My dear Mr. Perskie:-

You undoubtedly know that Mr. Emanuel Neumann was elected by the last Zionist Congress in Basle to be a member of the Executive Committee of the World Zionist Organization.

The announcement of Mr. Neumann's election was greeted with great satisfaction not alone by American Zionists but also and more especially by our fellow Zionists in Burope and in Palestine. Everywhere it is felt that Mr. Neumann would be an invaluable addition to the Executive, bringing to the work a fine intelligence and understanding, as well as a life-long devotion to the cause.

Mr. Neumann will soon leave for London and Jerusalem. It is important that he should be in a position to carry on his diplomatic work effectively and without financial embarassment. The limited budget under which he will work will not enable him to perform many of the services which he would be in position to do. Many informal meetings must be held, luncheons, dinners, etc. arranged for important personalities, etc. etc. which Mr. Neumann should be free to carry through but for which no funds have been or can be provided through official sources.

Some of the friends of Mr. Neumann have accordingly expressed a desire to raise a small sum, of say, \$1500 or \$2000 to be given to him on his departure from the United States as "a fund for incidentals in connection with his work." I have undertaken to raise this fund and I am accordingly writing to a very small group of people whose interest in the Movement is well known to me and who will understand the importance of such a fund. Would you like to contribute to it? If so, please send your contribution to me not later than December 1st.

Dear Abba:

I am trying now to carry out my plan of a conference in Washington, to be held early next month. It is astonishing how much inertia has to be overcome to do the simplest and smallest thing. This applies not only to external but also to internal difficulties.

I hope that you will make some headway with this matter soon.

I understand that we may have you with us at a meeting of the Administrative Committee next week.

I have been quite busy since the convention with 'peace after the peace' - trying to adjust delicate problems of internal administration with Szold and Lipsky. We are making slow progress, but I hope that before I go away this will have been satisfactorily disposed of, so that the 'peace' will have a fighting chance for survival until the next convention.

At our three-cornered conference yesterday, Lipsky seemed quite reasonable and amenable, and I hope it lasts.

Mrs. Max Blumberg, 691 Willoughby Ave., Brooklyn Mrs. Peter J. Schweitzer, 270 West End Ave., N.Y.C. Sunday I spent the day in washington and conferred for two hours with Brandeis. There is every indication that the dinner which I am planning there may turn out successful beyond my original expectations. There is a considerable reservoir of good-will for us to draw upon. I went over the plans in detail with Brandeis, and he added a number of good suggestions. The fact that he is interested in this work is wellknown to a group of our non-Jewish friends in Washington and serves as a powerful lever. It has occurred to me that our friend Mr. Hopkin may become sufficiently interested in the Pro-Palestine Committee and this dinner which is intended to crystallize sentiment for it, to make a substantial contribution for the purpose. I think he could probably be gotten to underwrite the expense of the dinner, which involves not only paying for the plates but also the incidental expenses, traveling, wiring, publicity, etc. - all in all about \$500. I think he might be made to see that it would be far better to have the expenses of such things borne by non-Jewish sympathizers than by ourselves, to avoid the appearance of artificiality. It is possible that the invitation for the dinner may be issued from Vice-President Curtis, or else, from a little group of distinguished people in "ashington.

Dear Neumann:-

I have had your letter of November 19th under careful consideration and regret that I cannot share your understanding of the matter. The situation as Bob and I both understood it is as follows:

At the time of the Congress, we assumed that you would receive from the W.Z.O. \$4000 a year and that on our pledge to make up the difference between that and not less than \$10,000, we should be called upon for \$5200.

It then turned out that the payment from the W.Z.O. had been reduced to 60 pounds a month, which we regarded as equivalent to \$3600 a year, and we willingly stood that difference, increasing our pledge to \$6400.

No one contemplated at that time that 60 pounds might be subject to exchange fluctuations. In view of the fact, however, that the money was for use in Palestine, and in further view of the fact that while we Americans mentioned \$10,000 a year, we all; regarded this as equivalent to 2000 pounds a year, and in further view of the fact that the cost of living in Palestine, as elsequere, is not what it was, not we do feel very strongly both that we should be held/only to the difference between 720 and 2000 pounds, that is 1280 pounds, but that the 720 pounds should still continue to be regarded as the equivalent of \$3600, leaving our pledge \$6400.

You state in your paragraph I - "and that this amount (that is at least \$10,000) a year for two years) is not to be affected by any change which may take place

in the salaries of members of the Executive, fluctuations in the value of the pound, or any other unforeseen changes."

Of course, none of these matters were discussed at the time and we cannot agree with you that our pledge should be subject to an increase because of any of these matters.

