Dear Dr. Silver:

I arrived yesterday from Europe and am just beginning, through Steinglass and Blitz, to catch up on the proceedings during my departure.

Whatever may have been the impression created by newspaper reports of the Antwerp Conference I found it most stimulating and informative. Even though I keep in daily contact with occurrences in Palestine I had no sense of the fullness of the picture until I heard a number of Palestinians at Antwerp describe the events and the prospects. Few speeches on Palestine that I have heard have made on me the impression created by Baratz, who, in an address of one and three-quarter hours, spoken in simple, unadorned phrases, gave a comprehensive account of what the present disturbances mean for the life of the Yishuv and for the revelation of character on the part of the Chalutzim. Baratz spoke in Yiddish and proved so dramatic, though restrained, that even Dr. Weizmann was seen to be emotionally aroused. Later Dr. Weizmann said that even though he had personally experienced the past twenty-eight months in Palestine he had not comprehended the picture in its pathos and in its heroism as he received it from Baratz.

The purpose of the Conference was not to create publicity, even though I understand the press carried rather substantial stories. As a matter of fact, the press stories could not pick up many of the things that were said because they were uttered in closed session. The principal aim was to give campaign workers in various countries an idea of what was occurring in Palestine so that they might return to their lands with an intensified interest in obtaining larger funds.

Certainly the Conference had such an impression on me, for I realize how inadequate are the sums America has been raising. The situation in Palestine is one for increasing concern. The Yishuv is summoning all its resources, but it is not able to cope adequately with the needs for defence. The breakdown of the police system in Palestine, the unwillingness

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of the Government to apply the drastic military measures that seem warranted and the spread of terrorist activity have made it essential for Palestine Jewry to strengthen its security position on a far larger scale. The burden rests on the Jewish Agency.

Several appeals had been made to Kaplan to help exploit the Conference by proposing figures of money that could be used next year that would win press attention. However, Kaplan would not be swerved from his original idea of presenting figures that accurately reflected the Jewish Agency's proposed budget for the year 1938-1939. The budget of the Jewish Agency is actually designed for five million dollars, which is the largest amount the Executive has counted upon for more than a decade. A very important part of this amount is intended for security and for help to economic enterprises, which have been jeopardized. Great care is being taken to avoid the provision of social relief as we understand it, or the creation of a dole system. Whatever money the Agency has available for such purposes is being used in the direction of creating public works that would absorb the unemployed, even though they might not get more than five or ten hours of work a week.

If ever an emergency existed in Palestine it is there today, not merely on the political side but on the purely physical side, referring to the needs of defence and the needs of actual sustenance.

The question is how can we enlarge the support which the Executive expects from America. A private meeting was called by Dr. Weizmann, which was attended by all the members of the Executive present at Antwerp and Messrs. Lipsky, Goldman and myself. It fell to me to describe the United Palestine Appeal situation in America with particular reference to the agreement with the Joint Distribution Committee and the relationship to the Welfare Funds. I also took occasion to point to the competetive activities of the Poale Zion and to the multiplicity of campaigns, authorized and unauthorized, that were flooding America on behalf of some phase of Palestine activity. I cannot say that there is any recordable outcome of that session, which Weizmann addressed with a most stirring plea for more cooperation between the groups in America and for some activity that would make possible larger income than the United Palestine Appeal had received in 1938 or that for the moment seemed possible for 1939.

Dr. Weizmann's plans are altogether indefinite. There is certainly no likelihood that he will be here either in September or October. It is expected that the report of the Woodhead Commission will be out the first week of October or certainly during October. From all the rumors that I could compile in London and elsewhere it seems very clear that there is a widespread expectation among those who ought to know that the Woodhead Commission report will be very disappointing and that in all likelihood the Executive may be placed in the position of having to reject it at once. What the judicial procedure is in the event of a blatantly unsatisfactory report I cannot say. However, Dr. Weizmann and the others are hoping for an opportunity to discuss with the Government the announcement of policy in Palestine before the Commission's report is put into the hands of the public and presented to Parliament for action.

There is another consideration which beclouds Dr. Weizmann's plans, and that is the prospect of war. In Europe it is generally taken for granted that war is inevitable. This would obviously have repercussions on Palestine far graver than the issuance of a partition commission report. What is really giving concern to Dr. Weizmann and the Executive is the gathering of larger sums of money that would be required for more extended defence purposes should war occur.

Dr. Weizmann confesses himself really unaware of the final contents of the Woodhead Commission report, even though it can be seen from his mood that he is most unhappy. If a report should be forthcoming which would be along the lines which the Partitionists have been advocating it is quite possible that Dr. Weizmann may come to the United States in November or perhaps early in December. But certainly it would be difficult to construct any plans on that basis. I mentioned the possibility of Lady Reading coming over. If we can agree upon her a formal invitation would have to be issued to her, but what was suggested in Antwerp was that Dr. Weizmann and Lady Reading might come together with each of them seeing different groups of people. Dr. Weizmann could see no point in his coming to America unless he could spend a great deal of time with individuals from whom large sums might be forthcoming.

I presented to Dr. Weizmann the plan you had in mind with regard to a conference with leaders of the Council of Federations and Welfare Funds and of individual Welfare Funds for the purpose of persuading them (1) to permit an emergency campaign of some twenty-five million dollars that would be outside the limits of the Welfare Fund budgets and/or (2) to set aside for overseas purposes a more generous percentage than has been forthcoming this year. Dr. Weizmann was interested in the plan, particularly since it emanated from you, although he was somewhat taken aback by the idea of placing Palestine within the framework of an agenda related to the position of Jews throughout the world. I believe that Dr. Weizmann would lend himself to any program that is formulated here if he is able to come. I think that Dr. Weizmann and the other members of the Executive are pretty well convinced by now that the prospect of getting large sums for the establishment of the Jewish State is not too bright.

It seems to me that there are three major items which ought to be decided upon at this time. These are: (1) Emergency fund, (2) Agreements with the Joint Distribution Committee for 1939, and (3) Pressure upon the Welfare Funds for new allotments in 1939.

As you can appreciate, I was the one who constantly countered their plea for an emergency fund with reference to our agreements with the Joint Distribution Committee and the Welfare Funds. Nevertheless, I could not help feeling conscious, before and now, of the need of some special action which would take into account the fact that Jews are dying in Palestine not because of a temporary disturbance but because of a fundamental struggle whose outcome will determine the future of Palestine far more decisively than the contents of any partition commission report. There are many Jews dying in Palestine today through the fault of Jews because the defences are inadequate, because the Jewish Agency does not have the funds to enable thousands of additional supernumeraries to guard the colonies, because certain outlying settlements are isolated due to the failure of the Agency to link these colonies with strategic roads.

In previous times, as in 1929 for example, there would have been no question of an emergency fund and people everywhere would have responded. From the few things I have been able to hear in the last day about the Morning Journal campaign it is evident that many cities have been expecting to be called upon for emergency fund activities and have felt that there had been a dereliction of duty on the part of the Zionist authorities that no appeal for funds was made to them.

on the part of the Zionist authorities that no appeal for funds was made to them. But I always keep in mind the necessity of adhering to the agreements. I am forced to ask myself, however, whether we are being fair to ourselves and to the Jews in Palestine, so many of whom are losing their lives, in adhering to an agreement merely for the sake of an agreement when perhaps a discussion of the true character of the situation might persuade all the parties to the agreement to abandon it.

There is another issue tied up to the question of an emergency fund, and that is the nature of our propaganda. For the last year we have been talking of the creation of wider opportunities for immigration. That is still the basis of every plea to the Government. But the really important situation requiring attention, to which little public reference has been made, is the protection of the 4,500,000 Jews now in Palestine.

What do you think of the wisdom of discussing with the Joint Distribution Committee (solely because we are bound to the latter by an agreement) a Palestine Emergency Fund Campaign on a national scale, As I understand it, a great many of the Welfare Funds have in their treasuries either reserves or unallocated funds to be used for emergency purposes. Perhaps a large part of these unallocated funds might be made available to the United Palestine Appeal if the Emergency Fund appeal were launched.

Even though we can secure no definite promise from Dr. Weizmann as to his visit to America, I think that your idea of speaking or writing to Rabbi Jonah B. Wise about the 1939 agreement is most important. If we could conduct the negotiations now and finish the agreement by October or at the latest early November, the field would be clear for the early launching of 1939 campaigns. I feel sure that the Joint Distribution Committee leaders could not remain unmindful of the defence needs of Palestine if it were this aspect that were stressed rather than the immigration phase.

