DR. BARUCH BRAUNSTEIN



Baruch Braunstein has become a familiar figure on the American lecture platform. He possesses two qualities above all else that make him a captivating speaker: (1) he is authoritative in his fields of discussion and (2) he knows how to share his knowledge with his audience.

CAN JEWS BE ASSIMILATED?

This is an old question-as old as the Jews themselves. Here is an answer. Over 500 years ago the Jews of the Spanish Island of Majorca were converted to Catholicism. Today, after pathetically repeated attempts to become part of the Christian world and forget their Jewish past, their descendants live in almost complete isolation. They are socially ostracized. They intermarry among themselves. These are the Chuetas (chew-et-uz), the "little Jews", of Majorca. Baruch Braunstein went to their Island and lived among them. He ferreted out their romantic-tragic history from dust-laden manuscripts untouched for hundreds of years. He discovered a lost part of the Jewish people. He wrote about them. "We may forget we are Jews," the Chuetas told the author, "but they will always remind us of our origins. It is our inescapable fate, though we are deeply religious Catholics."



Reep) The Call to WASHINGTON that helped to create THE STATE OF ISRAEL

Here is the hitherto unrevealed fragment of the record of William O'Dwyer's contribution to the cause of the Jewish people during the turbulent week which preceded Washington's historic declaration of official support for the UN partition plan for Palestine. Symbolically, his bit of history began on the eve of Yom Kippur just two years ago. The Mayor's great service to the cause of Israel and the Jewish people is portrayed in the following partial transcript of an address by MAXIMILLIAN MOSS, President of the New York Board of Education, and Chairman of the Brooklyn Jewish Community Council, before the annual meeting of the Jewish Teachers Association of the New York City public school system.

Y OUR chairman, in advance of the meeting, warned me that a speech would be expected of me. And when I asked him what the theme of the meeting would be, he said, "Why, Israel of course."

For that reason, and because I knew of your large benefactions to Israel, I felt that it was but fitting that I take this occasion and select this group of teachers to tell a thrilling story, hitherto generally unknown, involving an important contribution to Israel by our Mayor.

I am confident that when I shall have finished, you will be thankful that when crisis after crisis arose, we were able to call upon a real humanitarian whose quiet but effective work in those dark days has now become part of a glorious history.

I must go back to the time *before* the U.N. had acted on the Palestine Resolution.

For some period prior to the final action by the United Nations in November, the United States position on partition had not been stated. It was expected, that of all the nations of the world, the United States could be counted upon, first and foremost, to aid in the establishment of a Jewish commonwealth.

But, as you all know too well, we found that no one in high official life in Washington would commit himself even to state the position which the United States intended to take before the United Nations.

Nevertheless, we were hopeful. We, as Americans and Jews, believing in justice and righteousness, had a right to be hopeful; and we believed that when the time for keeping silent by the United States ran out, and it became necessary to speak out, that the United States would speak out in no uncertain terms, consistent with the wishes of the majority of the people in America.

But things did not move as they should have; and people were urged to aid with telegrams, and letters, and public advertisements.

However, this was not enough, and high quarters deemed it necessary that public support throughout the country of an extraordinary nature be sought. It was suggested that a conference of Mayors be held. All Mayors were to be called to New York, with expenses paid by local groups.

O'Dwyer Leads the Fight

The Zionist Emergency Council, officially in charge of the fight, wanted New York City's Mayor to call the conference. This conference would have caused the Palestine Question to be publicized in every city of every state, for everything a Mayor said in New York would instantly be reported back to his own local newspaper. The thought was to arouse grass roots support everywhere.

I called on the Mayor with this request, and upon being apprised of the situation, he stated that he considered it a great privilege to be asked to do this. He thought, however, that it would be better for the United States Conference of Mayors to call the meeting. He picked up the telephone and for two solid hours called the various mayoralty officials throughout the country, making the suggestion. He did not receive their support however on the ground that the organization should not concern itself with international matters.

When the efforts failed, the Mayor said that he him-

self would call the conference at such time as we may wish him to do so. (This was not a light decision for New York City was the host city to U.N., and the New York Mayor was the host Mayor.)

The Situation Improves

We reported this decision to the Zionist Emergency Council, but as the situation had improved in the meanwhile, we thanked the Mayor but informed him that the Conference would not be necessary.

Shortly thereafter however, Mr. Harry Shapiro, Executive Director of the Zionist Emergency Council, telephoned me at the instance of Dr. Abba Hillel Silver, stating that Dr. Silver would like to seek the assistance of Mayor O'Dwyer in an effort to learn what Washington's position would be on partition. No one knew, although many throughout the country had seen the President.

Because of its emergency nature, an immediate appointment was made with the Mayor, and within a half hour after Dr. Silver's message, the Mayor agreed to communicate at once with Washington and try to obtain the information which Dr. Silver wanted.

This occurred the morning before Yom Kippur. By evening the Mayor had received his message from Washington to the effect that Washington officially would vote for partition, and that we had nothing to worry about.

The Mayor felt so good about that news that he telephoned me at Temple Ahavath Sholom, *Kol Nidre night*, and I was called out from Kol Nidre services to receive the information, which I related immediately to the interested parties.

The Mayor further stated that he had asked this Washington official to make sure that the State Department had the same views, and accordingly a conference was arranged for the following day (which was Yom Kippur) with the then Under Secretary of State Lovett.

Under Secretary of State Lovett on Yom Kippur confirmed the fact that the official Washington view would

he to support the majority plan. This was duly reported to Dr. Silver.

