Dear Sir: - Last Sunday I heard your lecture on "Anti-Semitism", and as you are a young man, you may perhaps welcome a little constructive criticism.

First of all: Twice you spoke in a derogatory spirit of thoughts "Ande in Germany", now whatever our political dofference is with that country, the scientific and phylosophic Germany, we are under deepest obligations to, not only as Americans, but even more so as Reform Jews. The newspapers are trying hard enough to throw our brains into a muddle, the pulpit at least ought to retain clearness of thought. But at any rate, as long as we are at war with Germany, let us fight her with weapons, worthy the spirit of our past history, worthy the spirit of true Americanism, let us not sink to the level of ward politicians who throw mud at eacher, and who resort to slander, in order to down their opponent. Let as be said of us, after peace is restored that we have fought like men and like Americans.

But your statements were not even correct. You accused Germany of fathering the thought of modern Anti-Semitism, the idea of superior and inferior races, with the Jews belonging to the latter. The man who stood sponsor for this thought, was Ernest Renan, who in a book written in his earlier days (I cannot momentarily think of the name of thebook) made propoganda for this

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thought. The German Junkers and Russian Bureaucrats were only too glad to take it up, and when in later years Renan took back everything he said on this subjects, Russian and German anti-Semites of course, ignored his latter statements. But this thought was "Made in France", not in Germany.

You were correct in criticising Werner Somabrt for thexxthought for which you did, but to cast aside his entire book, just because it was " Made in Germany", is wrong, for after all, Sombart wrote a mighty good book. He was the first to call our attention to the coincidence of the migration of commerce and prosprity with that of the Jews, a statement that has not yet been contradicted to my knowledge, though his book has gone through severe criticism. Moreover his vivid description of the condition of commerce in Germany before and after the entry of the Jews in that country, is a classic, and has given us a better inside into the life of the Middle Ages in Germany than almost any historic work could do.

And one more point. Why do you lecture, why don't you preach sermons? Truly it is the function of the Reform pulpit, as of the Jewish pulpit in general, to teach Ethics, now while your lecture was instructive, it taught no ethical lessons, and you could have so easily turned your lecture into a sermon, by arriving at the conclusion, that whatever the causes of Anti-Semitism may be, we ourselves could minimize them, by leading lives of justice and righteousness, stating the fact, that while a non-Jew is personally held

responsible for any act of unworthiness on his part, entire Jewry is accused, when a Jew falls from grace. This you could have worked up nicely by urging your hearers to lead a life for the higher things, Art, Music, Science, and last but not least, Ethics, and then you could have nicely brought in the announcement you made after the lecture, larger contributions to the Associated Charities.

You are one of the most talented youngmen in the Jew ish pulpit, your mopportunity is a rare one, generations yet unborn will be affected by your utterances, therefore so much the greater the obligation upon you, to take care of what you say.

It was my intention to go hear you again to-day, but unfortunately I will have to leave the city, and had to deny myself the pleasure of listening to you a second time, but hope will have the opportunity to do so at a later period.

Trusting you will accept my criticism in the spirit in which it is meant,

My dear Rabbi Silver:

The Plain Dealer is asking your cooperation in an attempt to improve the reporting of Sunday sermons.

You will appreciate that the notes sent us do not have to be assembled or re-written in any finished form. If you will simply have your secretary make copies of such notes as you intend to use it will be entirely satisfactory.

My dear Rabbi Silver:

"Judaism and Christian Science." I should like to have spoken to you personally, but, no doubt, your time is valuable and probably I can say what I want here.

Were very good and exceedingly well handled. Your lecture was given in such a convincing manner that no person, not a Christian Scientist would want to be one - in fact, I should say, would want to be as far removed from Christian Science as the North Pole is from the South Pole. I cannot, of course, know whether this was your intention or not, so I cannot judge - nor is it my place to judge.

one who desired above all things to be a just man. This, indeed, is admirable, but do you think it is just to speak against any religion from a house of worship? No matter what the religion, Jewish, Catholic, Protestant or Christian Scientist, all seek the Almighty God and His kingdom. As a preacher once said, the kingdom can be compared to a sea and the different kinds of religions can be likened unto rivers, all taking different courses but all eventually flowing into the sea.

