I regret exceedingly that I am unable to attend in person the memorial services in honor of the boys of the Temple who died in the service of our country. In all humility I pay tribute to your heroic dead through this brief message:

Today we honor twenty-two sons of the Temple who laid down their lives on the altar of freedom. They were strong, unafraid, full of the joy of life and youth - in the very flower of vigorous young manhood. They left the firesides of their homes to answer the call of duty. They never returned. Each gave his life as a part-payment on the bitter cost of victory.

sacrifices have not been in vain; that out of the ashes of a war-shattered world, we shall build foundations for a better, cleaner, more decent and more just civilization than we have ever known before - a world that shall see the fulfillment of the dream of Israel's Prophets that swords be beaten into ploughshares and men know war no more; a world re-made and rededicated to the service and happiness of all of God's children.

To the parents and families of our heroic dead, I say:

May God comfort you and give you healing, peace and strength. May a victorious America and a free and just world be everlasting monuments to the memory of your sons - and to all young Americans whose fate it was to die that freedom might live.

REWARD AND PUNISHMENT IN JUDAISM

BY DR. J. H. HERTZ

Dr. Joseph Herman Hertz, Chief Rabbi of the United Hebrew Congregations of the British Empire since 1913, died in London January 14th. He was 73 years old.

Throughout his occupancy of the Chief Office of the British Rabbinate Dr. Hertz was the acknowledged champion of his people and his faith. He not only provided religious leadership to world Israel but also made scholarly contributions to Jewish research.

The following essay on "Reward and Punishment in Judaism" was published in 1938.

Judaism teaches that obedience to the will of God is rewarded, and disobedience, punished. This doctrine is bound up with the fundamental belief of Judaism in a God of Justice. Because God is just, He will not treat the righteous and the wicked in the same manner. In some way, it must be better with the former than with the latter, through the justice of God. But such reward—whether conceived to be material blessing or, as in later ages, it becomes more and more spiritualized—is not made the motive for virtue. Such motive must be love of God and His commandments, a free enthusiasm for doing His will.

Obedience Out of Love

Throughout his Farewell Discourses, Moses demands obedience to the Divine will out of pure and disinterested love of God. His words in Deuteronomy breathe an ardent

love and spiritual awe of the invisible God, a heart-religion such as we meet in the greatest of the Psalms and the highest portions of Prophecy. Throughout these same Discourses, however, we find, as in no other Biblical book, the appeal to material reward for obedience, and material punishment for disobedience, repeatedly and urgently pressed. 'This is due,' it has been explained,

'to the personal position of Moses. In himself he is lofty spiritual nature, yearning with a parent's love to a people incapable of rising to his spiritual plane; a people yet in the childhood of what we call real life, to be enticed with promises and frightened with threats. And alternately he pours his spiritual fervour into their dull ears, and then falls back helplessly on to the material considerations which alone will move them' (Moulton).

He boldly makes use of every appeal that actually influences men—gratitude to God, feeling of dependence on Him, and fear of God—in order to win them to the higher life.

'He does not ask men to serve God because it will be profitable to them, but because they love God; and he endeavours to make them love God by reciting all His love and friendliness and patience to His people, and by pointing out the evil which His love is seeking to ward off. Having before his mind the results of evil conduct, he does urge men to escape from the wrath that may rest upon them. But the only means so to escape is to yield to the love of God' (Harper).

A Recurrent Problem

How far there is correspondence in actual life between righteousness and happiness, and between misery and sin, is a recurrent problem both in Biblical and post-Biblical Judaism. Deuteronomy and Ezekiel declare that men get in this world exactly what they deserve. Job, Jeremiah, Habakkuk, the Psalms, and Ecclesiastes courageously face the bitter facts of life, and point out how often it goes well with the wicked and ill with the righteous. This world-riddle becomes less distracting under the influence of the belief in the immortality of the soul.

Since the time of the Maccabees, the belief in immortality became well-nigh universal among the masses of the Jewish People. R. Yannai could thus remain quite unperturbed by his recognition, that 'it is not in our power to explain either the prosperity of the wicked, or the affliction of the righteous'. 'Faithful is thy Employer,' says R. Tarphon, 'to pay thee the reward of thy labour, and know that the grant of the reward of the righteous will be in the future life.' New spiritual conceptions became prominent; such as the great saying of the illustrious Babylonian teacher Rabh, 'In the world to come there is neither eating nor drinking . . . but the righteous enjoy the radiance of the Shechinah.'

Two Guiding Principles

In connection with this world-riddle, the Rabbis never lost sight of two things. First, that suffering is not an absolute evil; it educates, it purifies, it can be an instrument of Divine love. Through it, Israel came into possession of the best gifts—the Torah, the Holy Land, and Eternal Life. Rabh declared, 'He

who suffers no affliction and persecution, does not belong to Israel'; i. e. has not known the highest spiritual experience of God's chosen one. And the second thing is, that in the deepest sense, righteousness is its own reward. Ben Azzai taught that even as one sin begets another, so the reward of a good deed is that it leads to another good deed!

