My dear Dr. Silver:

Mr. Gellman of the Mizrachi came in today and asked me to submit the following proposal to the United Palestine Appeal:

The American Mizrachi is in receipt of a cablegram from Jerusalem, dated September 25th, signed by Meyer Berlin. In this cablegram, Mr. Gellman was asked to submit to the organizations in America and Canada, a proposal for sending to Palestine products for the orthodox cooperatives, especially for rabbis and yeshivot. The following products are required: flour, sugar, quakers, matzoth, conserves, fruit, meat, fish.

The food is intended for the rabbis and the yeshivot students. It is proposed to undertake, in conjunction with the Agudath Ha'Rabbonim, an appeal to orthodox Jews, asking them to contribute food - the food mentioned - for rabbis and students. The food will be purchased in the United States, and will be forwarded on American ships to Palestine.

The question is, aside from the fact that this would be in the nature of a competitive campaign, whether it is desirable at this time to advertise the fact that Palestine, or some part of Palestine, is in the state of starvation and must be provided with food. In all probability, the Mizrachi could make the appeal in such a way as to avoid the implications of a campaign that intrudes upon the regular community campaigns. It could do this by means of appeals by orthodox rabbis from their pulpits. It could secure contributions of food from large wholesale houses owned by Jews, who could be persuaded, probably, to make contributions of food.

Some decision should be made on this matter as early as possible.

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

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

Dr. Joseph Cohen brought the following information with regard to the Council in London:

1. It is more than unlikely that a new public appeal to the Jewish community in England will be made at all. The Council has decided to abstain from all activity outside of England, and to concentrate entirely on the work for refugees already in England.

2. Under present conditions the sums needed for direct assistance to refugees in England amount to £10,000 a week. The Council hopes to raise money for a period of approximately five months and is of the opinion that thereafter the refugees will be absorbed in various ways in England.

3. To cover this expenditure and the already existing deficit, the Council wants to raise, as a last effort, the sum of £500,000 in the following way:

A. £250,000 to be raised in England by subscriptions from a limited number of contributors, but not through public appeal;

B. £250,000 to be raised through subscriptions in the United States.

Lord Reading approached Mr. Nathan Straus of New York City by cable, suggesting that this £250,000 be raised in America through a limited number of rich Jews, outside of the existing appeals, and not from personalities who are connected with the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee. I do not know what Mr. Straus' answer was. I am here just two days and cannot claim any profound knowledge of conditions here, but it seems to me unlikely that this appeal can be successful.

In reply to yours of November 21st:-

I am working under great difficulties, and find it almost impossible to arrange a schedule that would enable me to have a discussion in the Zionist Organization of the supervision of the editorial opinion in The New Palestine. Under the circumstances, I am compelled to write these editorials on Wednesday, under pressure, and it is physically impossible to consult with all those with whom consultation is often important.

The editorial on the "United Jewish Appeal for 1940" was written after Mr. Montor and myself had a conference, at which there were present representatives of the Welfare Chests. It was at this meeting that Mr. Hyman announced the postponement of the meeting of the Negotiating Committee, and refused to commit himself to any date when the Negotiating Committee would be called together. At that time, the Welfare Chest representatives severely criticized Mr. Hyman. On the following day (Saturday), a public luncheon was held, at which Mr. Hyman repeated his story of why negotiations were being delayed. At that luncheon, Judge Rothenberg publicly reminded him of the duty of the Joint to consult with its partners.

As a matter of fact, I based the editorial upon the position we had taken in the meeting with the Welfare Chest, and on what Judge Rothenberg said at the luncheon. *The editorial was written before any date had been fixed for the negotiations.*

I understand from Mr. Montor that the editorial has not been disadvantageous to our cause. On the contrary, it has strengthened our position with the Welfare Chests and given us a grievance against the Joint, which the public knows about, and which becomes useful in negotiation.

Dear Dr. Hoffman:

I am in receipt of your letters of November 29th and 29th.

I should, of course, be happy to do everything within my power to help you obtain the money which you inherited from your father, the late Dr. Hermann Cohn of Berlin. There are, however, two or three points which must be made clear before anything can be done.

(1) If your father not only paid the Reichsmark in Germany, but these Reichsmark were already transferred to Palestine and are available in Palestinian currency, then your father certainly not only applied for an immigration visa, but it was actually granted to him. Otherwise Palestinian currency would not be available at all, because no transfer is made to Palestine for Jews who were, and who remained, outside the country and did not even receive an immigration permit.

