Dear Dr. Silver:

I have examined carefully the list of names on the letterhead of the Jewish Agency for Palestine and can report the following with regard to the identification of these individuals with the United Palestine Appeal.

Of those listed, Dr.Henry Cohen, Galveston; Harold Hirsch, Atlanta; James Marshall, New York; Dr. Samuel Schulman, New York; Hon. Horace Stern, Philadelphia; and Henry Wineman, Detroit, are honorary vice-chairmen of the United Palestine Appeal.

Jacob Billikopf, New York; Louis J. Borinstein, Indianapolis; Alexander Kahn, New York; Dr. Maurice J. Karpf, New York; Samuel C. Lamport, New York; Rabbi David Lefkowitz, Dallas; Edwin B. Meissner, St. Louis; and Henry Monsky, Omaha, are members of the National Council.

Dr. Cyrus Adler and Hon. Alfred H. Cohen are honorary chairmen.

Those members of the Jewish Agency who have no relationship to the United Palestine Appeal include: David M.Bressler, New York; David A.Brown, New York; Howard S.Cullman, New York; Sidney Hillman, New York; Joseph C.Hyman, New York; Dr.Solomon Lowenstein, who resigned as a member of the Jewish Agency immediately following the last meeting of the Congress in Zurich; Hon.Henry Morgenthau, Jr., Washington; and Mr. Morris D. Waldman, New York.

In order to create a proper sphere of influence for the United Palestine Appeal and to give local leaders a sense of identification with the national office, it is proposed that a National Council for Palestine be created, with meetings being held from time to time, preferably in regional sections. Attached herewith is the list of people throughout the country who are registered for membership in the National Council for Palestine of the United Palestine Appeal. Would you be kind enough to indicate any omissions which ought to be repaired?

It is also proposed that a properly engraved certificate be printed for issuance to every member of the National Council, which he may hang in his office or home. It is felt that such a certificate would link the individual member more closely with the United Palestine Appeal interests. Does this proposal meet with your approval?

Is there anything which we ought to do to encourage further meetings with the Joint Distribution Committee with regard to an agreement for 1938? You will note from the memorandum which I have prepared on the Cincinnati meeting that several of the Joint Distribution Committee officers would consider a sixty-forty agreement if the \$750,000 which the Joint Distribution Committee proposes to get for the Coordinating Committee would be kept out of consideration.

The name of Nathan Straus has been proposed for one of the honorary chairmanships of the United Palestine Appeal. As you know, Mr. Straus withdrew from the United Palestine Appeal last year because of certain objections which he had to internal arrangements. Dr. Wise feels that if you would phone Mr. Straus, he would consent to serve as an honorary chairman. What is your view on this?

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REPORT OF THE UNITED PALESTINE APPEAL FOR THE YEAR 1937 TO THE EXECUTIVE OF THE COUNCIL OF GERMAN JEWRY.

The United Palestine Appeal is the fund raising instrument of American Jewry representing all elements in the community for the purpose of furthering the upbuilding of the Jewish National Home in Palestine. The officers of the United Palestine Appeal reflect the universality of the support which it is receiving from among Zionists and non-Zionists, conservative, orthodox and reform.

The campaign during 1937 was conducted on behalf of the Palestine Foundation Fund (Keren Hayesod), the Jewish National Fund (Keren Kayemeth Leisrael) and the Emergency Fund of the Jewish Agency (Mifal Bitzaron), all three participating equally in the proceeds, that is, each receiving one-third. Since the United Palestine Appeal considers itself solely a fund raising medium, the method of distributing funds raised by it was left to the Executive of the Jewish Agency and the Board of the Keren Kayemeth. The officers of the United Palestine Appeal urged, however, for 1937 as in 1936, that a part of the proceeds of the American campaign be used by the Executive of the Jewish Agency and the Board of the Keren Kayemeth for the settlement of German Jews in Palestine. Accordingly, the amount of \$250,000, the same sum as in 1936, was set aside for this purpose.

The records of Palestine collections in the United States during the five years from 1933 to 1937 show that the sum of \$1,162,000 was allotted to assist German Jews in Palestine during this period. In addition to the funds raised directly and made available by the United Palestine Appeal, there were special collections for the Youth Aliyah by Hadassah, in agreement with the United Palestine Appeal, which resulted in the remittance to Palestine, as of October 1, 1937, of an additional \$254,264. The total for German assistance in Palestine provided by America is therefore \$1,407,764.

The appropriation of the money hitherto contributed by American Jewry to the settlement of German Jews in Palestine is described in full in the report of the German department of the Jewish Agency, whose budget proposal for 1937 was adopted by the Council for German Jewry in a plenary meeting held last March in London and attended by Dr. Stephen S. Wise and the late Felix M. Warburg.

In order to appreciate the share of the United Palestine Appeal in the task of settling German Jews in Palestine it must, however, be borne in mind that the chief purpose of this Appeal is the consolidation and enlargement of Jewish Palestine which is to become a home for Jews from all parts of the world. Of the amount of \$30,000,000 net which during the years from 1931 till 1937 were remitted by world Jewry to the ordinary budget of the Keren Hayesod, the share of the United Palestine Appeal and its predecessors is \$13,715,000 (44.4%) which is considerably more than the share of the whole of European Jewry (31%). Attached herewith is a copy of a letter from Dr. Martin Rosenblueth, Director of the London office of the Central Bureau for the Settlement of German Jews, which analyzes a report by the Joint Distribution Committee regarding the sum of approximately \$9,000,000 which it states it has made available for Palestine development. 91% of the amount was provided before 1933 and the greater part of that during and immediately after the war.

of the Palestine expenditure was \$8,855,215. Since the Joint obviously did not disburse \$881,025 in 1936 for Palestine, it is difficult to see how Mr. Hyman arrived at the figure of \$9,736,240 per 31st December, 1936. It may be that this difference can be accounted for considering that the printed report does not include the amount of \$860,000 which according to Mr. Hyman were expended not by the Joint itself but by its constituent committees for schools, Talmud Torahs, Yeshivahs, etc. in Palestine. These \$860,000 which were not actually provided by the Joint should really be deducted from Mr. Hyman's statement thus reducing his grand total to \$8,876,240. This, in its turn, leads us to two conclusions:

- 1. that the Palestine expenditure of the Joint in 1936 was \$21,225 making a total of \$78,555 which were expended in Palestine from 1933 till 1936 (including the grants to the Hebrew University during these four years;
- 2. that of the grand total of the Palestine expenditure 91% were disbursed before 1933, i.e. prior to the Hitler regime, and only 9% during the Hitler regime (1933-1936).

As for the concluding part of Mr. Hyman's letter (beginning with the last paragraph on page 2 of his letter) it may be said that while it is true that the Joint can justly claim to have designated for the training and emigration of German Jews large amounts an appreciable part of which was used for the training for and emigration to Palestine, it should not be overlooked

- 1. that in 1934 and 1935 these allocations were made by the Joint out of the proceeds of the joint drives in the U.S. in which Zionists as well as non-Zionists participated;
- 2. that the proceeds of these drives were divided between Joint and American Palestine Campaign at the ratio of 60-40 -- not 50-50 -- for the very reason that the Joint could show that the excess of 20% would to a considerable extent, even indirectly, benefit Palestine;
- 3. that for the same reason the United Palestine Appeal agreed to the returns of the local collections in 1936/37 being divided likewise at the ratio of 60-40.

THE SUPPORT TRANSFER IN "HAAVARAMARK" (JEWISH SUPPORT MARKS) OF INTRIA LTD. LONDON

1) The position before the creation of Haavara Support Marks

Before the creation of a special Jewish Support Mark, Jewish donors abroad affected their benevolent payments and money gifts to Jewish relatives, friends and charitable organizations in Germany in the same way as is still done today by non-Jewish remitters. Those were the three ways used almost exclusively:

- a) Remittance of actual foreign currency (bank notes or cheques) to the German recipient, who has to surrender the foreign currency to the German Reichsbank and received Mark in exchange.
- b) Remittance in "Registered Marks" which can be purchased with an average discount of 50% 1 \$ = RM 4,60/4,80. (For further information see under "Standstill Creditors").
- c) Remittance of so-called "Couponmark" which can also be acquired with a discount of about 50% 1 \$ = RM 4,60/4,80.

Registered Marks and Couponmarks serve to gradually repay the German debts to foreign creditors.

2) The Standstill Creditors of the German Reich.

The foreign creditors of the so-called short term foreign debts of Germany are known as the Standstill Creditors. This group is mainly composed of well known big Banks in USA, England, Holland, Switzerland, etc. The claims of this group amounted in 1931 to about 5 milliards of Marks. Between this group and the German Reich the so-called Standstill Agreement was concluded, which so far has been extended from year to year. According to this Agreement the Standstill Creditors are the only group of foreign creditors to which the German Reich has conceded the right to use blocked inland Marks for travel and support purposes. The frozen Marks of the Standstill group are generally known under the name of "Registered Marks".

3) The creation of Haavara Support Mark.

The creation of a special Jewish Support Mark from Jewish emigrants' capital awaiting transfer could accordingly only be granted by the Standstill Creditors, who had to waive their monopoly right to that extent. Their consent to the creation of a Jewish Support Mark was given at the Standstill Conference of 1937, as per enclosed Resolution of the 15.2.1937. The agreement of the Standstill Conference to the introduction of a special Jewish Support Mark was meant as a humanitarian gesture by this (non-Jewish) group of creditors for the benefit of the promotion of Jewish emigration from Germany. It means that the Standstill banks have agreed to a slowing down of the repayments of the amounts owed to them from Germany, in other words an actual financial sacrifice.

