Dr. Gerhard Gershon Scholem of the Hebrew University, Jerusalem, who has been invited by the Jewish Institute of Religion to give the Hilda Stich Stroock lectures for 1938, has recently left Palestine to embark at Cherbourg on the "QUEEN MARY" for America. He will arrive in New York on February 21.

The six lectures in the course, which Dr. Scholem is scheduled to give at the Institute, will be on the general subject, "MAJOR TRENDS IN JEWISH MYSTICISM". The individual lectures will be:-

1. General Characteristics of Mysticism and Jewish Mysticism as an Historical Force. Monday evening, February 28.
2. Abraham Abulafia and the Doctrine of Prophetic Kabbalism. Tuesday evening, March 1.
3. The Zohar and Theosophical Kabbalism. Wednesday evening, March 2.
4. Isaac Luria and His School. Monday evening, March 7.
5. The Sabbatian Heresy. Tuesday evening, March 8.
6. Hassidism. Wednesday evening, March 9.

The subject of the seventh lecture, which will be given in Hebrew, will be announced later.

This series will be held in the Chapel of the Jewish Institute of Religion, West 68th Street, and will be open to the public. The lectures will later appear in volume form under the imprint of the Jewish Institute Press.

The Hilda Stich Stroock Lectureship on the History and Philosophy of Religion was established in 1927 for the purpose of inviting outstanding scholars of the world's religions to present some part of their research. Thus far the following series of lectures have been delivered at the Institute and published by its Press:-"Israel and the Tower of Babel", Hugo Gressmann; "Josephus-The Man and the Historian", H. St. John Thackeray; "The Jewish Foundation of Islam", Charles Cutler Torrey.

I wish to thank you for your invitation to the second Symposium "Religion Speaks" and also to congratulate you on this very important contribution to the religious life of our city. I was able to attend the first two, but not last night. I wish to say that your address at the dinner Monday was a masterpiece for cogency and for logical thinking. I agreed with you thoroughly and I see no alternative to the course you suggested. Of all the addresses I heard I think yours was the most searching and illuminating.

M. Jones and I in private conversation discussed a point which I think needs more emphasis and that is that the spiritual leaders of both Catholic and Protestant churches must share more largely with the spiritual leaders of Judaism in the creative transformation of our own hearts by which we can purge our world of it's cruel selfishness. I refer to the vision of the Great Unknown Prophet in Isaiah 53. However, the christians may interpret it, to mean that all of us must unitedly bear the burden of our suffering brethren. The thing that hurts me is that too many christian ministers shrug their shoulders and say that this is a Jewish problem. That attitude only means to damn their own souls and give paganism full sway. In other words we must do two things - we must organize the world into collective security as a political measure and we must suffer in spirit with those who are being tortured as a spiritual measure.

I want to thank you upon this great symposium which you brought to our city.