One of the important elements of an early discussion with the Joint Distribution Committee is the ratio of allocations by the Welfare Funds. The figures are showing conclusively that the percentages are thoroughly immoral from the point of view of the use made of the United Palestine Appeal and Joint Distribution Committee appeals and the amounts allocated in turn to these bodies.

If an early discussion could be held with the Joint Distribution Committee it might be possible to convene a meeting either in the East or the Middle West in October or early November of the principal officers and Executive Directors of the Welfare Funds of the country to whom Joint Distribution Committee and United Palestine Appeal spokesmen could describe their individual needs, and before whom there might well be placed an ultimatum that unless decent percentages were decided upon the two great overseas agencies would have to break away from the Welfare Funds and have separate campaigns. I feel sure that if combined action on the part of

Dr. Abba Hillel Silver -5m September 14, 1938 the Joint Distribution Committee and United Palestine Appeal were noted there would be no need for such an ultimatum, for there would be a spontaneous acceptance of the principle. If Welfare Funds could be persuaded to give a minimum of sixty to sixty-five percent or perhaps seventy percent in 1939 the difference to the United Palestine Appeal and Joint Distribution Committee would amount to hundreds of thousands of dollars and probably reaching over the million mark. Knowing how much delay is involved in convening such meetings and in the follow-up discussions, I underline the necessity of initiating them at the earliest possible moment. I should like the opportunity, at an occasion as early as you think necessary, to discuss these matters personally, for correspondence is sometimes inconclusive and unsatisfactory. Will you be coming to New York in the near future or do you wish me to go to Cleveland? As soon as I have had an opportunity to go through the correspondence and catch up with campaign details I shall write you on other matters. With kindest regards to Mrs. Silver, I am Cordially yours, Executive Director HM: EH P. S. Dr. Wise insisted that I come to the meeting of the Executive of the Zionist Organization of America tonight. I do not know whether I shall be called upon for a statement in connection with the Keren Hayesod Conference in Antwerp. In any event I am wondering about the advisability of discussing an emergency fund drive.



Attached hereto is a copy of a cable which came from Jerusalem today in code. Attached hereto is a copy of the transcription of the code.

It is evident from this cable that Palestine is deeply worried by the prospect of war and by the increasing scope of Arab terrorism that is making unusually heavy demands for additional supernumeraries and protective measures.

Unfortunately, there is no large sum of money on hand at the present time. I believe, however, that through special telephone messages and telegrams to key people we might be able to get a sum of at least \$100,000 in a week's time for remittance to Palestine. If I may have your approval for this procedure I will communicate with the key men at once.

I am delighted to learn from your letter of September 8th that you expect to be in New York to attend the Flan and Scope meeting of the Joint Distribution Committee, and that I shall at that time have an opportunity to spend some time with you. Flease plan on having dinner with me, at least.

This satisfaction is increased by the knowledge that every additional penny that is to be made available by Milwankse for the United Palestine Appeal is urgently required in Palestine for the fundamental needs of security and for extending the foundations that immigration should not be stopped at this time.

Then the Milwanies Jewish Welfare Fund was organised, the participating agencies and the contributors were notified that certain institutions were to be benefitted. The appeal was made on that basis, and I do not think it is unwarranted to say that the generosity of response on the party of the community was metivated by a knowledge of the meeds of the Joint Distribution Committee and the United Palestine Appeal.

In the last few months, there has been great pressure brought to bear from Palestine for the initiation of a special compaign in the United States, based on the emergency requirements arising out of the disturbances. Surely, mone of us in the picture of 450,000 Jews fighting heroically and brawnly not for thesis and its possessions, but solely for the right of Jews outside of Palestine to settle in the Jewish Komeland.

But despite this deep sympathy that the officers of the United Palestine Appeal feel, they regard as sacred the agreement into which they have entered with both the Joint Distribution Com

mittee and the Welfare Funds to protect the communities from a variety of supplementary campaigns, even though in this particular case the emergency appeal is so obviously warranted. If, then, Nilwankee's campaign has been sufficiently successful to permit an alletment to the United Palestine Appeal larger than the amount originally contemplated, it would be unfair to the Jewish community in Palestine if we should agree to release any part of this sum. You report that the original quota of \$77,500 was exceeded by about \$10,000. You add, however, that in the event of shrinkage, the surplus may be wiped out. We may, then, be dealing with a purely theoretical problem.

The purpose of a Welfare Fund is to save the community leadership from excessive burdens, and the community as a whole from overlapping campaigns, but Welfare Funds would fail of their purpose if, after insugurating campaigns for specified institutions, they were subsequently to include other causes solely to avoid additional appeals.

Committee have suffered to a very grave extent during the past year because of the unfortunate use made of the appeals inherent in their causes by various communities. I am glad to may that this accusation cannot be directed at Nilwaukee, but in a great many other cities mortgages on institutions, maintenance of local hespitals and similar projects have been paid for with the money that contributors thought was going in entirety, or at least in greatest part, to the Joint Distribution Committee and the United Palestine Appeal.

The Milwaukse Welfare Fund, like every Welfare Fund in the country, is actually the trustee for such institutions as the United Palestine Appeal. I am sure that you will agree that in your capacity as trustee for funds contributed to the United Palestine Appeal, you could not see your way clear to assigning any part of that income to any other institution.

Dear Henry:

A rather complicated situation has arisen in Milwaukee. By reason of request for funds on behalf of the American committee for Jewish Palestine Participation at the New York World's Fair and also on behalf of the National Coordinating Committee Fund, both of these worthy organizations have appealed to our Welfare Fund for participation for funds.

However, in the recent Campaign, which was Milwaukee's first organized attempt toward unifications no reserve was naturally set up. As a matter of fact, the overwhelming majority of the active organizers of the Campaign were frightfully skeptical that the quota set was way beyond expectation.

The results, however, justified the conclusion of the more optimistic because we exceeded the quota in excess of \$9,000; the original Finance and Budget Committee entered into an arrangement with the participating agencies to pregrate any increase over the original allocation to the said agencies to them so that if we should succeed in collecting in the full amount of pledges, we will have approximately \$9,000 in excess of allocations for distribution. You, of course, realistically know this entire sum will not be realized so that the excess for distribution is of an unknown and doubtful amount.

By reason of the commitments to the participating agencies, however, our Executive Committee deems it impossible to consider the appeals of both the American Committee for Jewish Palestine Participation and the National Coordinating Committee Fund.

However, knowing that the United Palestine Appeal is sympathetic to both of these organizations and co-operative with their plans and purposes. I have been requested to submit for consideration the release on the part of the United Palestine Appeal of such funds it might receive in excess of the \$25,000 allocated to its and accepted by it as it's share out of the Milwaukee campaign.

The United Palestine Appeal's financial interest in the excess is roughly one-third of the amount to be obtained in excess of the original quota of \$77,500 and as indicated above, such excess may be of a modest amount. You appreciate that with losses and defaults

in collections and other expenses, the surplus may easily be wiped out.

We feel, however, that if the United Palestine Appeal is willing to waive it's interest to the possible excess over \$25,000 and in like manner the American Joint Distribution Committee will also consent to a similar acceptance, there may possibly be created some fund available for distribution to the two agencies herein mentioned and who are justifiedly entitled to support and consideration.

This letter is written you in a spirit of frankness on the part of the Executive Committee and it's desire to meet it's legal obligations, but also mindful of increasing humanitarian necessities.

May I not request your presenting this matter to the proper Budget Committee and advise me at an early date so that in turn I can possibly give the other organizations a favorable response.

The writer is contemplating being in New York to attend the Plan and Brops Meeting of the Joint Distribution Committee and is looking forward to seeing you.

Dear Dr. Silver:

I have had some difficulty in picking up the threads in regard to the campaign of the Jewish Morning Journal, which to date has received approximately \$12,000 in cash with the balance reported in the papers comprising names and amounts of those who had previously contributed to the United Palestine Appeal. The purpose of the latter action was to bolster up the campaign and to create a wider interest among prospective contributors.

I am informed that there was a recent meeting of the Executive of the Zionist Organization of America at which you expressed the view that the special activity of the Jewish Morning Journal should be cancelled quickly. I shall appreciate knowing from you whether this is an accurate report.