4) The technical procedure for benevolent payments in Haavara Support Marks.

The remittance of Support payments in Haavaramarks is a "pure finance transfer" i.e. a method of a transferring the capital of Jewish emigrants, which has nothing to do with German exports. The transfer operates as follows:

A Jewish donor in USA (Mr. A.) wishes to remit 200.-Marks to his sister (Mrs. B.) in Germany. He buys from his Bank in New York 200.-Haavaramarks and pays therefore about \$43.- (that is about half the official Mark rate). These \$43.- do not go to Germany, but are paid in full to the Palestine emigrants' foreign currency fund with the Haavara Ltd., Tel Aviv.

The 200.- Marks due to Mrs. B. are paid out to her from the special Reichsmark account of the Palestine Treuhandstelle, Berlin, into which the would-be emigrants to Palestine have paid their Reichsmarks for the purpose of transfer.

5) Conclusion

Thus the following conclusions can be drawn:

- a) The use of Haavaramarks has not the slightest community whatsoever with the export of German goods.
- b) Haavaramarks take the place of Registered Ma ponmarks, or even remittances to Germany hitherto eff foreign Gurrency.

The purchase of Haavaramarks in no way conting the increase of business and export of German goods or of the ux of foreign currency to the Reich.

The purchase of Haavaramarks does however - by swelling the foreign currency fund of the Haavara - help to accelerate the transfer of the capital of Jewish emigrants from Germany to Palestine.

It is true that Boukstein was requested to act as attorney for Pasa in registering the debentures with the Securities and Exchange Commission in Washington. This has nothing to do with registering Pasa as an American Company. The registration is with the Securities and Exchange Commission in order to sell the debentures. Bentov did very little on the matter and so far as I know Hexter did less. I know of no committee appointed for the selling of Pasa debentures. I never heard of the alleged Secretary of the Committee, George Weiss. I think that it would be very difficult to sell Pasa debentures, particularly at the present time. I suggest that you present Dr. Landauer's letter to the U.P.A. Executive Committee and that you write Dr. Landauer after obtaining the views of the U.P.A. Committee. If I were the Jewish Agency, I would not start an effort of this kind or even go to the expense of registering the securities in Washington (a not insignificant expense) without obtaining clear, definite approval and working arrangements fith the U.P.A. The Executive of the Jewish Agency has charged me with the management of our colonization company, the Palestine Agricultural Settlement Association, Ltd. (called Pasa). It is in connection with this matter that I write to you today. Mr. Ben-Tove, member of the Hashomer Hazair, who was in the States last autumn, gave us an account of his activities for Pasa in America, and I gathered from his report that he was also in touch with you. Dr. Hexter who returned to Palestine several weeks ago, also informed us of the prospects for the sale of Pasa debentures in the States which, in his opinion, are quite good.

We shall not, of course, commence the sale of debentures without being in close touch with you, with the Zionist Organization, and with the United Palestine Appeal. We shall be happy to have your advice and your help. As well as that of our other friends in the States.

According to the law of the United States before starting any activity in America it is necessary to register Pasa as an American Company. Advocate Boukstein, of the American Economic Committee, has agreed to act for us in the matter of the registration. We will send the necessary material to him in the course of the next week or two (that means a batchof documents).

Mr. Ben-Tove also reported that he had appointed a committee to help in the sale of Pasa debentures, and that Mr. George S. Wise, 55 West 42nd Street, New York City, is the Secretary of this Committee. I do not know Mr. Wise or the members of the Committee, and if we really start work in America it may be that we shall have to supplement this Committee in accordance with your advice.

Dr. Hexter states that it would not be advisable to start the sale of debentures in the States before the autumn of this year.

I will keep you and our friends in America informed of our work, and hope that you too will keep in touch with us in this very important matter.

There is, so far, no printed report on Pasa's activities but the audited Balance Sheet for the year 1937 will be ready in the course of the next few days. I will send you a copy of the Balance Sheet together with explanations in due course.

I have noted the exchange of correspondence between Dr. Georg Landauer and yourself.

If the various campaign fund-raising efforts for Palestine to which we have objected conflict with the United Palestine Appeal, there can be no doubt of the fact that the sale of PASA debentures would certainly raise a hue and cry whose adverse effects would be felt by the United Palestine appeal.

The trouble is that no venture which tries to dispose of investments in Palestine has thus far been able to disassociate itself from the philanthropic and sentimental aspects. The more I hear about the size of Nachshon Bonds the more I hear of the glories of Jewish manhood - the wonder of Jewish brawn and the greatness of Jewish genius. Nothing is said - or whatever is said is spoken in undertones - about the prospects for income returns on an investment made in a bona fide proposition.

My de r Mr. Montor: I have just returned from my tour of the Pacific Coast and before I plunge into the many congregational duties which await me, I want to give you my reactions to the trip. I was completely gr tified with the reception which I received on the Coast, with the arrangements which were made and with the response of the communities. Bernard Stone did a good job in planning for my coming. He seems to have taken hold of the situation in an excellent way. He traveled with me to the respective com unities where we set up permanent contacts for future UPA activity. I was deeply touched by the warmth and enthusiasm which awaited me in every community. The meetings were extraordinarily well attended - in some instances great numbers were turned away. As a rule I addressed a campaign workers' meeting at luncheon and large public meetings in the evening. During the day I also met smaller groups or prominent individuals whom I wanted to interest in the UPA. I was particularly gratified with the banquet of the Western Regional Conference of the Jewish Welfare Federations which gave me an opportunity to meet a great number of the representative Jews on the entire Pacific Coast and with the banquet of the Moving Picture people which I understand was the largest in the history of that colony. These Moving Picture people plan to do substantially more than at any time in the past and their contributions at the dinner indicated that they will materially exceed their contributions of last year. Mr. Louis B. Mayer finally broke down and after my address delivered a lengthy eulogy

H. Montor -2-April 12, 1938 of the man who caused him so many months and years of mental torture ... Generally speaking, I found the Jewish communities on the Pacific Coast very much alive to world Jewish problems, very sympathetic to Palestine and very eager to be helpful and cooperative. Now, with reference to other matters in connection with the UPA: I am enclosing herewith a letter from Mr. Herold Jacobi. He is not quite as optimistic as Mr. Blitz seems to be about the contributions of the wealthier Jews. I have definitely set aside Monday evening, April 25th for Mr. Wertheim's meeting at the Harmonie Club. It will not be possible for me to come to Newark on May 2nd. I simply cannot be away from Cleveland all the time. I can attend a luncheon in Newark on Tuesday, May 3rd. If they feel that an evening meeting would result in greater good for the UPA, I would suggest that they invite Dr. Wise or some other leader to address the meeting. Please inform Mr. Stavitsky. Dear Dr. Silver:

In a report sent to me by Silverman on a J.D.C. Conference held in Syracuse last Sunday he states that Joint Distribution Committee leaders are encouraging their representatives and friends to conduct campaigns exclusively for the J.D.C. He says, moreover, that individual leaders of the J.D.C. are being urged in view of the Austrian situation to conduct in their communities "a special emergency effort" that would have no relationship to the funds allotted to the J.D.C. in Welfare Fund communities.

I do not know, of course, to what extent these urgings will be incorporated into practice. I am sure that the J.D.C. would not officially and publicly encourage such separate action which would constitute a violation of our agreement. On the other hand, I can understand that the J.D.C., particularly Mr. Coons, would utilize the separate campaigns of the Jewish National Fund as a means of extricating itself from the 60-40 agreement.

It may interest you to know that the J.D.C. is aggressively engaged in a drive to stimulate a separate J.D.C. campaign in Albany which for the past few years has had a combined drive. In my view, a separate U.P.A. campaign would not be helpful to our interests.

The J.D.C. is engaged in a systematic program of cultivating the communities. This it does through a series of lecture programs and through the regional conferences.

The situation in Springfield is very bad. Rabbi Snyder has been our enemy ever since he left the Hebrew Union College.

George Greenspun has just returned from a visit to Springfield with a gloomy picture. Apparently Snyder is determined to keep the United Palestine Appeal out of the 1938 campaign in Springfield. It is planned to hold a meeting at the home of Governor Horner on May 9th with Miss Sigrid Warburg as the speaker. \$7500 is the quota for the Joint Distribution Committee. It is the intention of a few people in Springfield that if more money is raised, a part of it shall be given to the United Palestine Appeal.

Dr. Wise has written to Professor Sachar of Champaign, who is close to Governor Horner, urging that Sachar communicate with Governor Horner to request his intervention on behalf of United Palestine Appeal.

The attached letter from you to Snyder may prove of value.

Dear Dr. Silver:

From the comments made by Stone, and from what I have seen in the California papers your visit to the Coast must have been a great experience for everyone who heard you. A letter came to Blitz this morning from Louis K. Sidney, who said that in all his life he had never heard anyone who had impressed him as greatly as you did at the motion picture dinner. I am sure that your tour will mean permanent benefits for the United Palestine Appeal.

