My dear Rabbi Silver; ---I herewith enclose you copy of a letter addressed to Mr. Loeser, by Mr. Goldhamer, which contains the minutes of the two meetings concerning which I spoke to you. With reference to the meeting of Oct. 18th, you will note that Mr. Goldhamer records me as present. I was absolutely not at that meeting. As a matter of fact, he stated to me that you were present at that meeting, but that you had come in after the action had been taken. You will note by this record that Mr. Eisenman's argument was that we "should not attempt to interpose objections to the manner of services to be conducted" on account of the fact that we had sold a burial lot. Mr. Eisenman forgets that we levy quite a number of restrictions on people who buy lots, as for example, the headstone, vases, etc. I am simply sending this to you as a memorandum, in order that we may think out a reconsideration of this action. Dear Mr. Loeser; --The following excerpts from minutes of meetings of the Board of Directors of the United Jewish Cemeteries will acquaint you with the action taken relative to the matter of ritual at burial services: Minutes of the meeting of October 15, 1919 (a) Present Messrs. Feiss, Halle, Levy, Lowenstein, Silver, Stone, and Wolsey; (b) Paragraph 6 -- "Rabbi Wolsey called the attention of the Board of the fact that on several occasions, religious services had been held at funerals in Mayfield and Willett Street Cemeteries, which were not in accord with the ritual of service of the Jewish Synagogue, and expressed the opinion that such service should not be permitted in a Jewish Cemetery. It was therefore, moved, seconded, and carried that

of the Congregations."

(a) Present Messrs. Feiss, Baumoel, Eisenman, Halle,

no ritual or service which does not conform to the established Jewish religious Service, be permitted at funerals in Mayfield or Willett Street Cemeteries, unless first submitted for approval to the one or the other of the Rabbis

Levy, and Wolsey;

(b) Paragraph 2 -- "The Secretary read the minutes of the meeting of October 15, 1919, which were approved as read with the exception of Paragraph 6, referring to a resolution that no ritual or service should be permitted at funerals in Mayfield or Willett Street Cemeteries unless first submitted for approval to one or the other of the Rabbis of the Congregations. Mr. Eisenman said that he was not present at the meeting when this resolution was adopted else he should have voted against its adoption on the ground that the Cemeteries Association, having sold a burial lot to anyone, should not attempt to interpose objection to the manner of service to be conducted. On motion made by Mr. Levy, duly seconded, and carried, the previous action of the Board on this resolution was rescinded, and the question was left open for further discussion at the next meeting of the Cemeteries Board,

My dear Mr. Goldhamer: --

I wish to enter a formal complaint to the United Jewish Cemeteries Board, as to the conduct and the policy of Warden Mr. Rindfleisch.

I was asked by the family of one of the members of this congregation, namely Mrs. Victor Mandel, to officiate at the funeral of her husband. I stated that I would officiate if the funeral could be arranged for Monday, the notification of his death having been given to me Sunday noon! I made this provision because I am compelled to leave Cleveland this evening, for Cincinnati. The family was more than willing to conform to the requirement.

However, when the family made arrangements with Mr. Rindfleisch, he definitely laid down the condition that the funeral would have to take place on Tuesday, because the announcement did not give him sufficient time to dig the grave. This is the third or fourth time that I have been compelled to face this ruling of Mr. Rindfleisch, though in the case of the soldier, Herbert Goodman, he reversed his ruling and dug the grave, when pressure was brought to bear upon him by the officers, indicating that he could dig the grave if he put his mind to it. We provide him with two men for this work, and it seems to me that they could have a grave dug in eight hours, if they were industrious about it. They have done it before, and they surely can do it again.

The very obvious result of such a ruling would mean that we may have no funerals at Mayfield on Monday, unless he is notified on the Friday morning previous, that is, allowing for no work on Saturdays or Sundays.

The burden of my protest is therefore against Mr. Rindfleisch's policy, which means that we may not bury our dead at the time that is most convenient for us. In this particular case, his attitude is responsible for two funerals on Tuesday, and fixing the hour for the first funeral at Mayfield at 1:30, which is highly inconvenient both for the mourners and for their friends.

The charge I am making becomes much more serious when I say to you that I happened to see him at the cemetery yesterday, and he told me that the family had come to the cemetery and made arrangements for the funeral for Tuesday. In other words, he put the re-

sponsibility for the day of the funeral upon the family, when as a matter of fact he had definitely forbidden the family to have the funeral on Monday -- in other words, he is guilty of a bit of mental dishonesty in this instance.

I have had this experience three or four times during the last four or five years, and the matter has now come to such a pass that I must formally present to the Board of the United Jewish Cemeteries, the request that Mr. Rindfleisch be told very definitely that he must reverse his unaccommodating policy, or that his connection with the United Jewish Cemeteries be terminated.

Febry-18-1924 Re-statement of the Terms and Conditions of Joint Ownership of Mayfield and Willet Street Cemeteries for Adoption by the Tiffereth Israel and Anshe Chesed Congregations. The Cemetery on Mayfield Road shall be known as the Mayfield Cemetery: the two Cemeteries on Willet Street shall be known as the Willet Street Cemetery. 2. The two Cemeteries shall be under the control and management of a Committee, to be known as and styled the Board of Governors of the United Jewish Cemeteries. The Board of Governors shall have power to adopt such rules and regulations as they deem expedient for disposing of and conveying burial lots; and to prescribe rules and regulations for interments and for the operation of the Cemeteries; and to establish rates and charges for the sale of plots and for their upkeep, and for any other service which they may be called upon to perform incidental to the maintenance of lots, graves and decorations thereon; the Board of Governors is also empowered to receive funds entrusted to them by lot and grave owners for Perpetual Service and to invest and reinvest such funds in such securities as are authorized for trust funds or savings banks in this State. 4. The Board of Governors shall consist of ten members, viz: four Trustees from and the active Rabbi of the Tiffereth Israel Congregation and four Trustees from and the active Rabbi of the Anshe Chesed Congregation. 5. The Board of Governors shall be elected as follows: At the Annual Meetings of the Boards of Trustees of the Tiffereth Israel and Anshe Chesed Congregations, each Board shall elect from its members, four Governors to serve two years and until their successors have qualified. If the office of any Governor becomes vacant from any cause, his successor (who must be a Trustee of the same Congregation as the Governor whose office shall have become vacant) shall be appointed by the Board of Trustees of his Congregation for the unexpired term. 6. The Board of Governors shall keep an accurate account of all receipts and disbursement, and of their accounts and proceedings, and they shall make full reports of the operation of the Cemeteries and such other matters as they deem necessary, annually to the two Congregations for their approval. 7. After all debts against the Cemeteries have been paid and cancelled, the Board of Governors shall annually, after reserving a sum sufficient in their judgment to meet the ordinary expenses for the improvement and care of the Cemeteries, divide all surplus funds equally between the Tiffereth Israel and Anshe Chesed Congregations. The Board of Governors shall have power to sell and dispose of lots and graves in these Cemeteries to such individuals and organizations and on such terms and conditions as said Board in its discretion may determine. Deferred payments shall be evidenced by notes bearing interest at the rate of six per cent per annum.

Regulations to be Adopted by the Board of Governors of the United Jewish Cemeteries of Cleveland,

Board of Governors and Officers

- Section 1. The Board of Governors shall, at their annual meeting in September, elect the following Executive Officers: Chairman, Vice Chairman and Treasurer, from their own number, and a Secretary, who may or may not be one of their own number; all these officers to serve one year or until their su cessors are elected and have qualified.
- Section 2. The Chairman shall preside at all meetings and perform such other duties as usually appertain to the office.
- Section 3. The Vice Chairman shall, during the absence or disability of the Chairman, act in his place, be clothed with all his powers and perform all his duties.
- Section 4. The Secretary shall keep a record of the proceedings of the Board of Governors, issue all notices of meetings and permits for interments and improvements on lots under regulations hereinafter provided; make out all bills for dues and other charges and pay all money received to the Treasurer; draw all orders on the Treasurer, render a quarterly report to the Board of Governors of all transactions; keep a register giving the name, age, residence, place of nativity, whether married or single, and cause of death of the person to be interred, and also the number and location of the lot, and perform such other duties as the office demands.
- Section 5. The Treasurer shall receive all the moneys collected on account of the Cemeteries, and pay the same only on orders duly signed by two of the Executive Officers.
- Section 6. The Chairman shall appoint such committees as may from time to time be authorized by the Board of Governors.
- Section 7. Any officers or employees having custody of moneys, securities or other valuable property of the Cemeteries, shall give surety bonds in such amount as may be prescribed by the Board of Governors.
- Section 8. All books and papers relative to the Cemeteries shall always be open to the inspection of the Board and to the Committees of the Tiffereth Israel and Anshe Chesed Congregations.
- Section 9. The regular annual meeting shall be held in the month of September and special meetings may be called from time to time either by the Chairman or upon request of two members of the Board. Five members shall constitute a quorum at any meeting for the transaction of business.
- Section 10. All funerals shall be subject to such rules and regulations as the Board of Governors may prescribe.

- Sec. 11. Upon full payment for lots or graves, the owner shall be given documentary evidence of his right, title and interest therein and a Trust Fund Agreement providing for the perpetual care thereof. No transfer of a lot may be made while there is any indebtedness against the lot, and shall not be made without the written consent of the Board of Governors.
- Sec. 12. Lot owners shall pay such annual care tax as may be prescribed, unless their lots have been provided for in Perpetual Care.
- Sec. 13. (a) Resident lot owners paying an annual care tax, shall, upon ceasing to be members of the Tiffereth Israel or Anshe Chesed Congregations, at once arrange for the Perpetual Care of their lots at the established rates, and in addition, may be assessed such an annual tax as the Board of Governors shall determine.
- (b) Resident lot owners whose lots are in Perpetual Care, may, upon ceasing to be members of the Tiffereth Israel or Anshe Chesed Congregations, be assessed such an annual tax as the Board of Governors shall determine.
- (c) Non-resident lot owners, paying an annual care tax, shall upon ceasing to be members of the Tiffereth Israel and Anshe Chesed Congregations, at once arrange for the Perpetual Care of their lots at the established rates.
- Sec. 14. Lot owners neglecting or refusing to pay their annual tax or other assessments levied for the period of three consecutive years, or failing to provide for Perpetual Care of their lots as provided for by Section 13, may within thirty days after the accrued arrearage, above specified, be notified by the Secretary of said arrearage, by a registered letter sent to their last known post office address, as shown by the records of the Cemetery Board, and provided said arrearages are not paid on or before thirty days after date of the mailing of said letter, which letter shall be deemed sufficient notice, then such lot owner shall forfeit all right, title and interest in and to such lot and the title of same shall immediately revert to and vest in the Board of Governors of the United Jewish Cemeteries, without any further notice or action, legal or otherwise, on its part, and said lot owner is forever afterward debarred from asserting any interest in or to said lot.
- Sec. 15. No interments may be made nor work of any kind done in or about a lot without an order in writing from the Secretary, and no such orders may be issued for lots against which any charges have accrued.
- Sec. 16. No headstone, marker, monument or mausoleum may be erected in the Cemetery until sketches, drawings and plans indicating materials, design, finish and size and proposed inscription thereon have been first submitted to and approved by the superintendent or the Board of Governors. No mausoleum plot shall be sold to a prospective purchaser until such approval of plans for the mausoleum has been granted by the Board of Governors.
- Sec. 17. All foundations for headstones and monuments shall be constructed by the Cemeteries, upon order of the lot owner, and charged to him at the established prices.
- Sec. 18. When circumstances warrant, free burial may be provided to members of the Congregations or to non-members at the discretion of the Board of Governors.
- Sec. 19. The Superintendent or his assistant must be present at every interment, and it shall be his duty to open and close the grave.

Perpetual Care.

Section 20. Perpetual Care of lots and graves shall consist of cutting, sprinkling and re-sodding the grass, filling in graves when sunken, keeping headstones and cornerstones vertical and in general, keeping the lot neat, clean and in good order. Such care shall include the cleaning of the interior of mausoleums, when provided on mausoleum lots. No lots shall be received in Perpetual Care unless in condition satisfactory to the Board of Governors.

Section 21. When the plans and location for a mausoleum have been approved and the lot paid for, the owner of the proposed mausoleum shall also pay to the Board of Governors a sum sufficient to endow the building for its care and maintenance. This amount shall be determined by the Board of Governors, and in no event shall be less than 10% of the original cost of the mausoleum.

Section 22. Perpetual Care of lots or graves shall be on such basis per square foot as may be prescribed from time to time by the Board of Governors and in no case less than \$100 per lot or \$25 per grave, and such rates shall apply to all lots sold after the adoption thereof.

Section 23. The Board of Governors shall establish rates from time to time and upon request, for the planting of myrtle or other foliage, and its perpetual care; for the annual planting and care of flowers, and for such other service as the Cemeteries may be called upon to perform for lot owners.

Section 24. (a) The moneys received for the purpose of "Perpetual Care" shall constitute the "Perpetual Care Trust Fund."

- (b) This Fund shall be under the direction and care of the Perpetual Care Trust Fund Committee, composed of the Chairman of the Board of Governors and one member of the Board, representing each of the two Congregations, appointed by the Chairman with the approval of the Board.
- (c) This Fund shall be separately deposited or invested, from time to time, by the Committee, the signatures of two of whom shall be necessary for the withdrawal of any moneys from banks, or trust companies, or the disposition of any of the securities. The moneys shall be invested and reinvested, from time to time, only in such securities as are authorized for trust funds or savings banks in this State; the income only of such funds shall ever be used, and shall be used for the Perpetual Care of lots and grawes entitled thereto.
- (d) All acts of said Committee shall be subject to the approval of the Board of Governors, and such Committee shall make annual report to the Board of Directors, which shall submit said report to the annual meeting of the Congregation.

