

My dear Dr. Gamoran: Let me thank you for sending me sample material of the Commentary on the Books of Amos and Hosea, written by Rabbi Tedesche. I recall that the Commission on Jewish Education some time ago approved the project of publishing these Commentaries. I am firmly of the opinion, however, that the whole subject should be reconsidered. I believe that the Commission is proceeding with the publication of a series of books for which there is absolutely no need in the religious school system of Reform Temples of this country. I know of no school where the books of the Bible are studied in such great detail as to require specially prepared commentaries on the part of the Commission. There is sufficient material on the subject of the books of the Bible written by Jews and non-Jews which an intelligent teacher can utilize. I recall also that a statement was made at the meeting a few years ago that the Jewish Publication Society is planning a series of Biblical commentaries. There are many textbooks which our school system still stands in greater need of. Biblical commentaries are not among them. Dear Dr. Silver:

I have your letter of February 23rd and I am hastening to answer it as I am under the impression that you are not quite aware of the present situation with regard to the need of a Commentary in our schools.

You may perhaps not recall that the Commission on Jewish Education had several discussions on the subject at several meetings, at some of which you were present and at others of which you were absent. The result of all these discussions was that everybody felt keenly sensitive to the fact that we do not have a single series of Jewish Commentaries to which we can refer our teachers or laymen. The publication of Commentaries was not intended especially for our schools; it was thought of rather as a project for the Jewish education of our adults, which would also be very useful to our teachers.

The problem of the Jewish Publication Society's plan came up, was thoroughly discussed, and as you will see from the Minutes containing a detailed plan submitted by your Committee, (Dr. Schulman, chairman) it was felt that the two plans were entirely different. Theirs was to be a scholarly Commentary; ours, while it was to use the results of scholarship, is to be a popular Commentary, to say nothing of the fact that the plan of the Jewish Publication Society is now about twenty-five years, and has brought no concrete results except the Book of Micah by Margolis.

I may add that it is now more than two years since the Commission approved this plan and we have barely gotten started. This is an indication of the fact that it takes a long time, and it will take a long time, before such Commentaries are available. This would in no way interfere, therefore, with the

immediate needs of our schools. Books that are of immediate need will, other things being equal, always be given preference as far as publication is concerned.

However, when all is said and done, and assuming that your attitude is correct, it should be brought up at a future meeting of the Commission on Jewish Education as a subject for further discussion. I do not see, though, that it would be fair to penalize any of the men whom we have invited and who have already done considerable work at our request, on one project or another. The Commission on Jewish Education is a responsible body. When we extend an invitation to a man to undertake a given piece of work, he is entitled to the assurance that if his sample material is submitted, it will be considered, and that if his work is satisfactory, the book will ultimately be published. How would you feel if we had invited you to prepare a book, and after you did a good deal of work on it, we wrote you a letter and said that we changed our attitude on the subject.

I do not want to compel you to read this manuscript if, for some reason or other, you are not inclined to do so, but I do not feel that your feeling with reference to Commentaries can be justified as a reason for not reading the manuscript, which the Chairman of your Committee invited you to read.

I am therefore returning the manuscript to you and I hope that you will read it, and in the light of the plan of our Committee, will give us any suggestions or criticisms that you may have.

As for the attitude that you are taking to the general subject of Commentaries, I shall be glad, if you feel so inclined, to see to it that the matter is placed on the agenda of the next meeting of the Commission, which will probably take place in connection with the Central Conference of American Rabbis. I hope you will find it possible to be present.

Dear Dr. Silver:

Upon my return to New York, I wish to offer my apologies for the avalanche of talking to which I subjected you last Friday afternoon. I had too much explosives inside of me which were pressing for relief. In despite of that I left out some very important items that require immediate and intelligent attention. One of them is very timely.

We are in the beginning of the traveling season. A goodly number of Jews who would not travel on German boats nevertheless slip into Germany during their sojourn in Europe either out of curiosity or under flimsy pretences such as visiting distant relatives, etc. In doing it these people are supporting the German railroads, hotels and what is more important to Germany than anything else, they are furnishing the much needed foreign exchange with which Germany may balance its foreign accounts. In addition to the general public there developed last year that particular nuisance that a large number of rabbis - both Reform and Conservative - went to Germany to make a study of their own, as if what is known already about conditions in Germany was not sufficient to satisfy even the unsatiable hunger for facts among the rabbis. I believe that Mr. Untermyer should issue a renewed warning against traveling to Germany either directly or indirectly, and as far as the rabbis are concerned, I leave them to you.

I have spoken to our friend, Herman Bernstein, over the telephone since my return and we both agree that a better organized political effort should be undertaken immediately before even our Jewish people become callous and indifferent.

May 7, 1934 Dear Professor Kallen: I wish to congratulate you upon your splendid address at yesterday's meeting of the American Jewish Congress on the subject of Democracy. It was a masterful discourse, not merely informative but an intellectual delight. In one respect however I like to take issue with you as a leader of the American Jewish Congress. While it is true that the principle upon which the American Jewish Congress is organized is democratic, the administration and the practices of the Congress are a mockery and denial of democratic principles. Every six months or thereabouts we are treated to a huge meeting. In the spece of a few hours a large number of speakers and prearranged addresses are crowded in. Naturally there is no time left for discussion on the part of the "delegates", neither is there any desire on the part of the chairman to permit a free discussion. I think it is an act of impudence and oppression to call 1500 delegates together on a sweltering hot day like yesterday merely to listen to good speeches, I will admit, and to say aye. Such meetings as have taken place lately are on the same level with Hitler's Reichstag viewed in the light of truly democratic principles of free speech and free expression of opinion.
