

You will recall that I spoke to you briefly on Monday night at the meeting of the Executive Committee of the United Jewish Appeal to suggest the name of Abraham L. Liebovitz as an addition to the Executive Committee of the United Jewish Appeal.

Mr. Liebovitz has since been pressing very hard for this honor.

The status of Mr. Liebovitz is as follows: For many years he has been one of the few people who has stuck steadily to the United Palestine Appeal. He and his brothers are \$4,000 contributors to the United Palestine Appeal. He actually has performed the task of signing checks for the United Palestine Appeal during all these years, even though others have had the title of Treasurer and he only that of Associate Treasurer.

Mr. Lamport, who has been virturally alone in defending the United Palestine Appeal's interests in the New York United Jewish Appeal, saw to it that Mr. Liebovitz was named as Co-Treasurer in the New York United Jewish Appeal campaign with Mr. Samuel D. Leidesdorf. Liebovitz is, of course, one of the few people who could have been named by the United Palestine Appeal for this post.

Dear Dr. Silver:

I have had long conversations with Jonah Goldstein with regard to the incorporation. Goldstein is a very charming and undoubtedly knowledgeful person but I am afraid he has characteristics which the layman frequently associates with all lawyers.

Incorporation is not in my line but is the province of a lawyer. Unfortunately Goldstein has virtually turned the whole problem back into my lap.

The suggestion he made originally was that there should be no amendment of the certificate of the United Jewish Appeal, Inc., which was officially incorporated in January 1935 to cover the 1934 and 1935 United Jewish Appeal in which the Joint Distribution Committee and the American Palestine Campaign (the Keren Hayesod) participated.

I called his attention to the fact that the tax exemption certificates of the Treasury Department provide that when there is a change in the status of an organization it must immediately report that fact to the Treasury Department. Judge Goldstein did not feel that there was any change in the method of operation or the beneficiaries of the United Jewish Appeal, Inc., and, therefore, did not believe it was necessary to emphasize the inclusion of new agencies.

But from my experience last year with the incorporation of the United Palestine Appeal and the lengthy process that was involved, I urged that this would not be satisfactory for the big givers to the United Jewish Appeal.

After my layman's persistence Judge Goldstein made the following suggestions:

(a) That we should write to the Treasury Department on the basis of the certificate of exemption granted to the United Jewish Appeal, Inc. on February 10, 1936 in accordance with the copy enclosed, stating that the Joint Distribution Committee, the United Palestine Appeal and the National Coordinating Committee were the new agencies included in the United Jewish Appeal.

The Joint Distribution Committee and the United Palestine Appeal have individual certificates of exemption from the

Treasury Department, but unfortunately the National Coordinating Committee does not have such a certificate, which will complicate the problem considerably. The National Coordinating Committee, I am informed, is now in the process of writing out affidavits for the securing of its certificate of exemption.

(b) Judge Goldstein thought kindly of my suggestion that we should get a Washington lawyer who would expedite action following the letter which we would send to the Treasury Department. I had in mind Max Rhoade who did so splendid a job for us on the United Palestine Appeal tax exemption.

(c) Judge Goldstein advised that the Directors of the United Jewish Appeal, Inc. be invited to resign on prepared forms, and that a meeting of the new Board of Directors, or rather Trustees, of the United Jewish Appeal, Inc., as designated at the meeting of the Executive Committee of the United Jewish Appeal on February 6th, should be summoned in order officially to designate the Trustees at a board meeting.

This morning I am meeting with Klein, Hinds & Finke, the accountants of the United Jewish Appeal, who are supposed to be tax exemption experts.

This whole problem is really not one for a layman. The difficulty exists because we trust to the generosity of some of our Jewish lawyer friends who really are very busy, and, regardless of the generosity of their natures, do not give the problem the time, the attention and the consideration that it deserves, and the kind of consideration they would give to a problem for whose solution they were being paid. In the long run it does not pay to get free service on such important items.

Attached herewith is a copy of the letter which Governor Lehman is sending out to the group of people expected at the meeting on March 5th. I think it is a very cold and unsatisfactory letter. Governor Lehman refuses to sign any other. I had prepared a statement which I thought was more calculated to bring people to New York City from Cleveland or San Francisco, but we have to accept whatever is offerred in these circumstances.

It has been agreed that if we receive a number of responses from men saying that they will be in Florida on March 5th, arrangements will then be made for a meeting in Mr. Ittleson's home in Palm Beach. I take it for granted that you are planning to be in New York on Sunday, March 5th. Is that correct?

If so, please schedule those four dates definitely. I should like to be back in Cleveland by the end of the week. As far as Possible, I plan to fly.

Dear Dr. Silver:

Attached herewith is a copy of a letter which I have addressed to Rabbi Jonah B. Wise.

Maybe I am given to too much anxiety but, as I said in the enclosed letter to Rabbi Wise, I have a feeling that the United Jewish Appeal has not yet got hold of the imagination of the country. This can be done in one of two ways: (1) Through field men; through contacts of leaders, speakers, etc.; and (2) Through the utilization of all the modern devices of publicity and promotion.

Some of our field men are doing very good jobs. Others are of that type who are frightened even by the mention of five hundred dollars, so that they are not the type to ask or to think in terms of the larger contributions we need this year. It would seem obvious that the thing to do is to dismiss those men not equipped for the job. In the first place, however, it is not easy to replace even weak persons and, in the second place, there are other restrictions with which we are all too well acquainted.

I do hope that you will urge upon Rabbi Wise that he agree with you in "unleashing" the power that is inherent in our publicity organization so that every time we want a radio program, a publicity release or contact with public forces, we do not have to go through a three-week filtering process that is so enervating as to remove every incentive for initiative.

Dear Rabbi Wise:

This will acknowledge the receipt of a copy of your letter of February 8th in which you describe "The Message of Israel" hour for March 5, 11, 16 and 25.

Four such programs as you contemplate on "The Message of Israel" hour would be a valuable asset for the United Jewish Appeal.

I would like to urge upon Dr. Silver and yourself that whatever radio time can be obtained by the Publicity Department, either nationally or locally, should be utilized.

Early in the year a telegram was prepared by Dr. Silver and yourself addressed to the three national chains. In response to this wire they agreed to give us time. Thus far we have delayed accepting it, presumably on the ground that it was too early to begin stimulating the communities.

May I point out that scores of campaigns are now under way or are contemplated in the immediate future. It is true that the majority of these are not in the \$300,000 or \$400,000 class; nevertheless they are being given quotas two, three and four times what they were in 1938. They will need all the stimulation they can get. The same is true of the thirteen large cities.

I am frank to confess my own anxiety that the country is not yet esturated with the feeling that the United Jewish Appeal for Refugees and Overseas Needs is the overwhelming cause of 1939. It is my opinion that we have been too reticent and too hesitant, and that we have hedged our Publicity Department about with too many restriction.

I am one of those who believes that publicity is not fundamental to the success of a campaign. At the same time, however, it is apparent that unless we create an atmosphere of Babbi Jonah B. Wise

emergency and of unprecedented mobilization of the Jewish community, we shall fail to convey that every Jew, regardless of his means, is expected to contribute, and that the contribution is expected to be of an extraordinary amount.

I take this means, therefore, of unging upon Dr. Silver and yourself that, within the confines of dignity, the bars be let down, so to speak, so that our Publicity Department might function with the normal fervor and dynamism that are characteristic of any first class, modern American publicity organization.

Sirs:

Reference is made to the evidence furnished by you for use in reconsidering the question of your exemption for Federal taxation.

The evidence submitted discloses that you were incorporated under the laws of the State of New York on January 31, 1935. Your purposes are to conduct campaigns and to raise funds for the relief and rehabilitation of Jews and the settlement of Jews in Palestine. Your incorporators represent The American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee, Incorporated and the American Palestine Campaign for the Jewish Agency of Palestine. Your activities consist of conducting campaigns throughout the United States for the solicitation, raising, and collection of funds and the distribution of the funds raised to The American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee, Incorporated, and the American Palestine Campaign, Incorporated. Your income is derived from contributions and it is used to promote your objects and for general maintenance and operating expenses.

Based on the facts presented it is held that you are entitled to exemption under the provisions of section 101(6) of the Revenue Act of 1934. You are not, therefore, required to file returns for 1935 and subsequent years so long as there is no change in your organization, your purposes or your method of operation.

Any changes in your form of organization or method of operation, as shown by the evidence submitted, must be immediately reported by you to the collector of internal revenue for your district in order that the effect of such changes upon your present exempt status may be determined.

Contributions to your organization by individual donors are deductible by such individuals in arriving at their taxable net income in the manner and to the extent provided by section 23(o) of the Revenue Act of 1934. The deductibility of contributions by corporations is governed by sections 102 and 107 of the Revenue Act of 1935.

A copy of this letter is being transmitted to the collector of internal revenue for your district. The question as to whether you are exempt from payment of the capital stock tax will be made the subject of a separate communication.

I am sorry to have to point to a correction in your friendly letter of February 7th. It is true that I said we would write to the chapters in those communities in which UJA campaigns are being held at this time, asking them to avoid any possible conflict with the larger campaign. We are deeply interested in the success of the campaign and know that our chapters are following the progress of the campaign with keen interest, and would not want to jeopardize the success of the campaign in any way. On the other hand, if I gave you the impression that we intended to "communicate to Hadassah chapters throughout the country, asking that Youth Aliyah campaigns in cities not included in the attached list should be postponed until after the UJA drive in that community has been completed", I gave you a very wrong impression.

In the first place, we do not, in this office, set the dates for local campaigns. They are set at the beginning of the fiscal year, October 1st, always taking into consideration the local situation. In the second place, our year is completed by September 30th. There can be no such thing as our postponing out fundraising effort until fall. In the fall, we start a new year and are forced to meet new quotas and new conditions and circumstances. In the third place, our Youth Aliyah campaigns do not follow the patterns of the UPA and JDC campaigns. They are not intensive, high-pressure effots, condensed into a limited period of time, but on the whole are carried on over a long period through more or less continuous effort. Therefore, we could never undertake to categorically inform our chapters that there must be no Youth Aliyah efforts until after the UJA campaign is completed.

I can assure you that we will do everything in our power to avoid any friction, and that we will at all times take into consideration the larger fundraising efforts so as to conduct our affairs in such a way as to not endanger the success of the campaign.

If you think it necessary to discuss this matter futer, we will call the meeting which we previously postponed for Mrs. Greenberg, you and me to confer.





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My dear Dr. Wise and Dr. Silver:

I have been instructed by the executive committee of the National Coordinating Committee to write the Chairmen of the forthcoming United Appeal to point out that when the request was made on behalf of the Coordinating Committee for two million dollars, this figure was based on the continuing of the care of the persons affected by the German situation, and did not include those affected by Eastern Europe.

The situation in Italy and in south eastern Europe has become similar to that in Germany and, from all the information I can gather, is likely to increase in volume and importance. The executive committee of the National Coordinating Committee voted to assume the same responsibility for the refugees from south eastern and eastern Europe as it had been carrying for the refugees from Greater Germany.