Amendments

Amendments to these Regulations may be proposed at any meeting of the Board of Governors and if adopted by them, shall be submitted to the Trustees of the Tiffereth Israel and Anshe Chesed Congregations for approval. The affirmative vote of the Board of Trustees of both Congregations shall be necessary to adopt the amendments.

You undoubtedly know my position in the matter but for the sake of your record I wish to put my position in writing.

would be establishing an unfortunate precedent if we would permit the burial of Non-Jews in Mayfield Cemetery. Other such cases will occur undoubtedly in the future and we shall find ourselves greatly embarrassed. Again I anticipate a great deal of criticism should this fact become known. Our cemetery is consecrated ground and dedicated to the Jewish dead. If Jews and Non-Jews are to be buried in the same cemetery there is no valid reason why our community should have a distinctively Jewish cemetery.

One would of course wish to accommodate a family which is desirous of having the burial of their Non-Jewish friend in Mayfield Cemetery but there are principles and precedents involved.

- Report of the Board of Governors of the United Jewish Cemeteries to a Joint Meeting of the Boards of Trustees of the Temples, relating to the Mayfield Mausoleum.
- In April, 1935, nearly a year ago, the Board of Governors of Mayfield Come tery came before a joint meeting of the Boards of the two Temples with a proposal for the erection of a Mausoleum in Mayfield Cemetery.
- It was pointed out at the time, that proposal for the erection of the Mansoleum was found imperative for the following reasons:
 - First, because the land remaining for development and sale in Mayfield Come tory, was hardly sufficient to meet the fleeds of the present membership beyond a period of possibly ten years:
 - Secondly, because it was found impossible to secure land adjacent to the present Cemetery within a reasonable price for Cemetery development;
 - Third, because the purchase of land elsewhere, even the obtainable within a reasonable distance from the City and at a price reasonable for Cemetery development, was inadvisable on account of the great cost involved in duplicating Buildings, Roads and other facilities, and the duplication of administrative overhead.
 - It was also pointed out that the erection of a Community Mgusoleum was desirable for the following reasons:
 - First: Because a Mausèleum structure offered the best solution of the problem of conservation of space--- more entombments being possible over the same area of ground space;
 - Second: Brownes all facilities and cost considered, Mausoleum entombment represented no greater outlay for the purchaser than ground burial;
 - Third; Because this type of entombment was far more sanitary and not as repellent as ground burial;
 - Fourth: Because the Mausoleum by reason of its heating and ventilating facilities, offered opportunity for visitation the year nound:
 - Fifth: Because the Mausoleum Structure represented a thing of beauty and permanence;
 - Sixth: Because the custom of Mausoleum entombment is fast being adepted throughout the country, both for economy of space and for reanitation, safety, beguty and permanence.

- It was also set forth to the Temple Boards, and subsequently to the Temple Membership, that the future of this project rested upon their voluntary Mcceptance of it; that the estimates of cost to the purchasers, contemplated no profit; and that no sales program other than the proposal by mail, was planned.
- The Board of the Cemeteries has waited for an indication of the interest of the members, evidenced by their subscriptions for space, and while it has occasioned no surprise that great numbers have failed to evince such an interest, it has been cause for concern that but few seemed to have given that to the subject.
- The Cometeries Board is necessarily concerned because it is charged with the responsibility of making proper and adequate provision for the future needs of the Temple Nembership.
- The Cometeries Board appreciates that such needs are least regarded by the average person because the incidence of death is far remote and there is naturally a strong aversion against any plans for it.
- Hevertheless the problem as it relates to the whole membership, will be a very present one within a few years; plans for the Mansoleum cannot be further gone into until at least two-thirds of the estimated cost of the structure is assured by subscriptions; time must be allowed for preparing plans and specifications, the securing of bids and such further changes as may then be necessary; and more than ordinary time must be allowed for the finishing of interior space suited to the wishes of those who select private rooms and family sections.
- As already stated, the matter has been presented to the entire Membership in brochumes describing and illustrating fully the project and explaining in detail, the basis for subscription and payment.
- The Cemetery Board has made no provision for the sale of this space upon a commercial basis; private Mansolea are sold upon a basis which allows a liberal commission and the rates established for space in the Mayfield Mansoleum represent therefore, a saving to the Membership.
- Furthermore, the Cemsteries Board does not deem it proper to detract from the voluntary aspect of this project by recourse to sales compaign.
- This the Board feels ought not to be necessary; nor does the Board feel on the other hand that the project will, with what presentation has been made, or is possible by mail, sell itself.

It has had its appeal to a few far-seeing and thoughtful persons who appreciate the importance and desirability of preparedness in all things— there have been enquiries from such persons and sales of space to them will no doubt by consumated in the near future; but to the rank and file of membership only the development of this interest by word of mouth discussion, can avail, and it is for the purpose of asking your co-operation, that the Board of Governors has requested this meeting.

The Board Members of the Temples have a co-responsibility with the Cemeteries Board in the matter; they can acquaint themselves fully with the reasons and the necessity for the project, with the advantages which it has to offer and with the basis of sale of space. Thus prepared they can do much to help create the interest necessary to a more serious consideration by the Membership at large.

The attention of the members of the Temple is again directed to the announcement recently issued by the Board of Governors of Mayfield Cemetery respecting construction of a Community Mausoleum.

As indicated in this announcement, ground space for burial in Mayfield Cemetery is limited and the Mausoleum offers a solution of this problem for those who would avail themselveýof this type of burial.

The project is, so far as is known, the first of itskind undertaken by any Church or Temple group in this country; all existing structures of this kind have been projected as commercial enterprises for profit.

It is in the interest of the Temple membership that the Board of Governors has developed the plan for the Mausoleum and the membership is urged to give the matter due consideration so that sufficient subscriptions may be received for space to warrant the construction of the Mausoleum.

The building will be beautiful in design and offers to the members, burial space at cost, in keeping with the present cost of ground space burial besides including many advantages over the outdoor interment.

These advantages together with a description of the structure and conditions for the sale of space are contained in a booklet already mailed to members, and copies of which may be had upon application to the office at Mayfield Bemetery, 2749 Mayfield Road or by telephone, Fairmount 1733.

The Sale of
Burial Place in
Mayfield Cemetery

for

Non-Members

of

The Temples

To Members of The Temple and the Euclid Avenue Temple.

At a Meeting of the Board of Governors of Mayfield Cemetery held on November 1st, 1928, the following Regulation was adopted after having been approved by the two Temples:

"On and after November 1st, 1928 no burial place in Mayfield Cemetery shall be sold for the burial or entombment of any person who, at the time of death, is not a Member in good standing of either the Anshe Chesed or the Tifereth Israel Congregations."

IN OTHER WORDS:

- (a) No Temple Member can hereafter buy burial space in Mayfield Cemetery or in the proposed Mausoleum for the burial of anyone except the immediate family consisting of Husband, Wife and unmarried children.
- (b) No non-member of the Temples will be permitted to buy space in the Cemetery by joining either of the Temples at the time of a death in the family.

Owing to the lack of adequate Regulation, it has been found that approximately 25% of the burials in Mayfield Cemetery during the past two years have been non-member interments. This has been possible through the fact that Members of the Temples have taken advantage of the opportunity to purchase space

in their own names for the burial of non-members; and also because it has been possible for non-members to join The Temples at the time of a death for the sole purpose of purchasing ground in the Cemetery.

- The Board of Governors with the Trustees of the two Temples felt therefore that same action was necessary, and this Regulation is adopted for the purpose of conserving the space in Mayfield Cemetery and in the proposed Mausoleum, for the use of the Members of the two Congregations to which the Cemetery facilities belong.
- It is understood, however, that the adoption of this Regulation does not prohibit the burial of non-member relatives of Temple Members who own lots purchased prior to its adoption and who may wish to use such burial space for the interment of non-member relatives. It is further understood that an immediate family shall consist of Husband, Wife and unmarried children, to whom the use of lots are restricted but exceptions may be made by the Board of Governors in the case of dependent relatives living with such member families or in the case of dependent parents of such Temple Members.
- It is the intention of the Board of Governors of Mayfield Cemetery to adhere strictly to this rule and the co-operation of the members will be appreciated.

A special meeting of the Temple Board of Trustees was held at the Temple on Tuesday evening, July 8th, 1930.

In the absense of Mr. Wolf, president, Mr. S. M. Gross, vice president, presided and the Mollowing Board members attended: Henry F. Klein, Sidney N. Weitz, Milton P. Altschul, Benj. Eowenstein, Clarence Hays, Benj. F. Klein, Robert Gries, Mrs. R. C. Norberg.

This meeting was called for the purpose of adopting the following resolution:

WHEREAS, the Anshe Chesed Congregation of the City of Cleveland and the Tifereth Israel Congregation of the City of Cleveland are the joint owners of the Mayfield Cemetery, so-called, situated on the northerly side of Mayfield Road in the County of Cuyahoga and State of Ohio, and have authorized, and are now proceeding with, the erection of a mausoleum upon a portion of the said cemetery in the furtherance of the uses and purposes for which said cemetery is owned and operated by said Congregations; and

WHEREAS, in connection with the payment of part of the cost of the erection of said mausoleum building it is necessary for said Congregations to borrow certain monies pending the sale of space in said amusoleum and the collection of the sale price thereof;

NOW, THEREFORE, to that end, BE IT RESOLVED that the Tifereth Israel Congregation of the City of Cleveland in the City of Cleveland in the consummation, from time to time, of loans from the National City Bank of Cleveland in an aggregate principal amount of not more than One Hundred Fifty Thousand (\$150,000.00), which loans as and when the same are consummated from time to time, shall be evidenced by the joint and several promissory notes of the Tifereth Israel Congregation and the Anshe Chesed Congregation, made payable to the order of the National City Bank of Cleveland on note forms as prescribed by said Bank, bearing interest at the rate of 6% per annum and payable four months after their respective dates.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the President or Vice President and Secretary or Treasurer of the Tifereth Israel Congregation execute such notes in behalf of the Tifereth Israel Congregation; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the proceeds of said loans be deposited in the mausoleum construction account of said two Congregations, to be disbursed in connection with the payment of the cost of erecting and completing said mausoleum; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the President or Vice President and Secretary or Treasurer of the Tifereth Israel Congregation be authorised to execute in the name of the Tifereth Israel Congregation, from time to time, renewal notes, with the Anshe Chesed Congregation as joint and several co-maker thereof, for the purpose of evidencing said loans and or such parts thereof as may from time to time remain unpaid and that said notes and any and all renewal notes so executed shall be direct and primary obligations of the Tifereth Israel Congregation as join and several co-maker with the Anshe Chesed Congregation.

It was moved by Mr. Weitz, seconded by Mr. Henry Klein, that the resolution, as presented, be adopted and that the Temple officers be authorized to join the the officers of the Anshe Chesed Congregation to negotiate for a loan for the mausoleum in an amount not over \$150,000.00. The motion was unanimously carried.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned.

Mr. Benjamin Lowenstein, Vice Chairman of the Advisory Committee for the building of Mayfield Mausoleum presided, and stated that the Meeting had been called to give the Advisory Committee an opportunity to present to the Temple Boards, the status of the Mausoleum Project and to secure the necessary further approval and authority to proceed with construction of the Mausoleum and to borrow such funds as might be needed by the Committee to complete the building.
- 3. The Chairman then called upon Mr. S. M. Gross, head of the Building Committee, who related briefly the progress made to date in the preparation of plans and specifications for the Mausoleum and in securing bids and estimates on the cost of completing the building.
- Mr. Gross stated that in his opinion, the Committee had selected as Architects who were eminently qualified by experience extending back over many years, to plan the Mausoleum.
- Mr. Gross stated further that an estimate of cost based on actual and tentative bids received to date, indicated that the Mausoleum might be built at approximately a cost of \$400,000. including Architects fees and Commissions paid to Mausoleum salesmen.
- 4. In the absence of Mr. Clarence J. Hays, Chairman of the Finance Committee, Mr. Lowenstein called upon Mr. Goldhamer to present the financial data.
- 5. Mr. Goldhamer reported that the Mausoleum sales to date amounted to \$320,983. representing in excess of 50% of the total sales value of the Mausoleum and 60% of the actual entombment space available in the building.

Cash on Hand in the Mausoleum Fund amounted to \$27,173.03 and there was available from payments on subscriptions within nine months of breaking of ground, the further sum of \$203,808. making a total of \$230,981, against a requirement of \$180,000. for construction payments; within a year from date of breaking of ground, there will be available \$266,500. against the need of approximately \$330,000. indicating that a loan of about \$65,000. may be required. However this does not take into account probable future sales which may to a considerable extent offset any shortage of funds.

6. In pursuance of the purpose of the meeting, the following resolution was pre-

sented for adoption:

"The Board of Governors of Mayfield Cemetery, having sold 60% of the space in the proposed Mayfield Mausoleum in accordance with the authority granted by the Trustees of the Anshe Chesed and Tifereth Israel Congregations in joint Meeting assembled on April 16th, 1925, it is hereby resolved by the Trustees of the Congregations meeting jointly on July 1, 1929, that the Advisory Committee for the Building of the Mayfield Mausoleum be authorized further to proceed at once, thru its duly appointed Building Committee, to construct the Mayfield Mausoleum in accordance with plans and Specifications drawn, and to do any and all things which in the discretion of the Board of Governors may seem necessary or proper to consumate said project."

On motion of Judge Bernon, duly seconded by Mr. Gus Bamberger, the Resolution was unanimously adopted.