While you were away I kept sending to Cleveland copies of various letters which I thought would be of interest to you and also made reference to some of the problems that have arisen. My general observation of the campaign at this date is that there will be an increase as compared with last year. The increase may be 10%, it may be more. It would be hazardous to be too specifically prophetic. It any event there is a much better spirit in every community. Due to the fact that the Welfare Fund system prevails in almost every community from which funds in bulk are expected, it is not always the United Palestine Appeal and Joint Distribution Committee which will share in the increased revenue, but rather other participating agencies and local causes. I think it is really unethical for some of the communities to do what they are doing in utilizing the Joint Distribution Committee and United Palestine Appeal appeals to advance minor pet hobbies and to take care of the mortgages of local institutions.

There is now being completed a comprehensive survey of the entire country as of April 10th. This record will give the name of every community with which we have had any contact this year or in the past, and will refer to mail communities as well as to those which conduct active campaigns. Since this report consists of more than 160 pages the actual running of of it is consuming a great deal of time, but copies should be available some time next week. The information will obviously be very tentative in nature since the most important campaigns are to be held during the month of April, and even more during the month of May.

As regards Bernard Stone, you have seen at first hand the work he has been doing. I, too, feel that he is ideally equipped for the type of work that must be done in a United Palestine Appeal region. He takes his duties seriously, reports regularly and provides the type of information that is essential to obtain the background on the progress of the campaign.

I had been having difficulty with Mintz many weeks ago because he had gotten into a rut in following his old campaign methods of sticking in one community for weeks or even months. I indicated to him that if this continued he would be subject to dismissal. As a result he has been engaged in the type of activity that will mean increased results throughout his territory. At least that is the report that comes in at this time, not only from himself, but from the communities themselves. I have already written to you about New Brunswick, which hopes to raise \$5,000 for the Joint Distribution Committee and United Palestine Appeal this year as against \$700 last year. Lakewood, N. J., which raised \$700 altogether last year has already obtained \$5,000, with a substantial amount more to come. The most important problem in New Jersey is in Newark, which had been relying upon you to go there on the evening of May 2nd. They don't feel that the luncheon on Tuesday, May 3rd will be as adequate for their purpose. They are to let me know their decision as to another speaker they may decide upon.

Silverman has been very active in the New England area, giving a great deal of his time to Boston, which hopes to raise a total of \$200,000, as against \$120,000 in 1937. 75% of Boston's quota is to be divided equally between the Joint Distribution Committee and United Palestine Appeal.

Simon Levin covers his territory pretty regularly. He is not, as you know, a heavyweight in the force which he puts into a community. He is businesslike and competent, but certainly not inspiring. However, reports from throughout the Seaboard Region indicate better results this year. Richmond, Va., with which this office has been cooperating extensively, which is apparently appreciated, believes that we will receive between \$9,000 and \$10,000, as against \$6,500 in 1937. Washington, D. C. is again out for a quota of \$100,000, as against a quota of \$60,000 last year. If the \$100,000 is raised the United Palestine Appeal will receive about \$38,000. This would compare with \$22,000 last year.

Braunstein is adjusting himself to his territory. His difficulties are, of course, greater, since he is entirely new to United Palestine Appeal campaign procedure. However, he is apparently making a very splendid impression everywhere he goes. In the end this will cound greatly in our favor.

The person who is giving me the greatest amount of difficulty is George Greenspun, who seems to have developed a sitting disease which keeps him chained to Chicago. I have given him several warnings, but have realized that until April 24th, when the Mid-Western United Palestine Appeal Conference is held in Chicago he will probably be greatly concerned about the success of this Conference. I, too, feel that the Chicago meeting can have as great a value for United Palestine Appeal sentiment throughout the mid-West as the Washington Conference did earlier in the year.

I know how tremendously crowded your schedule has been and is, and I also know that you are to come to New York for the Wertheim meeting on Monday evening, April 25th. If it were at all possible for you to go to Chicago

for one of the sessions of the conference, either afternoon or evening, on Sunday, April 24th, it would provide just the note that is missing. Do you think it can be managed?

After the Conference Greenspun will either have to go on the road, for which he is well adapted, or else take the necessary consequences.

Attached herewith is a schedule showing where each man has visited when during the past few weeks. From the full report that you will receive next week you will see the effectiveness of their work.

At the Federation Board Meeting last night the separate ear-marking of \$1,215 for the J. D. C. was deleted from the recommendation of the Budget Committee as a separate item in the allocations submitted for the various subventions and the following Motion was then adopted to cover the \$11,215 allocated, the minutes reading as follows: "A Motion was moved and ecconded that the reserved specified funds be allotted \$1,115 to the J. D. C. plus \$5,600 recommended by the Budget Committee, making a total of \$6,715 and \$100 plus \$4,400 recommended by the Budget Committee making a total of \$4,500 to the J. P. A., moved and unanimously carried."

While the motion is rather crude and unsatisfactory, it was a definite understanding of the Board that the purpose was to have the J. D. C. receive 60% and the U. P. A. receive 40% of the \$11,215 fund.

I would be pleased to know your reaction to the budget although in view of the arrangement nationally I do not think it makes much difference how the motion was adopted.

I would like to make certain that in the receipt of funds by the two national agencies that the said \$1.215 shall be so divided that we shall receive 40% of that money. Otherwise, I would certainly secure a number of \$50 and \$100 pledgors to give me checks for at least half of their individual pledges payable to the U. P. A.

We succeeded in having the budget allocation to the American Friends Hebre University changed from \$100 to the sum of \$300.

I am frank to tell you that if the National Organizations enter into an agreement on disparity against U. F. A., we shall decline to submit to this discrimination. If the Joint Distribution Committee is likely to insist on such an agreement in the future, I should like to have this information. The U. P. A. can raise \$10,000 in a campaign of its own and we will withdraw from the Federation. I think that the J. D. C. is doing a disservice to itself, and to many of us who want to help the J. D. C., by entering into such agreements as 60-40.

April 5, 1938 Mr. Baruch Braunstein United Palestine Appeal Dear Mr. Braunstein: I have received your letter of the third asking me for an agreeable time for your visit to my city. Zionism is, to me, almost as sore a point as the other forms of nationalism. Nothing, in my opinion, has done so much to make questionable the position of Jews in the Lands of their adoption and sworn sole political loyalty. Now I have never been able logically to separate the purposes of the United Palestine Appeal from the purposes of its constituent organizations, nor them from the ultimate aim of a Jewish state, a Jewish flag, and a Jewish government in Palestine. With all my distress at the pains of my byother lews in the lands of oppression, even if it were clearly for their sake, I would not jeopardize the future of all the coming generations of Israel. I fully realize that the majority of Jewish leaders are honestly of a different viewpoint than mine: but nevertheless I must make up my own mind on the basis of my own conscience. To me every dollar spent under the UPA is a dollar spent toward the eventual realization of a Jewish state. I really see no particular use in going through the unpleasantness of another personal interview with a UPA representative. For the last several years, in spite of my own desire to keep the conversation on an impersonal plane, the UPA representative has invariable impugned my motives and questioned my love of my people. I would, of course, prefer to avoid another repetition of that. Furthermore Mr. Ben R. Mayer (Union Homestead Cor) and Mr. Henry Louis Cohn, (Baton Rouge Drug Co.) are co-chairmen of the Baton Rouge Jewish Welfare Fund. The UPA is not included and I am of the opinion it is too late to include it. It was left out on my advice; but it must be clearly understood that in my dommunity the rabbi advises and does not direct. If, therefore, you are not satisfied with the present status in Baton Rouge, I would suggest you correspond with either of them directly. If they continue to ask my advice. I shall, of course, continue to tell them that it is my opinion our community can best serve the interests of our overseas brethren by giving all they can afford for that purpose to the Joint Distribution Committee alone. My dear Mr. Montor: I do not think that the Newark people ought to insist on a 50-50 arrange ent, especially since it is purely nominal. It would be a far friendlier gesture on our part to tell the JDC folk that while we are able to procure a 50-50 arrangement in some welfare fund towns, we have instructed our friends to abide by the 60-40 arrangement. I do not think that the campaign in Newark would suffer from such an arrangement. With reference to the Tri-State zone: I believe that Mr. Coons is entirely in the right, bearing in mind that his statement applies only to special funds raised by the JNF and not to the continuing long-established vehicles for JNF collections. I agree with you that the Weizmann broadcast should not be tied up with any other broadcasts. The JDC will be amply represented on our program throughout the week of the campaign and a statement by Shroeder on behalf of the Council, would not be of any particular appeal at such an occasion. I have written to Judge Rothenberg requesting him to contact with Mrs. Warburg. I am pleased to know that you are going to Chicago for the Mid-West Regional Conference. Please make it very clear to the officers of the Region that the purpose of the Region is not to serve as another Zionist district but as a vehicle for cultivating good will for Palestine among the great sections of our people as yet not actively identified with Palestine. The men who should be cultivated and put forward at all times should be not old-time Zionists, but new people. I note in one of the papers that El Paso had a successful campaign. What share of the Quota was allotted to the UPA?

The specific information which you give me in your letter of April 22 as to the Jewish National Fund's having raised \$1500 in March 1938 in Reading, with the understanding to all contributors that these contributions had nothing to do with the ensuing campaign to include the United Palestine Appeal, is appreciated.

As you have been advised undoubtedly, the Joint Distribution Committee and the United Palestine Appeal entered into an agreement for 1938 that all funds allotted for these two agencies in some 75 specified welfare fund cities are to be divided on the basis of 60% for the Joint Distribution Committee and 40% for the United Palestine Appeal. This agreement applies to Reading, which you will find included on the attached list of communities as being covered by this agreement.