It is quite true that we said that if possible, we would raise up to \$12,000. You know the conditions, however. We do not see the possibility of that.

\$2500 and \$3000 for expenses should be secured. I regret that neither of us has any knowledge of such agreement. When you suggested that, if possible, we increase from \$10,000 to \$12,000., nothing was said about transportation expenses.

Whether anything can be secured for this purpose from the Z.O.A., we do not know. You know the conditions there as well as we. If, on the basis suggested by you of your acting in the capacity of the Z.O.A. representative abroad, anything can be so secured, well and good - but we have made and can make no promises in this respect.

As to getting it from any other sources, we know of none now.

Up to the present time we have the following contributions:-

We count on getting an additional \$400 and will certainly get it, although we are not sure of the source. on this basis, the other half of the \$6400 has been guaranteed \$1600 by L.D.B. and \$1600 by Mrs. Rosenbloom, but a under/specific agreement that if we can get any additional money over and above the \$6400, their guarantees will be reduced pro rata, so as to bring their annual personal obligation down to a reasonable amount. In our minds, but without any direct statement to them, we have considered not exceeding \$1000 a year for each of them as such a reasonable amount.

Therefore, if in addition to the \$400 a year, which we are still lacking, we should be able to raise up to \$1200 a year more, it could not inure to your benefit, but would have to be used in accordance with our agreement with L.D.B. and Mrs. R.

Of course, if we can possibly raise more than this, it would go to increase the amount payable to you.

While we have guaranteed that you should get the minimum amount from America, we have considered as a matter of course that if any money comes to you directly from American sources for the purpose for which the Fund is engendered, such money should be deemed a part of the fund.

I greatly trust that this will be agreeable to you. It has been shown to J.W.M., who has been most active in raising the money, and he approves of it.

Dear Abba:

I am enclosing a brief report on a conference which took place at Mr. Brandeis! home on Thursday.

Mr. Hopkins was quite helpful and made any number of suggestions. There is one about which I would like to have your opinion. He spoke very highly of Dr. Charles F. Thwing, President Emeritus of Western Reserve University. Mr. Hopkins during his student days, acted as secretary to Dr. Thwing, and says that they are very close and intimate.

He believes that Dr. Thwing, despite his advanced age, is still a great moral and intellectual force, and enjoys great prestige throughout the country.

It is Mr. Hopkins! view that we are most likely to gain supporters emong a certain type of Christians
who have been brought up on the Scriptures, and who have
a sentimental and emotional attitude toward the Holy Land,
which makes them pre-disposed to favor the Zionist cause.
He warns against depending merely on politicians and liberals,
who have no such background and sentimental attachment to
Palestine.

As a matter of fact it was Dr. Adler who had first urged me to have the Pro-Palestine Committee include a number of outstanding people in academic circles, and avoid giving it a purely political coloring.

Dr. Hopkins intends to speak to Dr. Thwing and hopes to bring him down to the dinner meeting in Washington in January, and thinks that Dr. Thwing would make a good national chairman or President - if necessary we could have an Executive Committee with a Chairman of the Executive in the east.

Dec. 22d, 1931 Mr. Emanuel Neumann, 110 William St., New York, N. Y. My dear Emanuel:-I am just getting over a three-day cold and that accounts for the delay in answering your Washington letter. Mr. Hopkins has been a good friend of the Movement for quite a number of years. He has made a study of it and appears to be genuinely in sympathy with it. There is a fine, 61d Testament background to his Zionist interests. He is well thought of in the city, although his political influence has been considerably lessened in the last two years by his being dismissed from the office of City Manager by a machine controlled council. In the last two years he has been engaged in a bitter political controversy with the Republican machine and there has been considerable mud-slinging on both sides, but Mr. Hopkins' personal integrity seems not to have been impugned. I am not so sure about Dr. Thwing as head of your organization. When he was President of Western Reserve University he was not regarded by the Jewish community as particularly philo-semitic. He is of the old school of Gladstonian English gentleman whose interest in Palestine would be a purely academic one. He should be a member of your organization but I think you ought to get a more positive and a more vigorous chairman. With kindest regards, I am As ever yours, AHS/IR

I did not get your letter of the 17th with the enclosed check until yesterday, when I got to the Mayflower again in Washington. They received the letter apparently after I left last week, and stupidly kept it there instead of forwarding it to my home, though they had my home address.

Let me thank you for the check, and more so for your efforts. This is timely aid. I have succeeded in raising a little more money for the purposes of this political work, though not very much.

You refer to certain letters which you received from New York. If you are not precluded from doing so, by the seal of confidence, I would appreciate a little more detailed information as to the persons from whom you received the letters and just what they contain. It would be very useful to me personally to have this information confidentially. I can assure you I will treat it as such.
