Dear Rabbi Silver,

I have just learned that Rabbi Feuer, the assistant-rabbi of "The Temple" has accepted the Toledo pulpit, and wishing to be considered for the vacancy, beg to present the following data to aid your committee in its decision.

I have completed eight years with Temple Beth Israel of York, Pa., which, in the decade previous to my coming, had a new rabbi almost every year. I purposely accepted the local pulpit, though it was smaller than others available at the time, to permit me to take post-graduate studies in Philadelphia at Dropsie College of Hebrew and Cognate Languages and also at the Univ. of Pennsylvania. At the latter I completed the courses in the fields of Elementary and Secondary Education as well as in School Administration, to prepare myself to assume added responsibility in Jewish Education.

While not averse to occupying the pulpit whenever necessary, I incline rather toward the other aspects of rabbinical duty: the religious school, club leadership and pastoral visitation. During my local ministry, our Congregation added an Elementary Hebrew department, a High School Department and the Temple League of young folks. We also have an adult Hebrew circle and the Sisterhood Bible Class.

Contacts in the general community have resulted in my being elected President of the York Social Service club, in which I am serving a second term, and chairman of the International Relations committee of the York Rotary Club.

(Extract from letter written by Dr. Morgenstern, October 17, 1934)

"I also recommend Rabbi David Max Eichhorn, a graduate of the Hebrew Union College of the class of 1931. He, too, was one of the ablest members of his class and one of the finest spirits in the Student Body during his entire eight years' period of study here. During the year following his graduation he carried on graduate studies here, and in conjunction therewith he did Social Service work. For the last two years and a half he has ministered to the Reform congregation in Springfield, Mass., and there did excellent work in the face of almost insuperable odds. Unfortunately, however, as you no doubt know, the dominant spirit of New England Jewry, and particularly in the small and middle-size towns, is Orthodox. The result was that this, combined with the present depression, has made it impossible for that congregation to continue. It has only during the last few weeks, following the close of the recent High Holydays, had to close its doors. For this reason alone, and not at all because of lack of ability, Rabbi Eichhorn is at present without a pulpit and is therefore staying with his parents awaiting another call.

He is a young man of fine personality, high ideals, earnest, capable and conscientious in all his work, a good speaker, a responsible and thorough thinker, and an excellent administrator. I cannot commend him to you too highly. Rabbi Eichhorn is unmarried."

"One of the best known clergymen in this district, Rabbi Eichhorn, since his advent to Springfield in 1932, has been identified with many civic and social movements in the city. He was also prominent in dramatics, having directed several plays and having organized the successful children's pageant staged last winter. He has been heard in radio broadcasts, and he was a participant in a number of round tables and panels on religious, educational, and social matters."

Dear Silver:

Rabbi Gotthelf whom you met, quite casually, when you were here the other day, tells me he would like the position of assistant rabbi in your congregation in place of Rabbi Feuer. He also asks me to write you a word to learn whether you will be good enough to give him a personal interview. I am reluctant to do so because I know you will be pestered to death with similar requests. However, I do not like to refuse a favor to a young man, especially one who is so unfavorably placed as he is.

He is a graduate of the J.I.R. and for over a year has been principal of the Talmud Torah and rabbi of the B'rith Sholom Congregation, an orthodox congregation. So far as I have heard, they are quite satisfied with his work and have recently re-elected him at a slight increase in salary.

I know he will be grateful for the interview. However, if you do not wish to have him come to see you I shall quite understand it and not in the least resent your refusal.

Your address at the Community Chest banquet made a splendid impression and greatly stimulated the workers. The campaign went over the top for the first time in eleven years.

Dear Abba:

You must be at this time thinking of a successor for Leon Feuer. I am taking the liberty of making a suggestion which you may be glad to have. I want to suggest to you the name of Rabbi David Cedarbaum, now of Temple Beth El, Lansing, Michigan. I have an idea that you would find in Rabbi Cedarbaum a congenial spirit. He is a pupil of Dr. Benderly, and spent several years with the Bureau of Jewish Education of New York. He is the author of what was at that time a widely discussed paper on "The Costs of Jewish Education". He is a first-rate educator both in the fields of school work and of club work. He is in addition an interesting speaker. He is frequently called in from Lansing to address large groups in Detroit. At Lansing he is heroically maintaining a very small congregation. His talents as an educator have little opportunity for exercise there.