I now quote to you one of the supplementary minutes to the agreement, signed by Abba Hillel Silver and myself, which reads:

"As the United Palestine Appeal, for purposes of this Agreement, undertakes to include not alone Keren Hayesod, Jewish National Fund and Mizrachi, but also Emergency Fund for Palestine, it is understood that the Joint Distribution Committee will include within its 60% allotment, provision for special emergencies in relation to its program."

Under the circumstances, it is my opinion that the Reading Jewish community, including the subscribers to the emergency campaign of the Jewish National Fund held last month, have no alternative but to divide this money during the calendar year of 1938 on the basis of 60% for the Joint Distribution Committee and 40% for the United Palestine Appeal. I shall, of course, be most grateful to you if you submit my letter to the United Palestine Appeal, which includes the Jewish National Fund as a partner, for their interpretation.

There are various conditions that surround the complete payment of this allocation, which I am instructed to communicate to you: (1) The current campaign of the Jewish Welfard Fund has thus far received, in subscriptions, the sum of \$580,603. The sampaign will, unquestionably, receive, in subscriptions 600,000. and may receive some slight additional sums. A number of persons, who, in the last campaign, had made substantial gifts, found that for this campaign they either could make no gift at all, or very definitely reduced the amount of their previous subscription. It is, therefore, necessary for us to relate the allocations to participating organizations to the amount actually raised. (2) The Board of Directors of the Jewish Welfare Fund desired me to indicate to both your organization and the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee that they wished to have the amounts paid by Chicago related very closely to the amounts actually collected by the United Palestine Appeal and the Joint Distribution Committee. You will recall, of course, that we have a 10 percent arrangement, whereby we have agreed, provided we are able to raise sufficient funds, to pay 11 1/9% of what each of these two agencies have collected elsewhere, so that Chicago will represent 10 percent of the amount received from the whole country. In view of the fact that we are making payments to your arganization for 1937, and, in a sense, we will be one year behind in our payments, it is completely feasible to pay over from the Chicago Fund to your organization 11 1/9 percent of what has been collected by the United Palestine Appeal, and to follow the same procedure with respect to the Joint Distribution Committee. As you know, we have thus far paid on account \$85,000. (4) The maximum allocation of \$204.435 is based on a recent statement of pledges for 1937 which we received from your organization, deducting expenses of the New York campaign and service payments and excluding the Youth Aliyah. FINANCING CHARITABLE AND EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS AND AGENCIES IN PALESTINE

On December 22, 1937, the Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds, in collaboration with Miss Henrietta Szold, prepared a proposal for transmitting appropriations from Jewish welfare funds in the United States. to charitable and educational institutions and agencies in Palestine. The plan called for cooperation between the Jewish welfare funds through the Council and the Social Service Department of the Vaad Leumi, of which Miss Szold is Director.

The important features of the proposal were:

- 1. Social Service Department of the Vaad Leumi will assume responsibility for obtaining information about Palestinian institutions which appeal for support in the United States.
- 2. All reports of these agencies in the files of the Council will be brought up-to-date.
- 3. The Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds will assume an obligation of \$1,200 for one year to finance two thirds of the estimated cost of engaging an investigator and incidental items.
 - 4. The program will be carried out in consultation with an advisory committee of five members, two of them designated by the Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds from among American residents in Palestine.
 - 5. The Vaad Leumi and its advisory committee will accept from American welfare funds all appropriations which they wish to make for distribution to Palestinian charitable and educational agencies. The welfare funds can:
 - a. Designate the institutions to which they wish their allotment paid and send separate remittance to each agency in care of the Vand Leumi.
 - b. Send a single remittance to the Vaad Leumi and ask the Department to assume responsibility for distributing their allotment among a specified group of institutions.
 - c. Make their allotment to the Department for distribution to Palestinian agencies at their discretion without designation of individual agencies.

The Board of Directors and the General Assembly of the Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds accepted the proposal at the Cincinnati meeting. Word has just been received from Miss Szold that the Vand Leumi has also accepted the proposal.

The share of the expenses assumed by the Council has been met by pledges from individual members of our Board. The advisory committee of five will consist of Dr. Magnes and Mr. Viteles appointed by the Council, a representative of the Chief Rabbinate for Eretz Yisroel, and two members selected by the Vaad Leumi, one well versed in the affairs of the old Yishub and one close to the Sephardic community.

We have asked the Vand Leumi to proceed with details and hope to have reports ready for distribution to our member agencies at an early date.

Welfare funds wishing to use the Vaad Leumi for transmission of their appropriations to Palestinian institutions, as described in paragraph 5 above, may send their remittances and instructions to Miss Henrietta Szold, General Council (Vaad Leumi) of the Jewish Community of Palestine, P.O.Box 471, Jerusalem, Palestine.

In transmitting funds the following steps should be noted:

- 1. Ask your local bank for current rate of exchange at the time the check is made out.
- 2. Have the bank make the check either in dollars or pounds, (whichever is indicated at the time by the rate of exchange) in the amount to be sent to the Vaad Leumi in Palestine.
- 3. Give instructions with the check, indicating which of the three following methods you desire:
 - a. List the agencies and amount designated to each, if you wish distribution made according to your allocations.
 - b. List agencies or types of agencies and allow the committee to determine what allocation should be made to each agency on your list.
 - c. Indicate that you wish the committee to select the agencies and make the distribution according to their judgment of needs.

My dear Mr. Fichman:

Mr. Lofman showed me a letter of April 29th that you were good enough to send to him.

Let me clarify the agreement that the United Palestine Appeal has with the J.D.C. concerning the allocations of funds from Welfare Funds. Your community is, of course, affiliated with the National Council of Jewish Welfare Funds and therefore is subject to this agreement.

Under the agreement, funds allocated for the JDC and the UPA are distributed on the basis of 60% for the JDC and 40% for the UPA. The Jewish National Fund is permitted, as always, to carry on its traditional efforts.

In the subscription blank, copy of which you were good enough to enclose, you have a special item there of "£1.00 for the Jewish National Fund." The suggestion that each contributor to the campaign should give an additional dollar to the JNF is a splendid one for itself, but I am very much afraid that under the agreement that Welfare Funds are operating, the amount to be realized from the dollar contributions will have to be included in and charged up to the United Palestine Appeal. I quote Paragraph 4. from the minutes with respect to the agreement.

"The traditional collections of the Jewish National Fund, such as box collections, Flag Day and Flower Day collections, trees, stamps, bequests, endowments and Golden Book certificates are, of course outside the purposes of this Agreement. It is therefore understood that such projects as the sale of the Huleh Bonds by the

My dear Mr. Montor: After our meeting with the field workers, yesterday morning, I am persuaded more than ever that the New York City campaign needs thorough-going and immediate revision in technique and perhaps also in personnel. The suggestion which I made, of getting up a card index of some two thousand names of givers and of organizing a dependable group of one hundred workers personally to solicit these prospects, should be acted upon at once. If necessary, I would suggest the employment of one or two alert and effecient executives to do nothing but devote themselves to this one job. It would pay, I am convinced, based on my experiences in Cleveland and in other communities, and a substantial sum of money could be realized if this plan is adopted and systematically prosecuted. It is not yet too late. I believe that you ought to devote more time to the New York campaign because that is where our ultimate success or failure will be registered. New York City ought, this year, to raise from five to six hundred thousand dollars more than it raised last year. Everything favors such an outcome except our altogether inadequate campaign organization. A word about the dinner. The address of Dr. Silver was nobly conceived and grandly uttered. That is all that can be said for the dinner excepting that the ices were cold.

You might as well face the fact that a new technique has to be devised. The dinner was utterly unworthwhile excepting for the address. Dr. Silver did not come to New York in order to make a great speech. The meeting was made up of people who had given in small amounts -- perhaps a dozen who had give \$1,000 or more -- and the ordinary run of Zionist hangers on and officials like you and the writer.

It may be heartoreaking to you, to whom a dinner is the "Holy of Holies" of Lichist life, but dinners must be given up except upon such rare occasions as one can find a Lord and Lady Melchett to dine. It is the end of the year. People are away. Nobody worthwile attends. It falls flat. If elegence could have moved the attendants, that attendance would have given, but there was no one to give; and people do not come there to give. They come to hear their gifts recorded. I don't believe that more than \$2,000 or \$3,000 of fresh money came from that function. Just because to have had closing dinners or opening dinners is no reason why such dinners should be continued forever.

I put it to you very earnestly and I shall send a copy of this memorandum to Dr. Silver in order that he may have in mind what I say for another year.

Mr. Hamilton Fish delivered a splendid Zionist address full of warmth and spirit. Dr. Weizman's telephonic broadcast did not come over well. Most of it was a rumble. Nevertheless the people did receive a thrill from the few brief sentences which did come over. You have undoubtedly received my request from Mr. Goldhamer to get the full text of Dr. Weizman's address by cable. We shall have it printed here and put into the hands of all those who attended the anguet last evening. Incidentally, it will make good copy for the next issue of the New Palestine. Please rush this matter. Dr. Wise's letter to you and Mr. Blitz, a copy of which you sent me, hits the nail on the head. It is, you will recall, the substance of what I said to Mr. Blitz and the workers at the hotel on mednesday morning. A new technique must be quickly put into operation if our campaign in New York City is not to peter out. I have indicated what this new technique should be and I must insist that Mr. Blitz and his co-workers proceed along the lines mapped out. I do not know whether I shall have the time to come to New York in June and spend a week there. Dear Dr. Silver:

I am working with Blitz on the New York campaign in accordance with your suggestions.