In view of the fact that little has been done to cooperate with the Jewish Morning Journal to stimulate its readers in New York City I think that the amount received thus far, though small, represents a welcome addition to the receipts in New York City. The daily publicity in the Morning Journal has been valuable not only because of the money that has already been received but because of the activity initiated among synagogues and Jewish organizations, which have undertaken collections solely because of the desire to respond to the Jewish Morning Journal. Undoubtedly by the time of the High Holidays there will have been an even better response than there has been up to this time.

I know that there has been a great deal of criticism of the undertaking by the Morning Journal of this emergency activity, but I have noted that the bulk of the criticism here comes from those Zionists who have not cooperated particularly with the United Palestine Appeal even in its regular campaign. If you had an opportunity to read the hundreds of letters that come in with the small checks you would see that the sums are contributed by people who were never approached and never have an opportunity to give their mite to the United Palestine Appeal.

After all, the Morning Journal campaign costs us nothing and is providing an amount larger than what is raised in one of the populous Jewish sections of New York City.

For my guidance in the future would you let me know what attitude you have taken toward the continuation and character of the Morning Journal activity.

In view of the problem raised in your telegram of September 11th affecting the interests of the United Palestine Appeal, I am undertaking to state the position of the United Palestine Appeal although I have forwarded the telegram to Mr. Szold, who is one of the officers of the Vand Bitachen Committee.

The rumor that pr. Weismann and Mr. Ben Gurion were on their way to the United States is unfounded. Should Dr. Weismann come to the United States this year or early next year it will be for the purpose of stimulating the fond-raising efforts of the United Palestine Appeal which, on behalf of the Jewish Agency and the Keren Kayemeth, carries the supreme responsibility for raising adequate sums in the United States for the security as well as the upbailding program in Palestine.

The United Palestine Appeal is, of course, anxious that a maximum of money be made available for Palestine from St. Paul, but we are cognizant of the fact that the United Palestine Appeal entered into an obligation with the St. Paul Welfare Fund not to conduct supplementary compaign activity. We intend to adhere to this ment fully. If there are a few individuals in St. Paul who are sufficiently aroused by the situation in Palestine to wish to contribute additional amounts directly to the Vaad Bitachon there is nothing that the United Palestine Appeal could permit itself to say in opposition to such generosity. But, on the other hand, it ought to be distinctly understood that this is not part of the fund-raising work of the United Palestine Appeal and that the United Palestine Appeal would consider it a serious matter if any supplementary fund-raising activity were to affect adversely the relations of the United Palestine Appeal with the Welfare Fund and the allocation of the Welfare Fund either in 1938 or 1939.

But in any event we would not encourage any action which would make it appear that the United Palestine Appeal has in any way breached the agreement into which it entered with the Welfare Fund of St. Paul. I believe that the cable from Rabbi Meyer Berlin, dated September 6th and addressed to you, was intended to make sure that the Mizrachi obtained from the United Palestine Appeal in 1939 at least as much as in 1938, and does not really have as its objective an increased amount.

I do not think that it honestly can be said that the Mizrachi Organiza-tion has added strength to the United Palestine Appeal in the year 1938. But that is a matter for the officers of the United Palestine Appeal to decide since it is a political and philesophical subject and not related directly to fund-raising.

I don't see on what basis the Migrachi can claim additional amounts in 1938 for its work when according to an analysis by the Treasury Department of the Jewish Agency Executive, the largest part of the amount received by the Misrachi from the United Palestine Appeal this year has been devoted to Mizrachi organizational purposes in Palestine and to the maintenance of the Mizracht party paper, "Hatzofeh".

I attacheherewith a copy of a report of the Mizrachi Palestine Fund and an analysis of the figures by the Treasury Department of the Jewish Agency. This analysis shows that out of a total of over \$19,000 spent by Mizrachi during the past year, a sum of only \$5,499 was used for those purposes in Palestine which the United Palestine Appeal had in mind when it increased from \$30,000 to \$60,000 the grant to the Mizrachi Palestine Fund.

The Executive of the Jewish Agency has made efforts to get more thorough reports from the Mizrachi Palestine Fund, but has not been altogether successful. But at Antwerp I learned that certainly the bulk of the money received from America is being used for purely Mizrachi organizational purposes.

If I may be permitted to express an opinion on such matters I might say that contributors to the United Palestine Appeal would not be made too happy to learn that Misrachi party purposes are being served through a subsidy which is designed to help maintain and create educational and agricultural institutions in Palestine supplementary to those being financed by the national institutions.

There is supposed to be an agreement between the Mizrachi and the United Palestine Appeal whereby the Mizrachi throws all its forces into the United Palestine Appeal campaign. In New York City, that section where the bulk of Mizrachi adherents is concentrated gave such a demonstration that you were compelled to leave a banquet in your honor with a rebuke to all the officers involved.

That the Mizrachi forces are not fully aligned with the United Palestine Appeal is proved by the fact that during the past year the sum of \$40,000 was remitted to Palestine by the Mizrachi Women's Organization for the purpose of building a Mizrachi Pioneer Women's House in Tel Aviv.

I give you these figures inasmuch as you indicate that Mr. Gellman will discuss with you the necessity of enlarged funds for Mizrachi.

Dear Dr. Goldstein: Attached herewith is a copy of a cable which has come from Elieser Kaplan, Treasurer of the Jewish Agency. I am sending you a copy of the original cable which was in code, as well as the transcription. In view of the fact that the cable was sent in code, it is apparent that what is uppermost in the mind of Kaplan is the forwarding of money immediately for defense and not merely for the ordinary program, In view of this situation and of this special need which I think all of us consider paramount, would you on behalf of the National Fund be willing to agree that the funds immediately to be received during the next few weeks should be set aside exclusively for the Emergency Fund and that the shares of the Keren Mayesod and of the Keren Reyemeth come out of funds to be received thereafter? I realize that this is an unprecedented suggestion but take the liberty of making it in view of events in Palestine. I have breached the matter to Dr. Silver who asked that I sommicate with you in regard to this subject. There is very little money in the Treasury at this moment but I am sending out special appeals by telegram to key cities in the hope of obtaining a large sum from outstanding 1938 accounts. But if we want to answer the plea of Kaplan in the most substantial way possible, it will be necessary to negotiate a loan at the National City Bank for an amount of \$100,000 or \$150,000, as may be agreed upon. Your New Year message is being sent to members of the National Council in the form of a letter since in this way it assumes the most personal and direct character.

The campaign in The Day for the Poale-Zion has been discontinued.

I received a telephone call today from the Director of the Springfield, Mass. Welfare Fund who informed me that the New England Zionist Region had embarked upon an Emergency Fund drive and had proposed to circularize every member of the community of Springfield.

Dr. Cohen, the Director, expressed alarm over the effect this would have on the Welfare Fund and asked the view of the United Palestine Appeal. I informed him unequivocally that the United Palestine Appeal is opposed to such an Emergency Fund drive on this wholesale basis.

It is apparent that this action by the New England Zionist Region results from the initiative taken and the resolution adopted recently by the Zionist Organization of America calling upon individual Zionist members to make a contribution to an Emergency Fund. It is obvious that the buck is being passed.

Last night there was an impressive dinner at the Commodore Hotel for Dr. Goldman. He delivered a very stirring message on Palestine and the sacrifices being made by the Yishuv in this period. These was an appeal for funds by Dr. Wise. \$15,000 was raised for the Zionist Organization of America.

Dear Dr. Silver:

While in Antwerp Dr. Weizmann made a special appeal through me to you. It seems that Dr. Wise, among other American delegates, told Dr. Weizmann at the last Zionist Congress, I believe, that they would make available from the United States the sum of \$5,000 toward the budget of the Sieff Institute, which Dr. Weizmann heads. The Institute has engaged some thirteen scholars from Germany and is, as we know, doing a splendid piece of work in the field of chemical research.

Dr. Weizmann feels that America has "let him down". I had known nothing of the promise or the intention with regard to this \$5,000 until Dr. Weizmann spoke to me in Antwerp. He urges that the United Palestine Appeal adopt this as part of its budgetary commitment for the year 1938 and asked that you use your utmost influence to persuade all parties concerned that this expenditure in Palestine should be considered as within the purposes of the United Palestine Appeal.

