Dear Rabbi Silver:

I hasten to reply to yours of today in re the program for the Memorial Meeting of Congregations on Thursday, July 23rd, at the Temple which you so kindly sent me for my reaction. I concur both in the conception and setup of the meeting.

With regard to the questions you pose, I shall answer them seriatim:

- (1) Unless the Orthodox rabbis object, I favor organ music while the people are assembling. I believe that such Orthodox Jews as may come to a reform temple for the meeting will not feel offended by the music.
- (2) "Shevisi" or the "Ab Harachamim" could be added between items 7 and 8 -- that is after the last address and before the closing prayer.
- (3) Since the program is designed to be somewhat in the nature of a service, it would be proper to have the audience participate through responsive reading of some psalm.
- (4) I think you should designate the participants.
- (5) Did the committee consider inviting the participation of one outstanding Christian minister to indicate that they too mourn with us the ruthless slaughter of so many of our people? Personally, I would favor the participation of a man like Bird, Phillips, Bishop Tucker, or Blanchard, who is now, I think, the moderator of the American Congregational Churches.

A Prayer for our Country in time of war . . . (Read in Unison)

O Loving Father, Thou art our ever-present help in time of trouble. We turn to Thee for courage and hope as the hosts of violent men encamp against us. We come into Thy Presence with humble spirits and hearts bowed down. Not in reliance upon our own merit do we make our supplications unto Thee, but trusting in Thy mercy alone.

We declare before Thee, O God of truth, that though we and our beloved nation have often failed to establish Thy Law on earth, we have not knowingly sought to violate it. We have indeed neglected the good but we have not fostered evil. We have desired no conquest, we have hated no nation and scorned no race. We had hoped for peace for ourselves and among all nations. Therefore we pray to Thee, O Lord of Hosts, now that with all our strength we are resisting violent evil, that Thou keep clear before our eyes the vision of world-wide peace taught by Thy prophetic messengers in days of old. Let not the heat of battle nor the rage of combat nor our resentment of the ferocious violence which our enemies inflict upon our people, ever drive from our hearts the ideal which Thou has taught us, to establish a world in which men shall beat their swords into ploughshares and learn the arts of war no more.

We ask Thy help for this, our beloved country. Shield it and prosper it in these days of tribulation and trial. Bless Thou our President. Preserve him in health. Send Thy light to guide him that he may lead us aright upon the road which we must travel. Send Thy protection to our soldiers and sailors on land, on sea and in the air; and those of Thy children who have fallen in battle, receive, O God, in the shelter of Thy loving arms and send comfort to the bereaved.

Grant us strength, O Lord of Hosts, for the heavy tasks which now confront us, as we re-dedicate our mind and heart and will to the ultimate goal. With Thy help we shall re-establish justice and brotherhood in the world that all may acknowledge Thee again as their King and Father. Amen.




The civilized world has been aroused by the ghastly details about the mass slaughter of the Jewish populations of Poland and Lithuania since the beginning of last year. The tragedy of Lidice has, as far as the Jewish population is concerned, been repeated a hundred fold in the extermination of Jewish communities. The extermination policy was decided upon at the beginning of the German-Russo War, and mass executions began during last summer, especially in Eastern Galicia. The routine adopted by the murderers is to herd together in one place, usually in the main square or in the cemetery, hundreds or thousands of men between the ages of fourteen and sixty, and mow them down by machine guns, or stab them to death, or kill them with hand grenades. Intended victims usually have to dig their own graves.

Of the seven million Jews who are directly or indirectly prisoners of the Third Reich, one million have been slaughtered, two and a half million are exposed to starvation and epidemic in Nazi ghettos, hundreds of thousands have been expelled from their homes and are facing economic annihilation, and ultimately, extermination.

On the historic day of mourning, Tisha b'Ab, the Ninth of Ab, commemorating the destruction of the Temple, the Jewish congregations of Cleveland will assemble this coming Thursday evening, July 23, 8:30 P.M. in a community-wide memorial meeting to pay tribute to their martyred dead, to condemn the mass murders of defenseless civilian populations in Europe, both Jewish and non-Jewish, and to pray for the victory of the United Nations against the most brutal pogromists in history.

The memorial meeting will be held in The Temple, East 105th St. at Ansel Road. Reform, Conservative and Orthodox Jews alike will meet together on this historic occasion and they will be joined by many non-Jewish fellow citizens. Similar meetings are being held throughout the nation. The Jewish Community Council, the American Jewish Congress, the B'nai B'rith, the Jewish Labor Committee, the Zionist Organizations of Cleveland, The Jewish War Veterans and many other organizations are cooperating.