7. The following resolution was then proposed:

"And it is further resolved that the said Advisory Committee for the building of the Mayfield Mausoleum, shall thru its duly appointed Finance Committee, be authorized to borrow in the name of the Temples as Owners of the Mausoleum, such money as may be needed for the completion of the Mausoleum, and to arrange with the Executive Officers of the Temples, for such loans."

On motion of Mr. Irwin Loeser, seconded by Mr. David S. Kohn, the resolution was unanimously carried.

g. The following additional resolution was offered by Mr. David S. Kohn, in order as Mr. Kohn explained, to make valid all past actions and work of the Board of Governors, the Advisory, Building and Finance Committees in respect to Mayfield Mausoleum Project:

"Resolved that all acts by the Cemeteries Board, the Building Committee and the Financial Committee be ratified and approved with respect to the

Mausoleum Project."

A motion for the adoption of the resolution was seconded and duly carried.

No further business coming before the meeting, it was adjourned.

An Important Message to the Members of the Temples —



This is an Important Message to the Members of the Temples With an Urgent Request for your Personal Reply

Dear Friend:

In December 1930, the Board of Governors of Mayfield Cemetery, having acted under instructions of the two Temples, completed the building of the Mayfield Mausoleum.

The purpose of the building, was to make available increased burial facilities in the restricted area of Mayfield Cemetery, for the large membership of the two Temples, whose families did not yet own burial ground.

The Mausoleum included Private Rooms of several Crypts each, selling at the more substantial prices to make possible the building of this permanent and beautiful structure; and Individual Crypts at minimum prices for single entombments.

The Individual Crypts represented about one-half of the total of 850 burial spaces in the Mausoleum, and they were sold singly or in groups of two or more, faster than the more expensive Rooms.

In fact before the Mausoleum had been completed, the sale of these Individual Crypts had proceeded so rapidly that it was necessary to limit their sale further only to member Families where deaths occurred.

Despite this restriction upon the sale of Individual Crypts, but sixteen are now left; while in the meantime many members of the two Temples have made application for the purchase of such spaces, which applications could of course not be accepted.

The Board of Governors feels now that the matter has become pressing and that the needs and requests of the member Families, if they can be definitely ascertained, should be given attention, and additional Crypt space constructed.

To this end, we are asking each member, whether he is prepared at this time to consider purchase of space or not, to please indicate his interest in the project.

Will you help us by sending your reply on the enclosed Card at once to Mr. Sam M. Gross, the Chairman of the Mausoleum Building Committee.

The contemplated added wing to the Mausoleum will still further involve us in this practice which is contrary to the letter and spirit of the rules adopted for the Cemetery by the Temples. To the Members of the Anshe Chesed and Tifereth Israel Congregations:

- On September 5th, 1933, we advised you that there were practically no individual Crypts remaining for sale in the Mayfield Mausoleum; and that the very few Crypts remaining could therefor be sold only to families in which a death occurred.
- There has on the other hand been a continued demand for space in the Mausoleum in preference to the ground space in the Cemetery due to the fact that Mausoleum entombment has come to be recognized as the ideal and economical method of burial.
- As a result of these conditions, the Board of Governors of Mayfield Cemetery, felt that the situation demanded immediate consideration of a further enlargement of the Mausoleum facilities to provide additional single and Companion Crypts for those who need the less expensive spaces.
- In our notice to the members last September, we asked them to indicate by mail, who were interested in the purchase of Mausoleum Space; and while a sufficient number evinced an interest to warrant the Board of Governors in proceeding further in the matter, it will be necessary to have evidence of a like interest on the part of more members before the Temple Boards can be expected to authorize actual construction.
- A tentative Floor Plan of the contemplated Wings, together with a price list and terms of sale of space, are here attached.
- If you are interested and these extensions cannot be built unless a sufficient number of members do purchase space please so advise us by return Card here enclosed, and a representative will call upon you to present the matter further with plans and detailed specifications.
- The Board of Governors of the Cemeteries has devoted considerable of its time and attention to endeavor to prepare for the inevitable future requirements of the membership of the Temples; and to that end the expansion here proposed is imperative.
- Acting as the Board does, voluntarily in behalf of the interests of the members, your co-operation becomes a matter of vital importance.

My dear Mr. Lowenstein:

I regret that I will not be able to attend the meeting of the Board of Governors of the United Jewish Cemeteries on November 26th.

I should like to register my vote against borrowing any further from the Permanent Improvement Fund for principal and interest payments on the loans made at the National City Bank. To my best knowledge, no such authority was granted in the last few years to borrow money from the Permanent Improvement Fund for such purposes, although money was borrowed without authorization. This money belongs to the congregations, representing profits from the operation of the cemetery. The congregations, too, have mortgages to pay off, but they have been unable in recent years to pay off their mortgages—which, at least in the case of our Temple, is far greater than that of the cemetery—at any such rapid rate as the cemetery seems to be anxious to do in paying off its indebtedness.

The Board of The Temple has appointed a Fact-Finding Committee to look into the whole matter of the Cemetery Board's indebtedness to the congregation, and until the Board of The Temple, which, together with the Board of the Euclid Avenue Temple, owns and controls the cemetery, has had an opportunity to express an opinion. I strongly urge upon you not to divert any further monies from the Permanent Improvement Fund; else I shall find myself compelled to ask the Board of The Temple not to renew the notes at the bank.

My dear Mr. Meisel: The Gemetery situation, as I see it, is very clear but unfortunately it has been befuddled by men who are unacquainted with the rules and regulations under which the Cemetery operates or who have not fully adjusted themselves mentally to the fact that the Cemetery is not an independent institution and that its Board is only a committee acting in papels of the congregations. Under the terms and conditions of the Union of the United Jewish Cemeteries, adopted in 1890, revised and amended in 1909, 1913, 1916 and 1933 (Section 8, page 3 of the enclosed booklet), it was ordered that: "After all debts against the Cemeteries have been paid and cancelled, the Board of Governors shall annually, after reserving a sum sufficient in its judgment to meet the ordinary expenses for the improvement and care of the Cemeteries, for one year, divide all surplus funds equally between the Tifereth Israel and Anche Chesed Congregations." Such surplus funds did accumulate over a period of years, between 1917-1929, and at a time when the Cemeteries had no outstanding indebtedness, but they were never divided between the congregations. By 1917, the Cemeteries had paid off all their indebtedness and from then on until 1929, a period of 13 years, they contracted no new debts. The Cemetery Board of Governors ignored the clear direction of the above constitutional provisions which was to allow the congregations to have the profits derived from operating the Cemeteries -profits which many congregations in the United States derive from

their cemeteries -- some of them as high as twenty to thirty thousand dollars a year, and which help in a very material way to meet their budgets.

Instead of distributing these surplus funds they were put into this amortisation fund in 1920, created by the Cemetery Board, (when there were no debts to be amortized) later called the Permanent Improvement Fund. This action was never approved by the congregations and there was no provision for it in the constitution. There was no need for such a fund inasmuch as there already existed a Perpetual Care Fund (Cemeteries' Trust Fund) whose purpose it was (Section 21A, page 9 of this booklet), to finance the general care and maintenance of the Cemeteries and also "for any umusual construction or repair that may in the judgment of the Board of Governors be required.

The constitution d d not contemplate that all profits of the Cemeteries should be kept in reserve to meet some future eventuality when extraordinary large sums of money would be required for construction purposes. This is clear from Section 5, page 3: "After reserving a sum sufficient in its judgment to meet the ordinary expense for the improvement and care of the Cemeteries for one year"the surplus funds are to be divided between the congregations. Whenever a large project must be undertaken, e.g., the construction of the mausoleum, the congregations would normally be called upon to borrow money for it.

At the time of the building of the mausoleum, this Permanent Improvement Fund, representing the surplus profits of the Cemeteries, had in it a sum of \$20,000 in investments and \$3805 in cash balance. Total \$23,805. Since that time \$22,709 has been borrowed from this fund. There is today a sum of \$11,000 left. If no borrowings had been made, this fund would today have \$33,709, all of which is money belonging to the congregations.

The Cemetery Board is continuing to borrow from this fund at the rate of over \$1000 a month to pay off interest and capital on the mausoleum loan which today amounts to \$62,000. The Cemetery Board recognizes the loan character of the money taken from the Permanent Improvement Fund. But while it is eagerly paying off the bank loan it is making no effort and has made no provisions for the paying off of its loan to the Permanent Improvement Fund. In fact, it is quickly eating up this fund to pay off the bank indebtedness.

With the constant talk which has been going on at the sessions of the Cemetery Board relative to the building of additional

Max Meisel 40 3es November 27, 1934. wings to the mausoleum, thereby contracting additional indebtedness it seems hardly likely that this money borrowed from the Permanent Improvement Fund will ever be paid back. The congregations. therefore, and those members of the Temples who own grave lots in the Cemeteries are thus being taxed to subsidize crypt owners in the mausolean.... The contention that the Cemetery Board cannot distribute these funds to the congregations because the Cemetery has debts to pay off may be applicable to such funds accumulated since the debts were contracted, but is clearly not applicable to those funds which were held back from the congregations prior to the building of the mausoleum when the Cemeteries had no debts whatsoever. Thus a sum of \$23,805 is due the two congregations and instead of being returned to the congregations, it is being quickly dissipated in borrowings to pay off the mausoleum loan. There is no clear reason why the mausoleum bank loan of \$62,000 should have to be amortized so rapidly while our own congregational mortgage loan which is nearly three times as large, can be paid off at much smaller annual rates. This entire matter has been discussed over and over again, in fact ad nunseam at meetings of the Cemetery Board. At one time the Board sembers had actually voted upon the amount which should be distributed, but always someone, at the decisive moment, either got cold feet or was prevailed upon not to vote. And always sufficient legal hair-splitting, on the part of those who were unacquainted with the constitution and by-laws under which the Cemetery Board was operating was introduced to delay action. It seems to me that our Temple Board ought to direct its representatives on the Cemetery Board to vote affirmatively for the repayment to the congregations at a certain fixed amount annually - an amount at least equal to what is being paid on the lean to the bank -- of the monies which belong to the congregations, and that thereafter, and as soon as the mausoleum debt is paid off, the surplus profits of the Mayfield Cemetery shall be distributed annually and automatically to the congregations. Dear Rabbi:

The Board of Governors of the Cemeteries, at its Meeting held on Monday, November 26th, received your letter in which you setforth to the Chairman, your objection to the further borrowing of moneys from the Permanent Improvement Fund for the payment of interest and principal amortization of the Loans made of the National City Bank for the completion of the Mayfield Mausoleum.

The Board met to consider among other things, what securities of the Permanent Improvement Fund should next be sold, when and as money may be needed for such interest and amortization payments. The Members did not feel that their duty and responsibility in the use of these funds and in the repayment of the Bank Loans, were in question but that this duty and responsibility were definitely implied and stated in the actions of previous Governing Boards and of the Temples themselves.

Under the circumstances the Members deemed it their duty to continue to meet the payments on the Loans as they come due, and it was moved, seconded and unanimously carried, that in the absence of necessary income from the sale of further Mausoleum space, or from the collection of outstanding accounts of Mausoleum sales, the Officers be authorized to make further borrowings from the Permanent Improvement Fund, selling securities of the Fund as money may be needed.

The Board desires to setforth again the provisions and actions of previous Boards and the Temples upon the basis of which they are now acting:

From the Terms and Conditions of the Union of the two Congregations in the ownership and operation of Mayfield and Willard Street Cemeteries:

Section 7. Receipts from all sources, except donations to the Endowment Fund, shall be applied by the Board of Directors to the improvement and care of the Cemeteries and to the payment of all other obligations.

Section 8. After all debts against the Cemeteries have been paid and cancelled, the Board of Directors shall annually, after reserving a sum sufficient in their judgment to meet the ordinary expenses for the improvement and care of the Cemeteries for one year, divide all surplus funds equally between the Tiffereth Israel and Anshe Chesed Congregations.

The action of the Board of Directors (Governors), after the Capital indebtedness of the Cemeteries was finally paid off in 1917, in setting up an amortization Fund(since called the Permanent Improvement Fund), "for the development of the Cemeteries."

The joint action of the Temples, after having been apprised of the failure of the Board of Governors, to be able to negotiate the purchase of additional ground, in authorizing the building of the Mausoleum Structure and the borrowing of Funds for its completion.

My dear Max:

The report which you plan to draft and the resolutions which are to be presented to the Boards of the two Temples for action should contain the following items.

- (1) The Permanent Improvement Fund which was established some time in the early twenties (it seems difficult to ascertain the exact date) by the Cemetery Board, was never authorized by the congregations and there is no provision for such a Fund in the Constitution of the United Jewish Cemeteries. The monies which accumulated in this Fund represent the surplus profits of the Cemetery over a period of years and should have been distributed annually to the two Temples in accordance with the constitutional provision. (Section 8 of Terms and Conditions of the Union) This was not done. Monies were borrowed from this Fund without the authorization of the congregations to pay interest and amortization charges on the Mayfield Mausoleum. The Boards of the Temples should now be asked to legalize these loans and such other loans as may be made from this Fund until such time as the entire indebtedness on the present Mayfield Mausoleum is paid off. Thereafter these loans should be repaid to the Temples as quickly as possible before any new building indebtedness (such as for a possible extention of the present Mausoleum) is incurred.
- profits derived from the operation of the Cemetery and the Mausoleum shall automatically, in compliance with Article 8 of the Constitution, be divided annually between the two Temples (19) future building debts of the Cemetery shall prejudice the payment of these annual. surpluses See & Tolumber 1997
- (3) The Permanent Improvement Fund should at once be abolished. It is a misnomer and a misleading term. Whatever

To the Members of the Board of Governors of Mayfield Cemetery and Officers of the Temples: At a Meeting of the Board of Governors of Mayfield Cemetery, held on August 17th, 1933, it was resolved to have a Committee appointed to ascertain, by examination of the financial status of the Cemeteries, whether there were any surplus funds available which might be distributed to the Temples, under the Terms and Conditions of the Union of the two Congregations in the ownership and operation of Mayfield and Willett Street Cemeteries, as set forth in Sections 7 and 8 thereof. The Sections are as follows: Section 7. Receipts from all sources, except donations to the Endowment Fund, shall be applied by the Board of Directors to the improvement and care of the Cemeteries and to the payment of all other obligations.