Dear Dr. Silver:

In view of a spirit of confusion and, I may say, pessimism that is apparent in various circles even among Zionists with regard to the situation in Palestine, I think it is more than ever important that we should have a series of conferences throughout the country for the benefit of local representatives and campaign workers.

There is to be a regular meeting of the Seaboard section on November 20th. We are tentatively planning a New York State Conference on November 13th. There is supposed to be a conference for the Pacific Coast around November 23rd. Philadelphia would be the centre of a conference early in December.

It is particularly important to have a conference in Texas. I understand that your willingness to come to Texas for such a conference is dependent on the holding of campaigns in that area at the same time. I am checking on this phase with Braunstein but in view of the inadequate attention which the United Palestine Appeal has given to Texas in the past, I feel that a successful conference regardless of other campaigns will be most important to bring back to us and to strengthen our friends in the various communities. Joe Weingarten, who is our strength in Houston, feels that a conference would not be valuable unless you could be present to give it color and meaning.

Would you wish to attend every one of the conferences that is being kept in mind or are there any special dates which you could give for at least several of these conferences?

In considering the question of relations with the Joint Distribution Committee and with the Welfare Funds for

the year 1939, do you believe that there is value in convening a meeting in some centrally-located part of the United States with the Chairman of every Zionist District in the country for the sole purpose of explaining the situation in Palestine and of receiving from these Zionist representatives support which could be used in the conversations with the Joint Distribution Committee? At the same time there would be an impression registered upon the Zionists that they have a responsibility: first, for protecting the ratio as between the Joint Distribution Committee and the United Palestine Appeal and, secondly, to assure a maximum percentage in the Welfare Funds for overseas purposes.

It was unfortunate that at the Detroit Zionist Convention the time devoted to the United Palestine Appeal was very restricted. Is it not vital, through a one or two day meeting specifically with Zionists, to stress the United Palestine Appeal needs for 1939?

A fact that we have to take into consideration now and for the 1939 campaign is the increasing emphasis on refugee needs in the United States.

The Joint Distribution Committee through the Coordinating Committee, which is to public appearance an entirely separate organization, has been conducting a series of effective meetings in various sections of the country stressing the obligation of American Jews toward refugees. The main point made is to the effect that the Jewish position in America will be jeopardized if by any mischance German refugees should become a charge upon the communities which they enter. Naturally, this is an effective point and results in the adoption of substantial obligations by representatives attending such conferences.

I attach herewith memoranda referring to this point from Pittsburgh and Charlotte, North Carolina.

I am aware of course of the tendency of those of us engaged in a specific type of campaign to enlarge upon the difficulties. However, there is undoubtedly a good deal that must be taken into consideration in these memoranda.

At a meeting in Pittsburgh today, attended by 280 people, of whom 183 were from communities in the Tri-State Area outside of Pittsburgh, there was organized the Tri-State Refugee Committee whose purpose is to re-settle refugees in the various communities in the region.

If you wish, I shall send you the names of all officers within the next few days.

at the instance of the Pittsburgh leaders—to the effect that 10% of funds raised in the region for overseas causes shall be allocated to refugee resettlement work. It is very essential that a definite position be taken on this matter as promptly as possible by UPA and/or JDC, else the fall campaigns here may be rather seriously affected. I shall try to get the exact text of the resolution for your guidance.

Incidentally the meeting today was addressed by Dr. I. Edwin Goldwasser, Samuel C. Kohs and William Thalheimer of Richmond, Va.

Thalheimer of Richmond, Va. this refugee work by local communities has come to plague me and may seriously interfere with regular campaigns I am lining up. 3 - In a number of instances although the communities do very little to aid German refugees who entered this country, the leaders in some towns use it as an alibi not to raise funds for neither the UPA or JDC. If this is permitted to go unchecked, this attitude will play havoc with UPA activities. 4 - I attach herewith a clipping from a Charlotte, N.C. paper on a meeting held in High Point, convened at the instigation of Wm. Thalheimer. I intend to have an intimate chat with Thalheimer when I visit Richmond this week-end and will advise you of our conversation. 5 - It seems to me a concerted move should be made jointly by the UPA and JDC to counteract to some extent this rapidly developing movement which on a/c of the aid that several hundred refugees may receive in America, the bigger task of giving succor to millions abroad may be overshadowed by such committees as Thalheimer and others are organizing. The Atlantic City Zionist District has decided that the United Palestine Appeal conduct a separate campaign for 1939 and break away from the Atlantic City Federation. The situation in Atlantic City has been bad for quite a number of years, as is indicated by the allocations to the United Palestine Appeal. In 1936 we were alloted \$3,000 but only \$2,000 of this amount was paid, the balance was used for local purposes. In 1937 we were awarded \$3,000 and this was paid. For 1938 the sum is \$4,000, of which more than half is still to be paid.

Breaking away from a federation represents a serious step particularly if there is a fear that the local Zionist district may not be able to bear the brunt of a campaign. There was a meeting of the officers of the Atlantic City Federation last Wednesday. I proposed to Mintz and the Atlantic City Zionist district officers that they do not discuss breaking away from the federation if the federation promises to allot for 1939 a sum of not less than \$7,500 to \$10,000. This apparently the federation has refused to do, since all money for local purposes is raised through a campaign in which the Joint Distribution Committee and the United Palestine Appeal are heralded as the chief beneficiaries.

The district feels that it should not be a combined drive but one exclusively for the United Palestine Appeal on the ground that the Joint Distribution Committee has nothing to offer in the way of leadership or large prospective contributors whom the United Palestine Appeal itself could not acquire.

The Chairman of the district is Mr. Joseph Halbert, an unusually aggressive individual. Mr. Halbert is an official of the Internal Revenue Department in Atlantic City.

In view of the determination of the district to break away from the federation, it would be difficult for us in any event to resist their pressure. Mintz, who has been ordered to keep a close watch on the situation, feels certain that the United Palestine Appeal can get by itself a minimum of \$7,500. It is also believed that a successful campaign now will strengthen

the United Palestine Appeal interest in the future.

The question that remains is whether we shall give adequate publicity to the action of the district for this will represent the first time that the United Palestine Appeal has broken away from a Welfare Fund because the Welfare Fund has treated the United Palestine Appeal inadequately. Perhaps this might be used as a test case to make emphatic to the Welfare FundSour protest against unfair treatment we have been receiving from a number of communities in the past year.

What are your views in the matter?

Memo to Samuel Blitz From Bernard Stone

Subject: Los Angeles, California

The attached was the report of the Allocations Committee, which was submitted to the meeting of the Board of Directors of the Los Angeles Jewish Community Council, at its gathering on Tuesday, September 13th.

The report was adopted with the following modifications or additions: -

1. It was decided that the first \$3600 received in excess of \$326,144, would be divided between the JDC and the UPA in the proportion of 60-40 percent.

This happened because of the strong criticism against the proposals of the Allocation Committee on the following grounds: -

A. That the 12 months rule from July 1st to July 1st was not fair.

B. That the 9 percent shrinkage is excessive.

C. That the unexpended balance from last year should have been added to the \$358,400 subscribed in the current year, before tabulation.

D. That the amount of \$7,200 should have appeared as a beneficiary, instead of as a preliminary deduction - for administration costs.

The members of the Zionist groups who are on the Board of Directors of the Jewish Community Council, were divided amongst themselves as to the proper course to pursue. The three divisions are: -

The Peace at-any-price men.
The growl-but-don't-bite men.
The fight-to-the-finish men.

Mr. Charles Brown is the representative of the latter party; Herman A. Bachrack is the "Peace-at-any-price" man; and Theodore Strimling is the "Growl-but-don't-bite" man.

All parties are agreed that there is going to be a determined effort on the part of the assimilationists who are on the Council - consisting of the very influential Judge Harry A. Hollzer; treasurer, Walter S. Hilborn; Joseph P. Loeb; Dr. George Piness, and their followers - to reduce us substantially, while leaving the position of the JDC intact; and as a first step to that end, they want to defeat the 50% rule which was adopted in 1937 and enforced in 1938.

The annual meeting of the Council where this issue will be fought out, is scheduled for the Fall, and I will have to line up the proper persons to fight with us to defeat the assimilationists.

Memo to Samuel Blitz From Bernard Stone

Subject - Los Angeles, California

A meeting of the allocations committee of the United Jewish Welfare Fund of the Los Angeles Jewish Community Council was held yesterday. It was well attended - among those present was Sam Briskin in behalf of the motion picture group.

