- ad (1) A hut was provided for Maanot, building materials for various points, and a shed for the storage of fishing nets for Kvuzat Maapilim in Athlith. In July/September 1939 L.P. 1,894 were expended for the purchass of 350 tents, accommodating 1200 workers in the labor camps, in the majority new arrivals released from the Government internment camps.
- ad (2) In the same period 1500 workers were given instruction in various branches of agriculture. Similarly, 70 women of the newly arrived immigrants were admitted into the Girls' Farms Schunath Borochow and Ayanoth and there trained in agricultural work. In July unemployed men were given special instruction in the hoeing of citrus plants, which needs special training. Some 200 youths between 14-17 years of age are being trained in Agricultural work in the schools of Givath Hashlosha, Yagur and Kfar Yeladim, for which the Labor Department of the Jewish Agency provides the funds.

MINUTES OF ANNUAL MEETING OF THE KEREN HAYESOD (PALESTINE FOUNDATION FUND)INC. AT HOTEL ASTOR MONDAY EVENING, NOVEMBER 27, 1939, 8:30 P.M.

The annual meeting of the members of the Palestine Foundation Fund (Keren Hayesod) Inc. was held on Monday evening, November 27, 1939, at the Hotel Astor, New York.

Mr. Louis Lipsky presided.

Revealing the difficult position the Keren Hayesod has come to occupy in the field of fund-raising and Zionist propaganda, the chairman stated that the Keren Hayesod, which started in the United States in 1921, has undergone quite a number of transformations, in the course of which it has to a large extent lost its identity and been involved in any number of campaigns, without many of the people who have made such contributions being aware of the fact that they have helped to build up the Koren Hayesod. As a result, it has become increasingly difficult to identify the Keren Hayesod contributor. He believed that a way will have to be devised in order to rehabilitate the Keren Hayesod contributor, and thus enable the administration to know who are Keren Hayesod contributors, and who are not. For the time being, however, and to serve the purposes of an annual meeting, letters were sent out to quite a large list of contributors to the United Jewish Appeal, who are known to be Zionists or Palestine sympathizers and who are entitled to be called Keren Hayesod contributors, as well as to Zionists of the Districts of Greater New York, for the purpose of submitting the financial report, taking such action as may be required, and naming the Board of Directors of the Keren Hayesod for the ensuing year. The chairman remarked that very little can be said at this time in connection with next year's campaign because all the discussions are still in flux, but he was hopeful that an arrangement similar (with slight variations) to that which prevailed in 1939, would be made for 1940.

FINANCIAL REPORT:

Mr. Charles Ress, Secretary, submitted an audited report of the income and disbursements of the World Keren Hayesod for the period from October, 1938, through June, 1939.

He explained that the total amount expended during this period amounted to approximately \$3,000,000, and was used for the following purposes:

With regard to the income and disbursements of the Keren Hayesod in America, Mr. Ress presented the statement that was prepared by the bookkeeping department for the period from January 1, 1939 to November 27, 1939. (Attached).

Supplementing this report, Mr. Ress stated that for the period from January 1, 1939 until November 15, 1939, there has been remitted to Palestine by the Keren Hayesod and the Keren Kayemeth, the sum of \$3,300,000, which represents the largest sum collected and remitted during a like period at any time. He added that it is anticipated that an additional \$1,500,000 will be obtained from the funds of the United Jewish Appeal, making a total of \$4,800,000 to be remitted to Palestine during the year 1939.

Mr. Ress stressed the importance of increasing the collections and the need of keeping alive the meaning and function of the Koren Hayesod in America.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the report as rendered by Mr. Ress, be accepted.

GREETINGS FROM DR. SOLOMON GOLDMAN:

The chairman read the following telegram of greetings from Dr. Solomon Goldman, President of the Zionist Organization of America, who was addressing a meeting in Toledo, Ohio:

REGRET INABILITY BE PRESENT ANNUAL MEETING KEREN HAYESOD ZIONISM AND YISHUB TRAVELLED, PLANTED, BUILT SUCCESSFULLY DESPITE THORNY PATH, ROCKY FIELDS, AND SHIFTING SANDS. FOUNDATION IS LAID THIS THE TERMINUS ABOUT IN ALL FUTURE ZIONIST EFFORT OUR MOVEMENT INELUCTABLE OUR ACHIEVEMENT UNDENIABLE. ZIONISM ROOTED SOLID IN OUR PAST, SUCCESSFUL IN PRESENT, MUST BEND JEWISH WILL TO JEWISH FUTURE. HITLERISM CANNOT SHALL NOT TRIUMPH AGAINST CHALUZIUTH. WE MUST GUARD AGAINST ITS FRUSTRATION BY DEXTEROUS DIPLOMACY. GREAT BRITAIN, FRANCE HAVE AS FRIENDS ALL HATERS OF BARBARISM. WE MUST STEEL OUR HEARTS REMIND THEM AND WHOLE WORLD IMPLEMENTATION WHITE PAPER IS BARBARISM SUI GENERIS. HITLERISM ACCELERATES PLAGUE. MACDONALD SLOWS UP REMEDY. WE MUST FIGHT ON THIS FRONTIER OF JUSTICE WITH UNYIELDING CONVICTION.