The executive committee noted the many requests for aid from people in this country in respect to prospective refugees from south eastern Europe and eastern Europe and felt that it would be unwise to set up a new organization to care for these refugees whose needs are very similar to those coming from Germany. It was felt also that the appeal for funds would be more difficult if the eastern and south eastern European refugees were not included in the work of the Coordinating Committee.

As the British-Jewish-Arab conference on Palestine opened in St. James Palace, London, the spokesman of Masian told the world press: Not a Jewish State, not a home nor even a refuge, but a "reservation", under police supervision, should be established in a distant part of the globe, for us the descendants of the Kings and Prophets of Israel and of the Maccabees.

Haman, the chanceller of ancient Persia, embarked on his anti-Jewish campaign because Mordecai -- so the Megilah tells us -- refused to bow to him. Attempting recently to justify his campaign of extermination against us, the modern Haman revealed that the reason for his wrath is the fact that when the madness of Maxism first appeared, the Jews laughed at it .. Haman's defeat we celebrate on Furim by annually manifesting our generous impulses through observing the tradition of Shalach Mones. Some day we shall yet celebrate a new Purim, but today the maintenance of our dignity and freedom rests in our hands. WE CAN ACHIEVE MUCH by pushing forward the upbuilding of Eretz Israel.

On the advent of Purim, we urge you to again mark the occasion -- by sending your Purim gift for Palestine Land Redemption. In anticipation, we enclose a booklet containing receipts in the amount of \$6.00 which you may raise among your friends or contribute yourself. In this decisive hour, please help the Keren Kayemeth to acquire more acres of our land upon which Jewish life may grow in dignity and freedom.

> Addenda to the Protocol of the Sub-Committee of the American Keren Kayesod and the Jewish National Fund of America, which was authorized to negotiate and complete the U.P.A. agreement for 1939.

It was agreed at the meeting held on Thursday afternoon, December 29, 1938

That the appropriation of the Mizrachi Palestine Fund for the year 1939 be increased from \$60,000 to \$90,000, with the understanding that the Mizrachi Organization be required to provide the Executive of the Jewish Agency in Palestine with an accounting and a full pepert on the expenditures involved, and further, that copies of these reports also be supplied to the U.P.A. for its information.

SERVICE CHARGES:

It was agreed that the service charges for 1939 be paid to the Z.O.A., the Mizrachi and the Poale Zion-Zeire Zion on the same basis as for 1930, to wit: Z.O.A. \$54,000, Mizrachi \$9,200, Poale Zion \$9,200.

It was also subsequently agreed that, in view of the fact that the Hashomer Hatzair is a legally recognized Zionist Organization of the World Zionist Congress, and in view of the fact that in the year 1938 promises and assurances had been given to the Hashomer Hatzair that in the agreement of 1939 its legal status would be recognized by the U.P.A., an appropriation of \$1,200 be made for Hashomer Hatzair as its service charge to the U.P.A. for 1939, it being understood that Hashomer Hatzair shall give full cooperation and support, through its periodicals and its propaganda, to the activities of the U.P.A.

Dear Dr. Silver:

I met on Thursday, February 23rd at the Hadassah office with Mrs. S. J. Rosensohn and Mrs. David de Sola Pool to discuss the relationship of the Youth Aliyah campaign to the United Jewish Appeal.

They informed me that Mrs. Epstein did not feel that she had the right to assume from our conversation at the Hadassah Conference some weeks ago what she indicated was our impression following the conversation. Furthermore, Mrs. Epstein had authorized them to say that the Hadassah had the right to repudiate Mrs. Epstein's statements if through some mischance she had given us the impression that Hadassah had agreed to discontinue Youth Aliyah campaigns in that it would help United Jewish Appeal campaigns in the offing.

I inquired of the ladies whether they did not think all Zionists owed primary allegiance to the Jewish Agency for Palestine and its funds. I called attention to the letter from Mr. Eliezer Kaplan in which all Zionists were urged to give first consideration to the Keren Havesod and Keren Kayemeth which in the United States are embraced within the United Palestine Appeal. The ladies do not feel that they owe any particular allegiance to the Jewish Agency in fund-raising matters.

If you have ever reasoned with Hadassah women, as I know you have, you can appreciate how futile I felt after a half hour of such a conversation in which Hadassah says that only within the Youth Aliyah lies the difference between disaster and triumph in Palestine. The Hadassah women insist that their Chapters never conduct "campaigns" but that they do sponsor year-round fund-raising efforts. Furthermore, they saw no reason why they should go out of their way for the United Jewish Appeal since they do not receive any funds from the campaign.

Before I left the office the only assurances I could receive were:

(1) That a general letter might possibly be written to the Hadassah Chapters asking them to cooperate as much as possible with the United Jewish Appeal (although they emphasized that they had no authority as to when or how to conduct campaigns for Youth Aliyah); and

(2) That they would be prepared to receive letters from me on specific questions in communities involving relationships between the United Jewish Appeal and Youth Aliyah.

The Hadassah women seem to feel that the United Palestine Appeal is making their life miserable while the J. D. C. people are cooperating most splendidly with the Youth Aliyah campaign. They refuse to believe that this is a problem affecting the entire United Jewish Appeal. I am afraid that insofar as Hadassah is concerned, I must give it up as a hopeless task and hope for the best.

Mr. Abe Luntz was in my study, this morning, at my invitation. We discussed the Canton situation. He told me that Canton, this year, must raise a substantial sum of money for a new building for their Jewish Center. The present one has been condemned as a fire trap. He felt that the quota assigned for Canton, of \$32,000, would be very difficult, if not impossible to reach, in view of this special task which confronts the community.

I suggested to him that he have a group of the wealthier Jews of the city, say ten or fifteen in number, meet immediately and that we would send someone in to sit down with that group and explain to them the needs of the UJA and persuade them to make special contributions for overseas relief now, over and above what they will make to the general campaign, inclusive of the UJA, which is scheduled for the latter part of April. In that group would be a few people such as Mr. Livingston, Mr. Erlanger and Mr. Luntz who can each give \$5,000. The meeting would be arranged to meet the convenience of the man whom headquarters could send out. Inasmuch as I have been to Canton frequently, it would perhaps be more helpful if someone else could go there. Could Jonah Wise go there for such a meeting; or can you suggest someone else?

SUBJECT: U.J.A. PUBLICITY

By virtue of that which I interpret as the fundamental publicity policy of the Joint Distribution Committee, I have been compelled to either disapprove or refer recent releases submitted by Mr. Steinglass. This constitutes no reflection on the enterprise or abilities of Mr. Steinglass or his associates. I recognize that such action on my part as the official representative of J.D.C. policy in the day to day work and program of the U.J.A. might even tend to delay the progress of the publicity program, and assuredly circumscribe the opportunities in certain directions.

The J.D.C. publicity concept is so diametrically different from the publicity concept of the U.P.A., for example, that they seem to be irreconcilable. This difference obvicusly makes it difficult to hit upon a common ground or base for U.J.A. publicity. It was with this thought in mind that we discussed during the earlier stages of campaign preparation the advisability of the J.D.C. and U.P.A. respectively having their own educational programs with such tie-up as possible to reflect the importance of the U.J.A. as the common fund-raising instrument. This tends to leave "pallid" opportunities for U.J.A. publicity, but I must confess that I cannot find the formula for improvement.

I am prompted to write this specific memorandum on the general problem of U.J.A. publicity because Mr. Steinglass asked me to approve letters asking:

- 1. A letter of endorsement from President Roosevelt.
- 2. Letters of endorsements from Senators, Governors, Mayors, and other public officials.

It was necessary for me to refer both to the officers of the J.D.C. for approval because, in my opinion, these involve fundamentals of J.D.C. policy of such importance to the J.D.C. that I would not assume personal responsibility for passing on them alone.

I must repeat that I find nothing wrong with Mr. Steinglass' seeking approval for releases of this type, which may and undoubtedly do have great publicity value. but which may not be in conformity with the established J.D.C. policy to which I refer.

For the specific type of publicity releases to which I have referred, however, I feel that I should express my personal opinion.

The officers of the U.P.A. in preliminary conversations on arrangements for the U.J.A. expressed themselves quite definitely against any formal tie-up for a completely united front and common national fund-raising appeal with the Christian agencies. These Christian agencies are conducting their own Protestant and Catholic national campaigns respectively. The U.J.A. is officially not conducting AO! NB' NUBUL HORLON

a national non-sectarian campaign. Have we a right to ask Christian leaders in public and political life to endorse a technically Jawish campaign in competition. so to speak, with exclusive Christian campaigns? Or should we ask the officers of the Protestant and Catholic Refugee Committees to join us in securing an endorsement for all three campaigns?

I do not minimize the importance of publicity, even though I have been critical of the amount and type we have been receiving within the limitations that I have been a party to imposing. I think also that we have spent too much time and attention on the fundamental policies of publicity, which undoubtedly should be defined by the mational chairmen and co-chairmen or be in the hands of a special campaign publicity committee.

Shen I return, I shall be very happy to consider this matter further to the end of improving a difficult situation. During my absence, I shall have to insist that Mr. Belth represent me in all matters relating to publicity.

Copies of this are being sent to officers of the J.D.C.; Co-Chairmen representing the J.D.C. in the U.J.A.; Mr. Belth and Mr. Steinglass. Additional copies are attached for such distribution as you care to make of them.

Dear Dr.Silver:

In discussing the forthcoming campaign with the people in Nashville, I was told that their hopes of success were bound up with getting a personality who would challenge every member of the community by his very presence. They are most anxious to have you and are prepared to adjust themselves to any date you may have free, although it is traditional in this community to start a campaign on a Sunday.

Nashville has a quota of \$50,000, having accepted the United Jewish Appeal quota of \$35,000, as against \$12,500 contributed last year. Considering that this money must come from a community of some 2500 people, it is apparent that an unusual amount of stimulation must be provided. In years gone by cities like Buffalo and Rochester were expected to raise the sums that Nashville is now called upon to give, and communities like Atlanta are taking quotas similar to those which Pittsburgh and St.Louis had in 1938 or 1937.

I wired you yesterday that the Atlanta people are most earnest in wanting you to open the campaign on April 18th or 19th or a week thereafter. If you accept the Atlanta invitation, and if you could spend another day in this area, the visit to Nashville would be most worthwhile. One comes through Nashville on the way back to Cleveland.

\$20,000,000 is the Goal for 1939

In all the cities I have visited thus far, I hear the same refrain: if only we could have Dr.Silver, we would not be hesitant about accepting the larger quota! I realize how physically impossible it is for you to accept all or even most of these invitations, which in most instances are prayerful hopes. Unfortunately, there are no acceptable substitutes. The communities do, of course, get someone else but they take these others as inevitable fate and not with greatspirit.

What has struck me particularly about Atlanta and Nashville is that the spirit for the campaign formes from Zionists or from those most deeply interested in Palestine. And yet these communities would undoubtedly be claimed by Mr.Ittelson as JDC towns.