I saw Mr. Lipsky this morning and secured his consent for a series of projects which Blitz and I are working out to stimulate a wider response in the community.

An emergency meeting of the Brooklyn leaders of the United Palestine Appeal has been called for Wednesday afternoon at the United Palestine Appeal office. Brooklyn is one of the worst areas in the city, and it is the purpose of this conference to make the leaders conscious of the fact that they have no title to leadership because of their failure to organize the campaign properly.

On Thursday afternoon there will be a meeting of the chairmen of every Zionist district in New York. The purpose of this is to have every Zionist member in New York canvassed by the chairman of the district or by some officer especially appointed. There are, of course, many Zionists who contribute through sectional campaigns or through trade groups. The office was put to work this morning on the compilation of a complete list of every Zionist in the city, showing the amount contributed in 1937 and 1938. On the basis of this giving record every Zionist in the city will be approached.

A special luncheon has been called in Mr. Jacobi's office on Friday. Invited to this luncheon are those not directly affiliated with any trade group or sectional group and who, themselves, can be given a number of cards and organize other workers. There will be about 15 or 20 people at this special luncheon. These conference activities are designed to put new life into the campaign and to thrust more responsibility on those who have thus far been getting away with what is actually murder.

I am seeing Dr. Wise tomorrow and plan to see Dr. Goldstein and others to submit to them a list of names, which Blitz and I will prepare, as prospects whom each of these leaders will be asked to see or telephone.

It is my belief that a number of the directors we have are not as effective as they might be. Blitz feels that now is not the time to dismiss them because it would very seriously affect the morale in the sections in which they work. What will have to be done, therefore, is to supplement what they are doing and give them a new goal at which to aim.

submitted the idea are discouraging for they believe that Hadassah would not be willing to assume new responsibilities, particularly when not concerned with actual Hadassah programs. However, I think

There are, of course, things that can be and must be improved in the New York campaign of the United Palestine Appeal. Improvements have been going forward steadily, and as soon as the leadership of the United Palestine Appeal recognizes completely and unreservedly that a fund-raising effort for Palestine cannot be hampered by personal sentiment in the determination of the leadership or of the working personnel, most of the difficulties will have been removed.

During the past week have, on your instructions, tried to see how the New York campaign has been operating, and to observe to what extent the United Palestine Appeal is making itself felt in various sections of the community.

Until the end of June every effort will be made to supplement the activities now in progress. I will give whatever assistance is within my power. By the end of June it will be possible to give a more complete picture of the effectiveness of efforts now being made.

I think it is important, however, in fairness to what has been done and is being done, that a comprehensive picture be drawn of the structure of the United Palestine Appeal. For that purpose I have asked Mr. Blitz to compile some data which indicates (a) the men and women on the staff of the United Palestine Appeal in the New York Campaign and (b) the trades and sections being handled by the individual workers and (c) the amounts, placed at a conservative estimate, that are expected from the trades and sections being covered.

There are a number of factors that must be taken into consideration when comparing the results in New York with those obtained for the United Palestine Appeal in other cities. In the latter there is the advantage that the United Palestine Appeal is tied up with

other causes, whether it be in a combined drive with the Joint Distribution Committee or in a Welfare Fund campaign, which reaches every section of the community and appeals to every interest.

It is true that Chicago through the Welfare Fund gives \$200,000 to the United Palestine Appeal but, if an independent United Palestine Appeal campaign were being conducted there, I doubt whether even \$40,000 would be raised. The same is true of most communities throughout the country if we want to be realistic about the attitude of communities to Palestine.

From the point of view of its large Jewish population and the tremendous sentiment for Palestine that is said to exist in New York, it is obvious that New York ought to raise much more than is being raised. But on the other hand account must be taken of the factors which are involved in preventing greater amounts being raised. In any campaign for the United Palestine Appeal it is the Zionists who should serve as the bulwark both in the amounts given and the workers utilized. That is certainly not the case in New York City. With only the rarest exceptions, every Zionist leader in the city of New York has interests other than the United Palestine Appeal. Whatever he may do for the United Palestine Appeal does not represent the totality of his life or of his fund-raising. It is not as in other communities where a solicitation once made covers all causes.

The national officers and the members of the Administrative Committee should constitute the nucleus of workers in the New York Campaign. They do not. In the first place, many of the members of the Administrative Committee are themselves very poor and, in addition, have no contact with persons of means. But, in the second place, those who do have the contacts and who ought to interest themselves in soliciting are not doing so. The brunt is placed on a man like Blitz or on the other directors to spur on workers and even contributors.

In any normally organized campaign conducted elsewhere, it is the chairman and his fellow-officers who take seriously their obligations, and during the period of a campaign go everywhere and do anything to see people and insist that they give not only as much as last year but more.

There is something else that must be considered in relation to New York, and that is the lack of big gifts. As statistics have proved, 70 or 80% of the money obtained in any community comes from about 7 or 8% of the contributors. That is not true of the United Palestine Appeal Campaign in New York City which must work out in hundreds and thousands of one-dollar and five-dollar contributions what one man might cover with a single \$25,000 gift. Those who have

the means in New York City are definitely hostile to Palestine, whether it be Lucius Littauer who gives \$2,500,000 to Harvard University, or Simon Guggenheim who dispenses millions of dollars every year, or Roger W. Straus whose gift to the United Palestine Appeal for the first time in years amounts to \$500. In the first place, there is no one from among our leadership who is willing or able to contact these men; and in the second place, even when contacted they refuse to yield in their uncompromising hatred of Palestine.

On May 2nd the New York Campaign showed total pledges of \$214,061.88. Broken down, the figures showed that \$68,954.15 represented pledges for the United Palestine Appeal's share in joint campaigns in New York City in trades and sections; and \$145,107.73 represented pledges in independent United Palestine Appeal campaigns in trades and sections.

There is a meeting today of Brooklyn leaders of the Campaign, and tomorrow there will be a meeting of the Presidents of the Zionist districts. For Friday Mr. Jacobi has called a luncheon meeting for a Special Gifts Committee to be formed, with a larger gift cards to be handed out among those who will take them. I have still to be convinced that there are sufficient people so passionately devoted to Palestine that they are willing to take cards of important people who must be spoken to plainly with regard to their contributions if any money is to be gotten. I look forward to the Friday meeting with a hope that the deep emotion, which has been stirred in so many Jewish hearts, will find concrete expression in actual work.

In all the trades that have been organized -- and these represent the most important asset for the campaign -- the system of solicitation through prepared prospect cards is the one being followed in every case. It is this system that Mr. Blitz is now trying to impress upon the sectional groups where the Zionists constitute the strongest element.

In addition to the quotas and trades which are being covered, I am sending you the sheets of daily receipts reported in the office of the United Palestine Appeal so that you may get an idea of the reach of the campaign and the method being used to get the money.

One of the important ways of getting money in New York is through banquets. That does not mean that appeals are made at the banquets, but that the banquet is utilized as a focus in appealing to contributors. They are told that a distinguished speaker will be the central figure at the dinner and that their gift will be announced. Thus even though no additional money may be gotten through a dinner, it is the dinner which makes possible the receipt of the money. That may be an unfortunate way to appeal to people but that is human nature, which is respected not only by the United Palestine Appeal but by the

Greater New York Fund Campaign which is now out for \$10,000.000. and by the New York Federation which raises millions every year.

It is important, I believe, to emphasize one outstanding fact about the New York Campaign, and that is the work accomplished by Blitz in bringing into the United Palestine Appeal's sphere of activity, people who are non-Zionists. These are the leaders in combined drives with the Joint Distribution Committee in New York, and even in independent United Palestine Appeal efforts. Were it not for these new people who do not have an outstanding record of Zionist service, the United Palestine Appeal Campaign today would be where it was in 1928, 1929 and 1930 when \$90,000 and \$100,000 was being raised every year instead of \$700,000 which New York will probably raise in 1938.

You yourself have commented on the hysteric devotion of Zionists to Palestine which expresses itself solely in frothy sentiment, and rarely, if ever, in concrete work on behalf of the Palestine which they love.

I have before me a list of the Brooklyn leaders who are being summoned for the meeting this afternoon in this office. All of them are outstanding figures in the Brooklyn Zionist Organization. One man, who is an Honorary Chairman in Brooklyn, has not given one penny. Another, who is a member of the Administrative Committee, has not given one penny. In fact out of 35 Zionist leaders -- men and women who have been summoned --. only a handful gave any money at all, and the balance merely enjoyed the pleasure of leadership and complaint against whatever activities were being conducted to raise money from such people as were not discouraged by the knowledge that the leaders had not contributed anything.

New York is, as you say, the most important problem for the success of the United Palestine Appeal Campaign in 1938. More money will be raised than was raised last year due to the pressure being applied and to the efforts of Blitz to get in non-Zionists rather than to have to rely on non-working Zionists against whose dominance in the Administrative Committee he protested vehemently last year.

I think it would be most helpful to the campaign itself and interesting to you for a knowledge of the community structure in New York if you could possibly spend a week here, meeting with the workers, the contributors and the prospective contributors.

Dear Dr.Silver:

I observe that you have been writing to a number of the officers of the New York campaign to whom you have made comments reflecting your view on the campaign.

