





PROFESSOR BORIS SCHATZ comes to us from the Bezalel Arts and Crafts School in Palestine, a symbol of an idealistic life consecrated to the fulfillment of a lofty ideal. Born in Russia sixty-three years ago of a family of Jewish scholars and rabbis, his early youth was spent in the study of the Talmud in preparation of the rabbinate. Though he distinguished himself as a student of the lewish laws he was not destined to follow the calling of his forefathers. Even at the tender age of ten he felt the greater urge to express the cravings of his soul in drawings. Finally he actually left the "Yeshivah" to devote himself entirely to his life's chosen work of painting and sculptoring. A hard and bitter struggle followed. Because of his religion it was hopelessly impossible for him to be admitted to an academy of arts in Russia and eventually he found himself a student in Paris. His subsequent rise to fame was phenomenal. With honors heaped upon him from every quarter he turned to Palestine to establish a school for the cultivation of lewish artists. He has ever remained faithful to his ideal and has given to humanity and to the Jewish people an art which discloses a rare creative genius.

My dear Gene:-You may recall that at the last meeting of the Board there was some difference of opinion as regards one of the Cemetery regulations. I procured copies of the regulations and bylaws which I am enclosing herewith. You will note that already in the regulations adopted in 1924 there were two specific items which authorize the Board of Governors of the Cemetery, at its discretion to assess resident lot owners who cease to be members, an annual tax, the amount subject to its discretion. The Board of Governors has felt that recommendation for such assessment as well as the amount should come from the respective Boards of the two congregations before the Cemetery Board should take action. I have not been able to procure copies of the bylaws of the Cemetery prior to 1924. But I have a clear recollection that this regulation has been in existence for a great many years although seldom resorted to. 

Friends of Bezalel:

Though the great pioneer and inspiration for Bezalel has left our midst, a number of us who are interested in Bezalel feel that renewed effort should be pursued for the reopening of Bezalel.

Bezalel represents a national institution, a CHICAGO COMMITTEE cultural effort without which Palestine might be but another settlement of Jewry, even as in the Diaspora. This institution can continue as the organization for its maintenance can be assembled. What is necessary is the expression of Jewry of those few who are appreciative of its value, who will persist so that it shall carry on.

> Friends of Bezalel are now organized in ten cities. With this as a nucleus, surely enough Jews must be willing to make the effort that Bezalel be reopened and maintained. A number of cities are planning cultural evenings where Palestinian music, Palestinian art and general Palestinian culture are the subject matter for the program. These programs can be rendered by local talent, or by such visitors as your city receives. Admission charges and an appeal for contributions can be made. What is most significant is the association of such activity with the significance of Bezalel.

May I not urge your active participation to redoubled effort to carry out the program envisaged by the late genius, Boris Schatz, who wrote at the time of the twenty-fifth anniversary of Bezalel:

"In hours of sad contemplation, the soul seeks a reply to the question, "For whom did I labor?" I ask myself whether I would have begun all those works had I known beforehand the tremendous difficulties that will have to be overcome, the sacrifices to be expected and especially the eventual lack of gratitude. I must shamefully confess that I am not certain I could find in me all that strength. Nevertheless, I advise my son, my friends and my students not to pay attention to my hard experience and to go on with their work. A man can sin, a group of people can forget its duty, but not Jewry as a whole. The people of Israel lives and will live, and will not be thankless. It will know to repay its sons and builders and even if the payment be late, it is bound to come, and it does not matter if I personally will live to see it."




Twenty-five years ago I founded the Bezalel School in Jerusalem. To explain in detail the spiritual and financial influence of the school in Palestine is unnecessary. Hundreds of our sons and daughters have received their education in the arts and crafts and have gained recognition and thereby financial independence. The Bezalel School has added much to the prestige of our people and inspired the revival of a Jewish national art. But, the small annual budget of the school has as yet not been provided for. The artists, having no assured market for their art, not even direct contact with the tourists coming to Jerusalem, are compelled to give away their work on a commission basis to traders, who take great advantage of this deplorable situation.

My object in coming to the United States was to organize "Friends of Bezalel" Societies, who should raise a fund for the school and also make it possible to sell the art in the States.

With the proposed fund, I expect to build a Bezalel Bazaar similar to those of the Orient. This bazaar would contain fifty studios where the Bezalel crafts would be produced and sold directly to the tourists. Each studio would cost \$1000 and be named after the person or group who would donate the money for it. The income from the rent of the studios would provide for the annual budget of the Bezalel School. The bazaar, on the other hand, would help attract the tourists who would buy directly from the craftsmen.