Section 8. After all debts against the Cemeteries have been paid and cancelled, the Board of Directors shall annually, after reserving a sum sufficient in their judgment to meet the ordinary expenses for the improvement and care of the Cemeteries for one year, divide all surplus funds equally between the Tiffereth Israel and Anshe Chesed Congregations.

The undersigned were appointed by the Chairman to examine into the question; and a meeting for the purpose was held on September 13th, with the Chairman, Secretary and Clerk of the Cemeteries Board. Audited Statements and Records of financial operations extending back nearly twenty years were submitted, together with the status of present existing funds and the Cemeteries' indebtedness.

It is your Committee's judgment, in the light of the past financial experiences of the Temples in the operation of the Cemeteries, and particularly in view of the present financial status due to the further necessary expansion of the Cemetery facilities by the construction of the Mayfield Mausoleum, that it would be unwise for them to offer any recommendation other than that the Officers of the Temples and the Board of Governors itself, review these data before arriving at any decision for the distribution of present funds.

We have therefor requested the Clerk and the Secretary to prepare in brief form your study and consideration, the operating and financial history from the time of the purchase of Mayfield Cemetery to date. There is in our judgment, reflected in this experience more concretely the problems with which previous Boards of the Cemeteries have been concerned and those with which the present Board and the Temples must be prepared to deal.

In 1890, the Tiffereth Israel and Anshe Chesed Congregations, having owned and operated independently, sections of a Plat of ground now known as Willett Street Cemetery, and the Tiffereth Israel Congregation having purchased another Plat of Ground now known as Mayfield Cemetery, an agreement was entered into by the two Congregations for the joint ownership and operation of both of these burial grounds. The Sections previously quoted in this statement are a part of the Terms and Conditions of the Union.

The ground space for Mayfield Cemetery, containing about 20 acres, was bought in 1889 at a cost of \$6,667. Initial expenses incurred in improving the ground for the purposes of burial and sale of space to members, amounted to \$9,800 more, or a total of \$16,467. This outlay was financed in part by a Mortgage Loan of \$4,000 negotiated with the Montefiore Home and by the issuance of interest bearing Bonds for a total of \$10,600, which Bonds were sold to members of the Congregations in denominations of \$100 to \$500. The Temples themselves added \$879 each from their respective Treasuries, and assumed the mortgage indebtedness.

It was necessary of course at all times to continue the development and improvement of the burial facilities of the Cemetery in advance of the needs and the sales of space to members, and the Temples therefor refinanced their loans and borrowed additional funds, from time to time, remaining in debt on account of the Cemeteries for nearly thirty years or until 1917 when a final payment of \$7,000 was made to the Jewish Orphan Home, discharging a Mortgage Loan of \$12,000 made in 1908.

For the entire period from 1890 to 1932 inclusive, Capital expenditures for Ground, Buildings, Roads, Landscaping, Drainage, Water Lines, Fences, and Permanent Reconstruction and Repairs, amounted to \$197,337; adding to this the Cost of the Mayfield Mausoleum, \$432,000, the total Investment in the Cemeteries, amounts at present to approximately \$630,000.

During the same period, 1890 to 1932, there was expended for current maintenance of the Cemeteries, a total of \$286,914.

Summaries of the year by Capital and Operating Receipts and Disbursements, are submitted herewith, grouped chronologically into four periods. These periods indicate important adjustments in the management and administration of the Cemeteries, as dictated by changing conditions and demands. With each period reference is made to the experiences and changing conditions which prompted the actions of the Temples in adopting new regulations governing both the sales of space and the imposition of new taxes and other costs upon the lot owners and purchasers.

1. Years 1890 to 1912 inclusive

Capital Account Income for this period \$ 101,047

At the conclusion of this period, a change was made in the Account and Record keeping of the Cemeteries, and a comprehensive Audit of the financial operations which had been prepared incident to the change, revealed to the Board perhaps for the first time, the futility of its efforts to pay off the Mortgage indebtedness under a plan of operation whereby the current operating expenses of the Cemeteries exceeded annually the operating income, making necessary the continual absorption of Capital funds derived from the sale of ground space, for such maintenance deficits.

It is interesting to note here that the Regulations adopted in 1890, permitted the sale of space only to the members of the two Congregations which owned the Cematerics. In 1891 the Regulations were amended to permit the sale of space "to members of any regularly organized Jewish Congregation in the City of Cleveland"; and while the records do not mention the reasons for this change, no doubt the inability of the Temples to sell space to members more rapidly, and the feeling that there was more than ample ground for the members' needs, led to this decision. However, the Regulations were again amended in 1900, restricting the sale to members only.

Consideration was also given during this period to the possibility of encouraging members to set aside endowment for their lots; and in 1907, the Regulations were amended excluding endowment 'donations', from use for current operating purposes. In 1909 the first Regulations setting up schedules for Perpetual Care of lots and graves, were adopted, and while this was a step in the direction of encouraging more stable income for Cemetery upkeep, the law was only permissive and very little was received from lot owners for the purpose.

2. Years 1913 to 1916 inclusive

During this time, intensive study was given to means for placing the administration of the Cemeteries on a sounder business basis, balancing outer with income through adequate charges for all services performed. It was not until late in 1916 that laws were enacted effecting these necessary changes, and the results are of course not evident prior thereto.

3. Years 1917 to 1923 inclusive

- In November 1916, Regulations were edepted by the Temples effecting the following changes in the sale and care of lots, all for the purpose of increasing and stabilizing the revenue for Cemetery maintenance:
 - a Perpetual Care was made compulsory for all lots sold thereafter:
 - b An Annual Care Tax, calculated according to the size of lots, was charged against all lots owned unless such lots were already provided with Perpetual Care; and irrespective of whether such lots had interments in them or not. Prior to this time a flat rate of four dollars was charged only against lots which had burials; and Perpetual Care, as already stated, was optional.
 - c The Board authorized the setting aside each year of all sums received from the sale of lots (exclusive of Perpetual Care) into a Permanent Improvement Fund to be used only for the improvement of the Cemetery, expansion of burial facilities, and payment of Capital indebtedness. There was of course no Capital indebtedness from 1917 until the Mausoleum was completed in 1929.

4. Years 1924 to 1932 inclusive

(It should be noted that the two periods, 1917-1923 and 1924-1932, were periods of rising costs in Cemetery operation.)

During 1923 further by-laws were adopted to increase operating revenue, and the entire plan of administration of Mayfield cemetery was changed. Up to this time the Superintendent received a nominal annual wage from the Temples but derived his main income from charges which he made for services per-

formed for Lot owners, and from Gratuities. The Cemeteries Board paid for all of the Labor which he used in performing these services. Not only did this plan work out to the disadvantage financially of the Temples, but there was always more or less criticism of the Superintendent by those who felt that better attention was given the lots of those who tipped him, than to the others.

Under the new arrangement, an Office was established at Mayfield Cemetery, a Clerk was placed in Charge, the Superintendent was put on a straight Salary, and all charges were thereafter made through the Cemetery Office and payable into the Cometeries' treasury. It was possible thus also to ascertain what the individual services cost and how much to charge for them.

While the Cometeries Board which was in control in 1911, began at that time to realize that the ground space in Mayfield Cometery would be inadequate for the needs of the rapidly growing memberships of the two Temples, all efforts to purchase adjacent ground from the Rockefeller interests failed the offers were made up to \$12,000 per acre. In about 1925 attention was directed to the possibilities of Mausoleum construction. It should be noted here that had the efforts of the Board to buy additional land been successful, in 1912, the Temples would today have been quite heavily in debt as a result of the large expenditure which would have been involved.

Turning to the present fine cial condition of the Cemeteries;

At a joint meeting, held on January 16, 1935, of special committees representing Tifereth Israel Congregation and Anshe Chesed Congregation, appointed to consider certain phases of the cemetery laws and cemetery funds of the United Jewish Cemeteries, and at which meeting there were present on behalf of Tifereth Israel Congregation

following resolutions were unanimously adopted and the approval thereof recommended to the Boards of Trustees respectively of the two Congregations:

RESOLUTION (a):

RESOLUTION (c):

That the Board of Governors of the United Jewish Cemeteries is authorized and empowered to make loans from said Surplus Fund for the purpose of liquidating the principal and interest of the outstanding indebtedness on the present Mayfield Mausoleum until such time as such indebtedness is entirely liquidated;

That, when and as such present indebtedness shall have been paid, then such loans, as have heretofore been made and/or which may hereafter be made out of said Surplus Fund, shall be repaid to the Surplus

Fund as rapidly as possible and thereafter shall be disbursed to the two Congregations in the manner and form as provided under the Terms and Conditions of the Union of the United Jewish Cemeteries;

That, subject to the limitations herein provided for, all surpluses derived from the operation of the cemeteries and the Mausoleum shall be divided annually between the two Congregations, in accordance with the Terms and Conditions of the Union, and that no future building debts of the United Jewish Cemeteries shall prejudice the payment of the annual surpluses.

RESOLUTION (a):

That the Board of Trustees of each Congregation recommend to its respective Congregation that Article VII and Article VIII of the Terms and Conditions of the Union be respectively amended so as to read as follows:

ARTICLE VII: Receipts from all sources, except
(a) donations to the endowment fund and (b) proceeds realized
from the sale of Mausoleum space, shall be applied by the
Board of Governors, to the extent required, for the improvement and care of the cemeteries and the Mausoleum.

My dear Max:

I am very grateful to you for the splendid manner in which you handled the meeting yesterday afternoon. I think we made definite progress. I should like to have your help in drafting, in exact form, the resolutions which were adopted. Mr. Rosenthal asked me to send him a copy of it. I presume that the procedure is to submit these resolutions for adoption to the Boards of the two congregations, then to be forwarded to the Cemetery Board which will draft an amendment to Section 8 of the Terms and Conditions of the Union, which in turn will be submitted to the Boards of the two congregations for approval. If this is incorrect, please advise me.

The resolutions adopted are as follows:

Thereafter these loans shall be reapid to the two congregations as quickly as possible before any new building indebtedness (such as for a possible extension of the present Mausoleum) is incurred.

After the present Mausoleum debt is paid off, all profits derived from the operation of the Cemeteries and the Mausoleum shall automatically, in compliance with

My dear Rabbi:

Herewith I acknowledge the receipt of your letter dated January 17th.

You are correct in assuming that the declaratory resolutions shall be submitted for adoption to the loard of Trustees of the respective Congregations and such adoption [17] automatically bind the Board of Governors of the United Jewish Lemeteries; the amendment to Article VIII, however, must follow a different procedure. Thile there is express power in the Board of Governors to initiate any amendments to the Laws and Regulations, there seems to be no power either express or implied to initiate any amendment or change in the "Terms and Londitions of the Union". I take it, therefore, that this latter agreement, having been adopted by the Congregations, as such, the proper procedure will be for the Boards of Trustees to recommend to the Congregations the amendment desired, the adoption of which, of course, will make its operation effective and binding upon the Board of Governors.

I have drafted for your guidance what appears to me to be a presentable report, but I have reversed the order of the Resolutions particularly with reference to the change of name, because I want the Surplus Fund, as such, to be the designated nomenclature for the future accumulations, repayments and disbursements.

As to the amendment to Article VIII. It seems to me that an amendment to Article VIII without a corresponding amendment to Article VII will not accomplish the purpose of the strict legalists. The language in Article VII "to the payment of all other obligations" will in my opinion raise the same implication with reference to future indebtedness. Therefore, it would appear that we should try and do a whole job and cover the

The few Crypts remaining for sale in the Mausoleum, can only be sold to member families in which a death occurs; and there has developed a continued demand for space in the Mausoleum in preference to space in the Cemetery, owing to the more ideal and economical method of burial represented in the Mausoleum plan.

As a result of these conditions, the Board of Governors of Mayfield Cemetery feel that the situation now demands immediate consideration; and that a further enlargement of the Mausoleum facilities to provide the less expensive single and companion Crypts, is essential.

A tentative Floor Plan of the contemplated Wings. together with a price list and terms of sale of space, are here attached.

Mr Clarence Goldsmith, a member of the Board of Governors, will call upon yourself and the others who have indicated an interest, to explain the plans further, and to receive the subscriptions of those desiring to purchase space.

As we stated to you before, the Board of Governors is acting purely in a voluntary capacity in behalf of the Temple Members; we are endeavoring to make preparation for the future and inevitable requirements of the member families; the extensions to the Mausoleum cannot be built unless the members in sufficient number, do purchase space.

Your co-operation in the matter is therefore of vital importance.

ARTICLE VII: Receiptes from all sources, except (a) donations to the endowment fund and (b) proceeds realized from the sale of Mausoleum space, shall be applied by the Board of Governors, to the extent required, for the improvement and care of the cemeteries and the Mausoleum.

