billions of government funds for material relief does not diminish but emphasizes the need for hospitals, nursing, child welfare, family care, and guidance and occupation of youth.

The fact is that one-half of the millions of unemployed receive no material relief and depend especially on the other social services upheld by the National Mobilization. In addition the billions spent for food, clothing and shelter mean only \$24 per month per family for those on relief and leave other essential human needs unmet. The Mobilization does not raise money but provides information and impetus drawn from the whole nation - to back up the local workers that must secure the contributions for those indispensable human services other

than relief. Due to the President's request we are assured of all the great national channels of publicity, radio, press, advertising and platform. The funds for utilization of these facilities are provided by the communities themselves. You are asked to help furnish adequate auspices and leadership for the messages of increased and imperative need.

There will be only one meeting of the Committee and that in connection with the National Mobilization Conference to be held at Washington on September 28th and 29th. The President has invited the Conference for its first session at the White House.

May we not have your acceptance on this national committee?



My dear Rabbi Silver:

Mr. Gerard Swope, President of the General Electric Company, has accepted the chairmanship of the 1935 Mobilization for Human Needs. He succeeds Mr. Newton D. Baker at Mr. Baker's request and the latter's insistence that he himself be relieved of the chairmanship after three years of distinguished and effective leadership. Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt has accepted the chairmanship of the National Women's Committee of the Mobilization. Thirty-four leading national welfare organizations are cooperating with Community Chests and Councils, Inc., which directs and administers the Mobilization. As President of this association, may I ask you to serve as a member of the National Citizens Committee under Mr. Swope as chairman, and thereby support and strengthen the able leadership that has already been enlisted.

The more government participates in welfare activities, the more need that this participation be leavened and stimulated by the personal, individualized services of private organizations. The fact is that as local and national governments have added billion to billion for material relief they have had to decrease absolutely or relatively their expenditures for other human needs. Since 1929 public expenditures for recreation have been cut 40 per cent; government nursing services have decreased 15 per cent, while free private nursing has increased 20 per cent. In the face of a vastly enlarged demand for free hospitalization, government hospitals have increased this service 19per cent; voluntary hospitals 56 per cent.

The Mobilization does not raise money but provides information and impetus - drawn from the whole nation - to back up the local workers who must secure the contributions for those indispensable human services required in their own communities. We are assured of all the great national channels of publicity - radio,

press, advertising and platform. The expense funds for the utilization of these facilities are already provided by the very communities which must themselves finance their own good neighborly services.

There will be only one meeting of the Citizens Committee and that in connection with the National Mobilization Conference to be held at Washington on September 27 and 28. The President has invited the Conference to hold its first session at the White House.

May we not have your acceptance of membership on this National Committee? The publication of your membership in this committee will add to the impressiveness of the wide-spread interest throughout the nation in the 1935 Mobilization for Human Needs.

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PROGRAM PROSPECTUS 1936 MOBILIZATION FOR HUMAN NEEDS WASHINGTON CONFERENCE SEPTEMBER 17 & 1.8

Owing to the earlier Conference date which it was necessary to take, definite acceptance has not yet been received from several speakers. It is impossible, therefore, to enclose a complete program with this invitation.

The final program will be sent you on receipt of your acceptance to this invitation to the Conference. Its particular features will include:

Corporation Contributions - This will be an unusual feature. Mr. Gerard Swope as Chairman of the Mobilization and Mr. Donaldson Brown, Chairman of the Finance Committee of General Motors Corporation, who has accepted the chairmanship of a committee on this subject, are organizing a program for Friday, September 18, to discuss standards of corporation giving. Sectional discussions will be led by outstanding representatives of manufacturing corporations, chain stores, railroads, insurance companies. Reports of these discussions will be made at the noon luncheon.

Chest Responsibility for Human Services - The future of the chest movement, as it emerges from the depression, is of concern to everyone interested in social welfare. Mr. Stillman F. Westbrook, President of Community Chests and Councils, Inc., and Mr. Newton D. Baker will discuss this question in particular relation to its responsibility for the development of sound and adequate community programs of service.

The Outlook For Youth and the Special Contribution of Voluntary Health Services - These two phases of welfare services will be specially presented by Miss Dorothy Thompson, publicist and news commentator, and Dr. Thomas Parran, Surgeon General of the United States.

Women's Committee - There will be special meetings and programs planned by Mrs. Harper Sibley, Chairman of the National Women's Committee, and Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt, Honorary Chairman, in addition to a general presentation of their contribution to welfare services.