One sometimes receives the wrong impression from a sermon or lecture and I may have - but you seemed to convey the thought that Christian Science is based solely on the New Testament and not on the Old. This is not so, and if you would ever attend a meeting on Wednesdays or Sundays you would find that the Read reads from both the Old and New Testaments - selections which have been authorized and prepared by Mrs. Eddy and pupils taught by Mrs. Eddy. In fact, Christian Scientists are constantly reminded of the glory of Daniel in the lion's Den and God's protecting care in this instance - of the three men in the fiery furnace - of Moses' consecration - of God's care of Elijah in feeding him by ravens - in fact, all of the prophets and good men of the Old Testament are revered and Christian Scientists hold their lives as models for their own. Mrs. Eddy's remarks about Judaism which you seemed to condemn, referred, without question, to the present day, rather than to the Biblical day Jews. You seemed to infer otherwise. One, however, must admit that the Jews of today are living more in the letter than in the Spirit of religion as practiced by the patriarchs of the Old Testament. I am convinced of this, because I have been reared in an orthodox (ewish home. If you would study page 361 of Science and Health, you will find that,

after all, Mrs. Eddy has the rightidea about Judaism and Christianity.

Can't we, my dear Rabbi Silver, devote our time and thought to attending our dear Father's business and isn't today full of events? Must we, today, speak against another man's religion when that religion is his very life, just like your own religion is your life? I must say, you were broad-minded in your statement that you revere a religion that can uplift humanity, etc. Most preachers are rather reluctant to admit that any religion but their own would have such a tendency.

Since the scant fifty years of its birth, Christian Science has many, many adherents, yet, it never denounces another religion - never holds a meeting where another religion is even discussed, but goes quietly on its way, seeking the kingdom of God, even as you and I. This does not necessarily mean that every other religion should do likewise. I will not let myself think that preachers, Jewish or Christian will lecture against Christian Science so that they might be able to have a stronger hold on their own congregations. It shouldn't be necessary.

Instead of creating Love in the hearts of a congregation, as a minister of God should, and as the people sorely need it, many a preacher will do the opposite, unconsciously. I heard many sarcastic remarks and many jeering, sneering remarks from people going out of the house of God yesterday. I know that that was not what you intended should be re the result of your sermon but such it was. All these sneering remarks were against Christian Scientists and the religion of Christian Science.

My dear Rabbi Silver, we humans are wont to put certain thoughts of lack of understanding, or differences which we cannot comprehend, or what not, under certain captions. For instance, the word "nervous" seems to cover a multitude of sins. The slightest irregularity in work, words, actions, or anything, comes under the caption "'I'm nervous" or "you're nervous" or "he's nervous." In the same manner, you use the word "mystic." What you cannot or would not comprehend, you put down as "mystic." What seems "mystic" about Christian Science to you or to another, does not seem "mystic" to a Christian Scientist. Rather, mortal existance is a phenomenon and to the Christian Scientist the Spiritual reality is perfectly clear - nothing mystic about it. You also said that Mrs. Eddy mentioned something in an "off-handed" manner. How can you infer this? You don't know this - on the contrary, she may have spent hours on what sounded to you "off-handed."

Then the subject of marriage. I do not know how you think about it, but according to Mrs. Eddy and the Bible, in heaven there are no marriages, neither are we given in marriage. According to Mrs. Eddy, The "Heaven is a divine state of Mind". Until this state is reached, marriages will continue to be necessary. How wicked the world now, before this state is reached, would be if there were no marriages. Scientists do not make a concession by marrying. It is against the law not to marry and even if the law did allow Scientists to live together without marrying, everybody could do this and say "Oh! I'm a Christian Scientist".

The same thing is true about eating. Mrs. Eddy says in heaven we shall neither eat to live nor live to eat and as heaven is a divine state of Mind, according to Mrs. Eddy, this won't be necessary is reached.

Suppose that "give us this day our daily bread" didn't mean just exactly that to Mrs. Eddy. I think it is beautiful to see everything in a God-like way, even bread - rivers - names, etc. as Mrs. Eddy did. You know that the All-Wise creator knows the needs of His children - He is perfectly capable of taking care of His children and supplying their needs. We should rather pray for the grace of God to be in us - that we should be free from strife and all other blessings will come to us. As for the selection, "There is no Life, Truth, Intelligence or Substance in Matter" no one can say that there is. This is irrevocably true.

