Dear Friend:

The first Regional Conference on Social Justice will be held in the City of New York, Saturday evening, January 26th and Sunday, January 27th, 1935, under the auspices of the Social Justice Commissions of the U.A.H.C. and of the C.C.A.R.

The chief purpose of the Conference is to discuss what program the Synagogue should develop in the present social emergency. The Synagogue must translate into present day language the teachings and ideals of Israel and must take a positive stand on the maintenance of the present or the establishment of a new social order. How can the Synagogue establish itself not only as a House of Worship and as a Place of Instruction, but also as a Religious Center for Social Justice? This is the question we are to consider at the Conference and out of our deliberations we believe will come a concrete program for the Congregations.

We are calling the Conference primarily for the Presidents and Vice-Presidents of the Congregations, the Sisterhoods and the Brotherhoods. If, however, it is not possible for these officers to attend, we trust you will appoint two alternates to represent your Organization. In addition to the delegates, we shall be happy to welcome other interested members. Kindly return the enclosed delegate blank as soon as possible.

You will receive additional information and a copy of the program at a later date.

To the Chairman and Board of Managers of the Department of Synagogue and School Extension:

Gentlemen:

This is not a report of the sub-committee of which I happen to be chairman. It is a personal statement I am constrained to make before retiring from this Board.

Your sub-committee was called together several times. Considerable correspondence has seed between its members. At the last meeting no conclusion was reached. It has

This is not a report of the sub-committee of which I happen to be chairman. It is a personal statement I am constrained to make before retiring from this Board. Your sub-committee was called together several times. Considerable correspondence passed between its members. At the last meeting no conclusion was reached. It has been impossible, therefore, to present a committee report on the work we were asked to do. In justice, however, to the organization which elected me to the Board of Managers and because of the many hours of earnest thought and study I have given to the subject and most of all because I desire to see the liberal Jewish movement mobilized and marching on to greater accomplishments, because of these things I make this statement.

It is not easy to say some of the things that must be said. I do not want to hurt any one's feelings. I hesitated a long time, indeed, until the last minute to put pen to paper, and yet the situation demands frank discussion. It is hardly necessary for me to say that I have no personal ax to grind; my life has been unusually blessed in the recognition of my fellow Jews for which I am humbly grateful. I cannot leave this Board, however, without giving expression to the convictions, right or wrong, which have come to me during a two-year service on the Board of Managers.

When I took the chairmanship of this sub-committee, on analysis and appraisal of the set-up and working of the Department, someone said to me: At least two other committees have studied the situation and have gotten nowhere. This was prophetic of my own experience. As I look back, I ask why? Why has nothing been done with invertigation after investigation? Why do the Board of Managers and the Union still find themselves without that enthusiastic support which this great representative body of liberal American Jewry needs and deserves? Why do the Department and the Union still fight a heart-breaking battle for cooperation and financial support?

With the keenest regret I have come to the conclusion that the answer lay with the official and lay management. The conviction has been forced upon me that the present official and lay management believe sincerely that the present set-up is the best that can be arranged under the circumstances, and that they are opposed to any change whatsoever. It is for this reason that other investigations have been fruitless; for the same reason our sub-committee work has availed nothing.

Perhaps one cause for this is that the Board of Managers of the Department of Synagogue and School Extension has not taken the intimate, personal interest in the work of the Department; we have not given it sufficient time; we have perhaps shifted the responsibility to the few lay members who live here and to the executive group. It is easy, however, under such mixes conditions for men, no matter how well-intentioned, to fall into a rut. I am convinced that what we need is an entirely new approach to our organization and program.

How does the Board work now?

Under our present system reports of the Director are uniformly approved, often without comment. Few questions are asked and frequently no suggestions offered, because the average member is without knowledge as to the detailed operation of the Department. It is often a waste of personal time and Union money to attend meetings as approval of reports is most often purely formal procedure.

At the last meeting of the Board of Managers, a report of the Budget Committee

was presented by a member who saw it for the first time when he read it. I favor some policy which will enable the members of the Board to work and shall move them to think about our problems.