(2) If the money was indeed already transferred to Palestine, then it is against all regulations to pay it to claimants in other countries. The transfer was effectuated by the absorption of certain merchandise in the Palestine market, and this purchasing capacity is, according to the existing regulations, to be used only for the transfer of money to Palestine. The law definitely and expressly forbids the making of payments to persons not immigrating into Palestine. In other words, the transfer apparatus cannot be used for transitory purposes.

But recognizing that in special cases payment outside of Palestine may have some justification on special grounds, it was decided that a certain amount should be transferred to a prospective or ex-prospective Jewish immigrant, if the remainder were invited in a project appropriate to the public interests of the country and the Jewish settlement there.

(3) The currency restrictions in Palestine are operative today in cases such as yours, in two ways:

- a. No payments outside Palestine (or outside certain parts of the British Empire) can be effected without special permit from the Palestine Government;

b. No payments can be made to enemy subjects.

You have not ceased to be a German subject by the Nuremberg laws, and as long as you will not be deprived of your German citizenship by a special act of the German Government, and until such time as you have acquired some other citizenship which would automatically invalidate your German citizenship, you may be regarded as an enemy by the Palestine Government. However, I don't believe that this obstacle is unsurmountable, because the Palestine Defense Regulations maintain that a person is not an enemy merely because of his citizenship of an enemy country. And, since you are living in a neutral country, and the place of residence is an important item in defining the term "enemy subject", you may be able to overcome this second obstacle by an application from your attorney in Palestine, Mr. Hans Kaufmann of Tel Aviv.

I have explained the situation to you in all this detail in order to avoid any misunderstanding. Therefore, if, as I have indicated in point (1) in my letter, your father's money was actually transferred to Palestine and is being held there, and if you are willing to accept an arrangement along the lines indicated in the second paragraph of point (2), then I believe that I can be of assistance to you in arriving at an agreement with "Havaara" in Palestine, always provided that we can somehow solve the problems presented by point (3).

I deeply regret that I am unable to give you more encouraging information, but as you will see, the whole matter is involved with Government rulings.

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



TO BE READ AT THE NATIONAL CONFERENCE





My dear Mr. Landauer:

Let me thank you for your letter of January 22. There will be a substantial sum of money coming to the United Palestine Appeal out of the 1939 collections. I doubt very much whether it will be possible to get advances on the 1940 campaign. If an emergency arises, it may be possible for the UPA to borrow certain sums against our 1940 income. We have done that in the past.

After reading the enclosed letter, I wonder whether you can be of any help to me and to the young man, Israel Seemon, who is my cousin. He is a splendid young fellow and was an official of the Zionist Organization in Lithuania. I helped him to go to Palestine and I have tried to find an opening for him with the Keren Hayesod, for which organization he worked in Lithuania. From the letter you will see that in spite of promises, etc. he has gotten nowhere. I spoke to Mr. Hermann while in Geneva last summer and he said he would look after the matter. Evidently nothing has as yet been done.

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



Mr. Kaplan goes on to say, "that in the course of these negotiations we proposed to them that their people should enjoy all our services and all rights given by us to every organization, Zionist or non-Zionist, which is connected with us; that we were ready not only to recognize the rights of every individual among their membership to enjoy our services but that we would also recognize the rights of the Revisionists collectively in every field of economic and financial work. We stipulated one condition: to end the fight against our funds; to declare that they are enjoying our funds and that they should appeal for the support of the funds. They offered a counter-proposal: that we should promise them a certain percentage out of the income of the funds; they said they were ready to proclaim their support of general campaigns for Palestine but they asked that in such countries where Keren Hayesod and Keren Kayemeth conduct campaigns, the drives should be joint drives of Keren Hayesod and Keren Tel Hai, or Keren Kayemeth and Keren Tel Hai. Naturally we could not accept these conditions. It seems therefore that the negotiations were brought to an unfruitful conclusion.

Dear Moshe:

You will be interested in having a report of Jabotinsky's first public appearance in New York on March 19th, before an audience of about 4,000 people, a large part of it composed of old Zionists who came out of interest in hearing Jabotinsky.

Jabotinsky was introduced by Dr. Akzin "not as a Chamberlain Jew" but as a real representative of the Jewish people. He ^{was} greeted with special warmth Mr. Heschel Farbstein, who took his seat on the platform.

In the name of the Bill of Rights, Akzin protested against discrimination in Palestine, where the Agency betrays the confidence of the contributors in America and distributes its funds only to "party members".