Another thing that has struck me is that actually the wealth of some of these communities has not been tapped. That does not mean that some of these Jews are willing to give, but men known to have incomes of \$100,000 and more make contributions of \$50 or \$100. It is amazing how many such people there are in each community one studies and analyzes.

Dear Dr. Silver:

Last Friday morning Coons said he wanted to meet with me before I left for a tour and before he left for the same, both going to different communities. I thought we would go over individual cities and study special pressures that had to be applied (as I have been doing alone and with Robert Herman in the past few weeks).

But it seems that what he wanted was to make a "record" and so he dictated to a stenographer certain observations on the progress of the campaign. By indirection and blatantly he inferred or said that the UPA forces were this and that.

I was completely nonplussed by this martinet approach and this bureaucratic dictating for the record (to be sent to the JDC officers). But even though I felt absurd in engaging in this polite verbal duel, I assumed that my function required me to be equally stuffy and to comment on Mr. Coons! observations. Attached herewith are both testaments.

I might say, though, that the atmosphere in the office is far better than these encyclicals would indicate. With the exception of Coons, who still has a special case of Palestine acidity, everybody, whether formerly JDC or UPA, is working with spirit and consideration.

This will probably reach you after I have left New York, to return on March 16th. While Coons and I are away, Herman will be in charge.

Dear Dr.Silver:

As I ride across the flatlands of Arkansas to Omaha, I begin to appreciate the enormous contribution you have been making to the success of campaigns: doing it year after year.

This is just a note of recapitulation. According to our New Orleans phone conversation, you are prepared for: Nashville, Tenn. on April 25th (\$35,000 for UJA); Atlanta, Ga. on April 26th (\$90,000 asked for UJA); Richmond, Va. on April 27th (375,000 for UJA). Further word with regard to these will be coming from the office.

I know that you have a heavy schedule: from what I can see the heaviest ever. But even then I do hope you can go through with San Antonio, El Paso andFort Worth, Texas, involving something like \$75,000 or \$100,000 for the UJA. Could something be done in Allentown along the lines of what is planned for Scranton on March 22nd--that is, with the consent of the local people, of course. I shall try to get someone for April 2nd: perhaps Lowenthal or Ludwig Lore, the Foreign Editor of the New York Post.

Getting around to these communities is valuable for me: it gives me a better insight into local conditions in addition to giving me a relationship to the various leaders with whom hitherto I have had to communicate solely on the basis of mail.

But anything away from that old moth-eaten martinet Coons is good. I pity poor Steinglass, a fellow with imagination and ideas, who has been reduced to a hack, waiting weeks before a cheesy publicity item is OKed. And then Coons complains!

It occurs to me that it may be most valuable in the Ohio area, particularly in the vicinity of Cleveland, if a meeting could be arranged in your home or in your study within the next few weeks for the purpose of impressing upon leaders of the campaign and upon potential contributors in nearby towns the extraordinary importance of the United Jewish Appeal.

In other words, the meeting that you would call in Cleveland would be a replica within a smaller area of the Lehman meeting. What date would be suitable to you for such a meeting if you feel that the idea is advisable?

Could you telephone Mr. Anathan and urge him: (a) to take a personal interest in the campaign instead of assigning it to someone in his department store; (b) to accept the chairmanship of the Initial Gifts Committee and to invite the leading potential contributors to a function which he will sponsor to insure their large giving, and (c) to lend his support that a quota of \$12,000 for the United Jewish Appeal will be assured.

My dear Mr. Montor:

We had a good meeting, last evening, in Scranton, attended by the leading citizens of that community. Mr. Herman of the UJA was also present. I feel confident that Scranton will accept the Forty Thousand Dollar quota although many of them were under the enthusiastic impression that they had done so marvelously last year. I had to disillusion them. Furthermore, that community has been in the practice of raising its funds in cash, either because they don't trust each other, or because some of them are afraid that contributions spread over a period of a year might interfere with numerous other Jewish solicitations which go on from one end of the year to the other. Both Mr. Herman and I made a strong point in mentioning that if a large sum of money is to be raised in Scranton, it cannot be raised on a cash basis.

I was in the office of the UJA Tuesday morning and spent some time there with Rabbi Jonah Wise. The office seems to be well organized and functioning properly.

Both Wise and I feel that the speeches which we broadcast this month on the Message of Israel Hour in behalf of the Refugees should be printed - all four lectures in one booklet and also the four lectures separately. There has been quite a demand for them from all parts of the country and I feel that they would prove helpful in the Campaign.

I should like to know something about the program for the meeting convoked by Governor Lehman on April 2nd. Who is to speak and who is to make the direct appeal. It should be impressed upon those who are arranging the meeting that Palestine is not to be shunted off the scene in the presentation of the case on April 2nd.

I strongly urged upon Rabbi Wise that the out of town guests be entertained at luncheon, either at the home of Governor Lehman or somewhere else. That much courtesy should be shown to them. Mr. Henry Montor

In connection with your Long Distance call of yesterday, I believe that it is a mistake to interrupt the normal money-raising procedure in American Jewish communities by bombarding them with hysterical telegrams for an immediate remittance of funds. In the case of those communities where the campaigns have already been held, it is quite legitimate for us to urge them to send on the funds as rapidly as possible. However, in the case of those communities who have not yet held their campaigns or are now in the process of orgainzing them, it simply confounds their work and might even interfere with the success of the campaigns. If the JDC requires immediate funds, there is always the possibility of borrowing.

And now one final matter: Rabbi Wise mentioned to me in a vein of criticism that a tour on the Pacific Coast has been arranged by you for Rabbi Brickner without his knowledge. He felt that being in the office each day, any such major lecture tour should be discussed with him. I told him that I knew nothing about it and that I was as much surprised as he was. Mr. Herman was called in and he gave us the history of how this tour was built up. I still feel, however, that the national chairmen ought to be consulted when a major project involving the sending of one man to a number of communities on the Pacific Coast is being considered. I understand that practically none of the cities on the Pacific Coast had asked for Rabbi Brickner. We might have been able to make some other suggestions which could have served the interest of the campaign better. Please keep that in mind for future occasions and take us a little more into your confidence, especially Rabbi Wise, who is on hand in your office almost daily.

I do not believe that it is worthwhile to invite Mr. Sam Gross of Cleveland to the Governor Lehman meeting.

Mr. Goldhamer suggested that Mr. Julius Tuteur be invited to the Lehman meeting. Mr. Goldhamer also took up the question of the chain stores in Cleveland owned by Jews. In the past, these stores refused to contribute locally on the pretext that their organizations were contributing through national headquarters. In most instances this was not the case. I would suggest that our headquarters take the matter up with these national chair stores and adopt some policy.

This will acknowledge your letter of March 23rd.

As Herman has told me, the meeting in Scranton was of the utmost importance in order to give the leaders an understanding of the greater amount that was required of them and of the more effective method of getting money through year-round payment.

Steinglass is now preparing for publication the series of speeches over the "Message of Israel" hour. This will be made available to thousands of people who have requested copies and for general campaign purposes. This, of course, involves a large outlay.

There is to be a meeting on Sunday evening, March 26th, at the home of Mr. Ittelson for the purpose of preparing the program for next Sunday.

Rabbi Wise is meeting with Governor Lehman tomorrow afternoon to suggest that he be host to a luncheon on Sunday about which you spoke.

As I understand from Rabbi Wise, it is planned that the meeting be handled almost entirely by Ittelson and Lasker. with Governor Lehman making some introductory remarks. Apparently the intention is to stress the money side of the meeting. However, I will have fuller details after the meeting on Sunday night.

The technique of campaigning for funds is not the same for all communities. Allowances must be made for the procedure

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Executive Director Henry Montor and the temperament of major cities but different devices must be utilized for other and smaller communities. Thus, I feel that the telegram to the communities asking for cash and binding the Czechoslovakian situation to the United Jewish Appeal is most important. In the first place, a number of communities which have had campaigns hold on to their money until they get what they call a very big sum to send on to headquarters. Every cent counts whether it is for the JDC or UPA. In the second place, in many communities the receipt of a written telegram asking for money is most valuable in stimulating the collection of outstanding pledges. Another valuable aspect of these urgent telegrams is that they persuade members of budget committees, who are in doubt about the quota for the United Jewish Appeal or who are hesitating about holding a campaign, to take immediate action.

Our field men are in touch with most of the communities, and when they find indifference it is not because the local leaders are convinced that a campaign two or three months from now will be more advantageous but because in general they like to postpone the idea of an energetic campaign. Letters are very useful but a plethora of them becomes less and less effective. The UJA has not over-emphasized the use of telegrams so that a message of this kind is certain to bring a response.

Rabbi Brickner offered his services to the United Jewish Appeal for the latter part of April. Since the Speakers Bureau is always in need of speakers, we accepted his offer. Seattle and Portland were particularly anxious to have him. Since he is to be on the coast we have offered addresses by him to a number of the other communities.

It is always difficult to demarcate between the daily routine of speaking and campaign arrangements and the larger measures of policy. The tempo of the campaign throughout the country is now reaching an accelerated stage, and discussion of whether one speaker or another should go here or elsewhere is not always possible with the Chairmen, particularly since I have always taken it for granted that the man most acceptable to the community is acceptable to the officers of the UJA. The communities are bombarding us every day with requests for speakers. Every one of them asks for you first, and being told that you cannot accept, we scurry around frantically for someone who will, to some extent at least, meet the secondary wishes of the community. Thus, for example, Omaha was most anxious to have you address the initial gifts dinner but when you were in New York you turned this down.

Attached hereto is a copy of theletter which I have sent to Mr. Gould of Lorain on your behalf.

If Mr. Goldhamer will send me the list of chain stores in Cleveland which have national headquarters in New York, I shall see the national officers.

My dear Friend:

It is a long time since I have had the pleasure of seeing you. I have not, nevertheless, forgotten our pleasant contacts in past years.

As you probably know, I am national co-chairman of the United Jewish Appeal. In view of the tragic events which have overtaken so many of our people in Germany and elsewhere in Europe, we are endeavoring to raise, this year, the sum of Twenty Million Dollars in the United States to take care, if only in part, of the terrible tragedy which has occurred. The nation is responding magnificently. From all parts of the country, where campaigns have already been held, there have been splendid results. The City of Chicago which last year raised some six hundred thousand dollars for this cause, just completed its 1939 campaign with a sum of nearly two million dollars.

New York City is opening its campaign on April 2. Governor Lehman has called a conference of the leading Jews at his home on that day. New York City has accepted a quota of ten million dollars, and we are confident that the amount will be raised. We have on hand three gifts, in New York City, of a quarter of a million dollars each.

Your own City of Steubenville has been allocated a quota of twelve thousand dollars for the United Jewish Appeal. I am hoping that this amount will not only be reached, but exceeded. The success will depend in your community, as such success depends in every community, upon the right kind of leadership. I know of your standing in Steubenville and I am hoping that you will take a personal interest in the campaign, that you will accept the chairmanship of the Initial Gifts Committee and invite the leading contributors in your community to some function which you might sponsor to make sure of their proper giving, and that in all other ways you will give your support to this important work. I feel keenly that we need stimulation. A personal letter from you would be most helpful to the key leaders throughout the country--17,000 of them in big and little city.