The figure reported as having been raised was over \$358,000; and the sum which it was decided to divide was approximately \$296,000. It was therefore recommended that the sum of \$62,000 be spread between the gross and the net - doubtless this recommendation will be the subject of debate and attack at the meeting of the Jewish Community Council scheduled for the 13th of September.

Assuming that the \$62,000 stands, it will include a figure of 9 percent allowance for possible shrinkage, as well as for some reserves and expenses. If it should turn out that the shrinkage is below 9 percent, as it always has been in the past, then the allocations will be revised accordingly, by giving more to the participaths. These are the recommendations of the committee

Out of the \$296,000 approximately \$147,902 being 50 percent of the net, is to be divided between the JDC and the UPA in the proportion of 60-40. This would make our share a little over \$59,000.

My dear Mr. Montor: I agree with you that Mrs. Edward Jacobs should be invited to attend the meeting of the UPA, and also Dr. Morris Hexter. I am not clear in my own mind about the position which we should take with reference to Atlantic City. To break away from a united campaign in any city is a serious matter. I would suggest to you that, at your convenience, you run down to Atlantic City and personally canvass the situation, particularly the officers of the Atlantic City Federation. You do not indicate in your letter whether the Joint Distribution Committee has been treated any better. If not, perhaps joint action with the JDC would be helpful. Please write to the officers of the New England Zionist Reigion indicating to them our opposition to any emergency drive at this time or at any time without the authorization of the UPA. With reference to Los Angeles, I believe that a joint letter with the JDC is far more desirable than an individual protest on our part. They have as much grievance as we have. This is to acknowledge your amazing and astounding memorandum of September 20th. "Amazing and astounding" refers to Mr. Mendel Fisher's long distance telephone conversation with Rabbi Silver as conveyed to you by Rabbi Silver.

There is not a scintilla of truth in the assertions made by Mr. Fisher as reported to you by Dr. Silver.

The following is the resolution that was adopted by the Executive of the Z.O.A.:

"On the basis of reports on the Palestine situation submitted by the President and Secretary to the Executive of the Zionist Organization of America, it was resolved to recommend to the United Palestine Appeal as the fund-raising instrument of the Keren Hayesod and Keren Kayemeth to initiate an emergency conference to which all Zionist groups and Palestine fund-raising agencies would be invited for the purpose of discussing and adopting a program for enlarged fund-raising for Palestine."

It is Dr. Goldman's intention upon his return to New York to confer with Dr. Silver, Dr. Wise, you and me as to how this resolution shall be implemented. Furthermore, it is my understanding that Dr. Goldman, even prior to the above-referred to conference in New York, will make an effort to contact Dr. Silver either by letter or telephone call, and apprise him of the resolution adopted by the Z.O.A. Executive and invite his cooperation.

Dear Montor:

I beg to acknowledge copy of your letter addressed to Mr. Leon Gellman of the Mizrachi Organization, New York, dated July 19th, as well as copies of your letters to Dr. Silver and Mr. Lipsky of July 12th - all these letters dealing with the allocation of \$60,000 to the Mizrachi and the financial report submitted by the Mizrachi on the utilization of last year's allocation.

You pointed out in your letters that what was especially lacking in the report was an explanation of the item of 5.486 pounds transferred by the Palestine Mizrachi to the Toran Valavodan Fund. We have just now received a report on this amount, and I beg to enclose this report as received from the Hapoel Hamizrachi Organization. You will notice that the amount of 5.486 pounds is included in the general receipts of 6.848 pounds received from various sources. The expenditure, on the other hand, lists a numer of items which need further elucidation. We have asked the Hapoel Hamizrachi to give us the necessary explanations. Isuppose they will try to furnish us with the necessary material because I assume that the head office of the Mizrachi here as well as the Hapoel Hamizrachi have been informed in the meantime by Mr. Gellman of the contents of the letters he has received from you on behalf of the United Palestine Appeal. Meanwhile I want to tell you only that when our Treasury Department has received the material requested from the Hapoel Hamizrachi it will be able to point out that apparently a very great percentage of the funds goes generally and under specific items for administration, organization and propagania - a number of items and purposes being financed from various sources which in their turn have received funds from the Keren Hayesod derectly or indirectly.

I asked the Executive of the Jewish Agency to prepare a statement of allocations made by the Jewish Agency to various Mizrachi institutions during the year 5697, and you will find a copy of this statement attached.

I have also asked our Treasury Department to obtain additional material from the Hapoel Hamisrachi and to prepare on the strength of such additional information an analysis of the report of the Mizrachi on the Utilization of the whole amount of \$60,000 received and spent during last year.

Dear Morris:

First of all, I wish you and your family all good things for the New Year. Secondly, I am afraid I have to present in a direct way to you a problem which disturbs me and the J.D.C. greatly.

I have authoritative information that Mr. Magida, representing the U.P.A., headed a delegation in Altoona last week and emphatically requested a 50-50 division of funds to be raised in the Altoona Welfare Fund campaign in the near future.

I now quote from my letter to you of February 16th, 1938, in which we expressed our willingness to have a combined campaign with the U.P.A. in the Tri-State Area:

"You have undoubtedly been advised that some seventy-five Welfare Fund communities are subject to an agreement between the J.D.C. and the U.P.A. for the division of funds on the basis of 60% for the J.D.C. and 40% for the U.P.A. In the Western Pennsylvania territory, Altoona will definitely be considered as subject to this agreement, and Johnstown and Wheeling are included among the cities which have become affiliated with the Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds since the 1937 campaign in Western Pennsylvania. It was agreed by Mr. Nontor and me that Mr. Montor should do some fact-finding to establish the precise status of these two communities. If it is decided that they are in the same category as Altoona, the 60-40 arrangement will apply to them also regardless of the division of funds in the Western Pennsylvania zone as a whole."

Altoona is precisely in the same category today as it was on February 16th and it is definitely subject to the national agreement which we made with the United Palestine Appeal.

As a Welfare Fund community, funds in it must be divided on the basis of 60% for the J.D.C. and 40% for the U.P.A. Mr. Montor understands this definitely as he received a copy of my letter of February 16th to you and gave it his stamp of approval.

I must ask you, as Chairman for the Western Pennsylvania Region, to straighten this out promptly so that there may be no misunderstandings. We of the J.D.C. heartily dislike what I might call "fast ones" when agreements are made in good faith. Discouraging incidents like this and the Jewish National Fund undertaking independent campaigns in Western Pennsylvania make it difficult for us to have the type of agreement which we have entered into for the Tri-State area at your urgent request each year, and frankly, I think we will be much better off if in the future we pursue our course independently. The amount of money involved does not warrant these annoyances in the face of moral and written agreements.

He is forty-two years old, received a B.A. degree from Columbia University, studied at Berlin University for one year, assisted Dr. Samson Benderly in forming the American Palestine Company many years ago, for three years did fund-raising for the Jewish Telegraphic Agency and from 1924 to 1927 was a field director for the Keren Hayesod in New York State and in California. From 1927 to 1930 he was in motion pictures being associated with M.G.M. and Pathe. Thereafter he worked for a time for the Brooklyn Federation of Charities. When the Federation broke up he took up life insurance and has been at this ever since.

Mr. Lipsky warned me that there was a prejudice against Sakier. I am not aware of the reasons. I mentioned Sakier's name to Alex Rothenberg and Samuel Blitz. Both of them are opposed to consideration of his name on the ground that he cannot be handled. During his conversation with me Mr. Sakier indicated that I might expect unflattering comments upon him because during his years with the Keren Hayesod he was aggressive in approaching the communities and in compelling them to give far more than they had ever done before. Perhaps this aroused local Zionist resentment.

I am submitting this matter to you in the first place to find out whether you know his name and are acquainted with his activities and in the second place, because I do not wish to take on personnel without your definite approval. I must confess that it is difficult to take on a person when Alex Rothenberg and Samuel Blitz, on the basis of what they feel has been their experience, regard him as not too valuable. My private impression is, however, that the United Palestine Appeal has not had so high a standard that Sakier cannot measure up to it. My idea is not to take him on as an additional member of the staff but to place him in a niche which I propose soon to create.

Mr. Leon Gellman, President of the Mizrachi Organization, telephoned me today to request that \$15,000 of the loan now being negotiated by the United Palestine Appeal be turned over to the Mizrachi Organization on account of the commitment to be made for the year 1939.