So, my dear Rabbi Silver, I'm a Jewess who has taken up Christian Science and I find that I can be more loyal to God - more near Him and worship Him in more Truth than I ever did before. Before studying Christian Science I was a student of Judaism and Christian Science is a fulfillment of, or rather the logical result of Israel's devotion to the One Almighty God.

I hope I have not intruded by writing this. Human beings do not have to be agreeable on every single point in order to be compatible and 'tho we may differ, yet we can be friends and obey the Golden Rule. Oh! how I hope that that one error, preaching against another's religion in the house of God may be abolished forever!

I will say, that in spite of our apparent differences, I enjoyed your lecture and was glad to be there to hear it.

Would you mind dropping me a line, assuring me that you don't consider it wrong for me to have taken up your time in this way?

My dear Rabbi Silver:

Some of the things you say in your "Design for Living" recipe in yesterday's Cleveland Press interest me a great deal. At the outset let me say that I think you have contributed an unusually splendid formula to all of us seeking, perhaps less successfully than yourself, to form a philosophy of life in these changing times. I hope that some day I can define mine as precisely as you had defined yours.

At least since it became evident to me that the world wide depression was much more fundamental and deep rooted than it had at first been supposed. I have been trying to formulate a philosophy toward the change that has been going on all about us. I felt that I could not form any worth while philosophy without a comprehensive study of the past, especially as history relates to the economic and sociological experiments of past governments and past civilizations in dealing with a great many of the problems we find today under new guises. That I have been doing over the past three years.

Naturally, I approach my philosophy study through the medium of economic principles, as you probably approach yours through a deep interest in sociological study. I do not see that that necessarily leads either of us into error, or into unsound conclusions, if we pursue our whole study with an open mind.

My fundamental conclusions, reached as a result of this study, is that we are faced with the necessity of far reaching, fundamental reform of our economic and social structure, while at the same time seeking to cling to some of the old verities, what you call "certain human ideals which are indispensable to any age, regardless of its intellectual, political or economic complexion."

I find myself in the center, as it were, shuddering for fear that the overwhelming, terrific pressure for change all about us will carry us into an over-indulgence or excess of change which would sweep away with the bad those things you and I regard so highly from the past, and on the other hand, fearing change will not be intelligently directed, will bring reactions and counter-agitation, resulting perhaps in a discrediting of so many of the changes we doubtless would urge in common.

I think there never was a time when same minds were more in need for direction of the course of change, and freer, open outlook more in

demand to warn us against the seeds of destruction in unwise change as against the fruits of advance, in wise change. Men like yourself can render a tremendous service to the nation in these times, it seems to me, in pointing out the distinctions and the opposite ends to change.

For myself, I can say that I would rather sacrifice some of the reforms that I think are badly needed in our economic system, if the type of changed required to bring them about would sweep us into an anti-religious complex such as grips Russia. I find from personal contact with many of the young liberals and radicals in our universities today that many of them are thinking in terms of an intellectually administered economic and social society that would reject religion. For myself I cannot stand for a moment with them in that desire.

Perhaps I am essentially, by nature, a conservative. I do not think the terms liberal and conservative are wholly expressive, although they do offer us the opportunity to align our general philosophy with one or the other schools. If I could design a middle ground for myself I would continue as conservative as the multiplication table and as liberal as the advancement of science. I would advocate change when the need for change has been proved, but I would reject change when it tends to lead us into fields proved dangerous by past history, or unproved by any previous human experience.

I like especially that paragraph in your article in which you stress the old-fashioned social values and virtues. I fear we are coming to lose sight of their inherent, fundamental worth. They are outwardly so unattractive in this day when so many social experiments are gilded with the lure of adventure. So I rejoice to see you giving them their due, holding fast to them with an abiding faith that only by their preservation can the human race steer clear of the pitfalls.

I think probably that is why I liked your "design" so much. You are a little to the left of the center and I am a little to the right of the center, measured by current political and social yardsticks, but when it comes to a recognition and an adherence to these "abiding social values," I am happy to note that we see altogether alike.

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