Enclosed herewith is a draft I prepared this morning in the quiet of my home. I hope it is satisfactory or offers the basis for something you can do. Remissione and not despair insthe must be the keynote of action by Jews today! Recognizing that we are in the midst of a struggle in which our tenacity and our assurance of survival are important physically and morally, we can only resolve to go forward with new courage after each seeming defeat. If we are to be of any value to ourselves and to the millions of other Jews who are enabled to survive solely because they believe in us and wait for our support, we must be strong in will and determined in action: as individual Jews and as communities.

In this letter, whose length I trust you will forgive because of that I feel is the importance of the United Jewish A peal for Refugees and Overseas Need WRITION Psychologically, the united Core all entry in American Jewry in this "20,000,000 campaign is Photonsole value, financially, it should mean a better foundation for the infinitely larger resources that are needed this year by the United Falestine Appeal, the Joint Distribution Committee and the National Coordinating Committee.

International diplomacy may be shaken by Hitler's acts of aggression. For the Jewish people this lawlessness means the destruction of constantly new communities. Within two weeks hundreds of thousands of Jews in Czechoslovakia and thousands in Memel have been placed in the shadow of the Colossus of Hate. Despair grips our people. The suicides are uncountable. The economic dislocation and the mental confusion that Hitler brings is still index unimagineable though we have seen and heard innumerable descriptions for over five years. We do not know where Hitler will strike next. Plans that we make for the financial provision of a great number of his victims are blasted by the ruthlessness of his spread. There is a danger that because of the broad picture involved we may not see the details of the problem that faces us insofar as the United Jewish Appeal is concerned.

There are today under Hitler's destroying wings some 850,000 Jews: in Germany, Austria and what was formerly Czechoslovakia. A majority of that number are still in the age of creativity, having a zest for life and the capacity to contribute richly to any land that will accept them. The search for lands that will permanently absorb them still goes on. Thousands continue to go to Palestine and thousands come to America. Small numbers are admitted elsewhere. The burdensome expropriation that followed the pogroms of last November has left the German Jewish community seriously weakened -- notably in Austria. The need for support of those in Germany until they can emigrate is urgent. At the same time various schemes for their rehabilitation and maintenance outside Germany are being evolved, the extent of their Menaviewed veness depending on the funds available. Refugee camps are being established in England, Switzerland, Holland, Pelgium, Proce. Retraining farms and centers are being enlarged so that the emigrants can be adapted to new occupations. If men and women take their own lives and those of their children, it is because they yield to despair; because the aid which they expect from us does not come fast enough. Every time we read an item in our newspapers describing the tragic death of a Fitler victim it reminds us that we might possibly have shared in giving him hope.

Poland is one of the most important areas of support affected by the United Jewish Appeal. In a community of over 3,100,000 Jews economic destitution is causing wider ravages. Those who think boundaries are barriers to Hitlerian are not aware of the intensification of anti-Semitism that has occurred in Poland in recent years. The drive to rid Poland of its "auperfluous population" has taken on new energy. No responsible leader even thinks of encouraging that forced emigration of the Jews. They must remain until only physical violence removes them. But if

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we are convinced that the ganity of world Jewry and the sanctity of Jewish rights must be preserved in the londs in which Jews live, we must do our share to enable the Jews to survive in Poland. By so doing we can not only save Jewish lives but make a distinct contribution to the survival of democracy, which is the only barx wall between the Jewish people and disaster. The Joint Distribution Committee, through support of institutions of self-help in Poland, can make it possible to avert the disintegra tion of one of the largest Jewish units in the world. Surely no one--even those of us living as far away as the United States--believes that the disruption of the ancient Jewish community in Poland would be without its effects on our orn desting.

The snows of the Alps carry the footprints of thousands of wandering Jews who have once again taken up their trek. They are part of the 1⁵,000 ordered expelled from Italy because they entered after 1919. The anti-Semitic laws which WenR HitS effectives onth have deprived some twenty thousand Jews of COCO althout the Italian Jews of their status as citizens.

Hungary, within the orbit of Hitler politically, has adopted his slogans racially. A self-admitted Jew-baiting government is now passing numerus clausus legislation designed to remove sixty thousand Jews from their occupations. Thus does Hungary join the European countries using the Jewish people as mountains of human bones on which to climb to heights of political advantage.

• The government of King Carol in Rumania, striving to gain the support of anti-Semitic elements, outdoes its political opponents in the fervor of its regulations against Jews. The new economic agreement between the Nazis and Rumania foreshadows a far broader front of cooperation. It cannot too often be remembered that where Hitler goes there goes his complete arsenal of despoliation and destruction of the Jewish people.

There are over five million Jews in Central and Eastern Europe. Over them hangs the shadow of slow or swift strangulation. There is enough energy and talent within that mass to hold fast for a long time---until the shadow dissipates, as eventually it must--if we in America will help them hold their ground. For our sakes as well as for theirs.

The recent conferences in London have stirred many questions. Misconceptions have arisen which must be cleared up--for the sake of facts and especially in the interests of the United Jewish Appeal which embraces the United Palestine Appeal among its beneficiaries.

For weeks Jewish and Arab representatives met with the British Government to consider Palestine problems. No agreement resulted. The Govern ment has indicated that it will impose its own policy for the future. An impending announcement was withheld because of the shock of the Czechoelovakian events which undoubtedly dave Great Britain new cause to remember how much the Jews advertes to be counted upon to decipie defense from and how blunders much they can be counted upon to decipie defense free pressure exercised from America, by Christian all Color and how blunders how England can possibly think of closing the doors of Palestine to the Jews when they are being forced out of other lands at an ever-increasing tempo.

But whatever the decision that may be imposed by Great Britain--now or in the future--the facts of steady Palestine growthcannot be changed. There are today in the Jewish homeland over 500,000 Jews, They constitute more than a third of the settled population. They are so inextricably bound up with every facet of the country's life that no decree can diminish their strength. The Jewish young men and women of Falestine have for three years defended the land against the terrorist and the saboteur. They have demonstrated bravery under fire and capacity to carry on with their daily constructive tasks despite obstructions. They have built more colonies than in any similar period. They have found new water re-

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sources, enlarging the area of colonization. Jews, as citizens of Palestine, have the legal and moral right to bear arms. They will resist injustice as they have resisted injury. We Jews in America and elsewhere ought to be proud of our people who have innumtrated shownwhat it is to exercise all the prerogatives of free citizens of a native land in defense of the best interests of that land.

Immigration goes on. Economic life advances. The possibilities for land purchase are unprecedented. If we are as free with our financial support as the Jews of Palestine have been with their lives as well as their money no arbitrary decree can prevent a continuous influx of Jews into Palestine and their steady development of the country. Whatever British policy may be this year, the legal rate of immigration will not be less than it has been in the past two years. In the meantime, 'Jews have an opportunity to buy thousands of dunama of land -- the only possible basis on which great seatlement plans Acent be Souilt. There is not a Jew today, witnessing the a gardination of the time in Europe, who does not regret that we did the pot the vistor twenty and ten years ago to buy more land, to build more colonies, to pour more manpower into Palestine. The opportunities are not lost. They beckon. With the aid of the United Jewish Appeal we can make a substantial contribution to the saving permanently of large number of Jews in Europe and of building a reservoir of strength in Palestine for the other Jews who continue to hope for the chance at the free life the Jewish homeland provides.

The Jews of Falestine have given Jews everywhere an example they should cherish. When menaced by force, they have reacted with courage. When threatened with delimitation of their rights they stood up strongly to preserve them against all foes. If that comparatively small community if Falestine could resist Arab violence for three years, encouraged as it was by the empires of Mussolini and Hitler, and still grow and prosper, the millions of Jews elsewhere have every right to be strong and

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hopeful. But there are some among us who have greater capacity for resis tance. We must share our resources with the others.

I beg of you to see to it that your 1939 campaign for the United Jewish Appeal, whether held now or in the coming months, should not be on the level of a routine philanthropic effort -- requiring a little more energy perhaps but not nothing more.

You as a community leader have a definite obligation -- in terms of personal service and of contribution. If you will give yourself even more devotedly than in the post to the planning and conduct of the campaign the community will emulate your example. Moreover, all standards of generosity in the past have no bearing on what is demanded of us today. I have been surprised to note certain instances in which contributors of \$100 in 1938 are giving \$150 this year and those of \$500 are giving \$600 or \$700. There may be occasions in which a contributor gave the maximum last year and cannot possibly de nore LAMERICAN HEWEN But that is an exception. All the rest of us ought, as a token of our special capacity for understanding the tent of the groblem, give without regard to past records. Every leader should realize that an extraordinary enlargement of his own giving means more than the dollars from himself. It means that thousands of additional dollars are added to the campaign total since the entire community is stimulated to contributeon a similar scale of sacrificial generosity.

In those communities in which campaigns have been concluded, collections should be sourred. There are, of course, established procedures for the xemi regular collection and remittance of funds to the United Jewish Appeal. But every Jew who can should make available as quickly as possibe the full extent of his support.

The United Jewish Appeal is far more than an instrument of assistance to others. It is a weapon of defense for ourselves. Surely no one any longer thinks in the provincial terms that what happens in the world at large does not affect us here. In Europe is our first line of defense.

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I want you to know that every time I see the name of a campaign officer I feel a deep sense of satisfaction to know that my associates and I have another soldier in the ranks standing by our side in a phalanx to resist the tide that rises to sweep the world but which, with our herculean efforts and by the natural course of the world, will ultimately be abated.

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In acknowledgement of that solidarity will you not give me the great pleasure of writing to me personally at the above address of them minity your own observations on the Jewish situation and particularly with regard to what you personally have done within the framework of your own community on behalf of the United Jewish Appeal for Refugees and Overseas Needs. I have written in the same vein to several others in the community but I would appreciate a personal statement from you.

May the coming Passover holidays tim mark the beginning of a new epoch for the redemption of our people. The scaped from bondage thousands of years ago. With the help about that deliverance one scape. Very cordially yours,

I regret that I cannot accept the invitation to address the meeting at the Waldorf Astoria on June 7.

With reference to the list of people from Cleveland invited to the Lehman dinner - Mr. Hiram Rivitz wrote me this morning as follows:

"I wish it were possible for me to attend Gov. Lehman's meeting on April 2nd. I have been under the weather since the latter part of January. I went to Florida for the month of February, hoping to get rid of a bad bronchial infection, but I came back with the same trouble and have been going to the doctor taking tests, and after considerable investigation they located the germ, and I am now taking injections and am only able to come to the office for a few hours each day - but I am getting better, but still very weak, and the doctor advises me not to leave until I have taken sufficient injections to indicate definite recovery, which will take about another month to prove the value of this procedure, and I am afraid that I will have to remain in Cleveland for another month or so.