Although it has been stated that under the present organization of the Department there is no over-lapping and our set-up is excellent, and some earnestly believe this, this is not my opinion in the matter.

One secretary concerns himself in part with the question of dues. This is unquestionably within the province of the Comptroller's department. Again, the Executive Director feels it necessary that he intimately survey every manuscript presented for publication. I am cognizant of the reasons advanced for this particular situation. Yet I do not believe, right or wrong, that the explanation offered is valid.

Since its establishment, the Department work has grown enormously. Its functions have been multiplied. Almost every new undertaking of the Union was put under the supervision of the Department, until today we find the Department must assume responsibility for a mass of unrelated activities beyond the purview of the Department. We have now reached the point where instead of doing the propaganda work contemplated by the founders, we have got to to propaganda work among our own members in order to hold them. We have devoted time to so many things that we have estranged or lost the interest of our constituent congregations. Contributions have fallen so low that drastic steps are necessary in order to meet a crucial situation.

Has the time not come to select some few activities that the Department shall undertake and work intensively on these? At the present time there is great and widespread activity but the spread is too thin. The gradual assumption during the years of one activity after another has consumed the resources and the energies of the Department and its personnel. We realize it is hard to cut out good work, but we must appraise our obligations, choose the most essential and do them well. What we need now is intention, not extension.

I am under the definite impression that while good work is being done, better work can be done. Too much time is spent by the officials in the office and not enough time in the field. I ask myself this question: Even with the limited budget at our disposal, are we getting returns commensurate with the monies expended? I am told that the organization of the Northeast Conference was opposed by the office with the argument, right or wrong, that they should be concentrated in a central office and that to set up a district with an office in New York might tend to create a rival organization. I know that in time a great undertaking like ours, there must be coordination. At the same time, there is such a thing as over-centralization. What happened? The Northeast Conference was organized and its budget is approximately \$10,000, out of which comes the salary of the Regional Rabbi. Active and excellent work is being done (see report) on a very small outlay. On the other hand, and again let me please emphasize that there is nothing personal in my criticisms, a Bureau of Synagogue Activities was set up with a budget of some \$8,000 to \$9,000. I may be wrong, but my impression is that the large sum spent in this way - and I do not question that the work is good - is an example of how we are pouring out money without adequate return. I believe this sum can be spent better in other ways.

It is impossible adequately to appraise our problems as the Board of Managers, without considering the situation, is the Union itself. It may be better to abolish the Board of Managers and set up a series of small committees under the Board of the Union, not necessarily composed of members of the Board; these committees to have supervision and control over the various functions at present managed by the Board

of Managers. Certainly it is necessary to maintain an Executive Secretary who should coordinate and supervise all of its activities, but it is not necessary that the Executive Secretary concern himself with the intimate details of all departments, when he might be in the field, making friends for and supporters for the Union.

The most successful work of our Board has been in the educational field. Unquestionably we have done an excellent job in the creation of educational literature. Why? Because the job was definite and limited. The same method should be applied to all our work. We should choose one particular job in addition to the educational work and concentrate on it. To me, there is no more important task than propaganda, organization of new congregations, field work. A great deal of the time that is taken up now in the office with matters which may or may not be extremely important might be eliminated and all our energies concentrated in the field. The success of the present regional work certainly points the way.

The vast communities on the eastern seaboard and the larger cities of the middle west, with their thousands of unaffiliated, cry out to us, challenge us. This is the primary work of the Union, but little attempt has been made to tackle the problem on a program basis. With the unlimited field, the Union has made little progress in twenty years and our membership of some 50 - 60,000 in the United States certainly does not represent potential strength of Reform Judaism here. I am convinced that the time has come for us members to de-limit our work to two fields:

- 1. Education
- 2. Propaganda and organization of congregations.

I believe everything else should be subsidiary to these two functions, and that our reorganized set-up should be directed toward these ends. I earnestly hope that at this meeting the Board of Managers will authorize our Executive Secretary to study the question from this particular angle and present at the next meeting of the Board of Managers a program along these lines.

