

Dear Friend:

Again this committee wishes to enlist your interest and cooperation in forming groups where there are none and in strengthening those already organized.

Two State Conferences, Illinois and New York were held in the past year. At both there was a decided feeling, that too little interest is being manifested in the effort to intensify the work of the Young Folk's Temple Leagues, individually and in district and state groups.

In New York where sixty-two delegates from the entire State were gathered in earnest conference for three days in July, it was decided by the Young People that the work of a Young Folk's group, should be:

- (1) Devotional--including Temple attendance or a separate service. Giving cooperation to the Synagogue when called upon.
- (2) Educational--having programmes of Jewish interest, offering study groups to those who will attend, preferably as open forums.
- (3) Social--bringing young people together as Jews.

Their idea was not to organize a dancing or athletic society, but to offer these as recreation and means of good fellowship.

It is the wish of this Committee to record the expression of the opinion of your group, as to ways and means of furthering the plan mapped out by the young people.

We advise paid leaders, if the right person can be found. A poor leader, lacking in understanding, background and vision is a drawback, rather than a help.

We wish the advise and cooperation of the Rabbi and Superintendent of your Religious School. This Committee, awaits eagerly word from them in order to answer the many calls for help, sent in weekly.

Have your groups interest themselves in out-of-town Jewish students at your Universities, also in young men and women employed in your town. If possible urge the idea of Scholarships for boys and girls attending your public schools. Also interest them in helping to organize more Religious Schools in your town and districts.

We wish to impress upon you this fact. That this committee will willingly answer every letter and appeal. We will give you as much constructive help as our limited files permit, but we wish also to be able to fill those reference files with material received from you. We believe that this is to be a year of accomplishment and that the youth groups will offer some inspiration to every congregation, as well as receiving splendid cooperation from the Rabbis, Congregants, Sisterhoods and Brotherhoods.

TEMPLE LECTURE COURSE SERIES MEETS WITH UNUSUAL RESPONSE

The interest which the announcement of the Monday Evening lectures of the Temple created in the community is evident by the unusually large demand for tickets which has steadily been coming in.

The two series of lectures scheduled for this season promise to prove even more successful than the lectures of last year. The two great and vital themes which will be discussed and the outstanding character of the lecturers have aroused the greatest interest.

The first series of seven lectures on Psychology for the Layman will begin on Monday evening, Nov. 4th.

Psychology is the most challenging science of our day and its remarkable advance has made necessary a revision of nearly all of our thinking. The Temple will present a comprehensive survey of the most recent developments in this field. The following subjects will be discussed: Introduction to Psychology; The Psychology of Motivation; Psychology of the Abnormal; Psychoanalysis; Group Psychology; Educational Psychology and Business Psychology. Seven men who are outstanding authorities on these subjects will discuss them before the Temple lecture group. They are: Prof. E. A. Bott, University of Toronto; Prof. E. W. Hutchinson, University of Rochester; Prof. Herbert Gurnee, Western Reserve University; Dr. A. A. Brill, New York City; Prof. William McDougall, Duke University; Prof. Goodwin B. Watson, Columbia University; Prof. Arthur W. Kornhauser, University of Chicago.

The Textbooks of Mankind, the books which have marked the turning points in the development of civilization will be the subject of the second series of lectures which will be given in March and April. The Bible, Plato's "Republic," St. Augustine's "City of God," Francis Bacon's "Novum Organum," Rousseau's "Emile," Darwin's "Origin of Species," and Karl Marx's "Das Kapital," will be analyzed and their significance presented. The following men will

present these subjects: Dr. Abba Hillel Silver; Prof. Rupert C. Lodge, University of Manitoba; Dr. T. S. McWilliams, Western Reserve University; Dr. John Herman Randall Jr., Columbia University; Dr. Robert E. Vinson, Pres. Western Reserve University; Dr. Horatio H. Newman, University of Chicago and Dr. Norman M. Thomas, Associate Editor of "The Nation" and erstwhile socialist candidate for the presidency of the United States.