Mr. Fishershein, who recently came to the United States, was accompanied by Mr. Meier Karelitz, chief of the delegation, who was not at the office, however.

In very polite phraseology the United Palestine Appeal was asked to include the Poale Agudath Israel in its campaign. There was a subtle intimation that if the Poale Agudath Israel were not included, it would cause friction since the Poale Agudath Israel would have to go throughout the country and announce that they were not included in the United Palestine Appeal.

I told Rabbi Greneman, who was the spokesman in English that:(a.) the United Palestine Appeal was the fund-raising instrument specifically for the Keren Hayesod and the Keren Kayemeth, except for an allotment to the Zionist Organization and the Mizrachi, and (b.) that no allotment could be made by the United Palestine Appeal without the approval of the Keren Hayesod and the Keren Kayemeth in Palestine.

Without committing the United Palestine Appeal I indicated that perhaps the administration of the Poale Agudath might want to conduct its own campaign among its own members and sympathizers in the same way as the Poale Zion does for Gewerkschaften.

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Executive Director Henry Montor Palestine Appeal only after every attempt had been made to raise money in various synagogues and the latter, with traditional hospitality, had invited the delegation to apply to the United Palestine Appeal. No contributions were forthcoming from these zealous Orthodox Jews.

I suggested to the delegation that if they wanted formal and official action they should submit a written application to the United Palestine Appeal, stating what they want from the United Palestine Appeal.

Rabbi Greneman indicated that they were anxious to get \$30,000 in the United States.

I pointed out that the Jews of America would ask why the Agudath Israel was not included in the purposes of the Keren Hayesod and the Keren Kayemeth. They would have to be told that the Keren Hayesod and the Keren Kayemeth are most anxious to make available their facilities but that the Agudath Israel had rejected participation therein.

The Agudath Israel people are therefore in the highly moral position of refusing on strictly religious grounds to participate in the Keren Hayesod and Keren Kayemeth in Palestine on the one hand and of demanding funds from the American agencies of these two institutions, on the other.

I shall forward the application of the Agudath Israel when it is received.

I did not give them any hope for inclusion in the United Palestine Appeal. I felt it was better to reject than to commit the United Palestine Appeal to affirmative action which can always be taken by the Administrative Committee.

In re: Your Memorendum of March 27th

I wish to deal with that portion of your memorandum of March 27th, addressed to Dr. Goldstein that pertains to the JNF.

We ought not to bear the burden of responsibility for the number of difficulties you have enumerated in your communication, which have no direct relation to the JEF.

1- With reference to the Chicage Conference, it is taken for granted that the JDC has a right to hold conferences all over the United States. The JDC is a part of the UNA and while it is the opinion of many of us that the UNA as an entity cught to be strengthened, the JDC people not wishing to obliterate their organization, but on the contrary, wishing to strengthen all that the JDC represents, have called a series of regional conferences throughout the United States. To this problem you did not address yourself in your memorandum.

Shall the Zionists remove themselves from the scame at a time when the JDG is doing its best to strengthen its forces? It seems to me that all of us ought to feel grateful for the fast that the JNF is calling a conference at which the Sionists can have an opportunity of doing for the Felestine sentiment exactly what the JDG is doing for their business by calling its conferences. The conference, as we have stated more than once, will not announce any financial goals. It will be a conference to strengthen the sentiment of our workers and to give them some light and leading with regard to their activity, in view of the UJA limitations. You know, of course, that Weismann and Ussishkin will breadcast messages to the conference. These messages will, as in the past, have an invigorating effect upon Zionists throughout the country. If you think that the holding of such a conference is unwise, you are entitled to you epinion, but I doubt if many among us will share it.

Of course, we are all vitally interested in the success of the UJA and our levalty and our devotion to the UJA must be taken for granted just as the levalty of the JDC group. Each of us is roady and willing to contribute according to his ability and his means. It should not be necessary for us to proclaim that every minute of the day. The JMF has emphasized in all of its literature and in our appeal to the workers that they give all that is within their power to help the UJA. As the beneficiaries of this campaign we are vitally interested in its success. If some of our JDC friends do not understand that we are as deeply interested as they are it is our business to make that very clear to them. I am sure that you will, and that they will recognize that the Eienist forces in this country are doing all that there can be expected of them to help the campaign. Let me quote a statement that the JMF cent out to all of our committees, urging support for the UJA: 11

"SUPPORT UNITED JEWISH APPEAL

"Insofar as the larger gifts' efforts are concerned, the needs of the Jewish National Fund are incorporated in that nationwide campaign that will be carried on in 1939 under the auspices of the United Jewish Appeal for Refugees and Overseas Needs. It goes without saying that the duty of active participation in and contribution to the United Jewish Appeal in all communities is an obligation incumbent upon all of us. The attainment by the United Jewish Appeal of its \$20,000,000 goal is a task which merits our enthusiastic and unstinted cooperation, both because of its general program of Relief and Rehabilitation and because of the special stake of the JNF in its proceeds."

I think it would be in order for you, who are so solicitous about the best possible relations between the UJA and ourselves, that you convey to your colleagues in the UJA this pertinent information. Surely, the JDC group must know that the JNF did not come into existence yesterday and cannot be removed from the scene today or temorrow. Our integrity in the agreement is assured and we are endeavoring to live up to the agreement.

In connection with the Chicage Conference, Dr. Geldstein invited Dr.Silver several weaks ago to address the Conference, and to use his address, or a portion of it, for the purpose of saying to the JNF workers whatever he thinks should be said in impressing the UNA upon them. Dr.Silver found it impossible to accept the invitation. Thereupon we decided to invite one of the Co-Chairmen of the UJA to come to our Chicago Conference for the purpose of talking about the UJA and stimulating the interest of our people in it. Dr. Goldstein has written Dr. Silver suggesting that Judge Rothenberg be designated for that purpose. Perhaps this point, too, might be brought to the attention of your collesques in the UJA.

2- We agreed in January to cancel the Roosevelt Golden Book action. That was done although at a great price to us. Here was a project that was announced nationally at the Zionist Convention. Dr. Wise and others participated in that action. And just when we were at the height of our activity we had to give up the effort. Our publicity has been modified in accordance with the understandings arrived at. Though we have irritated any number of JNF people in the land, who do not seem to share our judgment that certain activities must be abandoned because of the agreement, we have strictly adhered to the memorandum of agreement which was submitted to Dr.Silver.

If the activity of the JNF within these agreed limitations still offers some conflict or irritation, there is, I am afraid, nothing to be done about it. Ferhaps the wary existence of the JNF as a living organization is the chief irritation. Perhaps the only condition which will afford you surcease from worry would be the disappearance of the JNF altogether. That solution is not feasible. It would therefore be advisable, it seems to me, that you should recognize that as long as the JNF is a functioning organization there is bound to be a modicum of occasional conflict and irritation no matter how strictly the JNF adheres to the limitations imposed upon it. It should be realized, however, that as long as those irritations and conflicts are minor the thing to do is to accept them as inevitable instead of making an issue of every little incident that arises.

3- We in the UPA must think just as the JDC is thinking, not in terms of today only but tomorrow as well. We have a long experience in fund-raising and it would be short-sighted policy if we failed to plan for the coming years. Our loyalty to the UJA does not prevent us from planning ahead. It would be suicidal for us as Sionists if, because we are in this campaign, we fail in our responsibility to prepare for the coming years. This would be as calamitous to the UFA as it would to its constituent organizations. We have already learned from the past that it is easy to dismantle but most difficult to reconstruct.

The JDG knows very well that the JNF is not an organization for today alone. We have a program and a purpose. The JNF must give the Sionists that amercize which they require in order to remain articulate. We can carry on our program effectively without creating irritations if only both sides knew exactly what is involved. The JDG was aware when it entered into the campaign that we would carry on our traditional activities. We also have a propaganda work to de and alms, this propagands from the direct UPA point of visw has already been weakened since we entered into the campaign because all of us are busy with the UFA. It must therefore be left to the JNF and to the Sionist organizations to vigorously carry on the propaganda to make American Jewry Palestine-conscious.

There is a dangerous tendency in Jewish life, in the effort that is being made to completely centralize all fund-raising efforts. From the point of view of many of these people the JHF is a nuisence and not an instrument for Palestine land redemption. No matter what we do, they become irritated. When a button is sold it is a challenge to their American patriction, so they say. There is a fear psychosis and it is not therefore the campaign aspect alone that troubles than but the very existence of the JHF as an gency for fund-raising. To us, the JHF represents a Mionist tradition. There are hundreds of poor people who can play no part in any large campaign, but who can carry on the day to day activities of the JHF. Must we deprize them of that right?

When this campaign is concluded, you must be prepared for the criticism that will be murled at us that we have not done our share. Our people cannot be the largest contributors and so some who will wish to be unfair will tell us that the UPA has not been as effective as they thought it would be. With all our hearts we hope that the UJA will truly solidify our ranks, but on the other hand, must we, and can we, leave to those who are so insistent that the JNF activities should be completely restricted the determination of our program and our objectives? The JDC has decided for itself what is best for its interests and we, too, must decide for ourselves what is best from the Zionist point of giew.

4- You raised the important question about allocating the balance of the funds that are to be made available outside of the nine and a half million. That is a very crucial question. We are all concerned that the UPA should receive its due share of the additional funds that the allocating committee is to apportion. It is my humble judgment that there will be a number of factors that will determine that issue, one of the most important of which will be our own inherent strength. If the allocating committee is to be fair and just, as I am sure it will been then Falestine will maturally receive a very substantial sum, just as the JDG will. We will also have to show to this committee that the UPA is a living organization, that it has tremendous power and strength in the country. The JNF can play its part in building that strength up. We must demonstrate to the country not only our readiness to support the UJA but, like the JDG, that we have a powerful organization that yulaates and that is prepared to assume its obligations as a Falestine scendy. We cought to therefore encourage the JHF and the K.H. to be as strong as power and that is prepared to assume its obligations as a Falestine × - ×

5- In your memorandum you inquire whether we cannot utilize our Conference as a great rally for the UJA. The answer is, of course, an affirmative one. It was plaaned from the beginning to devote a portion of the Conference to a discussion of our participation in the campaign. On the agenda for the roundtable conferences will be the UJA and all its remifications. We have invited Judge Rothenberg to speak for the UJA.

6- I do not think it is fair to Dr.Goldstein, who, you will admit, is rendering effective and devoted service to the UJA as such, that these complaints should be coming up time after time, and meeting after meeting. A person with loss patience than Dr.Goldstein would have "blown up" long ago. It seems to me that even the fact that you take the complaint against the JNF as your spring-board for your entire memorandum, covering observations on many phases of the work and many groups and parties, and that your whole memorandum is addressed to Dr.Goldstein and copies of it sent to the other Go-Ghairmen, even though only one phase of the memorandum pertains particularly to the JNF, is manifestly unfair and unjustified.

