DEAR JULIUS: CANNOT BELIEVE THAT OUT OF 43,000 DOLLARS RAISED IN TULSA ONLY SEVEN ALLOTTED TO UNITED PALESTINE APPEAL AND SIMILAR AMOUNT TO JOINT DISTRIBUTION COMMITTEE. HOW CAN WE POSSIBLY COPE WITH OVERSEAS SITUATION AND ACCELERATE SETTLEMENT PROGRAM IN PALESTINE IF SO HIGH A PART OF FUNDS RAISED LOCALLY IS DEVOTED TO OTHER THAN PRIMARY NEEDS OF UNITED PALESTINE APPEAL AND JOINT DISTRIBUTION COMMITTEE. EVERY COMMUNITY IS TODAY SUBORDINATING ITS LOCAL PROGRAMS TO PROVIDE FOR EMERGENCY REQUIREMENTS ABROAD. Dear Dr. Silver:

Last night I came into a meeting of the Executive Committee of the Zionist Organization of America at about 10:30, three-quarters of an hour before it concluded. When I came in, there was a discussion in progress with regard to the relationship between the Joint Distribution Committee and the United Palestine Appeal, and a report was being presented on the discussions held with the Joint Distribution Committee representatives at our last meeting.

A general discussion followed. Rabbi Brickner felt that the Z.O.A. Executive Committee was no place in which to discuss United Palestine Appeal problems, and that this ought properly to be left to the Administrative Committee meeting of the United Palestine Appeal, to be held next Thursday night.

When called upon by Dr. Wise to say something about the United Palestine Appeal in relation to Welfare Funds, I said that the bargaining power of the United Palestine Appeal was dependent, in great measure, upon the strength of Zionists and ~~for~~ friends of Palestine in the Welfare Funds. The impression I had received from contact with the country was that there was the deepest sympathy for emergency relief needs among the Zionists themselves, and in many cases it was in that group that we encountered resistance to the idea that the United Palestine Appeal should be on a basis of parity with the Joint Distribution Committee.

The general opinion was that the country at large, insofar as the Zionists were concerned, ought to have given to them a better picture of the Palestine needs and of the claims of the United Palestine Appeal so that they might more aggressively fight for these claims within the Welfare Funds. It was on that basis that the suggestion was made and a resolution adopted that the United Palestine Appeal be asked for the next meeting of the Administrative Committee to invite representative friends of the United Palestine Appeal in a number of the most important Welfare Fund cities. This, it was said,

would give the communities themselves a better knowledge of the relations that were developing between the United Palestine Appeal and the Joint Distribution Committee, and prepare friends of Palestine for the independent United Palestine Appeal campaign that might possibly eventuate from a lack of agreement between the Joint Distribution Committee and the United Palestine Appeal.

This resolution was unanimously passed, and I was called upon to communicate with you.

Among those whom I recall seeing at the meeting were Dr. Wise, Mr. Lipsky, Dr. Goldman, Rabbi Edward Israel of Baltimore, Rabbi Heller of Cincinnati, Abraham Goldstein of Hartford, Rabbi Brickner of Cleveland, David Berenstein of St. Louis, and a number of other out of town and New York members of the Z.O.A. Executive Committee.

At the close of the meeting, Mr. Goldstein expressed his views to me of the ineffectiveness of the United Palestine Appeal office, meaning myself, of course. He felt it was I in the office who was creating a spirit of defeatism among the Zionists with relation to the United Palestine Appeal, and that it was this non-recognition of the importance of Zionists in Welfare Fund cities and the neglect of their cooperation which was responsible for the United Palestine Appeal being placed in the position that it had to ask for smaller terms from the Joint Distribution Committee than prevailed last year.

Being Executive Director of the United Palestine Appeal compels me to be more diplomatic than my natural tendencies would lead me to be, so that I had to listen patiently, if not calmly, to Mr. Goldstein's objurgations, particularly in view of the fact that he is a power for the United Palestine Appeal in Hartford.

I note your feeling that non-members of the Administrative Committee ought not to be invited for next Thursday night. I felt that it might be advisable to have some of these people so that they could see for themselves, in a realistic and not in an emotional atmosphere, exactly what was involved in the relations between the Joint Distribution Committee and the United Palestine Appeal. I did not think that any of these people ought to be given the opportunity of thinking or saying that every effort had not been made to present the United Palestine Appeal position aggressively and tactfully.