Rabbi Cedarbaum has been coming in every Monday night to teach classes at our Beth El College of Jewish Studies. He teaches the class in "Methods of Teaching in the Jewish Religious School", as well as the class in "The Sociology of Jewish Life", which is a seminar on Kaplan's "Judaism as a Civilization", Ruppin's "The Jew in the Modern World", and similar works. He has the M.A. degree.

Rabbi Cedarbaum's address is Hotel Downey, Lansing, Michigan. He is thirty years of age and unmarried.

As you might imagine, from his association with Benderly he is thoroughly at home in Hebrew and in the entire field of modern Jewish culture. He is a graduate of the Hebrew Union College class of 1933.

My dear Abba:

I was pleased to receive your good telegram of the 22nd inst. and to learn from it that you will be happy to receive recommendations from me with regard to the position made vacant by the promotion of Rabbi Feuer. You will understand, I am sure, that some of the recommendations which I make herewith I present upon request. Others are spontaneous with me. All of them are offered in absolutely good faith and full sense of responsibility. You will, I am sure, know how to evaluate correctly what I say about each particular man. I follow my usual procedure of beginning with the older men and working down systematically to the younger.

Rev. Dr. Samuel H. Markowitz, (HUC 1922) would, I have reason to believe, be interested in the position of Director of Religious Education with full charge of and responsibility for the work done in this particular field. He would not be interested in a position as Assistant Rabbi. As you know, he has done a great deal of work in the field of Religious Education and has his Ph.D. from the University of Chicago. I regard him as an able man and believe that he is exceedingly well qualified to take complete charge of the entire educational program of your congregation. If you plan to distinguish at all between the services of an Assistant Rabbi and those of an Educational Director, I believe that Markowitz would be an excellent man for you. He ismarried and has two children.

Rabbi Julius Kerman (HUC 1928) was Principal of a Hebrew School in St. Louis before coming to the College, and did excellent work there. He was a capable student and, of course, more mature than his fellow-students. He served for a number of years after graduation as Rabbi in Sunbury, Pa. and for the last few years in a small congregation at St. Albans, L.I., which he organized himself. He is studiously inclined and thinks matters through clearly and responsibly. How he has developed as a preacher and in other aspects of Rabbinical work since his graduation I cannot say, since I have had no contacts with him that would give me this information. But I have a very high regard for him and his general ability and his integrity of character. He is married and has two children.

Rabbi Melbourne Harris (HUC 1929) served for three years following

his graduation as Assistant to Dr. Louis I. Newman at Temple Emanu-El in San Francisco. Since then he has filled the pulpit at Peoria, Ill. I understand that he did excellent work as Assistant Rabbi and Director of Religious Education in San Francisco and he is highly regarded by both the congregation and Dr. Newman. I understand too that he is doing excellent work in his present pulpit. He is possessed of an unusually pleasing personality. I regard him as an able man, and thoroughly sincere in all his undertakings. He is married and has one child.

Rabbi Abba M. Fineberg (HUC 1930) has officiated as Rabbi in Niagara Falls, N.Y. since his graduation. He has done work in Education at Niagara University and has an M.A. from that institution. He is earnest and sincere, painstaking in all his activities and, I understand, has done very good work in his present pulpit. He is married, but has no children.

Rabbi Phineas Smoller (HUC 1930) has officiated as Rabbi in his present pulpit, Springfield, Ohio, since his graduation. He was an able student and a fine spirit and influence here at the College in every way. He has grown in every direction since he left here. I have had occasion to watch his work during these years and am tremendously impressed by what he has done and the manner in which he has done it. He is earnest, high-minded and capable. He is studiously inclined and would, I feel certain, combine in admirable manner the duties of Assistant Rabbi with those of Educational Director. He is also modest and loyal in every way. I have an exceedingly high regard for him and commend him to your consideration unqualifiedly. He is unmarried.

Rabbi Saul B. Appelbaum (HUC 1931) a native Clevelander has served as Rabbi in Bradford, Pa. since his graduation. I understand that he has done good work there, although I myself have had little opportunity to form an independent judgment thereon. He, too, is unmarried.

Rabbi Carl I. Miller (HUC 1931) has occupied his present pulpit in Helena, Ark. since his graduation. He, too, is a native Clevelander. He was a capable student here at the College and is possessed of a very winning personality. He has done excellent work in his present pulpit. I believe he is likewise married to a Cleveland girl. They have no children at present.