The stimulation that is intended by these letters has its greatest effect, of course, among Zionists. I am afraid, however, that in certain instances letters of reproof will have an adverse effect. Mr.Jacobi, for example, may be discouraged by what he might regard as criticism of his participation in the campaign. After all, there are few key people upon whom the United Palestine Appeal can depend.

It is essential to spur the workers, but on the other hand, intensive criticism may dis-spirit those who are actually engaged in the work.

You will, of course, appreciate the spirit in which I make this comment, particularly since you know that our views coincide as to the methods that must be undertaken to supplement the present activities of the United Palestine Appeal campaign.

A meeting was held in the office yesterday of the leaders of the Brooklyn UPA campaign. There was the best representation that I have seen in many years.

Mr.Lipsky presided at the meeting and Mr.Blitz presented facts with regard to last year's and this year's campaign. There was a very long discussion during which one point was made clear and that is, that individual workers and leaders must conduct far greater personal solicitation than is now being done and that each leader must make his own contribution to the campaign commensurate with the quota and with the effect he wants to create upon other prospective contributors. I believe that the effect of the meeting was very good.

Two resolutions were adopted: (a) that each section pledge itself to raise at least fifty per cent more than in 1937 and (b) that a meeting of the Brooklyn leaders be held at 111 Fifth Avenue once a week to report progress on the campaign and to consider methods of fund-raising. This will serve as a nucleus for more intensive effort.

There is a meeting today of the chairmen of the Zionist districts. I shall report the results on that to-morrow.

It would be unfair to get the impression that nothing is happening in the campaign. There are scores of functions and meetings taking place all the time. The results may not always be commensurate with the effort, but the effort is being made. What has to be done is to create larger objectives and to get more intensive effort out of the workers. I assure you that every effort will be made along these lines but it is important that whatever criticism is made should be directed at those men who are best able to stand it.

May I reiterate the hope that you can spend a week with us?

May 14, 1938 Mr. Henry Montor, United Palestine Appeal, 111 Fifth Avenue, New York, N.Y. My dear Mr. Montor: I received your letter of May 12 in which you refer to certain letters of "reproof" which presumably I sent and which might have an adverse effect on the campaign. You mention particularly Mr. Jacobi to whom I wrote and who might be discouraged by what I regard as criticism in the participation of the campaign. Frankly, I don't know what you have in mind. The only letter I wrote to Mr. Jacobi is the one on May 5th, a copy of which I enclose herewith, in which I thank him most warmly for his participation in the meeting of a week ago, in which I suggest that one of the shortcomings of the campaign seems to be the dearth of workers and in which I suggest that much more could be done if an active group of layworkers would be organized under his leadership. If this reproof, then I do not know the meaning of English. I think one of the weaknesses of the New York campaign is the "tip-toe" methods which Mr. Blitz and othe s have been using in their relation to the people whose putative prestige they regard as indispensable to the success of the campaign. This "bated breath" attitude isn't worth a tinker's dam. With the exception of Mr. Harold Jacobi who has shown real devotion to the cause both in labor and in financial support, all the others are false decoys. For a miserable five hundred dollar bill, Roger Straus exploited a UPA benguet for his anti-Zionist, anti-Nationalist, and anti-Jewish State pronouncements. Such people will neither give you nor get you money. Mr. Blitz and his workers should devote themselves to the thousands upon thousands of Jews in New York City of the substantial middle class who can be reached for amounts ranging between one hundred and a thousand dollars. They are our prospects for Palestine and they should be solicited.

Henry Montor -2-May 14, 1938 I am glad to learn of the meeting which was held in Brooklyn and that you have also arranged the meeting of the chairmen of the Zionist districts. Keep Blitz and his workers plugging away at this job and forget the spologetics. I know all the difficulties and I am making full allowance for them. We still have six more months in which to work in New York City. Let's postpone the alibis until the end of the year. I was in Detroit yesterday. They had a very large and enthusiastic meeting. They have already reported \$539,000 towar's a goal of \$590,000. Their campaign closes Wednesday. Our own campaign in Cleveland is progressing very satisfactorily. On Thursday aftenoon, May 12th, there was a meeting at the United Palestine Appeal office of chairmen of Zionist Districts. A call had been issued to all the chairmen in Manhattan, Bronx and part of Brooklyn for the purpose of assigning to the Districts a responsibility for their members in the United Palestine Appeal campaign.

Copies of the follow-up letters that have been sent out from this office indicate the resolutions that were adopted. These were to the effect that the list and individual cards for every Zionist member should be sent to the chairman of every Zionist District showing whether the member had contributed to the United Palestine Appeal, and how much. The District would be asked to follow up inadequate amounts given by members, and particularly those who have not given anything. It was made clear to the District officers that in many instances the failure of members to contribute was due to the fact that they have not even been approached.

The District officers responded to the meeting, which was most effectively conducted by Mr. Louis Lipsky. You may be sure that everything will be done to ensure the success of this plan of covering at least every member of the Zionist District membership.

I am enclosing herewith a copy of the card which analyzes the contribution of every member. I am using this card to check up on various lists of prospects that have not even been covered. Within a week, in addition to the completion of the card, I expect to have an analysis of the number of Zionist members in New York contributing to the United Palestine Appeal. This analysis will show the total amount contributed and the average contribution.

On Friday at the Empire State Club there was a meeting summoned by Mr. Jacobi for the purpose of considering special gifts. The difficulties of conducting this type of work were

reflected in the response to Mr. Jacobi's personal and urgent invitation. Those who were invited but expressed regret at their inability to attend were: Maurice P. Davidson, Abraham L. After a most effective statement by Mr. Jacobi, who was in unusually good form, the attention of the meeting was diverted by Mr. Louis Nizer, who went into one of his usual fantastic schemes of having five prominent people call another meeting, which would, I assume, be followed up by still another meeting, ad infinitum. After a boringly long discussion of this absurd scheme, I had to be the shagetz and emphasize that there were fifteen people in the room and that our campaign should start with these fifteen and not worry about hundreds of others who have not been brought in and who might not be brought in, and that it was essential that every person take one, two or five names and at least make an effort to contact people, many of whom have not given because they have not even been approached.

The meeting resulted in the determination that every person present would take ten names to be followed up personally. Mark Eisner, Arthur Lamport, Louis Posner, Rabbi Louis I. Newman and the women each agreed to take ten names. This, I think, was an excellent start. It is just too bad that we could not get more people to attend such a meeting. It is intended, however, that a series of such small groups be called together for no other purpose but to distribute cards.

It will interest you to know that after looking into the methods of raising funds in New York, I find that the Joint Distribution Committee's approach is actually worse than that of the United Pelestine Appeal. That is no consolation, but some of our people feel that their ineptness is excused by a similar ineptness on the part of the Joint Distribution Committee.

I have been told that interference with the campaign at this stage would demoralize what is being done. That is why I have been hesitant in certain measures. My belief is that in Brooklyn, at least, the approach and the contact have been intolerably bad. The directors for that area should not be in charge of a Talmud Torah, much less of a big fund-raising effort.

I shall send you further observations on the campaign within the next few days. In the meantime, I would again suggest that if it at all possible your presence in the city for a week would have unusual results.

He inspired not noly the Richmond Jews but also the non-Jews. It was a rare privilege to have heard him speak. It may interest you to know that we have received many voluntary contributions from Christians. A man cam in my office yesterday and voluntarily gave me a subscription for \$500. In going over the list of givers for the past few years, I think that the Zionist group of Richmond have done a pitiful job. They always tell us that they haven't the means but frankly I don't believe they have made an attempt of near sacrifice. I don't know if that is the story it other cities, but if you will compare the business we have done the last souple of years with whatever they did for themselves, you must confess my point is well taken. I don't want to go into personalities and I don't intend to, but if you want to do a good job, put two dynamic men who could be your strength in persuading the members to do their part. In regards to our campaign, it is going exceedingly well. Our first two days of 750 subscribers totalled a pledge of \$30,000. The same givers contributed last year approximately \$18,000. However, the biggest percent of increase came from the large givers. We are striving for \$50,000 which is far in excess of what headquarters established. Subject FORT WAYNE, IND.

After you talked to me, I immediately checked the Fort Wayne, Ind. situation and there is absolutely no ground on the part of the JDC to make any dlaim insofar as Fort Wayne is concerned. Here are the facts.

The pledge was made at the Detroit Conference. Our records for that community show that Rabbi Shapire visited that community and there is a copy of a letter dated October 1st, 1937, sent to Mr. Hassan in which we informed him that Rabbi Shapiro would be in that community. A number of other people were also written to.

In December, the Fort Wayne delegates attended a Zionist meeting which was held in Indianapolis, Ind. and Cantor Glass reported to me that they would undertake to raise \$1,000. for the year 1937. Their actual effort was launched in the first part of December and our first remittance from that community was received on January 12th, in the sum of \$300 and a subsequent remittance on January 31st also in the sum of \$300, making a total of \$600. that we have received altogether. The campaign was actually launched in November, according to a report that we had from Rabbi Shapiro. On November 29th, Rabbi Shapiro reported that \$125 was secured and that their effort would be concluded in the month of December.

The amount raised in Fort Wayne, Ind. therefore is not subject to the agrement.