The Rabbis would have rejected the thought that in this world righteousness should permanently produce misery, and wickedness invariably lead to happiness, as both irrational and blasphemous. Nevertheless, they taught men to disregard the thought of reward altogether; and to do their duty, *lishmoh*, for its own sake. Rabbi Eleazar explained the opening verse of Psalm cxii, "Blessed is the man that delighteth greatly in His Commandments," to mean, 'he delights greatly in His commandments, but not in the reward connected with them.' This is in line with the teaching of one of the earliest Sages, Antigonus of Socoh,

'Be not like servants that minister to their master for the sake of receiving a reward; but be like servants who minister to their master without the condition of receiving a reward; and let the fear of Heaven be upon you' (Ethics of the Fathers).

Attaining Spiritual Exaltation

'It is true that the ordinary man may be incapable of such pure devotion; and, in his case, promises of reward and punishment are necessary. But such promises are merely a means to an end, the end being the attainment of such spiritual exaltation in which the love of good will be the sole stimulus to good. Let men serve God at first for reward; they will end by serving Him without any such motive. He who desires to serve God from love must not serve to win the future world, but he does the right and eschews the wrong, because he is a man, and owes it to his manhood to perfect himself' (Maimonides).

*Short Quotations from
Writings by Dr. Hertz*

The Jew's home has rarely been his 'castle'. Throughout the ages it has been something far higher—his sanctuary.

Anti-semites accuse the Jewish people of an incapacity for forgiveness and love. Let these preachers of love first practise it. Let them refrain, at least, from incendiary slanders against Israel who, among all the peoples of the world, has agonized and suffered most from hatred, malice, and all uncharitableness at the hands of others. Let such preachers of love remember the Mosaic Law: 'Thou shalt not bear false witness against thy neighbour'.

According to ancient Jewish custom, the ceremony of cutting our garments when our nearest and dearest on earth is lying dead before us is to be performed *standing up*. This teaches: meet all sorrow standing upright. The future may be dark, veiled from the eye of mortals—but not the manner in which we are to meet the future. To rail at life, to rebel against a destiny that has cast our lines in unpleasant places, is of little avail. We cannot lay down terms to life. Life must be accepted on its own terms. But hard as life's terms are, life (it has been finely said) never dictates unrighteousness, unholiness, dishonour.

Our virtues are Israel's: all our success in life we owe to the fact that the blood of the 'toughest of peoples' is coursing in our veins. Our vices are our own. Now the world inverts the distribution. Our virtues it credits to us, to our individual brilliancy, diligence, courage. Whereas the crimes, vices, and failings of any single Jew, no matter how estranged from his people or his people's faith he may be, it puts down to his Jewishness, and fathers them upon the entire Jewish race.

It is not a matter of sacred honour, as far as in us lies to counteract the world's injustice to our people by rendering, when the opportunity is

ours, some repayment for all we owe to Israel?

Israel's contribution to the common treasure of humanity will ever be primarily religious. Wide sympathy, ready help, and absolute self-determination must therefore be accorded in the New Judea to Jewish religious learning, Jewish religious institutions, and Jewish religious life. They alone contain the secret of Israel's immortality. The story of Israel's ancient kinsmen—Moab, Ammon, Edom—though these remained on their own soil, loses itself in the sands of the desert, while the story of Israel issues in eternity. Why? Israel alone had the Torah, and it is that which endowed him with deathlessness. And Israel will remain deathless—as long as Israel continues to cling to the Torah. Without the Torah, Israel's story will also lose itself in the sands of the desert, even on its own soil.

The New Judea must be the spiritual descendant of old Judea, and the mission of Judea, new or old, is first of all to be Judea.

The Temple library includes many volumes of the sermons, addresses and studies of Dr. Hertz. These may be borrowed by members of the congregation. The library is open daily except Monday from 9 A.M. to 5 P.M., Saturday and Sunday 9 A.M. to 12 M.

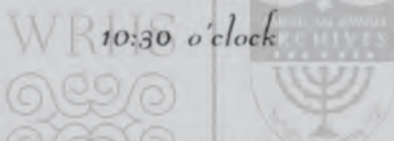

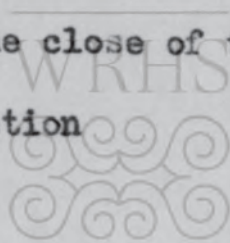

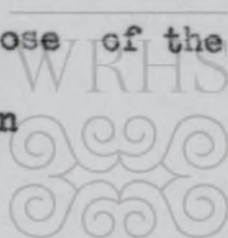