On the day following Yom Kippur, Mayor O'Dwyer on his own initiative advised us that he was very distressed; that he had received information from the highest, unimpeachable source (you would know the name of the man or woman if I stated his or her name to you) that things looked very bad and that the majority plan would be either openly opposed or sabotaged. The Mayor wanted me to convey this information *at once* to Dr. Silver.

The matter was of such grave concern that Dr. Silver decided to come to New York at once, and Dr. Silver asked that the Mayor on the following day, Saturday, again use his influence with Washington to change the situation.

An immediate appointment was made with the Mayor, who stated that he would come down to City Hall especially for this purpose on Saturday, to meet a Committee on the subject, and we were to meet him there at 11:00 A.M.

At the appointed hour, the Committee, Mr. Edward S. Silver, Mr. Nathaniel Kaplan and I met the Mayor at City Hall.

Now mark you, this was Saturday. Edward Silver does not ride on Saturday, and I want you to know that Mr.

Silver walked from his home in Flatbush to City Hall because of the tremendous importance of the occasion.

On that Saturday there were repeated telephone conversations between City Hall and Washington which brought confirmation of our worst fears. I can tell you that from 11 in the morning until 3 in the afternoon, without any lunch, the Mayor talked with many people in Washington. Finally he reached Senator McGrath, now the Attorney General of the United States, to whom the Mayor outlined vividly the extreme urgency of the crisis. Much impressed, Senator McGrath stated he would relay the information at once directly to President Truman.

O'Dwyer Meets Dr. Silver

In the meanwhile, Dr. Abba Hillel Silver was waiting at the Hotel Commodore for word from us.

We had to get to the Commodore; it was Saturday and Edward Silver doesn't ride on Saturday. Well, if Mr. Silver would not ride, neither would we.

So Nat Kaplan, Edward Silver and I walked to the Hotel Commodore from City Hall and there personally conferred with Dr. Silver. Dr. Silver considered the event so important that he decided to wait in New York over the week-end for our further report from Washington.

The importance of the Mayor's words reaching President Truman was great, as was equally important the necessity of receiving word from President Truman. Theretofore no one had been able to report the President's position.

The Mayor Gets the President's Word

On Monday of the following week, the Mayor received the position of President Truman and it was immediately reported to Dr. Silver whom I saw at the Jewish Agency at 16 East 66th Street.

The United States took the position it had promised! However, sabotage was still rampant.

Saturday morning, prior to the week of the United Nations vote, Harry Shapiro, Zionist Emergency Council's Executive Director, telephoned me stating that the necessary two-thirds vote had not been obtained.

That the American delegation was not energetic and aggressive; and that Latin-American countries were nonplussed at our attitude.

A high United Nations General Assembly Officer whose name had been given me, had reported that "Washington had not put the steam on."

Mr. Shapiro said he would like Mayor O'Dwyer again to urge Washington to take immediate energetic action; for if Washington wanted the plan to go through, it would.

Inspires Full U.S. Support of Partition in UN

The Mayor was located at a dinner in Brooklyn that night. He was told of the critical situation. That very night certain steps were taken by the Mayor and in order that Dr. Silver might have his answer, the Mayor arranged a meeting at Gracie Mansion the following morning at 10:00 A.M.

The conference at Gracie Mansion took place, at which time the Mayor assured us that his information at that moment (Monday morning, November 24th) was that the United States would fight vigorously for the Majority Partition Plan. We reported this to Harry Shapiro.

In the afternoon the favorable news was confirmed to us by Harry Shapiro, who stated that we should communicate with the Mayor and tell him to let up. For the first time, we were home.

Today we accept as a fact the establishment of the Israeli Commonwealth, but when we look back at the conditions at the time of the United Nations debates on the subject with the intrigue and machinations, who knows but that without the prestige, influence, and power of the Mayor in his demands on Washington, the result might have been different.



Mr. Mayor, we know that this is but an example of your readiness to serve all deserving causes, regardless of creed or color, and I am certain that I express the views of all here today when I say, "We, your contemporaries, and history in the future, will record you as a great man." The world can give no greater honor. God bless you.

My dear Friend:

About this time of the year the various organizations of The Temple plan their new Boards of Trustees and officers for the coming year. It has occurred to me that this would be an excellent time for the Nominating Committees who are inviting new people on the Boards to draw the attention of these prospective new Board members that one of the primary obligations and contributions which a Board member can make to his organization and to The Temple which his organization serves is to undertake, as an example to others, to be regular and faithful in attendance at public worship. Whatever other services a Board member can render his respective organization in The Temple, none is as important in the last analysis as the stimulating example which he or she will set by attending Sunday Morning Services regularly. Everywhere responsible leaders of Jewish religious life in this country are speaking about the necessity of a religious revival. I know of no better way than to set it in motion by the designated officers and Board members of congregations setting the example for the entire membership in the matter of Temple attendance. Failure on their part to do so is not only a personal failure, but because of the position which they occupy, creates a negative attitude towards the obligation of Temple attendance on the part of the membership at large.

Temples and synagogues, it need not be stressed, are religious institutions whose primary functions are public worship and religious education. Organizations which serve temples and synagogues must have these primary objectives constantly in mind or the whole purpose is defeated.

I believe that a tactful but firm emphasis on Temple attendance, especially at a time when new people are being drawn into positions of leadership in the congregation and its affiliated organizations, would go a long way to improve a condition which, though better by far than that which exists in most other congregations, can nevertheless stand considerable improvement.
