My dear Rabbi Silver:-



In reply to your letter of October 30th;

There will be three speakers at the meeting on the 12th. A businessman will discuss the present industrial situation from the point of view of a businessman; a bank economist will discuss it from the point of view of a banker, and I should like to have you discuss the whole subject, particularly the problems involved in unemployment, from the point of view of the workingman and of the student of social conditions.

As far as Cleveland is concerned, our conditions here are as bad as in other parts of the country and in many instances worse than in most parts. There is tremendous unemployment here. The Associated Charities have had to care for four times the number of people that it normally looks after. The small Jewish businessmen have suffered tremendously particularly those who have been in real estate. There is a psychic depression as well as an economic one in the community.

It would be fine if you would devote some time to the subject of Unemployment Insurance.

Lessing Rosenwald read a very fine and effective statement at the Boston meeting. His earnestness and his intelligent handling of the subject made a splendid impression upon the people.

I am enclosing herewith a clipping from the local Yiddish newspaper which might interest you.

Mr. Levy informed me of the deliberations which you had at the last meeting of the Finance Committee in reference to the budget of the congregation. He left me with the impression that you plan to make certain recommendations to the Board at its meeting next Tuesday.

It will be impossible for me to attend the Board meeting on Tuesday in as much as my father-in-law, Mr. Horkheimer, is celebrating his seventieth birthday anniversary on that day and the family will meet in Atlantic City for the occasion.

I should like to have an opportunity of talking over with you in great detail the budget for the coming year. There are certain departments where substantial savings may be made and others where such savings would be distinctly detrimental. I wonder whether you could meet with me some time when we could have a chance to go over the situation.

I am under the impression that any recommendations for specific curtailments of the budget at the next meeting of the Board would not be helpful. As it is the new budget will not go into effect until next September and there will be ample time for any revision between now and long before our plans are definitely made for next season.







My dear Rabbi Silver:-

We held a meeting this morning of the Committee working for the unemployed i. e. Mesdames Grossman, Affelder, Rosenthal, Joseph and myself.

It is the opinion of the members of the Committee that they prefer to try this experiment with a small group of about ten women to see how it can be managed. In as much as there is such great need amongst our own people they also prefer to start this work with just the Jewish women through the Jewish Social Service Bureau, having the Bureau pay for the work of the women and having the Temple Women's Association budget a definite sum presumably \$1000. for this project and also to try through the personal solicitation of a few people to raise \$2000. additional.

The women who are to be employed would bring their own lunches, at least in the beginning and the Temple Women's Association would furnish coffee. The finished garments are to be donated by the Temple Women's Association to the Jewish Social Service Bureau.

If this is successful we could then enlarge our project and take ten women from the Associated Charities having the Associated Charities both pay the women and furnish the material and in return receive the finished garments. We would go to Mr. Lynde and explain the situation to him and also ask advice in planning our work along the lines of the Wade Sewing Group of the Associated Charities.

What is your reaction to limiting this project to the Jewish Social Service Bureau?

Also want you to know that both Mrs. Grossman and Mrs. Affelder feel that they would not be able to do any Tuesday work if they undertake this other, but would want to turn their apron group over to someone else who could hold it intact. They are and have been right along much more interested in this new project as that is what they have wanted from the beginning.

I am uneasy about the Apron Group under other supervision but hope that the unemployment situation will not be of long duration and in another year these women would turn back to the Tuesday work.

Hope you are all enjoying your vacation and are missing the extreme heat that we are having here.



Dear Rabbi Silver:-

There seems to be a misunderstanding in regard to the new sewing project. I received your letter with your explicit expression that it would be better to start with about ten women from the Jewish Social Service Bureau.

Mrs. Joseph says that she spoke to you about it and you felt (as only she does) that it would be far wiser to have a larger group and include the Associated Charities in the very beginning of our experiment.

Did you change your mind for any reason, or did one of us misinterpret you? Mrs. Joseph also insists upon trying to raise funds on the outside and I think that a real mistake at present.

I have given this a great deal of thought along financial lines and feel that if the Jewish Social Service Bureau can not finance the purchase of material (at least after the first two months) that it is a great deal more than we should undertake. We find that we would have to have a paid director (in California she receives \$85.00 per month) on a basis of \$50.00 -- \$60.00 per month. Our funds would carry us only a few months and a great deal of energy and time would have to be expended.

My dear Rabbi Silver:-

At a special Board meeting held August 3d, the Board passed the recommendation of the Finance Committee to budget \$1000 to be used for Emergency Unemployment Relief.

Mrs. Grossman is to be Chairman of the Committee in charge of this work and as soon as she returns from her vacation she will organize her committee including representatives from all groups.

On the advice of both Mr. Lynde and Miss Kittner the work will start the first week in October after the holidays are over, sewing Mondays, Wednesdays and Thursdays. I should have said that all this hinges on the Temple Board granting permission to use the Assembly Hall. If the Temple can not carry the expense of heat and light due to the cut in its budget, then the Temple Women's Association will defray that expense.

We are to work with women from both the Associated Charities and the Jewish Social Service Bureau. The J.S.S.B. has absolutely no funds to purchase materials, so the A. C. will furnish materials for all the women including the Jewish women, and in return the A. C. will receive all the garments to distribute to the needy. The J.S.S.B. will pay its women and cooperate with us in every other way except the furnishing of the materials.

The Council of Jewish Women want to promote an opportunity shop for unemployed women with a sales' end, on condition that all the sisterhoods dispense with their sewing groups with the exception of quilting and community sewing. Of course we will not consent. I have told them so personally, as my own reaction and our Board will take action at its September meeting.

Hope that you and Mrs. Silver with your children are enjoying your vacation to the fullest.