ARTICLE VIII: The Board of Governors shall annually, after reserving a sum sufficient to meet the ordinary expenses for the improvement and care of the cemeteries and Mausoleum and the payment of current operation for one year, divide all surplus funds annually between the Tifereth Israel and Anshe Chesed Congregations; no purchase of additional land for cemetery purposes or any extension of the present Mausoleum shall affect the division of the funds herein provided for.

It was moved by Mr. Meisel and seconded by Mr. Weitz, that the resolution recommended by the joint Fact-Finding Committee be adopted. The motion was carried.

Pursuant to instructions we have examined the financial records of the United Jowish Cemeteries for the year ended December 31, 1936, and present herewith our report of its financial activities, together with our comments.

SCOPE OF EXAMINATION

The verification of the various funds consisted of treeing all recorded receipts into bank deposite; checking disbursements against cancelled check vouchers, invoices and such other data as was on file in the office of the United Jouish Comsteries. Balances shown to be on deposit in banks as of December 31, 1936 were verified by direct communication with depositories. Recorded sales of cometery lots, graves and Mausoleum space were traced into the property account.

Security activities for the year 1936 were examined and all securities held on December 31, 1936 were accounted for by an inspection on January 27, 1937 at the safe deposit department of the National City Bank of Cleveland, Ohio in the presence of Mesers.

David Skall and Samuel Goldhammer, Access to the safety deposit box

of the United Jewish Cometeries may be had by any two officers.

Insurance policies were also examined at this time.

GENERAL COMMENTS

We personally supervised, the mailing of statements of balances due the various funds from debtors which were unpaid on January 19, 1937. We attached the following label to all statements:

That is the "Surplus Fund", which is to be divided between the congregations. May I recall to you the action which was adopted back in 1935 to amend the terms and conditions of the Union in connection with the United Jewish Cemeteries. "Article VIII: The Board of Governors shall annually, after reserving a sum sufficient to meet the ordinary expenses for the improvement and care of the cemeteries and Mausoleum and the payment of current operation for one year, divide all surplus funds annually between the Tifereth Israel and Anshe Chesed Congregations; no purchase of additional land for cemetery purposes or any extension of the present Mausoleum shall affect the division of the funds herein provided for." Mr. Levy informed me, this morning, that Mr. David Skall has been raising the issue which we discussed at the last Cemetery Board with the board of his Congregation and that he has been pressing you for a special meeting of the Cemetery Board to take up his report. - 1. There were present; Benjamin F. Klein; Chairman and Messrs. Adolph Keller, Clarence I. Goldsmith, Rabbi Brickner, Sidney N. Weitz, Eugene L. Geismer, Milton P. Altschul, Rabbi A. H. Silver, J. H. Rosenthal and Harry Levy.
- 2. The Minutes of the Board Meeting of January 21st, were read and with a correction noted in Paragraph 8, were approved.
- 3. Mr. Geismer gave a brief report of a Special Committee meeting held in his office on April 4th, following some discussion, it was moved, seconded, and carried by those present, that a new Committee called the Finance and Investment Committee be appointed by the Chairman to look into the advisability of making some changes in the Financial setup at Mayfield Cemetery.
- 4. It was moved, seconded and carried that the Chairman appoint a Mausoleum Committee to make a study of the remaining unsold rooms; the Board suggested that inquiry be instituted to see if some capable salesman might be engaged to sell to families or groups of families; also that a Ground Committee be appointed, this Committee to visit the Cemetery and keep in touch with the problems of administration for report back to the Board.
- 5. The Audit Report was referred to the Finance Committee for further study and recommendations.
- 6. The Board approved the request of the Chairman for an increase of 40 cents a day for labor at Mayfield Cemetery; regarding the Caretaker of the Mausoleum and the Superintendents of Mayfield and Willet Street Cemeteries it was referred to the Finance Committee.
- 7 The Chairman recommended that large lots in section 8 be re-surveyed into two grave lots, it was the feeling of the Board that the matter should be referred to the Ground Committee.
- 8. Permission was granted to Mrs Wm. Hopfman, to leave in her Will, the sum of \$1,000.00, to the United Jewish Cemeteries for a Trust Fund, the income to be used for the care and filling of the Vase; also cleaning Vase and Markers.
- 9. The Board gave its approval that Article C of Section 13 be amended to read as follows;

NON-RESIDENT owners, paying an annual tax, shall upon ceasing to be members of the Tifereth Israel or the Anshe Chesed Congregations, at once arrange for the payment of any indebtedness due to either congregation and for the Perpetual Care of their space at the established rates. Such sum representing the indebtedness due to either congregation, shall when collected be remitted to the congregation of which the space owner was last a member.

10. No further business coming before the meeting it was adjourned.

Comment

There are 17 securities in this account with a current market value of \$248,572, producing gross annual income estimated at \$7,539. Bonds represent 98% of the market value and a single holding of common stock, the remaining 2%. In addition there is a Certificate of Interest in the Mortgage Participation Trust Fund formerly held by the Guardian Trust Co. as Trustee, with an unpaid principal balance of \$17,150.

The fund is unusually well invested and the conservative policy which has been followed is reflected in the investment of 78% in United States Government securities. There are only two holdings - \$5,000 American & Foreign Power Co. Deb. 5s of 2030 and 102.46225 shares of the Mutual Mortgage & Investment Co. stock - which might be regarded as speculative. Both of these have fair prospects of resovery, but the total gain which might result would be relatively small in relation to the fund as a whole. It is suggested that these holdings be sold and the proceeds invested in securities more in keeping with the quality of the other investments in the fund.

Because of the different tax status of various Government issues, it frequently happens that an owner not subject to Federal income tax finds it advantageous to buy the recent taxable issues rather than the older issues having some tax exempt features. Whether or not it would be desirable to make changes in this account depends upon many considerations, such as cost of the present holdings, maturities, the possibility of buying more Series G Defense Bonds next year, and so on.

If those who direct the investment of the fund care to consider making changes of this sort, we would be glad to discuss the matter with them. The following is one example of what might be done.

- "3. During the term of this Agreement the Board retains the right to direct the sale, lease, exchange, investment, reinvestment and general management of the property. The word "management" as used herein shall include (without limiting its generality) the right to give proxies, to exercise rights and to consent to mergers, recapitalizations and reorganizations and all proceedings of a similar nature in connection with any securities held hereunder. Any authorization, direction or instruction concerning the sale, lease, exchange, investment, reinvestment and management of the property given to the Agent shall be in writing signed by the Treasurer and Chairman of the Finance Committee of the Board or by any two officers of the Board or by whomsoever the Board may designate, or in the form of a resolution of the Board duly certified by its Secretary. The Agent shall be fully protected in relying upon any such writing or resolution, and shall be responsible only for failure to follow any authorization, direction or instruction given in the manner provided.

The Agent agrees that its Trust Investment Committee will, from time to time, as in the judgment of its Trust Investment Officers such action shall be required, review and examine the property held hereunder, and will submit to the Board in writing its recommendations, if any, as to sales, and changes in the form of investment thereof, and as and When any funds are received from any sale or other disposition of any property the Agent will promptly advise the Board thereof and submit with such advice the recommendation of its Trust Investment Committee for the investment of such funds."

MEMORANDUM

Summary of Meeting of Finance Committee of United Jewish Cemeteries, held April 23, 1942 at the office of Savid Skall

There were present David Skall, B. F. Kline, Clarence Goldsmith, Mrs. Campbell, Mr. Harry Rosen and Sidney N. Weitz. It was concluded:

- 1. All monies, securities and accounts receivable in the Mayfield Mausoleum Trust Fund and the Mayfield Mausoleum Fund be transferred to the Perpetual Care Trust Fund.
- 2. The Permanent Improvement Fund be abandoned and all monies, securities and accounts receivable therein be transferred to the Surplus Fund.
- 3. All unsold saleable lots, improved and unimproved real estate in Mayfield and Willet Cemeteries and all unsold space in the Mausoleum as of December 31, 1941, be set up in a Capital Account.
- 4. In the sale of lots the amount received for Perpetual Care be allocated to the Perpetual Care Trust Fund and the amount received for the purchase price of the lots be divided equally between the General Fund and the Surplus Fund.
- 5. The proceeds from the sale of Mausoleum space, commencing with January 1, 1942, be divided as follows:

25% to the Perpetual Care Trust Fund

75% to the General Fund

6. All income realized from the investments in the Perpetual Care Trust Fund shall belong to the General Fund.

- 1. The following Board members were present: Benj. F. Klein, Chairman Rabbi A. H. Silver, Sidney H. Weitz, Mugene Geismer, Harry D. Koblitz, Rabbi B. R. Brickner, James H. Miller, Mmil Elder, Bernard I. Pincus and Leo S. Bamberger of the Temples.
- 2. The minutes of the meeting of September 26, were approved as read.
- 3, With reference to the election of Officers; Benj. F. Klein, Chairman was re-elected. James H. Miller was elected Vice Chairman, to succeed Myron A. Cohen. Sidney N. Weits, Treasurer, to succeed Bernard B. Eisenberg.
- 4. The Board approved an increase on the following items:

 Planting ivy on grave \$20.00 increased to \$30.00

 Annual care charge on ivy beds after the first year 9.00

 Flower beds \$15.00 increased to 25.00
- 5. The Secretary was instructed to have cards printed, and mailed, to lot owners, that had not replied to our letter regarding the annual charge for ivy.
- 6. It was moved, seconded and carried, that Mr. Koepke be permitted to purchase lumber and paint for a new fence at Mayfield Cemetery at a cost of approximately \$1,100.
- 7. The Board approved the suggestion of Mr Koblitz that we send out to the Temple Membership a card advising them of the price of Crypts now available. The Secretaries of the two Temples was instructed to confer with Mr. Koblitz in reference to the card.
- 8. The Board approved an increase of .10 cents per hour for labor.
- 9. It was moved, seconded and carried that salaries be increased as follows: Mr. Koepke \$475.00. Mrs Campbell \$300.00. Mr Page at Willet St Cemetery \$200.00.
- 10. On motion made by Mr Weitz, which was seconded by Rabbi Silver, and carried, the Secretary was instructed to transfer \$10,000, from the General Fund to the Surplus Fund.
- 11. Mr Geismer made a motion, which was seconded by Mr Keblitz and carried, that the Board of Governors divide \$10,000, of the Cemetery funds between the two Temples.
 - 12. No further business coming before the meeting, it was adjourned.

Gentlemen:

We have made an examination of the financial records of the United Jewish Cemeteries for the year ended December 31, 1952 and submit herewith our report on its financial activities, together with our comments.

SCOPE OF EXAMINATION

The verification of the cash transactions of the various funds consisted of tracing all recorded cash receipts into bank deposits and the examination of cancelled checks, invoices and other data on file in the office of the United Jewish Cemeteries, in support of recorded cash disbursements for the period, with the exception of checks outstanding at December 31, 1952.

Balances shown to be on deposit in banks at December 31, 1952 were verified by direct communication with the depositories.

Recorded sales of cemetery lots, graves and mausoleum space were traced into property accounts and debtor accounts.

Recorded security transactions of the Perpetual Care Trust Fund were examined for the year 1952 from the various statements presented by The National City Bank of Cleveland, Trustee and Agent. We received a signed certified statement direct from the Trust Department of The National City Bank of Cleveland verifying the securities held and the principal cash balances of this fund at December 31, 1952. We did not make an inspection of these securities at the bank.

GENERAL COMMENTS

Statements of balances due the various funds from debtors (with the exception of eight, three whose graves are listed for resale, and five who have been charged for ivy planting which has been removed) were mailed under our supervision. We stamped on each mailed statement a request that debtors who do not agree with the balances shown by their statements, communicate directly with us. As of this date, one statement has been returned to our office for lack of sufficient address. One statement has been returned by the debtor claiming a lessor amount due than shown by your records. However, debtor was claiming no liability for graves he holds for resale, and we were able to reconcile his statement of liability to your records.

Balances due from debtors, as at the close of the fiscal years ended December 31, 1951 and December 31, 1952 are presented below in tabular form, classified as to the original dates of the unpaid charges:

During the year under examination \$15.00 was received by the General Fund in payment of accounts previously written off.

The results of the Mausoleum Project from its inception to the close of the year under examination are shown in Exhibits "G" and "H".

The deficit up to December 31, 1952 was \$5,292.58, a decrease of \$4,908.41 from December 31, 1951. A condensed analysis of space sold follows:

In Exhibit "F", Schedule "l", we present the detailed list of securities held, which reflects a total market value of \$372,485.25 as against a total cost of \$395,896.60. This schedule was prepared from a certified inventory of the Agency Account, Trust No. 2248AG, The National City Bank of Cleveland, as rendered direct to us as of December 31, 1952.

Income received from securities during 1952 was accounted for and traced into the Perpetual Care Trust Fund. The amount of \$9,797.20 representing income on securities of the Perpetual Care Trust Fund must be transferred to the General Fund.

During the year Mausoleum Space Sales totalled \$9,550.00; \$4,650.00 was collected. One-fourth of this amount or \$1,162.50 was transferred from the General Fund to the Perpetual Care Trust Fund.

The sum of \$900.00 was transferred from the General Fund to the Perpetual Care Trust Fund. This represents the three-fourths remainder of receipts from sale of Columbaria in Private Rooms 22 and 23 after the transfer mentioned in the immediately preceding paragraph. The transfer is in repayment of a loan from the Perpetual Care Trust Fund.

It is to be noted that on the Schedule of Accounts Receivable presented in the preceding pages, the sum of \$6,400.00 due the General Fund on Sale of Mausoleum Space includes \$1,500.00 due for resale of a crypt.

The sum of \$7,640.50 was transferred from the General Fund to the Surplus Fund. This amount represented 50% of the 1952 collections on sales of lots and graves.