Although there was no direct discussion of ratios as between the United Palestine Appeal and the Joint Distribution Committee, I did derive the impression that most of those present felt that the United Palestine Appeal should not go below 60-40. After the meeting, Rabbi Brickner expressed himself to me as being in favor of 65-35.

I believe in the compilation of records, and that is why I would have liked to have some of these people recorded when in an official discussion they give their true views of how they feel overseas money should be divided as between the Joint Distribution Committee and the United Palestine Appeal, this to be done within the sphere of

the United Palestine Appeal and not of the Zionist Organization of America. I am positive that the discussion would be of an entirely different type. I feel rather convinced that the Joint Distribution Committee cannot possibly raise \$10,000,000 in New York, for this sum would have to come from big givers. The trades, professions and sections usually include the United Palestine Appeal, and always for 50%. At least, that was the proportion that prevailed in 1938, and that is the proportion that has been established in the several industries which have thus far organized 1939 emergency drives.

I was surprised to find how aggressive Mr. Lamport was for a 60-40 relationship, rather than anything lower. It is his feeling that even if the amount which the United Palestine Appeal should receive this year should be smaller, it would be injudicious, because of the precedent set for coming years, that the United Palestine Appeal should have a 30% ratio as against the Joint Distribution Committee.

In any event, I think that an agreement, whatever its nature, that is not binding upon New York as well as the rest of the country, will not be helpful to our needs except, of course, for a 60-40 agreed relationship in Welfare Fund cities.

In the last two days I have met here with Simon Shetzer, Chairman of the Jewish Community Council of Detroit, who feels that the United Palestine Appeal might possibly get 50%, and under no circumstances less than 40% if there is no agreement. I also discussed the situation with Isadore Samuels, Chairman of the Allied Campaign of Denver. He too is quite friendly. It is when I talk to such men that I wonder where the Joint Distribution Committee finds the sources for its cockiness.

Do you think that there should be a meeting of the Executive Committee of the United Palestine Appeal prior to the meeting of the Administrative Committee - I mean a dinner to start at 6 o'clock, in which Dr. Wise, Dr. Goldman, Mr. Lipsky, Mr. Lamport, yourself and one or two others might take part?

Let me know your wishes so that I may make arrangements.

Are you planning to come in the morning so that I will have a full day with you to discuss campaign procedure and also the agenda of the Conference?

I assume that your negotiations with William Shroder are directed toward a meeting with the Joint Distribution Committee some time next Thursday, to take advantage of your presence in the city.

If a joint campaign can be worked out between the JDC, UPA and the New York Federation with a proper allocation for the UPA, it would be highly desirable.

Mr. Lamport just called me long distance from New York and I had a long conversation with him. He read to me the draft of the telegram which he thought the JDC and UPA ought to send out. I told him to hold off until we hear Mr. Baerwald's response to Mr. Shroder's request for a meeting of the Committee of Four. Mr. Lamport agreed to abide by this arrangement.

I am deeply concerned to learn that the Jewish National Fund is planning a campaign for Golden Book certificates in St. Louis to be inaugurated on January 29th.

We are now engaged in an extraordinary effort to preserve an adequate ratio for the United Palestine Appeal in Welfare Funds as compared with the Joint Distribution Committee. Any action which we take now which emphasizes that the United Palestine Appeal is not a unified fund-raising instrument for Palestine will be used against us and involve far greater losses than would be incurred if we abandoned petty fund-raising efforts at this time.

May I strongly urge that you send a wire to the President of the Jewish National Fund in St. Louis urging him not to inaugurate this Golden Book certificate drive only a few weeks or, at the most, a few months prior to the official opening of the Welfare Fund campaign. I would appreciate your kindness in giving me a copy of the telegram which you send.

It is my understanding that the United Palestine Appeal has been given the right to direct you to take such action.

I need hardly say that I shall press this point very vigorously at the next meeting of the Administrative Committee of the United Palestine Appeal unless satisfactory action is taken by you.

Michael Sanders, who has been travelling through some of the communities in Indiana and Illinois, gave me a rather distressing report about Cedar Rapids. You may have the information from your own sources but I want you to know that Platt of the J.D.C. has been doing a damnable job against us. The statements that he has made are injurious because he said that only 1100 Jews can come into Palestine. There is no reason why that campaign should not be on the basis of 50-50 but they have decided on a 60-40 allocation. I can see no objections as to why the J.N.F. should not insist on getting a few hundred dollars at a time when so much is being done to discredit Palestine.





