

### REPORT TO EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE DEC. 15

In order to get the Regional Government program quickly under way, the Officers and Hominating Committee of the original committee of 400 have taken the initiative in making certain recommendations and suggestions for presentation to you today.

The Executive Committee is regarded as the final executive authority charged with setting up other committees, with initiating a program and with seeing that such a program is carried out. It is to be the final authority to pass on any plan or plans later to go to the public.

To you who are members of this Executive Committee, your Officers and Nominating Committee recommend three major organisation sub-divisions which you are authorised to create. They are -

- 1. A Paot-Finding Cosmittee
- 2. A Legislative Ways and Means Committee
- S. An Squestional Committee

The functions suggested for these committees are -

### PACT-PINDING COMMITTEE

This Committee is charged with governmental research and study; with consultation with proper and essential governmental authorities; with giving a hearing to all interested and reputable parties from the suburbs and the city who may desire such hearing, and particularly with giving adequate hearing to official representatives of the cities or villages in the county. This Committee is further charged with working out a plan or plans which it does applicable to the Cleveland situation. Such plan or plans should be submitted to the Executive Committee before final presentation to the public.

This Committee shall organise at once for its task. Its Chairman and officers, and whatever executive committee it establishes, shall suggest such sub-committees as may be needed, either from its commembership or from other sources.

#### LEGISLATIVE WAYS AND MEASS COMMITTEE

This Committee will have responsibility for drawing up and securing such legislation as may be required by whatever plan is worked out. It is proposed that this Committee shall be appointed and organized at a later meeting of the Executive Committee.

### EDUCATIONAL COMMITTEE

This Committee will be charged with speakers service, publicity and other ways and meens of reaching the public and thoroughly educating it as to what is going on. It is proposed to appoint this Committee at a later meeting of the Executive Committee.

It is suggested to the Executive Committee that it take steps immediately to create the Fact-Finding Committee. The interest in the general subject seems to demand immediate action.

The Officers and Mominating Committee, therefore, present nominations for the Fact-Finding Committee with chairman, vice chairmen and secretary as fellows:

W. A. Greenlund, Chairman Dean Walter T. Dunmere, Vice Chairman Harold H. Burton Vice Chairman Leyton B. Carter, Secretary

Mr. Carter is Director of the Municipal Research Bureau. It is hoped that his knowledge and the valuable aid of his organization will be available for the research work which will be necessary to the working out of a sound plan.



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

My dear Rabbi Silver :-

This letter is to tell you as a member of the Committee of "400" about the progress of the work, what it has cost to date and the immediate financial needs of the Committee.

The Executive Committee needs a modest amount to carry on the work. The last winter's financial campaign produced \$2939.50. Resources are now about exhausted.

But what has been done you may ask. The answer is a great deal has been done. The Executive Committee has felt that "bally hoo" or superficial publicity would be out of place. It has felt too that attempts to draw wide spread attention to the problem of regional government during the summer months and during a presidential campaign would be untimely. But more important than these considerations it has felt that first a lot of basic study and thinking should be done before anybody "steps out" with a plan of action.

This kind of work has been quietly and determinedly going on. The Fact Finding and Policy Committee had held a long series of public hearings with many public officials and collected much valuable testimony. The Research Committee, a subcommittee of the Fact Finding group, has responded to its assignment of studying the whole situation in a truly admirable fashion. They have prepared 17 separate studies and monographs upon various essential phases of our problem. A final report is now being prepared based on these various studies, the testimony at the public hearings and other material. This it is planned will be ready for submission to the Executive Committee within a month. (See the list of the Research Committee's Reports on an attached sheet.)

At this moment we must depend upon the faithful, in short the members of the Committee of "400" and a few others who have attested their interest by cash contributions. Later, when the final report and a plan of action is publicly available a broader appeal can be made. But now a little boost is needed for bringing about any form of effective regional government.

Pittsburgh, Allegheny County and the State of Pennsylvania voted on their enabling constitutional amendment Nov. 6.

It was adopted. They are well on the road. They too had a modest beginning with a relatively few citizens. What they are doing, we too can do if all pull together. Last winter you contributed \$10.00 Would it be possible for you to duplicate this amount now?

Suggested Amendment to Constitution of Onio Granting Authority for Alternative Forms of County Gevernment and Fermitting a Borough Flan of Motropolitan Government for Certain Counties.

House Joint Resolution No.

A proposed amendment to the Constitution of Chio, repealing Section 16 of Article IV and Sections 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6 and 7 of Article I and inserting in Article I new Sections 1 and 2, relating to County Government and Federated Sunicipal Government.

25 IT RESOLVED by the General Ascembly of the State of Chio, three-fifths of the members elected to each House comparing therein, that there be submitted to the electers of the State of Chio for their approval or rejection at the regular election on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in Rovember 1920, a proposal to amond the constitution of the State of Chio by reposling Section 16 of Article IV and Section 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, and 7 of Article I thereof, and inserting in Article I new Sections 1 and 8, which shall read as follows:

"Section 1. Except as otherwise provided in this article, the organisation and government of counties and townships shall be such as now is or hereafter shall be sutherized by general laws. Laws may also be passed providing alternative forms of county government for any counties adopting the sems; but no such alternative form of county government shall become operative in any county unless and until approved by vote of a majority of the electors voting thoroun in such county.

"Soction 2. As a further alternative in any counties having a population of 180,000 inhabitants, as determined by the next proceding federal consus, all powers and duties of the county and of all county officers may be vested in a municipal corporation to be known as a Federated City. Such a city shall have such further powers and duties, shall include such territory and shall be formed in such manner as shall be provided by general law and in accordance with this section.

