My dear Mr. Silver:

If your name was not Silver I could not account for your irreverent letter to me. You express amazement at my failure to answer your several communications. A Silver should know better. Letters have a way of answering themselves if let alone. I have never subscribed to the dictum be approximately why should a Silver have to answer everybody?....

So you are going to celebrate the twenty-fifth anniversary of the Hebrew Union College Monthly. Why? Are you acquainted with all the literary horrors which the Monthly has perpetrated upon its readers, fortunately few and mostly impounded, since its first issue? Personally, I have long since done penance for the sins which I committed during the first (and most notable) year of its publication. Are you sufficiently repentant? And the long line of editors, from Silver to Silver, who, each in his day, labored and brought forth - a Monthly? Should we not rather "bow down our heads as a bull-rueh" (what an appropriate term for an editor) "and spread sackcloth and ashes under us" (what a splendid suggestion for an editor's chair).

Go through the files and see the rich treasures of golden emerods and golden mice with which the undergraduates, who suffered from great discomfiture by reason of their "Weltschmerz", filled the columns of the Monthly. Is there any contributor who ever offered his literary first fruits to this magazine who did not, ten years later, bite his knuckles and lament the fact that he had not carried out the Biblical law concerning the offering of first fruits - "Thou shalt put it into a basket"?...

And speaking of undergraduates - what about the Faculty? Did they not drop into the helpless and desolate hopper of the Monthly whatever was not grist for Mr. Silver -2-December 2, 1937. the mill of a real publication? And the Alumni - how often did they slip over a "nefel tamun" sermon on us in the guise of an essay. And the moles and the bats of the editorials which we wrote. And the poems and the songs which we published - what a tinkling they made with their flat feet! And all the other literary fillets and crescents and pendants of the sons of the daughter of Zion in their Monthlies. And the portraits which were published each year of the graduates! Was it only the Lord who looked down from Heaven upon them and smiled?.... And you wish to be congratulated on twenty-five years of this? And you a Silver! I founded the Monthly in order to have a place wherein to publish a few articles of mine which other magazines had thoughtfully rejected. Cunningly, I allowed a few other students to print their rejected material also, so as to give the impression of broadmindedness. In my day, remember, there were many men in the College who "could not discern between their right hand and their left, and also much cattle " - so that I could put over my scheme without much difficulty. I never intended the magazine to outlive me as editor. I felt cruelly betrayed when, year after year, the Monthly kept on appearing under editors who had taken the cue from me and had outplayed me at my own game. "Who so keepeth the fig tree shall eat the fruit thereof." You've got the fig tree now, Brother Silver! On that I congratulate you - with "Yasherkes" - as one Silver to another. Dear Rabbi Silver,

You want to know why we are celebrating our 25th anniversary? We might reply that with so many mapalahs round about us, it is justifiable to invent a simcha. And invented this one was. For it is not 25 yrs. but 23 yrs. since your first issue saw the light of scholarly eyes. But some editors, with superb disregard for figures, lost count and lo and behold this year's volume is no. 25. And since we need money badly, we are exploiting this accident by making much fuss about the 25th Anniversary and inviting all & sundry to congratulate us on reaching our maturity. We are strictly adhering to the term Silver Anniversary so that if any demurrer is raised, we can rejoin that it is a Silver Anniversary in honor of the first and latest editors. To others who may protest, we shall point out good historical analogies for observing the 25th year when there are only 23. After all, there werent really twelve tribes of

I know I haven't answered your question, "Why The Monthly?" One good raison d'etre is the relief it gives some students from the ennui of classes. The Monthly is, furthermore, the only magazine wherein Reform Rabbis can mingle without rubbing shoulders against a Jewish Committee-man or Congress-man or, l'habdil, a professional journalist. What this country really needs is a bigger and better Monthly. We can't promise you a Jewish Century overnight, but the magazine is today a far cry (which sometimes sounds like a shriek to be sure) from the academic repository of slightly used theses, sermons, and bibliographies that it was in years gone by.

Whatever a Silver is he cannot be among those described by Isaiah (12.17) as those "who do not pay attention to a fellow-Silver." I appeal to you, therefore, in the name of the name we share not fail me, but to let me have in a few weeks a brief guest editorial. If you don't, I'll reprint one of those articles which you seem to regard as literary indiscretions of your youth (for I've got vol. 1 in our morgue).