The United Palestine Appeal has received a reply from Jerusalem asking, in response to a cabled inquiry from here, that we proceed to make a loan for \$150,000 to be transmitted to Palestine for the Keren Hayesod and Keren Kayemeth on account of future income. What is now suggested is that \$15,000 of this amount be made available to Mizrachi.

There is no authority in any resolution adopted by the Administrative Committee of the United Palestine Appeal to grant Mr. Gellman's request, but he suggested that in view of the emergency of his appeal you, Dr. Wise, Mr. Lipsky and Dr. Goldstein be asked by mail to agree to his request.

What is your view of the matter?

In my personal opinion it is difficult to understand what warrant there is for deducting from the meager amount that we are sending to Palestine on account of this loan the rather substantial item of \$15,000 for Mizrachi uses.

Dear Dr. Silver:

From your letter of September 29th to Rabbi Jonah B. Wise, I note that there is to be a meeting of the Board of Directors of the Council of Federations in Pittsburgh on October 16th and 17th. In view of the tide of sentiment for the J.D.C. that is so strongly rising all over the country, do you not think it would be most valuable for you to attend that meeting? I believe that the Board of Directors comprises men who mold public opinion in their own communities and direct public opinion throughout the country insofar as Welfare Funds are concerned.

In the event that you cannot attend this meeting of the Board, is there any way by which you could designate me as your proxy or perhaps your observer so that we might know at first hand the nature of the discussion that has been initiated by the J.D.C. and is being strongly followed up by that organization? Perhaps it might be irregular for a member of the Board to have a proxy or observer, but in view of your double capacity within the Board would its members strenuously object? Your own presence is, of course, the more desirable.

I heard this morning from Oscar Berman and Rabbi James G. Heller. The former said that it had finally been decided to allocate \$46,000 to the U.P.A. from the forthcoming Cincinnati campaign. This is 40% of the total. An increase of \$11,000 has been made.

In describing the nature of the discussions in Cincinnati, Rabbi Heller indicates confidentially that William Shroder, President of the Council of Federations, is the "chief offender" in not being able to see the importance of Palestinian needs. I regard Shroder as a fair-mimled man and in view of his attitude it is evident that those less fair-minded are prepared to yield to his arguments.

A great number of 1939 campaigns are being planned now or being initiated in November or December. If one or two of these should break away from present arrangements and decide on other than a 60-40 relationship there is a danger that these acts will be considered as precedents and will reenforce the determination of Coons and the other technical heads of the J.D.C. not to renew the 1938 agreement under any circumstances.

The J.D.C. is chary of any official conversations with us, hoping that in the meantime sentiment for a larger ratio for the J.D.C. will solidify. We on our side ought, I believe, to generate greater enthusiasm for Palestine's needs through a series of conferences in local and regional areas. It might be very helpful to call a meeting of the Z.O.A. Administrative Committee within the next few weeks to be devoted exclusively to the U.P.A. situation. In some communities the Zionists may not be the leaders in the Welfare Fund but they have a capacity for creating and influencing public opinion if they are stirred to such action. The Zionists are the only public force that we can play with to influence the leaders of Welfare Funds. This has no reference, of course, to the conference that was discussed at the meeting of the Administrative Committee of the U.P.A. which is of an entirely different character.

As regards the conference discussed at the meeting of the Administrative Committee, what date in October is suitable to you? We could then issue invitations to each of the affected organizations, asking them to send five or more or less representatives each. The organizations involved are the Keren Hayesod, Keren Kayemeth, Zionist Organization of America, Hadassah, Poale Zion, Mizrachi and Gewerkshaften. Are there any other organizations that ought to be included?

In order to keep you informed of the record, I send you herewith a copy of a letter from Mr. J. Levin of Dallas, Texas, one of the important Zionist leaders in that community who had been called upon by Braunstein to assist the Dallas Welfare Fund drive.

Dear Greenspun:

You will recall that many menths age I expressed dissatisfaction with your work. I believed that you were not making adequate visits to the communities in your territories and that your influence was not being felt in a substantial way either in increased funds for the United Palestine Appeal or in a new appreciation of the needs of Palestine.

I have carefully studied the record in the states in which you have traveled since you went to Chicago as the field director for the Midwestern area ith central effices located in Chicago. The record discles that, unlike any other section of the country, the Midwest has not shown any appreciable increase in funds for the United Palestine Appeal. For the states of Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Michigan, Minneseta, Ohio and Misconsin there has been a total increase as between 1938 and 1937 of some \$25,000. However Cleveland and one or two other major Welfere Funds in your area account for this increase.

When the regional effice was created in Chicage it was hoped that there would be closer contact between you and the communities, and that this contact would reflect itself in a more generous response and in closer friendships with the United Palestine Appeal among the communities as a whole. I do not find that the record justifies this hope.

In the early menths of your activity in Chicago you were, of course, bound down by the United Palestine Appeal Conference held on April 24th. That is why I withheld sharp criticism, because I appreciated that wide activity on your part had been hampered. But I believe that sufficient time has passed to permit a final judgment on the nature and effectiveness of your work.

It is my observation that instead of pressing the claims of Palestine and of the United Palestine Appeal, you have consistently presented to the effice the darkest side of the picture, and have hopelessly and helplessly yielded to what you characterise as anti-Zienist and anti-Palestine sentiment

in the majority of the communities with which you came in contact. I am not underestimating the strong sentiment for the Joint Distribution Committee in your territory, but it is difficult to understand why this one sector of the country should, in comparison with every other section, show a failure to respond to that emotional generality which has manifested itself for the United Falestine Appeal elsewhere even if it is only in small percentages.

I do not know what factors are responsible for the weakness of your approach and for the attitude of desperation and of defeat which pervades your contacts with the communities and your reports to this office. Perhaps after several years of continuous activity in the field you are tired and no longer have that unusual enthusiass which was responsible for placing you in the Chicago office.

The Midwest today is the most important single section in the country for the United Palestine Appeal. It is quite likely that the territory placed in your hands is too large and that it needs to be broken up, but even largeness of territory does not account for the poverty of results. You have not visited the same number of communities and with the same intensity as other fieldmen, some of whom have just as large a territory as you have. Today the cause of the United Palestine appeal must be presented with greater vigor than ever before. It must be supported with a fund of knowledge and acquaintance with other factors in the Jewish scene. I regret to feel that this grasp of the situation has not been displayed by you.

Accordingly I have come to the decision that it is not fair to the United Palestine Appeal that so important a part of the country should be left in the hands of one who, for whatever the reasons, is not equipped to deal with the problems organization and of education.

Appeal for a number of years, it is difficult for me to come to this decision. It would be easier to permit matters to slide and to hope that luck will bring about a change. But when I think of the greater requirements of Palestine I do not believe that I can take the easier course of permitting matters to slide.

In justice to pourself, therefore, and in justice to the United Palestine Appeal I am hereby informing you that the United Palestine Appeal must dispense with your services as of December 31, 1938. I am giving you this notice far in advance so that you may have adequate time to adjust yourself to whatever other activities which may attract you.

Abram Magida was in this morning and described developments in Philadelphia. Our friends are having a terribly difficult time. For a long time Lessing Rosenwald insisted on a 75-25 relationship, even though a much larger quota of \$500,000 was adopted. Morris Wolf, Chairman of the Budget Committee, made as the last offer at the meeting several days ago, a proposal of 66 2/3-33 1/3. I understand that there was a very heated session at which Mr. Robert M. Bernstein, Vice-Chairman of the Allied Jewish Campaign, and Judge Louis E. Levinthal declared that they would not accept less than 40%, even if it meant going out for a separate campaign for Palestine. They said that acceptance of the one-third ratio would destroy the possibility of future successful campaigns in Philadelphia.

It seems, however, that Mr. Leon Sunstein, Chairman of the Philadelphia campaign, telephoned Judge Levinthal and informed him of his belief that the 60-40 ratio would be maintained. That was also the impression conveyed to Magida by Kurt Peiser. However, more definite information will have to be received as no final decision has been made and the last official word is 662/3-33 1/3.

Dear Dr. Silver:

The first blow from a Welfare Fund for 1938 has struck. It is the city of Buffalo.

I have just had a wire from Robert Silverman who attended the meeting of the Allocations Committee there. After what he describes as "a lengthy, hectic meeting" it was voted to divide the funds on a basis of 38% to the U.P.A. and 62% to the J.D.C. The U.P.A. allocation will amount to \$20,000.