- (a) A Federated City shall be a city within the meaning of Article XVIII of this constitution, and shall be subject to all provisions of that Article not inconsistent with this section.
- (b) A Federated City shall have, and its charter shall provide for its exercise of all the powers and duties now or hereafter vested by low in any county, or in the officers of any county, that shall be included wholly within its corporate limits. Such city shall also have such of the powers and duties of municipal corporations and of any other governmental subdivisions which are or night be formed within its corporate limits as shall be permitted by general law and provided by its charter. Such powers and duties say be exclusive or computant. Provision may be made by its charter for changes in the designations of any governmental subdivisions within the Pederated City, but the adoption of such charter shall not terminate the existence or change the form of government of any sunicipal corporation or township, and all of their powers and duties which shall not have been vested in the Pederated City by its charter shall be reserved to them respectively.

- (c) A Federated City shall include such territory as shall be specified in its charter, and such corporate limits may be changed from time to time as shall be permitted by general law, and as stated in its charter, provided, however, that a Federated City must include within its corporate limits at least one entire county, and provided further that the Federated City shall not have the powers or duties of a county or of county officers within any portion of a county which is not entirely included within the corporate limits of the Federated City.
- (d) The charter of the Federated City shall provide for the transfer to it of all property, and for the assumption by it of all indebtedness of any county located entirely within its corporate limits, and may provide for the transfer to it of such other property, and for the assumption by it of such other indebtedness as shall be provided by general law, and as shall be set forth in the charter. The charter may provide for taking districts within the Federated City, and for the levying and method of levying taxeguithin such city, and within such respective districts for any purposes of such city upon such basis as shall be uniform within each taking district, but need not be uniform as between separate districts. All taxes for purposes other than those of the Federated City, or of its taxing districts, shall be levied in accordance with general law.
- (c) The charter of a Federated City shall be framed by a commission, not more than one-half of the members of which shall be chosen by vote of the electors of the most populous municipal corporation within the county. The remainder of the commission shall be chosen by vote of the electors within the remainder of such county.
- (f) The charter of a Federated City shall not become effective unless and until approved by a majority vote of the electors voting thereon respectively in (1) the most populous municipal corporation to be included in the Federated City; (2) the remainder of the area to be included in the Federated City; and also (3) in each of two-thirds of the total number of municipal corporations and of the township areas, declusive of incorporated areas in such townships, to be included in the Federated City. Amendments to the charter shall be made as provided therein, provided, however, that no emendment reducing any power of any governmental subdivision within the Federated City shall be effective unless approved by majority vote of the electors voting thereon in the Pederated City as a whole, and also by a majority vote of the electors voting thereon in each of two-thirds of the total number of municipal corporations, and of the township areas, exclusive of incorporated areas in such townships, included in such Federated City."

TO ALL MEMBERS OF THE EXECUTIVE, FACT FINDING AND STATE AND COUNTY COOPERATION COMMITTEES:

You are aware, no doubt, that House Joint Resolution No.7 ("the regional government amendment") has been voted out of Committee with recommendation for passage. probability it will be voted upon in the House next Thursday, March 28th.

It is vitally important that you give your active help and support now. We, therefore, urge you to write to all members of the Cuyahoga County delegation, except Gilbert Morgan who is against the measure, asking them to individually use their influence with other members of the House in explaining this measure, in order that it may be well understood, and urging the support of other delegations. Already there has been much favorable comment in other parts of the State and it is felt that with the above help of our delegation victory in the House can be accomplished. letters should go out as soon as possible. We are enclosing a roster of the Cuyahoga County delegation. They should be addressed to the State House, Columbus.

In writing to our delegation it would be well to emphasize the following points:

- 1. The amendment is permissive only. Its passage would not of itself force any change upon any county, municipality, township, school district or their inhabitants
- 2. Its passage would make it possible for the legislature to make highly desirable changes in the form and structure of our obsolete and cumbersome county governments. It would also permit those counties that so desire to incorpor ate through the framing and adopting of a county charter for their own government.

- 3. The amendment sets up adequate safeguards for existing municipalities and townships in the matter of adopting the charter for an incorporated county.
- 4. The time is now ripe for action. Constructive constitutional changes are needed so that the people throughout the state and the legislature can provide county governments which meet present day needs and requirements. These needs and requirements are different in different counties. We are interested in metropolitan counties but all counties have their problems which cannot be fully and intelligently met without a constitutional change such as this resolution embraces.

Your prompt action is of the greatest importance.

SOME IDEAS ON THE BOROUGH PLAN.

The principal objection to the Borough plan from the voters of the present City of Cleveland will be this "Representation without Taxation is Unjust."

If Cleveland is to contribute any new ideas to the world, it would be better to work out an original plan of Borough government, without reference to what other cities have done, and then check up with the other cities to avoid their mistakes.

First A set of rules should be adopted that will protect the people and property of the city and suburbs in their present rights, then a Borough plan worked out that does not violate these rules.

Some of the city departments should extend their services to the entire county, and the expense be divided among all the Boroughs according to population or property values (dependent on the nature of the service.) The different Boroughs should vote on what other departments of the city government they want extended to them, and the costs shared by them.

Except where public policy demands, (such as extension of Public Health Service) there should be no increase in taxes without increased service, and then only when approved by those taxed.

Representation should be figured exactly, taking into consideration population, property values and the share of expense borne by each Borough.

The vote on city matters should be extended only where the Boroughs have a direct interest through bearing their share of the expense.