In making these observations, I did so with the same sincerity of purpose that prompted you to write your confidential statement to Dr. Goldstein and to the other Co-Chairmen, and with the same deep interest and concern not only in the work of the JNF, but also in the bast interests of our movement as a whole. To redepitulate, we must do everything within our power to strengthen every arm of our movement. The JNF by virtue of its experience, its history, its tradition and its organization can be of teamendous help in bringing about those objectives.

I today discussed with Leon Gellman, President of the Migrachi Organization of America, the letter addressed to you on March 30th by the National Coordinating Committee. Mr. Gellman told me the following:

A group of Orthodox erganizations in New York City including the Union of Orthodox Hebrew Congregations, Young Israel, Misrachi Organization of America and Shonrei Hadath feel that the Orthodox refugees are not being adequately considered by the Hational Coordinating Committee.

Mr. Gelhann told me that the Orthodox group states that Orthodox refugees are asked to come to the Committee offices on Saturday, and their particular psychology as pious Jews is not taken into consideration in placement and advice.

What this Orthodox group wants is that the National Coordinating Committee, to whose attention this situation has been called for many months, should set up some department which would recognize the fact that among the refugees are those who abide by traditional Judaism. Mr. Gellman states that many Orthodox Jews who have been offended by the attitude of someone in the National Coordinating Committee have come to one of the four organizations which are Orthodox to register the complaint.

It was on this basis that the four organizations sent a letter to the National Coordinating Committee asking that either special provision be made for Orthodox refugees or that these four duly constituted Orthodox bodies be given the means wherewith to provide for Orthodox refugees in their own menner.

I explained to him that at first the UPA had agreed to the post of Honorary Secretary with the understanding that someone like Ludwig Lewisohn was to represent the UPA, and Hyman the JDC. Failing that, we had been prepared to accept Mr. Hyman as the sole Honorary Secretary with the understanding that his functions would be honorary. Mr. Hyman declined. Since then we have forgotten the matter. I do not know why Judge Goldstein had resurrected it except perhaps under the stimulus of Mr. Hyman.

I explained to Judge Goldstein that a matter of this kind could not be decided except by the Administrative Committee of the UPA to whom I would submit it at its next meeting.

My dear Mr. Adler:

In accordance with my promise over the phone last night, am rendering you a report about Atchison. Last September when I came here, my colleague. Baruch Braunstein, then S. W. regional director M.P.A., asked me to speak for U.P.A. in Atchison. I offered to do it if a meeting were arranged and my expenses defrayed. The key-man, Mr. Deutsch, tried to arrange a meeting, but without success. Later he suggested making use of Mr. & Mrs. Callot's silver wedding celebration. I brought the "LAND OF PROMISE" film and showed it, but could not make the appeal because the hosts deemed it out of place. I merely made some general remarks about it. Meanwhile about the end of October, Rabbi David Shapiro, then a J.N.F. representative, now at Green Bay, Wis. (my former post), visited here, and would have covered Atchison, but I felt that it wasn't fair to Braunstein and the U.P.A.'s expenses. Hence, I offered to take care of it myself, agreeing upon 2/3 for U.P.A. and 1/3 for J.N.F. Finally about the end of November 1 succeeded in having a meeting arranged and spoke. The group pledged \$200 (2/3 H.P.A. and 1/3 J.N.F.). There was a delay in raising the money, because of difficulties among them? selves. Finally I was told by phone that only individual solicitation by an outsider can money be collected. Atchiege being too close to my community I could hardly go there as a collector. But since we had invited Rev. Mintz here, a J.N.F. representative, I waited, and promised to take him to Atchison to finish what I had started in September. We went out Monday and Tuesday, March 27th and 28th and collected about \$100. My total expenses (about \$10-11, for about 6 trips) were being defrayed by U.P.A.-J.N.F.

Now, you een judge for yourself, that this collection had nothing to do with the 1939 United Jewish Appeal, but belonged to 1938 U.P.A.-JIN.F. Furthermore, the U.P.A.-J.N.F. went to a considerable expense and efforts since Sept. 1938; besides, Rabbi Shabiro, a former J.N.F. representative, would have collected this money last October-November <u>1938</u> anyway. Furthermore, most of the money was given to buy land in Palestine for refugees, and for trees, etc. Had the U.J.A. (which and not exist then) or J.D.C. approached me, I would have been willing, and still willing, to travel for them; but it was the U.P.A.-J.N.F. that sponsored my visits. I noticed that the smaller unorganized towns are out of the way and are only reached by J.N.F.

I therefore think in all fairness to the efforts and expenses of U.P.A.-J.N.F., that this collection belongs to them for <u>1938</u>. Next fall or winter I am willing to visit Atchison for other towns in this state and in nearby states for the cause, if my expenses were defrayed. I do hope that you will get together with UPA-JNF and solve this matter in the fairest manner, as I have tried to explain. Please do not hesitate to call on me for the cause.





I beg to refer you to your letter of March 16th, which called me to New York. The letter set forth what, apparently, were the prime reason for the invitation. Later, a letter from Mr. Ittleson and a telegram from you hinted that an expression of my own individual, financial responsibility would probably be called for.

I could, - and would, - have gladly sent along a financial response without all the inconvenience and expense of leaving my business and my family to make the long trip to New York, but I was moved, and I am sure most others were also, by the prospect of discussing the subjects set forth in your letter, as well as other important matters of a Jewish nature in this country.

Mr. Warburg's luncheon was very gracious and the addresses interesting but, to all intents and purposes, the motive was to prevail upon ur visitors to so contribute as to impress and influence some New Yorkers who, it was stated, might be more liberal in the way of contributions.

At the general meeting which opened up at three o'clock, it was plainly apparent from the several addresses that this was the opening of the New York campaign and that there would be no consideration of all the different subjects that we had so hoped to hear discussed. They were not even listed on the program. We were told, and the program also set forth, that after a buffet supper questions could be asked and answered by representatives of the J.D.C., some of whom had just returned from foreign countries. At the supper only a few remained -- nearly one half of whom were ladies.

"The drive had gone over" -- a great success. But what of all of us who had been drawn to New York by the prospect of discussing with you and others of our leaders, national (as well as foreign) Jewish matters? What have we to bring back to our parts of the country? The numbers answering your call from all over the country is indicative of how seriously we are all concerned, and an expression of how quickly we were ready to respond, -- but after such a disappointment, how many do you now think could be encouraged to again answer such a call?

May I trouble you to continue a little farther with regard to our Jewish activities? We, living away from New York, blindly and trustingly follow our leaders, most of whom are in New York, and no questions asked -- we have been subjected to their words and actions for us, without our being consulted -- we give of our time and our wherewithal in support of the numerous institutions they set up -- surely we want to continue to do so. But, I am equally sure, however, that the time is soon coming when if our activities in the future are to be successful, more coordination and cooperation with us on the part of our leaders will have to be established. In their feverish and untiring devotion to our burdens, complete reliance has been placed upon sympathetic hearts -but the head is also attached to the purse strings. We must be placed in a position to impart information to all those giving their financial and personal assistance. May I offer the suggestion that the Chairman of each community be advised in full detail in what activities, and how monies have been used. Place them in position to answer such questions as: how much was used in Poland, and for what purposes; how much was used in moving refugees from German territories; how many refugees were moved and to what countries; what amounts were sent for care of refugees to England, Switzerland and other countries; what amounts were used for investigation of possible settlement of refugees in this country; what for different uses in this country, etc.,etc. At the end of its fiscal year the J.D.C.leaders must have in their hands a statement of income and disbursements in detail, just as any commercial corporation and, in my opinion there is a good reason why that information should be sent in detail throughout the country.

May I call also your attention to the following? We were told at the meeting in New York that our leaders had agreed among themselves that money available in this drive for the J.D.C. and the U.P.A., would be divided on a sixty/forty basis. Dr. Silver stated to me that it was quite all right if those opposed to Zionism wished only to give the J.D.C. and explained that such gifts would be offset by appropriating to the U.P.A., the full amount of an undesignated contribution. In other words, the desire of one to confine his donation to where he wishes it should go, is nullified -- this is done without his consent and also without the knowledge of most of those who contribute. Dr. Silver does not believe that many cases of this kind will arise, but I feel that I can say that here in the South there are a great many anti-Zionists, and please do not believe that I bring this up because I, personally, am not a Zionist-I bring it up because of the spirit of fair play and because it cannot be afforded to shake the confidence of the people. Such actions will destroy the probability of real financial support in the future.

I am sorry if I have consumed too much of your valuable time, and in writing so long to determine whether or not this letter should be sent, I have tried to find some way that you would consider it not a criticism but in reality a statement of facts and a plea for unity in the future.

SUBJECT: ATCHISON, KANSAS

On March 27th while in Leavenworth I learned from Mr. Edward Winning that a Rabbi had been in Leavenworth the previous day (Winnig forgot his name), and that was going to Atchison with Rabbi Horowitz of Leavenworth, in behalf of the refugee situation. As it was impossible for me to go to Atchison on that day as I had to return to Kansas City for a plane to Wichita. I immediately telephoned to Mr. Harry Berkson in Atchison, advising him that no one was additionized by the United Jewish Appeal for Refugees and Overseas Needs to solicit any funds in Atchison, and that I was the only accredited representative in that territory. Berkson advised, however, that Rabbi Horowitz and the other Rabbi whose name is Mintz had already called on him. In arranging my itinerary I found that it would be possible for me to be in Atchison on April 6th and on the previous evening telephoned to Mr. Deutsch, our chairman in Atchison (he was out of town on March 27th) to arrange a meeting. Minmediately telephoned Horowitz and learned that Mintz represents the J.N.F. and that he horowitz acted as he did solely because he had promised Baruch Braunstein last fall that "some day" he would go over to Atchison to solicit funds for the J.N.F. He could give me no details but promised to forward a written report which, I understand, has already been received in this office.

Dear Dr.Silver:

Although the country as a whole seems to be progressing satisfactorily, with virtually every community, big and little, geared to do a record-breaking job, New York does not seem to be coming up to expectations.

Mr.Lamport, who may have telephoned to you before you receive this letter, reported on a meeting of the New York UJA Executive Committee on Tuesday afternoon. Willen told the Committee that they should prepare for failure: that \$10,000,000 or even \$8,000,000 was impossible of achievement and that if five or six million were raised, it would be a miracle. Apparently he offered no constructive program that would avert such a failure.

What can and should be done in the matter? There is certainly no point in complaining for the saking of establishing a record. But I do believe it is not yet too late to rescue the campaign. That is where the national leadership must take a hand. With things going well, New York had a perfect right to say to the national officers that it should have as much autonomy as any other community, whether it be Cleveland or San Francisco. But now things look bad, on Willen's own admission, it is essential to examine the reasons why they are bad and to attempt to remedy them. Otherwise, the United Jewish Appeal will suffer an irreparable loss, not alone in this year's proceeds but in the effect on the entire country for coming years.