President Roosevelt will welcome the delegation at the White House at the opening session Thursday morning, September 17, as in previous years. Mr. Swope will respond in behalf of the Conference.

My dear Rabbi Silver:

I was much pleased to receive your acceptance as a member of the National Citizens Committee of the Mobilization for Human Needs. The influential men and women accepting membership and printed herewith indicate the seriousness with which our national leaders take responsibility for maintenance of voluntary welfare services in American communities. No cause could enlist a more notable group of backers.

You have already received the invitation to the Mobilization Conference at Washington on September 17 and 18, and an outline of the program. May I ask that you do your utmost to attend. Let me call your attention to the second day's program devoted to discussion of standards of corporation pledges to community welfare services.

Each year support from corporations has become a more important factor in community welfare services. Last year through our efforts the Federal law was amended to exempt such contributions from taxation. But there have been no recognized guides to what a corporation should give. It is my thought that discussion between corporation executives and community leaders will develop standards helpful both to business and welfare services. There will be separate discussions of different lines of business, e.g., manufacturing, chain stores, railroads, amusements, etc. You can help if you will take part in the conference on the particular field of business that interests and concerns you.

In addition may 1 ask you to attend the one meeting that is held of the National Citizens Committee to discuss the strategy of securing popular interest in community welfare services in the extreme confusion and distraction of an intense political campaign. We need your thought and advice on this problem. The committee will meet in the Chinese Room of the Mayflower Hotel on September 17 at 11 o'clock, immediately following the opening session of the conference at the White House.

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

My dear Rabbi Silver:

This fall the annual Mobilization for Human Needs will again seek, by a national educational program, to strengthen the local community chest appeals for funds in about 450 cities. The voluntary social welfare and health services in American communities will largely depend upon the success of these appeals, and will be in real need of reinforcement.

A number of events of national importance are being planned in connection with the Mobilization. Much of the publicity will be centered about the fact that the community chest movement is this year observing the 25th anniversary of the founding of the first community chest, which occurred in Cleveland in 1913.

We are asking a number of our national leaders for statements to be used during the 1938 Mobilization by Community Chests and Councils, Inc., in newspapers and other publications, and by the local chests in their campaign publicity. In order to make full use of these statements we are asking for them some months in advance of the Mobilization period, which comes in the fall.

May we have a statement, from 50 to 250 words in length, from you? Perhaps you will wish to call attention to the dependability of private welfare services amid the changes in our community life, or perhaps you will wish to focus special attention on the increasing needs to be met through voluntary efforts, or on other aspects of the appeal.

A statement from you will be valuable in our efforts to mobilize public opinion in behalf of this national effort, and we shall appreciate your cooperation.

INFORMATION CONCERNING THE 1939 COMMUNITY MOBILIZATION FOR HUMAN NEEDS

THE COMMUNITY MOBILIZATION FOR HUMAN NEEDS is an annual effort to inform the public regarding vital social needs in our country, urging citizens to support their local voluntary social agencies and to take an active part in promoting the total welfare programs of their communities. The Mobilization is a joint undertaking of thirty-six national social welfare and health organizations (listed on reverse of letterhead), with COMMUNITY CHESTS AND COUNCILS, INC., the national association of local chests and councils, as the administrative agency.

COMMUNITY

SUPPORT FOR LOCAL SOCIAL SERVICES

This cooperative undertaking raises no national fund. It aims rather to strengthen and supplement local fund-raising campaigns, the majority of which are carried on by community chests in approximately 490 cities in the United States (503 including Canada and other countries.)

During 1939 these chests raised in their own towns and cities about \$81 million for the support of private community welfare services. These funds provide hospital care, public health nursing, child care,

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family welfare service, camp life, and guidance for boys and girls. These and many other services of utmost importance in determining the present and future health, happiness and welfare of the American people are not supported by tax funds. The 8500 local agencies financed through community chests and by other voluntary giving are sponsored by Protestant, Catholic and Jewish donors, by civic, business, labor and other non-sectarian groups.

WHO IS CONCERNED

Around nine million interested citizens respond annually to the Mobilization. About 500,000 of them take part in the hard work involved in the annual campaigns. Three-fourths of the givers to chests are working men and women, whose gifts average less than \$5 each. However, 62 percent of the money raised is given in sums over \$100. About 21 percent comes in large gifts of \$5,000 and over.

SPONSORS

The Mobilization is sponsored by a National Citizens' Committee of 141 public-spirited men and women representing all sections of the country. Officers of the Committee are listed on the letterhead.
