December h, 1953 Rabbi Ferdinand M. Isserman Temple Israel Kingshighway and Washington St. Louis, Missouri My dear Ferd: Please pardon the long delay in replying to your letters. I have been away a great deal and my correspondence has unfortunately lagged. I can give you the following facts about what we call the "Ansel Road Project." After a careful canvass of the situation we decided that there is no reason for planning to build a new Temple elsewhere since our present facilities and our present location can be improved in such a way as to make moving unnecessary indefinitely. The Temple, as you know, is situated upon the periphery of what is known as "The Cultural Heart of Cleveland." Under separate cover I am sending you a booklet which will tell you the story. All the institutions in this neighborhood are now making a concerted effort to protect the whole area from possible deterioration in the future, and some of them have launched important expansion programs. The Temple is protected on all sides but one. Across the street, on Ansel Road, is a block of shabby houses. The Temple Board decided to buy up all those houses as well as those backing them up on East 101st Street. This will give us a large triangle of land. Part of it will be used for the building of adequate parking facilities for our people and part of it will be put into attractive landscaping. I'm also sending under separate cover a map of the area which we are in the process of buying up. Part of the property has already been purchased and a fine parking lot has already been built. The total cost of the project will be about \$500,000. Much of it has already been raised. The membership has reacted enthusiastically to the idea of keepifig our beautiful Temple where it is; a landmark in a section of the gitting rachited winds to hearly all of our mentions the femple can be reached by more than ninety per cent of our membership in less than fifteen minutes. We figure that in whatever section of the suburbs a new Temple would be built, most of its members would have to travel by car; no large Temple can ever be

My dear Friend:

I should like to interest you in the Ansel Road Project in which The Temple is now engaged and upon which depends the future of our great institution.

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Under separate cover I am sending you a landscape plan for the area as well as a copy of a brochure recently published by the T. W. Grogan Co. called "The Cultural Heart of Cleveland," which will give you an idea of what is planned for the University Circle and in the vicinity of The Temple for the future.

We would like to keep our beautiful temple just where it is - in the heart of this cultural center. It would be folly to think of moving to the suburbs and spending millions of dollars for a new temple structure. The Temple should stay where it is indefinitely. We are and we will be within ten to fifteen minutes of riding time from the overwhelming number of our members.

We need two things: adequate parking space and the removal of the unsightly shakks on Ansel Road to protect our neighborhood. The Ansel Road Project will accomplish both. We have already built a parking space which you have probably seen and which will be enlarged this spring. When it is completed, we will have adequate room for the temple automobile traffic. The remainder of the area we will landscape into a beautiful park.

We have already acquired more than half of the property. We are proceeding to acquire the rest. The total project, when completed, will cost five to six hundred thousand dollars. We have already raised close to three hundred thousand dollars. We are making the effort now to raise the remainder of the funds. I would deeply appreciate if you could see your way clear to make a contribution which can be spread over a period of two or three years since all the money is not now required.