Cohen we received a list of leading members of the Free Synagogue. That list has been thoroughly analyzed as to giving for 1937 and 1938. You will be interested in the results: 65 contributed amounts ranging from \$2 to \$3,000. The total sum given by these 65 contributors is \$7,647.50. These gifts came by mail. from independent United Palestine Appeal compaigns and from combined drives with the Joint Distribution Committee. However, 209 are non-contributors, most of them having contributed nothing in 1937 or 1938, and some having contributed small amounts in 1937 but nothing yet in 1938. Now that this analysis has been made may I ask your cooperation along these lines: (a) See or phone those men or women who can give, and ought to give, \$1,000 and over to the United Palestine Appeal; (b) write to others whom you cannot see but who will respond to a personal lefter from you. I attach a draft of such a letter. (c) write to those who have already contributed in 1938, but in amounts incommensurate with the quota of the United Palestine Appeal and with their own means. I attach a draft for such a letter. Attached hereto is a complete list of the members of the Free Synagogue which shows: (1) name and address; (2) amount contributed in 1937 (either in a joint or independent campaign); and (3) amount, if any contributed in 1938. May I ask you to pick out the names that you want to speak to personally and then authorize the sending of the letters, drafts of which I have attached, to the others. Thanks for your cooperation. Do you think that there would be any value in asking the field directors of the United Palestine Appeal to gather in Detroit in connection with the Zionist Convention?

May I suggest that you drop a line to Dr. Wise urging him to see to it that one of the Sessions at the Zionist Convention is particularly set aside for a discussion of the United Palestine Appeal. I regret to say that for many years an effort has been made to obtain such consideration for the United Palestine Appeal, but for one reason or another it has always gone by the board, and it is only in the most indirect way that the United Palestine Appeal is mentioned. Certainly, the problems of fund-raising, of relationships between the United Palestine Appeal and Jewish National Fund and the United Palestine Appeal and Welfare Funds are never thoroughly considered.

Would you want me to come to Cleveland within the near future to discuss aspects of the campaign both in New York and the country?

This week I conferred with Judge Sweedler, Chairman of the Brooklyn campaign and Rabbi Levinthal, both of whom I am trying to stimulate to greater action, if that is possible. I do not know what additional results can be expected from them. I am to see Maurice Levin tomorrow in the hope that I may persuade him to take an active interest in the campaign. Thus far, he has done nothing because he is violently opposed to partition, or, at least, so he says. I have told him that you have told me to invite his closer participation in the drive.

I shall also see Miss Ingrid Warburg in the hope that she may be influenced to use her influence with Mrs. Warburg for a 1938 contribution.

I obtained from Dr. Wise a list of the leading members of the Free Synagogue. These names are being analyzed as to

giving in 1937 and 1938. I shall complete the record this afternoon and will send you an analysis of the total. As I look at the cards I see a tremendous series of blanks. Dr. Wise will be called upon to follow up the numerous non-givers in the Synagogue.

Dear Montor: I am referring to your various cables and letters-especially of March 11th - concerning the Felix M. Warburg colony. The minutes of the United Palestine Appeal of March 23rd wherein the same question was dealt with I received on Sunday preceding the Monday on which, according to your cable of April 9th, the final decision should have been in your hands. I forwarded the extract of these minutes immediately to the Executive, asking Kaplan to see to it that a decision be taken. However, a decision was not taken, and I therefore had nothing to cable to you. But that implies already that there was no prospect of coming to a positive reply, and this is not difficult to explain. The Executive did not see a way of suggesting the naming of a colony in honour of Felix M. Warburg without definite prospects of getting sufficient additional amounts to guarantee that this new colony would be built up shortly and in such a way as to be a real memorial to the man who was being honored. They feel that the name of Felix Warburg stands too high to be attached to one of those settlements of ours which have to wait for years before they are put on their feet. I went to see Maurice Levin this morning in order to try to interest him in a more practical participation in the United Palestine Appeal. You may recall that the sum of \$15,000 is still outstanding on his pledge for 1937.

NEW YORK CITY

Mr. Levin gave three reasons why he does not care to share in the work of the United Palestine Appeal: First, he thinks that too much money is spent to raise the funds of the United Palestine Appeal; secondly, he is not satisfied with the situation as it exists in Palestine where he thinks an economic catastrophe impends; and third, he is greatly involved in personal commitments in the Hearn Department Stores.

He assured me that the \$15,000 pledge for 1937 would be paid, although he could not say when. He admitted frankly that the withdrawal of \$15,000 from his account at this time would be actually impossible because of the great load he is carrying in his commercial enterprises.

Mr. Levin is vigorously opposed to partition. He feels that the Jewish leadership in Palestine has not approached the Arab problem successfully. He believes that Jews in America are too greatly divided and are causing injury to the causes in which they are supposed to be interested.

This is the gist of a full hour's discussion Mr. Levin is a most sincere person, and really wants to be helpful to Palestine despite all the arguments that he cites in opposition to methods of operation of the United Palestine Appeal.

But the fact of the matter is that he is in

the worst economic position he has known in his whole career, and he hasn't money to give nor time to think about problems related to anything else but the situation right here in New York and in America. Not being able to give money he is very hesitant about joining in the councils of the United Palestine Appeal though he realizes the necessity of giving money. He still believes that Palestine is the great hope of Jews although he disagrees with the idea of dumping Jews into Palestine without regard to the economic consequences of unplanned immigration. Some of his thinking is confused and emotional but at bottom he is a person of real worth.

I send you these comments in view of my previous letter to you that I was to see Mr. Levin.

Dear Mr. Preiss: As you know, the United Palestine Appeal is making a survey and analysis of the contributing records of the members of the Lionist Organization in Greater New York. One of the digtricts for which the analysis has been completed is the West Side District, whose Chairman is W. H. Hernstein. In view of the fact that you have been kind enough to undertake the task of stimulating an adequate response in the West Side to the United Palestine Appeal. I am sending this material to you with the knowledge that it will be made the business of the West Side Zionist District. Mr. Samuel Goldstein, the Director for that Section, has undertaken to bring to you the cards for each member of the District, indicating how much he gave in 1937 and 1938 and whether the amount was contributed through a joint or independent campaign and whether any belance is still outstanding on account of 1937. May I urge that a meeting of the West Side Zionist District officers be called immediately and the whole program of obtaining the cooperation of members of the District be placed before them. Probably the best procedure would be to distribute among the members of the United Palastine Appeal Committee of the West Side District the cards of all those who have not yet contributed so that within the next few weeks each individual might be personally visited. The West Side District is supposed to be the most important segment of the Zionist movement in New York. It is rather alarming to see what a low percentage of contributors to the United Palestine Appeal there is in that Section. Now that the material is before you, I am sure that you will see that the situation is remedied with your usual aggressive and skillful attention. I attach herewith a sheet analyzing the giving record

of the West Side District which is based on the cards which Samuel Goldstein will bring to you.

Dear Dr. Wise: The United Palestine Appeal is making a survey and analysis of the giving record of members of the Zionist Organization in New York City. The results thus far are really appalling. An instance of the lack of interest shown by Zionist members in the United Palestine Appeal is found in the West Side Zionist District which is supposed to be the center of Zionist wealth in New York City. In 1937 only 33% of the members contributed. In 1938 the percentage has gone down to 22%. The Zionists are supposed to be the bulwark of United Palestine Appeal campaigns. They always say that they are the foundstion of the Keren Hayesod and the Keren Kayemeth. For the first time now I think records are being completed to prove that unfortunately the Zionist members are long on talk and short on each. Mr. Lipsky has been meeting with chairmen of Zionist Districts in an effort to remedy this situation. I think that the subject is important enough for a special meeting to be called by you of officers of Zionist Districts so that they may be impressed with the fact that (a) much more money could be raised for the United Palestine Appeal if the Zionist Districts book their obligations to the United Palestine Appeal seriously and (b) the influence of Zionists in negotiations for future campaigns must be decisively affected by the practical figures of Zionist contributions to the United Palestine Appeal. In 1937, out of a total membership of 483 in the West Side Zionist District, only 33% contributed to the United Palestine Appeal.

Of the amount of \$17,577.75 reported raised, approximately \$3,300 was contributed through joint trades drives.

The amount of \$1,930 is still owing on 1937 pledges.

Out of a total membership of 488 in 1938, only 22% of the members of the West Side Zionist District have thus far contributed to the United Palestine Appeal.

May 23, 1938 Mr. Henry Montor, United Palestine Appeal, 111 Fifth Avenue, New York, N.Y. My dear Mr. Montor: I am very pleased to know that you are following up the memberships of the various Zionist districts as well as some of the synagogs. What I feared is being fully established. The Zionists of New York have not been contributing to the UPA. My guess is that they simply have not been properly approached, or have not been approached at all. I am enclosing herewith a booklet which the Cleveland Jewish Welfare Fund publishes every year. It contains the names of all the contributions from \$1 up, and is mailed to all the contributors. We introduced it four years ago. At that time, there was considerable opposition to the suggestion, especially on the part of those who did not want their miserly contributions publicly reported. We were all persuaded, however, that it was the printing of this booklet which was in a large measure responsible for the remarkable increase in the giving in our community from \$75,000 in 1935, to \$345,000 this year. I am of the opinion that such a booklet printed in New York City would be the most effective method of stimulating giving and of smoking out the non-givers who have been protected heretofore by the cloak of anonymity. My thought is that we should announce in the New Palestine for the next few weeks that at the close of the campaign in New York City such an honor booklet will be published giving the names of all the donors and the amounts contributed. This fact should also be given adequate publicity through other channels. No Zionist will wish his name omitted from this booklet or credited in the booklet with a contribution unworthy of him. I have discussed the idea suggested in your letter of May 23rd with a number of people here. The objections are numerous. Many of them are sound.