Other persons who greeted Jabotinsky were the Kasin Preppes, formerly of Warshaw, who stated that the Betar, whose organization consists not of cent Zionists but of Jewish State Zionists in Palestine, has shown that Jewish blood is not hefker, and Rabbi Louis I. Newman, who had the honor (instead of Jacob deHaas, who is dead) of calling upon Mr. Jabotinsky, and who announced that the audience now expects of Jabotinsky "a decisive, dramatic stroke for the Jewish people".

This decisive, dramatic stroke, however, did not come to pass, because Jabotinsky's speech seemed to be extremely moderate in form and in its whole conception. The program and the arguments certainly disappointed his own henchmen to a great extent.

Jabotinsky declared that he did not intend to deal especially with the land legislation. This was certainly a breach of the Mandate and of faith and of the given word by England. But this is just one more item to show that the fate of England is today in incapable hands. The Jews, however, cannot ^{concentrate} specifically on this item, because they must now concentrate all efforts on the larger issue of the Jewish future.

The slogan of the day is "The Max Nordau Plan", which was propounded by Max Nordau in 1939 and unfortunately not accepted by the Zionist Movement, and is of the greatest moment today. Nordau spoke of the immigration of 500,000 or a million Jews, annually into Palestine, but today we should be satisfied with the program of 500,000 a year, the lower limit of his plan. If we can dump these numbers of Jews yearly on the shores of Palestine, the Jews would pour their gold into the country.

To be

Naturally, if our voice is heard, then Palestine should not be minimized as it was at the Evian Conference, or by an official Zionist speaker at the Mecca Temple, who dared to speak of an immigration of 50,000 Jews annually, which really means a Palestine deluxe and not a great national enterprise. How could we dare to offer a solution which would mean an immigration of one million Jews during the period of 20 years, and this viz-a-viz the situation in the Jewish zone of distress in Central and Eastern Europe.

If we wish to succeed and to have a restoration of the Jewish State as a result of this war, which is the only war aim of the Jewish people, then dignified and strong representation of the Jewish cause must be assured. To gather the necessary strength we have two means:

(a) A Jewish army, which is much more than a Jewish legion, which represents the future Jewish State, as the Czechoslovakian or Polish State is today acting by an independent Czechoslovakian or Polish army:

(b) representation of our cause by a supreme Jewish body, comparable to what was established by the Czechs and by the Poles, by a provisional Jewish Government; but as this conception may be not liked in the United States, he would prefer to call it a Jewish Embassy or a Jewish headquarters. To create this Jewish headquarters the Revisionists are willing and they are always ready to do it together with the old Zionist organization, but only by way of creating a new competent body, superseding all existing bodies and committees. To create such a united Zionist front, he is ready for a round table conference at any time, in fact, he offered it, but the refusal came from the other side. On September 8th he approached the old Zionist organization with such a proposal and suggested a scheme of common work, especially with regard to the distribution of incoming funds, a distribution according not to party lines and party strength, but to the number of needy persons. Alas, he did not receive an answer. He is even agreeable to combine forces for the collection of funds, but to this, too, he did not receive an answer. Now, if nothing would come of such negotiations, then the Revisionist Party is ready to proceed alone and submit this matter, by plebescite, to the Jewish people, in order to create by this plebescite the provisional government, or the Jewish headquarters. In the meantime, immigration must go on, and he appealed to the Jewish people to break through the gates.

Dear Judge Levinthal:

I am writing you about a matter of importance in which your co-operation is desired. I know that you are a busy man, and that you are carrying a number of heavy responsibilities already. However, I can assure you that what I am proposing will not add to your cares or times-consuming burdens.

As perhaps you can surmise, the matter has to do with Jewish affairs. No doubt you feel, as I do, that we have all the organizations in American Jewish life that we need, if not a number too many. It may please you, therefore, to learn that the organization I am writing about is intended eventually to remove from the American scene a considerable number of separate appeals.

As all who are active in Jewish life in this country are aware, there are at least fifty appeals, some supported by American committees, circulated in the United States on behalf of communal activities in Palestine independently of the United Palestine Appeal, which this year for the second consecutive time is a part of the United Jewish Appeal. The activities in question are of a variety of kinds. They are educational, cultural, religious, research, and social service in all sorts of ways, such as hospitals, orphanages, and homes for the aged. None of the ones I am referring to is of a political nature in any way. Some of these institutions are of an excellent character and perform useful and essential services in a country which in the last analysis, from the Jewish point of view, is the largest of refugee resettlement projects.