Receipts from lots, graves and masoleum space sales are deposited in the General Fund. The above percentages of receipts transferred are in conformity with action of the Board of Governors at a meeting on April 30, 1942.

Valuation at sales prices of Salable Lots, Graves and Improved Ground was submitted by the office staff of the United Jewish Cemeteries.

The inventory of unsold space as set forth in Exhibit "E" was not verified by the auditors by physical count. No valuation has been placed on other properties.

Note "A" - In 1952, the \$10,000.00 distribution to The Temples cambe from the General Fund; in prior years, such distributions came from the Surplus Fund. This accounts for the fact that the Surplus Fund at December 31, 1952 shows a principal balance whereas at December 31, 1951 it had a deficit.

Note "B" - Capital Assets Fund does not yet reflect any valuation for improvements made to Section 7 of Mayfield Cemetery in 1951 and 1952 at a total expenditure of \$14,374.51, as lots in this section are not yet available for sale and no selling price has been determined for them.



- Communicate with your Funeral Director for further arrangements.
- Communicate with the Clerk at the Cemetery office, Fairmount 1733, or with the Superintendent at the same number, to give necessary information about the time and other arrangements for the funeral.

THE SUPERINTENDENT MUST BE GIVEN AT LEAST 36 HOURS ADVANCE NOTICE OF FUNERALS.

- If you have no burial plot in the Cemetery, have someone go to the Cemetery promptly to secure the plot.
- 5. No funeral may be held until a permit has been issued by the Clerk of the Cemeteries, and no permits may be issued for burials where there are any unpaid charges against the plot and until these charges are paid.
- No denominational service or ritual, other than the Jewish, is permitted at funerals held in the Mayfield or Willet Street Cemeteries.
- If you desire a Service at the house of mourning after the funeral, please arrange for this in advance with the Rabbi.

From The Terms of the Union of the Mayfield and Willet Street Cemeteries

Mayfield and Willet Street Cemeteries are owned jointly by the Tifereth Israel (The Temple) and the Anshe Chesed (Euclid Ave. Temple) Congregations; the two cemeteries are under control and management of a committee known as the Board of Governors of the United Jewish Cemeteries.

The Board of Governors is empowered to adopt such rules and regulations as they deem expedient for disposing of and conveying burial lots; and to prescribe rules and regulations for interments and for the operation of the Cemeteries; and to establish rates and charges for the sale of plots and for their up-keep, and for any other service which they may be called upon to perform incidental to the maintenance of lots, graves and decorations thereon: the Board of Governors is also empowered to receive funds entrusted to them by lot and grave owners for Perpetual Service and to invest and re-invest such funds in such securities as are authorized for trust funds or savings banks in this State.

Excerpts of Regulations Adopted by the Board of Governors of the United Jewish Cemeteries February 18, 1924.

Funerals

Sec. 10. All funerals shall be subject to such rules and regulations as the Board of Governors may prescribe.

No denominational service or ritual other than the Jewish shall be permitted at Funerals held in the Mayfield or Willet Street Cemeteries.

Sale of Lots and Graves to Members

Sec. 11. Upon full payment for lots or graves, the owner shall be given documentary evidence of his right, title and interest therein and a Trust Fund Agreement providing for the Perpetual Care thereof. No transfer of a lot may be made while there is any indebtedness against the lot and shall not be made without the written consent of the Board of Governors.

Annual Taxes:

- Sec. 12. Lot owners shall pay such annual care tax as may be prescribed, unless their lots have been provided for in Perpetual Care.
- Sec. 13. Resident lot owners paying an annual care tax shall upon ceasing to be members of the Tifereth Israel or Anshe Chesed Congregations, at once arrange for the Perpetual Care of their lots at the established rates and in addition may be assessed such an annual tax as the Board of Governors shall determine.

Resident lot owners whose lots are in Perpetual Care, may upon ceasing to be members of the Tifereth Israel or Anshe Chesed Congregations, be assessed such an annual tax as the Board of Governors shall determine.

Non-resident lot owners, paying an annual care tax, shall upon ceasing to be members of the Tifereth Israel and Anshe Chesed Congregations, at once arrange for Perpetual Care of their lots at the established rates.

Lot Owners in Arrears:

- Sec. 14. Lot owners neglecting or refusing to pay their annual tax or other assessments levied for the period of three consecutive years or failing to provide for Perpetual Care of their lots as provided for by Section 13 may within thirty days after their accrued arrearages above specified, be notified by the secretary of said arrearage, by a registered letter sent to their last known post office address, as shown by the records of the Cemetery Board, and providing said arrearages are not paid on or before thirty days after date of the mailing of said letter, which letter shall be deemed sufficient notice, then such lot owner shall forfeit all right. title and interest in and to such lot and the title of same shall immediately revert to and vest in the Board of Governors of the United Jewish Cemeteries, without any further notice or action, legal or otherwise, on its part, and said lot owner is forever afterward debarred from asserting any interest in or to said lot.
 - Sec. 15. No interments may be made nor work of any kind done in or about a lot without an order in writing from the Secretary and no such orders may be issued for lots against which any charges have accrued.

Headstones, Monuments, Mausoleums

- Sec. 16. No Headstone, Marker Monument or Mausoleum may be erected in the cemetery until sketches, drawings and plans indicating materials, design, finish and size and proposed inscription thereon have been first submitted to and approved by the superintendent or the Board of Governors. No mausoleum plot shall be sold to a prospective purchaser until such approval of plans for the mausoleum has been granted by the Board of Governors.
- Sec. 17. All foundations for headstones and monuments shall be constructed by the Cemeteries, upon order of the lot owner, and charged to him at the established prices.

Perpetual Care

- Sec. 20. Perpetual care of lots and graves shall consist of cutting, sprinkling and re-sodding the grass, filling in graves when sunken, keeping the headstones and corner stones vertical and in general, keeping the lot neat, clean and in good order. Such care shall include the cleaning of the interior of mausoleums, when provided on mausoleum lots. No lots shall be received in Perpetual Care unless in condition satisfactory to the Board of Governors.
- Sec. 21. When the plans and location for a mausoleum have been approved and the lot
 paid for, the owner of the proposed
 mausoleum shall also pay to the Board of
 Governors a sum sufficient to endow the
 building for its care and maintenance.
 This amount shall be determined by the
 Board of Governors and in no event shall
 be less than 10 percent of the original
 cost of the mausoleum.
- Sec. 22. Perpetual Care of lots or graves shall be on such basis per square foot as may be prescribed from time to time by the Board of Governors and in no case less than \$100.00 per lot or \$25.00 per grave, and such rates shall apply to all lots sold after the adoption thereof.
- Sec. 23. The Board of Governors shall establish rates from time to time and upon request, for the planting of myrtle or other foliage, and its Perpetual Care; for the annual planting and care of flowers, and for such other service as the Cemeteries may be called upon to perform for lot owners.

PREAMBLE

The Tiffereth Israel Congregation of Cleveland, Ohio, being the owner of two Cemeteries, one on Mayfield Road near Cleveland, Ohio, and one on Willet Street in Cleveland, Ohio; and the Anshe Chesed Congregation of Cleveland, Ohio, being the owner of a Cemetery on Willet Street, adjoining the one owned by the Tiffereth Israel Congregation: Committees consisting of Jacob Mandelbaum, Julius Feiss and Kaufman Hays from the Tiffereth Israel Congregation, and Meyer, Weil, Moses Halle and Simon Newmark from the Anshe Chesed Congregation, reported to their respective Congregations, a proposition to unite the three above named Cemeteries and that said two Congregations operate them jointly.

At special meetings held for the consideration of said proposition, on July 6th, 1890, both Congregations resolved and determined to merge the ownership of the three Cemeteries aforesaid so that the same shall be owned and operated jointly by them; the debt resting against the Cemetery on Mayfield Road, to be assumed by said Congregations, share and share alike, and the above named Committees were instructed by their respective Congregations, to formulate the terms on which said union was effected and to draft Laws and Regulations under which said Cemeteries shall be governed.

The following terms and conditions of the union, laws and regulations, were reported by said Committees and duly approved by said Congregations.

Terms and Conditions of the Union

- 1 The Cemetery on Mayfield Road shall be known as the Mayfield Cemetery; the two Cemeteries on Willet Street shall be known as the Willet Street Cemetery.
- 2 The two Cemeteries shall be under the control and management of a Committee, to be known as and styled the Board of Governors of the United Jewish Cemeteries.
- 3 The Board of Governors shall have power to adopt such rules and regulations as they deem expedient for disposing of and conveying burial spaces; and to prescribe rules and regulations for interments and for the operation of the Cemeteries; and to establish rates and charges for the sale of spaces and for their upkeep, and for any other service which they may be called upon to perform incidental to the maintenance of such spaces. The Board of Governors is also empowered to receive funds entrusted to them by space owners for Perpetual Service and to invest and reinvest such funds in such securities as are authorized for trust funds or savings banks in this State.
- 4 The Board of Governors shall consist of ten members, viz: four Trustees from and the active Rabbi of the Tiffereth Israel Congregation, and four Trustees from and the active Rabbi of the Anshe Chesed Congregation.
- 5 The Board of Governors shall be elected as follows: At the Annual Meetings of the Boards of Trustees of the Tiffereth Israel and Anshe Chesed Congregations,

each President shall appoint from its members, four Governors to serve two years and until their successors have qualified. If the office of any Governor becomes vacant from any cause, his successor (who must be a Trustee of the same Congregation as the Governor whose office shall have become vacant) shall be appointed by the Board of Trustees of his Congregation for the unexpired term.

6 The Board of Governors shall keep an accurate account of all receipts and disbursements, and of their accounts and proceedings, and they shall make full reports of the operation of the Cemeteries and such other matters as they deem necessary, annually to the two Congregations for their approval.

7 Receipts from all sources except donations to the Endowment Fund shall be applied by the Board of Governors to the improvement and care of the Cemeteries and to the payment of all other obligations.

8 After all debts against the Cemeteries have been paid and cancelled, the Board of Governors shall annually, after reserving a sum sufficient in its judgment to meet the ordinary expenses for the improvement and care of the Cemeteries, for one year, divide all surplus funds equally between the Tiffereth Israel and Anshe Chesed Congregations.

9 The Board of Governors shall have power to sell and dispose of burial spaces in these Cemeteries to such individuals and organizations and on such terms and conditions as said Board in its discretion may determine. Deferred payments shall be evidenced by notes bearing interest at the rate of six per cent per annum.

Laws and Regulations of the Board of Governors of the United Jewish Cemeteries of Cleveland, O.

BOARD OF GOVERNORS AND OFFICERS

Section 1 The Board of Governors shall, at their Annual Meeting in January, elect the following Executive Officers: Chairman, Vice Chairman, and Treasurer, from their own number and a Secretary, who may or may not be one of their own number: all these Officers to serve one year or until their successors are elected and have qualified.

Section 2 The Chairman shall preside at all meetings and perform such other duties as usually appertain to the office.

Section 3 The Vice Chairman shall, during the absence or disability of the Chairman, act in his place, be clothed with all his powers and perform all his duties.

Section 4 The Secretary shall keep a record of the proceedings of the Board of Governors, issue all notices of meetings and permits for interments and entombments and improvements on spaces under regulations hereinafter provided; make out all bills for dues and other charges and pay all money received to the Treasurer; draw all orders on the Treasurer, render a quarterly report to the Board of Governors of all transactions; keep a register giving the name, age, residence, place of nativity, whether married or single, and cause of death of person to be interred or entombed, also the number and location of the space, and perform such other duties as the office demands.

Section 5 The Treasurer shall receive all the moneys collected on account of the Cemeteries, Disbursement of Funds shall be by check only, signed by two of the four Executive Officers and supported by a requisition duly approved by one of the Executive Officers in respect to any individual purchase or contracts exceeding \$25.00 in amount. Every expenditure of any amount shall be supported by requisition thru the office.

Section 6 The Chairman shall appoint such committees as may from time to time be authorized by the Board of Governors.

Section 7 Any Officers or employees having custody of moneys, securities or other valuable property of the Cemeteries, shall give surety bonds in such amount as may be prescribed by the Board of Governors.

Section 8 All books and papers relative to the Cemeteries shall always be open to inspection by the Board and to Committees of the Tiffereth Israel and Anshe Chesed Congregations.

Section 9 The regular annual meetings shall be held in the month of January and special meetings may be called from time to time either by the Chairman or upon the request of two members of the Board. Five members shall constitute a quorum at any meeting for the transaction of business.

Section 10 All funerals shall be subject to such rules and regulations as the Board of Governors may prescribe. No denominational service or ritual other than the Jewish shall be permitted at funerals held in the Mayfield or Willet Street Cemeteries, provided however, that Masonic ritual or the ritual of any other fraternal organization, not inconsistent with the Jewish ritual, shall be permitted.

DEEDS AND TRUST FUND AGREEMENTS

Section 11 Upon full payments for Cemetery or Mausoleum space, the owner shall be given documentary evidence of his right, title and interest therein and shall also be given a Trust Fund Agreement providing for the Perpetual Care thereof. No transfer of such space may be made while there is any indebtedness against it and shall not be made without the written consent of the Board.

ANNUAL CARE TAXES

Section 12 Lot owners shall pay such annual care tax as may be prescribed unless their lots have been provided for in Perpetual Care.

SPACE OWNERS CEASING MEMBERSHIP

Section 13 (a) Resident space owners paying an annual tax, shall upon ceasing to be members of the Tiffereth Israel or Anshe Chesed Congregations, at once arrange for the Perpetual Care of their space at the established rates and in addition, may be assessed by the Board of Governors such annual taxes as may be recommended by the Boards of Trustees of the Temples of which such space owners were last members.