Enclosed herewith is a copy of a letter from Rabbi Sanders A. Tofield of Houston, Texas.

Yesterday I attended a conference organizing the New York State United Palestine Appeal. It was the best organized and best attended meeting of its kind at which I have ever been present. The sentiment for Palestine was truly remarkable. The men present were not the type of people who may be depended upon to demand the utmost for Palestine, but who, when called upon for contributions, give \$5. The delegates at Utica were truly representative of their communities and included many of the major contributors and chairman of local drives.

They had planned to introduce a resolution demanding for 1939 60% for the United Palestine Appeal and 40% for the Joint Distribution Committee. Naturally, I stopped the introduction of this resolution and had to explain somewhat cryptically that there would be a combined drive in 1939 and there was no point in raising a discussion at this time as to the relations of the United Palestine Appeal to the Joint Distribution Committee.

Although Utica had in attendance about 350 delegates from virtually every community in the state, and although the sentiment was overwhelmingly for Palestine I realize it is not possible to translate this experience into a national feeling. It merely provides the background for belief that where communities are well organized and where proper leadership is made available and there is adequate contact between the communities and the United Palestine Appeal the strength of the United Palestine Appeal cannot be discounted. I feel certain that out of the 1939 campaign experience there will emerge new contacts for the United Palestine Appeal which will be helpful, whatever the outcome of the campaign.



Responding to urgent suggestions from many organizations, groups and individuals throughout the country, the Jewish National Fund has announced its decision to dedicate a volume of its Sefer Ha'Zahav, the Golden Book of Remembrance, to the Honorable Franklin D. Roosevelt, President of the United States.

This project will give public expression to the widespread feeling of appreciation and gratitude for the President's historic action in convoking the International Conference to create an Intergovernmental Committee that would seek to obtain asylum for the refugees from the lands of oppression within the framework of the immigration laws existing in the respective countries.

While the original Franklin D. 

Evidently the Chicago community is going into the campaign with real spirit and there is a prospect that a sum of \$20,000,000 will be raised.

Please send a memorandum to Jonah Wise and Mr. Coons relative to the subject which you discussed with me Long Distance today. We will not sign the agreement unless there is a clear understanding that all funds, regardless how the individual may wish to designate them, will be included in the joint \$20,000,000 fund and will come under the arrangement outlined in the Rosenberg Memorandum. We cannot permit any loop-holes which later on develop into very serious matters.

As the year draws to a close, you ought to begin making arrangements for a final accounting as between the UPA and the JDC on the basis of our 1938 agreement.

Dear Mr. Goldstein:

Now that the first impact of the new Nazi outburst has been faced, I want to tell you what the Joint Distribution Committee is doing and plans to do. The Joint Distribution Committee must account for by far the largest share of responsibility and assistance HERE and abroad.

In Germany, the loss of property, earning ability, community organization, religious ministration and social service to German Jews is practically complete. We have been recently informed, however, that the Reichsverband, the nation-wide organization through which we work, has again been able to open its doors. In other words, this enables us to function in meeting the results of this latest catastrophe.

On a broken, frightened and bullied people a fine is levied of approximately \$600. for each man, woman and child. I shudder at the question of how it can be paid.

What is our plan?

First, not one cent for tribute from us. The \$400,000,000, fine levied by the Nazis on the Jews of Germany will be taken from tortured men, frightened women and degraded children. This we must admit.

Second, it must be remembered that until help of governments is available, large funds must be raised for food, shelter, clothing, medicine, etc. for refugees, children, women and the aged. Whereas formerly our monies were supplemented by funds made available by the local Jews, now it is obvious the major responsibility will be ours.

Third, we stand ready to cooperate with large and long-range plans of democracies for any substantial schemes which intergovernmental committees may decide upon.

Fourth, but most important, it is our responsibility to aid refugee committees in countries of temporary refuge, as well as at the point of their final destination. Toward this end, the Joint Distribution Committee is one of the major contributing agencies in this country to the work of the National Coordinating Committee for Aid to Refugees and Emigrants coming from Germany.

This entire program can only be accomplished if vast sums are put at our disposal. Only then can we do the decent job that is required of us.