In the first place, many who contribute to the United Palestine Appeal do so through a joint campaign. It is those who are affiliated with the New York Federation and the Joint Distribution Committee who are most vigorous in objecting to the inclusion of their names in any public document.

As you yourself know, the primary reason for this objection is unwillingness to submit one's giving record to the public. However, there are a number of the larger contributors who object on the ground that they would be left open for every sucker list and on the ground that they do not want the non-Jewish public to see what funds are being contributed by Jews to overseas purposes.

The only important objection is the one that has to do with contributors in joint drives. If they object to the UPA doing what the JDC fails to do, we may lose their friendship for next year's campaign.

What did occur to me, however, was that we might have a published list of Zionists and their record of giving to the UPA. I could see no objection to publication of such a list except that it might put us in a very embarrassing light in negotiations with the JDC, whether for New York or national purposes.

In view of the newness of the idea, I believe that it would be best to get a definite decision at the meeting of the Administrative Committee on June 9th so that there could be no possible objection from an official source.

My dear Mr. Montor: I have not authorized any one in the Non-Sectarian Anti-Nazi League to issue any appeals for the League over my signature. This was done without my knowledge. I have this day sent in my resignation as a Director of the League and have dissociated myself from the organization. I should not wish to make any suggestions to the National Conference of Jewish Social Welfare Workers with reference to another speaker on their program to discuss the overseas problem. Coming from me, it takes on too much the character of an "issue". An informal note from you to Murt Peiser or Harry Greenstein might be better. I have read the articles of Slobodin which appeared in the Cleveland Plain Dealer. Mrs. Landau writes me that these articles were read and approved by George Backer, Dr. Maurice Karpf and Jacob Blaustein of Baltimore before they were farmed out; also that they were read and approved by the London Office. A fifth article which was thoroughly bad was suppressed. I don't know what earthly good the JTA hoped to gain by having these articles published in the daily oress. There may be some point in publishing them in the Jewish press in order to call attention to the serious situation in Palestine. But to serve those articles up to non-Jews who cannot do anything about it and have no interest in doing anything about it is just too stupid. I have so written to the JTA. Dear Mr. Aufeeszer:

Your pathetic letter of the 9th appealing to Albany Jewry to come to the rescue of their brethren abroad left me completely baffled. True, the appalling condition, the humiliation and the persecution of the greater part of our people is unprecedented in our history, but never before in the annals of our existence as a nation did we exhibit such determination not to succomb to the fate the dictators have chosen for us. This will is demonstrated by our heroic efforts in the building up of the Jewish State and nationhood in Palestine. Fretz Israel is the only ray of hope in our world of darkness. The primary hope for destitute European Jewry the greater part of whom must emigrate.

Without doubt "Zdoko" is necessary in time of distress but I am convinced that our fellow Jews in Europe do not wish to rely upon this palliative forever. They want a constructive program of rehabilitation and the right to remain a separate physical and cultural entity. Zionism and Palestine offer such a program.

But not a word of this in your letter. As I to gather that you people of the JDC. American Jewish Committee, etc. have learned nothing from the past? Are we to assume that in the future as in the vact you will again pussyfoot and relegate Palestine to the background in your appeals to american Jews? I can hardly believe that. Furthermore, I do not think that you personally, Mr. Aufsesser, identify yourself spiritually, with a philosophy of self-denial and assimilation which has bankrupted long ago. In assuming that the UPA campaign is part of the drive am I also to assume that the Poale Zion (Labor Zionists) will be invited to participate, or are we to rely upon our own strength to raise our quota?

I suppose you have asked yourself from time to time what do the Poale Zion want, why are there so many splits in Lionism. The answer is covious, for the same reason that there are more than one political party in France, in England, etc. We of the left in the Zionist movement stend for certain principles. We believe that Palestine should be built upon a basis of social justice, a better form of human conviviality, a cooperative commonwealth. Our homeland must not be a pepetition of a social system which can no longer guarantee its millions of constituents the basic human needs. Furthermore, Palestine can not be other than an economic as well as political democracy because of its comparative geographic minuteness. Only cooperative farming and cooperative industry, with the absence or at least limitation of the profit motif can absorb mass immigration.

Small wonder that more and more friends of Zionist have become imbued with this "Anshaung". The Zionist congress entrusted labor with the key positions both in the executive and in the Actions Committee. The \$1000 for the F.Z. quota in Albany or half-million doallars raised for the Histadrut Institutions in the U.S. is no criterion of the position of Labor in Zionism. Anyone who follows Jewish events knows that labor is the cardinal factor in the upbuilding of the Jewish national homeland.

Why, if our claim is correct, does not the Keren Hayesod take care of these institutions. Unfortunately, the Keren Hayesod cannot help the Kvozot (communes) and other labor institutions as much as it would like to for the lack of funds. Furthermore, our campaign is the concern primarily of those who identify themselves with labor's cause and are imbibed with a proletarian ideology. For the above reasons we must conduct our separate

fund-raising campaigns and raise our quotas, unless we amalgamate with other groups who can guarantee us that sum. It is self-evident that under such arrangement we would do our bit in sending out our committees and organize our periphery to lend the campaign its moral and financial support.

Montor's note to you regarding me is a curious blend of fact, inference and disingenuousness. True I have not contributed to the UPA, but the statement that my conduct "is
responsible for adverse sentiment created emong others who may not be Zionists and who
are tempted to follow this example of non-giving" is as untrue as it is impertinent.

Does Montor imply that I am such an important personage that my conduct (or misconduct)
serves as an evil example to others or does he think that I go about telling people that
I refuse to support the UPA? In either case his thinking needs straightening out.

I have not contributed to the U.P.A. because my annual contributions for specific public purposes and my personal investments in Palestinian private undertakings, made solely for the purpose of creating "work opportunities" and not for any financial returns, have strained my financial resources to the limit. I could leave it at that, but I prefer to be more specific so that at least you may clearly know my position.

Since 1925 I have devoted my energies to the furtherance of certain specific tasks in Palestine which I conceive to be fully as important as the projects which have here-tofore enjoyed a monepoly of K.H.funds. I refer to the development of private initiative in Palestine as an "sconomic absorber" of thousands of industrial Chalutzim. The dispensers of our K.H.monies have consistently ignored this most pressing piece of work. I have chosen to do otherwise. And in the furtherance of my conviction concerning the importance of the task I created the American Economic Committee for Palestine and have poured into it my undivided energies and every dollar I could and many dollars I couldn't spare. In other words, each year after making my maximum, undivided though inadequate contribution to this work there just wasn't any more left for the UPA.
- 2. When, in 1928, I undertook to aid Mr. Novomeysky in securing the Dead Sea Concession I found it nedessary, in order to raise capital, to make a \$25,000 subscription of my own. In doing this I mortgaged part of my earnings for a number of years. I never expected to get a penny of it back and I so advised my co-investors. But I went forward because I was convinced that the loss of the Dead Sea Concession to Jewish interests would be a national calamity. While we have not yet received any returns and will not for some years to come we have the deep gratification of knowing that we have already paid out nearly \$2,000,000 in wages to Jewish workers and that in the future constantly increasing Jewish wage payments will be made.

My direct financial commitments both by way of contributions and investments have been altogether disproportionate to my means and have kept me"scratching". But I have the

profound satisfaction of knowing that the work which I have directly initiated and aided has been effectively building up Palestine and has been sustaining and will continue to sustain many, many Jewish families there. If under these circumstances my attitude toward the UPA is still subject to criticism I am afraid I shall have

to continue to carry on as an unrepentant sinner. With warmest greetings, I am, Cordially yours, BEN BC

It is my responsibility as the directing head of the United Palestine Appeal to make inquiries with regard to all those whose names do not appear on the contributors' list of the United Palestine Appeal. Yours was not on that list. Accordingly, I called this to the attention of Dr. Wise as part of a number of other matters which I submitted to his attention. This is in keeping with the campaign procedure of turning over a list of prospect cards to each campaign leader and worker. No one who knows your record of participation in Palestine's upbuilding program can be unaware of the financial aid you have given. That does not alter the fact that the United Palestine Appeal, as such, does not have your name on its lists. Surely, you would not take offense at the effort of the fund-raising instrument of the Keren Hayesod and the Keren Kayemath to endeavor to obtain a maximum number of contributors. Cordially yours. I received a telegram from Mrs.Annette Saber, Secretary of the San Francisco Jewish Welfare Fund, that the \$60,000 allotted to the UPA does not represent forty per cent of the overseas allotment. I have wired Bernard Stone as follows and am waiting to hear from him:

"RECEIVED WIRE SABER SAN FRANCISCO INFORMING UPA ALLOTMENT DOES NOT REPRESENT FORTY PERCENT. IMPERATIVE YOU INITIATE ACTION IMMEDIATELY AMONG SAN FRANCISCO FRIENDS SECURE RECONSIDERATION. ADVISE"

Attached herewith is a copy of a letter which I am sending to Coons.

When the sixty-forty agreement was discussed, one of the principal reasons for entering into it was the thought that San Francisco would be compelled to abide by the understanding reached by the national leaders. In 1937 San Francisco gave the UPA 29% as against 71% for the JDC. Apparently the tendency in San Francisco has not been rectified.

What action do you advise in the matter?

I take it for granted that your office will communicate at once with San Francisco, urging that the agreement reached between the national leaders will be honored.