These things are clear to me:

First, the Federation machinery, whatever its merits, has too many other irons in the fire. Willen himself spends a great deal of time with the Greater New York Fund. That is an important institution with which Jews should concern themselves and one in which Willen personally must be involved since Federation receives a substantial sum from the campaign. But Willen, no matter how competent he may be, cannot serve two or three campaigns at the same time and do justice to the United Jewish Appeal. In addition to the Greater New York Fund, Willen is involved in the American Jewish Committee drive--which has taken an awful lot of money from New Yorkers. But it is not Willen alone who is concerned. The personnel and the leadership which the Federation said itwas making available to the UJA are tied up to

a large extent in the Greater New York drive. The Federation group is working on two premises: (a) that good will in New York demands that the Jews contribute in unusual measure of money and time to the Greater New York Fund as a means of offsetting anti-Semitism; and (b) that since anti-Semitism is increasing in the United States, large sums must be raised for the American Jewish Committee to combat it. These premises make hard sledding for the United Jewish Appeal drive.

Second, the Federation machinery--though large--is not necessarily competent. I know how you felt about the competence of the New York United Palestine Appeal. Except for the number of men working with the Federation group, a number of whom are quite effective, I do not see that the difference is staggering. What the New York campaign lacks is a sense of unity in its various parts and a feeling that a "crusade" is under way. That feeling isnot communicated either to the workers or the volunteers by the leadership. It derives solely from the events which lead people spontaneously to ally themselves with the United Jewish Appeal. Considering the fact that the New York UJA ostensibly has at its disposal the foremost names in New York Jewry, it is amazing that more progress has not been registered. The Women's Division, however, under the leadership of Mrs.David Levy is doing a splendid job.I hope it isn't discouraged by the attitude of Willen.

You will recall my disappointment after the Harmonie Clyb meeting. I sensed that it had been a flop and said so--even though over \$3,000,000 was announced. As you will see from the financial report I sent you, New York has not even attained \$2,000,000 as yet---and some of the best cream has already been removed. Willen is a persuasive talker--but what with all his other worries and his seeming incapacity to win the cooperation of all groupings, I am not convinced that the talk stands for money.

It may be said: Do nothing and say nothing now-because a controversy might upset the campaign and spil all prospects! The Federation people undertook the job and they must be given a chance to work out the campaign in their own way!

But I believe that the Federation has had ample time to prove (4) the extent of its preoccupation with the campaign and (b) the effectiveness of its approach. Prestige for one side and ill-will for the other must play no part--but we cannot afford to let the campaign go any further without some worf of counsel that the campaign must be tightened, that people should direct it who have only this one concern, that every section of the community must be reached and reasons not devised why any particular segment should not be touched, that this silly insistence that Palestine cannot be mentioned except vaguely as a refugee home must be abandoned, that the technique established in every other city in the country be given a chance in New York too. You remember that you have been insisting upon that for a year. It has not been done in New York--even though Federation has complete and contemptuous charge.

Do you think it would be advisable for you, on behalf of yourself and JB Wise, to ask for a meeting with the New York UJA committee on April 27th--or is a meeting of the Executive Committee of the UJA in the afternoon of that day preferable. If you think something along these lines should be done, you can phone or wire me at the Atlanta Biltmore Hotel, Atlanta, Ga., through Sunday night. I am addressing various meetings for the campaign during the period.

My dear Mr. Montor:

We ought to have a full and detailed plan worked out considerably in advance of such a meeting, and our headquarters in Jerusalem ought, immediately, to be contacted with for help in drafting this statement of our bugetary needs.

Dear Dr. Silver:

I have seen the Palestine Pavilion. Although the interior fittings have not yet been completed I think it can be said already that it will be an impressive addition to the World's Fair and a source of pride to all Jews interested in creating better sentiment for Palestine.

In view of the fact that the United Palestine Appeal is the fund-raising agency for Palestine upbuilding I think it important that somehow or other the name "United Palestine Appeal" be identified to the thousands of visitors who will see the Palestine Pavilion. Accordingly I am planning with your approval to arrange for the installation of a self-running motion picture machine in one of the halls of the Pavilion on which will be placed a shortened edition of the "Land of Promise" or similar film footage which will have interspersed from time to time reference to and slogans of the United Palestine Appeal as the agency through which American Jews make possible the rebuilding of the Jewish Homeland.

The cost of the machine itself will be about \$400 or \$500. Union regulations require that there be someone in the neighborhood for an emergency even though it is an automatic machine which requires no attendant. I think that the weekly cost to meet this union requirement will be approximately \$25 to \$30 for the period of the Fair. My own belief is that this is a very worthwhile investment. I trust that you will agree with me.

> The amount of money involved is unimportant. The principle involved is, in my opinion, of the utmost importance as it affects vitally the agreement among the Joint Distribution Committee, the United Palestine Appeal and the National Coordinating Committee Fund, Inc. in the United Jewish Appeal.

> As I see it, regardless of any other consideration as to when the money was planned to be raised, the money was actually raised by a Jewish National Fund representative in March, 1939 and, therefore, must be secured for the United Jewish Appeal, If you do not believe that this ruling is valud, I shall initiate steps immediately for a revision of the agreement made in good faith to the effect that monies received by the Joint Distribution Committee on and after January 1st, 1939 from campaigns that were arranged for the Joint Distribution Committee during the latter part of 1938 but held after January 1st, 1939 are to be considered as part of the United Jewish Appeal fund and instead will insist that these monies be refunded to the Joint Distribution Committee.

> The daily misunderstandings as to the status of the Jewish National Fund in relation to the United Jewish Appeal are becoming increasingly itritating to me and disturbing to the Joint Distribution Committee. It is particularly distressing to note in the letter from Rabbi Samuel Horowitz of Leavenworth in connection with the Atchison situation that "I noticed that the smaller unorganized towns are out of the way and are only reached by Jewish National Fund." This rather definitely suggests that the Jewish National Fund, through its own machinery, is undertaking to coger small towns for collections not to be regarded as traditional collections" provided for in the agreement.

> In a set-up such as we have in the United Jewish Appeal it will be tragic indeed if all of the included organizations could not operate in absolute good faith. It is assumed that each agency which is represented in the United Jewish Appeal will adhere without pressure to the agreement to which it is a signatory. That is the issue involved. Personally, I have not the stomach to be a policeman in this campaign and to try to track down each and every dollar that might come into the treasury of the United Palestine Appeal, the Jewish National Fund or the Mizrachi. Nor would I expect you to follow this type of procedure with the Joint Distribution Committee or the National Coordinating Committee Fund, Inc.

> I can say to you in good faith, tantamount to a guarantee, that every penny received by either the Joint Distribution Committee or the National Coordinating Committee Fund, Inc. to which this campaign is entitled by virtue of its agreement will be reported to the United Jewish Appeal and made available to the United Jewish Appeal for our own treasury. We expect the same from the United Palestine Appeal which, as we understand it, includes the Keren Hayesod, Keren Kayemeth and the Mizrachi.

> In order that this issue may be sustained until it is decided for future understanding and procedures during the remainder of the year, I am formally asking the Joint Distribution Committee to earmark and retain contributions in the sum of \$350 received from any source direct to its own office as an off-set to this \$175 contribution to the Jewish National Fund from the proceeds of an appeal conducted in Atchison, Kansas. Ido this on the basis that the agreement provides that out of the first \$9,500,000 the Joint Distribution Committee is to receive \$5,000,000 in relation to the \$2,500,000 for the United Palestine Appeal which, of course is a ratio of two to one. I am also asking the National Coordinating Committee to withhold \$140 which is in the ratio of \$2,000,000 out of the first \$9,500,000 in relation to \$2,500,000 for the United Palestine Appeal,

Please note carefully the attached correspondence in which Mr. Sam L. Meyer advises us that \$80.00 was raised in Fort Collins and sent to New York. As Rabbi David Shapiro, to whom he refers, represents or represented the Jewish National Fund in January, Mr. Meyer apparently thinks that this money was raised for the United Jewish Appeal - and we believe that it was remitted to the Jewish National Fund.

This memorandum ties in very definitely with our experience in Atchison, Kansas.

Unless you, as representing the United Palestine Appeal in the United Jewish Appeal, will take steps to arrange with the Jewish National Fund to remit to us all monies properly due the United Jewish Appeal of which the Jewish National Fund is a constituent member, I must confess that I know of no way of solving this matter.

It is not at all my intention or purpose to try to track down every penny, as I indicated in my memorandum on Atchison, but the agreement was signed in good faith, and the officers of the Joint Distribution Committee and the National Coordinating Committee Fund, Inc., respectively, who are parties to this agreement, recognize fully that the Jewish National fond is a member of the United Palestine Appeal and that all funds received by any agency included in the United Palestine Appeal must find their way to the common treasury. I mean, of course, that it is definitely and unequivocably understood by, at least, the Joint Distribution Committee and the National Coordinating Committee Fund, Inc. that funds raised or received on a strictly 1939 fund-raising basis after January 1st, 1939 belong to the United Jewish Appeal. I just as definitely mean that we do not take into consideration any commitments made in 1938 for funds to be raised in 1939 for any of the agencies.


As I indicated in my memorandum on Atchison, I have not the slightest doubt that the Jewish National Fund representatives are undertaking to cover small communities throughout the country which they believe will not be reached by the United Jewish Appeal. I know that you personally cannot be a party to such an arrangement but as the representative of the United Palestine Appeal, including the Jewish National Fund, in the United Jewish Appeal, I can see no alternative except that you take cognizance of this fact, investigate it and represent officially the United Jewish Appeal, first, to ascertain what is being done in this direction and, secondly, to insist that all funds so raised to date or in the future be automatically remitted to the treasury of the United Jewish Appeal.

You and I cannot fool ourselves. If the Jewish National Fund is permitted to conduct fundraising campaigns in communities on the assumption that we will not cover them, then it is perfectly obvious that the United Jewish Appeal will not have an opportunity of raising an additional penny in this type of small community. Our field representatives are definitely charged this year to cover every community, regardless of size, and L, for one, will not permit our field men to go into any community under false pretenses.

This will acknowledge your memoranda of April 18th with respect to Fort Collins and of April 21st with respect to Hadassah and Youth Aliyah.

The Jewish National Fund, in accordance with the understanding constituting the United Jewish Appeal, is to engage in its traditional collections, but is not to undertake fund-raising compaigne as we understand such campaigns. On that basis we shall find, I am sure, complete readiness on the part of the Jewish National Fund to credit all the funds it raises through campaigns of the kind described to the United Jewish Appeal. I am taking this matter up with M. Mendel Fisher, Executive Director of the Jewish National Fund, and expect no difficulties in the settlement of this problem.

I have undertaken on several socasions, as has Dr. Silver, to discuss with Hadassah the question of cooperation with the United Jewish Appeal. I regret to say that the cooperation does not always take the form which we should like.

I note that you have requested the Joint Distribution Committee office to withhold funds intended for the United Jewish Appeal until the matter of the Jewish National Fund has been selfied. I believe that your action is unjustified.

