Dear Dr. Silver:

This year we were invited again by the National Broadcasting Company to sponsor THE CALL TO YOUTH broadcast during the months of June, July, August and September. The broadcast is held every Saturday from 12:30 to 12:45 P.M. Eastern Daylight Saving Time (11:30 A.M. Cleveland time), and is carried from coast to coast over the Red Network of N.B.C.

For our theme this year we have selected the general subject, "Religion and the Social Advance." We have divided this general topic into a number of subjects covering a wide range, as you will note from the enclosed.

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

Schwarz, Director Commission on Synagogue Activities Merchants Building Cincinnati, Ohio My dear Rabbi Schwarz: In reply to your kind letter of October 22, permit me to say that it has been a long standing custom of our Temple for the Rabbi to attend regularly the meetings of the Board of Trustees. The Rabbi of The Temple is not an exofficio member of the Board nor does he occupy any honorary position on the Board. He attends the meetings as Rabbi of The Temple. I found that arrangement most satisfactory. I, of course, do not vote, but that is really not necessary. I have also tried through the years to refrain from injecting myself into the purely business and administrative activities of the Board of Trustees, leaving that field to the laymen, unless such questions involved basic Temple policy. MANN RABBI December 16th 1940 My dear Abba: I happened to sit in on a Program Committee Meeting of the U.A.H.C. in New York last week in preparation for the Detroit Biennial. My suggestion that they adopt the subject, "Re-thinking the Union - Its Achievements, Its Failures, and Its Future" as the important topic of conversation for the next Biennial was accepted. For having "talked too much" they suggested that I take the assignment, "Its Failures". I shall think the matter over for a week or ten day's before accepting or rejecting it. Tam writing to you and three or four other of my colleagues and friends who share some of my misgivings about the Union to ask you to list the major failures of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations as we now have it. I know that you are very busy. but if you could sit down and most informally mention your misgivings I would greatly appreciate it. Dear Dr. Silver:

You were present at the unusual Council meeting which we had in Detroit. At the post-Convention meeting of the Executive Board I was elected Chairman of the Board. To my way of thinking, things have been happening a little too fast. Had it been possible, I should have preferred to meet with you and a number of the Jewish leaders, to ascertain from them just what the rabbis and the congregations expect of the Union. This method of first electing me to office and then leaving it to me to find out has many shortcomings.

Your own case is an instance of what I have in mind. You are one of the accepted leaders in American Jewish life. You have been observing the Union for many years. And from my own limited experience and from what the members of the staff tell me, you have been helpful on innumerable occasions. To should have prized the opportunity of having a heart to heart talk with you. Perhaps at the Conference in Atlantic City this opportunity may be offered to me.

Now that I have been elected I find myself in possession of a report of the Committee on Survey, advising a considerable expansion of the Union's activities. Coupled with this advice is the suggestion that the Union undertake to raise the money necessary for carrying these plans into execution. I find nothing to criticize in the plans of the Survey Committee, and if the success of this program depended merely upon the time that I can give, the plan would be a success.

More mature consideration, however, leads me to the conclusion that it will take the personal interest and cooperation of many men to carry out even a few of the suggestions contained in the report. I have no illusions about what I can do unaided. Fortunately I have the time to devote to this subject. I believe also that I have the enthusiasm. But what I am looking for just now is the supporting enthusiasm of the religious leaders and their congregations.

Can I count on you in this matter? Will you take me into your confidence as to what the Union should do