The Multiplicity of these separate appeals in this country unquestionably is highly undesirable for a series of reasons, as follows:

1. When these appeals are carried directly to the individual members of the public, they serve chiefly to confuse if not also to annoy the recipients, and in any case they divert and dilute their interest from the major appeals, in which we are primarily interested.
2. When these appeals come before the Welfare Funds in the various cities, such as the Allied Jewish Appeal of Philadelphia, the budget or allocations committees of the Welfare Funds, in spite of their being able to obtain some information of a financial nature from the Council of Federations and Welfare Funds, have no way of really judging the value of the various activities, and no logical way of deciding how much to grant them.
3. The cost of conducting these many small separate appeals is very high, especially since many of them send representatives from Palestine to America.

4. Where people of standing are induced to interest themselves in these activities and to associate themselves with the American committees of them, extra burdens are placed upon them that detract from their effectiveness in the larger activities from their effectiveness in the larger activities with which in most instances they are identified.
5. From the standpoint of the Palestinian activities, most of the appeals are ineffective, producing unsatisfactory results, and there are grounds for believing that they compete with one another and tend to neutralize one another.
6. The American donors have no way of being assured that their money is well used, or that the better organizations receive the proportion of support that they deserve.

This matter has been under study for some time, and a group finally has decided to take steps to inject some system and order into the situation. An organization, called the American Palestine Fund, Inc., has been incorporated, that will seek funds from the Jewish community of America, to be distributed in the discretion of its Board of Directors after careful study of each of them to the deserving and constructive activities in Palestine in accordance with their merits and needs. In cities where there are Welfare Funds, the American Palestine Fund will approach the Welfare Fund rather than the individual members of the public. The American Palestine Fund will maintain a competent American representative in Palestine whose duty it will be to keep in close contact with all the institutions in Palestine to which the American Palestine Fund might make grants. All requests from Palestinian institutions desiring grants from the American Palestine Fund will be made to him in the first instance. These requests will be placed by him before the Palestine Advisory Board of the American Palestine Fund, which Board it is expected will be composed of prominent Palestinians. This Board will make its recommendations to the Board of Directors in America in connection with each request. The final decision will be made here by the Board, taking into account these recommendations and the amount of money available each year. Naturally, each institution receiving a grant will be required to agree to refrain from independent efforts to obtain funds from America during the period intended to be covered by the grant. The American Palestine Fund already has received letters from a number of the best known independent institutions in Palestine stating their approval of its objectives. The American Palestine Fund has no political connections or position whatsoever, and could not be regarded as either Zionist or in opposition to Zionism.

In addition to the Board of Directors and the Palestine Advisory Board, there is also an American Advisory Board, of which Professor Albert Einstein is the Chairman and on which there already are a number of eminent American scholars.

The Board of Directors will be a nation-wide body composed of community leaders from all the important cities. It will number forty-five. It will probably meet not more than once a year, probably on some convenient occasion such as the annual assembly of the Council of Federations and Welfare Funds or the annual meeting of the Joint Distribution Committee. The routine affairs of the American Palestine Fund will be conducted by an executive committee of the Board, made up mostly of New York members who can attend meetings when necessary.

Dear Mr. Norman:

I have given careful consideration to the contents of your letter of May 21st with reference to the recently organized American Palestine Fund, Inc.

I am of the opinion that there is no need for the creation of a new super organization in the United States for the purposes outlined in your letter. The Vaad Leumi in Palestine would be the obvious agency to check up on the various Palestine organizations seeking to make appeals in the United States. The Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds could very easily obtain all the necessary information about these agencies by communicating with the Vaad Leumi and passing on such information to the local Welfare Funds.

If an American Committee should be formed to coordinate these various Palestinian appeals, the American branch of the Jewish Agency for Palestine should, it seems to me, sponsor it. As it is, the American Palestine Fund, Inc. may create confusion in the minds of many American Jews who may look upon it as a successor to, or a competitor of, the United Palestine Appeal.

For these various reasons I find it impossible to accept your kind invitation to serve as a member of the Board of the American Palestine Fund, Inc.



Dear Mr. Leidesdorf:

With the exception of a lump sum of \$40,000 which I personally helped to obtain from the Ladies Garment Industry, all monies received by the Greater New York United Jewish Appeal in payment of pledges of the 1939 campaign during the last two and one-half months have been applied to the 1940 campaign. With the above exception no 1939 monies at all have been paid into the national treasury by New York since March 25, 1940.

The large monetary loss suffered by the agencies of the United Jewish Appeal is apparent.

I respectfully request that you, in your capacity as Treasurer of the New York United Jewish Appeal, look into this matter so that New York, like all other communities, may redeem the outstanding 1939 pledges instead of permitting them to lapse into the 1940 drive.