- (b) Resident owners whose spaces are in Perpetual Care, may upon ceasing to be members of the Tiffereth Israel or Anshe Chesed Congregations, be assessed such annual taxes as may be recommended by the Boards of Trustees of the Temples of which such space owners were last members.
- (c) Non-resident owners, paying an annual tax, shall upon ceasing to be members of the Tiffereth Israel or the Anshe Chesed Congregations, at once arrange for the Perpetual Care of their space at the established rates.
- (d) The annual tax referred to in Clauses (a) and (b), shall when collected, be remitted to the Congregation of which the space owner was last a member.

NON-MEMBER BURIALS

Section 14 (a) On and after November 1st, 1928, no space in Mayfield Cemetery shall be sold for the burial

or entombment of any person who, at the time of death, is not a member in good standing of either the Tiffereth Israel or the Anshe Chesed Congregations.

- (b) The foregoing regulation does not prohibit the burial of non-member relatives of Temple Members who have owned space purchased prior to November 1st, 1928 and there shall be a charge of not less than \$25.00 for each such interment or entombment.
- (c) Cemetery space being sold for the use of immediate families of Members only and such immediate families being defined to consist of Husband, Wife and unmarried children, the Board of Governors may nevertheless make exceptions in the case of dependent relatives living with such Member families or in the case of dependent parents of such Temple Members.
- (d) In the event a member of either the Tiffereth Israel or the Anshe Chesed Congregations, who is the owner of Cemetery or Mausoleum space, is in default in the payment of membership dues to the Congregation of which he is a Member, burial or entombment may on advice of the Temple Offices be denied by the Board of Governors.

NON-PAYMENT OF ASSESSMENTS AND TAXES

Section 15 Owners neglecting or refusing to pay their annual tax or other assessments levied for the period of three consecutive years, or failing to provide for Perpetual Care of their space as provided in Section 13, may within thirty days after the accrued arrearage above specified, be notified by the Secretary of said arrearage, by a registered letter sent to their last known address, as shown by the records of the Cemetery Board, and provided said arrearages are not paid on or before thirty days after date of mailing such letter, which letter shall be deemed sufficient notice, then such space owner shall forfeit all right, title and interest in and to such space and title of same, shall immediately

revert to and invest in the Board of Governors of the United Jewish Cemeteries, without any further notice or action legal or otherwise on its part and said space owner is forever debarred from asserting any interest in or to said space.

PERMITS

Section 16 No entombments nor interments may be made nor work of any kind done in or about the Cemetery without an order in writing from the Secretary, and no such orders may be issued for space against which any charges have accrued.

LOT IMPROVEMENTS

Section 17 No headstone, monument or mausoleum may be erected in the Cemeteries until sketches, drawings and plans indicating materials, design, finish, size and proposed inscription thereon have been first submitted to and approved by the Superintendent or the Board of Governors. No mausoleum plot shall be sold to a prospective purchaser until such approval of plans for the mausoleum has been granted by the Board of Governors.

All foundations for headstones and mounuments shall be constructed by the Cemeteries, upon order of the lot owner, and charged to him at the established prices.

FREE BURIAL

Section 18 When circumstances warrant, free burial may be provided the members of the Congregations or to non-members at the discretion of the Board of Governors.

Section 19 The Superintendent or his assistant must be present at every interment and entombment and it shall be his duty to open and close the spaces.

CEMETERY AND MAUSOLEUM TRUST FUNDS

Section 20 The Board of Governors shall set aside a portion of the sales price of Lots and Graves in the Cemeteries for the establishment and maintenance of a Cemeteries Trust Fund; and a portion of the sales price of space in the Mayfield Mausoleum for the establishment and maintenance of a Mausoleum Trust Fund.

Section 21 (a) The income and or a part of the principal sum of such Trust Funds shall be used as necessary, for the General Care and Maintenance of said Lots and Graves and Mausoleum and their environment in the Cemetery, and for any unusual construction or repair that may in the judgment of the Board of Governors be required.

- (b) Care and Maintenance of Lots and Graves shall consist of cutting, sprinkling and resodding of graves, filling in graves when sunken, keeping headstones and corner stones vertical and in general keeping the Cemeteries in good order.
- (c) Care and Maintenance of the Mausoleum shall consist of proper cleaning, heating and repair of the Building as well as the care of the grounds and approaches surrounding and adjacent to said building.

Section 22 When the plans and location for any private Mausoleum in Mayfield Cemetery have been approved and the lot for same has been paid for, the Board of Governors shall also collect from the owner of the proposed Mausoleum such an amount as may in its judgment be necessary to provide an annual income for the care and maintenance of said Mausoleum, and in no event less than ten (10%) per cent of the original cost of the structure.

Section 23 (a) The amounts to be added from time to time to the sales price of Lots and Graves in the Cemeteries, for their Perpetual Care and Maintenance shall be upon such basis as the Board of Governors shall determine and shall apply to all lots or graves sold thereafter.

- (b) The Board of Governors shall, during the first ten years of the operation of said Mayfield Mausoleum, set aside out of the sales price of space therein, sums amounting to not less than twenty-five (25%) per cent of said sales price for the Mayfield Mausoleum Trust Fund. After the expiration of this period of ten years, the Board of Governors may from time to time make such readjustment of the percentage to be set aside during the ensuing periods, as it may in its judgment deem necessary.
- (c) The Board of Governors may from time to time and upon request establish rates for other special services incident to the decoration or care of Lots, Graves or Space in the Mausoleum.
- Section 24 (a) The Cemeteries Trust Fund and The Mayfield Mausoleum Trust Fund shall be under the direction of the Board of Governors, and each Fund shall be deposited or invested separately; withdrawals of moneys from these Funds shall be subjected to the same Regulations applying to other Funds of the Cemeteries; investments and re-investments shall be made by the Executive Officers of the Board upon the approval of said Board and in accordance with the directions set up by these Regulations or such as may hereafter be adopted.
- (b) The Board of Governors may enter into an arrangement with a Fiduciary Agent for the Care and Investment of said Trust Funds in accordance with such an agreement as will be satisfactory to the Boards of Trustees of the two Temples.
- (c) Investment of these Funds shall be restricted to such securities as are authorized for Bank Funds in this State and except as hereinbefore provided, only the income of these Funds shall be used for General Care and Maintenance purposes.

AMENDMENTS

Amendments to these Regulations may be proposed at any Meeting of the Board of Governors and if adopted by them, shall be submitted to the Trustees of the Tiffereth Israel and Anshe Chesed Congregations for approval. The Affirmative vote of the Board of Trustees of both Congregations shall be necessary to adopt the amendments.



REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE TO STUDY THE FINANCIAL OPERATIONS AND CONDITION OF THE UNITED JEWISH CEMETERIES

1 -2 . .

At a preliminary meeting early this summer, your committee requested the auditors to present certain data relating to the accounts of the United Jewish Cemeteries. This information was made available to the committee and a meeting was held on December 11th. The committee continued its discussion relative to the financial affairs of the cemetery and after due consideration of all factors pertaining to the financial accounts, contractual obligations, constitutional provisions, lot mausoleum space owners and the relationship of the two Temples, the following recommendations were unanimously adopted and are hereby recommended to the Board of Trustees of the United Jewish Cemeteries for their consideration and adoption.

- 1. Following the resolution adopted by the Boards of Trustees of the two congregations, the Permanent Improvement should be closed. That all funds, securities and accounts receivable, except the account due from the Mayfield Mausoleum Fund, held in that account be transferred to the Perpetual Care Trust Fund of the cemetery to restore as the value thereof may be determined, that part of the capital deficit in said account, which deficit amounted to \$18,551.00 as of December 31, 1939.
- 2. That the obligation of the Mayfield Mausoleum Fund, which stood at \$39,774.85 as of December 31, 1939, be transferred to the General Fund.
- 3. That all funds received from the sale of lots in the cemetery be applied and transferred to the Perpetual Care Trust Fund of the cemetery until the balance of any deficit that remains after the transfers provided for in number 1 shall be completely restored.
 - 4. After sufficient sales of lots have been made to restore the

deficit as provided in number 3 above, proceeds received from the sale of lots shall be allocated as follows: A. One-half of the proceeds from the slae of lots shall be retained in the General Fund. B. One-half of the proceeds from the sale of lots shall be transferred to a Reserve Account. to provide funds for major replacements, repairs and ground improvements as will be required. The committee is of the opinion that this seems to be a prudent move, especially after reviewing the operating income and expense account which will provide no funds for such items. 5. That in the future only income from investments in the Perpetual Care Fund shall be transferred to the General Fund. 6. That the Mayfield Mausoleum Fund be closed and that all items contained therein be transferred to the Mausoleum Trust Fund for Perpetual Care. 7. That the Cemetery Board rescind its action providing for a 60 - 40 division of the proceeds received from the sale of mausoleum space and that all proceeds from such sales be immediately transferred to the Mausoleum Trust Fund for Perpetual Care until such time as that Fund contains funds equivalent in value to 25% of the selling price of the space sold in the mausoleum, which is only in accordance with the terms of the contract by which such space was sold. 8. That income derived from the investments held in the Mausoleum Trust Fund for Perpetual Care be used to defray as much of the operating expense of the mausoleum as possible, and that the remainder of the operating expense be paid from the General Fund. That the Board of The Cemetery give serious consideration to

subdividing or reallocating the unsold space in the mausoleum and also consider reducing the selling price thereof to conform to present conditions and to so provide for a possible sale thereof. It was the opinion of this committee, Mr. Ben Klein, excepted, that this unsold space would not be sold for many years to come, unless such action was taken.

10. That, should the Cemetery Board act favorable on the recommendations made above, instructions should be given to the auditors to make the necessary adjustments on the books of the Cemetery, in accordance with the financial statement as of December 31, 1940.





THE MAYFIELD MAUSOLEUM





he Mayfield Cemetery Mausoleum was constructed by the Tiffereth Israel and Anshe Chesed Congregations for the use of their members. It was built because the ground space for burial in the present Mayfield Cemetery was entirely inadequate for the needs of the large membership of the two Temples; and because Mausoleum entombment has in recent years become again the more desirable and acceptable method

of burial. The Mayfield Cemetery Mausoleum is constructed of re-inforced Concrete; exterior finish is White Marble and the interior walls and floors are likewise of Marble.

A flood of light through a Glass Dome surmounting the Chapel, and thru stained glass windows in the Private Rooms and corridors, provides the natural lighting; artificial light is taken care of with a system of electrical fixtures which give an indirect subdued effect.

The Building is kept dry and well ventilated with drafts of air, both natural and forced, circulating constantly, the system of ventilation for the Crypts being the invention of the Architect and especially adapted for the purpose.

The Mausoleum has its own heating plant, maintaining an even and comfortable temperature the year thru; this is for the protection of the building against the elements as well as for the comfort of those who visit the Crypts.

Desirability of Mausoleum Entombment

The entombment of the body in a clean, white marble Crypt, sealed against every manner of disintegration, offers none of the repulsiveness so often felt by those who are present at the lowering of the remains of their loved ones into the ground, and at the refilling of the graves.

The physical discomfort, and often even sickness and suffering which follow exposure at outdoor burials, are avoided when both the Service and Entombment take place within the Mausoleum building.

Permanence of Mausoleum

The Mausoleum stands both as a Monument and an Everlasting Memorial to the departed ones within its walls. To the families of these departed ones, it affords the assurance of adequate protection for all time against desecration from whatever source.




MAUSOLEUM BURIAL


The structure from which the Mausoleum form of burial place takes its name was built by Queen Artemisia in memory of her husband. King Mausolus, in 353 B. C. E. in Asia Minor; the Pyramids of Egypt with their sepulchral chambers, and the vast Catacombs of Rome, are other examples of the adoption in ancient days of this idea for both private and public interment and perpetuation.

England, since the Eleventh Century, has paid honor to its great men and women by placing their remains in the Westminster Abbey, and in our own Country we have the monumental Tombs of Washington, Lincoln, Grant and Garfield, as public acknowledgment of honor due their memory.

The Community Mausoleum came into use in modern times as early as 1862, when the City of Liverpool, England, built a public Mausoleum in the City Cemetery; the first sanitary Mausoleum in use in this country was built in a Church-yard near Shelby, Ohio, in 1909.

SUBSCRIPTION CONTRACT FOR PURCHASE OF SPACE

To the Board of Governors

of the United Jewish Cemeteries operated by the Anshe Chesed and Tiffereth Israel Congregations of Cleveland, Ohio:

In consideration of like Subscriptions for purchase of Space in the Mayfield Cemetery Mausoleum, by other members of the Anshe Chesed and/or Tiffereth Israel Congregations of Cleveland, Ohio, and upon the terms and conditions herein set forth, I hereby subscribe and contract for the purchase of

in the present Mausoleum structure, or the proposed extensions thereto, now in contemplation, located or to be located in Mayfield Cemetery, Cleveland Heights, Ohio; and I agree to pay therefor the sum of in the following manner: 15% or with this Subscription for purchase of aforesaid space: with the understanding that this Contract, unless extended by joint agreement of myself as purchaser and the said Board of Governors of the United Jewish Cemeteries, shall become null and void if there shall not have been sold by December 31, 1934, spaces including the space here purchased by myself, of a total of at least \$100,000; and in which event, this initial payment of 15% or \$ shall be returned to me without interest. However the said payment of \$ or 15% shall be forfeited by me if I shall fail to fulfill the terms of this purchase contract as hereinafter set forth; 25% or. upon due notification to me by mail that spaces of a total of \$100,000 have been sold, and that said Board of Governors are ready, with the approval of the Board of Trustees of the said respective Congregations, to begin building operations in the construction of the said extensions to the present Mausoleum structure; 30% or within three months of the date of notification for the aforesaid payment of 25%: 30% or within six (6) months of the date of notification for the payment of the installment of 25%. It is understood by the undersigned subscriber to this purchase Contract that no representations or terms and conditions of purchase, other than those herein set forth, shall be binding upon the Board of Governors of the United Jewish Cemeteries, or the Anshe Chesed and Tiffereth Israel Congregations by whom they are appointed as an administrative Board for the operation of Mayfield Cemetery. It is further understood and agreed by the two Parties hereto that the terms and conditions of this contract shall be binding upon the heirs, successors and assigns. Regulation Restricting

The Sale of

Burial Place in

Mayfield Cemetery

for

Non-Members

of

The Temples

To Members of The Temple and the Euclid Avenue Temple.