One final thought and that is this: The Union needs the dynamic of some great personality or personalities. Is it too much to expect that the Executive Secretary, who coordinates all of the work of the Union, can at the same time be out in the field? If it is, then someone else should be constantly in the field. If Reform Judaism is to be vital and alive, it is essential that our communities must be constantly stimulated by personal contacts. At the present time we have no such stimulus. The November Tour, finely conceived as it is, has apparently lost its power to move our constituency. The Union therefore must go out and beg. It is unconscionable that our great organization, representing liberal Judaism in America, should have to go on its knees and beg support from individuals and communities. At the present time, it is dying on its feet. Certainly there is enough unselfishness and wisdom and vision among us to give it new life: I believe we can revice suthusiasm for Reform Judaism in America. I believe we can put the Union on a firm foundation.

I suggest some recommendation from this Board to the Board of the Union that in facing the new situation caused by the death of the beloved Ludwig Vogelstein, these matters be given the most earnest consideration. Perhaps we need some shlaried official at the head of the Union, such as the Federal Council has, whose job it will be to go from one end of the land to the other making friends for the Union, meeting the key people in the various cities, telling the story of the Union and offering that new dynamic which only shall put the liberal Judaism of America on its feet. Failing this, perhaps it would be helpful to draft some of our inspired

leaders, lay and rabbinical, and for a period of some months have them devote themselves exclusively to Union work. My friends, we are tired but in this job we cannot give way to weariness. We have a holy task to perform; I, for one, believe it can be done!

In conclusion, let me say that I leave this Board with regret. I feel it has been a privilege to have participated these two years in this work. My earnest prayer is that the spirit of devotion and unselfishness may prompt us all to rise to the responsibilities which are ours, and to promote the cause of liberal Judaism in America more adequately and with such intelligent and aggressive a program as shall lift the Union to the position of importance which was the dream of its sainted founder, Isaac M. Wise, and which it so richly deserves.







#### STATEMENT ON SOCIAL JUSTICE IN PALESTINE

We, the undersigned, appreciating the fundamental significance of economic factors in the upbuilding of the New Palestine, take this occasion to express the hope that steps he adopted to avoid the appearance in Eretz Yisrael of those errors which have tended towards confusion and distress in the economic life of other countries outside of Palestine.

As Rabbis we believe it our function and duty, irrespective of personal party affiliation, to hold forth the historic ideal of social justice as the formative concept in the economic upbuilding of the New Palestine.

We commend to our colleagues, to our congregants and the community, the wisdom of affiliating with and aiding those agencies of economic counsel and cooperation, which, irrespective of party, are assisting in the mobilization of private and public funds for constructive economic purposes in the Yishub.

As Rabbis we urge upon the leaders of the Yishub and upon the Jewish Agency the importance of so guiding the Yishub in the relationship of capital and labor that the social health, tranquillity and progress of the land will thereby be promoted; to the end that the investment of new capital be utilized for the maximum benefits of the Yishub; that unwarranted speculation be avoided; that the scale of wages be just; that working and living conditions be steadily improved; that all classes in the economic life of the country cooperate in the upbuilding of the New Palestine in accordance with the highest concepts of Prophetic and Rabbinic tradition.

We recognize that no one party or group has a monopoly upon the fulfilment of these ideals of social justice. We urge that the various parties emphasize their points of common interest rather than of difference, (since any difference is minimal in character), and that all groups cooperate in the attainment of our essential objectives, namely, the purchase of the land, the entrance of an ever-larger immigration, and the development of the agricultural, commercial and industrial life of the New Palestine. Only through conciliation and cooperation can the Yishub be able to establish the secure foundations of a productive, a happy, a culturally and spiritually creative life As Rabbis we are prepared to lend our in the New Palestine. best efforts to the promotion of this spirit of good-will and cooperation between all groups and parties striving for the upruilding of Eretz Yisrael.