At the last meeting of the Board of Governors, we discussed at length the problem of increasing our membership and stimulating interest in the Ladies Night meeting. You are no doubt formulating a campaign, and it is perhaps presumptuous for me to offer suggestions to those whose work in the Club exceeds mine by several years. However, I have had some little experience with membership work, and perhaps one or more of my ideas may appeal to you. I am submitting three suggestions:

(1) This form is mentioned first because it applies particularly to the November meeting. It occurs to me that the women of the congregation can do much to make this meeting a huge success, as well as promote the interests of the Men's Club by urging their husbands to take part in the Club work. I suggest that something similar to this announcement be mailed to the wife of every Temple member. The idea may not appeal at first blush but think it over.

(2) This is a form letter to be used in welcoming new members, to be written under your signature.

(3) This is a general letter to all members of the Men's Club. It is what I had in mind when I spoke to you and Rabbi Silver at the last meeting. It can be followed up at regular intervals and this one appeals to you, we can prepare more for future use.

Since our time is limited, I am submitting these suggestions now, particularly since I may not be able to attend a Membership Committee meeting, due to the fact that I am going to Cincinnati Saturday morning and will not return until Friday morning of next week. I will be at my office tomorrow and Friday if you want to discuss these suggestions further. Because of their interest, I am sending copy of this letter and enclosures to Rabbi Silver and Rabbi Feuer.



My dear Max:-

I am afraid that the members of our Men's Club Committee did not understand fully the purpose of the Chanukah Brotherhood Celebration.

These celebrations were inaugurated by the National Federation of Temple Brotherhoods, to be held simultaneously in all parts of the country for the purpose of arousing among the laymen of Jewish Liberal Congregations greater interest in the work of Reform Judaism. They were to serve as an annual rally of the lay forces of Reform Judaism at which the problems peculiar to Reform Judaism could be discussed. Such meetings were held in New York, Chicago and elsewhere by the joint brotherhoods of all Reform Temples, at hotels, so that no question of congregational preference could arise. And these meetings have been eminently successful.

It was my thought that Cleveland this year would fall in line with the other cities and hold such a Chanukah celebration in which the brotherhoods of the two Reform congregations would join, to be held at a hotel and on the same night - Sunday, December 29th, - when similar meetings were held in other large cities.

It was my hope that an outstanding lay representative of American Judaism would be invited to address this meeting.

For some reason unknown to me, this plan was abandoned and in its place the idea of having a good-fellowship meeting among the brotherhoods of all Cleveland congregations, Conservative and Reform alike, was substituted.

I am not opposed to any such goodfellowship meeting, but clearly it does not carry out our original intention. Such a meeting could well have been held at some other time, if found necessary. I am not convinced that it is necessary. I certainly would never have agreed to having



I have given the matter of the Theatre Guild considerable thought since I told you that I was resigning from the Guild committee. My reflections have led me to the conclusion that I must insist that that resignation be accepted. The entire attitude of the Temple with regard to the Theatre Guild going on is such that I feel any attempt at doing so is futile and a waste of time. It is difficult enough to get the Guild across with the active cooperation of the Temple. To attempt to do it in the face of Rabbi Silver's opposition, or at best, his apathy, is useless. I know that he feels such work is not in accordance with his policy for the Temple. I thought his policy wrong when it was brought before the Activities Committee. I still think that it is wrong, but that does not alter the fact that his policy is now being attempted and is in place. I think it much better for the Theatre Guild to pass out of the life of the Temple now, while it can do no great harm and with a record of artistic success.

behind it, than to have to give up its activities after having gone forward to what must almost certainly be failure. I think it would be wise for the Alumni Association to hold its dramatic activities in abeyance until such a time as there shall be a change in the policy of the Temple and in the attitude of the Rabbi. To attempt to press on now with the work of the Theatre Guild can only result in a loss of the prestige for artistic and worth while work which it has built up over a period of five years or more. 