Our correspondence and our field representatives cover a great deal of territory, but despite the hundreds and thousands of communities with which we are in almost constant contact reparts of Aleged duplication or overlapping by the Jewish National Fund are restricted to the two or three cases which you have brought to my attendion - all of them not totalling more than several hundred dollars. I agree with you, of course, that it is the principle and not so much the money involved that is important. On the busier hand I think you will agree that by and large the principle itself has been very rigidly respected by the Jewish National Fund. If there are cases where some ancident has occurred this will undoubtedly be remedied by the Jewish National Fund.

I can understand that you should be just as keenly concerned as I that all funds intended for the United Jewish Appeal, from whatever source, shall be brought into the treasury of the United Jewish Appeal.

If the only menos that have been written on the subject of alleged irregularities have come from you to me it is not because I have not had warrant to write such memos.

I might with even greater cogency point out that the effort of the Joint Distribution Committee to raise supplementary funds outside of the United Jewish Appeal is not strictly according to Hoyle. My understanding is that the Joint Distribution Committee is appealing to various Landsmannschaften and communities and individuals stating that for every dollar made available for a specific town in Europe to which

that individual or organization is affiliated the Joint Distribution Committee will make available a similar amount from its funds. In New York City particularly this appeal is having its effect, although the appeal itself is not restricted to Greater New York.

At least Hadassah tries as much as possible to do its campaigning before Welfare Fund drives; even when Hadassah is part of a Welfare Fund campaign it contributes manpower, or rather womanpower, to a far greater extent than probably any section of the community. I might with equal right ask you to see to it that Ort should eliminate itself from Welfare Fund drives because in the past the Joint Distribution Committee has made substantial aliotments to Ort, and Decause at present one of the leading officers of the Joint Distribution Committee is the chairman of Ort, which is asking ten percent of overseas allocations in 1939.

As serious as any of the other observations I have made is one with respect to the National Coordinating Committee, which is raising mandreds of thousands of dollars throughout the country outside the channels of the United Jewish Appeal. I do not have reference to the amounts that are being obtained locally for the maintenance of refugees. I have in mind the large sums that are being taken from local Welfare Funds for regional service activities that should actually be part of the functions of the National Coordinating Committee. As far as I can see all that the National Coordinating Committee does with the funds it receives from the United Jewish Appeal is to maintain offices in New York City to be administered by the Council of Jewish Women, and for other purposes. Wherever money for servicing or investigation is required outside of New York City funds outside the scope of the United Jewish Appeal are asked for and obtained.

I am confident that few of those who participated in the original negotiations for the United Jewish Appeal were awars of the fact that the National Coordinating Committee should have been called the New York Coordinating Committee, insofar as expenditure of funds is concerned. From correspondence we have had in New York and from complaints that have come to me personally outside of New York I find that the National Coordinating Committee is one of our greatest handicaps instead of one of our greatest assets not because its purposes are not most significant but because some of its accomplishments merit less than universal commendation.

Naturally, the expenditures or activities of the agencies comprised within the United Jewish Appeal are not the concern of the United Jewish Appeal except insofar as their various activities help or hinder fund-raising of the United Jewish Appeal. If there is one organization within the United Jewish Appeal which might be said to be engaged in separate fund-raising activities on a large scale it is the National Coordinating Committee.

If I have not written memos to you in the past on these various items it is because I think that both of us must recognize two fundamentals: (a) that the \$20,000,000 campaign of the United Jewish Appeal requires maximum energy on our part, that local campaigns are initiated and that maximum sums are provided to the United Jewish Appeal; and (b) that, inevitably, in a country as large as the United States and with a Jewish community as unorganized and complicated as ours, certain overlapping will occur and certain groups within the community will fail to recognize that all other fund-raising efforts should be subordinated to the three agencies embraced in the United Jewish Appeal. One of the great assets of the United Jewish Appeal has been to overcome some of the apathy of the American Jewish community to a large-scale campaign such as the one in which we are now engaged.

From the reports you have in your possession as to the progress of the campaign throughout the country you will agree, I think, that neither the enthusiasm nor the amounts being raised this year would have been at all possible without some unified effort such as is represented in the United Jewish Appeal. If things are not perfect it is not because you and I are not trying to make them so; but if they are not perfect it is more attributable to a generally imperfect world. I say this in all earnestness and not facetiousness, for otherwise we shall be engaged constantly in minor efforts when we should be concentrating on the major tasks.

My dear Mr. Montor:

I am wondering whether our Speakers' Bureau is not over-doing it somewhat in some communities -- sending too many people for too many meetings in one community. Your memorandum of April 20th to Mr. Coons

Mr. Coons has been kind enough to show me the memorandum dated April 20th which you addressed to him. I had not been aware that Mr. Coons had questioned the propriety of the communication which I sent to a number of key leaders with regard to the situation in Italy.

You raise a very important point. I disagree completely with your point of view. The United Jewish Appeal is a fund-raising body and, as such, must keep its clientele informed of all phases of the work with the aim in mind of stimulating larger contributions to the United Jewish Appeal. The object of the 1939 campaign of the United Jewish Appeal is to create that sense of urgency and of emergency which will impel all communities throughout the country to raise far larger sums for the agencies embraced within the United Jewish Appeal.

Apparently you are under the illusion that when I am in the office at 342 Madison Avenue I am thinking only of and working solely for Palestine or the United Palestine Appeal. Nothing could be further from the fact. As Executive Vice-Chairman of the United Jewish Appeal I regard myself as a spokesman and an advocate of the United Jewish Appeal for Refugees and Overseas Needs in all its phases. When I visit communities I do not speak selely or even in the main of Palestine but of all the causes and activities embraced within the United Jewish Appeal.

I know that you will appreciate the spirit in which I observe that unfortunately there has not yet been a sufficient realization by all factors concerned of the paramount necessity of making the United Jewish Appeal the important institution in 1939 instead of any of the participating agencies.

Conducting a campaign is a pure act of salesmanship and, as such, requires all the devices, dignified and honest, of effective salesmanship.

To say that the United Jewish Appeal cannot talk about any of the work which the United Jewish Appeal helps to further is to make the conduct of the caspaign impossible. There are certain relations which I have established with leaders throughout the country. The strengthening of these relations means a strengthening of the interests of the campaign. It is my view that sending these people material, whether it be on Palestine, on Italy, on England or America is part of our general program to create wider interest in and broader support of the United Jewish Appeal from which the Joint Distribution Committee, the United Palestine Appeal and the National Coordinating Committee Fund, Inc. benefit.

Until such time as superior officers of the United Jewish Appeal for Refugees and Overseas Needs decide otherwise, I shall continue to believe that the United Jewish Appeal is the agency raising funds for the furtherance of three wajor purposes; relief and rehabilitation for the Jews of and in Europe, settlement in Palestine and adjustment of refugees in the United States.

Subject: The recent communication from Mr. Montor enclosing a memorandum on Italy.

I have read with close interest your memorandum to Mr. Montor with respect to his recent letter sending out a statement by Mr. Roth, concerning the situation of the Jews in Italy. I note also that Mr. Montor advises the community leaders that he can secure similar monographs on other Jewish communities.

I deem it quite inadvisable for Mr. Montor to do this. The J.D.C. has not only been closely in touch with the Jewish communities in Italy: it has extended direct assistance to the committees there; it has stimulated the establishment of the necessary organizations; it is giving fair amounts for essential work there. Moreover, very largely through the personal intercession and discussions of representatives of our European Office with important American personalities, who took up this whole problem in authoritative channels, the deportation order for aliens was, for the time being, suspended. I cite these facts because, while they are known to the officers of the Joint Distribution Committee, they are not within the knowledge of Mr. Montor. They could scarcely be. In similar fashion, the J.D.C., directly or through committees, is in touch with all of the Jewish communities in Europe to which refugees have fled.

We are in the process of working out the establishment of a Jewish Central Committee in Hungary. We are negotiating with respect to appropriate committees in Roumania. We are planning new types of organizational structure in Poland. We are closer to the requirements within Germany itself and the countries of refuge on the Continent, as well as in South America, than is any other agency. Obviously, if any well-founded information is to be sent to Jewish leaders throughout this country with respect to the problems in Eastern and Central Europe with which we have been dealing, and in which we are now definitely engaged, it should be within the province of the Joint Distribution Committee to send out any such appropriate memoranda. It has been our job and continues to be our job.

Moreover, for the United Jewish Appeal to send out to the people throughout this country a memorandum addressed by a distinguished writer in England to the Council for German Jewry raises the question naturally as to where the J.D.C. comes into the situation. The British Jews, through the Council, have given much less support and, consequently, less emphasis to the requirements on the Continent than J.D.C. has. In fact, they have looked to J.D.C. to do this.

We have, in our office, material gained from very many sources with respect to the problems in Palestine. As a matter of comity between our respective organizations, we would not undertake to send out to the communities memoranda with respect to the work of reconstruction in Palestine or with respect to the needs there. We feel that that is a matter properly within the province of the United Palestine Appeal or the Jewish Agency.

It is quite obvious that there are a great many questions affecting not only procedure, but policy, in relation to the actual service rendered in foreign countries that can best be explained by the agencies involved in the active work. If the program of assistance in Palestine is to be presented in any aspect, it is only proper that the United Palestine Appeal should assume the responsibility for the expose in question. If, on the other hand, the problems of the Jewish communities in Eastern and Central Europe are to be described, it would seem highly desirable that the J.D.C., which, after all is in closer touch with all of the situations in these countries, should be the agency to present the necessary explanations.

In no event should the United Jewish Appeal, as a fund-raising body, in my opinion, undertake to send out material which, directly or eyen indirectly, impinges upon the actual program of activities and problems of the constituent bodies without consulting them. Thus, I cannot conceive that the United Jewish Appeal would undertake to send out an article on the refugee situation in the United States without being assured by the National Coordinating Committee Fund that from the viewpoint of its policy and activity, the sending out of such an article is desirable, and that the National Coordinating Committee itself did not have in mind issuing such a statement or sending out such a memorandum to no matter how select or restricted a list.

I can understand Mr. Montor's desire to find material that will prove of interest to the communities, but I am quite clear that we shall have to take the position with the United Jewish Appeal that it should not send out memoranda of this kind. The J.D.C. is still in business. In the field of its activities it would be undesirable to permit anything to be injected which was not contemplated at all in arriving at the agreement with respect to the organization of the fund-raising machinery. 
The enclosed letter from Mr. Borinstein indicates that the Indianapolis Campaign has gone over the top.

SUBJECT: Hadassah

The letter which Mr. Montor addressed to Mrs. David de Sola Pool on March 17th is a lovely letter, but the fact remains that Hadassah is not cooperating. They raised \$54,000 here in advance of the Welfare Fund campaign. They take the cream off wherever they can. As Mrs. Epstein said in a speech here, they must now enlist the aid of men because of the greater need. "Hadassah tends to its business and other agencies should tend to theirs." (almost her words.) Mrs. Epstein was quite willing (in her speech) that Hadassah women should also work in Welfare Fund campaigns (after their effort). Swell that Jewish women should be allowed to do this in their home communities especially after they have drained off the money from women's circles and used up all their own energy and enthusiasm in getting it.

It's a little early to thank Hadassah for their cooperation to the United Jewish Appeal.