I must hear from you. Remember, MILLIONS FOR HELP, NOT A CENT FOR TRIBUTE.

Dear Dr. Silver:

Today I met with Isidor Coons at the J.D.C. office to discuss the technical set up of the 1939 campaign. Early in the conversation Mr. Coons stated that his understanding is that an individual may earmark a gift outside of what he contributed to a Welfare Fund and sent it directly to the J.D.C. The latter would have the right to keep the money and not to divide it.

I suggested that although I could not speak authoritatively and finally for the U.P.A. on this or any of the other issued, it was my conviction that Mr. Coons' interpretation was entirely wrong and that any campaign on such a basis would be out of the question. The understanding of the U.P.A. officers, I said, is that all funds received either by the U.P.A. or J.D.C. from whatever source or for whatever purpose during the year 1939, must go into the common treasury established by the united campaign.

I informed Mr. Coons that I would convey his understanding to you. He emphasized that it was his personal understanding and that he would take up with the officers of the J.D.C. the question of whether that was also their understanding.

Mr. Coons stated that following our meeting at Rabbi Wise's office he had reconsidered the subject of a central campaign office and that he had come around to the view that a unified office was essential.

This central office would have within it the campaign staff for the united drive, a common publicity department and the common treasury.

On the question of publicity, he declared that the J.D.C. did not want to have a repetition of the experience of 1934 and 1935 when there were two publicity directors with equal power, with each getting in the way of the other.

He felt that campaign efficiency, and economy in time, involved one man in charge of a department. He asked whether I had any proposal for a publicity director. I suggested Steinglass. He did not protest.

He also stated that it was necessary to have one man to direct the field staff which would be composed of the men working with the U.P.A. and the J.D.C. For this central directing task he proposed Robert Herman who is now assisting him in the J.D.C. for that purpose.

It was made clear that nobody on that staff could be hired or fired without the approval of the J.D.C. and U.P.A. directors. However, the only criterion for the composition of the staff is to be the ability to produce money.

Question of office engagement then arose. He suggested that the details, hiring of clerks, etc., aside from the sub-executives, men or women, would be left to Alex Rothenberg and Miss Morrissey for the J.D.C.

On the speakers' bureau, he said that the J.D.C. had a very efficient department which they were pleased to make available to the united campaign.

On the question of the availability of records following the close of the 1939 campaign, it was agreed that there should be a uniform community card for 1939 and that copies of all reports and correspondence would be made available in triplicate: one for the united campaign office, one for the J.D.C. and one for the U.P.A.

We agreed to meet again on Friday to go over the allotment of quotas and the assignment of territory. He proposed, however, that we eliminate from consideration for field directors the following cities:

New York, Chicago, Philadelphia, Boston, Cleveland, Detroit, Baltimore, Los Angeles, Newark, St. Louis, Pittsburgh, San Francisco and Cincinnati. These cities produce virtually 75% of the money.

Most of the communities have their own campaign directors who are doing or can do a good job. In one or two cities where the direction is weak, such as Newark or Pittsburgh, we might make available a special man for the period of the campaign, but these cities would be treated as autonomous units in which the ordinary field director would have no part. If special stimulation or contact were required Coons or I would do the job.

Coons made it clear, however, that the J.D.C. intended to maintain its own campaign office intact. That office would continue its educational work. It would sponsor educational tours of speakers devoted to the special tasks of the J.D.C. It would continue to collect money from previous campaigns since this could not possibly be done by the united drive. The J.D.C. would also conduct whatever additional publicity which dealt specifically with its own work. Coons assumed that the U.P.A. would act in the same way.

If this unified campaign office, along the lines described above, is to be agreed upon, I see the situation as follows:


A great part of the staff of the U.P.A., as that of the J.D.C., would be merged in the combined drive. We would retain our U.P.A. office through which we could carry out such activities as are involved in the collection of outstanding money in the previous campaigns; assurance for whatever publicity be decided upon that cannot go out under the combined drive's heading; compilation throughout the year of the records of the united campaign so that they can be instantly available to us for whatever eventualities occur in 1940; conduct of whatever educational activities that we may have in mind; and for such work as may be agreed upon.