My dear Mrs. Gross:-

The Temple contributed last year the sum of \$5439.50 to the Union of American Hebrew Congregations to do just the kind of synagogue and school extension work for which additional funds are now being solicited.

2. A sum of about \$50,000 was raised last year in Cleveland for the Hebrew Union College, of which the members of our Temple contributed \$43,000. This amount will be paid by the contributors either in five or in ten years. If in five years, the Temple will be sending to the College over \$8000 a year. If in ten years - over \$4000 a year.

The Hebrew Union College Endowment Fund which has now reached nearly four and a half million dollars relieves the Union of a great share of its financial responsibilities to the College. The Union should therefore have more funds available for its other activities without again appealing to the congregations.

3. The Temple Women's Association sent last year three scholarships to the Hebrew Union College, amounting to about \$1500. Our people thus contributed last year to the Union a sum well over \$10,000.

4. Apart from the above, we are contributing to the agencies connected with the Union of American Hebrew Congregations, such as the Federation of Temple Sisterhoods and the Federation of Temple Brotherhoods. The Temple Women's Association sends 25¢ per capita to the National Federation and the Temple Men's Club also sends 25¢ per capita to the National Federation.

5. We are also asked to contribute to the State Sisterhood scholarship, to support the Young Israel, to purchase art calendars and unionograms.

It seems to me that we are already doing all that we should be expected to do in the way of contributing to this organization. The individual congregations ought not to be made collection agencies for Union projects indefinitely.

The smaller Jewish communities are well able to pay for the instruction of their children. They should not be treated as poor and dependent communities. Proportionately the Jews of a smaller town are asked to contribute less to Jewish causes than the Jews living in larger communities. Because of their inaccessibility they escape many of the obligations of the larger communities. Just because a Jew lives in a small town, it does not follow that he is an object of charity. In the long run no one appreciates a service which is extended gratis.

My dear Mrs. Gross:-

I am somewhat perturbed about the status of the membership of the Temple Women's Association and I think that no time should be lost in correcting a situation which is likely to become worse unless it becomes better.

From what you said, it is clear that there are at least five hundred women whose husbands are members of the Temple, who themselves are not members of the T. W. A. In other words, almost 33-1/3% of Temple members' wives are not affiliated with the Sisterhood. This condition must be corrected at once.

I would suggest that you proceed with the organization of a special campaign committee which will devote itself exclusively to campaigning among these five hundred women. I would suggest that you appoint ten team captains; each team to be made up of five women. This will give you a group of fifty women and each woman will then have no more than ten prospects to call upon. The whole campaign, if properly arranged, can be completed in a week or ten days.

The present membership committee should be absorbed in this larger campaign committee and a new campaign chairman should be appointed. I shall be glad to discuss this matter with you further on your return from Dayton.



UCH has been given to Cleveland by John Carroll University. Cleveland has given John Carroll but little.

For forty-three years, Carroll has provided the youth of Cleveland and Northern Ohio with opportunity for higher education at a cost half or less than asked by other Ohio colleges.

A Cleveland institution, John Carroll has been a Godsend to hundreds of young men who otherwise would have been denied their four years of college training.

"Man Endowment" at John Carroll is one of the reasons why the cost of education is low. The Jesuits receive no salaries for their services. That is a matter of policy; they ask no salaries. Thus has Cleveland gained, without cost, a definite educational asset, representing a production endowment fund of nearly \$2,000,000.

\* \* \*

Crowded conditions, resulting from makeshift, have come to John Carroll in recent years. As the University approaches its half-century of unselfish and highly commendable service to the community, it looks forward to the building fund campaign to meet this physical crisis.

In a building at W. 30th and Carroll Ave., adequate for its day but lacking in the necessities of today's educational equipment, the faculty and student body have turned obstacles into stepping-stones and have developed a spirit of determination sufficient to bring the institution successfully to this important epoch.

That John Carroll has earned new buildings and new equipment on its property in University Heights is an undisputed fact.

