Dear Rabbi Silver:-

I am delighted that you have accepted the supervisorship tendered to you by the Board of Managers. duties of the supervisor are important, but it is not intended that they should take up more time than the supervisor has at his disposal for this work.

Your District is known as District #23, and consists of northeastern Ohio east of a line running in the direction from Cleveland to Columbus, and north of a line running through Steubenville, but not including Steubenville.

The appropriation placed at the disposal of each supervisor is \$150.00. This is available for traveling expenses of the supervisor in visiting any of the cities or institutions in his District, for purposes of organization. When the visit is in the nature of "circuit preaching" the congregation itself ought to pay for the services and not the Union of Congregations.

I have no desire to burden this letter with many details, and will speak of the work of the supervisor only in a general Cities containing over fifteen Jewish families ought to be visited about once a year, preferably at the beginning of the season. If at all possible a school or a congregation should be organized and arrangements perfected whereby some neighboring minister, not the supervisor, visits this city regularly to conduct services. community served in this manner ought to pay for the services, the amount depending entirely upon their affluence.

If there are any colleges in your District, these ought to be visited for the purpose of seeing what service the rabbi can render to the Jewish students. Sometimes a Students' Synagog is advisable, at other times a much simpler organization, which can meet

Rabbi A. H. Silver - - - #2 to entertain an occasional lecturer sent by you, would be preferable. If there are any State Hospitals or State Correctional Institutions, these are to be visited for the purpose of seeing what can be done for the Jewish men and women. All these details including the presence of Jewish inmates in these institutions will be furnished to you from time to time by this office. We have made several surveys of the Correctional Institutions and our information is at your disposal. With reference to all these duties it sometimes becomes necessary for the supervisor to delegate his powers to some other minister in the neighborhood of the city or institution. This rabbi is designated as deputy supervisor. Of course, tact demands that the "nearest" man be chosen for this purpose. As I expect to write to you often, I will go into greater detail on a subsequent occasion. Accept my sincere thanks for your offer of cooperation, and believe me to be Very cordially yours, Director. Dear Rabbi Silver:-

I am very sorry that you were unable to come to the meeting held in Mr. Mahler's office. While no very definite plans were adopted, the needs of the College as well as the obligation of Cleveland to do its share was the subject of consideration. Cleveland has undertaken to raise its quota amounting to about The Committee that met at Mr. Mahler's \$30,000 a year. office agreed that the opening step of the campaign should be a dinner given to the large contributors, for the purpose of securing some large initial contributions. 

Dear Silver :-

In accordance with my promise to you, I am herewith explaining the situation at Can ton, which necessitated the postponement of the meeting on Tuesday, October 15th..

I received a telegram while in your city from Rabbi Zepin, to the effect that there has been a change of plans in Canton. I immediately went there and found that a drive on the 15th, would be absolutely a failure. It seems as though the congregation of Canton were setting out upon a little drive of their own during this week in order to raise funds for their own congregation. Under these conditions it would hardly be advisable to come there and try to raise the quota for that city. I took the matter up with Mr. Toransky. who is the leading spirit in Canton, and he promised to put the matter over. As yet the method is quite undetermined and I do not know how we are going to do it. I realize, of course, that you are a busy man and express herewith my regrets in having thus inconvenienced you in any way. However, as soon as I learn of anything definite concerning Canton I will communicate with you immediately.

Have you made a decision concerning
Loraine? I have this morning dispatched two letters
to Loraine, one to Rabbi Volkman and one to Mr.Gould,
informing them that as soon as I learn of your decision
I will communicate with them. Will you kindly advise
me therefore, of your decision in this matter?

My dear Rabbi Zepin:

I have just received a letter from Mr. Shohl informing me of the coming drive for membership and also containing the list of the memberships of every congregation. I note that Tifereth Israel Congregation is credited with 470 members. The last semi annual contribution of our mongregation to the Union, if I recall correctly was \$827.50, which means that we ware paying for a membership of 75%. This, of course does not include the delinquent list of the past year nor the thirty new members which were admitted to The Temple during the past few months.