The staff necessarily in the U.P.A. office would be quite small. The main question that arises is to what extent we are to have any field staff outside of the field staff employed by the united campaign. The J.D.C. is planning to have two or three or four men roaming the country for special J.D.C. activities of a special educational nature. It is evident that men employed by the combined drive would not be able to be advocates either of the J.D.C. or U.P.A. but only of the unified drive.

The question remains whether we ought to dismantle the machinery in the regions which we have built up during the past year. I believe that the nucleus for this machinery should be allowed to remain even though it will involve additional cost, but the complete elimination of that machinery may leave us unprepared for whatever may happen in 1940.

It is clear that a definite agreement and contract will have to be drawn up between the U.P.A. and J.D.C. and National Coordinating Committee to put into writing some of the things which have already been agreed upon and other things which should be agreed upon so that there may be no misunderstanding whatever.

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



Sometimes a complaint is made by those attending National Conferences of the United Palestine Appeal that many things are talked about, but little is said of the actual developments in Palestine.





From Bernard Stone

...Dr. Kornfeld spoke at a luncheon yesterday at which Judge Hollzer presided. The group was small but included Louis S. Nordling and Marco R. Newmark, former presidents of the Los Angeles Jewish Federations, Milton Baruch who is now president, Aaron Riche, Max Rothenstein, Gustave L. Goldstein, Theodore Strimling, Walter Cohn, Jack Nathan, Jacob J. Lieberman and Rabbi Magnin. His speech was rambling and very ineffectual, but was nevertheless much better than the address he made on the previous evening at the JNF banquet, where he was a flop.

Dr. Magnin commented on his poor address and advised us against using him for campaign purposes. He said that Kornfeld does Palestine more harm than good, and that he gives an entirely erroneous impression of the UPA. Dr. Magnin also told me that by virtue of his poor speech, he had "talked himself out of a paid engagement at Wilshire Blvd. Temple" which Magnin had intended to offer him. However, in view of all this, I had a most glowing report of Kornfeld's address in Phoenix, Arizona, from Dr. Bank.

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

I have read with interest your joint communication with Rabbi Jonah B. Wise of December 21 with reference to the coming campaign of the United Palestine Appeal and the Joint Distribution Committee.

There is one point that I wish to make, and that is this. In our community, and undoubtedly in many other communities, there is always a dispute as to the proportion to be allocated to the United Palestine Appeal and to the Joint Distribution Committee from the amount of the funds raised, thereby causing unnecessary friction among the members of the committee.

The adherents of the United Palestine Appeal try to get as much as they possibly can for their side, and those favoring the Joint Distribution Committee do the same for their side, resulting, at times, in a tug of war.

My suggestion would be that communities be asked to send the entire amount raised in the campaign to a common treasury in New York and that the division between the United Palestine Appeal and the Joint Distribution Committee be made in New York. I believe that if this is done, it will straighten out one of the difficulties which we have been having in our city, and, I believe, in many other communities.

I am sending you herewith a check for \$10,000 to apply on the amount still due the United Palestine Appeal from our 1938 Fund. We still have outstanding collections to make in connection with our 1938 appeal. If we do collect additional funds, of course, we will pay up the entire pledge based on the former 10 percent arrangement.

According to our present calculations, we have paid you \$160,000. With the attached check, we will have paid you \$170,000. On the basis of what has been raised, as of December 5, 1938, the 1937 United Palestine Appeal has collected \$1,952,807, including Chicago payments of \$160,000. Excluding service payments of \$73,600, and the \$84,664 cost of running the New York campaign there is a net collected as of the date mentioned, of \$1,634,542. On this basis, Chicago should pay \$181,616.

All of this seems very involved, but what it actually means is that, including possible collections on outstanding pledges that your report still indicates Chicago ought to pay you something between \$180,000 and \$190,000. We have thus far paid \$170,000.

This will acknowledge your letter of December 20th, with which you enclosed a check for \$10,000 to apply to the allotment to the United Palestine Appeal from the campaign initiated by the Jewish Welfare Fund in 1937.

May I once again point out that the United Palestine Appeal does not agree to the principle established by the Jewish Welfare Fund that it will contribute on the basis of ten percent of what is raised nationally. This completely loses sight of the fact that in Chicago there may reside a far greater proportion of the men who are blessed with a greater portion of the world's goods than may be true of leaders in other communities. It is conceivable that the Jewish communities throughout the United States might become so poverty-stricken that only in Chicago would there be a group of men with sufficient means to contribute to overseas needs. I am confident that Chicago would not take the position that it must gauge its own generosity by the economic well-being of the rest of American Jewry.

