Dear Mr. Neumann:

As a Zionist, believing in building up the Jewish National Homeland in Palestine, I am warmly interested in all efforts to further the cause of Jewish education in this country. 
In connection with our efforts in establishing a national organization for Jewish education, I beg to report further, as follows:

Yesterday, I received the promised letter from Mr. Rosenbloom, in which he discussed the subject a little more fully, and makes a number of suggestions. It is evident from the letter that he is deeply interested in the project, and will go into the proposition to the hilt. He expects to be in New York shortly to discuss the subject with us.

I have written to Mr. Brandeis to elicit from him a statement of approval of our sims, such as I secured from Judge Mack.

I am also trying to see Dr. Wise, in the hope that he may help, at the proper time, in securing some of the necessary funds.

I have had talks with two representative members of the former staff of the Bureau of Education. I say the former staff because since Dr. Benderly's return something seems to have gone wrong, and the whole staff has resigned in a body. These men, some of whom are highly valuable from the professional point of view, are warmly interested in our project. I am going to meet them all on Sunday, to discuss our plans, and will probably secure the cooperation of the whole group. They would be, to my mind, a very important acquisition.



#### FORM LETTER

October 1920.

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For some time past, it has been growing increasingly evident to many of us that there is an urgent need in this country for creating a national organization for the advancement of Jewish education. Hitherto, a number of agencies have been working in this field, but their work has been largely unccordinated, and there has not been a single body representative of all the groups or elements interested in Jewish education, which shall devote itself specifically to this problem. This question has been the subject of discussion at the Conventions and at the meetings of the Mational Executive Committee of the Zionist Organization of America.

At a meeting of the Executive Committee of the Z.O.A., held on September 30, a resolution was adopted, authorizing the formation of a sub-committee, charged with the duty of calling into being — in co-operation with other organizations — a national body for Jewish education. After due consideration, we have come to the conclusion that the call to the Jewish national organizations, when issued, should not be issued in the name of our Committee alone, but should rather emanate from a somewhat larger group, representing in unofficial capacity, other organizations and groups, in addition to the Zionist. We feel that the matter is of such paramount importance that no effort should be spared to bring about the harmonious cooperation on the part of all concerned.

Therefore, knowing the deep interest that you have always taken in the Cause of Jewish education, we beg to invite you to attend a conference to take place on the at at who.

### (COPY OF LETTER RECEIVED BY MR. NEUMANN FROM MR. JUSTICE BRANDEIS) STONELEIGH COURT Washington, D. C. October 22, 1920. Dear Mr. Neumann: Let me thank you for yours of the 20th, concerning the proposed national organization for the promotion of Jewish education in America. With the views expressed in Judge Mack's letter of September 24 I entirely concur. If the organization is formed I shall be glad to contribute one thousand dollars toward the expenses of the first year. In regard to the proposed minimum budget, I venture this suggestion: If the organization is to do the full work proposed and cover the whole country, it will obviously require much more than the minimum named. But it seems to me that the chances of success -of establishing an institution which will prove influential and permanent -- will be far greater, if the organization starts more moderately and is developed, in the first few years, carefully and slowly, and limits its operations to a small section of the country. It is the quality, rather than the quantity of the work done now which will count most. And in the early formative years, it is important that the machinery be reduced to a minimum, and that thorough thinking and enquiry be intensified. With best wishes, Cordially, (Signed) LOUIS D. Dear Silver:

Executive Committee last Sunday, because, for one thing, we wanted to hear a report of your recent pilgrimage.

(The meeting) held on wonday evening of unofficial representatives of various national Jewish organizations, was, I think, a success. Rather divergent views were presented in the persons of Mr. Reuben Brainin, Mr. K. Whiteman, Dr. Turoff, Rabbi Jacob Kohn, Dr. Bernard Drachman, Mr. Abel, and others. You will get a fairly good idea of what took place from the minutes which I shall send you tomorrow. The important thing is that a Committee of Five was appointed to present at the next meeting, a statement of aims and a program of activities. The next meeting is scheduled for Monday evening, November 15, the day following the next meeting of the National Executive Committee. I feel that we are making satisfactory progress in the direction of uniting an important group of national organizations on a common platform for Jewish education. Very soon, however, it will be a question not of principles, but of money. Unless we will be able to secure the funds at the very beginning, we shall be stumbling along for a year, bottering about when this thing and that, spending ourselves in trying to raise petty sums of money, and achieving nothing. We will have to have approximately \$50,000 at the beginning to cover our activities for one year.

Do you think that Cleveland and vicinity could contribute, say, \$10,000 for this fund, within the next few weeks? If that sum seems too large, how much could be raised? What, in your opinion, is the method to be employed in securing such funds as may be raised?

(Rabbi Silver - 2)

I expect to be out in Pittsburgh some day next week to see Mr. Rosenbloom, who, I believe, will make a very substantial contribution.

A number of important matters depend upon our ability to raise funds soon. I have particularly in mind the fact that there are at least two educational experts of great value, whose services we may be able to engage, if we are in a position to do so in the very near futute, but whom we will lose if we delay. One of them is Dr. Nissan Turoff, formerly the head of the Vaad Hachinuch in Palestine, the Editor of the pedagogic journal "Hachinuch", and the translator of James' "Talks to Teachers".