\* \* \*

The fame of such noted teachers as Father Odenbach has extended far beyond the community. A veteran of higher education in Cleveland, this much beloved scientist has been one of the outstanding figures in the growth and achievement of John Carroll University.

The work of Father Odenbach and others of the faculty, who have been there during its earlier years, have formed a background for Carroll's new day.

As John Carroll embarks on its building fund, one sees seventeen new faces on this old background. Five of them are former presidents of colleges and universities. Among them are the Rev. Father Benedict J. Rodman, S.J., present president and the Rev. Albert C. Fox, S.J., Dean.

Not all of the faculty at John Carroll belong to the Jesuit order. Lay teachers, too, are on the staff. Ability and experience have placed them there.

John Carroll is a standard college, conferring the degrees Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Science and Bachelor of Philosophy. Like all Jesuit colleges, John Carroll is open to boys of all faiths.

Particularly noteworthy in John Carroll's history is the fact that her graduates have been instilled with a philosophy of life which has equipped them to maintain a broad and tolerant outlook. The great majority of Carroll men are found in business and the professions in the same proportions as the graduates of other colleges. Law, medicine, dentistry, and education as well as industry and commerce claim more than 90% of Carroll's graduates.

\* \* \*

In University Heights, just off Warrensville-Center Rd., where John Carroll now owns a 45-acre tract, a group of buildings is to be erected as the result of the building fund campaign for \$2,500,000.

The plans call for the Administration Building, the Faculty Building, the Dormitory, the Gymnasium and the Power Plant. In addition, provision has been made for necessary grading and landscaping, for at least a start on an athletic field and for an endowment fund to see Carroll through its first year in its new home.

Simplicity always has been the keynote of the institution. This will continue to be true of the new John Carroll.

The buildings asked for, though modern and adequate to the needs, will be in no sense elaborate. Practicability without frills best describes the viewpoint of the Jesuits as they go to Cleveland and Northern Ohio citizens with their problem.

\* \* \*

The campaign organization has progressed to the point where many of the most prominent men of Cleveland and Northern Ohio have identified themselves with the cause. The various committees include men of all faiths and creeds. Their membership speaks positively for the worthiness of John Carroll's project. They believe that achievement through the years, under great physical handicap, has earned Carroll's right to make its appeal for financial aid at this time.

The generosity of Cleveland and Northern Ohio people can find no better outlet than in helping this institution. The Campaign Committee believes that John Carroll has been kept waiting much too long. The committee believes, too, that you will be one of the first to recognize the University's worthiness—one of the earliest to pledge it a contribution.

Mrs. Brudno promised to reconsider the matter. But the following day replied in an utterly unsatisfactory and aggressive manner.

Rabbi Silver requested that no action be taken by the Board but that a record of his conversation with Mrs. Brudno be included in the minutes. This was unanimously voted.

Dear Rabbi -

Just received Miss Rothenberg's note with reference to the history text for 8th & 9th grade for next year. If you will recall our discussion, we had decided to retain the present text for the 8th grade up through the Spanish Inquisition & to use Leoriger in the 9th grade from the Inquisition to the present.

However, as thinking is now, it seems to me that Leoriger would be an improvement in book 8th & 9th grades and its use in both grades would save the children the cost of an additional text. Do I think we will introduce it for both grades next year. However, it would be good if you could glance thru some of the earlier chapters & compare them with similar material in the Bildner text before making a final decision.

As far as I can see, the only advantage of the Billdenee is that it dwells on personalities. But since most of the personalities are literary & covered in the literature course, we lose nothing by abandoning Billdenee. On the other hand, Levinson handles the material in real historical fashion and our 8<sup>th</sup> graders are old enough for this type of treatment. Particularly since we are going to use the Golub texts in 6<sup>th</sup> & 7<sup>th</sup> grades & Golub uses the historical approach.

We are enjoying ourselves immensely and send our very best to the family & yourself. How is the lecture course coming & how have the Friday afternoons started?