Population alone cannot be the primary decisive factor in determining contributions because there are many communities in the United States which give far more than their proper share per capita, as there are other communities which give far less than their proper share. In the course of the year these inequalities are ironed out by the willingness of Jews to give in accordance with their understanding of the needs rather than in accordance with the lack of understanding displayed by other Jews.

I must again dissent from your arbitrary decision to exclude, from the amount which the United Palestine Appeal ought to receive, payments which are made as service charges to organizations whose work is integral to the success of United Palestine Appeal fund-raising efforts. By the same token you might decide to deduct the expenses incurred in the conduct of the national campaign of the United Palestine Appeal. These service payments are no less an essential part of the running of the national campaign in the same way the expenses of running the New York drive are an inescapable obligation in raising maximum funds for the New York United Palestine Appeal.

The contributors to the Jewish Welfare Fund of Chicago are contributors to the United Palestine Appeal. I am sure that you have just as great an interest in the success of the United Palestine Appeal as I have, and that this is true of every contributor. It is unfortunate, therefore, that there are introduced mathematical and statistical elements which have no bearing whatever upon meeting the immediate tasks of upbuilding Palestine so that it may be able to receive an increasing number of Jews now without homes.

I therefore submit a formal application to the Jewish Welfare Fund by which the Welfare Fund will at least adhere to the principle by which it is operating in relation to the United Palestine Appeal, that is, that ten percent of what is raised nationally by the United Palestine Appeal will be contributed by Chicago. I think it eminently unfair that any departures should be made.

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

SUBJECT: Chicago area

I have met Mr. Samuel Goldsmith, Judge Hugo Friend and Mr. James Becker of the Welfare Fund. I have offered all possible cooperation, both personal and from our organization. Mr. Goldsmith was not very friendly nor at all well disposed toward the leaders and members, or ideology of the Zionist or UPA organizations. However I think I succeeded in putting it over to him that I wish to be friendly and to cooperate; in time I think we will get along, particularly if I am successful in developing personal contacts which I propose to do in Chicago.

Mr. Goldsmith was very disparaging concerning the circular~~s~~ and efforts we made last week. You will recall that I was not in full accord with the idea but did not wish to oppose Dr. Goldman and Col. Rosenberg on my first day here. My fears were justified inasmuch as Mr. Goldsmith stated that all workers we had secured had worked with him last year and belonged to his organization anyhow. On these grounds, I am opposing another idea of Dr. Goldman's and Colonel Rosenberg to hold a Mass Meeting of the Zionists, approaching the same group on the same idea, the purpose being to obtain workers. Instead, I am to see Dr. Goldman on his return next Sunday, in order to make an attempt to raise some real money for the drive among Zionists, in answer to Mr. Goldsmith's claim that we haven't a right to our allocation in Chicago inasmuch as Chicago, with 250,000 Jews is giving the UPA 40% of what New York City gives it, with fewer Chicago Zionist contributors.



Dear Dr. Silver:

In accordance with your telegram I phoned Mr. Goldwasser this morning. The conversation was somewhat as follows:

Montor: "This is Henry Montor of the United Palestine Appeal. I have been designated by Dr. Silver to get together with you for the setting up of the 1939 combined campaign office. When can we get together?"

Goldwasser: "I do not care to meet with you."

Montor: "I don't understand you. I believe that you were designated by the Joint Distribution Committee to act on its behalf in setting up this new office. I am the representative of the United Palestine Appeal. It is important that we get together as quickly as possible for that purpose".

Goldwasser: "I don't see it that way. I was appointed by the JDC to be on a lay committee. First I was told to meet with Alex Rothenberg, the UPA Office Manager. Now I am asked to meet with you who have the same status in the campaign as Mr. Coons who is the Director of the JDC."

Montor: "That is correct".

Goldwasser: "Under the circumstances, I do not care to have anything to do with it."

Montor: "You were designated by the JDC and I was designated by the UPA. I fail to see how the JDC can take to itself the right to determine who shall act and speak for the UPA".

With the martinet voice for which he is famous, Mr. Goldwasser thereupon concluded the conversation.

We seem to be stymied. I have reported to Dr. Wise and Mr. Lipsky on the situation. Dr. Wise is rather colorful in his description of Mr. Goldwasser. Mr. Lipsky feels that we can do nothing else but hold fast.