Silverman points out, however, that the Eugene Warner group had been battling from the beginning for a 75-25 relationship. Undoubtedly we have to thank Silverman that this great disparity was reduced to a more equitable basis, for there are few men who fight for our cause with such devotion and earnestness.

The Buffalo campaign is actually for 1939 since the 1938 campaign was held in May of this year. What has happened in Buffalo will undoubtedly be taken as a precedent in other cities. It is really essential that we know quickly how we stand in relation with the J.D.C. for if the J.D.C. invites a war we must act accordingly and be much more aggressive in covering Welfare Fund cities with a network of educational meetings and conferences and with a series of hammering appeals based, of course, on our determination to receive 50%.

In 1938 we could only talk about 60-40 in Welfare Fund cities. For 1939 we will have to talk about 50-50 if that is the basis upon which the J.D.C. wants to conduct a campaign.

Attached herewith is a copy of a letter from Abraham Goldstein of Hartford, Conn., who has really been our most effective friend in that city. Attached also is a copy of the acknowledgment which I sent to Mr. Goldstein pending your own reaction to the matter.

There is a widespread movement among Zionists in state units to create bureaus to supervise the affairs of the Zionist Organization, the Jewish National Fund and the United Palestine Appeal. My experience has not led me to see any value in this department-store-method of Zionist activity.

It is only because a single individual is able to occupy himself exclusively with the affairs of the U.P.A. throughout the year that we are able to make headway. If that same man would be involved in the inevitable politics of the Zionist Organization and the frictions between the J.N.F. and U.P.A., the U.P.A. would inevitably suffer reverses.

We are faced with a peculiar situation that it is upon the Zionists whom we depend for our major strength and yet it is the Zionists, by insisting upon these large outside expenses, that make difficult economy and the broadening of our field of contact.

What is your view in the matter?

I am roally sorry that there is some misunderstanding with reference to the question of a State Bureau for Connectinut. I have been delegated by the Zionist Region of Connecticut to take up the matter of a bureau with the Z.O.A., U.P.A, and J.N.F. I could not contact you personally the day following the National Executive meeting that I attended. / I then took up the matter with Mr. Silverman who informed me at the banquet that he discussed the matter with you and that you agreed to present it to Dr. Silver whom you were going to see shortly. We ere to have our State Conference on the 22nd and 23rd of October. It is of utmost importance that this problem be cleared up prior to that conference. We are at present functioning as a State Zionist Region. Adl of the activities for the U.P.A. J.N.F., and Z.O.A. are carried on by this Region in all the communities. Of course, we are getting assistance from each of the above mentioned organizations in the form of representatives being sent to us from time to time. We have reached a definite conclusion that this method is not bringing the best results possible to obtain from the Jews in Connecticut for Palestine. We reel that one director employed in the State under the management of the Regional Executive would bring greater results for our fund-raising institutions and Zionist activities. We are approching this problem with the propertion that the three institutions maintain the Bureau and a director by contributing an equal share of the expenditure; namely; one third. The approximate expense would be in the neighborhood of \$6,000 per year. The Z.O.A. has agreed to contribute its share. The J.N.F. has informed me that the matter has been referred to the Finance Committee of that organization and I am to hear from them very soon. Nowe we are anxious to hear from the U.P.A. As a matter of act, I have my hands full controlling the tempers of many loyal Zionists who feel that unless this change is introduced and a bureau is established,

they cannot assume the responsibilities they have so faithfully carried for many years.

I have assured them that I have confidence that the leaders of the above memtioned institutions will cooperate and will realize that this establishment will bring Zionist activities to greater achievements.

I have explained many other details in connection with this plan to Mr. Margolies, of the Z.O.A. and Mr. Fisher and Dr. goldstein, of the J.N.F.

If you feel you want any further information, I would appreciate it if you would take this up with them at your earliest convenience.

Attached herewith is a copy of a letter which I have addressed to the Keren Hayesod with regard to the funds received by the American Friends of the Hebrew University. As I informed you recently, the officers of American Friends cannot see any incongruity in keeping \$15,000 in its treasury when Palestine needs the money so urgently. In view of the fact that George Greenspun has been with the United Palestine Appeal a number of years it is likely that he will address himself to you with regard to the attached communication which I have sent him.

It would have been much easier personally to have permitted this situation to continue indefinitely but at a time when the United Palestine Appeal requires more aggressive and enthusiastic presentation of its needs than ever before, I do not think that it is fair that the midwestern section of the country, which is the most important single unit that we have, should be in the hands of one who has during the past year demonstrated a failure to rise to the demands.

Dear Mr. Montors

Your letter of October third (which was received October 8th together with a copy of a letter you sent to Greenspun) came to me as a distinct shock.

I agree with you that the Midwest Territory is one of the most important sections of the country. In the fourth paragraph of your letter to Mr. Greenspun you mention something about making friendships in the communities for the purpose of getting more generous responses. It is my belief that Greenspun has made valuable contacts for the U.P.A., because of his personality and willingness to work.

I have been receiving favorable reports regarding Greenspuns work throughout the territory, and sonsidering that the U.P.A. never had a man stationed here regularly, it is my humble opinion that Greenspun really showed some results. If you could see what the J.D.C. are doing here and have done for many years, I feel confident that you would agree with me.

Your statement, Mr. Montor, that you make regarding a man who has devoted the best years of his life to our cause, "that he has yielded to the Anti-Zionists and Anti-Palestine sentiment" is not very nice. It is hard to believe that a man who for 14 years, and as you stated in your letters that prior to his arriving in Chicago did valuable work for you could so readily yield to an Anti-Zionist and Anti-Palestine sentiment.

I do not ment to tell you how to run your business, but I also hire traveling men and am responsible for the success of more than fifty men who earn from \$5,000.00 to \$15,000.00 per annum. If I were running the U.P.A. organization, rather than to condemn a man who has done good work in the past, I would have taken the trouble to come to Chicago and see whether or not I couldn't improve the work of the representative. I would have also gone into the field to see what hardships he had to overcome. After doing both these things, I would then be in a position to know whether I would be justified in "riding" the man.

You know Mr. Montor, it is so easy to sit behind a desk in New York and issue orders that you think can be executed easily, and then because you do not believe results are coming in fast enough, to discharge a man in the manner in which you are doing.

My way of doing business is a little different, but of course, you are not interested in my way. I usually try and find out what is wrong if anything, with the methods being used, and as a Sales Manager or Director, it would be my duty to improve on these methods if I could.

I never knew Mr. Greenspun until he came to Chicago. It was only at the suggestion of Rabbi Goldman that I assumed the Chairmanship of the Midwest Region. In my observation of the activities of the Region, I have seen the amount of effort and work put in by Greenspun.

I have had reaction from people and communities he visited. I am happy to tell you that I was quite impressed and pleased with all the favorable response that came to me.

You admit that there has been an increase of \$25,000 between last year and this year. Still, you claim the increase was due to two Welfare Funds making contributions. I am assuming of course that these Welfare Funds did not make contributions last year. You are not taking into consideration however the smount of preliminary work Mr. Greenspun has done in the communities that will have their campaigns the rest of the year. Surely, the results to be obtained from the rest of the territory the balance of the year should be taken into consideration when you look at actual results of the territory.

I take no exception to your dispensing with the services of Mr. Greenspun. I do not know whom you have in mind to replace him. It has been my observation that there is a need for more men of Mr. Greenspun's type throughout the entire organization - men who know Zionism, Palestine, and fund raising, and to let a man put without giving him an opportunity to be fitted in elsewhere in the organization is something I cannot understand.

Is that the policy of the Zionist Organization? Is that the policy of the U.P.A.? Are we to handle our employees without any human consideration and expect better treatment elsewhere?

You know Mr. Montor, you do not encourage loyalty to an organization, even with the men who remain in your employ, when they see how the organization acts towards its employees who have been in the service for as many years as has Mr. Greenspun. I am not accustomed to this type of dealing when it comes to employees. The only reason we are still in business is because we think of our responsibility and our duty to the people who have helped us make our business successful. Were it not for this, which is practically our sole objective for remaining in this business, we might have retired long ago. Surely, the principles of Zionism give a person more to hope for than simply being discarded like an old shoe.

I again want to repeat that were it anyone else instead of George Greenspun who did the work he did, and who was in the service as long as he was, I would feel the same way about it.