Rabbi Arthur Zuckerman (HUC 1931) presents a most interesting case indeed. He was one of the ablest students of his class and for the three years following his graduation held the Morgenthau Traveling Scholarship. He carried on work at the Hebrew University in Jerusalem and likewise at the University of Vienna. He distinguished himself at both institutions and is scheduled to receive the degree of Doctor of Philosophy from the Hebrew University this year. The quality of his work added greatly to the prestige of the Hebrew Union

both in Jerusalem and in Vienna. He is an unusually capable man in every way. As a student he did a great deal of work with Young Judea organizations. He is, of course, an ardent Zionist, although I gather from his letters that his life and work in Palestine have sobered and matured his earlier over-exuberant enthusiasm for the cause. I feel that Zuckerman might some day become a great scholar if the opportunity is presented to him. But equally I believe that he has the potentialities of becoming an unusually capable Rabbi. He will soon be ready to return to this country and take a position. He married about a year ago a young lady, an American girl, who was also working for a degree at the University of Vienna.

Rabbi Elmer Berger (HUC 1932) is also a native Clevelander. He was a capable student here at the College and a fine influence among his fellow-students. He is earnest, high-minded and sincere, modest and gentle in his life and methods of work. He has done very good work in Pontiac, Michigan, during the two years that he has been there. He is married to a Cleveland girl. They have no children.

Rabbi Joseph Gitin (HUC 1932) has held a Conservative pulpit in Buffalo since his graduation and I understand has done very good work there. He has come to the conclusion, however, that he does not fit into a Conservative pulpit, and is eager to make a change. He is unmarried.

Rabbi David I. Cedarbaum (HUC 1933) is an unusually capable man, and perhaps he is the best prospect for you. Before coming to the College he had done quite a good bit of work in the field of Jewish Education and has completed all his requirements for the Ph.D. in Education at Teachers College, Columbia University, except the completion of his thesis. He is an unusually capable man, has a fine Jewish knowledge and background, was an excellent student, a clear thinker, an effective preacher, and a teacher of unusual ability. He is excellently qualified to serve either as Educational Director for your congregation or to combine the duties of this office with those of Assistant Rabbi. He has a pleasing personality and his character is of the very finest. He is unmarried.

Rabbi David J. Seligson (HUC 1933) has held a Conservative pulpit in Ventnor, N. J. since his graduation. I myself had the opportunity to see his work close at hand during the two months I was in Ventnor last summer. He has really achieved marvelous things there. He has built up his congregation from a very insignificant handful of people to one of dignified size and considerable influence in the entire Atlantic City community and throughout the southeastern part of the State of New Jersey. He has one of the most lovable and winning personalities of any man we have ever had in the College, is earnest, high-minded and loyal, capable and painstaking in all he does. He was an excellent student and a pleasing preacher. I have a very profound admiration for him. He is unmarried.

Rabbi David Sherman (HUC 1934) was one of the most promising members of his class. That he has not succeeded thus far in securing a pulpit is due to no fault of his, but only to circumstances over which he had no control. I regard him as the ablest student in his class and as the most promising preacher of that group. What he would be capable of in educational work I do not know, since he has had little or no opportunity in that direction. He too is unmarried.

This will give you a list of the men who either are definitely interested in the opportunity which your present pulpit situation offers, or who might easily be attracted thereto. All of these men, I think, merit your consideration, some, of course, more than others. Many of them you know yourself and will have your own opinion of their fitness for the position. I hope that this will be of some service to you, If I can aid you in any way in solving your difficult and responsible problem, please do not





RABBI TALKS TO IMPLEMENT MEN

Dealers Hold Final Sessions

Three hundred persons attending the Implement Dealers association banquet last night at the Jefferson hotel were told by Rabbi Melbourne Harris that a new code seeking the elimination of prejudice in the relationships between men should be added to those now in operation. He declared that there is a growing tolerance among the religious groups in America.

"The first Americans came to this country to escape European oppressions but they were the very ones to institute persecutions of minorities in this country," said Rabbi Harris. "I believe that these prejudices can be controlled and conditioned if we are open minded enough to look at the program aright."

"We are just beginning to realize that it is not necessary for all to have the same set of ideals, that truth is a universal highway with millions of approaches," said Rabbi Harris.

"True civilization," said Rabbi Harris, "is one able to unite diversified elements of humanity into voluntarily co-operating groups and the recognition by each group of the fundamental needs common to all."

The convention was to be brought to a close this morning with a business session. Richard B. Bradley was on the program for the final address.