At a Meeting of the Board of Governors of Mayfield Cemetery held on November 1st, 1928, the following Regulation was adopted after having been approved by the two Temples:

"On and after November 1st, 1928 no burial place in Mayfield Cemetery shall be sold for the burial or entombment of any person who, at the time of death, is not a Member in good standing of either the Anshe Chesed or the Tifereth Israel Congregations."

IN OTHER WORDS:

- (a) No Temple Member can hereafter buy burial space in Mayfield Cemetery or in the proposed Mausoleum for the burial of anyone except the immediate family consisting of Husband, Wife and unmarried children.
- (b) No non-member of the Temples will be permitted to buy space in the Cemetery by joining either of the Temples at the time of a death in the family.

Owing to the lack of adequate Regulation, it has been found that approximately 25% of the burials in Mayfield Cemetery during the past two years have been non-member interments. This has been possible through the fact that Members of the Temples have taken advantage of the opportunity to purchase space

in their own names for the burial of non-members; and also because it has been possible for non-members to join The Temples at the time of a death for the sole purpose of purchasing ground in the Cemetery.

The Board of Governors with the Trustees of the two Temples felt therefore that same action was necessary, and this Regulation is adopted for the purpose of conserving the space in Mayfield Cemetery and in the proposed Mausoleum, for the use of the Members of the two Congregations to which the Cemetery facilities belong.

It is understood, however, that the adoption of this Regulation does not prohibit the burial of non-member relatives of Temple Members who own lots purchased prior to its adoption and who may wish to use such burial space for the interment of non-member relatives. It is further understood that an immediate family shall consist of Husband, Wife and unmarried children, to whom the use of lots are restricted but exceptions may be made by the Board of Governors in the case of dependent relatives living with such member families or in the case of dependent parents of such Temple Members.

It is the intention of the Board of Governors of Mayfield Cemetery to adhere strictly to this rule and the co-operation of the members will be appreciated.

RESOLUTION (d)

That the Board of Trustees of each Congregation recommend to its respective Congregation that Article VII and Article VIII of the Terms and Conditions of the Union be respectively amended so as to read as follows:

ARTICLE VII: Receipts from all sources, except (a) donations to the endowment fund and (b) proceeds realized from the sale of Mausoleum space, shall be applied by the Board of Governors, to the extent required, for the improvement and care of the cemeteries and the Mausoleum.

ARTICLE VIII: The Board of Governors shall annually, after reserving a sum sufficient to meet the ordinary expenses for the improvement and care of the cemeteries and Mausoleum and the payment of current operation for one year, divide all surplus funds annually between the Tifereth Israel and Anshe Chesed Congregations; no purchase of additional land for cemetery purposes or any extension of the present Mausoleum shall affect the division of the funds herein provided for.

The above motion was adopted after being properly presented and seconded.



To the Members of the Board of Governors of Mayfield Cemetery and Officers of the Temples:

At a Meeting of the Board of Governors of Mayfield Cemetery, held on August 17th, 1933, it was resolved to have a Committee appointed to ascertain, by examination of the financial status of the Cemeteries, whether there were any surplus funds available which might be distributed to the Temples, under the Terms and Conditions of the Union of the two Congregations in the ownership and operation of Mayfield and Willett Street Cemeteries, as set forth in Sections 7 and 8 thereof. The Sections are as follows:

Section 7. Receipts from all sources, except donations to the Endowment Fund, shall be applied by the Board of Directors to the improvement and care of the Cemeteries and to the payment of all other obligations.

Section 8. After all debts against the Cemeteries have been paid and cancelled, the Board of Directors shall annually, after reserving a sum sufficient in their judgment to meet the ordinary expenses for the improvement and care of the Cemeteries for one year, divide all surplus funds equally between the Tiffereth Israel and Anshe Chesed Congregations.

The undersigned were appointed by the Chairman to examine into the question; and a meeting for the purpose was held on September 13th, with the Chairman, Secretary and Clerk of the Cemeteries Board. Audited Statements and Records of financial operations extending back nearly twenty years were submitted, together with the status of present existing funds and the Cemeteries' indebtedness.

It is your Committee's judgment, in the light of the past financial experiences of the Temples in the operation of the Cemeteries, and particularly in view of the present financial status due to the further necessary expansion of the Cemetery facilities by the construction of the Mayfield Mausoleum, that it would be unwise for them to offer any recommendation other than that the Officers of the Temples and the Board of Governors itself, review these data before arriving at any decision for the distribution of present funds.

We have therefor requested the Clerk and the Secretary to prepare in brief form your study and consideration, the operating and financial history from the time of the purchase of Mayfield Cemetery to date. There is in our judgment, reflected in this experience more concretely the problems with which previous Boards of the Cemeteries have been concerned and those with which the present Board and the Temples must be prepared to deal.

In 1890, the Tiffereth Israel and Anshe Chesed Congregations, having owned and operated independently, sections of a Plat of ground now known as Willett Street Cemetery, and the Tiffereth Israel Congregation having purchased another Plat of Ground now known as Mayfield Cametery, an agreement was entered into by the two Congregations for the joint ownership and operation of both of these burial grounds. The Sections previously duoted in this statement are a part of the Terms and Conditions of the Union.

The ground space for Mayfield Cometery, containing about 20 acres, was bought in 1889 at a cost of \$6,667. Initial expenses incurred in improving the ground for the purposes of burial and sale of space to members, amounted to \$9,800 more, or a total of \$16,467. This outlay was financed in part by a Mortgage Loan of \$4,000 negotiated with the Montefiore Home and by the issuance of interest bearing Bonds for a total of \$10,600, which Bonds were sold to members of the Congregations in denominations of \$100 to \$500. The Temples themselves added \$879 each from their respective Treasuries, and assumed the mortgage indebtedness.

It was necessary of course at all times to continue the development and improvement of the burial facilities of the Cemetery in advance of the needs and the sales of space to members, and the Temples therefor refinanced their loans and borrowed additional funds, from time to time, remaining in debt on account of the Cemeteries for nearly thirty years or until 1917 when a final payment of \$7,000 was made to the Jewish Orphan Home, discharging a Mortgage Loan of \$12,000 made in 1908.

For the entire period from 1890 to 1932 inclusive, Capital expenditures for Ground, Buildings, Roads, Landscaping, Drainage, Water Lines, Fences, and Permanent Reconstruction and Repairs, amounted to \$197,337; adding to this the Cost of the Mayfield Mausoleum, \$432,000, the total Investment in the Cemeteries, amounts at present to approximately \$630,000.

During the same period, 1890 to 1932, there was expended for current maintenance of the Cemeteries, a total of \$286,914.

Summaries of the year by Capital and Operating Receipts and Disbursements, are submitted herewith, grouped chronologically into four periods. These periods indicate important adjustments in the management and administration of the Cemeteries, as dictated by changing conditions and demands. With each period reference is made to the experiences and changing conditions which prompted the actions of the Temples in adopting new regulations governing both the sales of space and the imposition of new taxes and other costs upon the lot owners and purchasers.

1. Years 1890 to 1912 inclusive

At the conclusion of this period, a change was made in the Account and Record keeping of the Cemeteries, and a comprehensive Audit of the financial operations which had been prepared incident to the change, revealed to the Board perhaps for the first time, the futility of its efforts to pay off the Mortgage indebtedness under a plan of operation whereby the current operating expenses of the Cemeteries exceeded annually the operating income, making necessary the continual absorption of Capital funds derived from the sale of ground space, for such maintenance deficits.

It is interesting to note here that the Regulations adopted in 1890, permitted the sale of space only to the members of the two Congregations which owned the Demetaries. In 1891 the Regulations were amended to permit the sale of space "to members of any regularly organized Jewish Congregation in the City of Cleveland"; and while the records do not mention the reasons for this chance, no doubt the inability of the Temples to sell space to members more rapidly, and the feeling that there was more than ample ground for the members' needs, led to this decision. However, the Regulations were again amended in 1900, restricting the sale to members only.

Consideration was also given during this period to the possibility of encouraging members to set aside endowment for their lots; and in 1907, the Regulations were amended excluding endowment 'donations', from use for current operating purposes. In 1909 the first Regulations setting up schedules for Perpetual Care of lots and graves, were adopted, and while this was a step in the direction of encouraging more stable income for Cemetery upkeep, the law was only permissive and very little was received from lot owners for the purpose.

During this time, intensive study was given to means for placing the administration of the Cemeteries on a sounder business basis, balancing outgo with income through adequate charges for all services performed. It was not until late in 1916 that laws were enacted effecting these necessary changes, and the results are of course not evident prior thereto.

In November 1916, Regulations were madepted by the Temples effecting the following changes in the sale and care of lots, all for the purpose of increasing and stabilizing the revenue for Cemetery maintenance:

- a Perpetual Care was made compulsory for all lots sold thereafter:
- b An Annual Care Tax, calculated according to the size of lots, was charged against all lots owned unless such lots were already provided with Perpetual Care; and irrespective of whether such lots had interments in them or not. Prior to this time a flat rate of four dollars was charged only against lots which had burials; and Perpetual Care, as already stated, was optional.
- The Board authorized the setting eside each year of all sums received from the sale of lots (exclusive of Perpetual Care) into a Permanent Improvement Fund to be used only for the improvement of the Cemetery, expansion of burial facilities, and payment of Capital indebtedness. There was of course no Capital indebtedness from 1917 until the Mausoleum was completed in 1929.

(It should be noted that the two periods, 1917-1923 and 1924-1932, 32 800 were periods of rising costs in Cemetery operation.)

During 1923 further by-laws were adopted to increase operating revenue, and the entire plan of administration of Mayfield cemetery was changed. Up to this time the Superintendent received a nominal annual wage from the Temples but derived his main income from charges which he made for services per-

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formed for Lot owners, and from Gratuities. The Cemeteries Board paid for all of the Labor which he used in performing these services. Not only did this plan work out to the disadvantage financially of the Temples, but there was always more or less criticism of the Superintendent by those who felt that better attention was given the lots of those who tipped him, then to the others.

Under the new arrangement, an Office was established at Mayfield Cemetery, a Clerk was placed in Charge, the Superintendent was put on a straight Salary, and all charges were thereafter made through the Cemetery Office and payable into the Cemeteries' treasury. It was possible thus also to ascertain what the individual services cost and how much to charge for them.

While the Cemeteries Board which was in control in 1911, began at that time to realize that the ground space in Mayfield Cemetery would be inadequate for the needs of the rapidly growing memberships of the two Temples, all efforts to purchase adjacent ground from the Rockefeller interests falled the offers were made up to \$12,000 per acre. In about 1925 attention was directed to the possibilities of Mausoleum construction. It should be noted here that had the efforts of the Board to buy additional land been successful, in 1912, the Temples would today have been quite heavily in debt as a result of the large expenditure which would have been involved.

Turning to the present financial condition of the Cemeteries;

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Reference has not been made to the Perpetual Care Trust Fund for the Cemetery Proper, since the Capital of this Fund is in the form of endowments received and held in trust, the income only being available for the specific purposes for which the money has been given. Furthermore, experience over a period of the twenty years during which the Perpetual Care Trust Fund has existed, has indicated that while income may be greater in years of high investment yield, the cost of the care of the Cemeteries has likewise been greater in such years.

No Mausoleum Trust Fund has as yet been established because the space sold thus far has not been sufficient to meet the cost of the structure itself; and until such a trust fund is in existence, the Board of Governors will need to continue to borrow from the General and the Permanent Improvement Funds for the payment of Mausoleum upkeep and interest, and probably for some amortization of the Mortgage Loan itself.

There is yet another aspect of the Cemeteries administration involving a financial consideration, which has already been brought to the attention of the Board of Governors in a recent meeting, but to which your Committee feels reference must be made here also.

There has at no time been sufficient burial space prepared in advance to supply all the members of the two Temples. About two-thirds of the members either do not concern themselves about the purchase of burial space until the emergency of a death makes such purchase necessary; or they are not in position financially to make such provision in advance for their families; and only about one-third of the active members are lot owners.

Periodically the Board of Governors finds that the facilities remaining are sufficient for only ten or fifteen years longer, and at such times improvement and development of additional space is necessary. At the present time the ground space improved for sale in Mayfield Cemetery will be adequate for perhaps another ten years at the rate at which lots are bein sold; there is no more ground space for development unless the Board should decide to allow burials along the Mayfield road frontage. In the Mausoleum, there are remaining a number of the larger and more expensive Rooms and Family sections, but only a few single crypts representing the types of spaces which by far the larger number of Temple Members must buy.

The Board of Governors has come to another period when further development must take place. This matter will no doubt soon be submitted to the Temples for a decision. Replies to a questionaire which was sent out recently on the instruction of the Board of Governors, seem to indicate that there is considerable interest and desire on the part of members to have further facilities in the Mausoleum developed for them. And such development will of course entail borrowing again as it has in the past.