Through the "Friends of Bezalel" I want to find representatives who will undertake to sell the work in the United States. I appeal to you who are moved by the spiritual upbuilding of the land of our ancestors to help the Bezalel School.

#### BEZALEL BAZAAR

E VERY Eastern city has a center in which local products are manufactured and sold and at which tourists make their purchases of souvenirs and other commercial transactions. In Constantinople this center is known as the "Suck"; in Cairo and Damascus it is called the "Bazaar".

Such a center is indispensible in Jerusalem, and it is the task of the Bezalel to supply it. Tourists generally buy souvenirs, but the souvenir trade in Jerusalem is in Gentile hands, and despite its permanent exhibition and the dozens of shops selling Bezalel articles, the Bezalel has not yet succeeded in drawing the attention or the patronage of tourists as a class. These latter usually employ native guides who have their private arrangements with local Gentile dealers.

We have therefor decided to establish a Bazaar for Bezalel goods. This Bazaar which is to be built around the walls of the Bezalel School will have room for 32 shops and workshops. No tourist who visits Jerusalem would want to miss seeing the Bazaar—the first in the land of Israel to make souvenirs and sell them in this fashion. In this way, we would not only develop local industry and give employment to countless families, but would also provide a firm basis for the Bezalel School which could support itself on the rentals from the shops and workshops.

Every shop and workshop would cost \$1000 to erect and would always be named after the donator of the required sum.

Apart from that there is in the courtyard the atelier which we erecetd for the manufacture of carpets, but which we are unable to use. This is to be converted into a cinema at a cost of \$25,000, which would ensure us an income of at least 20%, that is of \$5000 a year.

We feel that after 25 years of Bezalel's existence and struggling on behalf of Jewish art, and having regard to the merits of Bezalel before Jewry and before the land of Israel, you will assist us in carrying out the plan that Bezalel may be placed in a permanently secure position and achieve what Bezalel has been established for.

To The Parents of The Confirmation Class of 1933.

Dear Friends:

At/a meeting held on Thursday evening, May 5th of the parents of the confirmants of 1933 the question of the date of the confirmation exercises of the class was discussed. Some parents felt that the service should be held as here-to-fore on the traditional day of Shabuoth. Others felt that the service should be postponed to the Fall of 1933 when I will have returned from my sabbatical year. There being a wide difference of opinion they requested that I make the decision myself.

On last Tuesday I consulted the Board of the Temple on this matter It was the almost unanimous thought of the members of the Board that the Temple should not depart from its traditional custom of holding Confirmation on Shabuoth. Our Congregation would lay itself open to criticism if a religious service would be postponed for reasons of personal sentiment. They felt that our boys and girls should be confirmed on the same day when all other children of Jewish congregations throughout the country are being confirmed.

I regard this position as valid and in keeping with my own convic-The Confirmation Service for the class of 1933 will therefore be held tions. on Shabuoth Day, May 31st, 1933.

However, in as much as I shall not have the privilege of participating in that service and of giving my message to the children, it was suggested by the Board that a service of consecration be held upon my return, preferably on the morning of Simchas Torah, October 23d, 1933 at which time the members of the class of 1933 will meet with me and I will have an opportunity of addressing them and of extending to them my personal best wishes and blessing.

This suggestion I regard as a happy one and will be carried out. I hope and trust that this arrangement will prove satisfactory to all the parents and that they will cheerfully avide by it.


The important thing in the confirmation of your children is the religious training and preparation which they receive prior to the ceremony and the personal contact which they have during the confirmation year with the Rabbis.

I have made arrangements whereby this important work shall not be interrupted because of my absence. I will meet with the children for six weeks during September and October prior to my departure and will personally instruct them for at least twelve sessions. Pabbi Feuer will then continue the instruction for the rest of the year.



Mr. Rappaport, formerly one of the renowned cantors of New York and Chicago, and now a tenor of the Chicago Civic Opera Company, has appeared successfully in opera here and in Europe. He has sung in oratorio and in concert, appearing with Gretchaninoff and other celebrities. He has also appeared with the greatest Symphony Orchestras under the baton of the greatest conductors, such as Alfred Hertz, Tulio Serafin of the Metropolitan, Basil Cameron, etc. These lecture-recitals are also embellished and illustrated by a noted string trio, consisting of violin, cello and piano, which adds greatly to their charm.