Maybe I am wrong in permitting myself to express my feelings the way I have, but honestly, Mr. Montor, your letter came as a distinct shock and surprise to me. I had such high opinion of the U.P.A. organization and its business methods.

My associates in Zionist work with whom I have discussed this matter are as much shocked at your action as I am.

I will look forward to the opportunity of discussing this matter when I see you personally.

It was decided that although orders had been issued to the entire country to have meetings on October 23rd throughout the country some of the major cities should reserve their meetings for November 2nd so that the flow of publicity and emphasis on the problem could be maintained beyond October 23rd. Accordingly, there will be two meetings in the City of New York on Wednesday evening, November 2nd, one at Mecca Temple and another at the Brooklyn Academy.
- 2. A press luncheon to acquaint the writers of the Yiddish press with the background information and to obtain their cooperation for our further activities will be held at the Brevoort Hotel on Thursday, October 20th at noon with Dr. Solomon Goldman.
- 3. Mr. Joseph P. Tumulty, secretary to the late President Wilson, is sending a telegram to President Roosevelt. A copy is attached.
- 4. The Executive Director of every Welfare Fund or Jewish philan-thropic organization in the country has been asked to circularize the contributors, urging them to send telegrams to President Roosevelt. The Welfare Fund is asked if this procedure is not deemed feasible: to set aside the fund required for this purpose and send a joint telegram to President Roosevelt with the name of every individual contributor signed to it, adding to its effectiveness as a public expression.

We have a special interest in the situation in Palestine not only because it is sacred to Christian as well as to Jew, but also be- acause of our intense concern for the refugees who are being forced by the hundreds of thousands to leaveGermany and who, except for an almost negligible number, are refused admission to other lands. In the face of the tragedy of the Jewish refugees, it seems to us that it would be an unspeakable calamity if Palestine, already pledged to become a homeland for Jews, should now be closed to Jewish immigration. We have noted with satisfaction the statement made by the Secretary of State last week imlicating that the Government of the United States will take all proper steps to safeguard the rights of American citizens in Palestine. The interest which I am voicing, however, has to do not merely with the legal aspects of the question, but with the far-reaching humanitarian issue which is involved. The basis of our appeal is one of Christian concern for people who are struggling against adversity and persecution and who are entitled to our deepest sympathy and help. We associate ourselves with the efforts which you are making to encourage the British Government to act justly and wisely in the present situation, so that immigration to Palestine may be based upon the capacity of the country for economic absorption and that the door of hope may not be closed to Jewish refugees. Attached herewith is a copy of a letter from Mr. Louis Lipsky giving us in-structions to make out a check for \$10,000 to the Higrachi Palestine Fund as a losn to be debited against the appropriation to the Migrachi for the year 1939.

Will you make out a check for \$14,000 to the Palestine Marachi Fund on the following basis: \$10,000 constituting the lean on account of the 1939 allotment and \$7,000 on account of the fonds still due to Migrachi from the 1938 allotment. From this total of \$17,000 to be deducted the sum of \$3,000 which is to be made as a check to the leren Hayesed on behalf of the Migrachi to repay the Keren Hayesed in Jerusalem for the lean which it guaranteed for Migrachi in Falestine earlier this year.

Dear Dr. Silver:

I feel terribly foolish in writing this to you - - just as foolish as the people ought to feel who have been making the subject matter of this note a cause celebre in the coffee houses and parlors of New York Zionism.

It seems that I have violated the canons of international law and the amenities of everything else by dismissing George Greenspun as of December 31st. I have been so busy with the emergency work that I have been unaware of the extent of the discussion on the subject. I am completely unconcerned with it.

As I said to Dr. Goldstein on Saturday evening when he asked the circumstances involving the dismissal of Greenspun. I felt on the basis of my experience that Greenspun did not add to the effectiveness of the U.P.A. Perhaps I am wrong. But if I am wrong I have no business to remain as Executive Director of the U.P.A.

I have always felt and continue to feel that one should serve an organization only so long as he was deemed to be valuable to its interests. The officers of the U.P.A. need not give me the long notice that George Greenspun received if they feel my services are no longer required.

My dear Mr. Montor: In view of the fact that the Council of Federations meets on January 22, I do not think that it would be advisable to hold our Conference on that day. Some of us might wish to attend the convention of the Council which is a v ry important gathering of the leaders in welfare funds throughout the country. Furthermore, We do not want to put ourselves in the position of competing with them. Rather we ought to cooperate with them in every way. I therefore suggest that we definitely set our Convention for the weekend of January 15. Dr. Goldstein should be prevailed upon to cancel his engagement. I am happy to learn that it might be possible for Lady Reading to attend the Conf rence. I am entirely in favor of inviting the people whose names you suggest in your letter. Among the non-Jews, my preference in order would be: (1) Secretary Hull (if he can be persuaded to say anything other than a few perfunctory remarks) (2) Senator Borah (3) Governor Earle and (4) Mrs. Roosevelt. Let's try them first. If you would send me a copy of the programs of the UPA conferences of the last two years, it would give me an idea of just how the program should be built up. I should like to suggest some changes. After we agree on the general set-up for the program, we can then proceed in inviting the speakers whom we would like to participate. I am standing by you in the matter of Greenspun, and I see no reason why you should yield to pressure. With all good wishes, I remain Very cordially yours. AHS: BK

The report of the Mizrachi Palestine Fund shows that besides the sum of \$60,000 (LP 12,000) which is the allocation of the United Palestine Appeal in America, and the sum of LP 1,200 which the Keren Hayesod allocated to the Mizrachi Fund out of its receipts from South Africa, the Mizrachi Palestine Fund obtained LP4,037.351 through its campaigns in various countries, so that its total receipts during 1937 amounted to

19,788.300 LP 750.949 From the above figures it can be seen that out of a total of LP 19,788.300 a sum of only LP 5,499. - was spent on Mizrachi undertakings in Palestine as against LP 7,220. - administration, organisation, etc.

With regard to the sum of LP 1,584.— which was expended in payment of debts of an earlier period, it may be presumed that these debts too were created by administrative expenses in former years. In this connection we have asked the Mizrachi for their 1936 report as well so that we may be able to ascertain the nature of these debts. The 1936 report will also be useful for a comparison of the expenses during the two years.

In particular, attention is to be drawn to the item of LP5,486.- which was allocated by the Mizrachi Palestine Fund to the "Torah Va'avodah Fund".

In our letter to the Mizrachi Palestine Fund dated May 18th, we asked them to send us also the report of the "Torah Va'avodah Fund" so that we could have a complete picture of the Mizrachi activities in Palestine. To our regret we have not received the desired report to date. In a telephone conversation between Mr. Lieberman and Mr. Tauber of the Mizrachi Palestine Fund which took place on the 6th inst., the latter stated that on the day they received the Keren Hayesod letter of May 18th he sent a copy of it to the Executive of the "Torah Va'avodah Fund" and asked them to prepare and submit the report for 1937. We are therefore awaiting its receipt.

Until we have received the said report it is impossible of course to give a complete and comprehensive picture of the Mizrachi activities in Palestine. It is clear though that a considerable part of the allocation of LP 5,486.— which the "Torah Va'avodah Fund" received from the Mizrachi Palestine Fund was no doubt spent on administration and organisation.

It is to be noted that in the report it is not mentioned at all that the lion's share of the Mizrachi income for the said year, that is LP 13,200, was received from the United Palestine Appeal in America and the Keren Hayesod receipts from South Africa.

It is likewise to be remarked that in the pamphlet issued recently by the Mizrachi giving details on Mizrachi activities in the field of argricultural settlement there is no mention in any form of the contribution of the Keren Hayesod or Jewish Agency towards these activities.

One should observe, by the way, the foot-note in the report of the Mizrachi Palestine Fund which states that they received \$40,000 from the Mizrachi Women's Organisation in America for the construction of a Mizrachi Pioneer Women's House (Beth Chalutzot) in Tel Aviv. In this connection it is to be remarked that this year too (1938) the Mizrachi Women's Organisation in America has begun a campaign for \$50,000. The purpose of this campaign is unknown to us. We do know, however (from the minutes of March 23, 1938), that Mr. Montor, Executive Director of the United Palestine Appeal in America, raised a violent protest against this campaign inasmuch as it is in violation of the terms of the agreement with the Mizrachi in America on the basis of which the sum of \$60,000 is allocated to them annually.




