Dear Rabbi Silver:

I want to confess quite frankly that I personally am very much disappointed that the recent Weisgal affair should have caused a misunderstanding between us. I consider myself one of your loyal friends and supporters of many years standing and it is most regretable that a stranger like Weisgal can come in our midst and create such disturbance.

I assure you that I appreciate your own feeling in the matter and for that reason I believe that you realize that my position is not enviable.

Regardless of my own feelings in this whole affair, I had to, because of the committee and for the sake of the work itself, follow the course which I took. Mr. Friedland was invited by us to act as chairman even before the Weisgal matter came up. The committe found it therefore impossible to withdraw Friedland's name, since by so doing it would plunge our work in this controversy.

I had hoped that our long standing friendship and your great interest in our work and friendship for Sprinzak might move you to make a personal sacrifice on this occasion. I thought that a man as great as you are, could afford to make a personal sacrifice, without endangering your prestige. That is why I felt that I could prevail upon you not to withdraw your name as speaker.

I hope that this incident will not spoil our relationship in the future.

Dear Rabbi Silver,

JUDGE SAMUEL SILBERT I was very happy to receive your letter of the 18th. It is a great satisfaction for me to know that you have no feeling of unfriendliness towards us.

You are absolutely right when you say that it was I who first broached the subject as to who shall speak at the dinner, and I have so informed my committee from the first. The reason I spoke to you about it was because somebody JUDGE LEWIS DRUCKER told me that you would prefer not to appear on the same program with certain individuals and I was anxious to please you. I agreed to it before consulting with my committee. It was aftertalking over the matter with my committee that it was decided that we cannot tell Fiedland that we do not want him after having invited him. Our work would have been endangered by such a move. I realize now that I might have avoided all this by not broaching the subject in the first place.

> It is because of my great esteem for you and for the lofty position which you occupy in our efforts for Labor Palestine that I dare appeal to you once more to forgo your reluctance in appearing on the same programme with someone whom you would otherwise prefer to avoid. Dare I hope for your favorable reply?