I do not like to be put in the position of resisting the appointment of a lay representative for the UPA, but Goldwasser has taken such a strange and unjustified attitude that I am wondering whether we ought not for that reason alone adhere to the purpose which you set forth in your telegram of last Saturday.

In the meantime nothing has been done toward the setting up of an office as a result of the interference by the JDC with the normal routine of Rothenberg and the JDC Office Manager getting together for the task of renting an office, putting in desks and typewriters and accomplishing other office incidentals.

I have a very definite suspicion, even stronger than it was last Thursday, that Goldwasser's purpose in this thing is not merely to set up an office but from the outset to have a controlling authority in the campaign. I wonder whether the JDC has made it entirely clear to all its officers that you and Dr. Wise are the National Chairmen and act accordingly.

The publicity story has not yet been O.K.'d. I was informed by the JDC Publicity Department that the JDC officers are still "browsing" about the story.

The lack of an office does not prevent our going forward with the organization of a campaign, but it is distinctly irritating to have these unnecessary delays.



This will acknowledge the receipt of the bill addressed to the United Palestine Appeal dated December 12th, 1938 for the amount of \$2,275.

May I point out that this bill is unwarranted in asking an additional payment on collections made by the United Palestine Appeal on the 1936 campaign.

The total cash income of the United Palestine Appeal for 1936 (as of December 20, 1938) is \$1,756,296.96. The sum of \$57,800 was raised for the Emergency Fund sent to Palestine which, by agreement, was not subject to the service charge of  $6\frac{1}{2}\%$ . This leaves a total of \$1,698,496.96.

The Zionist Organization of America has received on account of the 1936 campaign the sum of \$109,028.53. If figured on the basis of  $6\frac{1}{2}\%$ , there might be due to the Zionist Organization of America on the \$1,698,496.96 the sum of \$110,402.30. However, the sum of \$2,488, was raised by the Zionist Organization of America in 1936 through its own efforts. May I point to Clause 15b of the 1936 agreement which binds the Zionist Organization of America to "oblige itself not to undertake any fund-raising campaign (exclusive of membership)".

Accordingly, a sum of money is due to the United Palestine Appeal from the Zionist Organization of America.



Dear Mr. Margulies:

This will acknowledge the receipt of the bill addressed to the United Palestine Appeal dated December 12th, 1938 for the amount of \$2,275.

May I point out that this bill is unwarranted in asking an additional payment on collections made by the United Palestine Appeal on the 1936 campaign.

The total cash income of the United Palestine Appeal for 1936 (as of December 20, 1938) is \$1,756,296.96. The sum of \$57,800 was raised for the Emergency Fund sent to Palestine which, by agreement, was not subject to the service charge of  $6\frac{1}{2}\%$ . This leaves a total of \$1,698,496.96.

The Zionist Organization of America has received on account of the 1936 campaign the sum of \$109,028.53. If figured on the basis of  $6\frac{1}{2}\%$ , there might be due to the Zionist Organization of America on the \$1,698,496.96 the sum of \$110,402.30. However, the sum of \$2,488 was raised by the Zionist Organization of America in 1936 through its own efforts. May I point to Clause 15b of the 1936 agreement which binds the Zionist Organization of America to "oblige itself not to undertake any fund-raising campaign (exclusive of membership)".

Accordingly, a sum of money is due to the United Palestine Appeal from the Zionist Organization of America.





For these men and women have thrown off the mantle of sorrow and are today the backbone of the revival of the Jewish homeland in the vast program of mass settlement and colonization which has provided an avenue of new life for more than 200,000 Jews from Germany, Austria, Poland, Czechoslovakia, and other lands during the past five years, with the aid of the UNITED PALESTINE APPEAL.

The UNITED PALESTINE APPEAL is the only authorized agency of American Jewry to finance the Jewish national reconstruction program in Palestine.

The UNITED PALESTINE APPEAL is urgently in need of funds for the following major purposes:

3. To purchase the land on which Jewish settlements are founded; to develop water resources.
4. To finance the establishment of settlements.
5. To build homes, schools, to provide agricultural implements, and live stock.
6. To promote every enterprise in agriculture, commerce, trade, and industry which will tend to give employment and thus enlarge the capacity of Palestine to absorb additional immigration.
